# NOT DEAD YET

"We're not guilty. That's our plea, and our lawyers will prove it."

This is the comment of Danny Rifkin, manager of the Grateful Dead, about the Monday afternoon raid on the Dead's pad at 710 Ashbury where eleven people were arrested by rampaging state marks.

The busted included Pig Pen, the Dead's organ grinder, and Bob Weir, rhythm guitarist. Both were charged with possession of marijuana.

Neither of them turns on. Pig is a devoted wine freak, and Weir, who has long been a student of eastern meditation, has been applying the methods of the

Maharishi Yogi for the past two weeks. The meditation methods forbid the use of drugs.

Three more raids were made in the city the same day, including one on the Blue Cheer's house at 369 Haight Street. Ten people were arrested there, though none of the members of the band were in the house at the time.

The same afternoon in L.A., the Electric Flag, down south to cut an album, was busted by local cops. Though facts were vague, it is rumored that drummer Buddy Miles was the only one to escape.

In all, 36 people found themselves behind Hall of Justice bars Monday.

Feeling runs high that the Dead bust was in retaliation for their playing at the Straight Theater School of Dance last weekend. Blue Cheer is also scheduled for an appearance there.

However, the parties involved tend to discount this rumor. They feel rather that there is a mass push to bust, regardless. One theory is that by busting the rock bands, state and city police hope to create an unfavorable image of the people they claim local teenagers emulate.

In any case, more than a few houses, particularly those belonging to bands, have undergone hasty clean-ups since the Monday raids.

## FREE?



The Free Medical Clinic, appeared to be very much alive when BARB visited there this week. Fresh paint in a vivid variety of colors covered walls and woodwork. A crowd of volunteers made it difficult to reach the rear office.

"The response this week has been amazing," administrator Pickett enthused. "Most of those who volunteered mentioned the BARB article."

Despite a gratifying response from individuals volunteering time and skills, financial problems are still pressing.

"What we need is \$3,000 per month to operate for the next six months," Pickett told BARB. He encouraged Haight residents to pledge monthly sums, no matter how small, toward achieving the \$3,000 goal.

"It will be at least six months before we get any government money," he calculated.

In the meantime the clinic plans a San Jose benefit on Oct. 8 and one at the Fillmore on the 11th.

Pickett criticized those who had more concern for who was playing at benefits than whom the benefit was for.

"You don't go to a birthday party for the cake and ice-cream; you go because you like the boy," he said.

## BURGLE

"If we don't get the money, New York here I come," Phoenix, mainstay of the Digger Free Store on Cole St, told BARB. The Store owes \$750 in back rent. The landlady threatens legal action.

"At the most we've got six days," Phoenix estimated Tuesday.

Ironically, the Diggers may be evicted for building code violations, not non-payment of rent. One of the violations resulted from a "burglary" of the store about six weeks ago, when a door was kicked in.

This statement is closer to where it's at than anything any hippie can come up with at the moment. If, somehow, hippies could unify their psychedelic experience with an idea, then rather than a "San Francisco Sound"

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# A WAKE FOR HIP, A CHEER FOR FREE

Late this Thursday night, as BARB hits the streets a Wake for Hippie is being held in All Saints Episcopal Church in the Haight. Today all of San Francisco will become "liberated territory" -- "the first free city on the planet" in the words of one participant in planning Death of Hippie/Rebirth of Free Men celebrations slated for today, Saturday and Sunday.

Residents of the Haight Ashbury and periphere will don death masks, black armbands, swing censers and beat gongs and drums as they drag an oversize coffin for Hippie through the streets today. Black crepe will cover the windows of closed stores in the district.

The funeral and exorcism procession starts at one. Purpose of exorcism is to "free the boundaries of the Haight-Ashbury district" and destroy the "we/they" concept inherent in the idea of a "hip" community according to one member of the Committee for Community.

The Committee is a planning group made up of representatives from the Oracle, Free Clinic, Switchboard, All Saints Church, Housing Services and other groups. Members requested that they not be mentioned by name; they reject the concept of the leadership.

The funeral comes at a time of crisis for familiar Haight institutions. The Free Medical Clinic closed three weeks ago. The Switchboard and Digger Free Store are foundering. The Free Hotel project is dormant or dead.

Committee members variously attribute these breakdowns to "paternalism", "lack of community support", and the deadening effects of media labelling.

"The media cast nets, create bags for the identity-hungry to climb in," stated one individual. "The Free Man vomits his images."

The Funeral procession will circle the Haight and end at Masonic and the Panhandle. There the coffin will be placed atop a pyre made of garbage and collected debris of the streets and burned.

Saturday is planned as a "Day of Changes." Individuals and small groups will range throughout San Francisco giving impressions of their own rebirth as "Free Men." Many provo type actions are planned. Sunday will be a "Day of silence."

Planners of the celebration hope for a spreading out of the community with the "freeing of the boundaries" of the Haight.

Tactically, the police will have a harder time making busts if people no longer congregate on Haight Street. The media will find it difficult to impose new labels if they have no mass street scene to draw upon.

Decentralization has already begun. Ex-Haight Ashbury residents have relocated at various points throughout the West. Los Padres Forest, the Santa Cruz Hills, Colorado, New Mexico, Mill Valley, and Nevada all have small groups of free immigrants.

Other signs of change are beginning to appear. The Free City, a no-cost newspaper originating in the Haight contained instructions for making fire-bombs in its first issue last week.

The Psychedelic shop where it all began closed today "for good." Co-proprietor Ron Thelin forsees the closing of other similar venture as the Death of Hippie concept begins to take hold.

## New Agit-Prop Bugs Local Cop



To the crowd on Telegraph, Wednesday night, it probably looked like part of the show.

A gigantic red, white and blue dragon, quite blind, was being led across Haste Street. Walking with the dragon were all the cast members of Berkeley's newly-formed Agit-prop theater, and part of the audience.

Suddenly, from nowhere, a man dressed just like a cop shouted at the dragon.

John Fay, who had been helping the dragon across the street, took off down Haste Street, the cop in hot pursuit. The cop bagged his man, and the crowd cheered.

Now it is not often easy to separate fantasy from reality in the theater world; but it turns out that this bust was for real.

Not only that, but John Fay is not even a member of the cast, just a helpful onlooker.

And what was John Fay arrested for? Resisting arrest, what else?

So ended the new East Bay Agit-prop's first performance. It had begun with three anti-war skits on Cody's corner on Telly. It

was not unlike the shows put on in Berkeley and the Haight by the original San Francisco Agit-prop.

But someone must have tipped the police. Two squad cars pulled up before the performance began, and stayed through the show. Nothing happened until the star-spangled dragon led the singing, cheering crowd down Telegraph. Fay stepped out of the crowd to help the dragon cross the street. Enter a cop, on foot.

At BARB deadline, John Fay is in jail for "resisting arrest". As for the East Bay Agit-prop, they plan to perform anti-war plays wherever they can find an audience. Their big show will be at the Oakland Induction center all throughout Stop The Draft Week.

"We are going into the streets in Oakland to fight the draft," says Lisa Mandell, "and we hope we can bring the whole city with us."

The next performance of the East Bay Agit-prop will be 6:00 pm Sunday, at 1300 Arch St. The shows are free, but watch out for khaki krep khostumes.



## MYSTERY SURROUNDS STRANDED DANCERS

Mystery still surrounds the problems of an El Salvador dance group stranded in San Francisco for nearly four months.

Their problems are simple: they are flat broke, hungry, out-of-

work, homeless, and abandoned. Their dance company has 21 men and 18 girls. They do folk dances in typical costumes of the Central American countries.

Originally they had a contract with a David Ortega Cid, an entertainment promoter from Daly City. They were to make several appearances in the United States and Mexico this past summer. The debut was scheduled for San Francisco. It never came off.

Instead, the group was abandoned when the promoter reportedly disappeared. Since then, they have been living in cramped apartments and offices in the Mission district of San Francisco.

For food, the Mission Rebels and the Diggers have been helping. "Official" type agencies like the Red Cross claim they have "no jurisdiction in the case," ac-

## FUZZ TOO FREE?

# BUGGERS BARED COPS BUG KIDS;

Who was breaking the law? Berkeley's finest or the "hippies" whose Haste Street pad they hassled three times in four days?

A few interesting details were left out of the police-source account of last Wednesday's midnight raid published in a local daily.

For instance, the police had no warrant but claimed that the tenants were trespassing on newly-acquired University of California property.

The fact is that the police had no warrants and entered a dwelling owned by R. Williams, held in escrow, and not to become UC property until the Stroke of October 1.

The first two raids were dated September 27.

### "DANGEROUS"

A half-dozen dwellers in the Haste house were taken to Berkeley Police Headquarters. Two chicks were busted for possession of "dangerous drugs" which pro-

ved to be vitamin pills.

Two young men were charged with possession of marijuana. After about 30 hours in jail, one was released--all charges dropped. The other, a minor, was sent to Oakland jail and is believed to have been returned to his parents' home in Virginia.

### "BUGS"

The report in Berkeley's gazette calls the pad a "seedy dwelling." Two bugs found there recently are not the kind that bear germs, but, rather, bear wireless messages to nearby police radios.

BARB expects to have photos of these miniature "electronic marvels" for publication next week. Meanwhile, sleep secure.

The daily's article appeared last Friday. It states, "Because of technical difficulties," according to police reports, they have (sic) not been able to close in on the operation until Wednesday night."

Operation? One technical difficulty might have been the unwitting disconnecting of a bug when one of the tenants repaired a radio-record-player where the electronic gadget was later found.

### UNDERCOVER

According to the daily's story, the house "has been the subject of undercover observation by police and other law agencies for several months as the scene of extensive narcotics traffic."

The building can be easily viewed from the Berkeley Inn across the street, where the fuzz are often observed observing the scene on The Avenue.

Hidden transmitters--undercover observation--other law agencies--extensive narcotics traffic--"operation"--no warrant--midnight raid--arrests--booking--jail. And the result, one fifteen-year-old sent, we presume, back home.

BARB talked with three of the young men present during the Wednesday midnight influx of police. The three did not, to us, look like "hippies", just folk.

They had no complaint about the demeanor of the Berkeley police. During narc raids, even without warrants, they apparently live up to their reputation for politeness.

What happened, according to Michael Cane, Kurt Olszewski, and Ward Wood, was that the police broke into the Haste Street house, near Telegraph, herded the drowsy occupants into the kitchen, and shook down the rooms.

When asked about a warrant, police replied that they didn't need one, because the occupants were breaking the law by trespassing on University property.

Wood showed BARB his rent receipt, dated to October 1, signed by building-owner Williams.

Who was trespassing on whose property?

According to Kurt, at about 7 a.m. the same morning, another group of Berkeley police broke through a few doors, told the residents to get their things together and clear out, and after everyone complied, the officers of the law said, all right, now you can go see page 14

## FLASH!

Two troop trains were observed Thursday morning, October 5, going through Berkeley heading for the Oakland Army Base.

The trains, ten to twelve passenger cars in each, were carrying soldiers, many of them wearing fatigues.

The trains came by at 9:45 a.m. and 10:45 a.m. on the Santa Fe track. The Santa Fe line doesn't usually have passenger cars unless they and/or their occupants are being shuttled.

For troop trains to run through Berkeley an agreement with the city is considered necessary. Could it be that the "City Fathers" have made a quiet deal?

## STUDENTS BEWARE!

UC Students beware.

If you are not careful you may be classified 1-A this fall, even if you carry a full load of classes and maintain a C or higher average.

In past years students received draft information cards to fill out along with other registration materials. They returned these cards with their reg packets.

The school then forwarded the cards to draft boards. A 2-S deferment was usually forthcoming.

This year students were asked to fill out the same cards (numbers 103 and 109) but these cards alone will NOT be sufficient to procure the student deferment. No mention of this fact is made in the reg packet.

Draft boards this year require a written request for the 2-S in addition to the reg packet cards. If you do not write to your board requesting the 2-S they may inform you of your omission or they may classify you 1-A.

# HOW UC FILCHED FUNDS FROM ENTERING FROSH

The Regents' Special Committee on Fees still deliberates the size of the tuition - that - is - not - a - tuition.

Meanwhile, in the week before classes officially began at the University of California, entering freshmen students were already being coerced into "paying their dues."

Three thousand new frosh spent the past weekend in enforced encampment at 17 of the University's 18 Residence Units. They were soaked \$12 a head for their two-day "orientation" stay. Their participation -- so they had been instructed by the University -- was "mandatory."

The advanced sales pumped \$36,000 into the University's residence halls. Money which would not otherwise have been forthcoming was now guaranteed, thanks to the University and Cal Prep.

The money was ostensibly to pay for six dorm-ish meals and for rooms. Half-a-room actually, as each new student had to indulge the dorm ritual of sharing a single constricted cubbyhole with another student paired solely by chance.

The frosh had been convened for what was styled "an academically oriented program designed as the commencement of the entering freshman's college experience." Cal Prep Via the Dean of Students cum Administration somehow determined that orientation would be better served if all entering freshmen were herded into a common bivouac area. The living units came readily to mind. Hence the mammoth Dorm-In of fall 1967.

Virtually all Orientation events occurred on the campus. What Orientation services did the dorms provide? A reply comes in one freshman's wry comment: "All that happened was some Cal Prep people who helped answer questions on how to fill out forms we had to sign -- forms that didn't require explanation."

A new student recounted her interview with a Cal Prep girl who tried vainly to show the newcomer why it was important to attend rallies.

When the new recruit rebuffed such goings-on as so much sorority bunkum, the Prep-girl confided how she was "actually a Liberal, myself" but insisted that she had accepted the job of selling rallies to new students and that therefore she felt this task to be "my moral duty." Sic Semper Vietnams.

The dorms are full. Students moved in Sunday morning at the conclusion of Orientation. It is estimated that 70% of current dorm residents are entering freshmen. ("It's mainly only entering Freshmen who move into the dorms. After a quarter they move out," a switchboard operator commented.)

Thus, only one-half of the students found in the dorm during Orientation were bone fide dormies-to-be -- the other half were the dispossessed, 1,500 students who either had apartments or were still looking were compelled to quarter themselves for two days in the Residence Halls while Orientation proceeded apace. It was, in the U's word, "mandatory."

If this relocation program invites comparison to Major-General Edward Lansdale's concept of "strategic hamlets" (in which peasants are kept in "safe" areas while propagandists work to "win the hearts and the minds of the people") perhaps it is not amiss to recall Lansdale's subsequent observations in the Fall 1964 issue of Foreign Affairs.

Lansdale on that occasion observed how repressive tactics tended to produce more and potential revolutionaries.

As an attempt to "isolate and indoctrinate" the frosh, the Dorm-In was not wholly successful.

Saturday at the Greek Theater, Regent William K. Coblentz cautioned the students that "attempts will be made to sway you . . . You will be confronted by the zealots from both the right and the left." Ironically, local anti-draft advocates had already breeched Regent Coblentz's defenses.

Eschewing black pajamas for dark suits and ties, members of Resistance were on hand to welcome incoming students as they

trooped into the amphitheater.

Dressed to the nines, the Resistance melted into the panoply and managed to pass for ushers. They also managed to pass Resistance Week leaflets to every student who walked by.

The Resistance got an unexpected boost later in the proceedings

when, after the Vice-Chancellor had extolled the bliss to be had at the middle-of-the-road, both ASUC and Cal Prep officers used the microphone to bring up the Vietnam war and to drop plugs for Resistance Week.

## Port Chi Vigilers Bring Judge Down

Port Chicago vigilers forced the Man to go underground after their arrest at the nearby Naval Weapons Station last Friday.

In order to arraign the five anti-war demonstrators arrested for trespassing at Port Chi, the judge had to descend into the basement of the Martinez jail.

The protestors, veterans of non-violent action, brought officialdom below ground by the use of limp non-cooperation.

The five were charged with trespassing and entering a restricted area after they walked onto ammo dump property.

Earlier, they had been ejected from restricted waters by the Coast Guard when they tried to paddle two rubber rafts out to

the Berkeley Victory.

Their expressed intention was to dump the explosives from the Vietnam munitions supply ship, and to substitute food, toys, medicines, and May wine.

When the demonstrators were arrested at the waterfront gate of the Navy station, they went limp. Marines and Federal Agents dragged them to waiting vehicles.

One federale was so eager to get them to jail that he dropped his automatic and, still dragging, shouted, "Get my gun! Get my gun!"

After their subterranean arraignment, the accused were taken from Martinez to the San Francisco County Jail.

They were tentatively scheduled to appear in court on October 10.

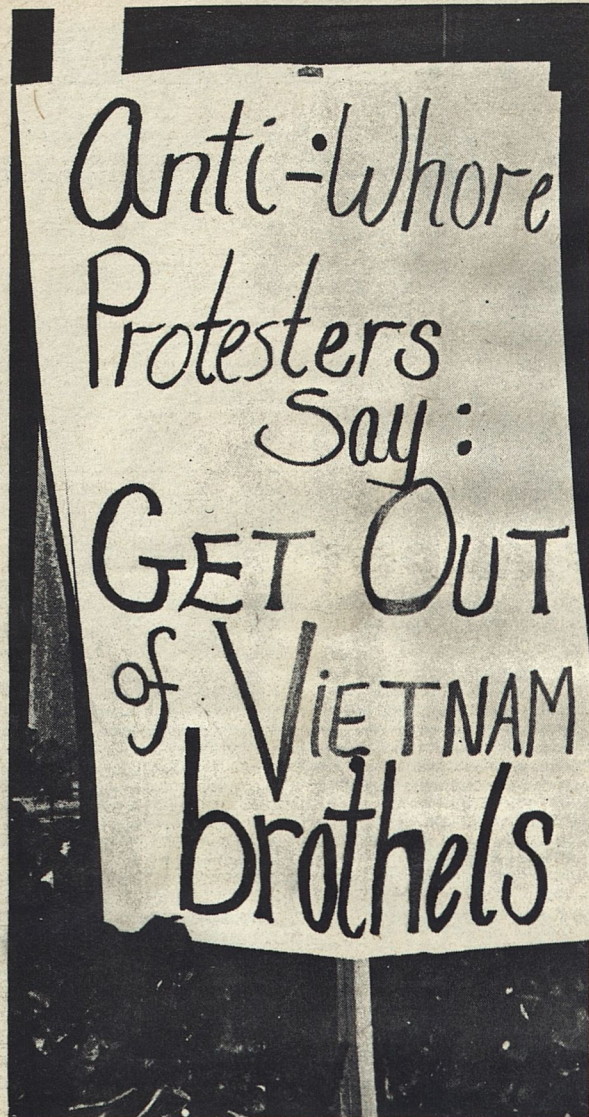

## Girls Protest USO 'BEWARE THE GI'S BARING GIFTS'

"We don't fight the Army, we are fighting CLAP that the fellows are bringing back from Saigon brothels. We don't want the Clap."

These are the words of Joan, one of about 15 girls who were picketing the USO club on Hollywood and Gower last Friday night.

It started about 9 p.m. when two girls showed up in front of the club. At 9:15 a truck arrived with more girls carrying signs saying such things as IT'S NOT HIP TO HAVE CLAP. They set up a portable PA system that was used for a few short speeches, and around in a circle they went with their signs.

Soon Nat Tilem, director of the USO, came out and asked the girls, "Why are you doing this? You shouldn't be doing this here. Now break it up and move on." The girls continued to march.

While all this was going great

outside, hostility was growing inside the club between the servicemen. This time Tilem gave a little speech to everybody in the club, saying that if anyone left he would not be allowed back in the club.

One fellow who came to the club while this was happening laughed when he found out what it was all about and started to go into the club. But Tilem said, "You can't go in there."

LA Provo Mike Agnello extended an open invitation to the servicemen to visit the Magic Mushroom, a club in North Hollywood. The picketers joined Agnello and about 15 servicemen hopped on the back of the flatbed truck and headed for the Mushroom.

According to David Drake, owner of the Mushroom, the servicemen stayed only about 20 minutes because they couldn't buy liquor there and the girls weren't coming on strong to them.

## Expedition To Find the Tribes

The following quotation is BARB's read-aloud selection of the week, taken straight from the fall catalog of Midpeninsula Free University:

60. HIP ANTHROPOLOGY: Weekend Field Trips to Haight-Ashbury

Something is happening there but you don't know what it is, do you Mr. Smith? Some of it is in the streets and in the parks -- in the public eye. But much of what's going on happens behind doors closed to tourists and casual on-lookers. The way to know the hippie scene is to be there -- to see it from the inside, and experience the immediate impact of the forces and ideals which have made this the most intriguing phenomenon of our time. These Free U. weekend expeditions are designed to help you penetrate the public surface and see what it's like and where it's at.

The general format will be:

A group of 16 (8 men and 8 women) will go to S.F. Friday evening. After a discussion seminar with some people who've been on the scene for some time, we'll go to whatever may be happening that night. Later, we'll crash at a Free U. pad -- sleeping bags on the floor. There will be one such expedition each weekend. Sign up and we will contact you about the time and place of departure.

## MORE NUDE-INS FOR SF STATE

Stark naked -- but in his right mind. So psychiatrists at SF General Hospital found Adam Feldman, 21.

He and Patricia Vawter, 18, must appear Oct. 11 in Municipal Court (Dept. 12) to face charges of indecent exposure and disturbing the peace, for their "nude-in" Sept. 28 at SF State College.

Student body president Phil Garlington joined 191 fellow students who asked college prexy John Summerskill to "use your influence to get the charges dropped."

The nudist couple will be defended by attorney Larry Minkoff, of the Haight Ashbury Legal Organization (HALO). Minkoff contends their bodily exposure wasn't lewd or indecent, hence doesn't violate Penal Code Section 311.

They plan to plead guilty of disturbing the peace, but ask Judge Joseph Kennedy to dismiss the indecent exposure beef.

### NUDE WAVE

Their action fits into a wave of unofficial, unconnected nude-ins so far this year in Golden Gate Park, starting with free-beachers dancing nude at the great Be-In. BARB recently pictured a bottomless young man who stripped and preached in the Panhandle several times. Hippy Hill has been almost as congenial to flesh

as to grass, with Jefferson Fuck Poland (his assumed name) and others shedding rags to cop rays.

On the evening of Sept. 30, another young man got busted near the Haight-Stanyan entrance, after he stripped and delivered a satirical speech to a small crowd. Three more persons told BARB they plan nude frisbee games soon. (If you want to join in, phone Kohl at 621-6581.)

All this arises outside the official sexfreedom movement. The Frisco chapter and Sam Sloan's Sexual Rights Forum cheer from the sidelines and help with defense. But the Oakland SFL Incorporated refuses to help, maintaining interest only in their own members, according to a spokesman.

Poland fumes, "Those middle class swingers don't care about spreading sexual freedom. Just their own personal pleasure. I'm ashamed of their selfishness and lack of idealism."

But the nude-ins continue anyway, without the questionable benefit of "leaders".

Informed sources believe an ideal test case -- like a married couple sunbathing nude on a municipal beach -- could legalize total nudity at San Francisco parks and beaches.

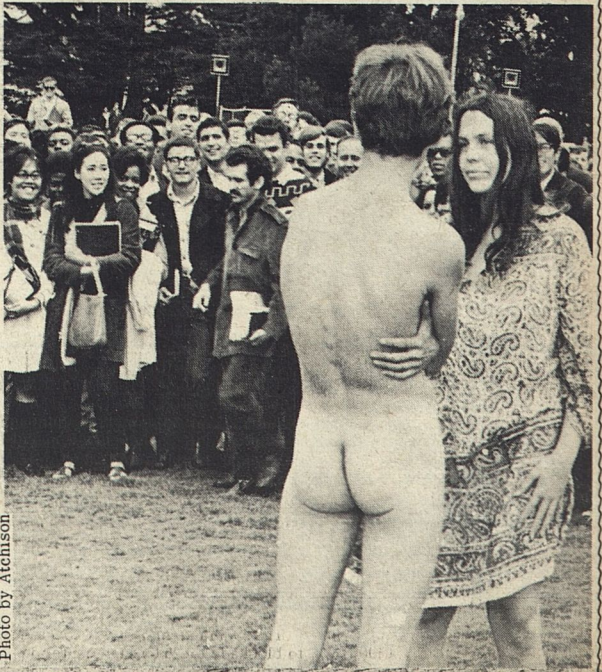

# MCCARRAN ACT SNEAK REVIVAL WARNING

"Sweeping and dangerous reversals of all the Supreme Court rulings to date against the McCarran Act" may "sneak through" Congress this session.

Judy Rudnick, Northern California Director of the Committee to Abolish HUAC told BARB this week that twin bills are now in the Rules Committees of both houses of Congress with the intent of reviving the defunct McCarran Internal Securities Act of 1950.

The bills, H.R. 10390 & 10391, the Willis-Ashbrook Bills to Re-vive the McCarran Act, would call for the Attorney General to register persons as Communists, rather than requiring the person to register himself, as did the McCarran Act.

The Attorney General would then publish their names and would post the list in every post office in the country. Any organization with one Communist member would be designated a "communist front" and all members would be registered as Communists.

Any witness subpoenaed by the SACB who refused to testify would be guilty of "civil contempt" and without a trial would go to jail until he decided to testify.

Senator Everett Dirksen is leading the drive to ram the bills through the Senate. He has indicated in a letter that the bill would be given highest priority on the Senate Calendar. Once through the Senate, the bills would be assured passage, since no HUAC bill has ever been defeated in the House.

The Willis-Ashbrook bills originated in the House Un-American Activities Committee after a series of farcical hearings in which only a handful of fanatical anti-Communists testified," according to Mrs. Rudnick.

Mississippi Senator Eastland's Senate Internal Security Subcommittee swiftly passed them along to the Rules Committee.

In 1950 the McCarran Act, which incidentally set up concentration camps as reported in BARB, was vetoed by President Truman, who said it "put the government into the thought control business." Congress passed it over his veto.

## THANKS FOR ALL

Mark Comfort, Oakland civil rights leader, would like to thank all the people for contributing food and money to the Lowndes County Freedom Organization.

The Oakland Direct Actions Committee, led by Comfort, collected over 40,000 lbs. of food for the starving Blacks living in Tent City, who had been ousted from their Alabama plantation homes for registering to vote.

In August, Comfort and 7 others from Oakland delivered the food in a 24 ton truck donated by an East Bay trucking firm. Until they arrived in Lowndes County, they were hassled by police, arrested by the southern highway patrol, and threatened by KKK.

Comfort told BARB that the response of the Blacks in Alabama was great, and ODAC hopes to keep on collecting money to be sent the first week in December.

A letter from John Hewlett, president of the Lowndes County Freedom Organization, to ODAC stated that the people are grateful for the food, and greatly appreciated the check for \$150.

Comfort particularly thanked the BARB, because "much of the money collected was sent as a response to BARB stories about the project."

Comfort will appear on KPFA on Oct. 12th, at 2:45 p.m. He will discuss conditions in the ghetto. On Sunday, Oct. 8th, he will appear on KPFC from 10:00 to 12:00 p.m., and will discuss current happenings.

# STOP DRAFT PLANS FIRMED

What would happen if all the male demonstrators at the Oakland Induction Center should take off their clothes as a provocation during Stop the Draft Week.

That's what Terry Cannon of The Week's Steering Committee suggested at a monitors' meeting held Monday.

The discussion involved means of getting around police lines expected as part of a police blockade of the Induction Center October 16th.

"Most cops have tremendous male hangups," Cannon said, "Can you imagine the police reaction?"

"Creative provocation" of a humorous and non violent nature will be tried as well as other possibilities for confrontation. Many cannot be made public yet.

Meanwhile the plans for Stop the Draft Week are firming up. The monitor's meeting decided on the following tactical plans.

The demonstrators will meet at DeFremery Park in Oakland at 7 PM on October 16th, where a rally will be held.

Speakers will include Don Duncan, former Green Beret and Ramparts' Military Editor, John Grassi, a former editor of Time and UC professor at Berkeley, and George Ware, who travelled with Stokely Carmichael to Havana.

From the rally the demonstrators will assemble at three churches and the Berkeley campus. Early on the morning of the 17th they will be ferried via car and bus to the Oakland Induction Center at 15th and Clay. (The committee is seeking minibuses and station wagons for this effort. Contact 841-3005.)

The Oakland fuzz are expected to blockade the Induction center on their own to prevent the demonstrators from reaching it. Groups

of about 20 demonstrators will attempt to stop busses carrying draftees to the Center. Those who do not wish to risk arrest will picket separately.

In case of dispersal there will be assembly and regrouping areas. Communications will be co-ordinated by the Manhattan Engineering District.

Monitors are needed. All interested are invited to attend a monitor training session in front of the Oakland Induction Center at 10 AM, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 7th and 8th.

Funds are also needed. There will be a discotheque party on Saturday at 8 PM at 1300 Arch Street, Berkeley.

## UC PROF HIGH WITH SLATE

# 10,000 SET TO SIT TO STOP THE WAR

The anti-war forces' planned convergence on the Pentagon on October 21 is gathering momentum throughout the country. Current estimates place about 100,000 demonstrators in the capital that weekend.

An attempt to close down the Pentagon with a non-violent sit-in of 10,000 bodies is the action receiving the greatest publicity, but

## DARING PRO-POT MOVE

In a move unequalled since prohibition days, more than 40 people have filed individual affidavits attesting to the fact that they smoke marijuana.

Those who have filed are "average citizens", including an engineer at the UC Med Center and a school principal.

The action, being taken this morning in Judge Joseph Karesh's court in San Francisco, is part of a motion for arrest of sentence in the case of Melkon Melkonian, a Marin County auto mechanic convicted recently of abetting the sale of marijuana.

The drive for the affidavits has been spearheaded by Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Hinchcliffe of Marin, good friends of Melkonian. The former is an associate development engineer with the UC Medical Center where he has been practicing for ten years.

Hinchcliffe told BARB Wednesday, "I felt that since I'd been hearing about it (the marijuana situation) for so many years, and always rejected puff-ins and smoke-ins, that this was the perfect opportunity to admit that I smoke pot."

He feels it is the most effective action he can take to restore a sense of reality to the pot situation.

Molly Minudri, Melkonian's attorney, after warning all affidavit signers of possible repercussions, accepted the documents.

In addition to the signed admissions, Miss Minudri also has the written attestation of Dr. Thomas Burbridge, a pharmacologist and MD that cannabis (grass) is a totally harmless substance and, in fact, may be useful in curing various body ailments.

Dr. Joel Fort, deposed head of the SF Center for Special Problems, is expected to submit a similar document.

After denying a motion for a new trial, Judge Karesh granted a hearing for dismissal of sentence. Miss Minudri plans to contend that the laws regarding marijuana are unconstitutional in three respects.

1. "Unequal protection of the laws" in that marijuana is classified as a narcotic when in fact it is not a narcotic at all.

2. The penalties for the use of grass constitute "cruel and unusual punishment" in that severe penalties for the use of true narcotic drugs are imposed upon those convicted of the use of grass.

3. That, as per the testimonies and affidavits, grass has no harmful effect on the body and therefore should carry no penalties.

When queried on the possibility of repercussions, Hinchcliffe responded that he believed that most of it, if any, would come from social circles rather than police action.

"We hope this will be a big step towards legalizing marijuana," he told BARB, "We'd like to get more affidavits."

Hinchcliffe also reminded BARB that the same approach could and should be used in any case regarding grass offenses.

"Let's get it over with," added his wife, "in the best tradition of the American system. Then we can get down to the big things, like ending the war in Vietnam."

Proceedings begin at 9:30 this morning in Judge Karesh's court, Dept. 24, SF Hall of Justice.

the D.C. protest style will cover the whole spectrum of anti-war strategies.

Provos, Diggers, and representatives of the NATIONAL Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy will do their thing.

Throughout the Bay Area doves of various stripes are forming caravans to carry demonstrators to Washington. Stop-the-Draft week, beginning October 16, will serve as one of the chief preludes to the protests at the war capital.

Hundreds of young men across the country have pledged to turn in their draft cards on October 16. Locally, anti-draft groups are planning civil disobedience to shut down the Oakland Induction Center, perhaps for a week.

On October 16 in New York City, members of The Resistance will go into the federal courthouse to return their SS cards. Draft resistance centers are now also operating in Berkeley, Los Angeles, Palo Alto, San Jose, Chicago, Boston, Denver, Portland, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Kansas City, and Madison.

The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, coordinating the Washington, D.C. action, keeps track of anti-war activity from coast to coast.

A sampling of current reports shows increased organizing, especially near college campuses, in Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Delaware, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Michigan, Arizona, Colorado, California, North Carolina, Georgia, West Virginia, Missouri, and Texas.

The national committee, a broad-based coalition, is taking pains to make it clear that participants in the October 21 demonstration in D.C. will not be forced or pressured into civil disobedience.

Two marches, on the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument, are scheduled to begin at 11 A.M. and reach the Pentagon at 3 P.M. The direct action, blocking doorways, will start at 4 P.M., following a rally in the Pentagon south parking lot.

Direct action and a picket line are expected to continue there on October 22. Diverse groups are planning various guerilla-style anti-war actions throughout the capital all weekend.

Information on transportation, housing, march routes and other matters can be obtained from the National Mobilization, 857 Broadway, New York City 10003 (phone 212-875-4606).

Communications from the Mobilization headquarters indicate that they are in perpetual need of money to do their job on the largest possible scale. Contributions can be sent to the same address. jas

The Mission Tenants Union will hold its third annual Shotwell Street Fiesta in San Francisco on Saturday, October 7th. About 1000 people are expected to turn out. The Fiesta will take place from 12 noon to midnight on Shotwell Street between 15th and 16th.

The theme of the fiesta will be the MTU's drive for rent control in San Francisco. The Union represents over 350 Mission District families.

Soul, rock and mariachi bands will perform and there will be games, races and pinatas. In the evening there will be an open air showing of the film "Salt of the Earth," a classic about a New Mexico mine strike filmed by the strikers on the spot.

Mexican-American and Central American food will be offered. Soul food will be sold by the South Park Improvement Association.

Previous fiestas have focused on getting a playground for the neighborhood and a stoplight at 15th and Van Ness. Both efforts were successful.

# JAZZ IN THE NAIVE

Although the celebration was held in Berkeley's Newman Hall, last Wednesday's tribute to St. Francis was fully in the spirit of the city that took his name.

The main attractions (and, I fear, for a good part of the audience, the ONLY attractions) were the music by the Jamar Colt Control Company and the lights by the Great Northwest Phantasmagoria. The Jamar Colt group is a strange (saxophone, TWO basses, drums and girl vocalist - whistle-player) but an intensely exciting one, particularly when the saxophone and the female voice join company.

The lightshow was also excellent, despite a dimness of color. Most of the images revolved around the huge crucifix above the altar, so it seemed almost as though the bleeding Christ were projecting the glory of Resurrection in colored lights through punctured flesh.

The service itself included three views of St. Francis, the most interesting of which described the old-time "hippie" in the language of his modern counterparts ("This cat Francis was out of sight, Amen.").

Revs. Callanan, Sontag (O.F.M.), York (French Church) and Conway (Newman) read parables from the life of St. Francis, whose Sun Oracle had previously been delivered in three languages from different parts of the church.

Three episodes of the saint's life were presented in pantomime, and Greg Mack read Lawrence Ferlinghetti's "They were putting up a statue of St. Francis," and "Christ Climbed Down."

But the most beautiful parts of the service were the communal rituals. The first was the "distribution" of the Kiss of Peace, begun by Rev. York who then urged the members of the audience to hug and kiss each other. Unfortunately, few took up the suggestion.

Later, a prayer to Brother Fire was read. Everyone with matches was urged to light them while Greg Mack burned the text of the prayer. Incense was then distributed and lit while the audience marched out to attend what should have been the most beautiful part of the evening -- the blessing of the animals on the outer terrace.

But the ceremony was marred by the simple fact that the people involved managed to do little more than scare the hell out of the poor little donkey and sheep that had been brought out for blessing. The donkey, thoroughly mauled by cooling admirers, took the whole affair more placidly than did the sheep who was chased by children and adults alike when he tried to escape the ceremony.

(For all child - idolaters, I report the following dialogue: Child

One, "What are they going to do with the sheep?"; Child Two, "Kill him.")

My own suggestion that the animals be TRULY blessed by leaving them to their own animal peace was unfortunately ignored.

The greatest flaw in the evening was the audience, few of whom seemed sensitive to either beauty or spirit. Many apparently found their own conversations far more enlightening than the proceedings in front of them. (Two supposedly hip girls spent the entire blessing ceremony gushing to one of the priests about how groovy everything had been.)

The other sore point involved photographers, who ought to be barred from any event where mood is important. Whenever something looked like it was about to happen, some jerk with a camera would suddenly appear and obliterate the entire scene with his ungodly flash.

St. Francis would no doubt have blessed them anyway, but I can't find the heart to do it myself.

## ANTI-PLAQUE CLAQUE WINS

A delegate from the National Liberation Front gave the plaque to a Mexican student at a conference in Cuba. It was then passed to a Berkeley student, who gave it to Wendell Brunner.

That was part of the involved process of getting the plaque from the NLF in Vietnam to Berkeley. The NLF wanted to give the award to the UC-Berkeley student body.

But the ASUC Senate on Tuesday treated it like an activated bomb. They refused to touch it.

The plaque is a small enamel bas-relief of two martyrs, Nguyen Van Troi, the man who attempted to kill Macnamara, and Mo Ri-son (Morrison), the man who immolated himself on the steps of the Pentagon.

Wendell Brunner, an unsuccessful candidate for ASUC Vice-President last year, tried to end the odyssey of the plaque by giving it to the ASUC senate, the group that most represents the Berkeley students.

The collective senate appeared somewhat embarrassed. Only the most radical inhabitants of the sandbox were advocating acceptance. The others--the liberals--were scared.

Senators had two reservations. The first, and least important in their minds, was the fact that they did not support the NLF. Although they repeatedly stated they were against US involvement in Vietnam, they protested that it would look bad if they seemed to give support to those who were fighting the US.

Brunner tried to dispel this fear by stating that "Berkeley has been the site of numerous anti-war demonstrations and the accepting of this plaque would only imply that the ASUC deplored the war in Vietnam, and supported the people of that nation."

## REBORN RENAISSANCE

The Renaissance Pleasure Faire and Ha 'Penny Market opens tomorrow "in a hidden wood near San Rafael." If it's anything like its Los Angeles predecessors, it should turn out to be an extraordinary affair indeed.

The Pleasure Faire began five years ago as a background for a Commedia dell'Arte performance by the Piccolo Playmakers, a children's improvisational theatre group directed by Phyllis Patterson (who now co-produces the Faire with her husband, Ron). Like Topsy, it just grew until it became a full-blown old English county fair, replete with pageantry and revels.

The Commedia dell'Arts productions are still around, although they're occasionally spikd with anachronistic pieces like Mark Twain's notorious "1601." But now the theatre is revailed by clusters of dozens of booths where area craftsmen hawk their wares, along with street vendors and performers. And, of course, the hostels and taverns are there too.

All possible efforts are made to avoid necessary anachronisms (chemical toilets being an unfortunately necessary one -- but of course, one can't have milady sneaking off into the bushes).

Vendors are urged not to use card-tables or paper cups, and new Spiedel watchbands are equally taboo. Craftsmen may only sell handicrafts that might pass for period pieces.

"We used to ban sunglasses," said Mike Korman, a spokesman for the Faire, "but we found out that they used to wear them in the 16th century too."

Obsessed with authenticity, the Faire's producers have ferreted out all sorts of trivia associated with the everyday life of the period. But they HAVE taken a few liberties with time.

"We try to keep to the early Elizabethan period," said Korman, but since the only real changes during the Renaissance were within the nobility, we take a few liberties and go back a hundred years or so."

Kings may come and go, but peasants never change -- so the Faire is presenting a Medieval marketplace in the heart of Renaissance England.

The Faire has also had some difficulty accommodating modern politics, since a Medieval setting doesn't hold an anti-Vietnam dem-

onstration too well. "So what the peace movement can do," said Korman, "is protest against the Crusades," a proposal which isn't, after all, so far from the truth anyway. In similar fashion, SNCC has presented non-violent jousts.

All those who participate in the Faire are naturally required to appear in costume, and those who attend are urged to do the same. The problems of costuming isn't really that great. A burlap sack and some leg-wrappings make a peasant's suit, while the ladies can easily adapt an old dress.

"Almost anything will pass," said Korman, "so long as it's in solid colors and flowing." For the truly ambitious, all those in costume and on horseback will be admitted free.

Costuming is important in order to avoid a Disneyland atmosphere at the Faire. The producers want everyone to get actively involved in it, rather than simply remain passive viewers of it.

"We want to bring out the need for drama in everyone," says Korman, who also noted that costume sellers at the Faire almost always sell out. "People get there in regular clothes," he said, "but after a while they start to feel out of place."

The Faire ran for four years in Los Angeles with ever-increasing success until last year, when the site was moved into Ventura County in order to provide better parking facilities. All was going well with the Ventura County Board of Supervisors until the conservatives in Thousand Oaks got wind of the affair and began to air outrageous charges (the old faithful drugs, syndrome -- sex and Communism) against it.

After a frantic search for obsolete laws provided nothing better than a fingerprint requirement for "itinerant merchants," Mrs. Walter Brennan, of all people, filed an appeal with Board of Supervisors, claiming that she would be "morally aggrieved" if the Faire were to be held, although the site was a good eighteen miles from her home.

Cleverly enough, the hearing was scheduled for a Tuesday AFTER the Faire was supposed to open, but a quickly obtained restraining order allowed the Faire to open for the first week-end.

Opening day was crowded with cops, but none of them found much to do except groove with the Faire, as they testified at the hearing.

But despite the evidence of the police, the hearsay of Mrs. Brennan prevailed and the Faire was closed. The Board, which wasn't required to give any reasons for its action didn't.

No such problems are anticipated for the Faire's Bay Area premier. The Faire will begin at 11 A.M. for each of four mornings (October 7th, 8th, 14th and 15th), and formally begin with a Call O' the Faire procession at noon. It will close at dusk.

Tickets are available at the gate \$2.50 each for adults, and \$1.00 each for children under 12 (part of the proceeds go to benefit KPFA radio).

To approach the Faire grounds from the north, take Highway 101 to the Marin Civic Center exit and go east to Faire parking; from the south, take 101 to the San Rafael exit, turn right on Second St., and continue on San Pedro Rd. to the Peacock Gap parking area. A shuttle service will take you from either parking area to the Faire.

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# VOTERS TO SEE ANTI-WAR RAP ON SF BALLOTS

 Citizens for a Vote on Vietnam this week released the text of a 1700-word ballot argument for Proposition P - the U.S. troop withdrawal initiative - which the Committee will officially present to San Francisco voters in the

November 7 municipal election. "Haven't We Voted Against This War Once Before?" is the title. "Even among those who generally back (President) Johnson's position," the statement reads, "most do halfheartedly. Yet, this low level of support combined with his election victory three years ago, is seen by Mr. Johnson as sufficient mandate to carry on the bloodiest, most costly, and most dangerous war in history."

## LOVE CENTER READY

Hippies with psychological problems, who need a sympathetic ear, can now go to the new Love Center, located at the All Saints Episcopal Church on Waller St., in the Haight.

"Uptight people will now have a place to go where they can talk to someone who understands their scene," says Lomand, director of this new free community service.

"Our counselors (for want of a better word) are straight heads, very carefully selected, who can help people to understand themselves."

The counselors are Haight Ashbury residents, both males and females, in their twenties, with a background in the free scene. At present there are seven, chosen by a board which consists of other counselors, Dr. Schleisinger, psychoanalyst from the free medical clinic, and the advisory staff to the medical clinic.

They are not professionals, and they do not offer psychiatric help. They are responsible, hip people who are willing to listen to other people talk, and who may occasionally offer advice.

To avoid any sort of legal hassle regarding psychiatric work, the Love Center is working in cooperation with the Haight Ashbury Legal Organization.

The Love Center opened on September 25 and will remain open seven days a week, from 7-11 pm, with a minimum of two counselors available at all times.

Visitors usually come singly, but occasionally couples may come. However, the facilities are designed for a one-to-one exchange.

Voters "once before" voted against expanding the war in Vietnam. They elected Johnson, the statement points out, noting he "promised he would not involve us further". Since then a feeling of "uneasiness" and "helplessness" has resulted, it avers.

This feeling is attributed to the following factors:

"(1) A half million young Americans have been sent to Vietnam. 15,000 of them have bled out their lives there, and more than 85,000 have been wounded.

"(2) Many more Vietnamese have died, most of them innocent civilians. And Vietnam - already dreadfully poor after 25 years of war - has been ravaged.

"(3) Last year, the Administration allocated 30 billion dollars to the war. Meanwhile urgent programs which could correct the terrifying situation in our cities died for lack of funds."

Included in the ballot argument is a chart prepared by the Citizens Committee indicating the heavy costs the average taxpayer would have to bear if Administration plans to collect a proposed 10% tax above one's income should pass.

The statement concludes: "Until now, all attempts at informing the Administration of the overwhelming doubts and outright opposition to this war have gone unheeded; letters receive stock answers, mass protests are explained away. The result is a level of general despair and feeling of loss of control of our 'representatives' that is unsurpassed in American history.

"The vote of a major urban population - in effect divorcing itself from the behavior of Washington - cannot be similarly ignored."



# Up with People!

Moral Re-armament's "Up With People!" show came to Berkeley last week, and through one-hundred and fifty apple-pie smiles, you could hear America singing.

They sang of Paul Revere and of Joan of Arc; of God and the Green Berets (those "protectors of free men everywhere"). They spoke only in rhyme, moved and sang in perfect unison, never stopped smiling, and all looked absolutely alike (except that the four Negroes were not hard to spot).

But these are nice kids, not unlikeable, nor unfriendly. They are not bigots, nor warmongers, nor consciously fascist. They even tolerate hippies.

"I just hope they improve their

health, I hear they're all sick from something," one said.

No, you don't really dislike the boys and girls of "Up With People!". Like that Beatles' grandfather in Hard Day's Night, all you can say about them is that they are very, very clean.

America has succeeded with these hundred-fifty boys and girls. She has scrubbed and polished them so clean in mind and body that there is not a speck of sex or soul anywhere to be seen. It's called socialization.

"Sure, we like popular music, Andy Williams and all that stuff," one told me. "You know, we're not changed into robots all of a sudden, boom, no feelings, as soon

as we step on stage."

All of a sudden? No, it probably takes a while. But with songs like these, you begin to doubt: Up, up with people, You meet them wherever you go. Up, up with people, They're the best kind of folks we know!

This might be called childish rhetoric, except that not even children talk in such senseless abstraction. To use rhetoric like this, and not choke, you have to be taught NOT to think.

That's called brainwashing; and so the clean-minded boys and girls of Moral Re-armament sing, still smiling:

We'll win freedom for the whole world! Yes, we'll show aggressors round the world That Uncle Sam ain't bluffin'! There's no doubt that they believe it, or at least accept it unquestioningly. The boys go dutifully into the service when called, become model soldiers.

And Uncle Sam takes care of its pride and joy, makes them officers, keeps them out of Vietnam. (Of the forty Up With People! boys now in the military, none has seen combat.) Prize sheep are always kept alive for the show.

I went backstage and asked several members of the group if they did not get tired of smiling so much. I did not get bounced, or threatened, or laughed at, or with. I gave up asking when I had received about a dozen serious, nearly identical answers.

"No, you never get tired of smiling when you think of the people out there in the audience. If you fill your life with people, you'll never stop smiling."

It was too much for me. I went home and caught a good Shirley Temple flick on TV.

## Still Looking For a Home

Viet Expo '67 is still homeless, but no one seems very worried about it. In fact, more people seem to be getting turned on to the idea every week.

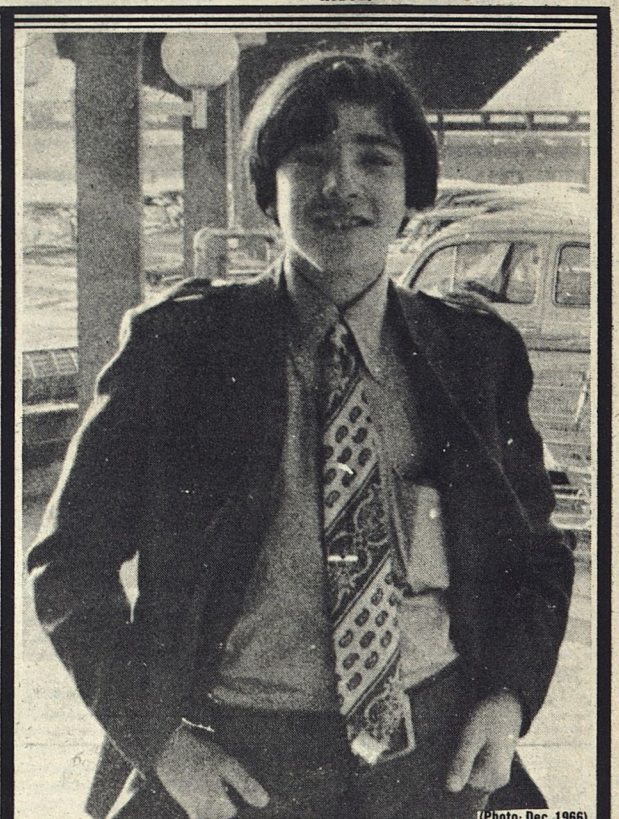

# ANGER'S ANGUISH

And now friends, the second in this series of taped interviews with area filmmakers. Today, a talk with Ken Anger, best known for his film SCORPIO RISING. He's been living in San Francisco for a year, and he will be leaving for Europe in a month.

L: I started the tape when we were in the midst of discussing Buster Crabbe's immortal characterization of Flash Gordon.

KEN: . . . where he was allowed to use his athletic ability, because he was an Olympic star, he was a swimming star, just marvelous. And he was completely wasted, and out of his element in dialogue scene, you know?

LEN: But what actor could speak those words?

KEN: I know. They're great camp . . .

LEN: (Looking at a photograph) This photograph is from FLASH GORDON CONQUERS THE UNIVERSE, the one with the feather's in their caps.

KEN: Kind of Robin Hood. It's supposed to take place in the Forest Kingdom.

LEN: I'm not sure. I think Prince Baron, maybe, dressed them, and here, look, Dale's hair changed from blond to black. And here is Ming without his skullcap. This must be a very rare photograph. I didn't know he was seen in public without his skullcap. You probably know they strung the serials together to make features out of them.

KEN: Oh yes, they're terrible, however, I love them because of their surrealistic jumps in costume. Since they're cut from chapter to chapter, they attempted to make some kind of crude continuity, but first of all, somebody would enter the room with a cape on, and enter another room in a silver space suit.

LEN: That's the way I'd like to make my entrance. Unfortunately today I appeared in my rags, although I should have entered with a silver space suit.

KEN: Just help yourself to orange juice . . .

(after a pause, going into the next room to look at Better Little Books of Flash, and Buck Rogers, we return to the room, probably the conference room of what was formerly the Russian Embassy in San Francisco. The room has very high ceilings, and ornate carved woodwork. It is a deep purple, and the floor is strewn with cushions.)

LEN: This is good juice, I don't know what it is, apricot?

KEN: No, orange. Orange blend. L: Blended with plastic.

K: This is California, but it's still hard to get fresh orange juice.

L: It would be horrible to discuss what happened, wouldn't it? I mean it was very bad to hear about it. K: Is that running now?

L: Yes, it's on. K: I didn't realize, you're not going to run out of tape, are you? L: I don't think so. K: Is it close enough to pick me up?

L: You're gonna do real good. Well, why don't you just describe what has happened.

K: I can just rap about it. It was an event, which was called The Equinox of the Gods, for the beginning of the autumn equinox, and I was using takes from LUCIFER RISING which were original film, which I was risking to project once.

L: You didn't have a workprint? K: No, no I can't afford that. I was using the original color once as part of a light show.

L: This event was an attempt to raise money for Lucifer, right? K: Yeah. The orchestra that was playing was the one that has been working on the Magic House of Oz, that's what that part of Lucifer is called. They were playing

bility. Purely by physical appearance. The way Eisenstein cast. Eisenstein and Pudovkin went down the streets and said I want that one, that one, that one, that one, that one, for my film. That's the way Potemkin was cast. Only in those idealistic early days of the revolution people showed up. It was merely that I was feeding people. I wasn't paying them on a salary. There were no contracts. I would have to work very fast with one person so they wouldn't disappear. When I got them here I tried to shoot as much as I could. And I did everything I could with them that day or that weekend.

L: Would you like to try to discuss Lucifer?

K: Well, Lucifer is my first, what I call, in all seriousness, not at all in a campy sense, I'd call it my first religious film. It's about the angel-demon of light and beauty named Lucifer, it's from the bringer of light. And it's about the solar diety. And the Christian ethos has turned Lucifer into Satan, made him a demon. But I show it in its gnostic and pagan sense, which is the angel of light and beauty. And so I show the way the force comes out in our society, in a twisted form and I show it's pure form. It's a tremendous concept to get across. It's my most difficult film, because to get across these ideas and images and to have them communicate, not merely have them be some private trip, require straining at every possible resource of technique on such a tiny budget. I spent \$8,000 so far. But believe me that was like ringing blood out of a rock. Because to get that money, and to get the effects I had to do with that small amount of money. And I've been fortunate in that some of the various people in town who have light shows and liquid projectors and overhead projectors and those various machines have loaned me their equipment and I have been able to do things with them.

L: Do you work with a crew? Do you do everything yourself?

K: No, I work all by myself. I always have.

L: It's the only way unless you've got a lot of money.

K: It's the only way, but it's slow, and pretty exhausting. I would like to do more dolly shots. But that means that someone has to push the camera, someone has to change the focus, I don't like zooms because it's too mechanical. But I like the camera to be actually moving around.

L: It's plastic. What about handheld shooting?

K: And I don't, not for this film, hand held is not the style, it's too distracting.

L: It's not smooth enough. It calls too much attention to itself.

K: I have some handheld.

L: Unless you can do some kind of amazingly beautiful handheld. K: Some can, but walking can't. You get that jogy effect. A year was being spent on the film. I began it at the spring equinox and I hoped to have it finished and shown at the spring equinox, in other words March 20th, next year.

L: Would it be possible to create some film from that portion that now remains?

K: This was my first feature film. It was to be 80 minutes long. Scorpio was only 31 minutes long and this was to be three times as long. It wouldn't be possible.

# NON-EUCLID

I have rapped away against the California Democratic Council often enough but until last Saturday I had never actually seen them in action. It was positively unnerving to watch the assembled delegates behave so exactly according to my expectations.

The substantive decisions were not so important or interesting, for me, as the manner in which they were made. During the long hours of dispirited debate I only heard one person speak in favor of a policy on the grounds that it was right; almost to a man, they assumed as an axiom of politics that the best program is the one that appeals to the greatest number of people today.

That axiom is, of course, nothing but common sense, like the axioms of Euclid and Newton, admirably suited to the political world we once knew and hopelessly inadequate in an expanding universe where, in the daily course of events, matter is transformed and energy is created.

John Kenneth Galbraith, the keynote speaker, set the tone admirably in his remarks on Vietnam. He was increasingly impressed, he said, by "the logic of those who say we should be compelled to withdraw." This triggered a burst of applause positively enthusiastic by the standards of the day, although probably less than half the audience joined in.

"Control your enthusiasm," Galbraith said, and went on to explain that "the American people are used to taking things by steps." He outlined some of the steps he would lead the American people along, steps leading ultimately to negotiations with the enemy.

Negotiations about what, for what, in defense of what legitimate interests?

Galbraith didn't consider it important to specify—but he did say that "if we cannot have negotiations, then let us defend ourselves!" in areas we have already secured." It may not be a perfect policy, he said, but it is "the course of action that will win the approval of the greatest number of the American people."

He ended his speech with this guide to personal conduct: "Great liberality of mind is something which is not to be confused with great vehemence of manner."

Later in the day, the delegates endorsed Galbraith's remarks by adopting the following language in the pledge which the "peace delegates" to the Democratic National Convention would take: "... we pledge ourselves... to the uncompromising support of a Party platform and a Party candidate committed without reservation (1) to an immediate cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam, (2) to negotiations—including all participants—for settlement of the war, so that American armed forces may be withdrawn, and (3) to international guarantees of non-intervention in Vietnam."

(The words "uncompromising" and "without reservation" are not to be taken at face value, since the delegates rejected a resolution pledging the delegates not to support Lyndon Johnson.)

You can rant on, if you wish, about the CDC's amorality or lack of principle—CDC members will positively lap it up. They are people who, ten years ago, made a decision to forego the "moral luxury" of saying publicly what they privately believe in favor of what they call "effectiveness." If you wish, they are opposed on principle to principles.

When it seems to be working well—when they are "effective", as they define it—then their principled amorality gives them cause to be oily and smug. But when it turns out badly—when they wind up irrelevant, either despite or because of their sacrifice of honesty—then they turn sour and hateful against all radicals and young whippersnappers. It looks to me as if the CDC peace slate will turn out that way.

If the tenor of the convention is any clue, the CDC peace slate will campaign in the Democratic primary on the following lines: Lyndon Johnson's policies have split the Democratic Party instead of uniting it. To re-nominate Johnson would further weaken the Party. Johnson hasn't really been trying to negotiate with the enemy. His continued escalations bring the danger of war with China. The war has forced a drastic cutback of government welfare programs. The Democratic Party is bound to lose in 1968 unless it comes out for peace. Dump Johnson.

(Disgruntled Young Dems in CDC talk confidently of getting sufficient places on the peace slate steering committee to sabotage the negotiations line and sneak in withdrawal. I wish them luck.)

The CDC is in a hell of a bind. If the regular Johnson Democrats win the primary, the whole organization is likely to go down the tubes right there. The CDC will have to decide whether to support Johnson for reelection or break with the Democratic Party. If they support Johnson then a big minority will walk out and at least half will drop out. If they break

with the Democratic Party then they lose their whole raison d'être, which is to hover near the levers of power. In either case, the organization can't survive except on paper.

But the peace slate could easily

win in the primary and send an anti-Johnson delegation to the Democratic National Convention. That will mean a few weeks of de-

one of the things that got us into this whole mess--will survive perfectly intact after the primaries (unless the Peace and Freedom Party manages to get on the ballot).

In case there are any CDCers listening who suspect they may have gone basically wrong somewhere along the line, let me state a few propositions of non-Euclidian politics just to give them a feel for it:

History is made by changing people's ideas, not by tabulating the ideas they now hold.

It is more important to change people's deeply-rooted categories of thought than it is to change their lightly-held loyalties to one or another set of alternate opinions which the mass media offer; and sometimes you cannot do both at once, but must choose one or the other.

You change people's ideas not by preaching at them, but by creating situations in which they are forced, despite themselves, to see the different consequences of different ideas.

For a revolutionary, honesty is not a "moral luxury" or a private virtue; it is, in the final analysis, his only political weapon.

# Long and Short of Discology

The lp record, with its capacity for 45 minutes of relatively uninterrupted sound, seems to have baffled its producers most of the 20 years of its existence.

"Oh boy," they said, giving forth Hollywood confidence, "at a swell way to document sounds. Why we can put an entire concert on one of these records, and it'll be just like being there."

But it wasn't, something very subtle was missing, so they invented hi-fidelity, and then stereo and filled the elite magazines with advertisements offering "the most exact reproduction of the actual sound made by the performer that modern science is capable of making, faithfully brought to your ears by our neat records."

Of course they ran up against the same problem that the positivist literary critics obtusely battered their minds against. The exact sounds of the instruments are not what one hears at a concert, they are not the essence of a live performance whether in a hall shrouded for opera or flickering for a dance, and most certainly not sitting in the sun in Provo Park. The essence of a concert is being with a group of people on a special occasion, joining with them for some form of high culture, and the poorly heard performance is given its meaning by the murmured comments of your friend, the applause of the other people, the mood of the time.

A record is changeless, and as should be the case while communing with the eternal, listening to one is a solitary event. Playing one may be the background for a social event, like smoking with friends, or having a party or painting the floor, but these things are not the same as going to a concert, and the music is not the same either. To hear the exact sound of an instrument is a previously unknown experience.

Considering these things, what are the alternatives to a concert? Each represents a radical departure from the previous works by these people; each in its own way is more intense and meaningful than the earlier works, and all are felt to contain more or less explicit drug references of the sort which make heads smile knowingly and feel a great kinship with the world, as represented by these cultural leaders.

The radio has undergone a major change in the last decade with the emergence of Top 40 platter shows. The change came about because someone realized that no one listened to the radio continuously so the programming should be a series of high points designed to stand out of that intense barrage of stimuli we call modern life. It stands out by being more intense, more varied, and hence more interesting.

The next step is portable radios taken around because they are so much more interesting than life could ever be. No doubt we will see this happening someday.

If the record is competing with the radio rather than the live performance as seems to be the case since airplay for a group is the best way of insuring a good turnout for their performances, then it is natural for its relation to the radio to be the same as the radio's relation to modern life. It must be more stimulating, more varied, and hence more interesting.

If this is the case then what records would be best sellers? Why soundtracks, of course, because they rapidly shift in mood and texture as the action they illustrate changes. And sure enough soundtrack albums are consistent best sellers. "Dr. Zhivago" has been in the top 15 for a year and a half. "The Sound of Music" is well into its third year high on the charts.

Several electric groups have achieved success recently by producing what may turn out to be the first modern lp's. You'll never guess who they are, even if I tell you that each lp's mood reflects a major aspect of Western culture, that each has caused a sensation, and each has been unexpected. Two are widely banned, two widely acclaimed. Give up? It's in alphabetical order:

- The Beach Boys-Smile (Brother 9001)
- The Beatles - Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band
- The Fugs-The Fugs (ESP)
- The Mothers-Absolutely Free (Verve/Forecast)

It will be noted that these groups form two sets of mirror images. It may also be noted that it is widely accepted that these albums owe their existence to LSD, for what basically appears to be three rea-

you send out returns to you-Indian Wisdom. It's too much to be a shuck.

As you might expect the music's lyrics have no burden at all. The record is a collection of gently funny pieces, filled with a particularly American kind of nostalgia just as the Beatles lp is filled with British nostalgia. It reminds me of 1920's pop hillbilly music, it feels the same, and you continually expect a song with pleasant surprises of the kind that make you smile, and look at your friend to see it he is smiling too. You could sit on the porch, pulling gently on your pipe, relaxing and thinking over the day, and like this record a lot.

The old new lefties used to suddenly ask someone what their opinion of the Sino-Soviet split was, as a quickies psychological test, Marvin tells me. If you liked Russia, or Stalin, you were authoritarian, and probably not a gentle new lefter, whereas if you liked China, and Mao well you were, ok.

In today's society a better test would be based on comic books. The fiercely hip Fish sang about Spiderman and Doctor Strange, the Beach Boys have subtitled one song the "W. Woodpecker Symphony." They just ain't got no angst.

The songs that really make the lp, for me, are first and foremost, Good Vibrations which is the song that started me on this radio idea anyway. It just keeps changing all the time, moving from something real quiet to something which seems to rock under that therimin. Even on the radio it caught my attention because it alone changed as fast as the patter between the records.

Then there is Gettin' Hungry, a serious sexual song, and if that is the case, it's a nice guy trying to come on like Jimi Hendrick's and failing, but failing in such a way that you still like him. It opens with a fast instrumental on a small organ, then a real quiet section with occasional notes against a single voice, then the chorus with its unbelievable line about "gettin hungry, hungry for my kind of woman" but you just can't take it seriously, even when the gospel singing comes in, and its really loveable.

And She's Goin' Bald which is about a chick whose hair falls out in the first verse, then comes a sha bo sha bo chorus which is replayed faster and faster, leading into a melodramatic narrator then a blues line "too late mama, nothing up side your head, no more, no more, no more." Delightful.

There is also a sort of commercial for the American Vegetable Association ending with an exhortation to write in and tell them your favorite vegetable, a song about having a lid, a lid, a little pad in Hawaii which people whisper is their drug reference, and some other things which I liked a lot.

Perhaps the sensitive reader has noticed a sort of veiled double meaning in this review, a kind of underlying hostility, especially in my adjectives. Well the sensitive reader is right, but that doesn't mean that I don't like the record. I think it's one of the best I've heard, I've listened to it 6 times now each time with more delight.

The hostility is there because I'm really suspicious of delight. I'm the sort of guy who likes Fidel because he makes the trains run on time. I believe that most of the people who read this paper are the same way, and that they'll find the Beach Boys record is groovy, but not quite satisfying.

# WEEKLY TOO MUCH FOR STATE?

"Open Process," since last April San Francisco State College's weekly student publication, is still breathing.

Its life depends on a recently formed Board of Publications that will appoint an editor, establish a budget appropriation, and contract for a printer.

"We're trying like Hell to get ourselves organized, but there might be a big hassle with the printer's contract, and the whole thing is still in the air," Blair Partridge, an "Open Process" staff member told BARB.

The paper was initially sponsored by the Associated Students at S.F. State as a response to requests from faculty members, students, and administrators who could or would not be published in the Daily Gator, State's establishment paper.

After seven issues a petition was circulated and signed by a member of physical education teachers objecting to, among other articles, stories by Jefferson Poland, the Sexual Freedom League guru. The articles were titled, "Bisexuality," "Nude Swim-In," and "Masturbators Arise."

Objection was also made to a photograph of a nude woman, showing pubic hair.

"President John Summerskill (S.F. State President) got letters from many state legislators and from Chancellor Dumke about it," Partridge said.

"If Summerskill definitely cancels the paper, he'll create a lot of resentment, and if he clears it, Dumke and Max Rafferty will object."

"We haven't broken any regulations, and we have many faculty members backing us. We hope we can get started again pretty soon."

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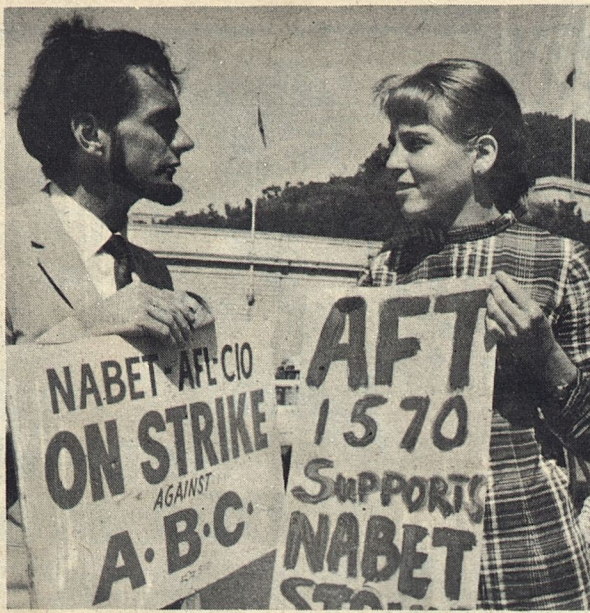

# BROADCAST UNION FINGERS CAL GAME

Union pickets threw a wrench in university operations last week during preparations for the Cal-Michigan game Saturday.

Pickets from the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians (NABET) today (10-6) enter their third week of a nationwide strike against the American Broadcasting Company.

ABC owns and operates KGO-TV and Radio in San Francisco. Five other such stations, plus network operations in New York, Chicago, Washington, and Los Angeles are being struck. The action is supported by the national AFL-CIO and supported by all trade unions.

The strike was called to back up demands for higher pay and better working conditions. For example, mail-room employees receive only \$87 gross pay weekly, while the news director (management) receives \$750 a week. The NABET union employees have been working since April without a contract.

NABET put a picket line at the Cal Stadium entrance five days last week because ABC-TV made a nationwide color telecast of the football game with Michigan.

Scabs and management personnel set up the electronic gear during the week . . . but not without troubles. Trucks (driven by teamsters) with equipment refused to cross the picket line. Telephone crews (who install microwave for telecasting) refused to cross. Hundreds of taxi cabs stopped at the NABET line.

Dozens of East Bay unions helped the pickets. U-C office workers, non-academic employees, painters, electricians, and teachers, all put members on the line.

The NABET picket Captain, Leo Laurence, an Editor for ABC News, told the BARB that the campus police were really worried. Somehow, rumors got to the fuzz that the strikers may strike at the equipment. The fuzz then doubled their protection guards.

University officials were worried all week that the pickets might stop the broadcast. Actually, NABET officials didn't want to embarrass the University or stop the game . . . only stop the ABC-TV telecast.

Any money received from the broadcast was "tainted money,"

according to Richard Fernandez, President of the NABET San Francisco's local. He said the "university was ineffect strike-breaking and immorally taking sides in a labor dispute by not cancelling the broadcast."

Somehow, Cal beat Michigan. -L.L.

# ANTI-WAR BITCH-IN AT SF STATE

"The election for mayor in San Francisco is a secondary issue," says Bob Davis, YSA candidate for mayor in San Francisco. "The important issue is Proposition P."

Proposition P, the Vietnam War proposition will be on the November 7 ballot.

The YSA will hold a "Bitch-In" at San Francisco State College in order to explain the importance of getting a majority vote on Proposition P.

The Bitch-In will be at 12 noon on the speakers platform on Monday, October 9, and both Bob Davis and Clyde Cummings, candidate for supervisor, will speak. Pro and con discussions of the war and the proposition will be invited from the audience.

"This is not a little municipal election," says Davis. "This has world wide significance. This is the first time in United States history that a major city has the right to vote on a war while the war is in progress."

"The entire world will be looking at San Francisco. This could demolish the myth of the Johnson consensus."

QUESTION: For cosmetic reasons and its sex appeal, I have been interested for some time in removing my pubic hair. ANSWER: Most Middle Eastern women routinely shave their pubic hair but I leave to you and your chafed friends the question of whether this practice will enhance your sex appeal. It does not seem medically dangerous.

Cautious use of a depilatory or one of the newer electric razors would seem the best solution to your problem. I would advise against permanent removal since you might someday move to a colder climate.

\*\*\*\*\*

Here are more letters concerning the great circumcision flap: "Since your questioner also wanted reasons against routine circumcision, please include this mother's:

1. The foreskin protects a baby's sensitive glans from diaper rash, etc.
2. Circumcised babies sometimes get sores on the urinary opening and try to hold back urine.
3. The inside of the foreskin is erotically sensitive and enables a hip woman to give her man added pleasure is foreplay or fellatio."

(NOTE: California Penal Code Sec. 2886 and 288 "Infamous Act Against Nature" provides penalties of 1 to 15 years imprisonment for criminal acts such as fellatio and cunnilingus.)

A Fresno woman writes: "I wish you had come out more strongly against the cruel practice of circumcision, or at least that you had mentioned the tragic

loss of sensitivity in the glans penis brought on by continual chafing against underclothes and legs. I maintain that circumcision can also contribute to difficulty in sexual arousal as well as a diminished satisfaction in the sex act.

Or simply to quote a melancholy Jewish friend, "The only way to lose a foreskin is to wear it off."

A possible solution is suggested by this letter from San Francisco: "In 'The Source' Michener refers to cosmetic surgery where one can regain a foreskin. Is this operation still done and if so, where? Mutilated"

COMMENT: Another argument for circumcision, besides preventing cancer in women, is that there is only one recorded case in history of cancer of the penis in a Jew. And it happened that he was uncircumcised.

As for the question of decreased sensitivity of the glans, Masters and Johnson studied this question in their researches into the physiology of sex. Extensive neurological testing of such sensations as touch and pain sensitivity failed to reveal any differences in those with or without foreskins.

One also wonders whether the alleged loss of sensitivity (some believe there is increased sensitivity) might not enable the circumcised to sustain the sexual act longer than their sheathed brethren.

If this were true, the circumcised could once more stand proudly erect, bared heads held high....

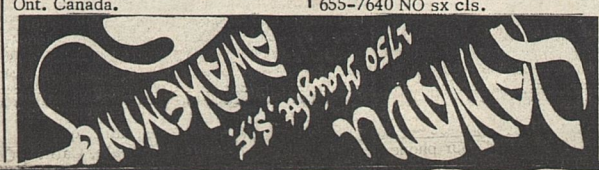

# Roving Rat Fink



The ugly summer is over, and I don't think any of us would care to relive it. Not even though it would mean adding that much time to the rest of your life.

The worst didn't happen. There was no declaration of war, and China wasn't brought into it, despite all the rumors. And the concentration camps failed to materialize.

I don't know how much substance there was to that apprehension. Perhaps it was all a right-wing plant, or left-wing paranoia. But this I do know: it would never have gone over and been so widely believed under previous administrations. You couldn't possibly picture Truman or Eisenhower or Kennedy ordering a wholesale roundup of all his opponents so he could continue an iniquitous war without harassment. But for you-know-who, it seemed quite in character.

And right now, things do look better. There are new rashes of peace talk. My comments a couple of weeks ago on the Viet election need revising, and for once it's a pleasure to say that maybe I was wrong. With peace feelers being sent out to the North, and with Thieu laying it on the line to Ky that "I'm the boss now," I begin to believe that the election may have made a difference. And there are differences here

 Hams looked unconvinced. The strongest reason for rejecting the plaque was fear of what the conservatives might say, Dick Beahrs, ASUC president, argues, "The right wing would like nothing better than for us to accept this plaque. I think Wendell is a great guy and all, and I hope he'll keep the plaque, you know?"

at home too. The recent polls show that LBJ can no longer keep up his pretense that the people are behind him, "all but a small majority." A lot of his former Congressional supporters, even that sharp-beaked hawk Stuart Symington, are swinging over to the other side.

Perhaps most encouraging is the fact that the old two-party system seems to be creaking back into action. Influential Republicans are calling on their party to run a candidate on a frank peace platform. And when this even extends to Senator Margaret Chase Smith, a lady never before prominent for peace-mindedness, one's heart leaps up.

. . . The preceding was written about two weeks ago, and since then the scene seems to have brightened even more. There was that poll showing a majority of Californians in opposition to the Vietnam war. And the court decision placing the Viet resolution on the San Francisco ballot. And even LBJ taking somewhat of a softer tone.

This is not to say that the end of the war is in sight. It's hard to know what, and for how long, the Administration may do to extricate itself from the mess it worked itself into. But the Administration now seems less likely just to let it go on and on, and lead to what it may.

Of course, what is needed is more than only an end to the war. It is a revamping of foreign policy which will rule out any future Vietnams. And just at this moment, the wind seems to be blowing from the right direction. At least, it's once more possible to hope.

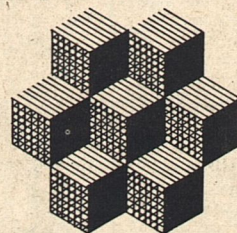

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# 'Oo's For Mayor?

San Francisco's normally dull  
municipal elections may be liven-  
ed by the mayoralty campaigns  
of two non-party candidates. Lloyd  
Downton and Wilhelm Joerres have  
filed for the race with what might  
best be described as unusual plat-  
forms.

Mr. Downton's program, reminis-  
cent of the "open city" days,  
would turn the Polo Field into a  
race track, establish a city-oper-  
ated casino on Alcatraz, license  
draw poker and permit any bar,  
restaurant or dance hall to ob-  
tain a dance license.

Downton also calls for free bath-  
ing and housing facilities for hip-  
pies and miniskirts for meter  
maids.

Wilhelm Joerres, who refers to  
himself as the Official Number  
One Candidate (he was first to  
file), and as "a beautiful young  
man" is running as a logical pos-  
itivist. At least he does not deny

the rumor to that effect.

Joerres holds that he is the  
intellectual candidate, as well as  
being strong and healthy and the  
cleanest candidate.

He comes out strongly against  
routine infant circumcision, Ci-  
vil Defense, official persecution  
of homosexuals, venereal disease,  
alcohol and birth control pills  
("let's put adventure back into  
sex").

He stands for quality control  
of marijuana, trans-racial sexual  
integration, for a public demon-  
stration of napalm, and for the use  
of coffee or LSD in place of al-  
cohol.

Joerres, who wears his blond  
hair shoulder-length, promises to  
spend his first week in office in  
the nude. He will not conceal any  
erections during that period, and  
he hopes the public will emulate  
him.

One of the strongest planks in  
Joerres' platform calls for the  
declaration of a state of emer-  
gency to last as long as he stays  
in office. He considers the city  
to be a "psychic disaster area."

Joerres' hobby is underwater  
demolitions. He was the Southern  
Bavarian Table Tennis Champion  
in 1958. Being unemployed, he is  
the poverty candidate, he will hold  
a fund-raising dinner at 95 cents  
a plate.

"I feel that this is a colorful  
and beautiful city," says Joerres,  
"and in line with this I am waging  
a colorful and beautiful campaign."

May the most beautiful man  
win. L.F.
