




a substance that can be used to make fabric stiff


Sing a song of winter, Of frosty clouds in air! Sing a song of snowflakes Falling everywhere.


Sing a song of winter!

Over heels and heads.


Up and down a hillside When the moon is bright, Sledding is a tiptop Wintertime delight.







