DIFFERS BUT WILL FIGHT FOR PARTY

Robert Scheer's decision not to seek the Peace and Freedom Party's nomination for U.S. Senator was based primarily on differences with the Party's leadership over how to conduct the campaign.
"I think it is possible to conduct a radical campaign and at the same time reach out to bring people in," Scheer told BARB. "I don't agree that there is a conflict between educating people and running a principled campaign."
"There are purists in PFP who will be talking only to small meetings of convinced people," Scheer predicted. "Some of the purists seem to want a small, left-wing, vegetarian-type party."
Scheer also objected to being asked for loyalty to

NLF DOUBLE SKILL; BOTH TO FIGHT AND NEGOTIATE

"On the heels of a major Communist war offensive, signs are growing that a follow-up 'peace offensive' soon may be under way" - Chicago Daily News, Mar 10, 1968, in reporting a "shift of tactics."

The New Yorker magazine would seem to support this thought. "In the opinion of Douglas Pike, the Americans' foremost expert on the Vietcong, ---the second phase (of Gen Diap) attacking the cities is going on now and will last through March, and the final phase of the stepped-up general offensive will extend from April through June.

"Giap presumably feels that by then the Americans may have become so tired of the war...that a peace settlement favorable to the Communists can be reached" - Robert Shaplen, New Yorker, Mar 2 (written Feb).

At first glance, what appears to be a "retreat" into a 'peace offensive' by Hanoi and the NLF

turns out to be something else, as explained by Shaplen. It is this: "fight and negotiate."

"As their euphoric broadcasts of exaggerated claims of success during the Tet attacks indicate, the Communists are relishing their present position...the leaders both in Hanoi and the NLF seemed determined to 'fight and negotiate at the same time'."

It certainly is a position to relish and be euphoric about. The US position is: fight and not negotiate. It is a position that is rapidly fading away, both on the fighting fronts in Vietnam and on the political fronts back home, Douglas Pike, notwithstanding.

We are all familiar with the upsurge of anti-war feeling even INSIDE Congress. What we are not too familiar with is the crumbling military position INSIDE Vietnam.

Shaplen reports: "Despite what appeared to be an all-out offensive, Giap employed about half of his total Vietcong main force of a hundred and eighteen thousand and also between five and ten thousand North Vietnamese soldiers, analysts doubt that he and the other Communist leaders expected to achieve their maximum military and political objectives in a first assault."

What in the holy hell, then, is going to happen in the SECOND attack? Answer: "If the Communist do launch a followup to the Tet offensive soon, they will almost certainly have to use many more N. Vietnamese troops than they did before."

"According to intelligence estimates, such troops are readily available all the way from the DMZ to the Delta. Approximately sixty thousand N. Vietnamese troops are

in the country, and only about ten percent took part in the Tet attack. Giap also has sixty thousand main-force Vietcong troops he did not commit during Tet..."

All this fighting is totally unnecessary, for, as Shaplen points out, the NLF (or Vietminh) had 'peacefully established itself as the city's (Saigon) ruling government' in Sep 1945.

"After a month it was thrown out by a combined force consisting of British occupation forces, returning French commandos, and Japanese troops that were pressed into service before being shipped

home." Shaplen is being a little too cute. The Japanese were not "pressed into service." Rather, they were NEVER DISARMED. The British and the US used them to occupy not only Saigon, but also let them keep their arms in Indonesia until "the rightful owners" could return, meaning, of course, the Dutch.

We are totally without honor, then and now, because we used our enemy, the Japanese, as a police-force to keep down the peoples' revolution, and further, today, because we have killed hun-

dreds of thousands of those people as well as losing 19,000 American GI's in our filthy role as the new occupiers of Asia.

There is only one thing to negotiate - when are we going to get out of Vietnam? The impression the US and all its 'experts' are desperately trying to put forth is that a North Viet 'peace offensive' reflects a defeat for them during the Tet attacks.

What Shaplen clearly points out is that the N. Viets and the NLF are quite capable of doing both, tit for Tet.

The academic community must speak as one voice. We must stand as one man. The war must be stopped before it is too late.

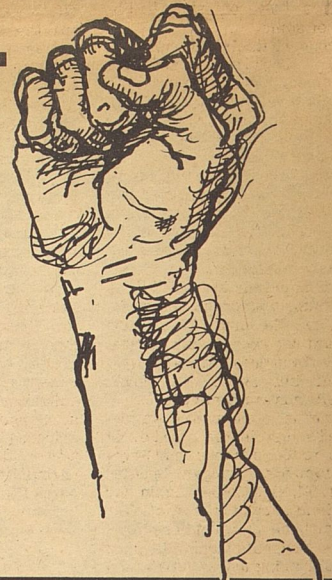

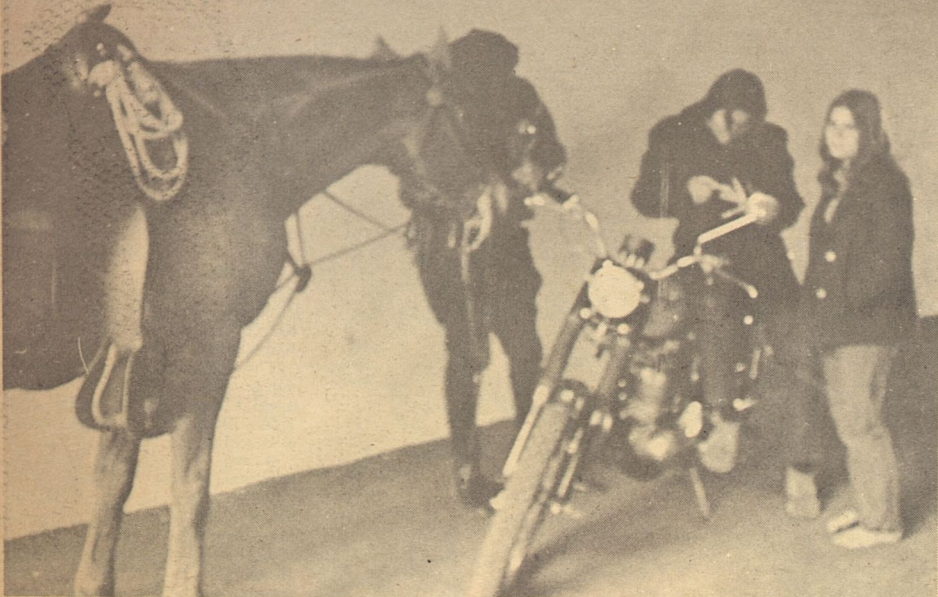

H'ASH BE-IN GLORIOUS SCENE BUT COMMUNITY STILL UPTIGHT

Haight Street, last Sunday, was once again -- but never quite -- a through street, nothing but a thoroughfare on the way to where the action was.

And the action, on hippie hill, was the best since last summer's solstice, a great Be-In.

Yes, by most objective criteria, last Sunday afternoon in Golden Gate Park was a smashing success for the moderates in the Haight. Credit the members of the hip community who worked desperately at the last minute to provide both a substantial festival and a diversion from possible trouble.

But by Tuesday, reflections on the rock concert and its aftermath had left a taste of ashes in the mouths of some.

The concert itself was a runaway triumph -- the largest crowd since the summer Solstice gathered in the meadow at the foot of hippie hill to hear the All Men Joy, Salvation, Clover, and the James Cotton Blues Band.

Starting at 1 o'clock the bands played until after sundown. As one music lover put it, "It was a gas walking out of the entrance to the park with the moon up and hearing rock music behind you."

An estimated six to eight thousand and tourists, hippies, and straights poured into the park. They were lured not by rock bands alone. Chanters from the Krishna Temple did their bit, as did the usual hippie bongo drummers.

In addition, some public-spirited souls distributed crates of oranges to the masses, and Shirley Feldman's younger brother took off all his clothes again and waded them around on a stick. (He put them back on when bored bystanders suggested that his bare butt could bring naked retribution from the fuzz and queer the whole scene.)

At evening's end, a request over the loudspeakers for celebrants to pick up the trash around them was enough to clean the meadow of litter.

Meanwhile in mudville not all was joy -- business was down and the street was dirtier than ever. Few tourists, once they heard of the happening in the park lingered on Haight to load up with package booze or psychedelic trinkets for Aunt Martha back east. They did, however, manage to drop most of their litter coming and going.

No hippies were seen balling in the meadow but this was probably because Haight Street's one-man watch-and-ward society wasn't watching hard enough. So Sunday ended up "cool."

During the week though there were hints of violence. The alarms and excursions started a week ago last Tuesday when a group of hip residents met at Switchboard to discuss the forthcoming Sunday with Mike McCone, the Mayor's man in the Haight, and Dick Hongisto, Police Community Relations expert assigned to the area. It was indicated that the mayor

would find it difficult and politically unfeasible to close Haight for the third time straight. Future closings of the street would have to go through the "democratic process," was the word. No alternatives were suggested at the time. But the fear arose that there would be trouble if Haight was not closed.

By Thursday, the mood on the street -- by those who knew what was in the offing -- was one of depression. Board of Supervisors President John A. Ertola on Wednesday had said, "I don't believe in closing Haight Street . . . just for the hippies."

Another bumper was a rumor that the more militant wings of the Peace and Freedom Party and the Students for Democratic Action would use Sunday to block traffic and force a confrontation with the police.

Friday, spirits lifted a little when Mayor Alioto claimed that "closing streets for festivals is a good thing for the city" and added pointedly that ownership of property in the Haight "doesn't give anybody the exclusive right to determine use of those streets."

Saturday, the rumors were that the Cream were going to play in the park (they never showed). But some hip residents felt that even the Cream would not be a big enough attraction to pull people off the street if somebody really wanted a confrontation.

Sunday noon the word was that a number of rock bands were going to play in the park in addition to the Cream. People started to drift over early. As they headed down Haight Street they saw signs hailing Sunday as a "non-confrontation day," as Jim Campbell, formerly of Flame and now of P&F passed out handbills advising everybody to keep their cool.

Almost everybody kept their cool with one notorious exception -- a knot of itinerant preachers who set up shop on Shrader alongside the Straight Theater, and managed to draw a crowd, . . . create an almost impassable street. A few free men directed traffic until the situation cleared.

LATINS CHARGE OAKLAND FUZZ MACED MEMBERS

The Oakland City Council adjourned early on Tuesday night as United Latins for Justice demonstrated against the police slaying of Charles de Baca -- and later its police employed MACE on the demonstrators.

"They threatened us and used mace in our faces," spokesman Arturo Gomez de la Cruz told BARB.

He then related how a group of 50 Latins began chanting "We Want Justice" after the City Council under Mayor John M. Reading passed the De Baca killing off as "justifiable."

"We were put aside," de la Cruz told BARB, "so we began to demonstrate for justice. We said we wouldn't leave until given an answer."

Victor Martinez, Chairman of the ULFJ was permitted to speak briefly before the Council. He called for a police review board and a Grand Jury investigation of police killings. He cited "white justice" and claimed discrimination against Latins.

Councilmen refused to answer questions, according to de la Cruz, and turned to other business by ruling Martinez out of order.

"Certain individuals sat down then in the main stairway of the City Hall -- about 20 of us. We said we would stay the night if we had to."

"The Mayor laughed at our demands. We heard that he said he was not supposed to laugh, but he was laughing anyway."

"The police told us to leave," de la Cruz said. "There were thirty of them, not a squad of six as the Tribune reported."

"They told us they were closing

the building. We said we'd stay because the building was supposed to be open and we continued our chant."

"Then they grabbed Victor Perez bodily and threw him out. Then they began grabbing the others, I saw them grab a young girl by her hair," de la Cruz said.

"They threatened us," de la Cruz charged, "and used MACE in our faces. That cop had no reason to shoot MACE at me."

De la Cruz said "We learned police are not supposed to use MACE unless they are under physical attack. We made no physical resistance at all. We just chanted."

The United Latins for Justice denounced the killing of Charles de Baca by Oakland police on Feb. 5 as a "heinous crime."

De Baca was stopped by police upon entering a vehicle. He was running away, unarmed, when one of six police bullets killed him, according to the ULFJ.

The group is a union of Mexican-American organizations founded to bring justice to Latin people in the East Bay.

The group is sponsoring a demonstration to protest the alleged discrimination against Latins and the use of MACE and police firearms against the public.

The demonstration is set for Saturday (Mar. 23) at 10 a.m. at the Oakland City Hall. Speakers will include Ignacio Balli, Chairman of ULFJ - Hayward; Bert Corona, Chairman of the Mexican-American Political Associations of California; and Dr. Octavio Romano, UC Anthropology professor.

The rally will embrace the memberships of the Mexican-American Student Confederation and the Spanish-speaking Unity Council, which consists of over 20 organizations.

Organizers of the demonstration said they didn't know how many would come out for the rally because "MACE scares people."

"That's why they used it on us at City Hall," a spokesman said. "They wanted to scare us away from the truth." --SBG

FITTING MEMORIAL FOR MORIARITY

A celebration of the Vernal Equinox in memory of Neal Cassady is being sponsored by the Omega Point Foundation March 22, 23, and 24.

Neal was immortalized as Dean Moriarty in Jack Kerouac's "On the Road". He died Feb. 4th at the age of 42, on the railroad tracks outside San Miguel Allende in Mexico.

The festival will be held in Limekiln Creek (11 miles south of Big Sur Hot Springs on rte. 1) amidst 1,000 acres of redwood forests, mountains, streams, and beaches.

36 lambs and 6 pigs will be barbecued and served with natural rice to the large crowd expected to camp in the area for three days.

Music will be provided by the Anonymous Artists of America, Birth, the Bubble, Dan Crismon, the Edsel Boogie, the Electric Tingleguld, Flower, Freedom Highway, the Lynn Alexander Quartet, Enriaue de Luztiaga.

And the Phoenix, the Mt. Analogue Guide Service, Wierd Harold, Spango, Eight-eyed Plane, Kid Africa, and the Blueberry Jam---lights by the Blackshit Puppy Farm.

A donation of \$3 is asked for the series of events including food, drink, poetry, arts, crafts, music, yoga, oracles, banners, flags, incense, bread and beads.

A spokesman for the Omega Point Foundation said that more than five thousand people were expected to attend the celebration. Further information is available at 323-5446 or 325-5472.

PORT CHI VIGIL HOUSE BUSTED

Thirteen members of the Port Chicago Vigil in Canyon were arrested at 5 a.m. Thursday on marijuana possession charges.

The group was fasting against police harassment when a dozen fuzz entered with a search warrant.

The warrant was issued for "things and evidence consisting of social security cards, library cards, student identification cards, and other identification cards; the person of . . . , a runaway juvenile, other runaway juveniles, and narcotics."

The warrant was signed by a superior court judge.

Joanna Barnes, a member of the house, told BARB at press time that the police made everyone leave the rooms that were being searched.

She said several people reported seeing the fuzz plant the marijuana.

A strict rule at Canyon House prohibits dope in order to prevent just such politically-motivated busts, a spokesman told BARB.

ALL-SCHOOL STRIKE THREAT AT SF STATE

The threat of an all-school strike hangs over SF State if fired profs Juan Martinez and Richard Fitzgerald are not reinstated soon.

As the BARB went to press, the Third World Liberation Front was considering a strike and seeking support for the possible walk-out from student organizations and the American Federation of Teachers.

The young TWLF is an alliance of State minority organizations established after Fitzgerald and Martinez were fired two weeks ago. Both have supported campus minority interests.

The TWLF demanded last week that positive action be taken by the administration concerning the two ousted profs before Monday.

Under the Front's pressure, Vice-president Donald Garrity (PhD. in Criminology) decided by Friday that he would review Martinez's status. Garrity and Dean Feder met with the minority professor early this week, but the meeting apparently accomplished nothing.

"They were shocked and offended by my charges of racism and reaction," Fitzgerald stated dryly. "I was shocked by their ignorance of racism and reaction at this school."

At a noon rally in support of Fitzgerald and Martinez on Monday, the TWLF made it obvious that they would no longer restrict their methods to "obsolete picketing and sign-carrying."

"If we lose, everybody loses. If we don't get what we want, things won't function," states Ben Stewart of BSU.

The group is also asking for equal representation on the Hiring and Retention Committee.

By the end of this week the Front expects to have enlisted the support of a number of campus liberal factions in their attempt to have Fitzgerald and Martinez reinstated.

The Organization of Student Em-

ployees (OSE) announced to BARB earlier this week that it had passed a resolution in support of the two as union brothers. The young industrial union composed entirely of students, is considering possible AFL-CIO affiliation.

MINORITIES FORCE PROFS TO BACK DOWN

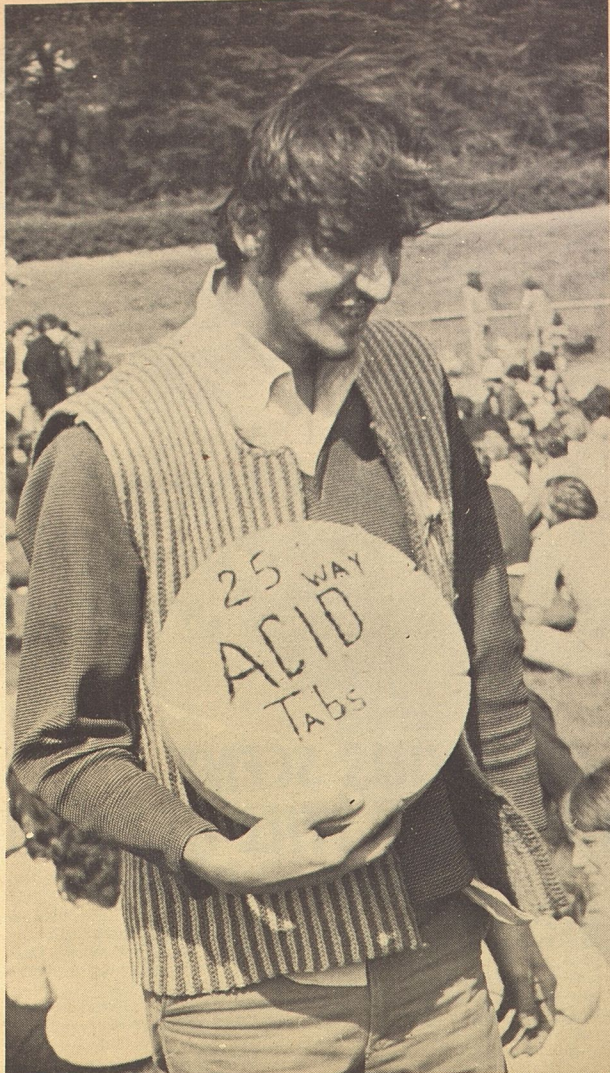
More than 100 students, faculty, and Third World members confronting the Graduate Council at SF State Tuesday forced it to rescind a resolution passed last week to eliminate the Pass-Fail grading system.

The P-F system is currently used only in the Experimental College, at the option of each class. Last week the Graduate Council, a committee of the Academic Senate, eliminated the P-F system within the graduate program.

This week it was scheduled to consider elimination of courses 177 and 277, essentially the Experimental College. Before the committee could act, the more than 100 concerned students and faculty members marched into the meeting to voice their disapproval.

The Experimental College is the only present means by which students can help establish new courses at State. The only curricular changes in 15 years have come at the 177-277 level.

The Third World Liberation Front, a new alliance of campus minorities, was concerned because the Council action would have eliminated the possibility of minority-interest courses within the curriculum.

IN THE WORLD'S STREETS THEY TALK WITH FEET

The streets of the world are getting too small.

San Francisco is not alone. Warsaw, Rome, Stockholm, London, Paris, Berlin, Manila--all reflect the same story: when people don't like something, they vote with their feet--in the street.

Most street-action during the past month is against our war in Vietnam. In Rome and Warsaw, however, it was for freedom.

Stockholm's demonstration had the unique situation where the Swedish government was officially on the streets, too. A cabinet minister marched with the anti-war demonstrators. This has caused a flap in Washington, and our Ambassador to Sweden has been called home.

This has led the Prime Minister of Sweden, Tage Erlander, to declare that he really did not know on what points good relations could be maintained with the United States.

In Warsaw, it was the other way around plus the fact it was the Polish government who was under attack, not the United States. "Police shot tear gas grenades and swung clubs yesterday to rout several thousand students marching through the streets of Warsaw chanting 'freedom' and 'democracy' in the second day of protests against censorship of a 19th century anti-Russian play," reports the UPL.

Cops are cops, everywhere. The students of Rome succeeded in "dissolving" the Italian government of Pres Giuseppe Saragat. The students had demanded certain reforms which have "kept the universities in turmoil for weeks." Saragat, "just hours before the life of the present Parliament was expected to end" decided to join the students.

This typical liberal tactic, however, failed. "Opposition parties led by Communists denounced the bill as too little and too late and joined forces to keep it off the

floor of Parliament." (AP).

The SF Examiner headlines a Chicago Daily News report from Rome, "Berkeley Inspires Riotous European Students." It goes on to say that "from the Atlantic to the Middle East, youth in big city universities, rarely in small cities, are taking out their discontent with fists, stones, bottles, meetings, pamphlets, and general violence.

"Cars burned, classroom windows smashed, buildings smeared with slogans, police clearing the buildings with clubs and tear gas but make few arrests. Professors are split in loyalties."

What these students want--all of them no matter where their campus is--is a meaningful role in their academic life, the same demands of the FSM at Cal.

In Italy, apparently it's the professors who cut classes. "The quality of education suffers from many professors' failure to attend classes regularly," states the AP.

One student showed up in class with an umbrella. In the middle of the lecture, he opened it up "to protect myself from the shower of his words," he explained.

It is generally agreed that the students have a "legitimate grievance. But a sweeping educational reform bill got bogged down weeks ago in a legislative logjam" in Rome.

So to the streets!--G.K.

What's So Appalling About UC'S Pauley?

"The people who come to a live concert of electronic music can't be anti-art," said John Schofill, organizer of Cinema Psychedelica.

John's had a month to think about it, since that night on February 15 when Cinema Psychedelica brought the members of Mills College's Tape Music Center to Pauley Ballroom for a concert of what was termed "live electronic music."

Although the event of the evening were to "shake and upset" the performers and composers at the event, according to performer-composer Bill Moraldo, of San Francisco, they decided to continue in the face of audience hostility because "each composer wanted to present his piece."

Why the people involved have waited so long to tell what happened that night is not exactly clear. It may well be that they wanted to forget the terrible things that turned their concert into a horror-happening.

The first piece, Gnazzo's "Music Fo(ur) Vocal Groups" was received without incident. Technical difficulties in setting up the elaborate electronics gear prevented the immediate start of the second piece, "AC-DC," by Ivan Tcherepinin.

In order to quiet the audience of about 300 most of whom were students of the University of California at Berkeley, where the concert was being held, John Schofill made a statement explaining the

difficulties with the equipment.

John says that he said: "If you haven't made your notes into paper airplanes perhaps you'd like to consult them for the next piece."

The audience must have found the suggestion irresistible, for in the next few minutes hundreds of paper planes soared through the air, many of them directed at the performers. There were about 500 left-over programs at the entrance way, which were seized and tossed into the midst of the undiminished salvo.

About 20 people surrounded a piano and either sat on top of it, or pounded on it. Others were content to disconnect amplifier plugs, or to disconnect power cords. Amidst screaming and shouting instruments were taken or broken. Many members of the audience expressed themselves by running around the room.

After "AC-DC" had begun, the running continued. Unfortunately the piece calls for the performers to move around the room too, and members of the audience prevented the performers from reaching their microphones.

The next piece, Bill Moraldo's "Tryptich," (a pun on try and pitch) was even more of a freak-out. The lights dimmed, and four projectors, under the direction of expert projectionist Schofill, were used for filmed loops. There is a light switch in Pauley Ballroom, usually kept locked Schofill told this reporter, which on this occasion was not secured.

Irate students, who are believed to have come from a nearby college, repeatedly turned on the electric lights. Schofill, in the projection booth, turned them off with his switch. For many minutes, the ensuing battle was indistinguishable from the flickering robe at a light show.

On the floor of the ballroom, Moraldo was having troubles of his own. He discovered that someone had disconnected one of his speakers. As a result, he esti-

GUERRILLA TRAINING AT SF STATE

"Everyman's castle should have a shotgun," Roberto Kaffke told his class last Thursday. "The Revolution is coming very fast to Latin America and in another sense to the United States; if you don't believe that, I don't know what you're doing here."

Kaffke's guerrilla Warfare Seminar at SF State since its March 1 beginning has attracted more than 150 registrants.

Kaffke is an Army veteran who has spent the last few years in Nicaragua observing the guerilla action there. He served as a combat engineer with a counter-saboteur squad during the Korean War.

The course presents the students with a variety of radical speakers and literature, and provides them with practical preparation for urban warfare.

It will include any topic the participants feel is relevant, "for revolution is a many-faceted thing, but it is basically people -- hungry, desperate people."


Last week Dr. William Mandel spoke and played tapes of his appearance before the McCarthy witch-hunt of 1953 and the HUAC hearings of 1960. Tapes of Rap Brown and Stokely Carmichael's speeches at the Oakland Auditorium will be heard this week.

Beside examining the classical revolutionary strategy and contemporary attitudes of militants and radicals, Kaffke, conducts weekend field trips to prepare the students of revolution physically as well, as ideologically. The first of these field trips was concerned with survival in the mountains.

Kaffke points out that oppression hasn't been stopped by any means employed so far, and that it will only end when the oppressor is faced with the threat of physical retaliation.

He states that black people have already started this retaliation, and that assassination of black leaders will follow soon after the courts have tried to drain the militant organizations financially. When this too fails, revolution or fascism are the only results Kaffke can envision. He hopes to prepare the student for that moment.

Classes are every Thursday, 7-10 p.m. in HLL 135 at SF State.

The rock concert and "spontaneous expressions of freedom" were part of the P&F movement 8-day series of events composing Freedom Festival Week. The week's schedule includes three more concerts, and photo and art exhibits, films, plays, people and performers.

Tonight at 8pm is Famous Performers Night at Mission High School. The entertainers are Will Geer, Gil Turner and others.

The celebration ends this Saturday with another rock-concert at the Polo Field in Golden Gate Park from 11a.m. to 6 p.m.

CO-OP GRASS BEST BY TEST

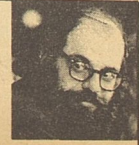
If your wife looks a bit more groovy this morning, chances are she bought some coffee at the Telegraph Avenue Co-Op this week.

KENNEDY CAPER NO MIND BLOWER

Now that Senator Robert Kennedy is going to run for President in 1968, this puts into question two other candidates -- Senator Eugene McCarthy from Minnesota, and an unknown named Lyndon Baines Johnson from Texas.

It also puts into question the role of Black Power and the Peace & Freedom Party, for the above-named candidates are Democrats. All peace activity will be safely contained during the elections within the Democratic Party.

This is the whole point to begin with, and that's the way it is going to end -- Kennedy/McCarthy vs Nixon/Reagan. The war in Vietnam might be "negotiated" and the blacks may get a "hearing."

There are only two things wrong with this: 1) the NLF and North Vietnam; 2) the blacks of America.

They are not going to buy the Democratic ticket. Peace & Freedom Party, however, will split seven ways to Sunday -- with the Democratic Party not far behind with THEIR infighting.

With the rest of the world's protest ON the streets, America is OFF the streets. How in the hell did we arrive in THIS bag?

It all started with Sen. McCarthy speaking out against the war. Not given a ghost of a chance last week, he and his peace-activist students in the New Hampshire primary did so well that it forced Sen. Kennedy to "re-assess" his "not running" for President.

"Catching up" would be the better word. (He is emerging as the Dick Nixon of the Democrats). Kennedy is not fooling the students behind McCarthy. Interviewed by David Brinkley, one student said: "We were for Kennedy, but he refused to speak out against Johnson. He was not there when we needed him. But McCarthy is here."

Kennedy has missed it."

This was BEFORE the election. Kennedy's "re-assessment" came AFTER the election. Now, the question is: who will yield to who? Kennedy most certainly will not run for Vice-President.

McCarthy will, and there goes the P&F ballgame.

There is another thought, put forth by Joe Feit, veteran Democrat doorbell-pusher. "Johnson has lost the war in Vietnam. It is so bad that it is hurting the capitalist economy, and this dollar - drain and gold crisis has escaped him. He can't do anything right."

Feit feels that just as Eisenhower "was brought in" to bring peace in Korea, Kennedy will be "brought-in" to do the same thing in Vietnam.

"Pres. Johnson will be kicked upstairs. They will throw their arms around each other at Chicago," explained Feit.

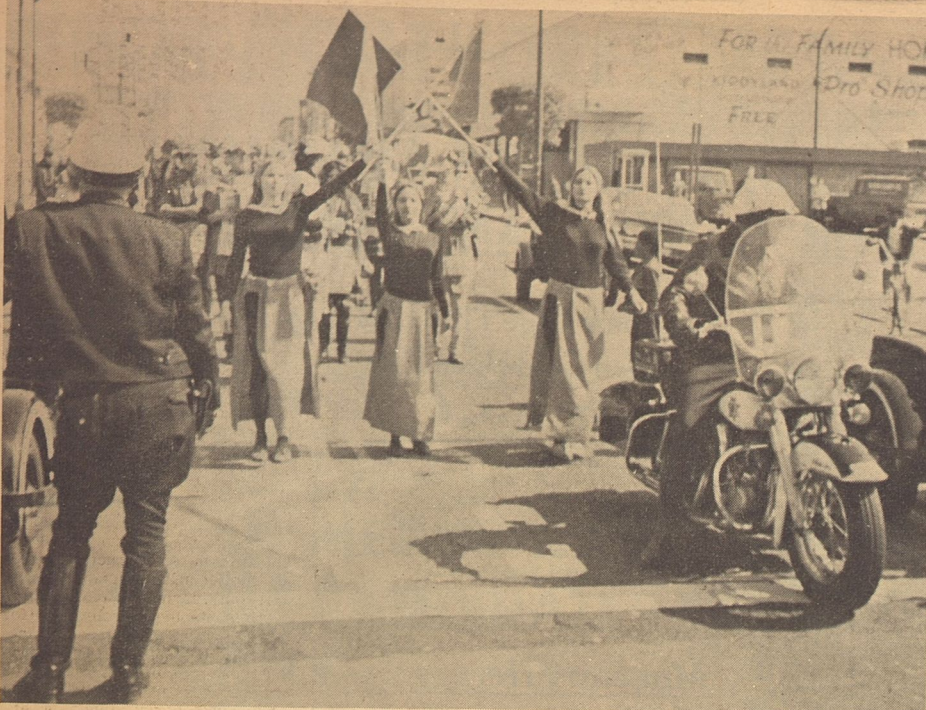
He admits it seems "far fetched -- but then, so was McCarthy's candidacy."

The blacks of America will not go for Kennedy's expression of disappointment over the silence from the White House on the Commission's White Racism report (made Wednesday night).

Just as Kennedy is trying to catch up with McCarthy, he is going to have to run like hell to even get close to the Black Panthers and the minority peoples of America in 1968.

This is not going to be an election -- it is going to be a soul-searching catharsis.

BAY AREA ACTIVISTS KIDNAPPED IN MEXICO

A trip to Cuba ended in a bizarre kidnapping with a CIA stink for six bay area persons last weekend, in an apparent attempt by the U. S. State Dept. to discourage travel there.

"This is to be seen as part of the United States' immoral and unnecessary policy toward Cuba," said Jack Bloom, a member of the group, "and as a demonstration of U.S. imperialism that this country can pressure Mexico to do this."

It started a week ago Wednesday when the six, Bloom, Hal Jacobs, Stuart McRae, Connie Kurz, Karen Wald and Bobbi Cieciorka, all members of local movement organizations, flew to Mexico City enroute to Havana. In two days they had visas and plane tickets, with no hassle from the Cubans. Some went as journalists; others would do research for studies in Sociology and Political Science.

At the airport about 6 p.m., Friday, they were met by 10 men who asked the six to go with them.

"We had been told of harassment," Bloom said, "by Mexican officials and by others who had gone to Cuba, and thought this was part of it. Outside the building they told us to get into their cars. Then we asked for identification."

He said a couple of them reluctantly showed credentials of the Mexican police.

Two of his group were then shoved into a car. Bloom said he and some of the others saw "at least one gun" and decided "resisting would be of no avail."

They were driven around Mexico City in two cars for about an hour, until one man stopped to make a phone call "apparently for further orders," Bloom said, Then they left the city.

Bloom, who speaks fluent Spanish, learned only that they were being taken back to this country, and that their abductors knew nothing about it -- just followed orders. 16 hours later they were dumped at the border. During the fiasco Hal Jacobs lost his suitcase.

Several weeks ago the group decided to make the trip "to see what is going on." They applied to the State Dept. for permission to visit Cuba and were told on the phone, Feb. 20, that a letter approving their request would reach them in a few days.

When it didn't arrive Bloom called Washington and was told the same thing. Again it did not come. UC's spring vacation came and "we were forced to leave without it, but with the indication of getting it," Bloom said.

He added there was no reason to believe that anything like this would happen. But, Bloom said, the incident "should be seen in light of recent trips there, including the OLAS Conference, Stokely Carmichael's trips, and the SDS trip, just recently. The U.S. government wants to prevent

the blockade from being opened."

It was the first time that Mexico has prevented Americans from entering Cuba. Bloom said the Cubans want Americans to visit and return with reports of the progress being made there. And the Mexicans have no reason to prohibit travel.

Two indications of U.S. involvement, he said, were that one of the men spoke a different dialect, stayed apart from the others, acted like a foreigner in Mexico. He asked directions several times and was not always understood. He may have been Cuban, Bloom said.

More important, the group was split up. Three were taken to Brownsville, Tex. and three to McAllen, Tex. Asked whether the Mexicans had told U. S. border guards to expect them, an American official answered, "We have source independent of the Mexicans."

The group is demanding that the U.S. government insure the rights and safety of U.S. citizens going to Cuba through Mexico. Second, they insist that "the Mexican government guarantee permission to Americans to board planes to Cuba unless such acts would violate international agreements between Mexico and Cuba."

Bloom said passports are "supposed to protect citizens but are used to harass them." Jacobs said they told their story to both Mexican and American customs officials and were told nothing could be done about it.

Monday evening, 72 hours after it began, they arrived in San Francisco. None of them have made plans to try again. McRae said, "If we don't, others will."

ERTOLA HIPES H'ASH OWNERS

The Haight-Ashbury Property Owners Association held a private rap session Tuesday night at the Dudley Stone School (Haight near Masonic) and aired their grievances to Supervisor President John A. Ertola. At its peak there were about 150 property owners, but many left when Supervisor Ertola departed to judge an oratory contest.

The meeting was closed to the public but several members of the Haight hip community managed to slip in. An officer of the Police Community Relations division intervened for at least one unwelcome hip when a move was made by a property owner bouncer to throw him out.

Supervisor Ertola commented on the recent closings of Haight Street. Grant Street residents, he said, had to wait for months and months to get permission to close for one day. "They went through



the old democratic process of waiting."

At mention of the hippies and Haight Street, a voice from the crowd shouted "How about Alcatraz for them? He was greeted with laughter. Another property owner present asked, "Why did the Mayor close the street?" Supervisor Ertola replied: "To keep the peace the first time, but I wish I had something to say about it the second time."

A 30-year-old Negro then stood up and asked "How do we get rid of the undesirable element that we don't want?" and partly answered his own question with the statement, "We've got to get the realtors not to rent to them."

Ertola's response: "People should send complaints to the health and housing departments about the violations in health and housing, such as illegal occupancy and overcrowding and unsani-

SHADOW WHITES BACK MERRITT BLACKS' DEMANDS

"Please, don't make me a spokesman. This is a Black thing." The softspoken student in a blue stocking cap and army fatigue jacket stood at a campus card table loaded with literature as he talked with BARB.

He was one of a group of "concerned students" calling themselves The Whites Against Racism (WAR) who are supporting a Black-Directed Change in the educational policy and structure of Merritt College, in Oakland.

Due to the parallel but separate efforts of black students, white students and faculty members, the current black rebellion in this college appears to have a good chance of success.

Unless administrators prove as reactionary here as they have elsewhere, and attempt to slow down the progress of counselor Sid Walton's reforms, his 12-point program should easily win out at Merritt.

Walton's program includes: The hiring of a qualified Black president to replace the retiring Dr. Edward Redford; a teacher hiring policy to right the present severe racial imbalance in the faculty; sweeping reforms in the services provided to night-school students, to make the quality of their instruction better and more available; and the immediate expenditure of \$100,000 to implement an Afro-American studies program that has long been in the works at Merritt.

The \$100,000 was at first seen as an enormous obstacle. However, in the March 7 meeting of the Faculty Senate, an extra \$350,000 in funds suddenly appeared available to the school.

Somehow, it seems, there had been more than a quarter-million dollar "underestimation" of standard state-provided operating funds.

Dr. Suzanne Adams, an outspoken and articulate progressive on the faculty, is rallying instructors for the Walton measures. She heads a new committee of the Faculty Senate which has the stated purpose of seeking "areas of support."

Most of the instructors interviewed by BARB favored the pro-

posals, even though it could possibly stop incremental cost-of-living increases in their salary for a while. Some, however, expressed irritation with the forceful way in which they (proposals) were presented.

Walton told the faculty that the Black-Directed Changes he proposed were minimal.

If they are not accepted the Blacks on campus will begin a political campaign of disruption of the college. This would range from Black boycotts during the all-important census week (the census determines the amount of state funds the college will receive in the coming year), through stoppage of construction on the new campus site, to active opposition to any school bond issues.

Black students, according to fiery Soul Student spokesman Isaac Moore, "endorse the Walton proposals." But he wouldn't say what active support they are giving the program on the grounds that "We aren't giving the enemy our battle plan."

The blue stocking-cap at the Whites Against Racism card table also maintained an air of mystery about his organization. He asked that no people in the group be named.

"The whites involved in this aren't trying to build a big name-hungry organization", he said. "We don't even have a leader. We just formed spontaneously about a week ago to see how we could help."

The aim of WAR is to fight white racism by confronting and educating other whites. Their petition favoring the Walton proposals contains, so far, about 500 white students' names after less than a week of work.

Because of the recent National Advisory Council report on racism, the non-spokesman said, even the whites who won't sign seem at least willing to stop and talk.

"But it is going to take more than talk," he added tiredly. "I've found out why the Blacks in Oakland are frustrated by the whites. Nobody here is willing to recognize that he might be even subtly biased. It's always their mummies and daddies."

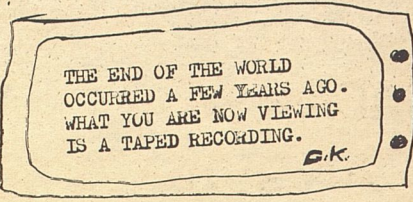

TWO COURTS FOR SEALE

"Lots of people besides the cops want Bobby (Seale) off the streets," a Black Panther told BARB Wednesday. He was referring to events which will bring Panther Chairman Seale into court twice next week.

Seale will appear in Alameda County Municipal Court, Berkeley, on March 19 at 2 p.m. for a preliminary examination, and then in Oakland on March 21 for another.

The hearing on the 19th is to determine whether or not there is sufficient evidence to move the Berkeley case into superior court.

The Panther Party chairman was arrested in a Berkeley police raid upon his home on Feb. 25. Seale and his wife Artie were charged with two counts of felony gun violations.

An appearance before Judge Floyd Talbot last week was for "arguments on questions of discovery," according to Seale's attorney Charles R. Garry. Next Tuesday's appearance will begin the examination of Seale and the other defendants on the charges filed.

Garry last week called for the presentation of certain police documents from the District Attorney's office necessary for Seale's defense. Garry claimed that the documents were being withheld from him because he had "irritated" the D.A.

"I have now gotten all of the discovery I requested. I just got it today," Garry told BARB Wednesday.

"I don't know if they've got enough here (to take the case to superior court)," he said, "I haven't looked at it yet."

Seale will appear in an Oakland court on the 21st on "other trumped-up gun charges," according to Panther Communications Secretary Kathleen Cleaver.

"These charges stem from an arrest prior to the Berkeley raid on the Seale home; it was right after Sacramento," she said.

Seale was sentenced to ninety days in jail after leading an armed band of Panthers to the capital in May 1966.

Eldridge Cleaver, the Party's

Minister of Information, indicated that Seale was "moving to get Garry to defend him" in the Oakland case.

"In this Oakland case," Mr. Cleaver told BARB, "John George (an Oakland attorney) waived a jury trial without his (Seale's) knowing about it. The judge is all ready to lock Bobby up."

FLOOR FIGHT FORESEEN AT P&F M CONVENTION

The fast action at the Peace and Freedom Movement convention this weekend will probably start at once on Saturday when the first plenary session opens at 9 a.m.

A floor fight over the initial adoption of the rules and agenda is already foreshadowed by debates in the State Steering Committee, composed of representatives from throughout the state.

The Steering Committee sessions indicate that the north and south, the cities and rural areas may be maneuvering to guarantee their power from the start.

While much of the PFM founding convention in Richmond may duplicate standard political ploys known to the major parties, one basic decision made earlier is expected to keep the new party in the hands of its membership: all policies, platforms and candidates must be ratified by the local area groups before becoming official.

NOT BINDING
The 1,000-odd delegates and alternates can only endorse; they are not empowered to make binding decisions on the movements or party.

Earlier hopes for an open, mass convention are completely erased during the March 16, 17, 18 sessions as they are now planned. About 2,000 observers can be accommodated at the convention hall, but their role will be strictly to observe the plenary sessions.

The State Office informed BARB that observers will not have speaking privileges, and will be unable to attend the workshop sessions, due to space limitations.

Even with such limitations, many persons active in planning the convention say it will be almost impossible for the body to complete its scheduled tasks.

UNIQUE
Several unique features will help distinguish the Peace and Freedom convention from the major parties. No rented police will be there; instead, security will be maintained by a group of "Black Berets."

No keynote or other speakers are scheduled, but the first session will open with the SF Mine Troupe Marching Band's performance of "The Pledge of Allegiance."

After that, the convention will enter the field of factional politics. The specific arguments will have to be heard during the weekend. The issues to be contested are outlined in the agenda proposed by the State Steering Committee:

MEANWHILE... AT THE CANDIDATES MEETING

A lying-room-only crowd turned out last Sunday evening at Berkeley's Garfield School to hear the Peace and Freedom Party candidates for nomination. When they couldn't get seats, some lay on the floor in front of the stage.

The meeting lasted more than four hours, and most of the people stuck it out until near the end. Pivotal issues were brought up, and before the thing was over it was clear how the majority felt about them.

Did they favor support of selected Demo party candidates? No. Do they want PFP to advocate socialism? Yes.

Five of the 14 speakers were black. Three of these, Bobby Seale, Eldridge Cleaver and Elvin Littlefield, were heard with marked respect and applauded with enthusiasm.

The other two, John J. Miller and John George, were Democrats trying very hard for endorsement. They were put down by other speakers and the audience.

Some well-known names were on the speakers' list, including Bobby Seale, Mario Savio and Eldridge Cleaver, who spoke for Huey Newton, candidate for U.S. Congressman. He presented

STUDENTS STRIKE AGAINST THE WAR

The International Student Strike on April 26 will gain momentum in California at a Berkeley Conference on March 23-24. Letters recently received by the Berkeley Strike Committee indicate that the strike will be massive on a worldwide scale.

April's action -- fully titled the International Student Strike Against War, Racism, and the Draft -- is a political protest, not directed against school administrations as such.

Mass demonstrations on April 27 are planned to follow the student classroom walkout.

Strike plans are now being formed by students in Mexico, Guatemala, Cuba, Chile, Nicaragua, Panama, and Bolivia. Massive support is also expected in Japan and Hungary.

Bobby Seale said: "The first thing black people are united on is 'free Huey Newton.'" Nearly every speaker brought in that issue as part of what he stood for.

Most eloquent speaker was Eldridge Cleaver. After referring to the Black Panther Party as "the wave of the future," he said: "On the extreme right we have Jeffrey Cohelan; between him and the wave of the future is John George. . . Huey Newton could run on the platform of the President's Commission of Civil Disorders. They stole our analysis, but backed up on our solutions." The one standing ovation of the evening was for Mario Savio, who sketched American history and economics of this century, winding up with an eloquent argument for democratic socialism.

During the question period later he added that "We aren't going to get to the future unless we change the way the U.S. is involved in the rest of the world."

Paul Jacobs, one of three candidates for the U.S. Senate, started defensively by admitting he had been an I-led-three-lives type during the McCarthy period. He was loudly hissed and booed.

Jacobs stated that he now knew what he had done was wrong, but even while saying this he could not resist the temptation to bring in some of the old red-baiting references and rhetoric.

During the question period, all of the candidates were asked whether they were socialists and whether they thought the PFP platform should advocate socialism.

All of those remaining at that time except one answered the first question affirmatively; some with semantic qualifications. The exception was John O'Dell, who hoped for a "modified and ethical capitalism."

On the second question, some said yes, some said let the convention decide.

In responding affirmatively on the second question despite being "a little hung up on the word," Savio said he was aware that a socialist program would cause some to "run away" from PFP. "But this is 1968," he concluded, "and we can't run the American revolution all over again." --M.W.

the party program before one had been adopted.

This appears to be less than a major problem, however. Bob said this week, before the party convention, that he expects to campaign very actively for PFP. He cited his commitment to RAMPARTS Magazine as an alternative demand on his time.

Back to the subject of reaching unconvinced people: "I don't feel that radical politics is corrupted by using billboards or TV. When you get away from the intellectual community, billboards may be the only thing some people read and if you can project a radical idea that way and get them to think about it, then you ought to."

"It is self-indulgent to worry about the purity of our style at a time when it is essential that we build a radical base in this society."

Issues should have been discussed much more than they have been before the convention, Scheer thought.

"Only one meeting for candidates to speak was held before the one last weekend in Berkeley," he pointed out.

"That was in San Diego. There really was no opportunity for candidates to project their ideas. I have accepted every invitation to speak and have spoken all over the state, but at PFP meetings we are doing too much talking to the convinced."

"I can be more helpful without being a candidate. I want to work hard for the Peace and Freedom party, and without being accused of doing it for personal advantage."

"I will also be free of the petty

in-fighting that goes on too much in PFP. I am talking about the PFP in Berkeley. This does not apply to the rest of the state. Berkeley is the worst place for purists and splinter groups. I think it would be good if other parts of the state took over the party. Berkeley has dominated too much."

Scheer spoke indignantly about an article by Marvin Garson reporting his decision not to run which appeared last week in the Express Times.

"He reported my attitude as exactly the opposite from what I had told him," Scheer said.

"I didn't complain that I lack contacts. I was making the point that the party and all candidates should conduct the kind of campaign that would reach more people, and that the steering committee of the party had not provided adequate opportunity for the candidates' to debate the issues before the party's convention."

Scheer took occasion to reply to some critics of his 1966 campaign for congressman.

"Without those 1966 peace campaigns, there would be no Peace and Freedom party today. In this area, my campaign gave rise to the CNP, and CNP formed the base for PFP here. I made the motion in a CNP meeting to form PFP."

"That congressional campaign did give rise to organization on the left and its continuity is visibly demonstrated by the fact that we turned our main office at 2214 Grove into the headquarters of the Peace and Freedom party."

GERASSI

John Gerassi, former SF State Prof. and expert on Latin Affairs, was "dumped" last Friday by hearing officer Robert Hill and his State Personnel Board.

College president John Summerskill in January over-ruled the Academic Senate and canned Gerassi for "unprofessional conduct" after Gerassi's participation in the December Mill-in at State. The Personnel Board decision exhausts Gerassi's appeal in the educational system.

Gerassi's attorney, Charles Garry, said Wednesday that action in the District Court of Appeals was being considered, but that Gerassi had not yet decided to take the case to court.

FROM RICHES TO RAGS ON ROAD TO REVOLUTION

For the first time in a whole generation, the majority of the American people will this year be able to vote for an openly socialist ticket and hear direct challenges to the premises of capitalism.

In California, Berkeley Pete Camejo will run for the US Senate on the Socialist Workers Party ticket. Although Camejo's name will not appear on the ballot, votes for him will count as an "official write-in" under California law.

The ballots of twenty-two states, including several of the most populous, will include SWP candidates. The party, which is running Fred Halstead and Paul Boutelle as its presidential slate, styles itself as "revolutionary."

Due to "equal time" provisions, the Socialist Workers views will be broadcast to tens of millions of Americans. As an official write-in candidate, with a list of electors, Camejo will be able to have as much access to the media as super-conservative Republican Max Rafferty.

POT, BLACKS, PEACE

In an exclusive BARB interview, Camejo explained his views on a number of topics ranging from pot and "hippies," to Black Power, the Peace and Freedom Party, and



the next American Revolution.

Pete Camejo was not born a radical socialist. Until 1947 he lived in Venezuela with his affluent family, which during the 1950's sometimes entertained leading officials of the Perez Jimenez dictatorship for dinner.

If his party's campaign is successful, his own political transformation may be repeated a thousandfold in American youth this year.

In his early teens, Camejo admired Senator Joseph McCarthy and the archetype hawk General Curtis LeMay. He idealized the USA because its people were evidently so much better off than those in other lands.

His schooling included standard textbook attacks on communism and the socialist countries. Then he encountered a book which defined socialism as "production for use, not profit, and democratic control of the means of production."

STARTLED

Camejo says he was startled by what seemed to be such "lies." Certainly it wasn't what he'd been taught. When he asked a teacher about it, the reply was, "Oh, that's what THEY claim."

Camejo then began reading all the socialist literature he could find, to learn in detail what THEY claimed. It fit in with that he observed. He was finally convinced.

His first contact with "Trotskyists"—a favored label the establishment press tacks onto the Socialist Workers Party—was in 1958, when he was 18 years old. Two years later he was at the founding convention of the Young Socialist Alliance.

Since he came to Berkeley in October 1965, Camejo has been active in radical politics in and around the University. He ran for the Berkeley mayoralty seat two years ago. Just prior to his SWP Senatorial candidacy, he was suspended from UC for speaking at the Stop the Draft Week "illegal" rally of 10,000.

JAIL

When police attempt to pick off the leaders of political actions, Camejo frequently finds himself among the arrested. "I'm not

afraid of going to jail for it (the Victory of socialism over capitalism), but I don't want to do it unnecessarily," Camejo says.

The relative caution and careful Marxism of the SWP has led many Berkeley activists to consider the party rather conservative and old fashioned. Camejo argues that "it's just a matter of being intelligent about tactics, so we can win—and we're seriously out to win."

Camejo points out that while the Peace and Freedom Party was still in its earliest formative stages, with no clear stand on the struggle for black liberation, the Socialist Workers Party was supporting black control of the black community.

WRONG

"Basically, there are two wrong attitudes taken toward militant black organizations like the Panthers," Camejo said.

"It's wrong to oppose them, and it's wrong to think that the role of revolutionary whites is only to support black groups uncritically." He said that several white Berkeley radicals "patronize" the Black Panthers by taking the latter stance.

"We should work as equals for the same goal, and to do that the black people must have their own organization, with a mass base in the black community.

Camejo said he would like to see Huey Newton run for Congress as a write-in for the Black Panther Party, not for the Peace and Freedom Party, which "has no black base, no matter how many contracts they sign with the Black Panther Party."

FREE HUEY

Despite tactical differences, he said the Socialist Workers Party is in fundamental agreement with the platform of the Black Panthers, and fully supports the "Free Huey Newton" position.

Camejo considers the Huey Newton case a "typical frame-up," but emphasizes that "even if he sneaked up from behind and shot the cop, we'd still be freeing him, because he would have been fighting an oppressor."

"There must be a black revolutionary party, organized, and with strategy and tactics geared to victory," Camejo said. "Such a party would destroy the Democratic Party, because it would lose them the cities, and much of the labor vote would gravitate towards support of the black candidates."

Part of Camejo's scepticism of the Peace and Freedom Party is that it does not seem clearly divorced from the ruling-class Democratic Party.

"The Peace and Freedom groups outside California are going over to 'Senator (Eugene) McCarthy, and the same thing could still happen in California."

He traced the development of the West Coast PFP from its inception, highlighting moments when it played the liberal game, toying with a King-Spock ticket when King was supporting the suppression of the Detroit ghetto uprising.

PFP TO SPLIT

The reason the California PFP became more radical, in Camejo's view, is the split at last year's San Luis Obispo conference when the Communist Party dropped out, giving radicals control of the PFP machinery.

Now that the Peace and Freedom movement has moved to the point of selecting a concrete platform, Camejo expects it to shatter into dozens of factions, due to the divergent views gathered under one tent.

BARB asked whether the PFM could accept the Socialist Workers Party platform, with its strong stand for black liberation and against the war.

"Our attitude," he said, "is that we'd want them to accept our Socialist program, but we don't want to get inside the Peace and Freedom Party—because that would create confusion over power fights."

"We see a gradual process of dialog with them, in which we'll argue in a friendly manner, and we (SWP) will remain free to talk about socialism."

In all, he considers the PFM "a very progressive sign which is getting a lot of people thinking about the war and the black struggle," but he doesn't expect it to become the basis for a mass third party.

SMOKE POT?

Turning to the less classically political, BARB asked Camejo if he smoked pot. "No," he said, laughing.

What do you think of the "hippies," the "free men," BARB asked. Are they free?

"No. They show an alienation from an inhuman society, but they don't confront the problems. They try to escape as individuals by doing what they want to do, but offer no social solutions."

But what about the hip communes? Aren't they a catalyst in creating an alternative society?

That's another kind of escapism. You simply cannot build a paradise within this system. This sort of thing has appeared in every society that begins to rot," Camejo said.

"I think the 'hippies' will nearly dis-



Fatal Streak Fickly Fingers Filmmaker

Well, where do we go from here? I don't know. I've written this polemic about—well—it starts like this:

Filmmakers, it's time for us to realize that we can look only to ourselves for strength.

Noble words, noble, all for a noble cause in a troubled time. And what of it?

After the freakouts at the Tape Music Center Concert, and the Godard non-lecture, I am left with a feeling of despair. From the letters I've gotten from readers, and from rapping with filmmakers and other artists, I feel worse.

Listen you jerks, it doesn't matter how good or bad the films were, or how good or bad the projection was. I know, I'm not going

to convince anybody or anything if I call you jerks. Just a fatal streak of antagonism. I'm a non-proselytizer.

How come the people at Pauley Ballroom can sit through lousy feature films that run three hours, but couldn't sit through a little over an hour of experimental film?

But I don't feel like talking about this crap this week. Somehow, I feel like I ought to, maybe ought to sum the whole thing up in a few well chosen words. How about abracadabra? How's that? Does it fit?

Filmmakers, you have nothing to lose but your marbles.

I've talked to filmmakers and performers who participated in both fiascos, both incidentally held at Pauley Ballroom. Say, maybe it's Pauley Ballroom. Maybe I've missed the profound correlation.

Sure, I'm off the beam, it hasn't got anything to do with what happened to Brecht and the THREE PENNY OPERA in early Nazi days in Germany. I've got the wrong analogy. (By the way, if you need

appear when the prospect of a real social revolution appears on the horizon in America. That would give people a real way to bring about change, and the attractiveness of being a 'hippie' will be less than being a revolutionary."

ABORTION

But suppose ten hippies started a guerrilla movement...

"That would be very bad," Camejo said. "It would be like confusing the first month of pregnancy with the ninth, and the only result would be an abortion."

That reply tells much about where the Socialist Workers Party stands in respect to revolution. Whatever outbreaks against oppression occur in America, none can bring about total revolution unless based upon those most directly caught in the gears of capitalism—the workers.

At this stage, by the SWP analysis, the basis for a revolution does not exist. Even the Socialist Workers Party itself has no mass support among the workers, although it is visibly growing.

The 'hippie' scene, even if one imagines them armed, is only a symptom of the basic struggle to come.

But in the society of the future, as envisioned by Camejo and his party, marijuana and other aspects of the standard hip culture would not be illegal.

"We would get rid of all anti-social laws," Camejo explained. "No penal system should have anything to do with self-harm—though we know marijuana is not harmful—because a person who harms himself obviously needs medical attention. In fact, the entire concept of prisons is incorrect. Obviously, if someone tries to kill somebody, he needs help."

Although the revolution may not be yet at hand, this year the followers of America's electronic media will have their minds expanded as the SWP candidates openly advocate socialism. Meanwhile the Democrats and Republicans will make their customary sounds, ringing more hollow with each passing day. --jas

Melkon Melkonian sentenced himself to a 5-to-life term in State prison last Friday. But his ultimate fate still rests with the court.

Melkonian, whose challenge to the constitutionality of the marijuana laws aroused the support of 2066 affidavit signers, was returned from Vacaville "Reception and Guidance Center" Friday after 66 days in that prison. He had been sent to Vacaville by Judge Joseph Karesh of San Francisco for evaluation before sentencing.

The diagnostic study done at Vacaville described Melkonian in

David Ward--were arrested in the recent county-wide drug-roundup in Marin and told that police were aware of their work with the group. English and Ward have a constitutional test case in the courts of Eureka.

In addition, Mrs. Garnet Brennan, principal of the Nicasio school, was fired from her job when she signed an affidavit stating she had used marijuana for 18 years.

Mrs. Brennan is now tutoring 10 children at the Rancho Campesino commune in Novato. Here too the Establishment has brought pressure to bear to close not only her school, but the house as well.

The landlord of Velma Storm, another committee member, reported that Sidney Stinson, Marin County Undersheriff had made inquiries to him about the Ad Hoc Committee.

Following Melkonian's sentencing in May the Ad Hoc Committee will begin organizing the long appeal process to bring the dealer's case to the higher courts.

"Melkon Melkonian is to be commended for his efforts to bring the marijuana issue to a head, and to force society to examine its present position of extreme ignorance. Nothing but good can come of this.

"Melkon is acting within the existing legal procedures for changing unjust laws in order that he and millions of others will not have to live as criminals in order to enjoy an innocent and enlightening way of getting high that does no harm to society or the individual."

"To refuse Melkonian probation for a perfectly legal activity is vicious, illegal and insane and makes him a political prisoner."

glowing terms as a gentle, highly intelligent man of superior intellect who had been a model prisoner and recommended probation with the possibility of some jail time at the local level--presumably county jail.

Despite the glowing report, James Kane, the associate warden in charge of making recommendations, urged that Melkonian be sent to State prison.

Kane said: "It is anticipated if placed on probation he would be extremely difficult to supervise in the local community due

and offered him three choices:

a return to Vacaville in the hope of obtaining a favorable report for the granting of probation; a year in county jail and probation, but with no appeal allowed on the case; and a 5-to-life stretch in San Quentin or Soledad, with an appeal allowed.

Melkonian chose the 5-to-life. His bluff called, Karesh was upset. In court, he stated again that he did not understand Melkonian. He had made this confession in earlier appearances.

"I think this man wants to be a martyr," the jurist said, shaking his head.

But instead of sentencing him, the judge allowed Melkonian to make bail at \$2,500 in order that he might have a back operation. Troubled by sciatica, Melkonian spent most of his time at Vacaville in the hospital. Sentencing was postponed again for 60 days.

It is hard to understand how Kane and Karesh arrived at their conclusion that Melkonian is playing the role of a martyr. The psychologist -- Raymond McDonald -- stated that, "He (Melkonian) denied that he was attempting to cast himself in the role of a martyr, indicating that he likes his freedom and would not care to spend any substantial length of time in custody."

Friday Melkonian told a Chronicle reporter, "Baby, I got no eyes to be a martyr."

The persecution of Melkonian is not the only instance of Establishment retaliation against the Ad Hoc Committee for the Reform of Marijuana Laws, the group that supports the convicted dealer.

 tary conditions. Or they could send them directly to me and I'll get them to the proper offices."

After Ertola left the meeting simmered down to complaints about an unresponsive city government, garbage on the streets, the problem of derelict cars, and their despair at the disintegration of their neighborhood.

The property owners seemed to be seeking a sense of com-

munity, one hip listener felt. He sympathized -- at least in the abstract.

Handed out at the meeting was a flier listing seventeen points of complaint. Many of them are the same ones listed by moderate hip elements in the community. Others, it is felt, are either stretching a point or flatly untrue.

Your reporter has yet to see "lewd dancing exhibitions by drug addicts" and was unaware that the "numerous schools in the area" were besieged by "drug addicts and sex deviates."

He also doubts that news vendors are "endangering lives," that "sports cars roar through the area all night long," that uncurbed dogs are "endangering residents lives" (not unless you slip), that prostitution was running rampant, or that there was "loud musical instrument playing every night of the week on the street."

Upstairs at the Dudley Stone on the same night there was another meeting, this one open to the public. Father Harris of All Saints Church and other interested individuals had gathered to discuss what could be done to provide needed housing and shelter for the kids already heading for the Haight.

NEWTON APPEAL HOPE

Attorney Charles R. Garry told BARB he filed a "comprehensive brief" with the California State Supreme Court Monday on behalf of Newton, who is in jail awaiting trial in Alameda County on murder charges.

The trial is scheduled to begin in Oakland on May 6, but Garry's motion before the Supreme Court should be returned within 30 days, he said.

Garry said "similar actions have been taken throughout the U.S." "We contend that Grand Jury indictments have been reversed in similar cases," he said.

The motion has already been denied by higher courts here, the State District Court of Appeal and the Alameda County Superior Court.

His argument is that the Grand Jury which indicted Newton is "illegally constituted," that it excluded Negroes, wage earners, and persons over 50, and included only acquaintances of the judge.

Garry also claimed in his petition that in the Newton case before the Alameda County Grand Jury, the jurors saw no evidence and returned their decision hastily at the D.A.'s request.

Now that Luce is in the sky, with or without diamonds, the magazines he founded have become considerably more worth reading. Luce must have died a defeated man. He knew by then that the American Century he had worked so hard to promote wasn't going to happen. And he surely knew what would happen as soon as he wasn't around to keep an eye on the staff.

The public has long known the situation at Time-Life Inc. in order to turn out the kind of high-quality, biased but knowledgeable magazines he had in mind, Luce had to hire a staff of well-educated men, given to thought and study. The very kind least likely to subscribe to Luce's suburban-realtor view of the world and man. For them, working for Luce was a form of purgatory, partially made up for by the high salaries. In order not to lose their own souls completely, they developed a technique of slipping bits of their

own viewpoint into the articles, to see if they would get by the editor.

And usually they did. The editors developed a practice of letting such things stand. It was good public relations. In any undergrad bull session, they could count on some sophomore contending that Time magazine is not all bad; why, just in the last issue they printed...etc etc.

But now that Big Brother is no longer watching, the staff has a good bit more freedom.

Another angle is that Time's biggest circulation-builder used to be the introductory subscription offer sent to members of college graduating classes. In earlier times, most of them responded. Even a liberal considered it a way to keep informed, and you could allow for the editorial bias. And the science and art and book sections were good.

Times change, though. Too many

of the young now feel that they wouldn't want that lousy war-loving Johnson - loving thing in their homes even if they didn't have to pay money for it.

So something had to give. And it did.

Fortune has all along been a pretty objective magazine, for those who need to know. Sports Illustrated—well, a sports publication is one of the few where you can believe what you read.

But now we see Life magazine turning Dove. We see Time featuring the Beatles on the cover, with a very sympathetic story. We see, in both magazines, rave reviews given to books (Giles Goat-Boy for one) which a few years ago would have been tongue-lashed for their non-adherence to bourgeois standards.

It's one more sign that the revolution is happening. And one more proof that what would help it along tremendously would be the disappearance of a few crucial people like Luce. R.R.

mates that only one fourth of the piece was heard. The audience behaved with characteristic restraint.

By this time, perhaps two thirds of the audience had left.

The rest of the program consisted of Nylund's "Scat Bishop," and a piece planned for audience participation, of all things. This Bartlett and Jenks piece, which lasted half an hour, called "Pretty Polly," was designed for films and electronic sounds.

When spot lights were beamed on sections of the audience, they were to make all the noise they could. They had been provided with noisemakers for the occasion, but they threw themselves com-

pletely into the piece, according to Schofill, by screaming and shouting.

Schofill considers himself to be an astute judge of audiences, and he declared that "it was really beautiful. They just couldn't make enough noise. They were just screaming and shouting. I got a very warm feeling."

When the people left the room, at the end of the concert, they tossed their chairs into a great heap near the exit.

"It looked like sculpture. It was really beautiful," Schofill reported.

HIPPOCRATES

QUESTION: Between the 1st of November and January 15th, I used methedrine approximately 3 days out of every 7, or about half of each week. I have not had my period since the first of November. Naturally, I am very worried. Since January 15th I've used methedrine only once, for a three day period ending today. I'm going to stay off it now. Can you advise me about the period problem?

Is there medication of some kind that will help? I need help.

I cannot go to my parents. I'm 15 (16 in July). A friend of mine told me about you so I am writing. It's very important that my parents do not become involved in any way. The return address I'm enclosing is that of a friend.

Until I began using methedrine, my periods were always completely regular. There is no chance that

I am pregnant.

P. S. For what period of time can methedrine be detected in the bloodstream or internally? If I were sure that it could not be detected, I would tell my parents that it has been three months and that I was not worried at first but am now.

ANSWER: Tell your parents your period is late so that you may see a physician. Methedrine can't be detected in the bloodstream more than a day or so after its use. Nor can its use be determined by physical examination, once its effects, such as high blood pressure and dilated pupils, have worn off.

Drug experts consider methedrine the most harmful illegal drug being used today. Tolerance, the necessity to take more and more of the drug to achieve the same results, rapidly develops.

Methedrine is used in medicine to curb the appetite, produce alertness and, in rare instances, to raise blood pressure. The normal dose is 5 milligrams three times a day, by mouth. Meth heads develop tolerance so quickly they commonly shoot 100mg to 200 mgm of the drug into their veins every three or four hours.

Harmful effects of methedrine are ruptured blood vessels in the brain (from a sudden rise of blood pressure), an overdose of the drug, and permanent personality changes -- and not for the better. Hepatitis is a common disease of meth heads who share contaminated needles. The incubation period of serum hepatitis is so long (6 weeks to 6 months) that many people may become infected before the first symptoms appear. Boiling water does not kill the virus which causes serum hepatitis.

QUESTION: Please hurry and have this printed. I haven't found the answer in any books and this problem has been bothering me for some time so you are one of my last resorts.

Why is it that my labia minora protrude (at least 1/2 inch) from my labia majora? What can be done to correct this?

Fortunately, I went to a high school in a state that didn't require P.E., so I didn't have to take embarrassing gang showers.

ANSWER: The labia are the "lips" of the vagina; the outer labia are the majora or larger lips and the minor are the smaller inner lips. Variations in size are normal. If any of your intimate friends think your "problem" is unusual, it's due to their lack of experience. Perhaps it was UNfortunate that your state did not require P.E. Your fears would be fewer now.
