OUT TO PROVE IT

One of the most hassled men in the Bay Area is John Ross, chairman of the Progressive Labor Party and would-be candidate for supervisor in the coming San Francisco elections.

Although Ross locally heads "the working man's party," he has seen SFPD observing and photographing people entering and leaving his headquarters from the "Labor

Temple' located across the street. Added irony is that Ross was beaten up this summer at an ILWU picnic. San Francisco unions, Ross says, "work for The Man, not the rank and file." He has scars to back up his claim.

Further, on September 6, the SF Examiner ran a story stating that Ross was ineligible to run for supervisor, 15 days before Ross even filed his application.

Although three other candidates -- Robert Mendelsohn, Charles Clay and Clark Cummings -- are as ineligible as Ross (lacking five years residence in SF), none were barred or even investigated.

This, says Ross, is a "clear question of somebody trying to get us."

Ross plans to protest his expulsion in court in October. For the trial he will call in radicals from all over the county to prove that not only left-wing, but also anti-war and anti-draft organizations have been subjected to a "consistent pattern of attack and assault since 1964."

Ross is lining up several ACLU lawyers to help with the case.

Despite his being expelled from official candidacy, Ross will conduct a "stick-in" campaign, in which voters will attach a sticker bearing his name onto the blank provided for write-in candidates.

Ross has another court case coming up October 9, in which he will charge Mayor John Shelly, police chief Thomas Cahill and various Mission District police with "criminal prosecution to suppress our rights."

The "criminal prosecution" in this particular case involves the police breaking into a Mission District Draft Resistance Union party and "beating and arresting 10 persons," including Ross.

(The above mentioned Examiner story featured a picture of Ross taken shortly after this beating -- his face was badly misshapen.)

Ross will shift this case up to the Federal level, as the State would have him face a certain judge, who, Ross says, is a "Reagan appointee". Ross cites cases to support this claim, including the current trial of three Mission boys who, he says, were brutally beaten by police without provocation -- but the judge isn't seeing it that way. -H.W.

JUVENILE, PARENTS FUZZTRATED

SAN LUIS OBISPO (UNS) -- On Thursday, September 7, Larami Moreau age 17, accompanied by a friend who was almost 18, left his parent's home in San Anselmo, He hitch-hiked south, spent the night in Big Sur, telephoning his parents from the home of a friend of theirs in Big Sur.

He arrived in San Luis Obispo the following afternoon. He and his friend bought some peaches on the street and were about to eat them when a sheriff's deputy took them into custody.

The sheriff's deputy telephoned Larami's parents, assured his father that he had done nothing illegal but that he was in custody under a special San Luis Obispo ordinance as being "beyond parental control."

Mr. Moreau said that Larami was not beyond his control, that he was travelling with his permission, staying with friends of the family, telephoning regularly, etc.

The officer said that if he was 200 miles from home he was "beyond parental control." The boy's father said his control was established by home training and is not geographical. The officer said that "There are so many runaways nowadays that we arrest all strange kids."

Larami's father insisted that the officer release the boy, let him buy bus tickets for both himself and his friend as he had ample money. The officer agreed that he could do this, that they had put a boy on a bus the day before.

The next morning another phone call from the parents of his companion revealed that instead of releasing the boys, they had jailed them.

The other boy's parents came when summoned and got their son out at 10 p.m. The police refused to release Larami except to his parents, which they can require, even if he were to be picked up in Minnesota.

Larami's mother then phoned the county jail where Larami had been put in the drunk tank overnight because, having long hair and having his spare clothing in a Mexican woven bag, he was judged to be obviously homosexual and therefore had to be isolated to protect the other boys who were in custody. He was intensively searched for the "dope" the officers were sure he had.

Larami's mother directed that her son was to be released immediately to the friends who had driven a hundred miles to pick him up, with their son. The lieutenant at the desk said he'd have to call probation. The mother directed him to phone whoever he had to, but to let Larami go with his friends.

A phone call to Marin County authorities revealed that the police claim they have the right to hold juveniles under 21 without any charge as long as 72 hours, and that Saturday and Sunday do not count. Parents cannot demand the release of a child in custody even though there are no charges of illegal actions against him or her.

Any girl who has been married achieves adult rights and protections, although her husband does not until he becomes 21. An "emancipated minor" who can prove self-support, if he is over 18 has some rights.



A Pearl In Scott's Valley

If you've ever driven down to Santa Cruz, you've probably passed a little town called Scott's Valley without even knowing it. Consider yourself lucky.

You see, Scott's Valley doesn't like strangers any more than it likes the twentieth-century. If you don't believe me, just ask Leon Tabory.

Tabory is a clinical psychologist who, until last November, worked at the Santa Cruz County Hospital. But it was in Scott's Valley that he tried to put some of his therapeutic ideas into practice by presenting rock bands and light shows at The Barn, a two-story building overlooking the Scott's Valley Baptist Church.

The idea was to help foster human awareness, but Scott's Valley just wasn't buying any.

It seems that Tabory had a bad name among Scott's Valley Baptists because of a talk he had given on marijuana at the Hip Pocket bookstore in Santa Cruz two years before. In a town where children are told that the San Andreas fault is going to open up and swallow all the sinners, you might as well SELL pot as mention it.

Then, too, Tabory had testified for the defense when the Christian Women for Morality (i.e., Baptists in drag) made their unsuccessful attempt to have the Hip Pocket busted for obscenity.

At that point, Rev. Glenn Culwell, the town preacher, tried to get Tabory fired from the hospital. He, too, failed.

The Baptists didn't care much for The Barn, either. Oh, it was all right when the square-dancers used it, and it was all right, too, when the Volunteer Fire Department used it. But when it opened as a coffeehouse in 1965 -- with no less a figure than Eric "Big Daddy" Nord at the helm -- it became clear that Scott's Valley had become the target for a full-scale beatnik invasion.

Fortunately, the town was saved when the coffee-house folded. But no sooner had the townfolk drawn their first easy breath in months, then Tabory showed up with HIS shenanigans.

The town rallied its defenses. As an opening shot, C.R. Roberson, a paving contractor, Deacon and eventual City Councilman, placed a lien on The Barn, falsely charging that Tabory had refused to pay a paving bill. The court threw the lien out.

The second round began when Tabory -- more as a sign of good intentions than anything else -- applied for a "use permit." Since Scott's Valley was not an incorporated city at that time, he filed his application with the Santa Cruz County Planning Commission. Scott's Valley tried to muster

a major protest, but somehow came up with only two letters. Nonetheless, it was enough to gain a postponement of the hearing, and to have the application transferred (illegally, says Tabory) to the Scott's Valley Planning Commission, which, of course, denied it.

That was the frontal attack. The flanking action consisted of a smear campaign against Tabory himself. He had graduated from the University of Wisconsin; the Scott's Valley News granted him a degree from the University of Leningrad. In a speech to the local Optimists Club, a man Tabory didn't even know denounced him as a Communist and a homosexual.

Since he didn't actually need a use permit, Tabory opened The Barn anyway. On October 16, 1966, Scott's Valley brought civil and criminal charges against him for allegedly violating an ordinance prohibiting the operation of a place where entertainers are provided -- as "social company or otherwise" -- within 200 feet of a residential zone.

The Scott's Valley Baptist Church, as chance might have it, is in a residential zone, although no one, including Rev. Culwell, actually lives there. Tabory wasn't worried. Since The Barn had always been used as a dance hall and community center, the ordinance in question should not have applied. Unfortunately, it turned out that a former owner of The Barn had applied for a use permit for an antique shop. And while the antique shop never materialized, the break in the chain of uses meant, in the judge's opinion, that Tabory needed a use permit too. The criminal charges were dismissed when the City Attorney failed twice to show up for a hearing.

Meanwhile, the common folk weren't idle either. A local doctor began explaining to coffee klatches how light shows damaged the brain and led to a craving for drugs. The Santa Cruz Sheriff's office was besieged with groundless complaints about noise, and finally stopped investigating them.

At this point, Scott's Valley hired its OWN cop, who immediately tried to close down The Barn. He began following Tabory around and snooping around The Barn whenever he could. Tabory was by this time boning up on the law. He intended to reopen The Barn, since the judge's order would not be binding until the appeal was settled. But he decided to hold a private party instead, with a sign at the door announcing it as such. Nonetheless, he was arrested again and charged with contempt of the judge's order. Unable to post bail, he spent three days in jail.

Now hot on his trail, Scott's Valley also charged Tabory with violating an "emergency" ordinance that had just been passed to protect the health, welfare and morals of the town. In order to make the charge stick, the city had to prove that a sufficient state of emergency prevailed to warrant such a law.

The City Attorney was unable to provide such evidence at the initial hearing, and subsequently moved for dismissal of the charge. He got it despite Tabory's objection that the city was simply trying to save ITSELF from a charge of legal harassment.

The contempt charge, however, has provided Tabory with a chance to fight back. Since there is no appeal from a contempt charge, Tabory was able to file a Writ of Prohibition with the California District Court of Appeal as an "extraordinary measure." If this fails, he has a couple other legal aces up his sleeve. But who knows what the Baptist anti's have up their.

BUT STRAIGHT! LUCIFER GONE; ANGER OFFERS REWARD

Keneth Anger stands alone like Job, wondering why.

Last Thursday evening, September 21, 1,600 feet of original Ektachrome EF, original camera film, and printing master, for Anger's film, LUCIFER RISING, was stolen from a locked trunk in the Straight Theater.

This is only one in a series of robberies which has plagued the theater in recent days.

The film is valued at nearly \$200. However, this is only the cost of stock and processing. Its actual value is inestimable. It was half of the original footage, from which all future prints of LUCIFER would have been made.

Anger believes that the robbery was, in his words, "an inside job." He said that no one had broken into the theater that evening, therefore it had to be the work of an insider.

Anger says that he was assured

that the film would be perfectly safe locked in the trunk, which also contained tapes that would have been used for the film's sound track, props, banners and lights with rotating colored gels. However the management of the theater would assume no responsibility for the loss.

The film, which was on four reels of four hundred feet each, was shown earlier that evening in conjunction with a program designed to raise funds for LUCIFER RISING. The benefit, called The Equinox of the Gods, featured the Mime Troup, the Congress of Wonders, and others.

A specially trustworthy projector had been checked out by Anger with which to project the film. It is not entirely unusual for independent filmmakers to project original film, because of the great cost of making a workprint, or a cutting copy.

LUCIFER had been budgeted at \$20,000, but Anger was only able to raise \$8,000.

If he is unable to recover the film, LUCIFER will not be completed, Anger stated. It would be impossible to restage the scenes since so many of the actors have split.

Anger is offering a reward of \$100 for the return of the film, \$50 for the return of the tapes, and \$25 for the return of the props.

If the film, tapes, or props are left at the BARB office, 2886 Telegraph Avenue in Berkeley, Anger pledges that cash will be left there the next day for the party to pick up, no questions asked, or strings attached, and naturally no law.

Sunday night at the Straight, Malachi, the well known guitarist, had his priceless handmade twelve string guitar stolen from back stage of the theater, before he was to have begun his performance. The same evening, the flute belonging to a female musician on the program was stolen.

Anger's troubles did not end with the theft of Thursday night, however. Saturday night, his home on the corner of Scott and Fulton was burgled, and his camera, a Kodak Cine Special, and other articles and props for LUCIFER were stolen. The camera when new was valued at at least \$1200.

Anger does not believe that there is a relationship between the two robberies. He believes the second theft to be an act of personal vengeance, the first the act of someone seeking "dirty" footage. There is some nudity in the film.

RUBIN DENIES SPLIT

Jerry Rubin this week squelched rumors that he had split from the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam.

"I want to make it clear that the coalition is sticking together," Rubin told BARB by phone Wednesday night.

He is still in charge of organizing the entire October 21 weekend demonstration in Washington, D. C., along with co-project-director John Wilson of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee.

"My own preferences and abilities lie more toward the civil disobedience and hippie type of action," Rubin said, "but no one is going to be forced or pressured into any particular style of protest."

The October 21 peaceful assault on the federal war-heads will be three-pronged: a march, a rally, and civil disobedience.

The march, forming at the Lincoln and the Washington Memorials, is planned to cross various Potomac bridges to a rally at the Pentagon.

Part of that rally will be an American-Indian-style exorcism of the evil from the Pentagon, whose shape is the symbol of ill in Indian magic.

Quiet dissenters, simply making their bodily presence known, are still expected to comprise the majority of the demonstrators.

Various independent groups are contemplating acts of civil disobedience, from sitting-in at the Pentagon to defoliating the White House lawn.

One independent group, the Council of Love, inseminated by a New York Digger, is spreading its roots nationwide through the hip underground.

Its immediate goal is to hold a series of benefits to provide free buses and free food for caravans from the West Coast to the capital.

The spirit of Mack Sennett sometimes visits meetings of the Council of Love when they visualize possible modes of anti-warfare.

In an incense-filled room in San Francisco, a scene was recently portrayed in which the Potomac turns red from the infusion of US Navy surplus marker-dye, and a phalanx of charging bluecoats is met by custard pies, shaving cream, an underfoot wave of agglies and immies, and skin-contact psychedelic chemicals such as DMSO squirted from water pistols.

Rubin explained that "the coalition, as such, would never accept dying the Potomac red" as a sponsored tactic. But neither would they attempt to prevent it.

"What we really want in Washington," Rubin said, "is for different people to come and do their own thing."

Death of Hip Birth of Free

One year ago Oct 6 marked the first Love Pageant, the first free food in the Haight and a prophesy of a declaration of independence.

Next Friday, a year later October 6 will signal "the Death of Hippie" and "Rebirth of Free Men" and a Declaration of Independence.

The Committee for Community made up of representatives of the Switchboard, Free Medical Clinic, Housing Office, Free Store, Oracle and others, who do not wish to be named, called its second meeting on the Death of Hippie celebration Wednesday.

All those present could agree on the necessity for the "Death on Hippie." Most felt that media had created the concepts of "hippy", hippy culture, ethics, and hippy community.

There was a general consensus that the media's image enticed many dissatisfied young people to the Haight -- people who in most cases had not made an internal commitment to drop out.

This influx of uncommitted people in need of housing, food and other services changed the environment for those already there. They tried to fulfill the needs of the newcomers.

"Rather than asking them to do their thing, the community tried to give them what they came for," as one person put it.

Many speakers expressed concern that the resulting situation destroyed the freedom of both the older residents and the new arrivals. Instead of "doing their thing" people were becoming media image "hippies," they felt.

In the previous meeting much of the symbolism for the Death of Hippie portion had been worked out. Free people of the Haight will carry or drag a coffin around the outskirts of the Haight Ashbury District in a funeral for "hippie" and exorcism of the Haight Ashbury.

They will fill the coffin with

debris of the streets, words like "hippie," and perhaps some beads and long hair.

The idea is for "individuals to throw things into the coffin that are meaningful to them" according to one participant. "An individual might cut off his beard if it wasn't really him. The same goes for beads or clothing."

The funeral procession will probably end at Stanyan and the park where the exorcism and coffin burning will take place. A suggestion to tow it out to sea and burn it at sunset received some support.

Members of the Committee will attempt to have store owners close their shops and cover their windows with black crepe during all or part of the celebration. Some individuals on the committee anticipate much widespread cooperation from store owners that might otherwise be expected.

There was a great deal of disagreement in the initial stages of the discussion on what to do for the "Rebirth of Free Men" portion

of the celebration. The Committee finally decided to just "let it happen and see what the individual expression is."

One of the "individual expressions" maybe a phallic worship ceremony held by Lenore Kandel at Coit Tower with "dancing nymphs" encircling it.

Another idea is to set up a baby sitting service in the mall across from city hall with "fifty thousand beautiful chicks and babies." Free persons might take over City Hall for a day and stage a Greek feast with everyone dressed in togas inside.

Some of the reborn may dress in army uniforms and parade through the city carrying "bomb Hanoi" posters. Others may be handing out one black and one white armbands to straights on Montgomery Street.

Another suggestion was for all free persons to leave the city "until the people get bored" and then return en masse screaming "we're back! We're back!"

FOUND!

Janet Kornbluth is beautiful; just look at her picture in last week's BARB adadadad and see for yourself. That's what Paul Conover did, and discovered that the girl he picked up hitch-hiking just before Labor Day was Janet Kornbluth.

"Janet was a secretary at M.L.T., and she was hassled by the scene back there. She just walked out at lunch one day and took a plane to San Francisco, and I just picked her up one day while she was hitch-hiking," Conover told BARB.

"Last Friday night I was just sitting, reading the BARB and listening to music, and I saw her picture. I was really surprised.

"I called the phone number listed under Janet's picture and told



them that she was safe, well, had a job, and planned to stay on the West Coast indefinitely," he said.

Coincidentally, Eleanor Cohen, whose number was listed, had recently hired the Liquid Blue Band, of which Conover was manager.

"Janet has never seen a copy of the BARB, she's just heard of it, and I would be inclined to think she'd be amused by the coincidence," Conover said.

FREE MED FIGHTS ON

After a week of appeals in leaflets, newspapers, and on radio the Free Medical clinic has turned up "at the most four or five volunteers."

"This is what is disappointing to me," Lowell Pickett, Clinic administrator, told BARB.

"Volunteers were what made the Clinic different. They were the reason why people would come here. When you hire people, you get the same kind of atmosphere as in general hospitals throughout the world."

"Our financial problems are still fantastic," Pickett stated.

Two benefits are scheduled for the clinic. There will be a "dancing lesson" benefit at the Straight Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 4 and with accompaniment from various rock groups.

The Jefferson Airplane, Charlatans, and Blue Cheer will play the other benefits at the Fillmore on Wednesday the 11th.

Before the Clinic will reopen there must be a great increase in community support, according to Pickett.

"There must be some people in the neighborhood who have free time. If they really care about having the clinic, they will have to volunteer some time," he said.

VOTE FOR P BISHOP PIKE TELLS 2000

"The Vietnam war is a way of giving the American Negro an opportunity to fight in Southeast Asia for rights he doesn't have in Southwest Georgia," Bishop James Pike declared this week at Galileo High School.

He spoke in behalf of the "Citizens for a Vote on Vietnam" which recently put its initiative measure on the SF ballot, calling for withdrawal of US troops from Vietnam. Some 2000 attended the meeting.

Joining Pike at this kick-off rally -- the first of many such neighborhood drives planned by the Committee -- were Supervisor Jack Morrison and Dr. Benjamin Spock, the noted pediatrician.

The referendum will appear on the November 7 municipal ballot as Proposition P.

Morrison, who is also campaigning for Mayor, gave his endorsement to Proposition P in a brief speech stating that he first doubted the Citizens group would ever succeed in getting Proposition P on the ballot. Now that this was done, he said, the Committee had "performed a great service to the people of San Francisco."

"If only half the money spent annually on the war in Vietnam were spent on our cities," he declared, "San Francisco could look for well over a \$100 million a year in terms of jobs, education, public transportation, city beautification and also in terms of getting at the root causes and sickness of our urban communities."

Pike, describing himself as a "very violent dove," said that at one time he had been a "mild hawk."

Citing the Nuremberg decision, Pike said that the best way we could support our servicemen was by not making killers of them.

"The young kids that I have met in my travels across the land aren't saying, 'I don't want to go over there and get killed,' Pike explained. "What they're saying is, 'I don't want to go over there and kill someone!'"

Pike argued that a Yes vote on Proposition P would be a meaningful vote.

"If you pass this," he suggested, "maybe a supervisor could block off the Golden Gate and stop the shipment of napalm."

Dr. Spock, sounding like a doctor treating a sick patient, described the US in terms of having the disease of "vigilante justice -- Western style."

"To a very dangerous degree we enjoy violence in this country. We're only half civilized in this

respect. We're going to have to bring up several generations with a fear and horror of this violence," Spock said.

A spokesman for the Citizens Committee told BARB that a recent informal poll conducted by Pat Bell, a professional pollster, revealed that 58% had voted Yes on Proposition P, with 41% voting No and 1% undecided.

In addition to this, the Committee also announced that it would conduct a separate ballot on election day for those between the ages of 18 and 21.

FUZZ BAG FREE MAN FOR GIVING

The moral is: stores are for selling or don't sit on your doorstep, free store experiments notwithstanding.

The story began on Haight Street on Saturday Sept 16. Steve Fowler was sitting in the doorway of The Cosmic Bell, his future place of employment.

On either side of him were two signs reading "FREE POSTERS." He was giving the Meher Baba "I am the Ancient One . . ." poster to passersby.

The purpose of his generosity was to publicize the imminent opening of his Meher Baba Center at the Cosmic Bell on 1405 Haight St.

Around five pm two cops told him he had to cease distributing posters and move on. When he refused they cited him for Public Nuisance, Refusing to Obey an Officer, and Blocking Traffic--the last in spite of the fact that no part of his person or display extended beyond his own doorway.

Fowler was in jail for 18 hours. His bail was set at \$250 dollars. Only the efforts of the SF Own Recognition group got him out on his O.R.

"When I was leaving the jail flashed," he relates. "They had one of my posters pinned up on the wall. It really blew my mind. Holding them for evidence," they said."

Fowler demanded a jury trial. The trial is set for October 16 in Dept 11 of the S F Municipal Court.

He says he will file suit against the police and the city if any lawyer will agree to take the case for free.

NON-STUDE STUD CUTS COLONEL'S MUSTARD WITH A BIT OF CUSTARD

A Marine Corps Colonel got a custard pie in the face, between 100 and 200 Berkeley freshmen got an unexpected show, and non-student man, clad in a black cape, orange T shirt, black tights, and gas mask got away.

All in a space of two minutes. Less than 24 hours later the dashing champion of free people everywhere appeared in the BARB

office for an exclusive interview, replete with costume.

"I'd been smoking and it hit me - I guess that's how non-student man was born", the muffled voice behind the gas mask told BARB Sunday.

"When I read the announcement, non-student man and his cap-gun toting accomplice had mapped out approach and escape routes to Wheeler Hall, the scene of the in-

cident. They enlisted the aid of 2 motorcyclists, and the plot was set.

At 4:15 on Saturday Col. Roy D. Miller was just warming up to the subject of ROTC program for freshmen. In midsentence he turned to see non-student man dashing onto the stage at his right.

"I took 10 steps," related non-student man. "He looked at me. First he just looked peeved. But then he saw the pie hurtling toward him. Shock and real terror appeared on his face."

According to an eyewitness account, "Miller put up both of his arms in this cringing, really flailing manner, which was the best part."

At that point the accomplice dressed in an army uniform shouted "Provo. Get him!", and chased non-student man from the stage with a volley of cap gun blasts. In less than a minute the pie thrower and his aide had jumped on the backs of waiting motorcyclists and cleared the campus.

Witnesses in Wheeler said a young man in the rear stood up and yelled "End the war in Vietnam" just after the pie was thrown. They noted quickly suppressed laughter from some of the freshmen.

Col. Miller "looked around for a half minute or so to check the reactions of students," another witness reported. "Then he resumed his spiel in midsentence. His dignity had been assaulted and he wasn't going to show it. But he was standing with flecks of pie all over him!"

Col. Miller later had "no comment" about the incident but wanted to know if BARB could identify his assailant.

The illusive provocateur described his highly successful debut as "only a beginning". He plans even more imaginative escapades to "turn on new people on the campus and keep administrators, military, and even radicals from being too overbearing."

WFP BAFFLE DC FUZZ

"Should they go? We say no! We back the boys who will not go," chanted one thousand women as they marched in front of the White House on September 20th.

The parade of women, representatives of Women For Peace from all over the United States, was led by four women. They carried a simulated coffin, made of black cardboard. Painted on the side was, "Not our sons, not your sons, not their sons."

This is how 3 day national conference of WFP began.

During the conference a campaign was launched called the Jeanette Rankin Brigade. Jeanette Rankin, now in her 80's, was the first congresswoman, and was the only congressional representative to vote against the Declaration of War in 1917.

At that time she said that if ten thousand women refused to send their sons, the war could be stopped. Women for Peace plan to get a power block of one million women to end the war in 1968.

During the conference a group of women presented to General Hershey signed statements that the women stand behind the brave young men who believe that war is immoral, unjust, and brutal. These men must have the courage to say no, and we can help give them that courage by giving our support, read the statement.

Presenting the statements were Carolyn Goodman, mother of civil rights worker Andrew Goodman who was killed in Mississippi in 1964, Gail Eaby, Kay Camp, and Mrs. Williams, mother of Pvt. Ronald Lockman. Lockman is in the stockade at the San Francisco Presidio for refusing to go to Vietnam.

Delegates planned to picket the White House during the first day of the conference and to test a recently issued edict restricting the number of pickets to 100. They had made prior arrangements for

their defense, and would send 110 women, hoping some would be arrested.

The picketers rallied in a park across from the White House, unaware they were in a newly fenced-in area. As they walked out singly and in twos because of the small exit, the police counted 100 women and refused to let the others through.

"The women made an end run and went around the police lines. The police cut them off, then more women charged across the street and were cut off again," Betty Segal, Berkeley representative, told BARB.

Police cars arrived, people began pushing, yelling, and falling. "Then we sat down. We just sat in the middle of Pennsylvania and Executive Avenues, and two women were arrested.

"Two young men with our group were singled out by the police and pushed around and beaten, then thrown into a car.

"An announcement over a loud-speaker told us to disperse within 2 minutes or the permit for our next rally would be withdrawn. It seemed advisable so we withdrew," said Mrs. Segal.

Mrs. Segal feels that the conference was highly successful. Except for an announcement that appeared in the Women's section of a Washington newspaper the day after the arrests, everything went as planned.

"The announcement said that Secretary Stewart Udall is re-considering the picketing edict, and that means we might not have our test case after all," Mrs. Segal said.

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BLASTING NAVY TWO FRONT ATTACK ON NAPALM PORT

One by land, two by sea. When a quintet of Port Chicago pacifists at noon today try to board a munitions ship from two rubber rafts in restricted waters, two others will simultaneously cross over the line by land onto the Concord Naval Weapons Station. The two life rafts, the CD (Civil Disobedience) Plowshare and the CD Pruning Hook, will carry Catherine Allsup, Phillip Malec, Phyllis McKeever, Robert Powers, and Ed Stover to the Berkeley Victory at dockside. If they reach their goal, the peace crew will ask permission to board the munitions carrier to

dump the weaponry overboard and replace it with flowers, toys, May wine, and medical supplies. At the same time, Alan Fisher and Mike Maloney, under the black and red anarchist flag, will walk toward the off limits Waterfront gate at the weapons station, aiming to meet the rafts with more supplies. Signaling from the rubber rafts may be accomplished by the release of colorful balloons.

The seven pacifists anticipate charges of resisting arrest, at least, when they go limp or otherwise non-violently refuse to cooperate with the militia. The Coast Guard has not announced whether it has perfected techniques for moving limp peaceniks from bouncing rubber life-rafts to cutters.

All the seagoing demonstrators know how to swim, and will wear lifejackets.

Prior to the movement into restricted areas, a party beginning at 10 a.m. will be held at the waterfront gate of the Naval Weapons Station in Port Chicago.

A release from the Plowshare group asks interested persons to join the party and 'help us bring love to the U.S. Navy by having fun in front of their weapon station while we have fun in the water.'

Peaceful party-goers can get information, directions, and possibly transportation by calling 339-9668.

TO CHOOSE FREEDOM AND PEACE

Voters who will want a choice in 1968 other than Johnson/Nixon (Reagan, etc.) can now lend their support to a Peace and Freedom Party.

The steering committee of the Community for New Politics voted early this week to form the third party, and to concentrate their efforts on placing it upon the California ballot.

CNP's voter registration drive must recruit 67,000 Californians by December 31 if the Peace and Freedom party is to get on the 1968 ticket.

The Party's platform dedicates itself "to getting the U.S. out of Vietnam, to supporting equality and self-determination for black people, to fighting against poverty, police oppression and bureaucratic dehumanization."

Corruption in the contemporary two-party system is another theme voiced by CNP.

Registration centers are located at 2214 Grove (CHP's main office), at Red Square on Dwight Way near Telegraph, at Berkeley fire stations and at City Hall.

Republicans and Democrats can re-register now into the Peace and Freedom Party and then switch back, if they wish, anytime before April.

RIGHT GUARD HITS ARMPIT OF AMERICA

"El Cerrito High School is the armpit of America," says a motley band of El Cerrito High School students.

The jubilant band, garbed in motley, charged up the BARB stairs Wednesday to describe the first rally just held by them, the Right Guard.

(Pssst. In case any reader has remained sheltered from both the yahoo press and the boob tube, their name is derived from a restless group of mainland Chinese and an American underarm spray deodorant).

What happened Wednesday after the last bell at ECHS was that twenty or forty Right Guardsmen in uniforms ranging from Ancient Roman to Recent Esquimau shouted "C'mon to the rally" outside the school.

As bemused teachers and administrators peered through panes of glass, about 75 students rallied for 25 minutes by laughing, screaming, and hugging one another.

The happening characterized two of their most immediate complaints -- impending regulations on dress, and the "anti-human" nature of football rallies.

"Some signs at the rallies say 'Kill' so-and-so," on ECHS student said, speaking around a camp

helmet. The Right Guard is planning its own football homecoming float, featuring an immense can of incense-wafting spray deodorant, bearing the slogan "Love the Eagles to death."

The group is dubious that the student body is being truly represented by the present dress-regulations committee, appointed by the principal, not selected by the students.

One proposal being considered by the regulators is that male head hair cannot extend below the earlobes. No mention has yet been made of upper limits.

Since the Right Guard hissed into the world only a week ago,

their specific objectives are not yet unclouded. But two aims are already clear: No dress regulations, and No regimented school spirit.

Other points of criticism included grading, bells, and an administrative "non-controversy" policy regarding speakers -- although a South Vietnam soldier was this week considered non-controversial.

The Right Guard's Commissioner of Propaganda expects to begin a mimeo newspaper soon to help spray the word.

To raise funds for their efforts, Right Guardsmen say they plan to sell sugar cubes during the lunch period.

Cons Beat Resisters

WASHINGTON, D.C. (UNS) -- Some of the establishment's victims are apparently still brainwashed -- at least, in the District of Columbia jail.

Three men who were taken to the jail after sentencing as a result of an anti-draft demonstration, learned this week, when some prisoners beat them up.

They were Peter Kiger, Dick

White and Bob Murphy. All were arrested in an anti-draft demonstration at national Selective Service Headquarters Monday, September 18. The New York chapter of the Resistance put on the action.

Kiger is reported to have broken teeth and cuts on his face.

Also arrested were demonstrators Harry Drexler, Kurt Gayle and Barbara Gayle.

Drexler began the demonstration by giving to General Hershey's secretary a letter stating his desire to sever all ties with Selective Service. He then left the building and sat on the front steps with the Gayles.

The three were arrested on charges of disorderly conduct. They were replaced by Kiger, White and Murphy, whose arrest followed.

The next day, members of the Philadelphia Resistance joined the Mobilization's program of sustained confrontation. Dan Silverman and Greg Allen of Philadelphia entered the headquarters and were ejected and arrested when they refused to stop discussing the war in Vietnam.

Sonia Evers, of Philadelphia, and Bruce Davidson, of New York, were arrested for sitting on the steps of the Selective Service building.

All were charged with disorderly conduct.

INDIAN LIKES "FREE MEN"

The entire North American Indian Unity Caravan didn't show at the meeting for Indians and non Indians at the Straight Theatre last Friday, but the meeting was fruitful anyhow, according to Ron Thelin of the Psychedelic Shop.

Thelin attributed the Caravan's decision not to participate in the meeting to "the media image of hippie."

Rolling Thunder, Chairman of the Traditional Tribal Council of the Western Shoshone Nation did show with his Nevada delegation. A total of about 1500 people heard the Indians expound on their religion, prophecies, and way of life or witnessed a two hour "ritual film-sound statement" given by "free persons" living in the Haight later on that evening at the Straight Theatre.

Among the prophecies discussed by Indians present at the Theatre

was the "Day of Purification," including the "gourd of ashes" symbol of purge, destruction, and regeneration. On the Day of Purification (which is drawing near) "Indians and their true brothers throughout mankind will return to the way of the Great Spirit," Thelin explained.

He related the "gourd of ashes" to the celebration of "the death of hippie and rebirth of free men" to take place in the Haight on Oct. 6, 7 and 8. "It will be people going back and reacquainting themselves with the Great Spirit," he said.

On Saturday the Equinox celebration continued with a Peace and Friendship dance held at a ranch south of San Francisco. "We danced around the fire until one," Thelin said, "and stayed up all night talking."

A Declaration To Our Fellow Citizens Of The United States, To The Peoples Of The World, And To Future Generations:

1 We are appalled and angered by the conduct of our country in Vietnam.

2 In the name of liberty, we have unleashed the awesome arsenal of the greatest military power in the world upon a small agricultural nation, killing, burning and mutilating its people. In the name of peace, we are creating a desert. In the name of security, we are inviting world conflagration.

3 We, the signers of this declaration, believe this war to be immoral. We believe it to be illegal. We must oppose it.

4 At Nuremberg, after World War II, we tried, convicted and executed men for the crime of OBEYING their government, when that government demanded of them crimes against humanity. Millions more, who were not tried, were still guilty of THE CRIME OF SILENCE.

5 We have a commitment to the laws and principles we carefully forged in the AMERICAN CONSTITUTION, at the NUREMBERG TRIALS, and in the UNITED NATIONS CHARTER. And our own deep democratic traditions and our dedication to the ideal of human decency among men demand that we speak out.

We Therefore wish to declare our names to the office of the Secretary General of the United Nations, both as permanent witness to our opposition to the war in Vietnam and as a demonstration that the conscience of America is not dead.

On September 23, 1965, a Memorandum of Law was incorporated in the Congressional Record of the 89th Congress of the United States of America, in which eighty leading American attorneys, after careful analysis of our position and actions in the Vietnam War, came to the conclusion that we are violating the following accords: The Charter of the United Nations, The Geneva Accords of 1954, the United States Constitution.

To Protest — To Object — To Dissent has long been an American tradition. The following are a few among the many who have signed this declaration to be on permanent record.

Take the Better Half

by Marvin Garson

Half of my mind tells me that electoral campaigns, especially for national office, are dangerous nonsense, that they breed dishonesty as naturally as the damp breeds rot; and half of my mind tells me that nothing could be more disastrous than for the American left to abstain from the gigantic electoral battle of 1968 that is already brewing.

I'm not impressed by the argument that we should "do community organizing instead of electoral politics." Propose a particular organizing project, whether in "the community" (wherever that is) or elsewhere, and we can discuss it on its merits. But "community organizing" all by itself, in the abstract, means nothing; it's warm and furry but it has no shape.

Let's take electoral politics at its best -- i.e., as independent third-party politics based on mass organization rather than maneuvers inside the Democratic Party or a top-heavy national ticket with no local base -- and assess it as a community organizing project.

The advantages:

1) It allows you to deal with a broad range of issues quite naturally, without forcing anything. A candidate for national office is expected to talk about any public issue, and even to create new ones.

2) It breaks down the sense of isolation both among activists and the people they're organizing by involving them in a project which other people in other neighborhoods, other cities, or even other parts of the country, are working on at the same time.

3) It breaks down social parochialism. The set of people potentially involved includes all voters, i.e., all adults. This creates the opportunity (and the necessity) for people from different social groups and classes to work together.

The disadvantages:

1) Electoral campaigns have as their center of attention one man, the candidate.

2) The rhythm of your activity and the forms of your organization tend to be prescribed by law rather than developed experimentally.

3) Since success or failure is inevitably measured in numbers of votes, there will be a strong pressure in the direction of opportunism.

That may look a little depressing on balance, but so would any organizing project if you realistically listed its pros and cons. And it's not as if the left was bursting with activity, is it? Even now there are too many people just marking time, waiting for something to do. Next year thousands of them will want to get involved in an electoral campaign -- and next year it will be too late, at least in California.

If you want to fool around in the Democratic primaries once again, you can wait until the Spring to organize your campaign. But if you want to run an independent third party campaign you have to do a tremendous organizing job between now and January 1. The reason is a state law designed to keep third parties off the ballot here. The law says that for a third party to get on the ballot, 67,000 people have to register as members of that party BEFORE JANUARY 1.

A NEW SWITCH

The Bay Area will soon be covered by Switchboards. For two weeks now, Berkeley has had its own version of the Haight-Ashbury original. Soon to follow will be San Jose, Hayward and San Mateo.

Berkeley's Switchboard is part of an ambitious community of workers who call themselves the "South Campus Church Mission." "We want to serve the world, as would any church mission," says Rev. Dick York, the founder of the community. "Just as Jesus did when he washed people's feet in the bible -- that's the way we want to serve people."

Through the new Switchboard, anyone-hip or straight-can contact the "Free Church Mission" and offer or receive help.

York's community will attempt to post bail for minor arrests, locate free doctors or lawyers in emergencies, find "crash pads" for travellers in and out of state, organize a school for all ages, find guides for trips, and offer draft advice and group therapy.

More generally, the new Berkeley Switchboard attempts to "connect people up with the good things that are happening." Soon available will be formulas for "legal highs" (such as a recipe for Hawaiian Rosewood brew).

The "mission house," home of York's Switchboard-community is at 2331 Careleton; the Switchboard numbers are 549-0649 and 549-0791.

The house is, of course, open to anyone, anytime -- "even L.B.J. is welcome," claims Spider Hoffman, one of the workers.

The service program is already underway. Already, emergency

medical aid has been provided for car wrecks and drug overdoses, and as far away as Colorado. There have been some problems with local hospitals, however: many will not treat even emergency cases if there is doubt about the victim's ability to pay the hospital bill.

But York's community tries to find funds whenever necessary. They have raised as much as \$800 for one single auto accident.

Also, jobs have been found for unemployed hippies; messages have been taken and given; bail provided for minor busts; and run-aways aging from fourteen months to eighteen years have been picked off the streets.

The Berkeley Switchboard is sponsored by a committee of local clergymen and businesses. York's original idea was to operate as a "street minister," walking up and down Telegraph, ready to help in cases of emergency.

He soon found this unpractical. Then, three months ago, he founded a "Free Church" in his own home. The "Mission" has grown out of this into a home of its own, and -- most importantly -- the Switchboard.

It is the Switchboard that brings the outside world to the community. Straight people -- doctors, lawyers, psychologists -- call in to offer their help. Neighbors and homeowners in the Berkeley area donate furniture or open their homes to travelers in temporary need.

Of course, additional help is always welcome. So, if you have a talent or a home to share with Dick York and his community, you might call the Berkeley Switchboard. You don't have to wash feet.

TIMES ARE BIT DIRE FOR SHIRE

The old wooden warehouse on 17th St. has been abandoned by the Shire School. The classroom--or as much of it as will fit into Director Tony Johansen's truck--has been moved to Golden Gate Park.

BARB reported last week that the San Francisco Building Inspector had ordered \$5000 worth of structural reinforcements in order to make the warehouse earthquake-proof, but he wasn't the only one who got uptight about the building.

The Health Inspector, doing HIS thing, declared the building "uninhabitable," and the Fire Marshall--heart all a-flutter--turned in the final thumbs-down.

So the School was "evicted" until such time as the building could be made safe.

"It's not a case of harassment, though," said Marilyn Edmiston, one of the teachers. "The charges were justifiable. In fact, they were really very nice about it."

Since the School doesn't have \$5000 on hand, the old building will no doubt simply be abandoned.

"The \$5000 would just be to make the building safe," said Marilyn, "and we still wouldn't have the other things we need to make it a school."

Now the problem is finding a new--and much safer--building. (The number to call is 751-6731.) Until then, the School will continue holding half-day sessions in the park.

Happily, the sudden move hasn't had any adverse effects on either staff or students. Things are settling down, and the children, despite the temptations of park and playground, are becoming interested in academic subjects far sooner than expected.

"After their experiences in the public schools," says Marilyn, "we thought they'd really want to take advantage of all the freedom, but they're not."

But, of course, the School can't remain in the Park forever. When asked what would happen if the School couldn't get a new building before the rainy season began, Marilyn answered simply: "We just have to get one, that's all." Meanwhile, a benefit for the School is scheduled for October 22nd at the Straight Theatre.

The Peace and Friendship Caravan to Discover Free America departs for Washington on Oct 12, Columbus Day.

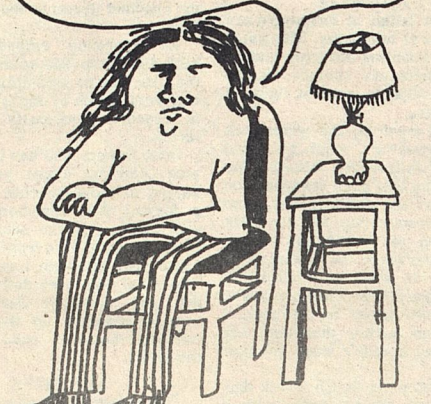

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The Way of the Gateless Gate...



Peter Schneider, a student:
"Does a man have a finger or does the finger have the man?"
"Buddha nature has the man."
"What is Buddha nature?"
"You can't lift it up with ten men."

It is said that there are many right answers to a koan and there are also none. Paul Reps in his book ZEN FLESH, ZEN BONES says, "... the koan itself is the answer, and by the time there is a right answer to it Zen is dead."

Zen adherents are quick to point out that koans are not meant to be logical. They deal with states of mind rather than words. They serve to break the armor of the student's verbalism and allow him to live in the illimitable.

One of the Zen adherents at Zen Mountain now is Kobun Chino, a young Zen monk and scholar from Japan.

His English was broken and I spoke to him with the aid of a student. This is Kobun's first time in America and he arrived only three months ago. I tried to question him about what he may think of the strange (to him) ways in which Americans came to Zen. I had in mind the off-the-cuff guesses of a number of the students that half to three quarters of the students had used LSD before coming to Zen.

LSD

Zen Master Shunryu Suzuki, the spiritual leader of San Francisco's Zen Center, taught and pronounced the initials LSD with a mouthful of ridicule when his students question him about it.

When I interviewed him last week I questioned him for about five minutes on it but came away completely bewildered by his Zen answers to me. The only thing clear was Suzuki's regarding LSD as completely irrelevant to anything.

It was even more irrelevant to young monk Kobun Chino. He had never heard of it and didn't seem to be aware that drug taking was commonplace among young Americans. In truth, all of American life seemed irrelevant to Kobun. After arriving in San Francisco from Japan in July, he immediately went to the S.F. Zen temple on Buxh Street for three days of intensive meditation. He then was quickly driven south to Tassajara where he has been ever since.

I asked him what he thought of America's first actual Zen monastery. "This place is perhaps called Zen Village," he responded.

"I sometimes call it Zen Children Village. There are almost no rules. It is a very rare type of monastery. It is a child village and also a Children's Village and it needs unimpeded growth like most things young."

"Ours is one of the only successful functional utopian-type communities in the United States," David Chidester, one of Tassajara's "Suzuki" koshi's spiritual presence provides inner harmony to keep the community operating."

The community will function all year round now. During July and August they had 80 people but they are now down to averaging between 25 and 30.

SHAVEN HEADS

Most of the men students looked like they had recently had their heads shaven and I saw one girl with short hair but the rest of the girls had fairly long hair. I was told that during the summer there was a number of extremely longhaired males in the training sessions, except for the teachers and master Suzuki, everybody wore esthetic casual clothing when they were there.

This is in marked contrast to the situation in Japanese Zen monasteries where men and women wear exactly the same clothing (uniform robes) and have their heads and eyelashes shaved.

Suzuki seems strangely un-Japanese and a bit American in his support for a basically unregulated approach to Zen enlightenment. He says he is not at all concerned about hair length but prefers shaved heads. "The shaved head is the ultimate in hair styles."

WITH SUZUKI

To get the story on the now legendary new Zen retreat in the mountains south of the Carmel Valley, I hitchhiked up there last week. Zen Mountain Center is a monastery located at the old Tassajara Hot Springs resort in Los Padres National Forest. Getting there is in some ways as difficult as reaching Satori.

The steep winding road up to Tassajara is one of the most breathtaking rides in this country. The huge mountains dramatically dwarf man. They serve as an ideal preparation for the deep mountain isolation of the hidden valley site of Tassajara. This writer was scared out of his wits by every minute of it on the way down in bright sunshine. At certain points you can see up to 3,000 feet straight down just from the edge of the dirt road.

Beautiful valleys and canyons stretch for vistas of ten, twenty miles. One's eyes embrace a good part of the last untouched land in Central California.

Esteban is a very Oriental appearing Central American Zen student. According to him, the narrow, mountain dirt road from Jamesburg to Tassajara was built by Chinese coolie labor in the latter part of the 19th century. The road was intended for robber baron industrialists who sought seclusion in the mountains.

"It was built on a mountain trail which had been used by covered wagons bringing settlers to the hot springs."

MOON VALLEY

I rode up at night and discovered what a valley of the moon really was. There was a full moon that night and up in the mountains it looked amazingly clear and full. It lit up long deep valleys miles long.

Originally, San Francisco's Zen Center had planned to purchase a parcel of horse pasture just above the Tassajara resort. There are little parcels of private land in the middle of the wilderness of the huge Los Padres National Forest near the edge of the Carmel Valley area.

The horse pasture was, for the time being, owned by a man of years; it appeared before me physically assembled. At the beginning of this year the resort itself suddenly became available for \$300,000. Zen Center snapped it up with a Zen concern for the immense difficulties it will have raising huge installment payments twice a year until 1972.

Almost immediately the Center had a complete physical plan for a mountain monastery which would "help to put down real roots in Zen in America."

The people at Zen Mountain feel "It will never be physicalized or with in the sound of traffic." The only access to the land now is that 16 mile dirt road elevated by the county once a year.

NUMBER ONE PHONE

Zen Mountain's phone number is Tassajara Hot Springs #1. There isn't any #2 or 3. There isn't another phone for literally miles. The site is so remote that Pacific Telephone Co. years ago refused to run lines up the mountains for just one number. A compromise was reached, Tassajara Hot Springs Resort set up its own phone company and paid for the lines and their maintenance, and Pacific Telephone hooked them into their system.

With the purchase of Tassajara, Zen Center has assumed ownership of the Tassajara Hot Springs phone company. Dialing the Mountain Center involves a seemingly complex act of hooking into their lines.

I called the number twice from Jamesburg, a community of about

New students wishing to stay longer than three or four days are required to sit in Tangyaro (intensive meditation) for from three to five days. In Tangyaro in Japan the meditation rooms have peepholes. If you slouch some lurking monk will come in and slam you with a stick.

Zen Mountain Center has two different schedules which it follows. Both are roughly modeled on the daily routine at the Eihei-ji Zen Monastery in Japan and are not for those who like sweet and easy life.

The first schedule, used during training periods, begins at 4 A.M. with 30 minutes of Zen sitting (meditation), with breakfast starting at 6 A.M. from about 10:20 A.M. a Zen lunch, short rest, formal study, work at 2:30 P.M. and at 4:30 P.M. a 30 minute lecture. Zen sitting at 7:30 and followed by tea at 8:30 and followed by tea at 9:30.

The other times than training periods the people of Zen Mountain sit at 5 A.M. for 30 minutes and spend the whole day, except for lunch and a 15 minute break, in these times, the work is more rigorous building and maintenance. The lecture and teaching are of a more important nature. People who come to see me by general paths.

Life at Zen Mountain is quite rigorous for all. For Springs guests, and people who come for non-Zen meditation, both of them pay room, table and are housed in small cottages and served four courses of meals in an airy straight dining hall.

The others, Zen teachers and students, also live in small cottages, two to a room, or study in very small dormitory rooms. Their meals are eaten in the Zendo (a monastery dining hall) and are blandly simple though probably more varied than in Japanese monasteries.

Breakfast usually consists of gruel and fruit, lunch of soup, salad, and bread, supper a simple salad and a bowl of rice and a cooked vegetable.

The meals are eaten in a highly formalized way with everybody squatting on cushions in the Zendo. It is pretty weird as one eats between the solemn chanting of sutras (Buddhist sermons) such as this one:

"First, seventy-two labors brought us this rice; we should

know how it comes to us. Second, as we receive this offering, we should consider whether our virtue and practice deserve it.

Third, as we desire the natural order of mind, to be free from clinging we must be free from greed. Fourth, to support our life, we take this food. Fifth, to attain our Way we take this food."

I was advised by Chadwick that one follows the hot baths with a plunge into the nearby cold mountain stream and then standing and sitting meditation in their little outdoor steam rooms. They look

The San Francisco Zen Center purchased the cluster of resort buildings at Tassajara and began operation of the Zen Mountain monastery in them while at the same time continuing to operate the resort. While I was there they were handling six other guests: one was a quiet, heavily black bearded husky man who looked anything but the Los Angeles liquor store owner he supposedly was; a soft-spoken sensitive veteran of the Jack Kerouac days who had hiked in via the 25 miles of mountain trails from Big Sur on the Pacific; and two elderly retired couples who had come for the hot springs and were friendly but seemed to this reporter unaware of the existence of the monastery in their midst.

They often referred to as Zen Buddhism and as a Buddhist sect; actually it is thought by many Zen scholars to have stemmed from sources before the time of Buddha 700 B.C. It is thought that the earliest known Zen teacher, Bodhidharma, was inspired by an ancient Zen-type teaching existing in China as far back as 2000 B.C. Then as now those who could see saw Zen in flowers and grass blades.

Bodhidharma is believed to have originated the modern approach to Zen around 520 - 534 A.D. in India. It is thought that he wandered to China shortly after, and introduced his teachings there. Zen later reached Japan in the 12th century.

Its approach embodies rigid self-discipline and scorn for dogma. Its aim of self-enlightenment and realization of one's inner self is reached principally by meditation.

Dick Baker, who has been studying Zen for seven years, was raised to monk/teacher status in a formal Zen ceremony while I was there. For the occasion Zen leaders came down from San Francisco and up from Los Angeles. The local Monterey daily newspaper, the Monterey Herald, even sent a reporter up the 16 mile twisting mountain road to cover the story.

ZEN RITES

The solemn Zen rites included Dick's posing and answering of koans, traditional Zen riddles for opening and redeeming the mind. He answered this one posed by

NOT BATH

The hot baths at Tassajara are real natural hot baths. The water flows up bubbles up from underground mountain springs. It has a high sulphur content, with a sharp odor.

When I got in the water was too hot, so I called to David Chadwick, a friendly talkative hip teacher who has been studying Zen for a year. His Zen self-discipline seemed responsible for his quick entry into the water and subsequent underwater swimming in it. For me it was a scalding it took me forty-five minutes to lower myself into it up to my neck. I couldn't go farther than that. My girl friend couldn't even get that far.

CITY COUNCIL REBUFFS BERKELEY PEACE TRY

Berkeley's official radical councilman Ron Dellums, has suggested that a citizens' committee be formed to help finance the city government.

In response to objections raised over the possible expense of proposed referendum on the war this November, Mr. Dellums suggested that the obscuring factors be removed through private financing of the election.

He himself would be glad to lend his name and support to the effort, he intimated.

This liberal gesture was made during last Tuesday night's meeting of the Berkeley City Council, when Carl Frank of the Student Mobilizing Committee asked the board to place the "Dearborn Initiative" before the people November 7. If they did not, he noted, the SMC would collect the necessary 5400 signatures on a petition to force the matter.

The ball was first tossed to the City Attorney, who noted that he had not read the State Supreme Court ruling on the similar initiative in San Francisco. He then

proceeded to recite all the old objections which the court had overturned.

The usual objection of the ruinous cost of a special election (20,000) was brought up. It was at this point that Dellums made his unique suggestion.

It was not known whether Dellums would reserve for the fund-raising committee a 51% controlling interest in the election.

Also, the question was left unanswered who would finance the fund drive.

Typically, no decision was made. On the motion of Willmont Sweeney, the matter was referred to the City Attorney, with the instruction for him to study up and report back next week. -- L.F.

OLD CHRON NOT SURE ABOUT SEX

The Chronicle can't make up its mind about Sexual Freedom. On June first repeated attempts by the East Bay Sexual Freedom League to place an ad in the Chronicle finally met with success.

"Now they've cut us off again," Tom Palmer, member of the 3-man board of directors, told BARB. "They claimed they were getting far too many letters from people who didn't think that was the right kind of ad for their paper."

The SFL plans to negotiate with the Chronicle to have the ads reinstated. If that fails, Palmer predicts "some sort of public display of our unhappiness."

IN MEMORIAM
Frank Sears 1940-1967

The wild Canadian poet is gone, and will not be back. It occurred Sept. 18, on a highway near Ukiah. He and two friends were riding in a panel truck which went off the road and crashed into a tree. One of the three survived, another was killed instantly. Frank died two days later in the hospital, and the county of Mendocino buried him.

Frank first hit Berkeley late in 1963, a rebel out of Ontario, with a driving urge to write poetry. I must admit that on the occasion of our first meeting, I helped throw him out of the Steppenwolf. Some while later, when he returned from a year's absence in Alabama, he told me that I was one of the few people he hoped would still be in Berkeley.

Right from the start he made his presence felt as few new arrivals have. He was a starring attraction at all the local poetry readings; he was everybody's good drinking buddy; no party was complete without Frank. And we all remember his habit of tilting back in his chair till he went crash on the floor. No matter how many times it happened, he just never seemed to learn.

Now that he's gone, these little things do come back. But Frank was more than just another Berkeley character who occasionally turned out a sort of a poem. He was an authentic poet, and devoted to his craft.

In his early work the Dylan Thomas influence was pretty plain, but as he went on he was definitely developing a sound of his own. Frank Sears' poetry was a most real relief from the sort of undistinguished thing you come to expect at Berkeley readings.

The last time I talked to him, a couple of weeks before his demise, he was telling me of his plans to start writing rock lyrics. He said he wanted to make money for a change. Primarily, he wanted to make money because of what it would enable him to do for his friends. Frank was definitely a man of the new culture.

On that occasion he also had some harsh words for the hippies' practice of intellectual shopping-around, ignoring their own real roots. He mentioned, for example, the sort of people who have read all kinds of exotic sutras, but have never even read Yeats. He was right, but I intend to reserve that subject for comment at a future time.

Frank Sears was my friend, and I miss him. In which I am not alone. Frank died too soon to reach the heights he aspired to, but he will not be forgotten. I believe that his name will be legend in Berkeley, and I think that's how he would have wanted it.

HIPPOCRATES

QUESTION: My wife is nursing our new baby. Will any harm be caused the baby if she smokes marijuana now and then?

ANSWER: Like the answers to many other questions about marijuana, its distribution in the body after inhalation or ingestion is largely unknown. Its effects on babies is also unknown; but there is certainly a strong possibility it might be excreted in mother's milk. Your baby is on a good trip anyway when at its mother's breast and marijuana probably won't make it better. There is possible harm with the use of any drug. Why take a chance with your baby?

QUESTION: For not loving people my body sent me a stomach ulcer as a warning. I smoke grass regularly. It was one of my devices to shut out people or avoid facing things. Is it bad for an ulcer? Should I give up grass for the duration as I try to heal my soul and patch up my insides?

ANSWER: Current medical thought is that most peptic ulcers are caused by emotional tension or anxiety. An important part of the treatment of ulcers is the relief of tension through sedatives or tranquilizers and one of the known effects of marijuana in most people is relief from tension. Its direct physical effects on the stomach are unknown.

If you frequently use marijuana to shut out people, even its staunchest advocates would say you are misusing the drug.

QUESTION: Some of my friends have taken over the counter preparation containing bella donna in large quantities and have become blithering idiots for periods of 4 to 6 hours. How dangerous is this? If belladonna is the active ingredient and a speed, why the hallucinations?

ANSWER: In some older preparations used in the treatment of asthma, the main ingredient is belladonna, a drug deriving its name from the women of medieval Italy who took the drug to dilate the pupils of their eyes. 'Bella donnas' were perhaps a little stoned as well. Besides dilated pupils belladonna causes a dry mouth, rapid heart beat and difficulty in urination. Doses large enough to cause hallucinations may be dangerous to life. Its effects, especially blurred vision, may last several days. Belladonna is closely related to scopolamine, the active ingredient in over the counter sleeping preparations. Neither are "speeds" (amphetamines) though some of their actions on the body are similar.

QUESTION: Recently I've come into many friends who have used yellow jacks but none of them agree or have similar experiences. What kind of high do they produce and how (if at all) harmful are they? ANSWER: "Yellow jackets" are capsules containing pento-barbital

or seco-barbital. The medical uses for barbiturates in this form are for sedation and to induce sleep. Before the widespread use of marijuana and LSD, barbiturates were widely used, often in combination with amphetamines or alcohol, to produce a "high", though "low" would better describe the experience.

Barbiturates are physically addicting and once hooked the "yellow jacket" addict must have his drug every day. Without it he will have withdrawal symptoms very similar to those felt by morphine or heroin addicts when they try to kick their habits.

Seeger Turns 'em On

Pete Seeger came on stage, set up a posterboard, and slowly wrote "Chicken Little Was Right" in chalk; "just to let you know where I stand." He then proceeded to turn-on the packed audience in the Berkeley Community Theater to the joys of group singing.
Pete, who singlehandedly has done more to revive American folk music than anyone else, stressed the history of American radical songs in his Wednesday benefit concert for the Port Chicago Vigil.

"Remember that our nation was formed by several hundred thousand and draft-dodgers from Europe," he noted after singing a 1764 English song about a deserter. He then led the audience in singing "Follow the Drinking Gourd", in its time an escape manual for slaves.

"Free speech is a great thing," said Pete later on. "When you're talking to a dozen people, they don't mind. Talk to a few thousand and they pay close attention. When you can talk to 35 million people, they make sure it's on tape."

With this he introduced "Bid Muddy," a powerful anti-Vietnam war song which CBS had cut from the tape of his appearance on the Smothers Brothers show two weeks ago. Seeger's powerful image of a Johnsonian commander sucked under by the Mississippi that he tries to force his men to conquer was right where it's at.
Pete brought the message home hard as he followed it with a song whose words were the statement of a German-born housewife who

blocked the napalm trucks at Redwood City last year.

Seeger wrapped it up with his vision of hope as expressed in "O, Had I a Golden Thread"; "... in it I would weave the bravery of women giving birth/in it I would weave the innocence of children over all the earth..."

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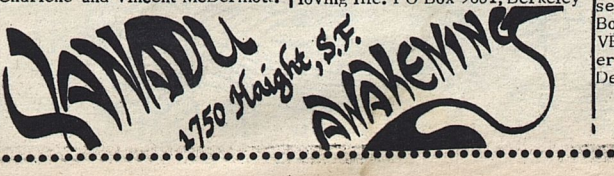
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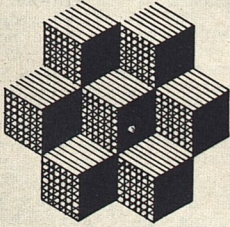

The Bay Area's Mime Troupe will carry its unique "commedia dell'arte-political" to the rest of the nation for the first time in early October.

The Troupe has won enough national contracts, mimer Joan Holden announces, to "inspire its creditors with fresh hope".

The tour means bread for the Troupe, as the oncoming cold season keeps Bay Area people from the parks where the Troupe performs (and collects donations).

In past winters the Troupe tried indoor performances, but the "rented theaters and expensive publicity . . . largely accounted for the Troupe's large debt," Miss Holden said.

The tour will take the Troupe not only to such conventional art centers as "the Big Apple" and Detroit, but also to lesser-known centers like Plainsville, Vermont, Waterville, Maine and Iowa City.

The mimers will return home around Christmas, when it is hoped local colleges will "see the Troupe through the lean rainy months".

"The Troupe is giving a farewell performance of L'Amant Militaire (its antiwar satire)", Miss Holden said, "in Wheeler Aud., Saturday, Oct. 7, at 8:30 . . . Proceeds will provide the Troupe with an advance bail fund, a demonstrated necessity; the Troupe was busted during both (national) tours of its Minstrel Show".

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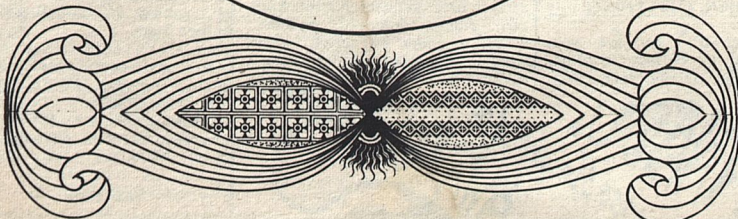

A personal visit from LBJ, Over 1,000,000 troops ON THE LAND of only one-half of Vietnam, Yet we can't silence "red artillery".

Next time you see some "professor of military science" walking across the UC campus, ask him why (you can tell him by the scrambled eggs on his cap and the custard pie on his face).

We are "winning" the war in Vietnam like the Nazis did in Russia.

Backwards. (Channel 4 stated Sept. 27, "Marines are firing 4 shells per minute, 24 hours a day"; note that this does NOT include bombings and Navy shelling.)

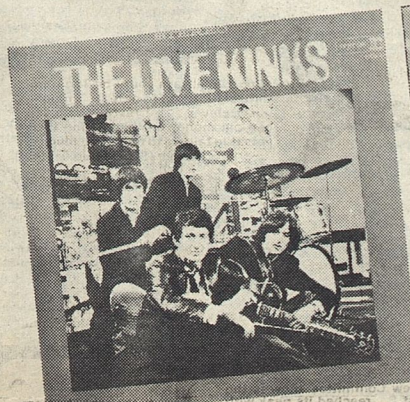
