

This is the comment of Danny Rifkin, manager of the Grateful Dead, about the Monday afternoon raid on the Dead's pad at 710 Ashbury where eleven people were arrested by rampaging state narks.

The busted included Pig Pen, the Dead's organ grinder, and Bob Weir, rhythm guitarist. Both were charged with possession of marijuana.

Neither of them turns on.

Pig is a devoted wine freak,
and Weir, who has long been a
student of eastern meditation, has
been applying the methods of the

Maharishi Yogi for the past two weeks. The meditation methods forbid the use of drugs.

Three more raids were made in the city the same day, including one on the Blue Cheer's house at 369 Haight Street. Ten people were arrested there, though none of the members of the band were in the house at the time.

Miles was the only one to escape.
In all, 36 people found themselves behind Hall of Justice bars
Monday.

Feeling runs high that the Dead bust was in retaliation for their playing at the Straight Theater School of Dance last weekend. Blue

School of Dance last weekend, Blue Cheer is also scheduled for an appearance there.

However, the parties involved tend to discount this rumor. They feel rather that there is a mass push to bust, regardless. One theory is that by busting the rock bands, state and city police hope to create an unfavorable image of the people they claim local teenagers emulate.

In any case, more than a few

In any case, more than a few houses, particularly those belong-ing to bands, have undergone hasty clean-ups since the Monday raids.

The certainty of a hippie image

(psychedelic) does not lead to other certainties; rather, it leads only to probabilities.

This statement confounds hippies. Philosophy is not a strong point with them because they are not thought-oriented; they are not thought-oriented; they are sensory-oriented, and how in the hell do you feel a thought? How do you smoke a concept?

How do you see an idea? What color do you paint infi-

delity? What is the sound of ego?

A hippie was explaining to me that the great void is where it's at (Tibetan Book of the Dead). "Who created the void?" I asked. "Uh - nobody. It's just there. It exists."

It exists."

Apparently, this hippie was not aware of the fact that for thousand upon thousands of years, since man first began to think, the question was always put: "If the question was always put: "If God (or The Void) created every-thing, who created God?" This wonderment brought forth this answer: God is the uncaused

this answer; God is the uncaused cause (or the unvoided void).

Jean-Paul Sartre comes the closest to catching this concept by words: "The essential characteristic of the mental image... is a certain way an object has of being absent within its very presence."

This statement is closer to where it's at than anything any hippie can come up with at the moment. If, somehow, hippies could unify their psychedelic experience with an idea, then rather than a "San Francisco Sound"

and periperie will don death masks, black, armbands, swing censers and beat gongs and drums as they drag an oversize coffin for Hippie through the streets today. Black crepe will cover the windows of closed stores in the district.

The funeral and exorcism procession starts at one, Purpose of exorcism is to "free the boundaries of the Haight-Ashbury district" and destroy the "we/they" concept inherent in the idea of a "hip" community according to one member of the Committee for Community. Community.
The Committee is a planning

The Committee is a planning group made up of representatives from the Oracle, Free Clinic, Switchboard, All Saints Church, Housing Services and other groups. Members requested that they not be mentioned by name; they reject the concept of the leader-ship.

The funeral comes at a time of crisis for familiar Haight institutions. The Free Medical Clinic closed three weeks ago. The Swit-

closed three weeks ago. The Switchboard and Digger Free Store are foundering. The Free Hotel project is dormant or dead.

Committee members variously attribute these breakdowns to "paternalism", "lack of community support," and the deadening effects of media labelling.

"The media cast nets, create bags for the identity-hungry to climb in," stated one individual.
"the Free Man vomits his images."

The Funeral procession will cir-The Funeral procession will circle the Haight and end at Masonic and the Panhandle. There the coffin will be placed atop a pyre made of garbage and collected debris of the streets and hurned. Saturday is planned as a "Day of Changes." Individuals and small groups will range throughout San Francisco giving impressions of their own rebirth as "Free Men."

Many provo type actions are planned. Sunday will be a "Day of silence." Planners of the celebration hope

Planners of the celebration hope for a spreading out of the community with the "freeing of the boundaries" of the Haight.
Tactically, the police will have a harder time making busts if people no longer congregate on Haight Street. The media will find it difficult to impose new labels if they have no mass street scene to draw upon. to draw upon.

Decentralization has already begun. Ex-Haight Ashbury residents have relocated at various points throughout the West. Los Padres Forest, the Santa Cruz Hills, Colorado, New Mexico, Mill Valley, and Nevada all have small groups of free immigrants.

Other signs of change are beginning to appear. The Free City, a no-cost newspaper originating in the Haight contained instructions for making fire-bombs in its first issue last week. Decentralization

issue last week.

The Psychedelic shop where it all began closed today "for good." Co-proprietor Ron Thelin forsees the closing of other similar venture as the Death of Hippie concept begins to take hold.

Country Joe, and the Fish, are splitting up. The rumor is true. BARB asked Folk Scene columnist ED Denson, their manager since very nearly the beginning, what's happening. Denson cited a handful of facts in the recent split:

Country Joe MacDonald is no longer going to perform with the Fish; he is going to perform as as singer with an acoustic (non-electric) guitar; the four remaining members of the band will coning members of the band will con-

ing members of the band will continue to perform; and Denson will manage both Joe and the band. Beyond that, Denson said, most of it is opinion.

But why is Country Joe leaving the band? BARB asked.

"Leading a band is a very complex thing," Denson opined, "involving a manager, schedules, handling equipment, the other members of the band. It's a very intricate thing, and leads to problems.

"That is, there is always some difficulty. Whereas a singer with an acoustic guitar just goes to his job"

Denson said there are no hard feelings involved, and that no one wanted to see the band cease to exist as a unit.

The Fish, he said, do not plan to replace Country Joe. Lead guitarist Barry Melton will be the leader of the band. Bruce Barthol, bass guitar; David Cohen, guitar and organ; and Chicken Hirsh, drums, will stay in their present slots. present slots.

The present group has been to-gether since February.

Before Joe launched out on his

own, the whole Country Joe and the Fish band finished cutting their second LP for Vanguard. The initial pressing of 100,000 is expected to be released next month.

What happened, according to Michael Cane, Kurt Olszewski, and Ward Wood, was that the police broke into the Haste Street house, near Telegraph, herded the drousy near Telegraph, herded the drousy occupants into the kitchen, and shook down the rooms. When asked about a warrant, police replied that they didn't need

police replied that they didn't need one, because the occupants were breaking the law by trespassing on University property.
Wood showed BARB his rent receipt, dated to October 1, signed by building-owner Williams.



Soon Nat Tilem, director of the
USO, came out and asked the girls,
"Why are you doing this? You
shouldn't be doing this here, Now
break it up and move on," The girls continued to march

While all this was going great

outside, hostility was growing in-side the club between the service-men. This time Tilem gave a little

speech to everybody in the club, saying that if anyone left he would not be allowed back in the club. One fellow who came to the club while this was happening laughed when he found out what it was all about and started to go into the club. But Tilem said, "You can't go in there."

LA Provo Mike Agnello extended an open invitation to the ser-vicemen to visit the Magic Mush-room, a club in North Hollywood, The picketers joined Agnello and about 15 servicemen hopped on the back of the flatbed truck and headed for the Mushroom. According to David Drake, owner of the Mushroom, the ser-vicemen stayed only about 20 min-

utes because they couldn't buy liquor there and the girls weren't coming on strong to them.

Something is happening there but
you don't know what it is, do you
Mr. Smith? Some of it is in the
streets and in the parks -- in
the public eye. But much of what's
going on happens behind doors going on happens behind doors closed to tourists and casual onlookers. The way to know the hippie scene is to be there -- to see it from the inside, and experience the immediate impact of the forces and ideals which have made this the most intriguing phenomenon of our time. These Free U. week-end expeditions are designed to help you penetrate the public sur-face and see what it's like and

where it's at. The general format will be: A group of 16 (8 men and 8 women) will go to S.F. Friday evening. After a discussion seminar with some people who've been on the scene for some time, we'll go to whatever may be happening that night. Later, we'll crash at a Free U. pad -- sleeping bags on the floor. HOW UC FILCHED FUNDS FROM ENTERING FROSH

The Regents' Special Committee on Fees still deliberates the size of the tuition - that - is - not -a -

of the tuition - that - is - not -a -tuition.

Meanwhile, in the week before classes officially began at the University of California, entering freshmen students were already being coerced into "paying their dues."

dues."

Three thousand new frosh spent the past weekend in enforced encampment at 17 of the University's 18 Residence Units. They were soaked \$12 a head for their two-day "orientation" stay. Their participation -- so they had been instructed by the University -- was "mandatory."

The advanced sales numbed \$36.

was "mandatory."
The advanced sales pumped \$36,
000 into the University's residence halls. Money which would
not otherwise have been forthcoming was now guaranteed, thanks

coming was now guaranteed, thanks to the University and Cal Prep.
The money was ostensibly to pay for six dorm-ish meals and for rooms. Half-a-room actually, as each new student had to indulge the dorm ritual of sharing a single constricted cubbyhole with another student paired solely by chance.

The frosh had been convened for what was styled "an academically oriented program designed as the commencement of the entering freshman's college experience." Cal Prep Via the Dean of Students cum Administration somehow determined that orientation would be better served if all entering freshments. better served if all entering freshmen were herded into a common bivouac area. The living units came readily to mind. Hence the mammoth Dorm-In of fall 1967.

Virtually all Orientation events occurred on the campus. What Orientation services didthe dorms Orientation services didthe dorms provide? A reply comes in one freshman's wry comment: "All that happened was some Cal Prep people who helped answer questions on how to fill out forms we had to sign -- forms that didn't require explanation."

A new student recounted her interview with a Cal Prep girl who tried vainly to show the newwhy it was important to

comer why it was important to attend rallys.

When the new recruit rebuffed such goings-on as so much sorority bunkum, the Prep-girl confided how she was "actually a Liberal, myself" but insisted that she had accepted the job of selling rallys to new students and that therefore she felt this task to be "my moral duty." Sic Semper Vietnams.

The dorms are full. Students moved in Sunday morning at the conclusion of Orientation. It is

conclusion of Orientation. It is estimated that 70% of current dorm residents are entering freshmen. ("It's mainly only entering Fresh-men who move into the dorms. After a quarter they move out," a switchboard operator comment-ed.)

Thus, only one-half of the students found in the dorm during Orientation were bone fide dormies-to-be -- the other half were the dispossessed. 1,500 students who either had apartments or were still looking were compelled to

who either had apartments or were still looking were compelled to quarter themselves for two days in the Residence Halls while Orien-tation proceeded apace. It was, in the U's word, "mandatory," If this relocation program in-vites comparison to Major-Gen-eral Edward Lansdale's concept of "strategic hamlets" (in which peasants are kept in "safe" areas while propagandists work to 'win while propagandists work to 'win the hearts and the minds of the people') perhaps it is not amiss to recall Lansdale's subsequent observations in the Fall 1964 issue

of Foreign Affairs.

Lansdale on that occasion observed how repressive tactics tended to produce more and po-

tended to produce more and potential revolutionaries.

As an attempt to "isolate and indoctrinate" the frosh, the Dormin was not wholly successful. Saturday at the Greek Theater, Regent William K. Coblentz cautioned the students that "attempts will be made to sway you... You will be confronted by the zealots from both the right and the left." Ironically, local antidraft advocates had already breeched Regent Coblentz's defenses.

Eschewing black pajamas for dark suits and ties, members of Resistance were on hand to wel-come incoming students as the

trooped into the amphitheater.

Dressed to the nines, the Resistance melted into the panoply and managed to pass for ushers. They also managed to pass Resistance Week leaflets to every student who walked by.

The Resistance got an unexpected boost later in the proceedings

when, after the Vice-Chancellor had extolled the bliss to be had at the middle-of-the-road, both ASUC and Cal Prep officers used the microphone to bring up the Viet-nam war and to drop plugs for Resistance Week.

The protestors, veterans of non-violent action, brought officialdom below ground by the use of limp non-cooperation.

The five were charged with tres-passing and entering a restricted area after they walked onto ammo dump property.

Earlier, they had been ejected from restricted waters by the Coast Guard when they tried to paddle two rubber rafts out to

the Berkeley Victory.

Their expressed intention was to dump the explosives from the Viet-

dump the explosives from the Vietnam munitions supply ship, and to
substitute food, toys, medicines,
and May wine.

When the demonstrators were
arrested at the waterfront gate of
the Navy station, they went limp.
Marines and Federal Agents dragged them to waiting vehicles.

One federale was so eager to get
them to jail that he dropped his
automatic and, still dragging,
shouted, "Get my gun! Get my
gun!"



McCARRAN ACT SNEAK REVIVAL WARNING

"Sweeping and dangerous reversals of all the Supreme Court rulings to date against the Mc Carran Act" may "sneak through" Congress this session.

Judy Rudnick, Northern California Director of the Committee to Abolish HUAC told BARB this

to Abolish HUAC told BARB this week that twin bills are now in the Rules Committees of both houses of Congress with the intent of reviving the defunct McCarran Internal Securities Act of 1950. The bills, H.R. 10390 & 10391, the Willis-Ashbrook Bills to Revive the McCarran Act, would call for the Attorney General to register persons as Communists, rather than requiring the person to register himself, as did the McCarran Act.

The Attorney General would then publish their names and would post

McCarran Act.

The Attorney General would then publish their names and would post the list in every post office in the country. Any organization with one Communist member would be designated a "communist front" and all members would be registered as Communists.

Any witness subpoinaed by the SACB who refused to testify would be guilty of "civil contempt" and without a trial would go to jail until he decided to testify.

Senator Everett Dirksen is leading the drive to ram the bills through the Senate. He has indicated in a letter that the bill would be given highest priority on the Senate Calendar. Once through the Senate, the bills would be assured passage, since no HUAC bill has ever been defeated in the House.

DARING PRO-POT MOVE

In a move unequaled since pro-hibition days, more than 40 people have filed individual affidavits attesting to the fact that they smoke marijuana.

Those who have filed are "aver-

age citizens", including an engineer at the UC Med Center and

a school principal.

The action, being taken this morning in Judge Joseph Karesh's court in San Francisco, is part of a motion for arrest of sentence in the case of Melkon Melkonian, a Marin County auto mechanic con-victed recently of abetting the sale

of marijuana.

The drive for the affidavits has been spearheaded by Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Hinchcliffe of Marin, good friends of Melkanian. The former is an associate development engineer with the UC Medical Center where he has been practicing for

ten years.

Hinchcliffe told BARB Wednesday, "I felt that since Pd been hearing about it (the marijuana situation) for so many years, and always rejected puff-ins and smoke-ins, that this was the per-fect opportunity to admit that I

smoke pot."

He feels it is the most effective action he can take to restore a sense of reality to the pot situation.

molly Minudri, Melkonian's at-torney, after warning all affidavit signers of possible reprecussions, accepted the documents. In addition to the signed admis-

In addition to the signed admissions, Miss Minudri also has the written attestation of Dr. Thomas Burbridge, a pharmacologist and MD that cannibas (grass) is a totally harmless substance and, in fact, may be useful in curing various body ailments.

Dr. Joel Fort, deposed head of the SF Center for Special Problems, is expected to submit a similar document.

After denying a motion for a new trial, Judge Karesh granted a hear-ing for dismissal of sentence, Miss Minudri plans to contend that the laws regarding marijuana are unconstitutional in three re-

1. "Unequal protection of the laws" in that marijuana is classi-fied as a narcotic when in fact it is not a narcotic at all.

it is not a narcotic at all.

2. The penalties for the use of grass constitute "cruel and unusual punishment" in that severe penalties for the use of true narcotic drugs are imposed upon those convicted of the use of grass.

3. That, as per the testimonies and affidavits, grass has no harmful effect on the body and therefore should carry no penalties.

ful effect on the body and therefore should carry no penalties.

When queried on the possibility of repercussions, Hincheliffe responded that he believed that most of it, if any, would come from social circles rather than police action.

"We hope this will be a big step towards legalizing marijuana," he told BARB. "We'd like to get more affidavits."

Hincheliffe also reminded BARB

Hinchcliffe also reminded BARB that the same approach could and should be used in any case regarding grass offenses.

"Let's get it over with," added his wife, "in the best tradition of the American system. Then we can get down to the big things, like ending the war in Vietnam."

The service itself included three views of St. Francis, the most interesting of which described the old-time "hippie" in the language of his modern counterparts ("This cat Francis was out of sight. Amen.").

Revs. Callanan, Sontag (O.F.M.), York (French Church) and Conway (Newman) read parables from the life of St. Francis, whose Sun Oracle had previously been delivered in three languages from different parts of the church.

delivered in three languages from different parts of the church. Three episodes of the saint's life were presented in pantomime, and Greg Mack read Lawrence Ferlin-ghetti's "They were putting up a statue of St. Francis," and "Christ Climbed Down.

But the most beautiful parts of the service were the communal rituals. The first was the "distribution" of the Kiss of Peace, begun by Rev. York who then urged the members of the audience to hug and kiss each other. Unfortunately, few took up the suggestion.

Later, a prayer to Brother Fire was read. Everyone with matches was urged to light them while Greg Mack burned the text of the prayer. Incense was then distributed and lit while the audience marched out to attend what should have been the most beautiful part of the evening -- the blessing of the animals on the outer terrace. on the outer terrace.

But the ceremony was marred by the simple fact that the people involved managed to do little more than scare the hell out of the poor little donkey and sheep that had been brought out for blessing. Wendell Brunner, an unsuccessful candidate for ASUC Vice-President last year, tried to end the odyssey of the plaque by giving it to the ASUC senate, the group that most represents the Berkeley students.

The collective senate appeared somewhat embarrassed, Only the most radical inhabitants of the sandbox were advocating acceptance. The others-the liberals-were scared.

Although they repeatedly stated they were against US involvement in Vietnam, they protested that it would look bad if they seemed to give support to those who were fighting the US.

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LES BELLES DAMES SANS...

The Renaissance Pleasure Faire and Ha 'Penny Market opens to-morrow "in a hidden wood near San Rafael," If it's anything like its Los Angeles predecessors, it should turn out to be an extraordinary affair indeed.

ordinary affair indeed.

The Pleasure Faire began five years ago as a background for a Commedia dell 'Arte performance by the Piccolo Playmakers, a children's improvisational theatre group directed by Phyllis Patterson (who now co-produces the Faire with her husband, Ron). Like Topsy, it just grew until it be-

atre group directed by Phyllis Patterson (who now co-produces the Faire with her husband, Ron). Like Topsy, it just grew until it became a full-blown old English county fair, replete with pageantry and revels.

The Commedia dell'Arts productions are still around, although they're occasionally spiked with anachronistic pieces like Mark Twain's notorious "1601." But now the theatre is revalled by clusters of dozens of booths where area craftsmen hawk their wares, along with street vendors and performers. And, of course, the hostels and taverns are there too.

All possible efforts are made to avoid necessary anarchronisms (chemical toilets being an unfortunately necessary one -- but of course, one can't have milady sneaking off into the bushes).

Vendors are urged not to use card-tables or papercups, and new Spiedel watchbands are equally taboo. Craftsmen may only sell handicrafts that might pass for period pieces.

"We used to ban sunglasses," said Mike Korman, a spokesman for the Faire, "but we found out that they used to wear them in the 16th century too."

Obessed with authenticity, the Faire's producers have ferreted out all sorts of trivia associated with the everyday life of the period. But they HAVE taken a few liberties with time.

"We try to keep to the early Elizabethan period," said Korman, but since the only real changes during the Renaissance were within the nobility, we take a few liberties and go back a hundred years or so."

Kings may come and go, but peasants never change — so the Faire is presenting a Medieval marketplace in the heart of Renaissance England.

The Faire has also had some difficulty accommodating modern

naissance England.

The Faire has also had some difficulty accommodating modern politics, since a Medieval setting doesn't hold an anti-Vietnam dem-

onstration too well. "So what the

onstration too well. "So what the peace movement can do," said Korman, "is protest against the Crusades," a proposal which isn't, after all, so far from the truth anyway. In similar fashion, SNCC has presented non-violent jousts. All those who participate in the Faire are naturally required to appear in costume, and those who attend are urged to do the same. The problems of costuming isn't really that great. A burlap sack and some leg-wrappings make a peasant's suit, while the ladies can easily adapt an old dress.

"Almost anything will pass," said Korman, "so long as it's in solid colors and flowing." For the truly ambitious, all those in costume and on horseback will be admitted free.

The Faire ran for four years in Los Angeles with ever-in creasing success until last year, when the site was moved into Ventura County in order to provide better parking facilities. All was going well with the Ventura County Board of Supervisors until the conservatives in Thousand Oaks got wind of the affair and began to air outrageous charges (the old faithful drugs, syndrome -- sex

After a frantic search for obsolete laws provided nothing better than a fingerprint requirement for "itinepant merchants," Mrs. Walter Brennan, of all people, filed an appeal with Board of Supervisors, claiming that she would be "morally aggrieved" if the Faire were to be held, althrough the site was a good eighteen miles from her home.

Cleverly enough, the hearing was scheduled for a Tuesday AFTER the Faire was supposed to open, but a quickly obtained restraining order allowed the Faire to open for the first week-end.

Opening day was crowded with cops, but none of them found much to do except groove with the Faire, as they testified at the hearing.

But despite the evidence of the

police, the hearsay of Mrs. Bren-na prevailed and the Faire was closed. The Board, which wasn't required to give any reasons for its action didn't.

required to give any reasons for its action didn't.

No such problems are anticipated for the Faire's Bay Area premier. The Faire will begin at 11 A.M. for each of four mornings (October 7th, 8th, 14th and 15th), and formally begin with a Call O' the Faire procession at noon. It will close at dusk.

Tickets are available at the gate \$2.50 each for adults, and \$1.00 each for children under 12 (part of the proceeds go to benefit KPFA radio).

place to go where they can talk

They are not professionals, and they do not offer psychiatric help. They are responsible, hip people who are willing to listen to other people talk, and who may occasionally offer advice.

To avoid any sort of legal nassig-regarding psychiatric work, the Love Center is working in coopera-tion with the Haight Ashbury Legal Organization,

The Love Center opened on Sept-

The Love Center opened on September 25 and will remain open seven days a week, from 7-11 pm, with a minimum of two counselors available at all times.

Visitors usually come singly, but occasionally couples may come. However, the facilities are designed for a one-to-one exchange.

November 7 municipal election. tion allocated 30 billion dollars to the war. Meanwhile urgent programs which could correct the terrifying situation in our cities died for lack of funds."

Included in the ballot argument is a chart prepared by the Citizens Committee indicating the heavy costs the average taxpayer would have to bear if Administration plans to collect a proposed 10% tax above one's income should pass.

The statement concludes:
"Until now, all attempts at informing the Administration of the overwhelming doubts and outright opposition to this war have gone unheeded; letters receive stock answers, mass protests are explained away. The result is a level of general despair and feeling of loss of control of our 'representatives' that is unsurpassed in American history.

K: That's right. And the actors I've used, my biggest problem is what I call, zapping my actors in a hurry, because they tend to evaporate on me. You see I'm casting by look, not by soul-beauty.

bility. Purely by physical appearance. The way Eisenstein cast. Eisenstein and Pudovkin went down the streets and said I want that one, that one, that one, that one, that one, that one, for my film. That's the way Potemkin was cast. Only in those idealistic early days of the revolution people showed up. It was merely that I was feeding people. I wasn't paying them on a salary. There were no contracts. I would have to work very fast with one person so they wouldn't disappear. When I got them the I tried to shoot as much as I I tried to shoot as much as I could. And I did everything I could with them that day or that week-

end. L: Would you like to try to dis-

cuss Lucifer?

K: Well, Lucifer is my first, what I call, in all seriousness, not at all in a campy sense, I'd call it my first religious film. It's about the angel-demon of light and beauty named Lucifer, it's from the bringer of light. And it's about the solar diety. And the Christian ethos has turned Lucifer into Satan, made him a demon. But I show it in its gnostic and pagan sense, which is the angel of light and beauty, And so I show the way the force comes out in our society, in a twisted form and I show it's pure form. It's a tremendous concept to get across. I have rapped away against the California Democratic Council often enough but until last Saturday I had never actually seen them in action. It was positively unnerving to watch the assembled delegates behave so exactly according to my expectations.

gates behave so exactly according to my expectations.

The substantive decisions were not so important or interesting, for me, as the manner in which they were made. During the long hours of dispirited debate I only heard one person speak in favor of a policy on the grounds that it was right; almost to a man, they assumed as an axiom of politics that the best program is the one that appeals to the greatest number of people today.

That axiom is, of course, nothing but common sense, like the axioms of Euclid and Newton, admirably suited to the political world we once knew and hopelessly inadequate in an expanding universe where, in the daily course of events, matter is transformed and energy is created.

where, in the daily course of create, energy is created, John Kenneth Galbraith, the keynote speaker, set the tone admirably in his remarks on Vietnam. He was increasingly impressed, he said, by "the logic of those who say we should be compelled to withdraw." This triggered a burst of applause positively enthusiastic by the standards of the day, although probably less than half the audience is included in

joined in.
"Control your enthusiasm," Galbraith said, and went on to explain that "the American people are used to taking things by steps." He outlined some of the stpes he would lead the American people along, steps leading ultimately to negotiations with the enemy. Negotiations about what, for what, in defense of what legitimate

regotrations about what, for what, in the tests of what togates interests?

Galbraith didn't consider it important to specify—but he did say that "if we cannot have negotiations, then let us defend ourselves(l) inareas we have already secured." It may not be a perfect policy, he said, but it is "the course of action that will win the approval of the greatest number of the American people."

He ended his speech with this guide to personal conduct: "Great liberality of mind is something which is not to be confused with great vehemence of manner,"

Later in the day, the delegates endorsed Galbraith's remarks by adopting the following language in the pledge which the "peace delegates" to the Democratic National Convention would take: "... interests?

in the pledge which the "peace delegates" to the Democratic National Convention would take: "... we pledge ourselves... to the uncompromising support of a Party platform and a Party candidate committed without reservation (1) to an immediate cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam, (2) to negotiations—including all participants—for settlement of the war, so that American armed forces cipants—for settlement of the war, so that American armed forces may be withdrawn, and (3) to international guarantees of non-intervention in Vietnam."

(The words "uncompromising" and "without reservation" are not to be taken at face value, since the delegates rejected a resolution pledging the delegates not to

the delegates rejected a resolu-tion pledging the delegates not to support Lyndon Johnson.)
You can rant on, if you wish, about the CDC's amorality or lack of principle—CDC members will positively lap it up. They are peo-ple who, ten years ago, made a decision to forego the "moral luxury" of saying publicly what they privately believe in favor of

luxury" of saying publicly what they privately believe in favor of what they call "effectivenesss." If you wish, they are opposed on principles. When it seeems to be working well--when they are "effective", as they define it ---their principled amorality gives them cause to be oily and smug. But when it turns out badly--when they wind up irrelevant, either despite or because of their sacrifice of honesty--then they turn sour and hateful against all radicals and young whippersnappers. It looks to me as whippersnappers. It looks to me as if the CDC peace slate will turn out that way.

If the tenor of the convention is any clue, the CDC peace slate will campaign in the Democratic primary on the following lines: Lyndon Johnson's policies have split the Democratic Party instead of uniting it. To re-nominate Johnson would further weaken the Party. Johnson hasn't really been trying to negotiate with the enemy, His continued escalations bring the His continued escalations bring the danger of war with China. The war has forced a drastic cutback of government welfare programs. The Democratic Party is bound to lose in 1968 unless it comes out for peace. Dump Johnson.


In case there are any CDCers listening who suspect they may have gone basically wrong some-where along the line, let me state a few propositions of non-Euclidian politics just to give them a feel for it:

History is made by changing people's ideas, not by tabulating the ideas they now hold.

It is more important to change people's deeply-rooted categories thought than it is to change their lightly-held loyalties to one or another set of alternate opin-ions which the mass media offer; and sometimes you cannot do both at once, but must choose one or the other.

Of course they ran up against the same problem that the positivist literary critics obtusely battered their minds against. The exact sounds of the instruments are not what one hears at a concert, they are not the essence of a live performance whether in a hall shrouded for opera or flickering for a dance, and most certainly not sitting in the sun in Provo Park. The essence of a concert is being with a group of people on a special occasion, joining with them for some form of high culture, and the poorly heard performance is given its meaning by the murmerred comments of your friend, the applause of the other people, the mood of the time.

A record is changeless, and as should be the case while communing with the eternal listening to one is a solitary event. Playing one may be the backround for a social event, like smoking with friends, or having a party or painting the floor, but these things are not the same as going to a concert, and the music is not the same either. To hear the exact sound of an instrument is a previously unknown experience.

unknown experience.

Considering these things, what are the alternatives to a concert:a movie, church, political ralcerta movie, church, political ral-lies, or a football game. For a re-cord, the radio is the competition, in fact it is often the case that playing records is simply a matter of being your own disc jockey and avoiding bummer sections of time while the playlist dips into the

The radio has undergone a major The radio has undergone a major change in the last decade with the emergence of Top 40 platter shows. The change came about because someone realised that no one listened to the radio continuously so the programming should be a series of high points designed to stand out of that intense barrage of stimuli we call modern life, it stands out by being more intense, more varby being more intense, more varied, and hence more interesting.

The next step is portable radios taken around because they are so much more intersting than life could ever be. No doubt we will see this happening someday.

If the record is competing with the radio rather than the live per-formance as seems to be the case since airplay for a group is the best since airplay for a group is the best way of insuring a good turnout for their performances, then it is natural for its relation to the radio to be the same as the radio's relation to modern life. It must be more stimulating, more varied, and hence more interesting.

If this is the case then what records would be best sellers? Why soundtracks of course because they

cords would be best sellers? Why soundtracks of course, because they rapidly shift in mood and texture as the action they illustrate changes. And sure enough soundtrack albums are consistent best sellers. "Dr. Zhivago" has been in the top15 for a year and a half. "The Sound of Music" is well into its third year high on the charts.

No group seemed less likely to produce interesting music than the Beach Boys unless it was Dean Martin. For the first years of their existence they were a primary example of senseless teeniebopper ample of senseless teenleoopper music except among the high cam-pers, with their hot rod songs. Re-member "fun, fun, fun, till mama-took the T-Bird away." Even their hot rod period was

Even their hot rod period was about rich teenagers with cars that were above all clean. They were a cursedly wholesome band, and so clean. The very opposite of what everyone who was hip believed in, no dirt, not a hint of anguish, not a hint of egomanic instrumental dexterity, just good clean fun singing about the things we all love so muchponds and little deue counes. hondas and little deuce coupes.

Then the word got around to us insiders that Brian Wilson, the producer Beach Boy, had taken acid, that the Beatles were really interested in his work, that the Beach ested in his work, that the beath Boys were what was really happen-ing in rock, "Hah," we all said. "Fat chance," and we all bought their last Capitol lp with them in very clean looking beards feeding their last Capitol Ip With them in very clean looking beards feeding animals, hoping that their hit single, "Good Vibrations" was on it. What a bummer that Ip was. Dreck, all dreck. So much for the Beach Boys. Obviously the Beatles are slipping, selling out, losing perspective. Put on the Butterfield record and stop rapping.

Smilely Smile changes all that. It is an incredible Ip. I would agree, they did take acid. It didn't change a thing except their cultural affliations, they are still incredibly clean. You get the feeling that its like Walt Disney took acid, and produced the best Bugs Bunny cartoon ever.

The record is a collection of gently funny pieces, filled with a particularly American kind of nostalgia just as the Beatles Ip is filled with British nostalgia, It reminds me of 1920's pop hillbilly music, it feels the same, and you continually expect a song with pleasant surprises of the kind that make you smile, and look at your friend to see it he is smiling too. You could sit on the porch, pulling gently on your pipe, relaxing and thinking over the day, and like this record a lot.

In today's society a better test would be based on comic books. The fiercly hip Fish sang about Spiderman and Doctor Strange, the Beach Boys have subtitled one song the "W. Woodpecker Symphony." They just ain't got no angst.
The songs that really make the lp, for me, are first and foremost, Good Vibrations which is the song that started me on this radio idea anyway. It just keeps changing all the time, moving from something real quiet to something which seems to rock under that therimin. Even rock under that therimin. Even on the radio it caught my attention because it alone changed as fast as the patter between the records.

Then there is Gettin' Hungry, a serious sexual song, and if that is the case, it's a nice guy trying to come on like Jimi Hendrick's and failing, but failing in such a way that you still like him. It opens with a fast instrumental on a small organ, then a real quiet section with occasional notes against a single voice, then the chorus with its unbelievable line about "gettin hungry, hungry for my kind of woman" but you just can't take it seriously, even when the gospel singing comes in, and its really loveable.

And She's Goin' Bald which is about a chick whose hair falls out in the first verse, then comes a sha bo sha bo chorus which is replayed faster and faster, leading into a melodramatic narrator then a blues line "too late mama, nothing up side your head, no more, no more, no more." Delightful. Then there is Gettin' Hungry, a

There is also a sort of commer There is also a sort of commercial for the American Vegetable Association ending with an exhortation to write in and tell them your favorite vegetable, a song about having a lid, a lid, a liddle pad in Hawaii which people whisper is their drug reference, and some other things which I liked a lot.

Perhaps the sensitive reader has noticed a sort of veiled double meaning in this review, a kind of under-

noticed a sort of veiled double meaning in this review, a kind of underlying hostility, especially in my adjectives. Well the sensitive reader is right, but that doesn't mean that I don't like the record. I think it's one of the best I've heard, I've listened to it 6 times now each time with more delight.

The hostility is there because I'm really suspicious of delight. I'm the sort of guy who likes Fidel because he makes the trains run on time. It believe that most of the people who read this paper are the same way, and that they'll find the Beach Boys record is groovy, but not cuite satis-

BROADCAST UNION FINGERS CAL GAME

Union pickets threw a wrench in university operations last week during preparations for the Cal-Michigan game Saturday.

Pickets from the National Association of Broadcast Employees d Technicians (NABET) today 0-6) enter their third week of nationwide strike against the

a nationwide strike against the American Broadcasting Company. ABC owns and operates KGO-TV and Radio in San Francisco. Five other such stations, plus network operations in New York, Chicago, Washington, and Los Angeles are being struck. The action is supported by the national AFL-CIO and supported by all trade unions. The strike was called to back

and supported by all trade unions. The strike was called to back up demands for higher pay and better working conditions. For example, mail-room employees receive only \$87 gross pay weekly, while the news director (management) receives \$750 a week. The NABET union employees have been working since April without a contract.

NABET put a picket line at the Cal Stadium entrance five days last week because ABC-TV made a nationwide color telecast of the football game with Michigan.

Scabs and management personnel set up the electronic gear during the week . . . but not without troubles. Trucks (driven by teamsters) with equipment refused to cross the picket line. Telephone crews (who install microwave for telecasting) refused to cross. Hundreds of taxi cabs stopped at the NABET line. Scabs and management person-

Dozens of East Bay unions helped the pickets, U-C office workers, non-academic employees, painters, electricians, and teachers all out markers, and teachers all out markers.

painters, electricians, and teachers, all put members on the line. The NABET picket Captain, Leo Laurence, an Editor for ABC News, told the BARB that the campus police were really worried. Somehow, rumors got to the fuzz that the strikers may strike at the equipment. The fuzz then doubled their protection guards.

University officials were wor-

University officials were wor-ried all week that the pickets might stop the broadcast. Actual-ly, NABET officials didn't want to embarass the University or stop the game . . the ABC-TV telecast. . . only stop

ANTI-WAR BITCH-IN AT SF STATE

"The election for mayor in San Francisco is a secondary issue," says Bob Davis, YSA candidate for mayor in San Francisco. "The im-portant issue is Proposition P." Proposition P, the Vietnam War proposition will be on the Novem-

roposition will be on the Novem-er 7 ballot. The YSA will hold a "Bitch-n" at San Francisco State College in order to explain the importance

of getting a majority vote on Pro-position P.

The Bitch-In will be at 12 noon on the speakers platform on Mon-day, October 9, and both Bob Davis and Clyde Cummings, candidate for supervisor, will speak. Pro and con discussions of the war and the pro-position will be invited from the audience.

"This is not a little municipal election," says Davis. "This has world wide significance, This is the first time in United States history that a major city has the right to vote on a war while the war is in progress.

"The entire world will be looking

QUESTION: For cosmetic reasons and its sex appeal, I have been in-terested for some time in removing my pubic hair. Cautious use of a dipilatory or one of the newer electric razors would seem the best solution to your problem. I would advise against permanent removal since you might someday move to a colder climate.

Or simply to quote a melancholy Jewish friend, "The only way to lose a foreskin is to wear it off."

A possible solution is suggested by this letter from San Francisco:

COMMENT: Another argument for circumcision, besides preventing cancer in women, is that there is only one recorded case in history of cancer of the penis in a Jew. And it happened that he was uncircumcised.

As for the question of decreased sensitivity of the glans, Masters and Johnson studied this question in their researches into the physiology of sex. Extensive neurological testing of such sensations as touch and pain sensitivity failed to reveal any differences in those with or without foreskins.

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

I wonder how many readers agree with my feeling that Beatle George Harrison was an unfriendly and unneeded visitor when he toured the Haight-Ashbury in August.

Unfriendly because he gave bad vibrations to people who tried to beg off him; unneeded because he later went out of his way in London to make uninformed put-down comments on the Haight-Ashbury which will increase straight-world misunderstanding of us all. (Hip people swarmed offering him love when he was recognized strolling through Golden Gate Park.)

Statements by rich man Harrison included the following (as quoted in the S.F. Chronicle):

"Haight-Ashbury reminded me a bit of the Bowery. There were people just sitting around the pavement begging, saying 'give us some money for a blanket.' These are hypocrites. They are making fun of tourists and all that and at the same time they are holding their hands out begging off them. That's what I don't like.

"I don't mind anybody dropping out of anything, but it's the imposition on somebody else I don't like. The moment you start dropping out and then start begging off somebody else to help you, then it's no good. I've just realized through a lot of things that it doesn't matter what you are as long as you work. It doesn't matter if you chop wood as long as you chop and keep chopping.'

It has long been clear that Lyndon Baines Johnson and most of the society he represents are students of novelist Ayn Rand's philosophy that says it doesn't matter what you do and how you do it (approve napalming of civilians, overcharge your customers if you have a business) as long as you do what your own individual grand scheme will profit by.

It is clear now to me that George Harrison has been reading Rand. What they two, and most of our society, have in common is that instead of begging they take. National and local government doesn't beg either; through a fantastically complex psychic and material advertising climate they manipulate poople into dropping money in the money.

The same applies to record and concert artists

and the Beatles.

Personally, I've never begged or panhandled but I'm honest enough to admit that such is much more honorable than some of the

enough to admit that such is much more honorable than some of the respectable regular jobs I've had. On one job I was a researcher for an international management consulting firm devising new ways to illustrate how American corporations could make more money off the already starving and destitute peoples of places like India and Nigeria.

Begging is less of an "imposition" on the civilization than that work of mine and that of millions of others who "chop and keep chopping." Being a beggar is hard work too and offers tiny wages and no fringe benefits, It is definitely valid self-employment. The beggar offers the giver entertainment (seeing the beggar satisfied, pleasantly experiencing the

onal and local government doesn't opportunity to play benefactor). His work surely offers the consumer as much benefit as many high paid professional fund raisers (glorified beggars) offer.

I say to Harrison that those people "sitting around the pavement . . . saying 'Give us some money for a blanket' are playing an important role of questioning what the hell is the nature of the giving and taking set-up on this planet. After all, our one species is in constant "imposition" on all the other hundreds of thousands of species of animals and plants we parasites are eating up and crowding off the earth.

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

The ugly summer is over, and I don't think any of us would care to relive it. Not even though it would mean adding that much time to the rest of your life. The worst didn't happen. There was no declaration of war, and China wasn't brought into it, despite all the rumors. And the concentration camps failed to materialize.

spite all the rumors. And the concentration camps failed to materialize.

I don't know how much substance there was to that apprehension. Perhaps it was all a right-wing plant, or left-wing paranoia. But this I do know: it would never have gone over and been so widely believed under previous administrations. You couldn't possibly picture Truman or Eisenhower or Kennedy ordering a wholesale roundup of all his opponents so he could continue an iniquitous war without harassment. But for you-know-who, it seemed quite in character.

And right now, things do look better. There are new rashes of peace talk. My comments a couple of weeks ago on the Viet election need revising, and for once it's a pleasure to say that maybe I was wrong. With peace feelers being sent out to the North, and with Thieu laying it on the line to Ky that "I'm the boss now," I begin to believe that the election may have made a difference.

And there are differences here

at home too. The recent polls show that LBJ can no longer keep un his pretense that the people are behind him, "all but a small majority." A lot of his former Congressional supporters, even that sharp-beaked hawk Stuart Symington, are swinging over to the other side

side.

Perhaps most encouraging is the fact that the old two-party system seems to be creaking back into action. Influencial Republicans are calling on their party to run a candidate on a frank peace platform. And when this even extends to Senator Margaret Chase Smith, a lady never before prominent for peace-mindedness, one's heart leaps up.

for peace-mindedness, one shear-leaps up.
. . . The preceding was written about two weeks ago, and since then the scene seems to have brightened even more. There was that poll showing a majority of Californians in opposition to the Vietnam war. And the court decision placing the Viet resolution on the San Francisco ballot. And even LBJ taking somewhat of a softer tone.

even LBJ taking somewhat of a softer tone.

This is not to say that the end of the war is in sight. It's hard to know what, and for how long, the Administration may do to extricate itself from the mess it worked itself into. But the Administration now seems less likely just to let it go on and on, and lead to what it may.


Of course, what is needed is more than only an end to the war. It is a revamping of foreign policy which will rule out any future Vietnams. And just at this moment, the wind seems to be blowing from the right direction. At least, it's once more possible to hope.

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

"I feel that this is a colorful and beautiful city," says Joerres, "and in line with this I am waging a colorful and beautiful campaign.




