SCHOOL: CHILD IMMUNIZATIONS

GCHD and Pomeroy Medical Clinic provide childhood vaccinations. The Health District works closely with Pomeroy School District to ensure children are vaccinated as required by state law. In 2016 there were 376 preschool-12th grade students. Fifteen students were exempted from vaccinations by parent choice. Students vaccinated- 94% (94.4% in 2015), exempted- 4% (4.5% in 2015), and non-compliant 2% (1.1% in 2015).

In 2016 there was a nationwide mumps outbreak though no cases in Garfield County. In the event of mumps occurring locally, students that had not had the MMR vaccine would be required to stay home from school or could choose to become vaccinated. Exclusion from school would last throughout the infectious period.


Data is routinely obtained and used for program improvements. School illness, immunizations, and child obesity information for program development and activities has enhanced the Health District's programs.


ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Garfield County Health District's contract with Walla Walla Health Department for environmental health services ended January, 2017. GCHD is fortunate to have Whitman County Health Department provide services until a long term solution is available.

Food establishment permits were up due to new ownership of existing businesses and convenience stores. Septic system permits increased by 2/3 mostly due to replacements and repairs.

Temporary food event permits were down in 2016 but there was an increase in food handler cards in the county.




- Monitor the health status of residents to identify community health trends

2016-17 Pomeroy School District enrollment included 330 kindergarten-12th grade students. The school district also provides preschool classes for an additional 46 children.



NOTIFIABLE CONDITIONS

In Washington State, health care providers, health care facilities, laboratories, veterinarians, food service establishments, child day care facilities, and schools are legally required to notify public health authorities at their local health jurisdiction of suspected or confirmed cases of selected diseases or conditions. These are referred to as notifiable conditions.

Garfield County Health District investigated 32 cases in 2016, compared to 24 cases in 2015. Since treatment for Hepatitis C has become more common, additional lab reports are received as the condition is monitored by the physician during treatment. GCHD received 17 Hepatitis C lab reports in 2016 compared to 9 in 2015.

Normally mumps is not very common in the United States but that wasn't the case in 2016. In 2016, there were 5,311 cases reported to CDC compared to 229 in 2012. Nine counties in Washington State received 155 confirmed and probable reports of mumps and a total of 155 confirmed and probable cases were reported in 2016. Garfield County did not have any mumps cases.

Influenza activity didn't start to peak in Garfield County until the end of 2016 and early 2017 found absenteeism in the school district as high as 33% intermittently for over 2 months.

GCHD provided ongoing education for the school, medical providers, childcare, and hospital on mumps and influenza.
