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Exclusive Eyewitness Account of T Action

"Humanity is balanced on a razor's edge over which events in Vietnam or elsewhere may swiftly push us," reads a statement issued to the press by Clifton Curran, the 20 year old Navy pacifist arrested on Treasure Island last Saturday.

"Now is the time to reflect on the immeasurable values of the divine gift of life," the statement continues. But no part of it appeared in the local press. There was noise, confusion, and furor in the press and on national TV, but no media appears interested in the true motivation of the initiators of the action.

Bob Meriwether, a member of Committee for Non-Violent Action West and one of the demonstrators explained their position to BARB.

"On my part it was a response to my own speech made earlier in the day at the Federal Building," he said.

Curran had been AWOL from the Navy. For 10 days he stayed at the CNAV-West House in Berkeley. He couldn't take what was happening in Vietnam.

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Off-Campus Jr. Hi Peace Rallies Loom

The student peace group at Garfield Jr. High, which recently stirred up controversy with its on-campus and an off-campus rally, is to be revived with off-campus status. They are planning to hold another rally soon, BARB learned this week from Mark Miltenberger, leader of the armband revolt.

BARB asked if reactivating this group had anything to do with dissatisfaction with the newly announced, on-campus, Vietnam Analysts Committee.

"No," replied Mark, "we had planned from the first to settle down for public and form the study group, but we had also planned to form an off-campus group since the last school meeting concerning the students' freedom to wear peace symbols at the school."

The group is currently attempting to secure marching and sound permits for a fairly tentatively scheduled for Feb. 10, to be held away from the Garfield campus. The original eleven member steering committee of the VAC with the new officers.

Prince Invites Scheer to Come to Cambodia

Robert Scheer, candidate for Congress in the 7th CD, has been invited to Cambodia by its ruler, Prince Sihanouk.

He is prepared to depart by plane Sunday for that country as well as Viet Nam, BARB was informed, unless his opponent in the Democratic primaries, Rep. Jeffery Cobelan accepts his challenge to a debate next week on President Johnson's war policy. In such event, Scheer will postpone his trip.

"I am the only newsmen in the West to be invited to that country, a country which may be invaded by the United States," Scheer told BARB in an exclusive interview Sunday.

He will be accompanied by his wife, Ann, and will report his trip for Ramparts magazine, of which

he is Foreign Editor.

"There's a new war out there," he said. "I want to see for myself. I spend \$18,000,000 a year in Vietnam but only \$800,000 a year in the ghetto in Oakland, I can't ask our Congressman (Cobelan) to go to Vietnam, but I certainly can ask him to go to Oakland, which he never does."

Scheer said he wants to find out "where that daily \$18 million is going." "Since I was there last, we have turned that whole area into our own private war. Also the Prince wants me to expose how we bomb his country," he said.

Scheer hopes also to contact leaders of the Viet Cong and people in North Vietnam. "When asked if this was in violation of U.S. laws, he replied "That's

He was talking to 250 persons at a meeting at Hellel Foundation in Berkeley, Monday night called to review the action at Cobelan's office. Jack Weinberg had just finished a critique of the day's events which evolved into a critique of Scheer.

"I don't have to get involved in things like this," Scheer retorted when it was his turn to speak. "Throughout the day I found my presence being ascribed to the campaign."

"I agree with Scheer," VDC leader Jerry Rubin told BARB in response to a query Tuesday, "but I think the problems are solved."

Watts Program Main Topic of CORE Meet

The eminently successful "Operation Bootstraps," a job training program set up in Los Angeles by the CORE, was the major topic of the Congress of Racial Equality workshop Friday evening and Saturday.

Louis S. Smith, Operation Bootstraps coordinator, will demonstrate what can be done to alleviate the troubles of the east bay ghetto communities.

Operation Bootstraps calls for the establishment of community centers like those set up in the south by CORE. Industrial leaders are asked to supply equipment and instructors to set up classes on CORE premises. The major effort is by the people of the community.

The program differs from Government sponsored projects. Mr. Smith claims these projects are "paternalistic and exactly opposite to the approach needed."

The CORE workshop will take place at the Berkeley Community Church, 1802 Fairview St., on Friday, Feb. 4 from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. and Saturday, Feb. 5, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The public is invited. Admission is free.

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will back them all the way.

Outside the office, demonstrators from the Berkeley campus, as well as from various community groups such as Women for Peace and Villagers Opposed to the War (see story page 7) will lend support to the delegates in Cobelan's office. A statement signed by residents of the 7th CD "opposed to further prosecution of the war in Vietnam" will be presented.

It asks: "Why have you persisted in sacrificing your general support of the Vietnamese War? Why do you couch your alleged opposition to the resumption of bombing in such vague terms, and within a context of general praise for the President's policies?"

It also asserts:

"If you cannot in good conscience oppose this brutal war and condemn the President's policies, it is at least your duty to answer the above questions publicly and to confront your opposition in open debate."

The signers then demand that Cobelan "respond positively and promptly to Mr. Scheer's call for a debate on a mutually agreeable date."

This statement, prepared and circulated a few days before the Thursday confrontation at press time, had not been altered in any way.

Moreover, it very well described a lengthy telegram received from Cobelan Wednesday which was read and discussed that night at a meeting on the Berkeley campus of over 200 VDC members.

The reading of the telegram caused considerable laughter. "It was so predictable, just what you'd expect him to say," one member commented.

In essence, Cobelan praised Johnson's domestic policy, called him a great leader, and refused to impeach him for his foreign policy as demanded by the VDC. He indicated regret as to resumption of the bombing of North Vietnam but took no clear stand.

With reference to VDC's demand that he vote against appropriations for the war he pointed out that he was on the House Appropriations Committee and would have to study the matter carefully.

In addition, Cobelan declined the honor of any early debate with Scheer pleading the time was not right since an important debate was already going on in Congress and The United Nations. Moreover, he felt that during the campaign each candidate would have ample opportunity to make his position known.

The VDC now demands that

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"What we in SNCC are saying is that we can't play the game by the rules 'cause you set up the rules. We got a new ball game and a new ball park - if you can't play by our rules then get out of our game and play on your own side!"

So said Stokely Carmichael, field secretary for SNCC, speaking this past Sunday in Fillmore Auditorium in San Francisco at the SNCC Anniversary Benefit sponsored jointly by SNCC and the National Farm Workers Association currently engaged in the Delano Grape Growers strike.

Cesar Chavez, director of the NFWA, scheduled to speak was unable to appear because he had to attend a funeral for Roger Teronzo. Teronzo was killed in a freeway auto accident earlier in the week. He had been the NFWA boycott's coordinator in the northern California area. He was given a moment of silence as tribute to his work.

The afternoon rally had the double theme of the "Battle and the Blues." The blues end of it was handled by a jazz program that included jazz personalities Jon Hendricks, Jimmy Witherspoon and Mae Thornton.

"We intend to disrupt every piece of (political) machinery in this country!" Stokely declared. "Is it a shocking thing to say that we don't want politics to be run by Roberts Rules of Order?" he asked.

Stokely assailed critics of SNCC who have directed their fire on SNCC for its position on Vietnam. (SNCC issued a statement on January 6, that they claim that the U.S. had been "deceptive in claims of concern for the freedom of the Vietnamese people, just as the government had been deceptive in claims of concern for the freedom of the colored people." The statement also urged Americans to seek an alternative to the draft by calling on American youth to work in the civil rights movement "knowing full well that it may cost them their lives, as painfully in Vietnam.")

"I'm not an anarchist," Stokely declared. "I say I'm going to decide what I want to do with my life!"

Stokely noted the war's impact on Negroes, especially Negro youth. "Everybody in SNCC is of draft age," he said, "and every time the war is being escalated, they are drafting SNCC people... it is a shocking thing to say that the draft is the most destructive force in the United States today!"

He called "the history of American society... the most violent on the face of the earth" and charged that people in this country with being "paternalistic

Senator Fulbright's challenge of President Johnson's "authority" to conduct the war brought this comment from Scheer: "Great - if he keeps it up after we start bombing the North. He fell out of the club. He no longer can accept the record of insanity by remaining silent and 'behind the scenes.'"

This last remark was in response to a previous question about Cobelan's claim that he is "working with Fulbright" behind the scenes. "Let our Congressman speak out, as Fulbright has done. He remains silent on everything - the war, the ghetto, the power structure. All he does is write memo after memo to the State department," Scheer said.

The candidate stressed that the "Consensus was shattered by the Negro Vietnam Day Committee's demonstrations against the troop trains. Cobelan told me such activity was 'immature' and would interfere with his effectiveness."

Scheer feels that Cobelan's district is "the most exciting" in the entire United States, yet this is not reflected in "any actions on the part of the Congressman from this district." He also hopes that his activity, and those supporting him, will "bring out" Cobelan in a "face-to-face debate" over issues about which Cobelan keeps writing memos to the State Department.

reason. The films were superb, one of the best avant-garde film screenings I've ever seen. The first film, "Happy Birthday Lenny," made by Lenny Lipton, was a succession of ironic images or symbols accompanied by the incredible ravings of a manic moment hanging on with ferocious claws to her son, i.e., Lenny. Lenny's life symbolized by film reels and red oceans and faded clocks was a conscious attempt to oppose the idiocy of his mother's world view. It was the supreme manipulation of "creative genius" - a fantastic revolt against mediocrity.

We all enjoyed it, dug it, and even one audience member asked Lenny, who answered questions, whether or not his mother had ever seen his film. Apparently, this viewer wanted the mother to be even more tortured than she already was. But we cheered him on, "Yes, yes, show it to that monster."

The second film, "We Shall March Again," was the piece de resistance for an all Berkeley audience, the only march film yet completed of the VDC demonstration, also made by Lenny Lipton. It was beautiful, moving, exciting, and we moaned when it was over. It was absolutely luscious when the faces of the cops moved smoothly before us with the resounding Horst Wessel song, not so much in the background.

One member of the audience asked Lenny why he used religious music in the first scene when the demonstrators were beginning their march. He didn't like the equation of irrational religion with the VDC. We were rooting for Lenny's answer, and he came through very well. He explained that there was an element of emotional fervor to the demonstration, and emotivity is not necessarily derogative.

We cheered because deep in our hearts we knew we had some irrational motivation, some emotional craving. And down went the self-righteous activist, amid the audience cheers. "For beauty is truth...". The demonstrators do come off as supremely heroic despite Lipton's claims to put Cobelan with this attitude won't last long in his campaign to unseat Cobelan.

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Watts is Greater Than Ghetto - Scheer Says

"If Watts is the only alternative to a ghetto, then I'm for another Watts, if the Viet Cong are the only alternative in Vietnam to the Viet Cong, I'm for another Viet Cong." In such vein were the remarks made by Robert Scheer to over 200 people summoned to the Berkeley home of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Finn, Sunday.

They came to hear candidate Robert Scheer blast Congressman Jeffery Cobelan, Mayor Houlihan of Oakland, and the power structure of the status quo, in the first of a series of public campaigns to unseat the silent incumbent of the Seventh Congressional District.

Scheer promised to conduct a political campaign which is "unabashedly radical." The status quo must be changed, he declared, or we will have "Vietnams and Watts forever," Peace, under US terms, is "impossible."

He argued the poor "should seize Oakland" and advocated that Oakland ghetto residents "select their own policemen."

"By radical," he explained, "I mean, going to the root. We have peace there with democratic Party, I worked for Cobelan and Kefauver. But today, I would not."

Scheer observed that "the difference between me and Cobelan is the status quo; he wants things to remain the same as they are, in Oakland, he wants to bring in new industry and keep things the same by keeping the Negro and the poor from making their own decisions; he let the power structure of Oakland write this point in the Poverty Program before we could vote on it."

The status quo, in Oakland, in Vietnam, or any place else, "must be changed," Scheer said, "or I will have Vietnams forever. If we can't support the revolutions that take place all over the world, let us at least stop crushing them."

Peace in Vietnam, Scheer feels, "is keeping the status quo, to have peace there with people still starving is immoral." He told of a high-ranking member from the N. Vietnamese government saying, "You Americans, with your pleas for 'peace' - I have lost 38 members of my family." Scheer said this man refused to talk to him any further, that he was in Vietnam last.

Scheer noted the changing face of communism. "I don't know," he said, "it is 'all the same', I would like to live in Cuba, but not the Soviet Union. I am not interested in the white capitalists, writers, and Jews in the Soviet Union." He added that America is caught up in a paradox of right-communist, that can't even get to the moon unless it's to beat the communists, and the white communist dropped dead today, the people of Vietnam would still be hungry?"

He said he is going to resist the liberal attitude of "Let's not think of violence, demonstrations, jailings. Let's just go home and hope the white capitalists, writers, and Jews in the Soviet Union, have a drink, eat supper, then go to sleep." He indicated, strongly, that anybody with this attitude won't last long in his campaign to unseat Cobelan.

He ended upon the Congressman to come to Oakland and "engage in sit-ins, demonstrations, to mobilize the poor, to help seize Oakland," What

Villagers Back Scheer, VDC Vs Cohelan

The Albany Villagers Opposed to War participated in yesterday's and Monday's action at Congressman Cohelan's office but differed with the VDC on several points.

VOW's executive committee unanimously voted last week to support Bob Scheer for Congress. Jeffrey Schevitz, spokesman for the Villagers, said that the executive committee had decided "to devote almost all activity of the group during the campaign to the election of Scheer." Already the Villagers are getting ready to do some precinct work.

"We're definitely sending a delegation down to Cohelan's office on Thursday," Schevitz told BARB Wednesday. However, he stated they would not take part in the sit-in, but would man a twenty-four picket line if necessary.

On Monday VOW did take part in the sit-in but left with the first group and continued their demonstration outside.

Concerning the statements presented to Cohelan Thursday Schevitz told BARB that VOW goes along with the demand that Cohelan support a censure of President Johnson for resuming the bombing of North Vietnam and for his general war policy. However, the Villagers don't agree with the VDC call for his impeachment. "But I won't demand VDC for their demand," Schevitz said.

"Our demand is that Cohelan support a censure of the President, and if he doesn't we want him to come back and justify his position to his constituents in a debate with his opponent in the Democratic party," Schevitz told BARB.

The Villager's spokesman also reported that Scheer has been invited to speak at the Albany Community Theater on February 21, under the sponsorship of VOW and tell about his trip to Cambodia and South Vietnam.

Berkeley CoFC Secret Group?

Is the Berkeley Chamber of Commerce a secret organization?

The COC has officially stamped the proposed city owned electric distribution system "unwarranted and economically impractical, and not in the best interest of the citizens of Berkeley."

BARB tried to ascertain the basis and source of this opinion, but the Chamber attempted to block its avenues of inquiry. In a letter to the City Council, the COC stated that their directors and the members of its industrial and legislative committees had studied testimony and unanimously agreed there was no justification for municipal power in Berkeley.

Mr. Walter E. Packard, the leading proponent of publicly owned power facilities, said he was "surprised and disappointed by the Chamber of Commerce's lack of interest in the welfare of Berkeley in view of the facts."

BARB feels that the public is entitled to the answers to a few questions concerning the Chamber because it has made its position public. Who is on the COC's Board of Directors? Who is on the committees? What testimony has been studied? And, is this opinion a consensus of the COC's entire membership?

But at the COC office on University Ave., BARB was told, "The official roster and list of Directors is not open to the public; it is only open to members."

Calls to the Oakland and Richmond Chambers of Commerce confirmed that in those cities the lists of members and Directors are not only open, but inquiries are most welcome. Indeed, the Richmond office was eager to send us one immediately; we declined politely but firmly since our heart belongs to Berkeley.

The Berkeley main library has not been supplied with any such information about the Chamber of Commerce since 1962. Then, there was a complete list of officials, committee members and general membership. It is noteworthy that information then available showed at least one member of the Board of Directors was a PG&E official.

Tulare Court Order May Aid 11 Arrested Here

A court decision in Tulare County may affect the trial of eleven people arrested in the bay area for allegedly violating a court injunction restraining picket actions against the unloading of "hot" grape carrying trucks.

In Tulare County a judge dissolved a temporary restraining order and sustained a demurrer in favor of the strikers. Professor John Leggett, advisor for the Student Committee for Agricultural Labor feels that the decision may prevent the Di Giorgio Corporation from future interference with the strikers.

"The Tulare County ruling may lead to the dismissal of charges against defendants involved in the San Francisco and Oakland arrests," Leggett, one of the persons arrested, told BARB.

Leggett, together with two other defendants appeared for arraignment in a San Francisco court last Friday. All pleaded "not guilty" and asked for a three-week continuance.

On Monday, January 31, the eight other defendants appeared in an Oakland court where they were also given a continuance.

There is speculation that now charges against all those arrested will be dismissed. However, one of the defendants told BARB that the assistant District Attorney for Alameda County had said the case cannot be dropped until he confers with the Di Giorgio Corporation.

In another local development a U.S. District Judge last Tuesday ruled against the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union's refusal to load grapes trucked to the bay area for shipment overseas. The court injunction upheld the Di Giorgio Corporation's and the National Labor Relations Board's contention that the longshoremen's action is an unfair labor practice.

Grape Strike News Boycott Spreads to Livermore Valley

The Delano strike is catching fire in the Amador-Livermore Valley, and it's leader, Cesar Chavez of the Farm Workers Association, will be on hand this month to keep things popping. Chavez will speak Thursday, February 10 at Granada High School in Livermore at the invitation of a local Mexican-American group, the Latin Organization for Betterment.

Details of Unique Death of Terronez

A free automobile accident on Thursday, January 27, in Delano resulted in the death of Roger Terronez, newly appointed boycott coordinator in Northern California for the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA).

Terronez was helping to start a stalled car in front of the NFWA kitchen in Delano. Another car was used to push the stalled vehicle. Because the bumpers of the cars didn't match up Terronez climbed on the back of the first car to weight it down. When the car had barely started moving Terronez lost his balance and fell backward, hitting his head on the cement. He died shortly afterward on his way to the County Hospital.

Only recently (Jan. 24) Terronez had been appointed boycott coordinator of the grape strike in the bay area. He had gone to Delano to confer with the NFWA concerning his duties in San Francisco.

At present time, no one had been named to fill his post.

Boycott List

The National Farm Workers Association has asked for a boycott of Delano Grapes and Schenley products "until a contract has been signed with striking grape workers."

In a leaflet, being distributed by various sympathetic groups and individuals in Berkeley, the NFWA states:

"Schenley Industries must bear the responsibility for its actions. Here are the facts:

"1. Schenley owns the largest grape ranch in Delano, California, 2. The Department of Employment, an official agency of the State of California, on October 7, 1965, formally certified (Trade Dispute 65-32884) that the Schenley workers had a legitimate dispute with Schenley and the state of California has therefore refused to order the Schenley vineyards. 3. Schenley has consistently harassed their striking workers by strikebreaking tactics reminiscent of the 1930's, 4. Schenley has created dust storm conditions with tractors, covering pickets with dust. Furthermore, they have sprayed pickets with toxic chemicals. 5. Schenley has refused the offers of the California Conciliation Service, ministers, and civic groups to promote discussion between the strikers and the growers."

The leaflet asks for a boycott of the following products:

Follow the Leader

HUMPHREY SEARLE: Symphony, MOZART: Violin concerto in G, K.216, ROBERT SCHUMANN: Symphony in Bb, Jakob Krachmalnik, violin, with the San Francisco Symphony.

Mr. Searle taught last year at Stanford. This performance, a local premiere, was a belated honor. The symphony is serial and 12-tone, as befits the work of a student of Webern. But, being English, Mr. Searle is unable to prevent his motifs and canonic rows and what-out from becoming tunes, English tunes, Babel English tunes.

I don't mind banal tunes. I think they make musical progress more apparent, and work for coherence. Mr. Searle's symphony coheres, progresses, and is rather enjoyably clear-textured. One of the niceties is that it scaled neatly; its twenty or so minutes don't outlast the audience. The ideas come and go, things progress and finish. The end comes while we are still listening.

The performance displayed more than usual care on the part of the conductor (I mean Mr. Krips) and it had a faint aura of excitement.

Last week, here, I suggested that the conductor turn and face the audience, for various reasons. I'm afraid I didn't make myself clear. I referred to Mr. Krips.

Instead, Mr. Krachmalnik turned and faced the audience, thus depriving the orchestra of

its visible leader. Mr. Krachmalnik played the solo in the Mozart concerto. I have often before mentioned the absent-mindedness that overtakes Dr. Krips while he is conducting. I have speculated that Jakob Krachmalnik, the concertmaster, functions as "de facto" conductor for much of the music. I had wondered what would happen, were Mr. Krachmalnik to lose his place.

It is an embarrassing thing to hear a full symphony orchestra come to an unplanned halt. Players drop out, like lights in a city late at night, until the last one or two still playing realize that it's no use. Everyone looks at the leader. And after the first panic someone does something. When this happened last Friday at the Opera House, it wasn't the end of the world. It was just an unfortunate time, like many



others, it was embarrassing to the players. Embarrassing to Mr. Krips, to Mr. Krachmalnik, to the audience.

On the second or third try they managed to get together again, after some conversation about treatment about which rehearsal number to use.

As I said, it wasn't the end of the world, but it wasn't surprising either.

It was just an apt illustration of the things happen with the San Francisco Symphony.

It's too bad, too. Once they regained their places, it turned out to be a passable performance. It was more than a little remarkable of the superb performance of the same piece that David Abel gave last summer at Cabrillo with Gerhard Samuel and his orchestra.

The Schumann piece at the end was a sooty-hued and turgid performance marred by sectional inattention and poor balance.

'Literary' and 'Imagistic'

Symbolism — but Who Cares?

I've just been reminded that H.G. Wells, in his novel "The Time Machine," predicted that 1956 was to be the last year of civilization, I suppose I'm sentimental (sentimentality, a friend once said, is the secret mask of cruelty) but already I'm starting to miss the human race, and the dogs and cats, and the fleas they bring in and deposit on our rug. I'm even starting to miss the rain that whet the air out of my rear tire last night. All of this has very little to do with this week's outrage.

However, it is an attractive lead. That is, it gets you into the article, or whatever it is you're reading. Since there is in fact no relationship, absolutely no thread of thought connecting the above to what is to come, no sort of transition is possible.

While slaving over the projectors at the Quessing Beach last Sunday, amazed and delighted I must say at the turnout, I got into conversation with two of you, but I never learned your names. We talked about filmic symbolism. I'd like to classify filmic symbolism into two categories: 1) literary, and 2) imagistic.

In Kuchars' an example of literary symbolism: a mother moans about how she has sacrificed so much for her son, and on the screen a cross in a cemetery appears. I use such a symbol in a film shown at the Beast, "Happy Birthday Lenny."

In Kuchars' "Corruption of the Damned," a car crashes — goes flying off a cliff. In the next shot we see a tire rolling down a slope, it wobbles, rattles, and then (you can feel the audience sigh) it sinks to the ground.

I don't think literary symbols are too useful in films. They're not as powerful as imagistic symbols. You have to go through the symbol process to appreciate the cross symbol. That's across. A cross is a Christian symbol. Christ was crucified on a cross.

The mother believes she is a martyr. She is suffering. This kind of device works, after fashion, but the rolling tire works far, far better. Not only is it non-literary, but it is a special kind of imagistic symbol, the most powerful kind. It is a kinesthetic symbol. Your guts are affected by the motion of the tire. This relationship between movement and response, emotional response, is part and parcel of what it is to be a living organism. Motion, periodic motion, rhythmic motion, and yes, even interrupted motion, when properly projected on a screen, can influence us more than all the Christ images in the world. Motion is built into our nervous system — words aren't. The incredible relaxation, the relief that takes place when Kuchars' tire finally settles down, tells us all about the accident, and the occupants of the car, it is a masterful use of imagistic symbolism.

There's only one trouble with all of this. Who cares? Just a little while ago we heard that Johnson's war is on again; full steam. Who cares about filmic symbolism when in some country somewhere past Japan, near China, very near China, tons of bombs are falling on people whose only mistake is, what is their only mistake? They must have made more than one.

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Squeals a Parable

It started when John burst into James' home to make him stop beating his wife. James said, "Get off my property," John replied, "Not until you sign this non-violence beating affidavit which I have drawn up." The least concerned person present seemed to be the wife.

So, the fight was on. James took the line that "You can't hurt me." John replied, "But I don't want to lick you. I just want to force you to sit down and talk this over in a civilized manner."

As the feud dragged on and on, some of John's family remonstrated with him about the unreasonableness of it all. He chose to ignore them, since they were only a small minority.

But when John's pastor approached him with an impassioned plea for peace, he couldn't ignore that. He had to appear to

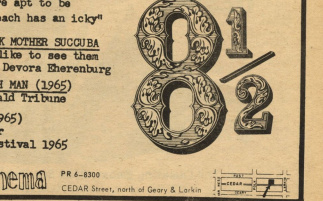

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A Step Toward Sexual Freedom in Berkeley

YOUNG mature couples - students of theories of Dr. Albert Ellis - seek other couples interested in cozier living or get-togethers. 848-2666.

(When the above ad was submitted last week, DA's request led it to ask pertinent questions, which led to the statement printed below.)

One of the things which would seem ideally most desirable, but which, as fate inevitably appears to have it, is simultaneously most difficult, is to tell the truth - particularly about (to) oneself.

In accord with this theory (in psychotherapy it has been employed with far too great success for it to be reasonably considered absurd), all of us have sexual desires which, if we are honest and truthfully admit we had, we would be desirous of satisfying.

But recently, some of us are admitting this, and what is more, are doing so in a group setting (which psychotherapy, with its own hands tied by the inflexible society at large, has not been able to do).

Even as these lines are being written, there is an interesting manifestation of this in Berkeley. (Interesting things are always happening in Berkeley.)

What makes Berkeley so potentially valuable and dynamic an American city. It seems, in fact, that Berkeley is fast becoming the great experimental "freedom lab" for the whole people (and the world) in Berkeley, amidst all the other forms of rebellion afoot, there is very much a sexual rebellion in the making also.

The rebellion has spoken of is not mere "shacking," as the term goes, for there is really nothing radically rebellious in this. "Shacking" is the use of the oldest, and most often winked-at expression of rebellion in the society, but a form which nevertheless best speaks adequately the utter hypocritical and unscientific nature of certain institutions which the society seeks to desperately to preserve and impose on all.

What is here being referred to as betokening a greater rebellion in Berkeley is the incidental rise of sheer, undiluted orgy-ism. Consistent with our point here, this would seem good and desirable as the first positive step in understanding our repression. Indeed, Freud's description of "repressed" sexual desires is certainly a description of orgasmic impulses.

The mood that is arising in Berkeley seems to state implicitly that there is nothing wrong with orgies if entered into uncoerced and/or mutual pleasure, and especially if entered into without corresponding feeling of guilt and absurd objections of "savagery" and similar prejudices.

Evidences that such orgasmic rebellion is taking place in Berkeley can be glimpsed in such things as anonymous ads appearing with increasing frequency on

Student-union bulletin boards, in newspapers, and elsewhere. The content of these ads has all but unashamedly advertised for other couples interested in "sexual-communal" living, "cozier" living, "get-togethers" and other less sensational, but unmistakable, wordings.

Here and there, from other sources, filter frequent reports of "free affairs," "private parties," and the like. Most of such reports always sound favorable. Everyone who has attended such affairs, including those who give usually an enthusiastic accounting. As a person remarked after attending such an affair, "Sex, if entered into rightly, free and without guilt, is psychodelic." Others have exclaimed, with interesting innocence, "I learned that the human body and sex are actually beautiful and not obscene at all!"

Now in view of this, Berkeley might soon expect to see an additional hostile reaction from the news media and other protectors of the status-quo. In fact, it might just do well to brace itself now. But then Berkeley is used to hostile reactions of one kind or another and has always weathered them commendably well. Indeed, it seems high time that intelligent persons have grown sick and tired of trying to tone for the world's sex guilt and are now seeking to free themselves of all forms of values in which such guilt is allowed to flourish. Who knows but that when aware of all freely admitted that sex is not obscene and that the limited forms in which we are allowed to practice it are not necessarily sufficient we may begin to build a world of peace and genuine brotherhood - a world, in a word, free from hate, suspicion, jealousy, and insane competitiveness.

At that time, being more pleasurably involved in other pursuits, we may not need to cry "Get out of Vietnam," for potentially no such Vietnam situation would exist. - Richard Thorpe

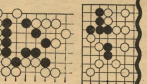

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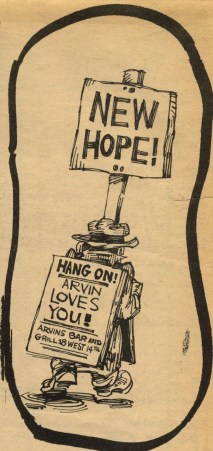
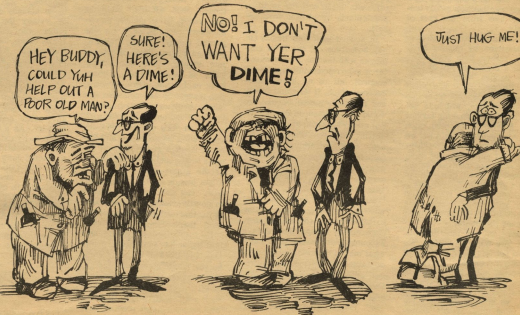

people gasped at this point, Scheer replied: "Why not? Doesn't Knowland look Oakland?"

He pictured the power-structure of Oakland as "scared." He said "the Mayor actually told me that he confers with Chief of Police Toothman every night before he goes home, hoping that the fog will roll in and keep the Negroes off the streets in West Oakland." Scheer also said they refuse to send a police car into West Oakland at night for fear of a riot. "They look upon Negroes as wild animals."

"Most of the world stinks," he stated, "the cities stink; the country-side stinks; people are hungry all over the world. There is a crisis in our foreign policy. We are totally alienated from most of the world." He said that in Western Europe the Marshall Plan has worked, "but for the rest of the world, the underdeveloped nations, there is nothing but hunger." He compared West Oakland and the power-structure of City Hall to the power-structure of America and "the hungry world."

Dr. Ephraim Kahn introduced the candidate, "we do not take our politics casually in Berkeley," Dr. Kohn said, he outlined how the campaign to unseat Cohelan got started. "Another doctor (Dr. Daniel Simon) sent Cohelan a letter in protest over his silence on the way we are waging war in Vietnam," he explained, "Cohelan answered that the letter was 'intemperate' and we should support our President."

Cohelan said the wrong thing, again.

and planned to protest publicly his opposition to U.S. policy, Meriwether said. At first, it looked like he would have to do it by himself.

The gist of Meriwether's speech at the San Francisco anti-Vietnam rally was that now it would be necessary for many to go to jail to stop the war. "After thinking about it I was prepared to get arrested together with Curran," he said.

Meriwether, and Ben Mann, who had also responded to the speech drove to Treasure Island with Curran. "A young lady, Andy Gonnellfinger, and Peter and Phyllis Harris accompanied us merely to drive the cars back," Meriwether explained.

Curran was apprehended by plainclothesmen. "Cliff was taken to a car inside the base, and in the confusion that ensued we followed," Meriwether related. "I stood together with Ben in front of the car to prevent it from leaving. The others were so moved by what was happening that they acted spontaneously and also tried to block the car. The MP's dragged us away, one by one, but as we were released we immediately returned to the front of the car. Finally they got wise and got enough men to move us all away."

After the car with Curran in it drove off the five other demonstrators were brought before the security officer of the base. "He told us we were violating base rules and not to do it again," Meriwether said. "Then he gave us forms to fill out for future demonstrations on Federal property. I was really surprised. They even had a place to check if we wanted to lease or use voice amplifiers. I intend to apply for permit to hold a silent protest in front of the base and see what happens."

Meriwether held BARB that the basic reason for the protest

was "to show sailors that there are people on the outside who support them if their conscience impels them to refuse to fight." He felt that this demonstration had succeeded in this respect.
