SONG FOR WOODY TO DIG HIM NO TRAVLIN' TOO HARD

Last week Woody Guthrie died. And I flashed on a year ago

Grant Houston, nephew of Cisco ouston, Woody's old traveling ddy, and I decided it might be Houston,

Houston, Woody's old traveling buddy, and I decided it might be fun to hitchhike to the Mariposa Folk Festival in Toronto.

The night before we left we sang for basket money in the Jabberwock. We made \$15, three cigarettes, and a chocolate chip cookie.

The afternoon of the first day we got a ride from an on-leave sailor named Mike who was going as far as Oklahoma City. We gratefully accepted the lift and for 1800 miles alternated between turns behind the wheel of his limping Simca, sleeping, and strumming our guitars.

At 3 am of the third night Mike dropped us off outside Melinda's All-Night Pancakes just off Route 66 in Oklahoma City. "See you guys in about 20 minutes after I say hello to my chick. Then Pil drive you on some more,"

In the time it took for me to

In the time it took for me to cross the street to a service station, change clothes, and walk back, which was about three minutes, Grant and I were placed under arrest for violation of curfew and long hair.
"But honest, officer, we're wait-

The Midnight Memorial was initiated and arranged by Turner, a singing actor who joined the Conservatory last month. He and Guthrie met in 1948 and were friends until Guthrie's death.

Born in Oklahoma in 1912, Woody Guthrie is generally regarded as the father of the contemporary folk music movement in America. Guthrie's view of his work was simple. "I write what I see," he once said. "I write what Pveseen. I write things that I just hope to see somewhere farther along."

jectors? jectors?"

They put us in the drunk tank with the city's habitual wino residents and any Black brothers they would find an excuse to bust. I generously shared my one pack of cigarettes with my fellow-persecuted, which shocked even Grant because, as I was later told, cigarettes are your most valuble possessions when you're in the can.

We demanded our telephone calls and were given the runaround, "The American Civil Liberties Union!" stormed Grant.

"Never heard of it," said the

About 7 am we were all herded out of the spacious drunk tank into a room about one fifth the size with no ventilation. The cops paraded their police dogs past the barred entrance, waving billy clubs tauntingly at the inmates, and making snide remarks.

At 10 am we were marched to court. And here we came: two long haired, blind (they took our glasses), bearded folkies. ..at the end of a line of 50 drunks who all pleaded "Yesh, yer honor. Guilty."

Judge Sanford didn't quite know

Judge Sanford didn't quite know what do do or say, particularly since Grant and I, with the cry of "Remember Woody!" on our breaths presented him with a list

breaths presented him with a list of grievances and violations committed by the police department. "Well, if you boys plead guilty, I can do something. Otherwise you'll have to stay here for a week for trial."

With thoughts of the folk festival still in our minds, and the hideous vision of what it would be like to spend another week in the Okie jail, we reluctantly decided to take a chance. Guilty, your honor."

"Fifteen days suspended. Now you boys get back out on the hiway and get out of town."

you boys get back out on the mway and get out of town." And that's exactly what we did. Fifteen miles from Guthrie, Okla-homa and 60 miles from Woody's home town of Okemah we stuck out

home town of Okemah we stuck out our thumbs again.

We never did make it to the folk festival. We slept in a gully by the side of the freeway in Chi-cago, and 30 miles later found our-selves walking down a New York Central track.

Midway between the cornfields of Porter and Chesterton, Indiana we

Midyay between the cornfields of Porter and Chesterton, Indiana we stopped at a farmhouse and exchanged a song for a couple glasses of water. The hired hand, Cliff, was so impressed that he called out the boss, the two teenage boys who'd heard of the big city of San Francisco and someday hoped to visit, and the farmer's daughter, a tall blonde who'd just recently won the local title of Miss Cornfield or something like that.

We sang a few more songs and were instantly invited to spend the night. Cliff stoked us up on hamburgers and fresh corn until we could eat no more.

In the morning, after the best night's rest we'd had since leaving San Francisco, we were fed

ing San Francisco, we were fed again given some clothes, and some helpful tips on how to hop the Central into Massachusetts,

the Central into Massachusetts, our new destination.

After a 25-hour ride on the Central, which placed us just outside of Troy, New York, we did some more singing for meals. A couple of groovey engineers let us ride in a spare engine into Pittsfield, Mass., and laid a couple of dollars on us for food as we departed. We made it as far as Great Barrington, where the first night, the chick I had come all the way across the country to see balled Grant.

"My fate will be decided by my penis, "he opined remorsefully. "Anyway, she wasn't very good." And after hearing the gory de-tails which led to the whole thing,

I sat down and penned "Talkin"
17-Year-Old Lewdy Blues".

CAN A LITTLE MITE BUG A MIGHTY UNION?

Pictures of napalmed children in Vietnam so horrified one San Francisco man that he gave up

rrancisco man that he gave up his well-paid, easy, secure work, because it was indirectly related to supplying the war.

This man, Hugh Leddy, now dishes up hamburgers and cokes six days a week, long hours, for less than he previously made in a 40-hour week. less than he pr a 40-hour week.

He is not sorry about it. He just couldn't go on with a job that touched in any way the burning of children.
Until February of this year, Hugh

was apparently no different from any other young American. He served in the US Air Force dur-ing the Korean War.

ing the Korean War.

Then, after some travelling and knocking around in various jobs, he decided to go for a good income and security.

In September, 1965, Leddy started to work on the docks as a guard. He started as a permit man, then got a "B" card, which meant a guarantee of work at good pay

for life. The work was easy-guarding the cargo on the docks and in the pier sheds. He was the youngest member of Guards' Local 75, International Longshore-men's and Warehousemen's Un-

In February, Leddy read the issue of Ramparts with the series of pictures showing what napalm does to children. He couldn't forget the pictures.

forget the pictures.

Next day, he was guarding a pier shed in Oakland. Most, if not all, of the cargo was civilian, but Leddy knew that the shipping companies are subsidized by the government and have to take special war cargoes when told to. He made up his mind he just could not go on with it.

could not go on with it.

Leddy told his supervisor at American President Lines that he could not in good conscience continue serving a criminal war. The answer was, "Then there is no place for you at APL." He went to his union dispatcher and business agent, Joe McLau-

ghlin, and asked to be dispatched only to decks that had no war cargoes of any kind. McLaughlin asked for 24 hours to look into

asked for 24 hours to look into this novel request, then said the answer was No.

Ten minutes later he called Leddy again to say that the question would be taken up at a meeting. At the meeting, the members agreed to his working where there were no military cargoes, but warned that he would not be able to work very regularly on that basis.

basis.

It turned out, Leddy says, that he got only one shift of work-guarding the Longshore Hall for a Saturday night dance.

Leddy collected unemployment insurance while he waited for non-military-connected assignments.

military-connected assignments

Military-connected assignments that never came.

After several months, he went to a union meeting to present his case to the members. He started to explain why he was not taking war-related work-that the war was unjust--but before he finished one sentence he was interrupted by Denver Davis, the president of Local 75, who told him he was out of order, that he would be dropped from the union for non-

dropped from the union for non-availability for work.
Leddy asked for a leave of absence so that he could return to the job after the end of the war. He was told he would receive his answer in a letter.
Leddy says that one officer of Local 75, a member of the Labor Relations Committee, charged that the meeting was not being conducted democratically, and walked out.

BARB asked Leddy what he thought about other people working 40-hour weeks for good pay on war-connected work.
"Everyone has to make his own decision," he replied. "I just

decision," he replied. "I just can't do it. Did you see those pictures?"

THE "MAN" MENACES THE MOBILIZATION

The Man has finally made his move to emasculate the October 21 anti-war protest in Washington,

The leaders of the massive peace action are not backing down.

An ultimatum from Henry Van Cleve, speaking for the General Services Administration, the Pen-Services Administration, the Pen-tagon, and D_sC_s lawmen, told the National Mobilization Committee that the entire march and rally would be illegal unless the Com-mittee renounced the part of its program which includes civil dis-obedience at the Pentagon. The National Mobilization has stated that it expects about 10,000 of the anticipated 100,000 anti-war demonstrators to volunteer to sit-

demonstrators to volunteer to sit-

of the anticipated 100,000 anti-war demonstrators to volunteer to sitin in the Pentagon doorways.

Administration man Van Cleve told them that under no circumstances would the government allow any picketing of the Pentagon. If the Mobilization Committee does not disavow civil disobedience, permits will not be issued for the planned march and rally, Van Cleve said.

In reply, officers of the Mobilization called upon "all Americans, regardless of their stand on the war, to support the rights to assemble, to speak and to seek redress of grievances as guaranteed by the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."

They asked Van Cleve to issue

of Rights."
They asked Van Cleve to issue all the necessary permits.
Late last week Dave Dellinger, chairman of the Mobilization, emphasized that "the demonstration in Washington will be a peaceful one. It will be non-violent."
"The sit-in at the Pentagon will also be peaceful," Dellinger said. "If there can be peaceful sit-ins in Alabama and Mississippi, there is no reason why there can't be a peaceful sit-in in Washington, D.C."
Convoys to the capital begin

A bus from Berkeley still has room for about six people. The Campus Mobilization Committee at UC is now coordinating local cars and riders for the transcontinental peace trip. In San Francisco, the SF Oracle office is doing the same.

If the pro-war forces don't manage to turn back the 100,000 demonstrators converging a back.

onstrators converging on the capital the scheduled Washington action on October 21 will begin at 10 a.m. At that time, marchers will assemble at the Lincoln Meni-orial and at the Washington Mon-

The march, starting at ll a.m., will cross the Potomac in two lines, via the Arlington Memorial Bridge and the George Mason

Bridge and the George Mason Memorial Bridge.

The 4 p.m. sit-in will follow a rally in the Pentagon's south parking lot. A Digger-style action will try to exorcise the evil from the Pentagon by a ritual involving the formation of a human ring around the five-sided war building.

John Wilson, New York direc-r of the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee, said that SNCC will not take part in the Committee, said that

"We'll go to the march and rally," Wilson said, "but we won't sit in. We'll go to the Black community and have an intensive 'Black organizing' session."

About 80 percent of Washington, D.C. proper is Black.

A mass meeting on the night of October 21 at the Sylvan Theater is planned to discuss the events of that day, and to plan for Sunday's action. Demonstrations are expected to continue at least through Monday.

PITTY-PATTY **WARNING ON ABORTIONS**

"It's not just the police that are getting paid off in the abor-tion racket, but many other people too," warned Pat Maginnis of the Association to Repeal Abortion

MAGINNIS PICKETED IN EAST

Pat Maginnis taught two classes on abortion in Ohio last week, and is now threatened with an in-dictment from an Ohio attorney. Pat is the stormy petrel of the Association to Repeal Abortion Laws in California.

She was invited to Oberlin Col-lege to attend a conference on abortion sponsored by the Humanists, the National Student Asso-ciation, and the YWCA. She and three men gave speeches at the conference, and were "well - re-ceived." ceived.

Then she went to Cleveland as a representative for the Association to Repeal Abortion Laws and taught two classes, attended by a total of 335 people.

The classes were picketed by ten carloads of Catholic high school students. The demonstration was orderly but the picketers were

orderly but the picketers were eventually driven away by the rain. It was only after she returned to California that she received the news of a possible indictment. She is charged with violating State Code 2905.32, which forbids prescribing drugs for abortion. However, this is an Ohio state law, not a federal law, Miss Maginnis told BARB. She is fairly confident that the California authorities will not go to the trouble of extraditing her.

"If there were enough pressure, they might do it, but I think it would be too embarrassing for them," she said.

Laws, this week.
"Telephone operators have been intercepting phone calls on the Mexican - American border, and redirecting women to quacks," she told BARB.

She cited the recent case of a woman who had made an appoint-ment with an abortionist in Mexico by calling from the Bay Area. When she reached the American side of the border, she phoned again to confirm the appointment, and an operator intercepted the call and sent her to a butcher.

The woman is now in pretty

bad shape in Oakland.
One Mexican abortionist has had nine phone calls intercepted. "Apparently a phone call from San Francisco will not be inter-cepted, but a phone call from El Paso may be," said Miss Maginnis.

She also sent out a plea for women not to accept lists of a-bortionists casually. The Los Angeles Free Press recently pub-lished a list of abortionists which

lished a list of abortionists which they said was approved by the Society for Humane Abortion.

This list, she said, was not approved by the Society for Humane Abortion, and it is risky for anyone to accept the authenticity of this list, since lists are constantly outdated.

"By publishing this list, they were expressing their freedom of speech and will probably sell more copies," said Miss Maginnis, "but no one gave them permission to print it."

She emphasized that the only

She emphasized that the only reliable list of abortionists is published with weekly supplements by the Association to Repeal Abortion Laws, and can be obtained by writing to PO Box 6083, San Francisco 94101, with a \$5 donation included. "We beg women not to accept lists casually from friends or doctors," she repeated. "HELL, NO!"

BLACKS DROPOUT OF STOP DRAFT **WEEK ACTION**

"Hell, no! Nobody goes!" is the rallying cry of Stop The Draft Week. In the boldest anti-draft demonstration yet. Activists will close the doors of the Oakland Induction Center for as long as possible next week.

Groups of marchers from all over the Bay Area will converge on the Induction Center, through which all of Northern California's

CADC DAY NON-VIOLENT **METHODS** AT CENTER

With this intent, the Civil Action
Committee will stage a mass sitin at the Oakland Induction Center
at 6:00 p.m., Oct. 16.
Protestors, in waves of twenty,
will seat themselves be for a the

doorways of the center. Potential inductees and government employ-ees will be forced to step on top of the bodies if they are to

enter the center.
But no one will be actively stopped from entering the induction center. Instead, the tactics of the non-violent Civil Action Committee are to use persuasion and reason. A dialogue will be es-tablished between protestors and

The inductee can make his own choice about entering the center.
But he must walk over the protestors' bodies.
The demonstration in Oakland is planned to last until 12:00 noon.

planned to last until 12:00 noon. At this point, demonstrators will be bused to the Federal Building in San Francisco, where they will join the Resistance. At least 250 (probably many more) Resistance supporters will turn in their draft cards at 1:00 p.m. The draft cards will be dropped in a box and handed over to U.S. Attorney Cecil Poole. "After two years of marches," says Bob Meriwether, veteran non-violent provocateur, "we feel the time has come to act decisively. We want to make a greater sacrifice than simply walking down the street." Meriwether will lead the support demonstration in Oakland

support demonstration in Oakland on Monday morning, and will turn his draft card in that afternoon.

"We feel that the mood in the country has changed in recent months," says Meriwether, "Ifwe are arrested, the people will be on our side this time, They will see page 14

to Vietnam. Demonstrators will block the doors, block the streets, and block the paths of the sacri-ficial sheep.

The action will kick off on Mon-

The action will kick off on Monday evening, when there will be a rally addressed by Don Duncan, John Gerassi and others.

The rally is no longer scheduled for DeFremery Park in Oakland. At the suggestion of Black resistance groups, the site of the rally and staging area has been changed, to move the action out of the Black ghetto.

Black groups will hold their own rally, addressed by George Ware of SNCC, at DeFremery on the 16th, but the primarily-white antidraft rally will be moved to Prove Park, at Grove and Allston Streets in Berkeley.

Park, at Grove and Allston Streets in Berkeley.

A planned staging area at 17th and Castro in Oakland has also been abandoned at the request of the Blacks, who want to minimize the risk of squads of cops invading the ghetto, The Oakland Induction Center is on the borderline between the downtown area and the ghetto.

After the rally, the demonstrators will proceed to various

After the rally, the demonstrators will proceed to various churches or Pauley Ballroom on UC campus where they will be familiarized with the monitors and briefed on what to expect. They will begin moving out to staging areas at about 5 a.m. on Tuesday by bus and car. There will be no confrontation at the Oakland Border as there was two years ago.

Provocative tactics against policy have been abandoned. "Our objective is the induction center, not the cops," explained Reese Erlich, a member of the STDW Steering Committee.

Monitor training is concentrating

Monitor training is concentrating on maintaining communication with the marchers and protecting them in case of police attack. There will in case or police attack. There will be at least six groups converging on the induction center from dif-ferent directions, rather than a single, vulnerable march. Con-frontation with the police is ex-pected, but arrests will be avoided if they would not contribute to they would not contribute to final objective: closing down

the final objective: closing down the center.

Buses carrying inductees are scheduled to arrive at the center at about 6:30 a.m. on the morning of the 17th. At about 6 a.m. members of a Peninsula contingent will begin picketing the doors of the center, to be sure to be there when they open. They will then block the doors. All expect to be arrested. At the same time, the main groups will arrive from the assembly points. Radio and runner communications will be maintained at all times.

Simultaneously, a picket line will begin at the Oakland Draft Board, 20th and Franklin Streets, for those see page 14

NO HACKLES RAISED AT HUCKLEBERRY

Rev. Larry Beggs of Huckle-erry's wears a button saying,

Rev. Larry Beggs of Huckleberry's wears a button saying, "God isn't dead, Church is!"
Huckleberry's is the house that serves runaway juveniles at No. 1 Broderick Street, just off Waller Street, in San Francisco. It provides hostel housing, food, and council to runaway minors.

Beggs says that since opening June 18 of this year, they've handled over 250 runaways. Half of these were put up overnight. I tried to pin Beggs down for an estimate of what per cent of the total runaways in the Haight-Ashbury Huckleberry's has handled. He won't guess but does admit it's probably only a small part of the total.

Its rules are very simple, intended for self/preservation and survival of the house: No drugs in the rooms, no love making, no alcoholic beverages, no promoting of any thing illicit on the premises, and in by 11 p.m. to avoid hassle with the police through violation of San Francisco's curfew for underlæ's. Two adult house mangers (one male, one female) gently nudge the kids towards compliance.

No attempt is made to regulate the kids' lives when they're not in the house. But, Beggs says, "If a guy's use of drugs seemed to be excessive and he couldn't take care of himself, we'd intervene."

"What we have to offer is unique in the country. People are writing us from Berkeley, Dallas, and many other places for information and advice on how to operate a house like Huckleberry's."
During the summer influx, hip people came to the house with many types of problems having nothing

types of problems having nothing

types of problems naving nothing to do with runaways. Someone came in once and wanted to take a shower. Beggs said simply, "Go ahead," "A carload of young people going to Van Nuys, California needed \$6 for gas. We took them to a gas station for a tank of gas," Beggs said.

station for a said.
"Our basic stand is standing for self - determination. We work with the decision-making process in individuals. We have about thirty volunteer workers, mostly professional.

"The house serves as a forum-neutral grounds sort of not in the courts, not in the parents' house where they have all the power. The chief thing that bothers parents about our approach is the endorse-ment we make of the child's right to make his or her own decisions regarding their destinies. "This is in sharp contrast to the

legal handling of runaways as criminals. Actually, most times the child is running away from an unhealthy home environment and he is seeking a corrective. Running away is the only option he has. If the police are going to pick up anybody, they should pick up the parents."

Huckleberry's is not a permanent

Huckleberry's is not a permanent housing thing; it's a temporary place to stay while getting help from the staff in restructuring the family situation. The longest anybody has stayed is three weeks. The average stay is 24 hours to three days or such.

Kids are only allowed to stay overnight if they allow fuck's to call their parents and their parents approve. If the kids don't want their parents contacted, Huck's is legally forced to turn them away. But in the process, they're given a lot of sympathetic advice and legal information.

a lot of sympathetic advice and legal information.
When a kid arrives and wants to stay they call his parents collect and tell them about Huckleberry's and then tape record the granting of consent for the minor to stay there if the parent gives it. The refuge's sensitive | and humanitarian treating of all parties has even influenced the S.F. police. has even influenced the S.F. police, some of whom now recommend it

to parents.

Beggs is hip and expresses the following position on police harass-

following position on police harassment of runaways:
"Runaways are not a police problem anyway, but a family one. The police view perpetuates the attitude that the runaway is a culprit, but so often he's the only one taking corrective action against an unhealthy crisis situations a dead marriage."

According to Spike Hall, a Huck-

leberry's volunteer worker, they occasionally get youths fleeing from long-time parental brutality. In such cases they help the kids get legal aid for the purpose of legally getting away from their parents.

He mentioned one case of a

parents.

He mentioned one case of a brother and sister, both only twelve years old, who stole a car in Oregon and drove it to San Francisco, "He drove, and to reach the steering wheel he sat on a pillow and a telephone book all the way." Beggs said

pillow and a telephone book all the way," Beggs said.
"In their case, ther was physical violence in the home and a tendency on the father's part toward incestuous behavior with the girl." Huckleberry's helped get them placed in the home of

get them placed in the home of a sensitive uncle. Huck's success has become so well-known that Michigan Governor George Romney included it in his tour of the Haight-Ashbury two weeks ago. No one at Huck's knows why a square business-suited politician like Romney finds it politically useful to visit a hip

with funds from the San Francisco Foundation. Recently the executive director of the Foundation described the kids at Huck's as "nice teen-age kids who are scared and need help."

need help."
It is physically administered by the Glide Foundation, Huck's young directors, minister Beggs and Barbara Brachman, keep it open night and day, seven days a week.
Their phone numbers are 626/1886 and 626-1887. They are one of the few Haight-Ashbury community, services which prospers its

on the few Haight-Ashbury colli-munity services which answers its phones 24 hours a day, Occasional-ly people with problems call there late at night when they are unable to get an answer from anybody else.

to get an answer from anybody else. The house is one of the few places, perhaps the only one, for juveniles in California which doesn't look, taste, and smell like an institution designed by a grey flannel businessman. It has a hip hostel-like atmosphere in which most of the people who come to it feel completely at ease.

Meals are cooked and served coop style with staff help. During the kids' brief stays they're assigned light household work assignments.



While there, Romney was made ware of the presence in the house of two runaways from his home state; unfortunately for the reader, my news source on this will not allow metoreveal what transpired. Huck's is housed in an old black

Huck's is housed in an old black Victorian-style two-story house on the southeast fringe of the Haight-Ashbury. Many of the es-thetic, comfortable rooms inside have been fixed-up by the youngs-ters themselves. Besides a kitchen and downtory rooms the house and dormitory rooms, the house has a large living room which serves as communication center and family session room.

and family session room.

There is also a coffee room with free coffee all the time for parents and the kids. It has a bulletin board, and when I was there the Beatles song "She's Leaving Home" was posted on it.

In August Huckleberry's changed to co-ed housing, in the beginning it housed only girls and males were placed in nearby houses, It switched because not very many girls came to it. Now an almost equal number of both sexes meander in.

Huck's is legal. They don't har-

Huck's is legal. They don't har-Huck's is legal. They don't har-bor the runaways. Rather they persuade the parents to let it op-erate as a go-between in solving the specific family conflict so the child doesn't keep running. The house is currently operated

Huck's sums itself up thus in

one of its reports:

"A major attraction of this emergency - type residence and service may be that it offers a meaningful alternative to the dilemma of being a runaway and fugitive.
The house can provide a considerably better alternative than
police pick-up and incarceration with its concept of punishment and concomitant stigma."

If you or someone you know is on an acid bummer, should you call the LSD Rescur Service?

In recent weeks several have tried to convince BARB that e answer to this question should "no".

Astute BARB readers will have

Astute BARB readers will have noticed the omission of the "LSD Rescue Service" phone number from the last two issues of our "Phrequent Phones".
Rumors were circulated that Hank Harrison and his volunteer

Hank Harrison and his volunteer staff were doing more harm than good, that they were unqualified to perform their chosen function, and, worse, that they were calling in police when a case proved dif-ficult.

Jean Dierkes of San Francisco called to report a disturbing in-cident. She claimed a male friend of hers was 'treated hadly by LSD

of hers was treated badly by LSD

of hers was 'treated badly by LSD
Rescue Service a few weeks ago
while he was on an acid bummer
at Kearney and Broadway.
According to Miss Dierkes, LSD
Rescue Service called in the heat
when they had some difficulty in
getting their patient to settle down.
In addition, several nasty stories
about the Service have been circulated around the Haight, Ashury

lated around the Haight-Ashbury

Free Clinic.

Among these are tales that a pregnant girl who called LSD Rescue Service was told not to worry, "since acid kills babies anyway."

BARB spoke with Hank Harrison, founder and director of the volunteer organization.

Harrison vehemently denied ru-

mors and claimed that Miss Direke's account of the boy on

Broadway was distorted.

"Look, I have a criminal record
myself," he said, "I don't go
around turning people in to the

"Ninety - nine percent of the cases we handle are giving people reassurance over the phone --

reassurance over the phone -hysterical mothers, people on bum
trips who have nobody to talk to,
nobody to tell them that it will pass.
We can teach people how to be
competent on acid, how not to
get themselves killed."

Harrison continued, "we've
handled about 2,000 rescues in the
last few years. Of these we've
had to call for an emergency ambulance seven times, when the
person obviously needed medical
attention.

person obviously needed medical attention.

"In a few of these seven cases,"
Harrison said, "the hospital people -- not us -- called in the police. And no one has gotten busted from any of these."

BARB confirmed that no arrest resulted from the appearance of the police in the case of the Broad-

the police in the case of the Broad-

way boy.

Meredith Andrews, who helped effect the volunteer rescue in that particular case, says the boy was not on acid at all, but was insane, and an escapee from the Langley-Porter Neuro-psychiatric Insti-

Eleven males and three females sunbathed and swam totally nude

One doctor's objection is that "they have no medically trained person on their staff. Even the judgment of whether or not to call an ambulance is a medical decision and they are not qualified to make it, although I am sure they are sincere and well intentioned people."

Unfortunately, according to many people who are having bad drug experiences are either unable

drug experiences are either unable or afraid to obtain the services of

a doctor.
Since much of Harrison's "drug
rescue" work requires only experrescue?' work requires only experience and compassion, they feel that LSD Rescue Service is performing a valuable and thankless service for the community.

It is nevertheless true that they are not qualified to make medical indements.

judgments.

The potential caller of the service must weigh these factors against each other and make his own decision.

H ASH BUSTS RAISE RASH OF PROTESTS

Police were caught with their pants down in the Haight-Ashbury

pants down in the Haight-Ashbury this weekend, Daily "sweeps" by special squads ordered by the Chief re-placed routine raids, Obstensibly to find truants and runaways, they

to find truants and runaways, they found something else - determined opposition.

Beginning with a pre-dawn raid Friday morning, the cops began making the daily sweeps of Haight Street. The biggest on Monday afternoon put 35 in paddy wagons, with ten later released, The Monday "clean-up" was unusual also because it took place in broad daylight. daylight.

I was there for the post-mid-night Monday maneuver. It was two a,m, and bars were closed. The street was nearly desolate unlike the crowded daytime. It was rather cool with fog rolling in, when the cops turned on their heat.

heat.

I followed the police as they marched three and four abreast down the sidewalk. Everyone in their way was stopped. Some were questioned briefly; most were hauled into waiting paddy wagons.

The attack was deliberate, determined. I saw the officers exchange smiles frequently as they approached people simply sitting on the sidewalk or talking in small groups.

on the sidewalk or talking in small groups.

Twelve hours later the fuzz did it again, only in broad daylight and with more officers. Their orders were from the top ... unlike other raids originating from the nearby Park Police Station.

In press statements later, Chief Thomas Cahill said more similar sweeps can be expected "until there are not numerous juveniles roaming the streets ... and ... because motorcycle gangs are attempting to take the place over."

Bike riders were not among those arrested, witnesses reported.

those arrested, witnesses reported.

At a community meeting called Tuesday to protest the police action, leaders said fundamental rights were being violated.

Allen Cohen, publisher of the Oracle, said: "Police with black gloves and black marias are violating the Bill of Rights,"

"There are no expenditions in

gloves and black marias are violating the Bill of Rights,"

"There are no exceptions in that document regarding age or length of hair," Cohen said. He told newsmen that lawyers were checking the legality of "Cahill's razzia" - - referring to the police saturation of the Haight-Ashbury.

The cops swooped into pads as well as the street, during the week-end, Michael Thompson, 23, of San Francisco was in his pad with 8 others.

"The (cops) came in plain clothes and refused to produce proper identification," Thompson said, "The officers claimed they were looking for runaways and seemed disappointed because none of his guests fit descriptions (of kids) counts by wellies. his guests fit descriptions (of

of his guests fit descriptions (of kids) sought by police.
"The officer told me he didn't need a search warrant as he tore my pad apart," Thompson added.
"The cops left my pad unlocked after hauling us off to jail, .almost everything was stolen." was Thompson's bewildered comment on the deadly weekend.
"The bust on Monday afternoon was a rotten show" is how Hetty McGee, a British subject working on the Oracle staff, described it.

"There should be other methods of catching truants and runaways rather than being so nasty about

of catching truants and runaways rather than being so nasty about it," she said.

Most of the 35 arrested Monday were suspected of violating City truancy or runaway codes, according to Sergeant Ralph Schaumleffel, who headed the 13-man special Tactical Squad dragnet.

One of the arrested "truants" was 32 years old,
"Happening House" Wednesday night announced an emergency conference to cope with the "Runaways and Rushaways." The conference hopes to combine police, parents, juvenile authorities, and volunteer runaways.

"Jail sentences for children, destroyed psyches and parental guilt seem, for the time being, to be all that our present approaches a re accomplishing," says Leonard Wolfe of Happening House. He added: "the recent arrests in the Haight-Ashbury are surely not the most creative approach to an anguishing problem."

His hand forced by Sonoma County "justice," Lou Gottlieb last Friday reluctantly arrested 15 of his friends.

Gottlieb owns the land near Seb-

astopol that became Morning Star, a woodsey retreat from the tech-nological meatgrinder. A judicious application of local law made him

nological meatgrinder. A judicious application of local law made him close down Morning Star and arrest lingering residents despite his efforts to comply with a long sequence of codes and ordinances.

If he had not removed the tenants from his 32-acre site, the court would have fined him \$500 for each day they remained. Of the 15 who stayed to be arrested, many wanted to see whether the law could really force a man to bust his friends on his own land. The girls arrested were bailed out. The men refused bail.

Although Judge Mahan had given the residents until the end of October to comply with the health and safety codes, he also ordered the dwellers at Morning Star to be out by October 4.

Since the rash of visitations by inspectors, the residents have been scurrying to comply with code after code, Six operating to lets were installed, a septic tank approved, debris was removed, structures were torn down, a bath house was built.

Judge Mahan was apparently not

built.

Judge Mahan was apparently not impressed by the defense attorney's argument that most of the offending conditions had already been corrected, and every effort was being made to comply with every code.

He was equally unmoved by the testimony of two county officials that the Morning Star residents were cooperative.

were cooperative.

"I am concerned only with violations of law," the Judge said.
Morning Star residents, however, allege that the law is deliberately being used to wipe them out, and that the real issue is not allowed to be spoken in court.

The real issue, they say, is that some local residents just don't like the hip style of life in the woods.

The injunction granted by Judge Mahan forbids, among other things, that any human being should walk naked or fornicate within view of of the road.

Gottlieb, at last report, intends to continue to try to comply with all the codes. A crew living on a nearby farm goes to Morning Star

Judging from some new records from the underground companies the idea is common thruout the hip community in this country, and judging from the music on these records it is not sufficient alone to create a viable new music. If the thought interests you consider the thought interests you, consider

these recordings:

1 - Takoma C 1007, "Black
Lotus - Hymn to Fugen" Robbie
Basho and various others playing
in New York in 1964. The man who got the group together was attempt-ing to evolve a music by having untrained musicians play together as they wished, in the hopes that a group consciousness would emerge over a period of several months. Basho was never quite integrated into the group, but he was close enough to provide some test of the idea.

was close enough to provide some test of the idea.

2 - Riverboat 3 "The songs all 7 - 70": There are 2 vocalists and five instrumentalists on the 40 minute piece, playing electric guitar, violin, flute, suling, xylophone, alto sax, classical guitar (gut strings), clarinet, shenai, bass recorder, mandolin, so-na, hawaiian guitar (slide), koto, soprano recorder, chimta, cor anglais, sitar, bansari, tabla, dholak, nequerra, bass, trumpet, cornet, jazz drums. One man plays nineteen of them, in succession.

According to the liner notes, by the composer, the music "is ritualistic & goes back to where I anyway think music should be/ or at least came from."

Judging from the way in which the recording was rehearsed and arranged, he believes he can give the instrumentalists a great deal of latitude: "A libretto of eight pages was prepared. The vocalists were not told how to sing it. They could go backwards or repeat any section if they wanted to. There

could go backwards or repeat any section if they wanted to. There was no score. The only instruction given the instrumentalists was this: no playing behind the koto or classical guitar. I had several rehearsals with each of them, mostly individually. The session leaded

hearsals with each of them, mostly individually. The session lasted thru two takes, this is the second."

I find the music similar to the new jazz on ESP, altho not as unpleasant in its tones, and I can not really relate to either well enough to tell if they are well done.

However, I tend to accept the composer's evaluation "The music was months in conception, is, I think, at least might be, an important piece of music," but I'm not certain of what to do with the music. How is it to be listened

FAIRE BEGGARS DESCRIPTION

Although I generally deplore Southern California and its 18th century freaks, I'm very thankful for Ron and Phyllis Patterson, a Los Angeles couple whose love for the past outdoes Orange Coun-

ty by two hundred years.

For without the Pattersons, there would have been no Renaissance Pleasure Faire. And that would be a most unfortunate loss

indeed.

Despite an occasional paper cup or litter-basket, the Pleasure Faire comes close to obliterating the 20th century. As one walks down the dusty path to the woods one meets with jesters and noblement country wenches with years. men, country wenches with goats in tow, trollops with bared breasts a-jiggle, wandering monks and staggering lepers. Below, the motley flags, banners

Below, the mottey Hags, banners and canopies can be seen fluttering above the dozens of stalls that snuggle against the trees. Potters, silversmiths, leather-workers, calligraphers and taverners lure you into their shops. Streets vendors crowd about to sing the praises of their particular line of goods.

Despite my earnest advice to others, I went to the Faire without a costume, and was immediately welcomed as a "visitor from the 20th century."

And, alas, I was. I walked about feeling as though Rod Serling had just thrust me through the twilight zone with a flub-stub. I was sadly out of step with the

And it's not hard to feel that And it's not hard to feel that way, since most people—in or out of costume—eventually begin to groove with the era. A boy at the archery stand offered to split the arrow which one man had just impaled in the apple that served for a bull's eve.

impaled in the apple that serveu for a bull's eye.

It was like that almost every-where you wandered, although the idioms occasionally got a bit mixed: a female leper warned a friend--"Sit next to me and you'll

get leprosy, baby."

Aside from the vendors, enter-

tainers of all sorts were scat-tered about the grounds. There were, of course, the madrigal sing-ers, and the lutenists, but a careful ear could occasionally pick out blues or flamenco guitarist un-

a blues or flamenco guitarist under a tree.

The Faire's main arena, however, is the Greenwood Theatre. Here are the jugglers and the acrobats, and the participants in a number of rather ribald plays. And it is here, too, that the Court of the Dusty-Footed holds session—last Sunday a lusty wench was tried and found guilty of witchcraft and the pox.

I could, as they say, go on and on, but there's not much point in it. If you REALLY want to know what the Faire is like, go this Saturday or Sunday. And try to get there before the for-mal procession at noon. (Tick-ets, \$2.50, \$1.00 for children un-

"Freedom of choice dictates that one's right to smoke marijuana must not be disregarded, "We are willing to demonstrate

and prove that we are good citizens, inferior to no person whether he smokes marijuana or not. "It is our wish that we could reveal the broadness and beauty of

those who have come to support those who have come to support our movement: doctors, lawyers, teachers, dentists, students -- all with much to lose. We also wish to thank the people of Haight-Ashbury, who illuminated our lives."

Affidavit forms are now available through High Hinchilliffe, 255 Green St., Mill Valley.

DOUBTS ON HIS DEATH

by Hal Verb

The reported death of Che Guevara at the hands of Bolivian police is doubted by Latin American expert John Gerassi.

Gerassi, an editor of "Ramparts" magazine, told an audience of 500 last Tuesday that the Bolivian government claimed it had matched the fingerprints of the hastily-buried body with those of the Cuban revolutionary. Gerassi noted that only the Cuban government had Che's fingerprints and that not even the CIA could have gotten them.

He spoke to the North American Congress on Latin America on

Congress on Latin America on "Cuba: The New International." He has recently returned from the Organization of Latin American Solidarity (OLAS) Conference in

Gerassi told of the profound influence Che Guevara exerted on the conference without even being present. His role was to show that there was no such thing as Cuban nationalism apart from other revolutions in Latin America and the rest of the world. He showed that their fight was literally the fight of every guerilla and re-volutionary who had taken uparms.

"Numbers and structure don't make a revolution," said Gerassi. "Example does. And the program comes out of the experience," Gerassi told of the improvement

in intellectual freedom he had ob-served since his last visit in 1964. As an example he cited the case of a group of Cuban students who had complained to Fidel Castro about the stultifying Russian textbooks they had.

books they had.

Castro suggested that they publish their own textbooks. The students did just that, and were soon publishing works by Trotsky and others. When Castro heard of this, he offered one student the position of heading the Book Publishing Institute. The student accepted and the Institute began several other enterprising efforts.

Gerassi said that the Cuban government has never lost its contact

Gerassi said that the Cuban government has never lost its contact with the people. "The Cuban government runs as a guerilla movement," he noted.

Bureaucracy, the main obstacle in the path of the Revolution, has been "cut tremendously" since Gerassi's last visit in 1964.

Referring to the OLAS conference, Gerassi said that it was the birth of a "new international" with Cuba as its center.

"Cuba puts you on the spot," he said, "It says; What are you? If you're a revolutionary — then put up or shut up!"

TROOP TRAINS BACK; WILL **COUNCIL ACT?**

The Santa Fe Railroad and the military are extremely uptight about the topic of troop trains these

Numerous sightings of what ap-pears to be passenger trains loaded with GI's have been reported in the past week

BARB contacted Santa Fe's Mr. Groundwater in his office at 114 Sansome St., San Francisco, and asked if troop trains have recently

crossed Berkeley.
"That," Groundwater growled drily, "would be classified information."

BARB next took the question right to the warhorse's maw -- the Western Area Military Traffic Management and Terminal Service at the Oakland Army Ter-

Service at the Oakland Army Terminal.

"What's your interest?" the sergeant on duty bridled. "It's none of your business. I can't tell you a thing."

"Can we say you will neither confirm nor deny?" BARB teased.

"That's right," the sergeant said.

"That's right," the sergeant said.

If the troop trains are once again steaming through Berkeley, it is not necessarily due to any covert collusions between the city fathers and the Pentagon mothers. It's perfectly "legal" and required no particular attention from the Berkeley City Council.

In fact some of the Councilmen, while directly responsible for the recent invasion of the troop trains, may still be entirely unaware of their presence.

may still be entirely unaware of their presence.

This is the paradoxical situation that has stemmed from City Council Resolution 3629 N.S. Last month the Council again passed--unanimously--this resolution.

The effect was to grant Sante Fe railroad the right to operate the trains on the company spurtransversing West Berkeley.

The City Council routinely votes "aye" on the resolution each time it has come up -- every three

it has come up -- every three months. The Resolution is a formal 90 day extension of the waiver which in August 1965 first per-mitted troop trains to use Berkeley as a back alley to the Oakland Army Terminal and Vietnam. When the trains came to Ber-keley in 1965, several hundred

Berkeleians stood on the tracks near the Sante Fe depot on University.

In that week the Vietnam Day Committee was galvanized. The trains came back -- equipped now with special attachments to lose scalding steam towards demon-strators from the hood of the en-

After the third confrontation-After the third commontation-with mounting numbers of pro-testors more injuries, increasing risk of death, and nationwide pub-licity very embarassing to the Johnson administration--the troop trains, under a smokescreen of vague allibis on the behalf of Army

vague and so the benail of Army spokesmen, withdrew from Ber-keley.

It was assumed then that troop trains would never again trouble Berkeley.

There the matter rested, Except

for or the City Council's seasonal eflex act of extending Resolution

3629.
Ironically, the same City Council passed another resolution on August 22 of this year and sent copies to LBJ, Thomas Kuchel, George Murphy and Jeffery Cohelan.

Passed by

Passed by a 6 to 1 vote, Resolution 42,030 stated; "That it is the belief of this Council that the greatest task of the City and of our nation is to correct the ills of our society, unemployment, under-education and discrimination; that continuace of the war under-education and discrimina-tion; that continuance of the war in Vietnam is a detriment to the pursuance of that task; that it is our belief this nation should com-mit itself with all possible speed to direct its wealth, brains and policies toward the vital domestic problems of our people at this time."

The Council was justly applauded

time."

The Council was justly applauded for this eminently sane and responsible statement. But they should also be held to it.

Resolution 3629 will have to be extended once more in 1967 if Berkeley is to continue its cooperation with conscription, the war and domestic gutherks on those war and domestic cutbacks on those bleeding social wounds which the Council would seem to favor. The moral is: the resolution need not be passed.







eral District Court on Thursday, Oct. 12 by the noted local civil rights attorneys Francis Heisler and Peter Franck on behalf of 56 citizens who represent a cross-section of professions, trades and levels of society. Each plaintiff orginally filed for a refund using the IRS Form 843, requesting the return of that percentage of their income tax used to finance either the war in Vietnam (17% in 1966) or military expenditures in general (67% in 1966.)

grounds for the claimants' are that their taxes were

illegally collected because (1) the US participation in the Vietnam was is in violation of the US ob-ligations under the UN Charter; (2) US conduct in the war has constituted a crime against peace and humanity; and (3) US activities in Vietnam are in violation of the US Constitution; compulsory participation in these activities (as in paying taxes to finance war) is contrary to their conscience and thus violates the First Amendant ment.

Impotency is the inability to have a erection or the inability to have i orgasm. Though impotency ends to increase after the age of the control 40 it is not a normal part of the aging process. As a medical stu-dent I treated an 83 year old man who had suffered a heart attack shortly after masturbating. He had recently been discharged from another hospital after prostate sur-gery and was just making sure all

was intact.
Usually no physical cause can be found for impotency though occasionally a surgically correctable circulatory defect may be the cause, Males of any age concerned with an impotency problem should consult their physicians. Often, a course of psychiatric treatments is beneficial.

QUESTION: We have been moistening our grsss and then putting it away in a warm place until a white and eventually blue-green mold appears. This seems to alter the effect considerably (for the better). What kind of mold is it and can it do any harm?
ANSWER: It is probably a happy mold. Positive identification of molds is usually possible only by direct examination. A mycologism in the Botany Department of a college could make such an identification. Perhaps you've made an important discovery-after all penicillin was originally made from molds. More likely the change you note is due to aging of the marijuana. The procedure consists of anesthetizing 2 small areas of the scrotum, making small incisions and severing both vas deferens, two spaghetti-like structures which transport sperm.

Ejaculation and orgasm normally continue as before since sperm

any continue as neitre since spent of the total seminal fluid volume.

The chief objection raised against vasectomies is that the resulting sterility is usually permanent. Too many cases arise in which a man later changes his mind and wishes to have children. Attempts to reunite the severed ends of the vas deferens are most

often unsuccessful.

Resist the draft—Help end the war

We call upon all men and women, ineligible for conscription, to declare their support of all young men who are openly resisting the draft.

- An ever growing number of young American men are finding that the American War in Vietnam so outrages their deepest moral and religious sense that they cannot contribute to it in any way.
- We and others throughout the country, like the majority of Americans not among those called upon to offer our lives in Vietnam, share this moral outrage. We believe that any American citizen is morally bound and legally justified in exerting every effort to end this war, to avoid collusion with it, and to encourage others to do the same.
- Therefore, we call upon all men of good will to join with us in the following statement, if they believe as we do that we must step forward at this time with those young men who are openly resisting an unjust military draft serving a disastrous military policy.

A CALL TO RESIST

The fundamental immorality and increasing brutality of our nation's course in Vietnam compels us to commit our lives to changing that course. Responsibility lies with each of us. The killing must be stopped. We stand with those young men who in the American tradition of civil disobedience refuse to submit to an unconscionable military draft. We ourselves are not eligible for the draft, but we publicly announce our individual and joint complicity in disobeying this law, along with the young men who are refusing the draft.

We do not undertake this action lightly. We are keenly aware of the penalties which may be exacted for this action:

Universal Military Training and Service Act, Section 12, Penalties. Any person who . . knowingly counsels, aids or abets another to refuse . . . registration or service in the armed forces . . . shall upon conviction in any district court of the United States . . . be punished by imprisonment for not more than five years or a fine of not more than \$10,000 or by both . .

We explicitly encourage, aid and abet this civil disobedience and thus place ourselves in equal legal jeopardy with draft refusers. We cannot leave them to take the risks alone for what is the basic act of conscience in our time.

I subscribe to the above statement of the Committee for Draft Resistance.



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
