

"There are some things we'd like to interview you about," SS man Neuman said, according to Mark. "We will not meet you at our office or the SDS office," Mark arranged to meet him at noon at the fountain on Sproul Plaza. Half an hour later Neuman called back,

"We really wouldn't like to meet you on campus," he said, "That's your area, your group."

Neuman suggested a neutral area -- the Berkeley police department, To Mark's quick "No" he could only reply, "It looks like we have reached an impasse."

They finally agreed appropriately on the fountain at Constitution Square.

This official policy of interference in civilian life is revealed in a Selective Service System publication entitled "Channeling."

The job-control role of the SS System has come to light in a brief filled this week in defense of conscientious objector Vincent O'Connor, son of a SF Juvenile Court judge.

judge.

While doing civil rights work in Alabama, O'Connor received orders from his draft board to report for duty with the Los Angeles Department of Charities, in lieu of military service. He did not report, and was arrested.

Attorneys Peter Franck and Jeanette Hermes this week filed a motion in the US District Court to dismiss the indictment of O'Connor on the grounds that the order to report for civilian duty is beyond the lawful and constitutional authority of the draft board. According to the brief, "men are distributed (by Selective Service) in the economic system like pawns on a chessboard."

The evidence supporting this charge is drawn from official publications of the SS Sytem itself, including a history of the System by Lieutenant General Lewis B. Hershey, its Director. Hershey wrote, "The deferment of men from military service to pursue civilian activities in the national interest has always been a function of Selective Service. The prospect of deferment has had the effect of influencing men to pursue such activities..."

Plans for increased manipulation of American manpower are exposed in the SSS publication, "Channeling."

That document states, "The club of induction has been used to drive out of areas considered to be less important to the areas of greater importance in which deferments were given, the individuals who did not or could not participate in activities which were considered essential to the defense of the nation. The Selective Service System anticipates further evolution in this area."

The brief on behalf of O'Connor argues that such use of deferments is contrary to the First, Fifth, and Thirteenth Amendments, that no such power over civilian activity is granted by the US Constitution, and that to allow such manipulation of occupations is to consent to a step in the direction of a totalitarian state.

TRIBAL LAWYERS READY TO ACT WITH TRIBES' HELP

Attorney Michael Sanford, organizing a new volunteer legal assistance group, is going ahead with plans to free the East Bay tribes of legal chains.

"It will betwo weeks or so before we can start taking cases," Sanford said, "Pve already heard from 3 or 4 lawyers who will contribute time, but we still need more experienced criminal and trial lawyers."

Sanford also needs people for office work, research such as interviewing witnesses, and answering phones. He plans to have a 24-hour phone service for calls from jail.

As reported in BARB May 25, the group will handle only criminal defense cases. At first, it will concentrate on drug cases, but Sanford repeated this week, "If we get enough people, we can expend and cover harassment and

This year, like last year, the climbers on the mission state their purpose as a "search" in Alaska, But last year, during the time of a similarly composed mission, one of the climbers was seen in Salgon. Soon afterward, he visited Hillary in New Zealand.

Speculations about the nature of the mission led BARB to consult an expert on current military matters.

The military expert suggested that the mission might be to plant a device used to guide Strategic Air Command weaponry. He described one such device as a small, rugged grid, possibly no larger than a cigarette package, which is used to aid electronic guidance of USAF weapons - delivery - systems.

Even that suggestion is purely speculative, although less - well-qualified guesses are easy to multiply.

ANTIWAR GROUPS WILL FORCE GOVT. TO OPT ON ARRESTS

There's been talk of massive Civil Disobedience -- such as 5000 sitting in at the Pentagon October 21 -- but it must start somewhere, soon."

This is what a coordinator of one of two civil disobedience groups told BARB this week. CD action against the war and the draft are being planned here for the end of this month.

the end of this month.

"Up to now, we have been 'safe' protestors," he continued. "Only when thousands of us are willing to back up our words with acts of massive civil disobedience -- when the government is faced with the decision of whether or not to jail a good portion of its citizenry -- will the men in power begin to listen seriously."

The two separate actions by two separate groups on two consecutive days -- June 28 and 29 -- signal the rebirth of militant actions in the Bay Area, according to spokesman of both groups.

The first action, called by the Regional Council of Students for a Democratic Society, will be an anti-draft demonstration and

"mill-in" at the 100 McAllister St. draftboard in San Francisco. In May, a "mill-in" there resulted in no arrests, Instead, demonstrators were bodily removed from the building and left outside. Even this however, interfered seriously with the draftboard's "legal business" of the day. For those interested in the SDS action, a meeting is set for Saturday, June 10 at 924 Howard St., SF, at 1 p.m. The demonstration itself will take place from 1-5 p.m. June 28.

The second event will involve massive but as yet unspecified civil disobedience at the Oakland Induction Center June 29. The Civil Action Day Committee is a new, loosely-formed group including several people new to direct action. The Committee now has over 25 persons committed to civil disobedience.

It expects to get over 100. The meetings for anyone interested either in the c.d. or simultaneous supporting demonstration a rescheduled: June 18 and June 25, both at 55 Coiton St., SF, 8 p.m. (Organizers ask those considering c.d. to meet there June 18 at 5 p.m.)

Meanwhile, the Los Angeles Free Press reports that the

"largest demonstration in the history of Los Angeles" will greet Lyndon Johnson when he arrives to kick off the 1968 Presidential campaign with a gala \$1000 a plate dinner in the Century Plaza Hotel on June 23rd. The Peace Action Council is coordinating the efforts of over 60 peace groups, all of which plan to participate in a massive protest march, which, since permits have so far been witheld, may be in violation of the law. But at a meeting held last Sunday in Hollywood discussion centered upon less c on ventional means of exerting pressure upon the embodiment of Great Society. Since many of these attending the meeting are ready to commit acts of civil disobedience in homor of their President, no names can be released. There is no formal group in charge of the efforts of these urban guerillas; and to prevent police interference with the developing plans, planning is being carried out in a hangloose, decentralized fashion designed to prevent any single police informant from spoiling the fun.

A spokesman for the cadres who met on Sunday told the FP that "enough alternative plans have been hatched so that if the police prevent one thing we'll be right there with another. Even if they cordon off the hotel for blocks in every direction and bring Johnson in a helicopter because they are afraid to have him travel the streets — we'll still be able to provide his little dinner party with plenty of unscheduled entertainment. The counter-security is fantastic.

"Of course there is a possibility that the dinner will be cancelled. That would also be fine. The object of our plan is to make it crystal clear that Johnson cannot come to L A, without causing himself an unbelievable amount of trouble and embarrassment.

"If they cancel this dinner we will simply wait until the next time he comes to town. He must come here sometime in the course of the campaign.



crackers continued, but the police inside their cars remained very reserved; all they did was keep the traffic moving.

The crowd was looking for something on which to expend its energy. Little groups and heated arguments began to form. It was Latin and Negro against white; few, if any, hippies had remained on the scene. When the real violence started, young 17-and 18-year-old Negroes began swarming in the Park, some of whom had come out of The Annex, and others who were not from the East Village area. There was a group of whites who were European by accent, and Puerto Ricans of all ages, varying from 11 to 60, all baiting one another.

A motorcyclist came up towards Seventh Street and Avenue B., but when he got to the intersection a crowd formed and stopped his bike. The hapless rider was pulled off his cycle and into the crowd, who then lifted the cycle and started tossing it around like a toy.

It was a reverseless situation; on Tuesday, 38 hippies were busted and abused for sitting on the grass and playing musical instruments. Tuesday night the cops were accused of violence, and two days later, a lot of people got their revenge. The total damage remains to be assessed.

reported that no one but hippies were attacked by the cops.

Before it was all over, 36 had been busted and three aspitalized -- because of a "noise complaint,"

Three Haight shops, The Blushing Peony, House of Richard, and the Psychedelic Shop, were originally busted on March 9 for displaying and selling an allegedly obscene poster, which showed couples in various sexual embraces.

The first trial ended in a hung jury, 11 to 1 for conviction. A retrial was set for May 29, and then postponed until this week.

Then on Wednesday the defendants pleaded nolo contendere, which means nor more jury trials. They will be sentenced probably just with probation, on July 5.

"We didn't want to go through another five-week trial," said Daric Jerome, owner of the Blushing Peony. He admitted it was the easy way out, but said that they were all tired of the expenses and the hassle.

TEACHERS HOPE TO WIN AT PARKS

The American Federation of Teachers is confident it will win in an election to determine union representation of teachers and counselors at Camp Parks Job Corps Center, being conducted at BARB press time Thursday.

According to a union representative, the AFT card count at Camp Parks Is more than half of the teachers and counselors.

"Litton Industries (the company which runs the Center) put a company memorandum through the mail asking them to vote no," the representative said.

"They said that since the ballot was secret, union members didn't have to vote union if they didn't want to."

The election came after a 20-day strike at the center, which expanded to picketing of Litton plants in the Bay Area and across the nation.

Boycotting of Litton products continues, to protest the firing of four union officers who were not reinstated at the end of the strike.

"But get an ID!"



The Mid-East crisis can be fun if you take the right attitude toward it. It can be an awful drag if you try to decide what side you're on, because from every point of view both the Arabs and the Israelis are right. The thing to do is just sit back and wait for a spectacular smash-up, a non-violent one, of course.

What I have in mind is a gigantic naval war between Russia and America. The sallors could all be rescued by helicopters, or perhaps Johnson could get the Red Sea to part for them. Let me write the scenario for you:

1) The U.S. masses a tank force to escort a bunch of oil tankers into the Gulf of Aqaba. The Russians announce they've got 300 submarines in the same area.

2) Egypt sinks the first tanker that attempts the passage. She justifies this as "spreading oil on troubled waters."

3) Planes from a U.S. carrier destroy the Egyptian shore batteries.

4) Russians wait until all planes have returned to carrier. While pilots are being interviewed on world-wide television via Telstar, Russian sub sinks carrier.

5) U.S. and Soviet Union simultaneously release text of a previously agreed upon Proclamation of Limited Naval Warfare. Terms as follows: a) State of war applies only to ships, and only to ships in Red Sea and Indian Ocean. b) Neither side can reinforce its fleet in the area. (Suez Canal has been blocked to prevent cheating; U.S. could send ships from Southeast Asia if it wants to, but it doesn't want to). c) Hospital ships manned by mixed Soviet-American crews patrol area to pick up sailors as soon as they're dumped into the water. It's against the rules to attack a hospital ship, If either side does sink a hospital ship they'll be killing some of their own men. d) State of Limited Naval Warfare automatically ends when one side or the other (or both) has lost all its ships in the area. e) Whole thing to be telecast simultaneously in Russia and America from transmitter ships manned by mixed crews.

This naval war I propose would contribute nothing to the solution of the Arab-Israeli crisis. But

I have a similar proposal for fun war on the home front. This is for public-power nuts, or anyone with a grievance against society at large. I am about to reveal the secret of a tremendously destructive weapon that could be used for good or evil; in the hands of a disciplined and ruthless group of people, it could be used to blackmail an entire nation, (I thought at first that I should keep this secret to myself, but then I said, you know, who am I?)

The secret is how to set off power failures through perfectly peaceful, legal means. The beauty of it is that it can only be done by The People Themselves; saboteurs in the pay of foreign powers simply can't pull it off.

You spread the word among a fairly large group of militant electricity consumers. Each participant plugs in all the appliances he can just short of blowing his house fuses. (He will have to blow a fuse or two by way of experimentation.) If the time for the coup has been set at, say, eight o'clock, then at about ten to eight each participant turns off all his house current by throwing the main switch right next to the fuse box. He sits by the switch listening to a transistor radio. At the moment of the eight o'clock time pulse on the radio he and all the others simultaneously throw the switch back on, with all those appliances already plugged. This credits a sudden surge in current which will cause a power failure if it's big enough.

In places like Los Angeles and New York, where it gets hot during the summer, it wouldn't even be necessary to fool around with those dusty fuse boxes. Everybody could just turn on their air conditioners at the same moment.

It would take an electrical engineer to figure out just how many people we'd need to pull it off. Maybe it would take a lot more than we've got now. If so, that would give us a goal to work toward; fifty thousand people parading can't do anything, but fifty thousand people turning on their house current at exactly the same time can black out a city.

The particular goal I have in mind is all those fund-raising speeches Hubert Humphrey will be making at \$100-a-plate dinners in 1968. Won't it be wonderful if, in city after city, all the lights go out the moment he opens his mouth?

IT CAN **HAPPEN** AT HOME

Dear BARB:

Re The Haight at Night - Terror in the Streets. Listen: it can also happen in a quiet apartment in the afternoon. Yesterday I was sitting at home listening to music, feeling calm and pcaceful, all alone for the first time in several days. I got up to answer a knock on the door. A young Negro, on the pretext of a sking questions about "friends next door," observedthat I was alone and pushed me back inside the apartment. He held me up against the wall, covered my mouth to keep me from making any unseemly commotion, and gesturing toward a knife on the kitchen table, allowed as how he would make some unforgettable incisions on my body if I didn't keep my trap shut. Each time I made an effort to talk to him he threatened me again. He got what he was after - a fuck he called it although I'm agraid it wasn't a very good one.

I have not told the police about it. Every member of the police department I have encountered during my stay in San Francisco has been nearly as surly and intractable as my young Afro-American Rapis Friend, presumably because I look like a hippy or a hippy-sympathizer. Again, each time I attempted to explain myself I was rebuffed or threatened. From this experience I am tempted to draw an odd analogy: under stress, neither the policeman nor the rapist allows an opportunity for rational communication; each one relies on violence to make his impression. This is not an accident but, rather, evidence of a widespread sickness. When will violence stop long enough for communication to begin? On second thought, perhaps I am doing the police department a grave disservice in not attempting to put them in contact with the rapist. Maybe, with just allitle mind-bending, that rapist would make a damned good cop, and both could swagger together, true soul brothers, under the many-colored cloak of Fascism.

In the meantime, when you come to San Francisco wear flowers in korate on the side - until the day such defences are no longer necessary.

HOW TO MAKE IT IN CANADA

Refuge in Canada is still easy to get, if you're willing to play the straight game.

Two recent SDS visitors to British Columbia this week described the current situation facing "political" emigrees to Canada. Jeff Segal and Mark Kleiman, officers in Students for a Democratic Society, told BARB what they learned at the border and in conversations with the Committee to Aid American War Objectors in Vancouver.

Segal and Kleiman received special attention from Canadian officers at the border. They think it was because they were bearded and a bit shaggy haired, although both had made a point of wearing neat, white shirts.

A customs officer gave them a choice of paying duty on the SDS literature they carried in their trunk, or dumping the literature back in the USA. They dumped it rather than pay \$1.50 per pound.

When they returned to the check-point without the pamphlets, they went through the routine again and were cleared — after the border guards checked through what Kleiman called "a Hell's Angels file."

In a two-day scouting of the nearby Canadian scene, they learned that the best way to enter Canada is by car. Border officials have great leeway in refusing entry, and the airport funnel is reputed to be the toughest to squeeze through.

Bus and train passengers are sometimes suspected of having too little money for a car, and are

Kleiman mentioned a B.A. in philosophy who landed a job gardening.

Canadian employers are mostly either neutral or sympathetic to immigrants from the USA who go to Canada to avoid the draft, Kleiman said.

Jobs are plentiful in the interior, but are often seasonal, the Committee to Aid American War Objectors told them. "For instance, they said it's possible for unskilled labor to earn as much as \$1000 a month in strip mining."

They estimate that about 1000 young Americans have entered Canada to avoid the Vietnam draft. "Probably very few of them are activists. The bulk of them seem to have little or no political experience, and decided they don't want to go in the Army for mostly personal reasons," Kleiman observed.

Most such moves to Canada in-

want to go in the Army for mostly personal reasons," Kleiman observed.

Most such moves to Canada involve "landed immigrant" status. A landed immigrant is a person who has been lawfully admitted to Canada for permanent residence, but is not a citizen.

Segal and Kleiman advised that applications for Canadian residency be made by mail rather than at the border, since border officials are becoming increasingly wary of young American men moving in haste to Canada.


Formally, the Committee to Aid American War Objectors point out, even an American who has been ordered to report for induction has no greater difficulty becoming a Canadian resident that does any other American.

Current information can be obtained from the Committee at Box 4231, Vancouver 9, British Columbia, Canada.

Similar groups are active in the provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Alberta, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Newfoundland.

ARTICLE RAISES ROW

"I don't even know Warren Hinckle, man. P'm so fucking pissed off I think Pil go down to Ramparts right now."

Michael Bowen was not even aware, until this reporter approached him on Haight St., that his name was among those listed as having in some way contributed to the notorious feature article on the hippies in the March Ramparts.

Bowen's name is one of some thirty listed in Wes Wilson's frontispiece for the article under the heading "As told to Ramparts by ..." Bowen says he was never consulted.

BARB made no effort to contact all the people listed on that page.

The hippie scene is not a static one and many of those listed, (Allan Ginsberg, Emmet Grogan, Mario Savio, Ken Kesey, Timothy Leary) have split. But we were surprised to find that Ramparts had not been in contact with some of the people we did talk to.

Columnist Ralph Gleason and Bettina Aptheker, both listed in Wilson's frontispiece, were never interviewed. Gleason resigned from Ramparts in protest against having his name associated with the article. In a recent Chronicle column he remarks that neither Ramparts or any other newspaper or mag have printed his letter of resignation.

Bill Graham, who is actually

Bill Graham, who is actually quoted in the article, told BARB that he had never been inter-viewed, and never once used the word "cadre" attributed to him in

the Ramparts article,

"That word, I never in my life used it," Graham said, "and the only time I ever heard it used was in the army. A cadre was a fucking corporal who came up out of Mississippi with a green thing on his sleeve."

Graham is even more upset that Hinckle felt qualified to write about the Fillmore Auditorium without even once having set foot in the place.

Jerry Rubin who was interviewed by Peter Collier of the Ramparts staff, was upset because, having been listed as a contributor to the article, his opinion was not even mentioned. He agrees with some of the political points made in the article, but feels that the hippies are "definitely a positive force" because they have confronted "the whole Protestant ethic, not only in words but in action."

Ronnie Davis, describes himself as "pro the article," but he was also not interviewed. Davis said he had "talked to (Robert) Scheer, probably, and it got through to Hinckle."

The factual inaccuracies in the article, such as the geographic location of Haght-Ashbury (it is not parallel to Golden Gate Park) and Hinckle's identification of The Family Dog as a rock group, Davis feels are only minor points.

Davis is "pro" because the article "gave a political perspective to the hippie scene that hadn't been applied before."

Opinions of the article differ widely in the sprawling, diverse c om munity it endeavored to pigeonhole.

Harvey Kornspan, manager of The Steve Miller Blues Band,

community it endeavored to pigeonhole.

Harvey Kornspan, manager of The Steve Miller Blues Band, thought it was "harmless." "What the hippies needed," he told BARB, "was a legend, and it created one – instant legend."

Don Carpenter, author of The Hard Rain Falling and a sometimes book-reviewer for Ramparts, took the just opposite attitude: "This is the danger with any organization that thinks it's politically correct – they're perfectly willing

to propagandize, that is, lie ... poor devils."

What most of the critics, from Mouse and Kelly and Ron and Jay Thelin to Bill Graham, dislike about the article is that is showed little knowledge of its topic. Jerry Rubin, once a journalist himself, felt the article had "too much opinion and not enough description."

But all the inaccuracies in the article — including the description of a supposed summit conference of hippies, a meeting which either never took place or was blown out of all proportion by the article — allithese pale before one glaring facet. The article was shoddy journalism. Warren Hinckle did not sufficiently research his topic before writing about it.

"There's a subject that was three miles away," Ralph Gleason told this reporter, "and if they fuck that up I have to question what they say about Garrison and Vietnam, too."

"When people read that thing in the BARB," he said, "they thought that's a good idea and that's as far as it had to go. I got as much out of reading it as I would out of anything else."

REVOLT

HONOLULU (UNS) -- A new, and stronger, variety of antimilitary activity is breaking into the stop-the-war scene. Its center seems to be the usually conservative tropical vacationland of Hawaii.

A group at the University there, calling itself Student Partisan Alliance, has alerted BARB to its plans for the "infiltration of the US armed forces by radical and revolutionary elements."

The group seems Maoist in its orientation; it supports the Chinese Cultural Revolution, condemning US imperialism and advocating a people's revolution in this country.

Not totally in the peace bag, SPA criticizes present draft resistance programs, stating that the draft is "sometimes necessary to the defense of a nation and a vital factor for resisting military aggression." It acknowledges the validity of draft resistance as revolutionary.

Central to their program is the

central to their program is the urging of newly-inducted military personnel to cooperate with the service during induction and basic training, and to volunteer for officer training school and technical schools "in which useful skills can be acquired."

When such training is completed "agitation, propagandizing, etc. begins," according to SPA's policy statement.

Techniques advocated by the new group are: mediocre cooperation, encouraging desertion, sabotage, eliminating unit leaders in combat, revealing unit positions and surrendering to liberation forces, and "divulging classified information to prostitutes, black market dealers, etc."

SPA declares that it "believes the draft can be used as a weapon by anti-imperialist organizations in the US."

Not only can it be used to sabotage the US war effort in Vietnam and other overseas adventures, but also to substantially weaken the entire military machine. . ."

Meanwhile, in military bases throughout the country, individual servicemen are risking and receiving court-martials for their stands against US war policy. Pfc. Howard Petrick, at Ft. Hood, Texas has been threatened with courtmartial for his anti-war and socialist activities.

Another soldier at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. has already been courtmartialed and served his sentence for dissenting to the war. He, along with Petrick, reports to BARB that the large majority of men they have talked to do not go along with the Army's policy on Vietnam, and many are privately in firm opposition to it. Fear of disciplinary action prevents their speaking out.

GI PAPER VS. WAR READIED

Anti-war GI's need no longer feel isolated in their struggle with the war machine. A weekly newsletter started this month by four Berkeley men is intended to bring them into closer contact.

"We already know of some servicemen beginning to organize on their bases," said Bill Collison, spokesman for the newsletter, the "Bond."

"We're asking now for names of GI's anywhere who are against the war. At every base contacted, we'll collect names of other GI's trying to organize, and send them each other's names."

Besides namey, Collison expects, the paper will contain articles "from servicemen -- Ihope especially from GI's and ex-GI's who've been in Vietnam --" and news of organizing activities on the bases.

It will tell how to get legal help, and serve, Collison hopes, to organize support by civilians around bases where GI's are organizing.

The "Bond" will be sent free to bound servicemen. (Others may subscribe).

Collison is calling for sympathetic servicemen's names, and for funds, help, and office space. For

We all live accidental lives, our futures and pasts, our attitudes and even our daily actions being shaped by unseen currents moving thru the times in which we live. We bob adrift like a leaf in the Amazon loudly proclaiming that we are independent of history, especially us hippies who see in the momentary flickering of the wind an immutable flow of history.

The present is unreadable, at least for me, and I realize that seeking direction by looking to the past is futile because I have rired to trace events and have found the things that look most trivial to be keystones.

The plot is that of rebellion converted to middle class blandness -- a reflection of the history of its author I think, and certainly of the people on whom he based his book. It begins with a motorcycle gang fantasy about wrecking a house where an incredibly sexy 14 year old chick is baby sitting, takes events thru the persecution of a high school teacher to a rumble in which the hero's assailant accidentally kills himself with a zip gun, and the subsequent conversion of the hero from a motorcycle bum to.....there are three endings, all middle class. In one he finds square love; in another he doesn't but gets married and raises his child in a quonset hut in Rockville, Maryland; and a third in which he goes to jail on false charges but encourages the continuation of rebellion.

And there it is, the rebellion useless in its frenzy, and the only solutions available to the author or his peers. The area covered by the action is about 10 square miles — the characters never go 10 miles to downtown Washington D.C.

Socially the area is about the same. They rap about integration, which they see as another aspect of the Establishment limiting freedom, and people mention dope but obviously it was not part of the experience of the characters or the author. Dope then was grass and heroin, and had no mind expanding aura. Kicks, that's all.

The author dimly sees that if all the teen agers could get together there would be "coast-to-coast chaos, riots, such as have not been witnessed since the French Revolution, and internal warfare..." a goal which has been thought of since by beatniks and hippies, and those on the left.

But the author does not want this because it "can only result in our being conquered — 'authorities' and 'rebels' alike, from without — by the Communists.' so he suggests that the police stop persecuting teen agers.

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

BIG PRESS FEARFUL OF LITTLE PEACE AD

The megalopolitan press, self-assertively one of the traditional outlets for free speech and individual expression in an America of suppressed truth and opinion, is joining the UShawk-government and its imitators in actively stifling the voice of protest against illegal war.

In its April 21 issue, BARB reported that Oakland resident Bill Shaw intended to observe the Nuremburg principle of not remaining passive but speaking out against immoral acts of one's government. He stated that he would attempt to place a classified ad in the SF Chronicle disclaiming legal responsibility for the Vietnam war.

Shaw sent in his ad, which read,

"I deny legal responsibility for the actions of the US government in Vietnam. I do not willingly support this illegal war." He subsequently received an acceptance slip for the ad, but it did not appear in the paper.

Upon inquiring, Shaw was told that due to complicated requirements, his ad would have to appear in the "Business Personal" section of the classifieds rather than the "Legal Notices," as he had requested.

Two weeks after the original acceptance, his ad still had not appeared. Inquiring again, Shaw was told that he would have to inform the Chronicle as to his occupation and place of business and include in the ad (at his own expense) his address for purposes of mail response. Shaw complied with his request, but because of the added expense, had to shorten the message of the ad to "I oppose the illegal war in Vietnam" and his signature.

He was then notified that the ad was still not acceptable, because he had used a post office box address instead of his residence. He then attempted to speak to someone in authority at the Chronicle, but was not allowed to talk to anyone but the ad clerk. At this point he withdrew the ad. "This is a clear case of suppressing dissent," Shaw declared to BARB. "The alleged reason for the inclusion of my address was so that the paper would not have to handle any mail resulting from my ad -- I have a PO box for just that purpose.

Thousands of migrant farm workers will face starvation this fall.

The decline in jobs, combined with rain-inflicted crop damage—there were no pears this season, apricots were meager, and there was only one planting of tomatoes—means that the seasonal workers won't have enough money to last them through the winter.

For single men, not covered by welfare and unemployment insurance, the situation will be desperate, Winter explained.

A complicating factor is the urban renewal projects which are systematically destroying the slums, and with them the cheap housing needed by the migrants.

In Sacramento, "almost the entire poor downtown areas have been torn down." In their place have risen office buildings, Macy's, IBM, a convention center. But there have been no plans for housing for the poor.

The Sacramento unemployment rate is officially 9.8%, which means the true figure is close to

In the face of the crisis, the workers have been organizing.

In Sacramento, some 200 homeless workers formed the South Side Single Men's Self-Help Organization (SSSMSO).

Two weeks ago BARB reported on the plight of these men, who were threatened with eviction from the decaying church which was their only shelter. Today they are out, and the building will be demolished shortly, Winter reported.

Almost all the men have now found jobs. But this is merely a reprieve.

The crisis began four to six weeks ago, when the picking season started late.

They are wrong. It will happen, and soon. Look at it from the view-point of those in power—the State Department, the FBI, the CIA. We are all "Communists," dangerous to the security of our country. Like the Japanese-Americans in World War II, we are all possible spies or sympathizers aiding the enemy. We must be put away.

As soon as war is declared—some say at the end of this month—they will begin. Underground papers like yourself will be the first to go. You would be "aiding the enemy" if you were allowed to continue printing anti-war news.

The American people will "understand." They will be told it is necessary for thier safety to get all the radicals out of the way, and they will not object.


