Echoes of France, Close to Home

We have a friend who says that when she's in the mood for France she just heads for Québec. Interesting advice—but it doesn't do justice to the unique New World culture and landscape of this province. True, the first Frenchmen sailed up in 1535, and their influence is still obvious—in the food, language and architecture. As the only fortified city in North America, Québec City might look just as at home on the Dordogne River as the St. Lawrence. The farmland may even remind you of Normandy. The most startling discovery, though, is that the European past thrives so near to home. The Charlevoix region was declared a Heritage Cultural Region by UNESCO. On a fascinating series of walks, we'll learn why as we visit the villages, the tradespeople and the terrain which make this one of our favorite destinations anywhere. Join us and see how it feels to go to Europe without leaving the continent.

DAY 1

QUÉBEC CITY

- Explore the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Québec City
- Enjoy grand views of the river from Château Frontenac

We meet in historic Québec City, overlooking the St. Lawrence River. Founded in 1608 by Samuel de Champlain, it has been designated a UNESCO World Heritage City. On our warm-up walk you'll feel like you're stepping back in time as we wind upward from the Lower Town - visiting historic sites, passing under the boughs of century-old trees, soaking in the city's unique blend of French and British heritage. In the Upper Town, we'll visit Chateau Frontenac, one of Canada's most recognizable landmarks, to take in grand views of the river. Among the cobbled stone streets we discover is charming Rue du Petit-Champlain, lined with quaint shops and cafés.

Our welcome dinner lets us explore two of the finest places in Québec City. It's a leisurely evening, as we enjoy our welcome aperitif under a 17th century vaulted ceiling, then enjoy our meal and indulge in dessert, coffee or a nightcap at our final stop.

DAY 2

HAUTES-GORGES / LA MALBAIE

- Explore Hautes-Gorges National Park, the highest peaks East of the Rockies
- Spot peregrine falcons and rare caribou herd
- Take in river views from our French-style castle Manoir Richelieu

Church steeples pierce the landscape, marking the location of the region's rural villages as we drive from Quebec City into the National Park Les Hautes-Gorges-de-la-Riviere. It's one of Quebec's most beautiful natural monuments. At the foot of the highest peaks East of the Rockies, the valley offers spectacular scenery and is the home to peregrine falcons and a rare caribou herd. Our leisurely paced walk on a gravel path lets us follow a river embedded into sheer walls of stone with gorgeous views of the valley.

Later in the day, we make our way to La Malbaie, one of the province's most elegant resort towns. This area became popular with both American and Canadian politicians in the late 1800's. Manoir Richelieu, a French-style castle perched scenically on the brink of the mighty St. Lawrence River is our home for two nights.

DAY 3

TADOUSSAC

- Spot minke, fin and beluga whales on a scenic fjord cruise
- Follow a footpath, with scenic river and fjord views, to an historic fur trading post

Today is a real highlight of our week as we venture along the St. Lawrence and the majestic Saguenay Fjord. The Saguenay's untamed beauty has attracted visitors for decades and our explorations today demonstrate why. This morning, it's all aboard for a magnificent whale watching

excursion and zodiac adventure. As the salt water from the St. Lawrence mixes with the fresh water from the Saguenay, a plankton-rich ecosystem is created which makes this one of the best whale watching locations in the world. We have the opportunity to view several varieties of whales, including minke, fin and perhaps the endangered beluga whale for an unparalleled experience with nature.

After lunch in one of Tadoussac's charming cafés, our walk takes us along beautiful footpaths with spectacular views of the St. Lawrence and the Saguenay Fjord to Tadoussac, Canada's first fur trading post where Samuel de Champlain arrived in 1603.

DAY 4

ST-JOSEPH-DE-LA-RIVE / BAIE-ST-PAUL

- Visit to an historic paper museum
- Savor artisanal cheeses at a private farm
- Enjoy a naturalist guided walk through landscapes sought out by artists

This morning, we head south to St-Joseph-de-la-Rive to drop in on a local paper museum where deluxe papers are handcrafted using 17th century techniques. Later in the morning, our friends Maurice and Francine invite us to their farm. During a memorable visit they share their passion for using traditional methods to craft delicious artisanal cheeses from cow and sheep's milk, followed by a tasting.

What seems to be just a remarkably broad valley with rolling hills and seaside villages is, in fact, an enormous crater formed by a meteorite impact about 350 million years ago! At its heart is our home, Baie-St-Paul, a lively center for the arts and birthplace of the Cirque du Soleil. Meeting up with a naturalist-friend, we explore the local flora and fauna as we follow a path past scenic fields and along a sandy beach on the shore of the St. Lawrence River.

Later in the afternoon explore on your own the art galleries and museums in the village. Dinner on your own this evening in town or at the hotel.

DAY 5

GRANDS-JARDINS NATIONAL PARK

- Take a spectacular wilderness walk to Charlevoix Crater
- Picnic lunch along the trail

Today we get a chance to appreciate the true immensity and beauty of the crater that craters the Charlevoix region. We're off to Grands-Jardins National Park. "Grands-Jardins" means "great gardens", and it's a well-deserved name. Our walk follows a well-maintained path up to Mont du Lac des Cygnes (Swan Lake Mountain) with a stop for a picnic along the way. The ascent takes us through lovely groves of trembling aspen trees, past a glacier-carved lake, into forests of black spruce and balsam fir, and ultimately up to the wide-open slopes. At this highest vantage point, we're right on the rim of the ancient crater. Lac des Cygnes glitters below, the air is crisp and clean, and the awesome views are nearly limitless.

DAY 6

ÎLE D'ORLÉANS / QUÉBEC CITY

- Explore Île d'Orléans, including its picturesque villages
- Visit the spectacular Montmorency Falls

After a leisurely breakfast, we drive to Île d'Orléans. The small island boasts the largest concentration of buildings dating from the French settlers. Our scenic walk takes us to Sainte-Pétronille, the most picturesque village on the island,

with its impressive Regency-style English villas and exquisitely tended gardens.

Just across the bridge from Île d'Orléans is Montmorency Falls. At 274 feet, it's one-and-a-half times as high as Niagara Falls. A lovely walk culminates at a bridge above the falls. You'll get an awesome (and safe) view of the waters as they tumble over the cliff. At the foot of the cascade, you'll have one of those frame-worthy photo opportunities with the towers of Quebec City and the Chateau Frontenac rising in the distance.

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ECHOES

— OF FRANCE —

IN NORTH AMERICA

AFTER 400 YEARS, QUÉBEC IS AS FRENCH AND FASCINATING AS EVER.

The aroma of baking baguettes pulls you nose-first down a cobbled street to a boulangerie. That green-gabled Norman manor house on the bluff? It's your hotel. The woman smiling out at you through her window box crowded with geraniums is someone's grand-maman. Ah, to be in Canada.

More than anywhere else in North America, the province of Québec qualifies as a country-within-a-country. French language laws are strictly enforced. Food and culture are inflected with a Gallic style that's held strong since Champlain pushed up the St. Lawrence River in 1608. This is France without the jet lag, and vive la différence.

You get full and instant immersion in Québec City. The French colonial buildings that dominate the skyline and twisty lanes might have been lifted straight from a village in the Dordogne Valley. On Île d'Orléans you walk between centuries (and empires) from old French settlements to Regency-style English villas with spectacular gardens. As your local guide introduces you to friends and tradesmen, it's hard not to be impressed by the cultural feistiness of Québec. You won't have a bit of trouble finding someone to argue that their distinctive variation on the French language is more authentic than anything you hear in Paris.

But that's the mere tip of a huge iceberg. The province of Québec is just a few square miles smaller than Alaska. You get a real taste for that vastness as you head east into the area known as Charlevoix

where the contrasts between cultivated village life and authentic wilderness couldn't be more striking. This is territory where you can track a rare herd of caribou and spot peregrine falcons floating over the highest mountains east of the Rockies — and then settle into Manoir Richelieu, a castle-style hotel, all on the same day. That grand hotel just happens to perch over the St. Lawrence — where the whale watching is excellent — and the Saguenay Fjord. (And if that has you feeling like you beamed over to Norway, is that such a bad bonus?)

We're big fans of the towns that dot this intensely rural region. Just outside St-Joseph-de-la-Rive, you'll visit our friends Maurice and Francie on their farm where they raise cows and sheep and offer you a taste of their artisanal cheeses. You'll also love it for Le Germain Hotel, a country retreat with a modern twist and, of course, it's own patisserie. The arty village of Baie-St-Paul is the birthplace of the Cirque du Soleil and home to a naturalist-friend who loves to show off the sandy beach on the shores of the St. Lawrence. La Malbaie has been a resort town for the wealthy since the late 19th century, and that atmosphere is as alive today as ever.

That deep Quebecois link between the European past and the outdoorsy North American spirit makes for a distinctive vacation. So much the better that all of that continental flair is waiting for you right here on the continent you call home.



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
