# SAN QUENTIN CONS TO STRIKE



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**15¢ BAY AREA 20¢ ELSEWHERE**

Convicts at San Quentin will refuse to report to work at the prison industries on February 15, 1968.

For the first time in the history of California penitentiaries, the convicts are able to tell their plans and purposes to the public in advance of their action, before the official version is spoon-fed to the mass media.

From behind the walls, bars, and gunrails of California's ultimate prison, the convicts have communicated with the BARB in extensive detail. How it was done will probably never be told.

Only the real underground of imprisoned men can tell you the truth about San Quentin prison. Freedom of the Press, including all your mass media, stops at the wall.

But under the noses of their guards, a group of San Quentin convicts has published a true underground newspaper, illegally, every week since June 1967. "The Outlaw," printed by mimeo or ditto process, continues to appear on schedule throughout the prison despite the fact that all duplicating machines are now kept locked except in the presence of an official.

The "goon squad," a special group of security officers, has been relentlessly shaking down cells and inmates suspected of working on the forbidden paper. So far they've failed. "The Outlaw" continues to appear weekly on the warden's desk.

Similar illegal papers have begun at Folsom and Soledad: "The Outlaw II" and "The Rebel."

If they catch an inmate reading "The Outlaw," they put him in the hole for up to 29 days. The hole — any of the isolation cells in B section — is stripped bare. Outstretched hands can touch the side walls. Five bleak, flat surfaces, a door of steel bars, and a hole in the floor to empty your bowels into, for a month.

While the con is in the hole, the Warden will be smiling at the press cameras, posing with a copy of "The Outlaw" in his hand, as if it's just a harmless prank no one really cares about.

The press is not allowed inside the wall, past the flowered green area of the administration building just inside the fragile fence. When word of trouble at San Quentin leaks out, you hear only what the prison

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# NATION-WIDE EMERGENCY DEMO CALL

Emergency demonstrations in support of Dr. Benjamin Spock and four other anti-war spokesmen are being urged for this Monday by The National Mobilization Committee.

Spock and the others, Rev. Wm. Sloane Coffin, Marcus Raskin, Mitch Goodman, and Michael Ferber, face arraignment Monday in Federal Court in Boston. In response to this, demonstrative action is planned for Monday at federal buildings, induction centers and draft boards throughout the country.

Arrested during the October Stop the Draft week demonstrations in New York, the men are charged with "conspiracy" and "aiding and abetting" anti-war protestors. The five men indicted have already announced that they welcome this opportunity to bring the legal and moral issues of the war before the American people.

Although no organizations have announced specific action in the Bay area on Monday, over 70 organizations and individuals are sponsoring an appearance by Dr. Spock on Sunday, February 4, at the Berkeley Community Theatre.

His topic is as yet unannounced, but tickets may be purchased at the Theatre Box Office. Price of admission is \$1.25. Within the next week further information will be available at the Community for New Politics and the Peace and Freedom Party office, 549-0690.

## VETERAN PACIFIST SHAFTED

Roy Kepler, the Bay Area's best known pacifist, was convicted last week on a charge he had not asked for.

"Maliciously and knowingly aiding and abetting a criminal act" was the charge brought against the veteran non-violent activist by Oakland cops. He was arrested during a sit-in anti-draft protest which he had organized with the cops' help.

Kepler committed the high crime of posting scouts to warn of the approach of busses bearing inductees to the Oakland Induction Center. He also told a sit-in that another doorway was free.

The cops had been told exactly what Kepler was going to do in advance, and never raised any objection to it then. This raises the possibility of entrapment. Kepler was arrested by undercover agents participating in the demonstration.

The jury included a Mrs. Harmon who admitted that she was prejudiced against anti-draft demonstrators, but the judge thought that she was all right. Oakland justice rolls on.

The message was clear. You're gonna get you regardless, so they might as well make it worthwhile.

## CDC LOCAL BACKS FIGHT FOR JUSTICE

The latest entry into the field of people and organizations demanding a re-opening of the Garza case in Hayward is the local chapter of the CDC.

The Peace and Freedom Party, however, was there from the beginning.

As regular readers of the BARB know by now, Gilberto Garza was shot to death by Hayward Police on Nov. 10th and the incident was quickly covered up. However, the first significant Mexican-American movement in the East Bay grew up to protest the incident.

United Latins for Justice has been picketing the Hayward City hall for the past two weeks and plans to continue this Saturday. Political action is being planned against mayor "Big Jack" Smith. ULFJ has had the support of the PFP for at least those two weeks.

The CDC now "vigorously supports the Latins United for Justice in their efforts to obtain a fully open public investigation to bring out all the facts".

## IN MEMORIAM: Stanford E. Seidner

Stan Seidner died last Sunday night, January 21, 1968. He was 47 when he lost the all-too-brief struggle with his severely deteriorated heart. For those who knew him, the loss is incalculable.

Since 1943, Stan was an integral member of the Berkeley "Community." In some sense, Stan, who was a part of every scene, almost predated the scenes themselves. He was, you might say, the "Patron Saint" of Telegraph Avenue. In his many hours at the Mediterranean (the Piccolo, it was, for those who remember) and the Albatross (or the Steppenwolf before that) he was father confessor to a most catholic congregation.

As an individual he was unique. He was talented (how often we had the pleasure of his gifted cello playing), remarkably intelligent, and a superb raconteur. His mind ranged easily, with plangent irony and subtle brilliance, over extraordinarily diverse territory. While he was fascinated by mathematics, medicine and psychology, and bitterly incisive on politics, his scope was fundamentally Rabelaisian, with pornography and lechery comprising its mainstays. (He was, of course, a charter member of the Society of the Dirty Old Men.) But above all, he was supremely sensitive to the feelings, thoughts, and secrets of the many people he talked with and knew.

He was not without his foibles. Those who loved him will remember wryly; those who scorned him will remember guiltily. For all, however, his absence leaves a painful chasm to be filled only with wistful memories. In his honor, and in expression of their love and grief, his friends are planning a memorial concert to be given at the Albatross. The date will be announced in the BARB.

## STATEWIDE PFP PLANNING MEET HERE

The Peace and Freedom Party Interim Committee will hold its second statewide meeting this weekend in Berkeley. On the agenda are several policy decisions and plans for the statewide convention will be made. Included also are appraisal of the nature and function of the convention, a decision on site and time, and an establishment of convention platform, structure, rules and arrangements.

PFP placed on the California ballot with an official count of over 105,000 registrants.

BARB talked to representatives of the Alameda county PFP organization committee and the SF Interim PFP.

Each group has set up a different structure to organize and select delegates to the weekend meeting.

After deliberating last weekend, Alameda County delegates decided upon the Convention organization that they will vote for. It is a one man, one vote approach, with the addition of a measure to safe-

guard any minority legislation: a two-thirds vote would be needed to pass anything dealing with minority groups.

Alameda delegates are still uncertain as to how delegates to the Convention will be selected within the county.

In SF, the PFP is set up in a different manner. Representatives to this weekend's meeting have not been instructed how to vote by area headquarters. Instead, 18

separate neighborhood and special interest groups will each send delegates to the meeting, in an attempt to keep the politics down to grass-roots level.

The 18 delegates will attend the meeting and report back to their own groups about policy decisions.

When the delegates to the statewide convention are decided upon, the SF area coordinating committee will dissolve. If this type of structure is successful, the PFP expects much larger numbers of people to be interested in what is actually going on.

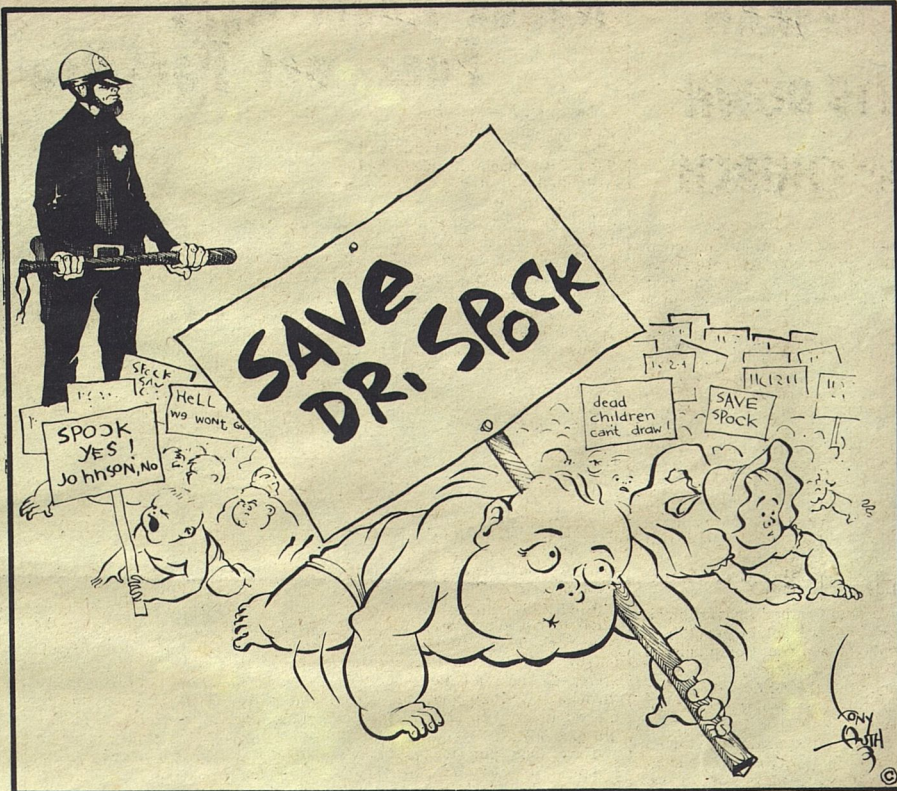
To finance the operation, meanwhile, the SF committee is planning to request that each SF area registrant donate \$1 per month.

## LENNY COMES OUT FIGHTING

Back in the good old days, when we were still liberals, there was an outrageous anarchist who inhabited the Telegraph Avenue area and would hold forth for hours at the corner of Bancroft and Telegraph arguing about all and sundry.

He attracted huge crowds at times and thus invented the UC rally as we now know it.

"As I recall, he used to be absolutely crazy," says a girl friend of mine about Lenny Glaser. I didn't know him then, being a good little engineer who would hurry past the gatherings to get on with my homework, but from what I heard then, I shared that opinion.

Lenny advocated the legalization of marijuana among other things, and sure enough, he was caught with some and arrested.

Nobody much came to his support because, well, his cause was sort of unpopular and nobody wanted to stick their neck out,

even though they knew he was right.

So Lenny got railroaded away to jail on a felony rap and we all got busy with the Free Speech Movement and the other events which brought about the radicalization of the campus.

Nobody would call Lenny crazy now. He's simply a little more radical than most of us, and certainly more articulate. A lot of us have come around to his viewpoint on a number of questions.

Lenny is out of jail and I was privileged to hear his first political rap on the outside. It took several hours and would have gone on forever if we hadn't run out of tape and time. I certainly can't relate it in all its detail, but I can give my impressions and the bare facts.

Lenny is down on liberals; very hard. Liberals all along the line made him a felon who has to register as a "narcotics addict" (for half a joint). But perhaps he doesn't yet realize that all the rest of us are almost as hard on liberals as well; the Vietnam war is their war, after all.

At any rate he is going to fight them on the marijuana question. He has already offered to undergo a medical examination of any sort while smoking pot before legislative committees investigating the subject, before the jury that originally convicted him, and before the Supreme Court. Nobody would take him up.

Lenny will resume his battle by bringing suit to enjoin the state from requiring him to register as an addict. While in jail he has done an awful lot of reading and legal work. He has a stack of briefs, petitions and transcripts several feet thick to show for his efforts.

A listener commented that it seemed the same thing is happening to Lenny as happened to Lenny Bruce; he is turning into a lawyer.

Lenny intends to go to law school; on the University's money. He will sue the University for \$50,000 and expects to win.

It was a University policeman who called up his probation officer when Lenny made a speech at the police car on September 30th 1964 during the opening incident of the FSM. On the basis of the speech he was put away for violation of probation. Lenny figures that they are liable for damages.

The campus will also be hearing from Lenny through other than legal channels. He will resume his old place at Bancroft, and expects to do much better than before.

"I used to be a passable speaker, but I was just a cub then. Are they going to hear from me now!" he says.


In jail he was a librarian and earned the title "the professor". He read his way through what sounds like a ton of books and compiled "Lenny's proverbs"

from his readings. He included the Bible in his readings and looks forward to taking on Hubert and the other evangelists by line and verse.

Lenny has also become addicted to realpolitik. He criticized the BARB for carrying gay ads and not appealing to the middle class masses (even though he had not up to that point been able to read us) and was enthusiastic in discussing the Peace and Freedom Party and electoral politics. He is out to win.

His salient feature is that he is a first-class gold star rap artist. He can talk for hours on subjects of his choosing and keep it absorbing throughout. The New Committee will be enlisting his talents from Feb 6-18th (except Mondays). 836 Montgomery St. is the address.

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# GLIDE MAN PUTS DOWN HIP CHURCH

 Glide Methodist, that pioneer of modern, contemporary religion in San Francisco, got uptight last week and locked its doors on a happening.

Several fellows from the Haight started a "Free Church" communion, but things got too hot for the Glide Foundation people, and they called it off -- locked the doors.

"We don't bad trip those guys," said Rev. Ted McIlvanna, in an exclusive BARB interview. "They wanted to create a happening in the small chapel of Glide on Taylor Street. But, they refused to take any responsibility."

Glide apparently has better things to do. "We would rather fight for black power. We've got bigger things to do" (than Free Communion?) said R.V. McIlvanna, paid staff member of the Glide Foundation which finances projects of Glide Church.

"Money talks again," retorted Al Rinker of Switchboard, one of the Haight's leaders who tried vainly to get the Free Church concept moving at Glide. "Monied people behind the Foundation got up-tight about drums some of the kids used during the chapel happening."

"It has nothing to do with money," Rev. McIlvanna argued. "Some of these kids even lit a small fire in the chapel after removing some of the pews. We o-k'd removing pews, but not a fire."

Inspection of the chapel last Sunday showed no damage to the church property.

"The Free Church concept means full, total freedom, continuously. It means the church has to take a risk," Rinker explained. "The walls might get re-painted by an artist. Or a dancer may dance all night or troubled kids may pray."

Glide wasn't ready for this kind of freedom. It locked the chapel doors after only three days of the experimental "Free Communion."

Hopefully, the Unitarian Church at Franklin and Geary streets will pick up on the experiment. A delegation from the Haight met with Unitarian officials Wednesday night. Reception was thoughtful, but very cautious.

"They want to talk it over with Glide," Rinker said. "They objected to the blunt sense of urgency projected by Art Lisch during discussions." Lisch had been quite direct, but honest. His idea was a chapel open 24-hours a day for meditation, music, food, whatever people needed.

In pushing this concept, Art is supported by Ron Thelin and Al Rinker.

It meant freedom. It meant a risk, one that might frighten away some "regular" members. Unitarians want time to mull this over, in other news of the haight this week...

The Hip Job Co-Op has been moved to the All Saints Episcopal Church on Waller St. Troubles over rental agreement violations, friction between those running it, and other nuisance problems, finally put an end to the separate Co-Op facilities.

A long-haired photographer plans to file theft charges against unnamed officers of the Park police station today.

Frank Herzog, 28, of Oakland, was busted while shooting a police sweep on Haight street last Friday night. Cops confiscated his camera. He charges they stole his film, then released him an hour later.

# Naked Adam flees Fuzz, not Paradise

Adam fled naked, but it wasn't from Paradise. For the third time since the fall, Adam Feldman last Sunday was running nude in the Bay Area daylight, an escapee from official restraints.

It began last September at San Francisco State College when Adam drew a large crowd with his chilly nude-in, joined at the last moment by Patricia Vawter. They were busted. She got three years probation.

Now, a naked body is not expected to carry an ID, and the officials took Adam's word for it when he said he was 21. He didn't correct that impression until January 5 when he appeared in court. He's really 17. They had to turn him over to the Juvenile Authority.

That, Adam said, is a bummer. It's a bummer because a minor has no rights. On the other hand, he took full advantage of the fact that he's not legally responsible for his actions.

When the Juvenile Authority tried to put Adam on a plane for New York, where his parents live, he broke free from his guard, stripped, and ran bare-asses wild through the SF airport. As guards closed in to grab him, Adam - to all appearances - fainted.

They took him to St. Mary's Hospital in the Haight-Ashbury district. Since he's a minor, they put him in the children's psychiatric ward. Obviously anyone who

makes a point of nudity must be a nut.

They put him, naked, under a restraining sheet and posted a guard. On Sunday afternoon Adam made his move when his watchman left, headed for the can. Knowing he had only a few moments, Adam wriggled out of the tightly-drawn sheets. He bashed out a small screen with his fist, slithered through, scraping his groin, and dropped down from the second story. He heard a commotion starting in the room.

He ran up to a startled girl on the sidewalk, told her the whole story in a few seconds, and convinced her to give him the flowery robe she was wearing over her other clothing. Then he took off toward Haight St., where his garb would seem less unusual.

Adam soon encountered a hip-looking couple, gave his spiel, and traded clothes with the cat as the chick giggled. After all, Adam said, if they pick you up everything would be cool, but if they pick me up they'll find out I'm a fugitive.

Now Adam is in hiding somewhere in the Bay Area, making plans for a return engagement at SF State. This time his nude-in will be aimed not only at expression of sexual freedom, but will be a protest of the scarcity of legal rights for minors.

# PANTHER LAWYER POUNCES ON POLICE

Are the Oakland and San Francisco police in cahoots to stamp out support for Black Panther Huey P. Newton?

Last week, BARB reported the gun-brandishing entry of cops into a Black Panther apartment on an alleged search for stolen furniture.

The Panthers said it was part of a pattern of harassment. They said they would fight back legally.

A letter to the San Francisco Police Commission from Panthers' attorney Charles Garry tells it like this.

"Demand is herewith made," Garry's letter says, "for a disciplinary hearing against any and all of the officers who were involved, either directly or indirectly in breaking down the door without a warrant, and without probable cause, of the premises at (a San Francisco address) at 8:30 am (on January 15)...."

"Not only was the conduct unwarranted, abusive, vulgar, degrading and chauvinistic, but the officers used the most filthy type of vulgarity in expressing themselves in the presence of the parties above named and also other inhabitants of the premises."

"My clients believe, and I agree with them, that this harassment is of the worst type;

that the conduct of the officers and their superiors behind them has political connotations of the worst kind and further is an attempt on the part of the San Francisco Police Department, working with and in conjunction with the Oakland Police Department, to harass and prevent Huey P. Newton from getting a fair trial in Alameda County."

The Panthers have been engaged in a drive to gain support for Black Panther Minister of Defense, Huey Newton, charged with killing an Oakland cop. The results of attorney Garry's letter may give a hint of what kind of a drive the cops have been engaged in.

## NEWTON DEMO DUE

A rally in support of Huey P. Newton, Black Panther Minister of Defense, will be held at 2 p.m. Friday, January 26, when Newton is scheduled to plead not guilty to charges of killing an Oakland cop.

A car pool to the Alameda County Court House rally at 12th & Fallon in Oakland will leave from Telegraph and Bancroft in Berkeley at 1 p.m.

# THE INDICTMENTS DA COAKLEY BOOSTS STOP DRAFT ACTIONS

 Seven organizers of last October's Stop The Draft Week have been indicted on charges of conspiracy.

The five who are in the bay area held a press conference at 11 AM on the Alameda Courthouse steps, and turned themselves in to the Alameda County Sheriff at 11:30 AM on Thursday, Jan. 25.

They are Reese Erlich, Frank Bardacke, Steve Hamilton, Mike Smith and Bob Mandell.

The remaining two, Terry Cannon and Jeff Segal, were out of town. Cannon was on a previously arranged speaking tour and Segal had returned to Chicago where he works with SDS.

"The indictments are an excuse

to crack down on anti-war advocacy and protest," said Lisa Mandel, Bob's wife.

The defendants are charged under section 182.1 of the California Penal Code, which makes it a felony for two or more people to conspire to commit a crime. Mandel and Smith were charged with three "overt acts" each, and the others with one apiece. The "overt acts" were not specified.

Alameda County D. A. Frank Coakley was reported to have said that he had been trying to "get" the defendants "ever since the FSM".

Bail has been set at \$6,250 each. A request will be made today (Friday) for reduction of bail.

Conspiracy charges in connection with demonstrations are extremely rare. The only similar case was the conviction last week of several persons for conspiracy in a similar demonstration held Dec. 5th in Iowa City, Iowa.

The remaining STDW organizers have organized a defense committee and are attempting to raise the money for bail and legal expenses. A rally was held Thursday on the Berkeley campus and another is scheduled for Friday at noon.

The defendants spent Wednesday night putting out a leaflet for the campus entitled "It's Hit the Fan Now, Baby". Portraits of the defendants were gratefully lifted from Berkeley's red-baiting minor daily.

An intensive political defense campaign will probably begin soon. Mandel is a member of the ILWU and labor leaders will probably lend their support as well as leaders of the Black community, educators and religious leaders.

Funds will be needed for the defense. Contributions made out to "Stop the Draft Week Defense Fund" may be mailed to 233 Lake Drive, Berkeley. A table will be available on the UC campus where contributions may be made.

If the DA is attempting to dampen any future anti-war protests, he has failed. Plans are proceeding normally for the next Stop The Draft Week, and will probably be given impetus by the indictments.

The establishment has not moved beyond the well-worn tactic of isolating leaders. They have not yet learned that in the movement leadership comes from below.

Now the defense. Soon the counterattack.

## PICKETS OUT TO STOP DOW AND WAR

A weekly informational picket-vigil will begin 2 p.m. this Friday (Jan. 26) at Dow Chemical's SF plant - 350 Sansome Street.

The picketing was initiated last Saturday by the Ad Hoc Committee Against Dow Chemical (an offshoot of Western Mobilization Against the War).

About 100 unofficial delegates representing a wide spectrum of anti-war views assembled Saturday and produced tentative plans for an uncompromising multi-faceted anti-Dow crusade.

The group's plans include a West Coast boycott against all stores carrying any Dow products, plus a West Coast picket and vigil at all Dow offices and plants.

Civil disobedience and other non-violent forms of protest reportedly will not be discouraged, spokesmen told BARB.

Because of Dow's heavy reliance on government contracts, the Committee plans to tie in a thorough-going tax refusal campaign with its Dow activities.

Statements of non-cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service will be made available for individual endorsement. Burning of tax forms is contemplated.

"Refusal to file or to pay will be encouraged in the same spirit as the refusals of boys to fight in Vietnam," said the spokesman.

## COPS USE OVERKILL ON PL'ERS

A submachine gun and a shotgun were the first thing to catch the eyes of three political activists Tuesday night when they noticed four San Francisco cops in their room.

The three were being picked up on a warrant resulting from their role in the SF State mill-in last December 6. They are charged with trespassing and disturbing the peace.

The heavy artillery of the SFuzz indicates that the uniformed minions of sanctioned violence are consistently following the method made clear at the Nob Hill club-in and in the weapons-heavy raid on a Black Panther apartment last week (see BARB, Dec. 19).

The method is simply overkill or threat of overkill. So far, the method has been directed solely at groups opposed to the established men of power.

When John Levin, Jon McKenney, and Dick Tewes -- all members of Progressive Labor -- were arrested Tuesday they were writing a leaflet. They looked up and saw the snouts of the big guns and four cops already in the room. When they were taken outside and frisked, eight other cops were in evidence. According to one report, the house was surrounded.

Jimmy Garrett, head of the Black Student Union, at SF State, also has a warrant out for him. Same incident, same charges. The SF cops sent five squadcars to his place in the Fillmore, but Garrett wasn't there.

According to an informed source, the rest of the 12 wanted for the mill-in charges are playing it cool.

Bob Broadhead was picked up during the Nob Hill melee, so the cops don't have to look for him; and two others turned themselves in.

## SWP TEAM SHAKES SHASTA

Socialist Workers Party Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates Fred Halstead and Paul Boutelle touring northern California campuses ran into Grange County style resistance at Shasta Junior College in Redding, this past week.

When they requested the college's authorization to distribute SWP literature at a campus table, the Vice-President sought counsel from the city fathers. The City Council voted promptly to ban distribution of the literature on grounds it advocated violent overthrow of the government.

The student who introduced the socialists to the College's Vice-President was summarily suspended by the Board of Trustees of Redding. The student Senate replied by passing a resolution of support for the student and a free speech campus fight may now be brewing.

Meanwhile, Halstead and Boutelle have sought out the ACLU.

# ASK OLE LB, HE'S A PAST MASTER AT IT

Why did they wait until now to bring indictments for conspiracy against the Stop-The-Draft Week leaders?

Why did they just recently convict Roy Kepler, the best-known pacifist in the area, for doing things at a demonstration that have always been considered inconsequential (like posting scouts for the inductees' busses)?

Why have the San Francisco Police suddenly done their best to imitate the Oakland cops?

Why did cops in Iowa City, Iowa beat the hell out of anti-draft demonstrators there last Dec. 5th in exact reconstruction of the Oakland cops' response here on Oct. 17th?

Why were those Iowa City arrested just this week convicted of "conspiracy"?

If you aren't blind and deaf you should already know the answer. Conspiracy. On the part of Ramsey Clark's Justice Department.

There is now a secret unit of the Justice Dept. for draft matters. Six weeks ago it was formed with the announcement that "all US attorneys have been instructed to expedite investigation..." on these cases.

In that announcement Clark went on: "They have also been directed to cooperate with local law enforcement officials and to urge them to vigorously prosecute violations of local laws which may occur in demonstrations against the Selective Service System."

So there it is. The word came down from Washington. And we all know who Ramsey Clark takes his orders from.

## HOUSING PICKET TO CONTINUE

Dissatisfied with the answers given by John Williams, director of Oakland's Redevelopment Agency, a group of citizens plan to continue picketing at three agency offices next week.

## NEW U OUT TO BLOW YOUR MIND

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# Committee Better Late Than Ever

The normal relationship between a theatre and a reviewer is something like love me or hate me, but, for God's sake, don't ignore me. Yet, for the Committee -- whose "new" revue is about six weeks old -- being ignored for a while was the best thing that could have happened.

My initial review -- based on the opening -- was, frankly, not the sort of thing that fills a theatre with hysterical admirers. I didn't think the show was BAD, but neither did I think it came up to The Committee's usual standards. If the review had been printed at that time, that would have been it. But it wasn't, and that, in effect, gave the group a well-deserved second chance.

I saw the show again last week and found that the simple passage of time had converted the weakest performance I had seen to the best -- with no qualifications. The group could literally do no wrong (even in the wholly -- well, mostly -- improvised second show).

The change, of course, owes nothing to divine intervention; it came about, rather, through a process of self-criticism that surpasses in range and acuity anything I -- or any other critic -- could have performed. Honed down in some places and beefed up in others, the first half of the show (the more or less "set" pieces) now stands in perfect fighting trim.

The second half of the show, a wholly improvised pastiche of the day's news, was every bit as effective as the first. At the opening "Harold" (the sketch's code name) was a little shakey; forty-five minutes of straight improvisation without the saving grace of a blackout is no doubt a harrowing experience at first. But now that the honeymoon jitters (but not the honeymoon) are over, "Harold" is solidly in the groove, and brevity no longer seems the soul of wit.

Two further notes, one sweet, one sour: first, The Committee has not -- as I once feared it might -- gone soft on The Great Society. The snappish terrier has yielded to the political mastiff.

The second note is painful but necessary (this hurts me more than it hurts you): Mimi Farina -- whom I adore -- just isn't right (or ripe) for The Committee. I had hoped that time would serve to dissipate her shyness and self-consciousness, but it hasn't. (Suggestion: perhaps Mimi could be used the way the Pitschel Players use Jon Romer: to sing, especially during the "preparation breaks.")

But enough talk. Act. Run to your nearest Committee Revue and get 'em while they're hot.

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# All Over Underground

**REV. KING PREPARES FOR NON-VIOLENT DISRUPTION**

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16 (LNS)-- A group of 40 organizers for Dr. Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference has been assigned to nine U.S. cities to train local residents in non-violent tactics of civil disruption.

The SCLC organizers have been dispatched to Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Newark, New York, and Washington, D.C., but specific targets and plans will not be public until the spring.

**"WAR ON HIPPIES' ESCALATED TO WASHINGTON"**

WASHINGTON, D.C. Jan. 22 (LNS) -- Twenty-three adults, 37 juveniles, and the proprietor of D.C.'s only head shop were arraigned today in the aftermath of a gigantic bust in the Georgetown section of Washington.

Wayne M. Poirer, proprietor of Yonders Wall is under prosecution for "operating an illegal establishment." Police raided the Wall several nights ago, arresting many in the vicinity on charges ranging from actual possession of drugs to, in many cases, association with drug-users (or "being present in an illegal establishment"). Several apartments were also broken into without warrants.

Washington police Sgt. David Paul, professes his intent "to rid Georgetown of all those long-haired drug users and beatniks, just like we did at Dupont Circle."

Police also took one observer and the reporter into custody at the courthouse, without apparent charges.

**GOD IS DEAD ON THOMAS CIRCLE**

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 21 (LNS) -- Nine anti-war demonstrators, disguised as worshippers, were physically removed from Lyndon Johnson's church this morning after they leafleted congregation and choir in reaction to Rev. George Davis' characterization of Eartha Kitt as "ill-mannered, stupid and arrogant."

The cadre, placed in various pews around National City Christian Church, rose during Rev. Davis' sermon, "Making God Real in Your Life." Eight of the nine were forced out by ushers after they distributed about 500 leaflets and the ninth, Michael Lucas, was removed by five men as the congregation broke into applause -- even further disrupting Rev. Davis' attempts at Christian reality.

Dr. Davis had "apologized" to Mrs. Lady Bird Johnson, who was confronted by Miss Kitt's anti-war sentiments last Thursday at the White House, for all Americans "including Negroes who are ill-mannered, stupid and arrogant." The demonstrators apologized "for all Americans, including Christian ministers, who are murderers, war-criminals and racists."

The church decided not to press charges. Johnson wasn't there.

**NEW MEXICAN LIBERATION LEADERS GET NEW CHARGE, STIFFER BOND**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Jan. 22 (LNS) -- Sixteen of 20 defendants from New Mexico's liberation movement, the Alianza Federal de los Pueblos Libres have been charged with "assault with intent to kill" as a result of the shooting June 5 of state cop Nick Sais and ordered to remain in state prison at Corralitos until they produce \$10,000 cash bond or \$20,

000 property bond each.

The 20 were already in jail on charges of killing Rio Arriba County cop and jailer Eulogio Salazar, as the State Supreme Court on Jan. 16 had revoked their bond.

Almost all of the men have large families dependent on them for support. Not only legal defense funds, but also food supplies, have entirely run out for most of them.

The Alianza's general office at 1010 3rd St. NW in Albuquerque has put out an urgent call for funds for bonds and food, and Alianza leaders have also called for telegrams and letters of support and solidarity from around the country.

Protests have been voiced from MAPS in California and H. Rap Brown for SNCC. Other protests to New Mexico governor David F. Cargo are urged.

**RESIST RESIST RESIST**

News of the Resistance here and abroad;

LONDON, Jan. 22 (LNS) -- Folk-singer Marc Ellington became the first American in Britain to publicly refuse induction into the U.S. Army on Jan. 17. He presented his induction orders, scheduled for Eugene, Oregon, to officials at St. Paul's Cathedral here, in a symbolic request for sanctuary.

Ellington, 22, has given concerts on many U.S. campuses. He said he will ask to be allowed to remain in Britain as he cannot return to the U.S. without facing imprisonment.

Another American, Phillip Wagner, has fled to France after working here three months on a visitors' visa since he deserted the U.S. Army. Wagner, who faces 13 years in jail, had been drafted out of the Peace Corps.

NEW YORK, N.Y., Jan. 22 (LNS) -- Two persons in Chicago and two in New York have received maximum prison terms for draft refusal in the last two months, Daniel Fallon and Dennis Riordan are members of the Chicago Area Draft Resistors (CADRE). The New Yorkers are Edward Oquendo of Youth Against War and Fascism and John Prince.

Fallon, sentenced most recently was denied bail January 19 and was dispatched immediately to a cell by Judge James Parsons.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 22 (LNS) -- Federal court here handed down three indictments for draft refusal on January 16. The defendants are Bruce Schmiechen, formerly an SDS staff member in Chicago; Eugene Copeland, who said he is a Black Muslim and opposed to "fighting a white man's war;" and Ronald Wilson.

**CARMICHAEL RAPPED IN N.W.**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Jan. 17 (LNS) -- The speakers committee of the Associated Students at the University of New Mexico have invited Stokely Carmichael to speak on Feb. 21, third anniversary of Malcolm X's murder. A fee of \$1,500 would be paid to him -- the minimum paid to ASU-NM speakers.

But a hue and cry over Carmichael's appearance has been whipped up and egged on by the NBC outlet, KOB and KOB-TV, and the American Legion, statewide; the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, the Retirement Association, and local right-wing groups are all calling for a cancellation of Stokely's lecture.

UNM President Tom L. Popejoy and Associated Students President John Thompson have issued statements upholding Carmichael's right to speak, while insisting "of course we don't agree with him or anything he stands

Visitors to San Francisco's Fisherman's Wharf this week past were startled to see a small band of pacifists circling in a picket before Dimaggio's Restaurant.

It is understandable that patrons have some difficulty making a connection between killing gooks and cooking gills. The connection is simple: the owner of the restaurant, Thomas Dimaggio, is a member of San Francisco draft board #45.

The picket is intended to inform San Franciscans about the responsibility the members of the draft boards have for the dislocation and suffering caused by the draft system.

At Fisherman's Wharf this past week, people appeared eager to learn. On some nights twenty patrons may choose to eat elsewhere and those who do dine at Dimaggio's frequently stop to talk with the impeccably attired picketeers.

On Sunday, every patron that entered Dimaggio's accepted a copy of the Bay Guardian's expose on the inequities of the San Francisco draft boards.

For Saturday the staff of the Daily Californian had scheduled a promotions banquet at Dimaggio's. At BARB press time (Thursday) the Daily Cal staff has scheduled a meeting to decide whether or not to cancel the reservation in support of the informational protest picket.

## NEO-NAKED ANTI-DRAFTERS ON THE RISE

"Naked people make love; people in uniforms make war."

So, you saw it too. The way that Eartha Kitt told a few home truths to Lady Bird, and managed to get the message through. One might hope that Lady Bird, who seems a quite nice lady, will now succeed in getting through to LBJ. But we all know that nobody gets through to him except his evil genius, Dean Rusk.

Eartha was so right. Why go to school, and "prepare for your future," when the said future consists of getting shot in a few years? Why be a "good citizen" when a criminal record will keep you out of the Army?

But the present point is that if Eartha can talk that way to the First Lady of the Land and get away with it, so can the left press. Thus I feel emboldened to say a few things that I've been holding back.

The conservatives present have been exclaiming with alarm that the purpose of the dissident movement seems to be to wreck the USA. And there's more truth to that than many on the left would care to admit.

Bob Pickus recently distinguished between those who are "anti-war" and those who are merely "anti-Washington." In his analysis, "anti-war" means those who restrict themselves to methods of proved ineffectiveness, and "anti-Washington" means those willing to try something else that might work. All the same, he does have hold of a truth.

Why is it that people who talk sweetly about peace and brotherhood will identify so strongly with the most horrible race riot? Why is it that people with no illusions about the Soviet Union will feel elated whenever the Soviets steal a march on us?

And why is it that so many Negroes, whose relation to the old "peace movement" was rather chilly, are now heart and soul for anything that's for peace?

The answer in all cases is the same. Anything that tends to pull the teeth of the Washington dragon, they instinctively feel as in their

own interest. I don't want to keep harping on the same subject: how LBJ has decreed as null and void the measures which were regarded traditionally in this country as means of social action. But it's TRUE! And the result is that the people who really care can no longer see any hope in going through approved channels. The only recourse left seems to be to cripple the Juggernaut. And they don't mind much how it's done.

And, sadly, they seem to have no eyes for how much of value might go up the spout in the process. But it wasn't they who brought things to this pass.

Those who refer to LBJ as a dictator are wrong. There's no reason to assume that he will abrogate the Constitution to keep himself from being voted out in 1968, and that's the acid test.

But this country during his administration provides a pilot study in the kind of regime that gets in on a popular basis, then uses its assumedly popular power as it sees fit, misuses it and thus becomes unpopular, defies anyone to do anything about it, but stands ready to step down when the rules require, and leaves the populace stuck with the dilemma of what to do next for the sake of a change. And it may be unfair to blame LBJ.

This may be the prevailing political configuration for the change from Pisces to Aquarius. But there will have to be changes made. And I think they're in the making.

# SPOONS VICTIM SENTENCED

"The sentence was much less than I expected," Bill Loughborough told BARB, commenting on the probation and jail term he got for a pot bust set up by two members of the Lovin' Spoonful over a year ago.

Bill works over at the Committee in North Beach. In September of '66, two "Spoons" reportedly victimized Bill with two lids of grass. This month, Superior Court Judge Joseph Karesh sentenced Bill to three months in County jail, and three years probation.

"The law says a minimum of five years to life for a marijuana conviction," Bill said. "I got off lightly if you consider the implications."

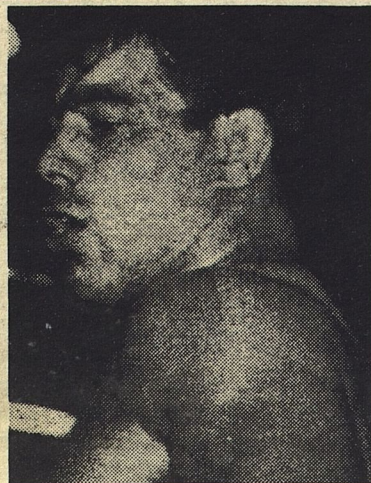
Today is the deadline for filing a Notice of Appeal. The judge promised he'd grant freedom to Loughborough if an appeal is filed. Bill said, "The appeal bond is ordinarily double the original bond. In my case, that means about \$2500.

Efforts to get a new trial for Loughborough were made during sentencing. Attorney for the Spoons submitted five affidavits testifying that the chief witness for the prosecution, Officer James Hampton of the San Francisco Police Department, perjured himself on the stand.

Affidavits stating this were signed by Steven Boone and Zallman Yanovsky, both members of the Lovin' Spoonfuls. Also, signers were Robert Cavallo, Larry Hankin, and Sandy Smith.

The Judge looked them over, then denied a motion for a new trial based on the affidavits.

# UC IRANIANS CHARGE CHAMP WAS MURDERED



### TAKHTI

The official press of the despotic regime of the Shah of Iran recently reported the suicide of Takhti, three times an Olympic wrestling champion.

The Iranian Students Association of Northern California says the report is a lie. Spokesmen for the student group say Takhti was murdered by the Shah's secret police, the Savak.

Takhti, the hero of many Iranian youth, was known to be a member of the National Front, opposed to the Shah. The alleged suicide note, written in the same style as the official newspaper account, reads like a press release, the Iranian students point out.

Within a week of Takhti's death, the Shah's press reported that

eight others had also "committed suicide," all of them political colleagues of the champion wrestler.

To protest the Savak murders and to plan further action, the Iranian students are calling a meeting for January 26 at 7 pm in Iran House, 2516 Dwight Way in Berkeley. The session will be conducted in Persian.

One proposed action is a sit-in at the Iranian consulate in San Francisco. The last time they demonstrated there, the SF cops broke it up with clubs, nearly removing one student's eye.

Reading between the lines of the Shah's press, the Iranian students conclude that Takhti was probably involved in the formation of a guerrilla band. The newspaper made several references to Takhti's frequent visits to wooded areas in the rural hills, supposedly after quarrels with his wife.

In recent years, several guerrilla units have been flushed from their hillside retreats and executed or imprisoned.

authorities want you to hear. You never hear the inmates' story. You never read what "The Outlaw" says.

Now a collection of "The Outlaw" has reached the BARB. We — the "underground" press with an open office, phones, and street sales — will here reprint the news of the real underground press, published within the confines of a miniature totalitarian state where the Constitution is void and the whim of a meaty guard is law.

"The Outlaw," you will see, states that prison officials are accomplished liars, propagating their own bureaucracy. "The Outlaw" says it has a hidden file of documents lifted from official prison records to prove all its statements.

"The Outlaw" says the San Quentin "race riot" of January 18, 1967 was actually a turkey-shoot staged by custodial personnel to head off a Reagan budget cut. The cons' account is printed below.

"The Outlaw" says it can prove that fabric manufactured at San

Quentin was illegally sold to a company in Japan, using convict labor to undersell private industry.

"The Outlaw" says that millions of dollars from the Inmate Welfare Fund was misappropriated to build more prison facilities while actual inmate welfare items were denied to "lack of funds."

"The Outlaw" says that much of the rehabilitation program is a farce, a hypocritical pretense used to hide the facts about the California Department of Corrections, but not designed to help an inmate earn a legal income after his release.

Now, having established contact with the outside, the convicts at San Quentin are ready to hold a new protest, scheduled for Thursday, February 15, 1968. On that day, after breakfast, they will go quietly to their cells instead of to their jobs, except those necessary to maintain the prison.

For the first time, the outside world of free men—that's what the cons call us—will know in advance what the "trouble" at San Quentin is really about. No matter what the prison officials tell the mass media next month, you will know exactly what the inmates are planning, and why they are doing it.

One problem faced by the cons is to avoid being manipulated into a position where the custody staff can create a violent situation. You will see in the first item printed here from "The Outlaw" that their demands are not the ravings of wildmen, and that their no-work protest technique is designed to avoid physical conflict.

The cons know that violence can only mean immediate trouble for them, and then more guards and tighter rules.

Their only weapon is to make their story known, hoping that public opinion will pressure honest state legislators to make a thorough investigation of the California prison system, without favoritism to the entrenched bureaucracy.

What the convicts ask for, in essence, is a Department of Corrections which actually does what it claims to be doing—helping convicted men find a legitimate role in the workings of the free society when they leave prison.

Here is what a recent January issue of "The Outlaw" says about the forthcoming San Quentin convicts' demonstration:

On February 15, 1968, those areas which will be exempt from the movement will be as follows: These areas are essential and

should continue to operate. (1) hospital; (2) mess hall; (3) boiler room; (4) block workers.

Let us take the opportunity to assure each other and everyone of you that we can be successful if, and only if, we remain united. The efforts of each man will be vital to the ultimate outcome.

On February 15, 1968, the eyes of many people will focus upon you, convicts and free people alike, anxious, awaiting to see if we have the ability and courage to stand up for something worthwhile. Let's not disappoint them. Above all, let us not disappoint ourselves. Unity, that's what we need.

### WHAT WE WILL GAIN BY IT

By now, all of you should be aware of the "unity holiday for convicts" scheduled for February 15, 1968. You should also be aware that this is not simply a few convicts who have joined together in order to raise hell with this Administration.

We are convicts who have grown tired of the present do-nothing policy of this Administration, and who have joined with certain members of the staff, as well as people on the outside, in order to apply certain pressures upon this Administration in order to compel them to make the necessary changes that will enable us to maintain a freedom of our own thoughts and expressions, to accept the responsibilities which are necessary if we are to function as an independent individual once we are returned to society.

We must not let ourselves come to rely upon this Administration to do our thinking for us, mainly because their thinking has, for the most part, proven to be wrong as is evidenced by the return, in large numbers, of prisoners who have been paroled, time and again, only to return and have their term re-fixed by the Adult Authority in accordance with Resolution 171 which is nothing more than an administrative rule, established by the Adult Authority itself in order to give it the power to violate the United States Constitution. More on this later.

The time has come for you to ask yourself this question: "Do I have the courage to take this first step and join with my fellowman in a movement from which we may all derive mass benefits?" You must first weigh the advantages you stand to gain by this movement, against those, if any, you may presently have.

What advantages do you have now? When will you be paroled? How long will you remain on par-

ole before you are returned to prison?

Can you expect your term, as previously fixed by the Adult Authority, to remain as it is, or do you think it will be raised back to the maximum? Are you serving a 1-14 year term? If so, you can forget everything under the 14.

How many of you are aware of the fact that under the present pay scale in industries, the prisoner should be getting a "bonus" for anything over \$35,000.00 monthly? We can think of no one who has yet to receive a bonus. Yet the furniture factory alone has averaged no less than \$65,000.00 a month since the new pay scale went into effect...

At the present time the Adult Authority has 5 members who are ex-law enforcement officers. How do you, as a convict, expect to



receive a fair and impartial hearing before these people? Here, then, are just a few of the things we expect to, and will accomplish, with your support.

We wish to impress upon you that we must not fail. You must forever be cautious that the prison authorities do not profit from what we must do. You can expect them to do everything within their power to turn our movement into something more than just a "unity holiday for convicts."

Remember, you are dealing with an Administration which would stop at nothing to hold onto the things which have taken them years to build. They are looking for excuses to hire more guards, to appropriate more money, to build more prisons and to confine more prisoners.

We admonish you convicts to expect any kind of rumor. These rumors will come from the staff. You must always bear in mind that your "Outlaw" is the only one who can present the truth of what is expected to take place during numerous chains of events that will bring about the changes we have all dreamed of...

We are also assured of the fact that when we start the process of bringing about these changes, the Prison Administration will not have the privilege of giving a one-sided report as has been the case in the past. We are now able to rely on our own people to give a true account of what takes place.

If the Administration lies, they will be exposed for it. If the girls at Santa Rita can have a sit-down strike, why can't we? If the guys at Narco (California

Department of Corrections Narcotics Treatment Center in Corona) can rebel against that administration, why can't we rebel against this one?

Violence is not necessary. We must not resort to any type of violence, otherwise we will destroy what we have worked so hard to gain.

We, of "The Outlaw", have taken many chances on keeping you posted on the evils which exist within the Administration. Now, we offer you a few of the things we expect to gain, if we stand together.

Remember, on February 15, 1968, on call for lockup, go to your cell. Do not become involved in anything. This is important.

The first sign of a disturbance and this Administration will fire tear gas and bullets. Some will be injured as we panic in an attempt to scatter. We must not permit this.

If no lockup is called on this day, the same movement will remain in effect for the following day, and will remain in effect until the Administration calls a lock-up. Do not report to work...

Here are a few changes we expect to be brought about:

1. An opportunity for all parole violators to be afforded a hearing in a court of law; to call witnesses in their behalf; to cross-examine those witnesses who appear against them; to be represented by counsel.

2. Complete abolishment of the increased penalties for narcotics offenders without prior felony convictions. Several men here are now serving anywhere from 10 to 15 years to life as a result of this stupid law. Isn't 5 years to life sufficient? The penalty is no deterrent to crime. This has been proven time and again.

3. That more favorable consideration be given to first offenders when their minimum time is completed. To compel a person to linger in prison can only lead to forming a hardened criminal. Too much time destroys any constructive things the prisoner has accomplished.

4. A demand for the removal of all ex-law enforcement officers from the Adult Authority, and that they be replaced with professors, psychologists, etc., who are more familiar with the criminal.

5. The immediate removal of all child sex offenders to mental hospitals where they can receive the help necessary to overcome their illness.

6. To compel the Adult Authority to reconsider all cases who appeared before them since October, 1967 at the time in which the new time-scale went into effect. Almost all prisoners who appeared before the Board since October have been denied—a good indication that you will do more time.

7. Demands for better food and living conditions within the prison. Approximately \$2,600.00 is appropriated annually for your support. Did you know that \$14.00 is appropriated each year just so you can have a new mattress? How long has it been since you have had one? This is just one item. We couldn't begin to list them all.

8. Complete revision of the present pay scale. Prices in the canteen continue to shoot skyward. The draw has been raised \$30.00 a month. Can you draw \$30.00 on your present pay?

9. Demand that a doctor be available within the prison around the clock in order to prevent unlawful deaths, such as that of Walter Atkinson, A-82632, on November 5, 1964. Didn't think we knew about that, did you, Dr. McNamara? Want us to give you a full report?

He died as a result of respiratory difficulty, this is true. But, only because his jaws were wired together following surgery, and he strangled on his own vomit... We know. We also have photostat copies of the complete records. Wonder if John Conley, D,D,S., would support your claims? We will see soon enough.

10. That your parole officer be

compelled to put his approval in writing of any request you make in order that he may not be permitted to use these things to justify violating the conditions of your parole at his own whim or caprice....

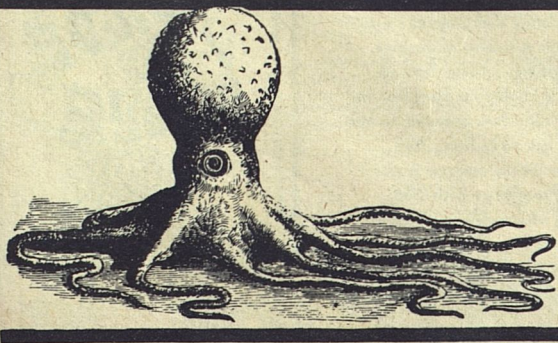
I only wish we could find the words to impress upon each of you, individually, just how important your support is in making this movement a success...

Men are presently fighting in Vietnam in order that those people may maintain their freedom of democracy and stop the so-called Communist aggression.

Yet, here at home, those who have elected to fight for their rights and freedom have been treated as criminals and sent to prison because they have attempted to achieve the same goals as our Government is attempting to achieve for those people in Vietnam. How can we ever expect them



to explain this? We dare not ask, because as long as their present

course remains unchallenged, there is no necessity for them to explain anything. This Administration functions in the same manner.

As long as they are permitted to continue with their present course of action, and remain unchallenged, we can expect to gain nothing because there is only one side to the story as far as the public is concerned, and that is the side of the Administration. They have remained unchallenged up until now.

Since we have been fortunate enough to secure the support necessary that will afford us a voice in the free world to offer our side of the coin, we must not falter. Remember, February 15, 1968, is the beginning of a new era.

Don't listen to rumors; listen to "The Outlaw." Don't permit the staff to benefit from our movement. Be calm. Be cool. Be firm. Above all, be a convict. (Ed. note: According to convicts, a "convict" is a person inside who places the good of the prisoners as a whole above personal gain when it comes down to the nitty gritty.)

\*\*\*\*\*

According to highly informed sources from inside San Quentin, a key reason the California prison system has failed both the taxpayer and the inmate is that the rehabilitation program is controlled by the custodial staff--the Old Guard which has been tending the cages without concern for the humanity or future of the inmates. If rehabilitation is too successful, there will be fewer prisoners,

fewer prisons, fewer jobs for the bulls.

When a new inmate is given his initial classification, the custodial staff, not the rehabilitation staff, determines his assignment. The inmate may ask to attend classes to learn to read, or to work for a high school diploma, but if the custody arm decides that a fresh worker is needed in the cotton textile mill, the inmate goes to the mill perhaps for 8 years.

That's all right, officials will tell you, because a textile mill job is classified as "rehabilitation," since it teaches a man "good work habits."

Most of the counsellors at San Quentin are ex-bulls. One week a guard may shake down a con, strip him naked, curse and humiliate him, and the next week the guard may get his promotion to the counsellor slot where the con is expected to confide in and rely



on him.

Even the good counsellor hesitates to make a favorable recommendation, because if he makes one mistake his favorable remarks later will be discounted by review boards. Bad reports, however, produce no risk.

The most remarkable fact about the entire rehabilitation program of the California Department of Correction is that there is no way to tell if an inmate has been rehabilitated. No test or measure of any kind to predict a man's behavior on release exists at this time. It's anybody's guess.

Nevertheless, the custodial staff evidently felt threatened by a growing rehabilitation program. By the time Ronald Reagan became governor, the rehabilitation program at San Quentin had grown larger than the custodial program. Then Reagan proposed a 10% slice in the budget.

Shortly after that, the daily press told the official version of the January 18, 1967 "race riot" in the prison. Soon 125 new guards were hired and the custodial side had reasserted its dominance over rehabilitation.

Here is how "The Outlaw" describes the "riot" from the cons' perspective:

Those of us incarcerated here at San Quentin, last January witnessed one of the most disgusting scenes imaginable. We were the unfortunate victims of the system that has no thought for the lives or the feelings of fellowmen.

Most of us wanted no part in the January riot which the writer is referring to. We became involved not by choice but by force.

Cold-bloodedly, Custody forced hundreds of Caucasians and Mexican prisoners to the lower yard football field. For the remainder of the day convicts were picked off like ducks in a pond by sadistic Department of Corrections killers--sniping from the walls encompassing the recreation field.

They did this without proper cause or justification for what occurred there that day. Oh, there was a reason all right but not the reason which the news media were offered or the public was under the impression of. No, it wasn't that way at all.

Earlier in that week which led up to this mass shooting, several incidents occurred. Any one of the incidents would have been suf-

ficient grounds for the Warden of this prison to have called in double security. By this I mean that every man in San Quentin should have been sent to his cell and there remained until a full investigation had been conducted.

However, this wasn't performed. On Monday morning of that unhappy week, an industrial strike was called by the black population. A strike that was to singularly involve Negroes. A picket line was formed in front of the industrial gate with strong-armed men to enforce the order.

Some of their men attempted to cross the picket line and were beaten. An hour later after these tactics had failed and frustration became the predominant emotion, a white man was killed and another wounded.

Racial feeling had been running high before Christmas and through the holidays. At this point full security should have been the command from the upper echelon.

Industry is a multi-million dollar setup. You can hear Sacramento scream clear from here when any amount of time is lost. Many minor and partial-minor incidents occurred in the days that followed.

Custody went about their business as though no danger existed. Horseblinders were the going thing. However, people at the top were not so blind. They saw a good thing in the making.

They saw an opportunity to upset Governor Reagan's budget cut and an order to stop hiring unnecessary correctional officers. At the same time, the universities were having their problems across the bay. Every civil service employee was next.

Now then...what would be the best thing that could have happened for the Department of Corrections at that time? Why, of course! A full scale riot. A doubling of the guard instead of less guards, lots of extra pay for everybody including the State Police who were brought in. And best of all, more jobs would be insured.

No...instead of trying to stop the hell which had been brewing, kerosene was added to the smouldering fire. Racial feelings were played on by Custody.

It is no secret that San Quentin is a racial bombshell at all times. After the killing of a white man,



it was a fact that retaliation will usually follow or vice versa. No orders from Warden Wilson were forthcoming. Everybody played it dumb.

Several days of this created a tension which could have been cut with a knife, it was so thick. By this time nearly every man in the yard had armed himself. Some even carried shanks (a knife of some sort) in the open.

Custody winked at this display. Boys will be boys. It might be interesting to note here that a concealed weapon found upon any prisoner is punishable by 5 years to life in any California Camp Court. Yet, boys will be boys.

The grand finale was about to begin. The stage was set, the actors positioned themselves. There were even movie cameras on the gunrails. This in itself should show premeditation on the part of Custody.

The whites stationed themselves along the block wall (approximately 1,000). After catcalling and jeering Custody began to force the

white men to the lower yard by use of tear gas shot directly at the heads of and bodies of the Caucasians.

It must be clarified here that most of the men that were now in the middle of this Chaos were men who were guilty of nothing more than coming from their jobs to eat the noon meal and in so doing were trapped in the meleé.

After the Negro population were herded into their respective housing units and were locked in cells, the fun began in the lower yard. There in the middle of the football field, 700 to 1,000 convicts were shot at without mercy. There is no real cause for it as there is nothing in the center of that field which could be damaged.

Nine (9) men were shot alive and wounded. The report later stated that "these men were hit by glancing bullets (bouncing off the soft mud that was on the field). I am sure combat veterans could argue that point, or even a hunter.

Late that night the men were back in their cells (a job that could have been accomplished in several hours at the most). In the weeks that followed Custody beat, bludgeoned, tear gassed and shot without letup. There is no real reason for it other than it appeared the hacks (bulls) were enjoying themselves.

We, the convicts of San Quentin who were present at that time, accuse Custody of starting...controlling...and finishing the whole thing at their leisure.

We accuse them of Brutality, Harrassment and cold-blooded murder....

Several months after the January riots Warden Wilson was relieved and BIG RED Nelson (now Warden) was transported to the scene. Mr. Nelson has a record of being one of the hardest wardens in the country. He boasts dictatorship and iron-grip rule. He has bragged publicly of it. He stated upon arrival his intention to make San Quentin a safe place to live.

Since his elevation to Warden, beatings, killings, and harrassment have almost doubled. The population is going up and tension is the biggest thing so far created. A million dollar program which offered hope to thousands of convicts, through rehabilitation, was stopped at the snap of Red Nelson's fingers....

He overrode Legislation and many other men higher up than himself to do this. Meanwhile, hundreds of employees, counsellors, and program administrators were idle, yet still receiving paychecks footed by the taxpayers. Buildings and offices built for that purpose, have no other use than to office counsellors who have no other function than to sit in these useless offices and draw their pay....

Prison industry, in theory at least, is not supposed to compete with the private sector of the economy. Products of convict labor, again in theory, go only to government agencies.

This should be true of the cotton textile mill at San Quentin, but a document liberated by inmates from prison accounting records shows that convict work sometimes has other uses. They call it slave labor:

Now here is an interesting little item which substantiates our charge of slave labour and larceny, to say nothing of misappropriation of state property. It is a sales receipt made out to: Sanko Corporation 16 Hashimo-Cho Uchibommechi Hignshi-Hu Osaka, Japan This receipt indicates that 4,710

yards of Denim fabric was sold to the above-named Japanese Corporation on August 16, 1966, for \$30 per yard, a price so low that the Japanese just could not resist.

International Credit #133109 is given, also Advise #1670. The amount of \$1,413.00 was paid through the Bank of Tokyo, San Francisco, thus consummating the bargain. This receipt was signed by a state employee, one G. E. Thorp.

Now this little transaction caused an awful lot of people to be bilked. There was first and foremost, the taxpayer who paid for the cotton mill, the foreman's salary, the raw cotton, etc. The private manufacturers were bilked because they cannot compete with subsidized slave labour working with state-owned materials, and last but not least: were you fellow convicts who must work for such degrading wages.

I do not exaggerate when I say that material could not be made for 30 cents a yard because the raw unginced cotton it is made from costs more than that. How, I ask you, could any private business under our "free" enterprise system compete with such as this?

Now everything, materials, labor, and machinery has been paid out of tax dollars and the finished products are supposed to be made available to state-operated institutions. Tell us, Mr. Thorp, is the Sanko Corporation of Osaka, Japan, a state agency of some sort? I think not.

This sort of business smacks of plain adulterated graft, the big pay off or kick back for someone--and we should know because we used to be crooks too.

Any time we can produce something in this country in direct competition with the Japanese who are geared with modern machinery to produce exactly the same product, and we are able to undersell them in their own country, then we say something is definitely wrong and the stench can be smelled all the way to Denmark.

The staff of "The Outlaw" emphasizes that they publish such items as the above only if they have seen the original document. News events are reported only if independently verified by several witnesses. One of their chief jobs, they point out, is to sort fact from rumor, which, they know, blossoms quickly behind prison walls.

For the sake of convict unity, they want the truth to be known on the inside, whether or not it ever reaches the streets.

BARB's informant said that the convicts' February 15 holiday is much more likely to be a successful, unified effort if they know that their message has been circulated outside.

They will know. We have been assured that several copies of the BARB--a contraband item in San Quentin--will be put into the convicts' hands for distribution along with the underground newspaper route.

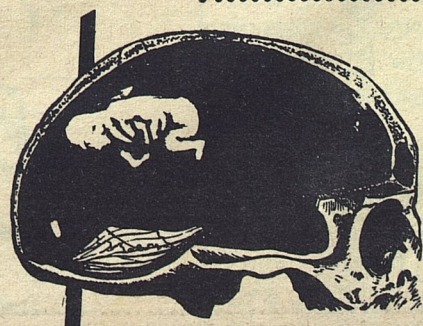

But the hundreds of thousands of lower class old women and young girls making \$1.40 an hour (without benefits) in Woolworth's and offices around the nation and getting old and older because they worry about getting docked for taking a few minutes more to eat their 69¢ lunch, well Brother they are with us and it's our fault for being too inept to reach them.

We should start fighting and organizing against our real enemies and not running around doing things like the poor Black worker who got caught in traffic on Haight Street a while back because I had slowed cars down while peddling underground newspapers to them. 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**CAN COFFEE DESTROY CHROMOSOMES?**  
 QUESTION: I understand there are millions of people so psychologically dependent on the drug caffeine that they feel they cannot function without strong doses when they wake up.

smoking tobacco does? Is there a tar in marijuana which coats the lungs, as in tobacco? Or is there something which might be even worse?

ANSWER: No one really knows whether the chronic use of marijuana might be as harmful to the lungs as the chronic use of tobacco.

Most cigarette hands smoke from 20 to 40 tobacco joints daily. Since the effects of inhaled marijuana last from 1 1/2 to 3 hours, the consumption of an equivalent quantity would seem most unlikely.

Tars differ in their irritant and cancer producing potentials so there remains the possibility that the chronic inhalation of marijuana smoke is more harmful than the chronic inhalation of larger quantities of tobacco. But there is no evidence to support this possibility.

QUESTION: In school we were told that when LSD was put in a jar of human blood, that after a certain amount of time the chromosomes in the blood were destroyed. They also said that this destruction was evident in blood samples taken from acid-heads and that their offspring will be mutant. Is this true?

ANSWER: To say that you were told half-truths would be an exaggeration. Studies made of the effect of LSD on chromosomes have given conflicting results. Half the studies conclude that LSD causes changes in cell chromosomes while the others have shown no change in cell chromosomes of LSD users. One of the latter studies were published in the October 27, 1967 SCIENCE but received little attention by the news media.

The meaning of cell chromosome changes, if they occur, is even more obscure. No authority in the field has ever said that the alleged chromosomal changes had caused harm to LSD users. Some believe that the chromosomes appear similar to those found in certain types of leukemia, but no case of leukemia has ever been linked to LSD use.

One case has been reported of a mother taking LSD three times during pregnancy and bearing a deformed child. No scientist would regard this as proof that LSD had caused this misfortune because the cause of birth defects is usually unknown - that's what the new March of Dimes is all about. If the use of LSD prior to pregnancy led to birth defects we could expect an epidemic similar to the thalidamide disaster, but this is not the case. No drug (including LSD) should be taken DURING pregnancy except on the advice of a physician lest harm be done to the unborn child.

Dr. Ostertag said, "The possibility exists that caffeine is one of the most dangerous mutation-causing agents in man since it is known that caffeine penetrates to the human germinal tissue and through the placental barrier to the human fetus."

Caffeine is a central nervous stimulant which in small doses produces alertness, wakefulness, talkativeness and increased urination. Excessive doses cause insomnia and agitation. The drug is commonly used to stimulate comatose patients.

Perhaps coffee will be an illegal drug someday, denounced in State of the Union messages. But one suspects many will continue to use the drug, despite heavy penalties. 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
