Escape to the Edge of Everything

Chile is the place to be when you want to turn off the plugged-in chatter of every day and feel truly away from it all. This adventure takes you to the very brinks of civilization with a visit to the high Atacama Desert and then to Easter Island, where the gigantic stone effigies glare over the Pacific. In between, you'll have a chance to explore urban Santiago and go wine tasting at a vineyard in the long shadows of the Andes. But never fear. Even in the wildest settings, you'll settle into the finest luxury inns and hotels. Throughout, you'll have the fulltime company of accomplished local guides who help you make sense of cultures and environments that couldn't be farther from the norm. As your guide Andres likes to say, "Chile helps you feel what you've never felt, learn what you never knew, and have the time of your life, too!"

DAY 1

SAN PEDRO DE ATACAMA

- Explore the pre-colonial fort of Pukara Quito
- Take the culinary trail to a lunch at the peak

Your group will meet at your luxury hotel in the vast red Atacama Desert near San Pedro. The Atacama is said to be the driest on earth, which makes it all the more remarkable to see how it's been shaped over the millennia by hard-to-imagine erosion. You'll visit nearby Pukara Quito, a 12th century fortress that was the site of one of the first encounters between the indigenous people and the Spaniards. Believe it or not, local farmers raise crops and livestock in this unforgiving terrain. You'll meet a farm family and visit a 2,000-year-old village. After lunch in the colonial town of San Pedro, you'll have a chance to walk in the Valley of the Moon (where the landscape leaves no question how it earned its name). From a ringside location in Death Valley, you'll watch the sun set over one of the best views of the Andes – a truly splendiferous moment.

DAY 2

SAN PEDRO DE ATACAMA

- Meet the artisans of the Altiplano
- See the flamingos in the Chaxa lagoon
- Experience the Lagunas Altiplanicas

The Altiplano – high plain – of the Atacama is where your day begins. There, the town of Toconao has a bell tower and church that are national monuments. On a walk, you'll meet some of the many artisans who preserve local crafts in their workshops. Driving deeper into the highlands, you'll stop at some of the perfectly blue lakes, with edges rimmed in salt like a margarita glass and backed by the biggest skies you've ever seen.

In the small village of Socaire, the walls are clay, the roofs are clad in sod, and the local lunch spot is awaiting you with a home-cooked lunch of their specialties. It's a special opportunity to get a glimpse of a life that in many ways has changed very little since Inca times.

The Sala de Atacama is a vast, jagged salt flat rimmed by steaming volcanoes and crimson crags. This afternoon, you'll explore an expanse of it in Los Flamencos National Reserve. The natural stars of these mirror-smooth waters are the flocks of flamingos at home in their habitat. The combined effect of the pink flock in the blue water backed by snow-capped Andes is truly magical.

Later, you'll return to the hotel to relax before dinner.

DAY 3

SANTIAGO

- Enjoy a guided walk in the historic city center
- Shop for the local lapis lazuli

After breakfast, you'll make the flight to the Chilean capital of Santiago. The skyscrapered city is a far cry from the remoteness of the desert, but even here the tallest

buildings are dwarfed by the Andes. The historic district is known for its Spanish colonial architecture. As you stroll among sites like the Presidential Palace, the Plaza de Armas and the Barrio Bellavista, your guide will give you insights on life in this remarkable setting. You'll also have a chance to explore the Precolumbian Museum, which has one of the world's truly great collections of relics from Central and South America. If you like, you can also visit workshops where the blue stone known as lapis lazuli is on display. (The stone is found only here and in Afghanistan.)

DAY 4

CASABLANCA VINEYARDS / VALPARAISO

- Visit a family-owned vineyard and enjoy a tasting
- Explore Valparaíso, a UNESCO World Heritage Site

Chilean wines are justly renowned around the world. Today, you'll be welcomed to the family-owned Emiliana Vineyards in the Casablanca Valley to learn about local traditions and, of course, for a tasting. The microclimate caused by the confluence of Andes and the cool Humboldt current flowing up the Chilean coast make this region a great spot for a very wide range of grapes from Merlot to Riesling. At the vineyard, you walk the gardens, see how native animals contribute to biodiversity that supports the vines, and tour the cellars before your tasting.

Then you follow the picturesque valley on a drive to Valparaíso, known as the "Pearl of the Pacific." Your guide will lead you on a walk in the lively and extremely colorful historic district. Then you hop aboard the funicular for a ride up to the panoramic views over this port city on the Pacific Ocean.

Back in Santiago, try one of the city's fine restaurants as you have dinner on your own.

DAY 5

EASTER ISLAND (RAPA NUI)

- Flight to Easter Island
- Learn about the history of the island at the Father Sebastian Museum
- Experience a Tahai Sunset

The original Polynesian settlers dragged their tiny outriggers ashore on Rapa Nui more than a thousand years ago. You can only imagine their relief and gratitude at the unlikely discovery of this tiny dot of land in the vast Pacific. Your arrival after a flight from the mainland is just as dramatic in its own way, as you immediately appreciate the remoteness...and the comforts of the modern eco-resort that will be your outpost for the next three nights.

This first afternoon is yours to wander the oceanside grounds. You may choose to shop the local art and craft market in Hanga Roa before you visit the small anthropological museum that was founded by a German missionary to preserve artifacts found on the island.

Just before dinner, you'll get to witness the spectacle of your first Easter Island sunset.

DAY 6

EASTER ISLAND

- Walk the Poike Volcano peninsula

Fueled by a hearty breakfast, we're off to the place where the Easter Island story began: Poike Volcano, the first bit of land that emerged from the Pacific about 3,000,000 years ago. On an incredible and scenic walk around the peninsula, you'll see the circular, 500-foot-wide crater. Your guide will share lore and research that begin to draw a picture of ancient life here. The grassy hills, for instance, were once covered with trees...and deforestation led to the civilization's decline before the first Europeans arrived in the 18th century.

You'll see "Maunga Vai a Heva" where a massive face carved into the rocky hillside as a part of water rituals. There's "Ana o Keke," a cave where virgins were sequestered to maintain the paleness of their skin. Preserved petroglyphs tell their story. And you'll see signs of the tribal strife that divided the peoples of various parts of the island.

Finally, you'll stretch out on the grass for a picnic overlooking the epic landscape and the deeply, deeply blue ocean stretch off to infinity. The balance of the day is yours to enjoy at leisure, maybe at the pool or in the spa.

OVERNIGHT: EASTER ISLAND

There is no more iconic place on Easter Island than the beach where a rank of 15 moai statues stand at attention on the ceremonial platform at Ahu Tongariki. They look east, and you will too after the pre-dawn drive to the beach for a sunrise breakfast you'll never forget. To witness the revelation of these stark profiles against the sky is an opportunity to appreciate their mystical power.

In fact, the moai are the focus of this entire fascinating day. At Akahanga Village, you see the grave of the island's first king...and a beach strewn with face-down statues knocked from their platforms by a long-ago tsunami. You'll also walk on the haunting slopes of Rano Raraku, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. It was the outdoor "workshop" where carvers chipped at the volcanic rock where it rose from the ground to create the statues. Hundreds and hundreds of moai – some complete, many only partially hewn – stand sentinel across the terrain.

You'll also visit the the largest of the moai at Te Pito Kura and puzzle over the effort it required to move the 35-foot statue that is believed to weight more than 80 tons. Finally, you stop at Akahena, Easter Island's finest beach. The fine sand is the pink of coral and the waters are crystal-clear turquoise. The seven moais at Ahu Nau Nau are the best-preserved on the island with exceptionally refined carving.

Back at the resort, you'll come together for a farewell dinner and a performance of traditional Rapa Nui music and dance.

- Flight back to Santiago

Enjoy your final morning at leisure. After lunch, you will transfer back to Easter Island Airport for your return to the mainland. On your late arrival into Santiago, you say your final farewells before your independent departure from Chile the following morning.

ESCAPE TO THE EDGES

EASTER ISLAND TO THE
ATACAMA DESERT, CHILE
COULDN'T BE FARTHER FROM
LIFE AS YOU KNOW IT.

Sometimes, the best purpose of a vacation is to shut down the hubbub and plugged-in chatter of everyday life. It's good, on trips like that, to spend some time with the big mysteries of nature and civilization. Oh, and to pause now and then to ponder it all over a fine glass of wine. Chile checks all of those boxes, as you will quickly discover on our new itinerary that ranges from the Atacama Desert to Santiago vineyards to enigmatic Easter Island.

Out on the edge of everything — in a tiny village huddled on a sky-high plateau or on a volcanic speck in the Pacific guarded by Moai — it's just about impossible to feel anything but awe. The ancient is always close. The gargantuan efforts that long-lost people made to leave a mark are humbling. In Chile, even in the nation's urban capital, the tallest skyscraper looks like a toy against a backdrop of the snow-crowned Andes. It's an adventure rich with how-is-this-even-possible moments.







It's hard to imagine the Atacama Desert — even after you've been there. It's amazing to see flamingos tiptoeing in a lagoon up against a tumble of crimson rocks at the foot of a steaming volcano. At Pukará de Quitor, you walk in the ruins of a 12th century fortress that's one of the first places where the indigenous people met the Spanish. And if you doubt for a moment that it's possible to live in this near moonscape, you'll learn otherwise when residents of a pre-Inca village invite you in for lunch.

A miracle of how to squeeze great wine from a waterless land, the Casablanca Valley is home of some of Chile's finest vineyards. You'll spend time amid the vines, on one of the most famous ones, and sit down to the most scenic tasting of white varietals that are especially happy in this micro-climate. You also have two nights in Santiago with plenty of time to explore, join the locals for an evening promenade, and see some of the architectural treasures from the Colonial era.

Then, all of a sudden, time kicks into reverse as you cross a patch of the southwest Pacific Ocean to Rapa Nui, known to us as Easter Island. The first inhabitants came from the opposite direction — Polynesia — nine centuries ago. You already know about the relics they left behind, the Moai statues, but you cannot begin to appreciate them until you see them in person, and you'll have plenty of time for that on your two-night visit. Let yourself soak in the solitude and the mystery of the island. There are gorgeous trails for walking, and the luxury resort where you settle in. It shows you the great hospitality that couldn't contrast more with the glares cast by the Moai. You'll be well connected with experts who help you understand the unfathomable obsessions that created one of the most unique places in all the world.

Toasting the new trip over a Maipo Valley cabernet, Andres, our local friend and expert guide, summed it up. "This view of Chile drives home just how small the world we inhabit every day really is. Out on the periphery — where an Andean breeze carves an Atacama moonscape, where stone faces five times as tall as you stand guard against who-knows-what — you get to feel what you've never felt, learn what you never knew, and have the time of your life in the process."
