

The Adoration of the Shepherds


Painted by: Guido Reni




Happy Christmas


Painted by: Lorenzo Lotto

Interesting Fact: The Adoration of the Magi is the name given to the subject in the Nativity of Jesus in art in which the three Magi, represented as kings, having found Jesus by following a star, lay before him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, and worship him.
