

Statement by Food for the Hungry President & CEO Mark Viso on Historic US Government Commitment to Treat Malnutrition

Washington, DC (July 18, 2022) – "Today USAID Administrator Samantha Power announced the single largest investment in history to treat severe malnutrition – a \$200 million U.S. Government commitment to treat child wasting, the deadliest form of malnutrition. Much of this funding will go towards production of Ready-to-Use-Therapeutic Food (RUTF), a special peanut paste packed with vital nutrients that quickly and effectively restore the health of a severely malnourished child.

"Food for the Hungry applauds this historic commitment, as the need is urgent and growing. Last year 45 million children were suffering from wasting – and that was before Russia's invasion of Ukraine further strained overburdened food systems. UNICEF estimates the current crisis is pushing one child into severe malnutrition every minute. Currently, only 20% of wasted children receive treatment – but today's announcement will change that. This investment demonstrates America's moral leadership and commitment to saving the lives of millions of the world's most vulnerable children.

"Food for the Hungry provides screening and treatment for children suffering from moderate and severe malnutrition, and we work hand-in-hand with communities to create sustainable solutions to their greatest challenges. We look forward to continued partnership with the U.S. Government and the private sector as we work to save lives and fight hunger, poverty, and injustice."
