Kathleen Cleaver, weary but somehow tireless, came to the BARB offices Wednesday night to talk about the latest police attack on the Black Panthers, in which young Bobby Hutton was gunned down and her husband was yanked off to prison.

She made it clear that each attempt by police to chop down the Panthers' leadership has only made their black liberation movement grow larger and more determined.

"The support we've received for Eldridge Cleaver is tenfold what we received when Huey Newton was shot, and we thought that support



The first one out was Bobby Hutton.

He emerged, his hands in the air, from a burning tear-gassed basement where eight of his Black Panther brothers were still holed up. He stepped into the bright searchlight. Oakland police shot him dead.

"BRING THE BOYS HOME" COULD BE A FASCIST SLOGAN

President Johnson has lost control of the cities in America and the war in Vietnam. He will be overthrown by a military junta before the November elections "to save the nation and win the war."

WHY POLICE CHIEF WON'T LET CLERGY IN COP CARS

Remember sitting in front of our tube last weekend, feeling helpless?

You knew that with King dead, something was going to bust loose, and you couldn't do a damn thing ("after all," shrug, "what can one person do?").

Well, one person was doing something. She is a little chick with long brown hair named Beverly Heskin. She started calling up ministers in the East Bay Friday night asking them if they would be willing to ride in police cars in the Oakland ghetto to beep tempers down, to cool things off.

Beverly is the chairman of a

Beverly is the chairman of a Merritt College group called Whites Against Racism and through her contacts with active Black militants on that campus, she knew that the Black community would be in favor of such a move. Beverly is the chairman

"I thought it would prevent viol-ence on both sides," Beverly told

BARB over the phone. "The fear the police breed in the ghetto would be reduced if the ministers were around and it might diminished the police fears of be-

diminished the police fears of being shot at."

A number of ministers, priests and rabbis agreed with her and said they would be willing to ride. So Beverly called the Oakland

So Beverly called the Oakland Police.

"When she called, her attitude was contentious," Chief Charles R. Gain told BARB later. Besides, "It was not a practical thing to do." So he said no.

Beverly said she asked Gain why. She said she got this reply: "I am the Chief of Police and my answer is no. I don't have to give a reason."

Gain. said this was a misunderstanding, that he hadn't really had time to go into the reasons for his refusal.

The reasons he gave BARB were

for his refusal.

The reasons he gave BARB were that his department needed time to "research the legal implications" of having citizens in the cars in case of injuries and of possible "suits against the city." Also, "I will not subject my policemen to the grave responsibilities of caring for a minister in ities of caring for a minister in

Asked by BARB whether the min-Asked by BARB whether the ministers could sign waivers absolving the police in case of accident, Gain conceded that this was a possibility. However, he believed that the obligation of the police department was to protect cifizens and not place them indanger, especially "in a tension-type situation".

especiar,

But, BARB asked, if the ministers were willing to accept this
danger to act as observers and danger to act as observers and protect other citizens, why couldn't the police cooperate? Gain answered that having observers implied that police brutality existed and that this was an unjustified

and that this was an anyone assumption.

"If we've got some people who think they can cure the ills of the world by snoopervising the police," he said, "they're very

the world by snoopervising the police," he said, "they're very much mistaken.

"Let's not come up with something that will salve your conscience by putting the monkey on my back," he added.

Noting a tone of irritation in the Chief's voice, Barb asked Gain if he thought he was being argued with. Chief Gain, anol-Gain if he thought he was being argued with, Chief Gain, apologized for sounding touchy and said he had put in a long day and that he had four people still waiting to see him (this was after five o' clock). He was tired of people

who constantly attacked the police. He felt that people ought to support and respect their police and stop all this negative thinking. Beverly Heskin called the Oakland Police on Friday night. On Saturday night four Oakland policemen and two Black Panthers were wounded. And seventeen-year-old Bobby Hutton, unarmed, died, with seven bullets in his body.

KING WAS NO TOM

In the wake of Dr. Martin Lu-ther King's death, the administra-tion spokesmen and some 'negro leader' cop-outs have called for the assertion of law and order and the re-affirmation of faith in the American Institutions.

American Institutions.

It is clear, however; that Martin Luther King did not stand for law and order but for the violation of all unjust laws. It is clear also that Martin King did not stand for the acquiescence to the perpetuators of racism and wars, but for the application of non-violent confrontation with those who seek to oppress and exploit, Martin Luther King was a man of seek to oppress and exploit, Mar-tin Luther King was a man of principle, a man of militant ac-tion and consequently he spent many of his days in the estab-lishment jails. He had love in his heart for all men, but unlike the Vice-president he had no room in his politics for racists and murderers. Such is the position of the Cam-pus Movement Workshop, a U.C.

pus Movement Workshop, a U.C. centered group dedicated towards the innovation of direct action non-violent tactics against the fornon-violent tactics against the forces of racism, war and poverty.

Hutton was just 16 when Seale
and Huey Newton organized the
Panthers in 1966.

DIDN'T STOP

Oakland Police say officersor-dered Hutton to halt as he ran from the building. He was shot after he refused to halt on command, police insisted Sunday. Newspapers reported early

this week that the Oakland Police Department claimed that the of-ficers could not tell if the youth was armed or not and that they did not fire until fired upon.

Seale claimed that the Oakland police knew Hutton was unarmed.
"The Oakland Police have established that he was not armed,"
Seale said. They said he wasn't armed. (Police Chief) Gain him-

"'Oakland police attacked the Black Panthers in the black community. I have witnesses to prove it."

Seale said he had a number of

Seale said he had a number of witnesses, some of whom were caught in the cross-fire. He would not say how many.
"Make a note that I'm being silent about this right now," Seale told BARB. "I'm going to keep quiet about the names of these people until the right time."
Seale indicated that his witnesses would disprove the cops' claim that a planned ambush had

claim that a planned ambush had been set for them.

Deputy Police Chief Robert Cazadd said Sunday that over 100 spectators had watched the fray

from the ghetto street.

Cazadd told reporters that the incident began at 9:07 p.m. on Saturday when Officers Richard R. Jensen and Nolan R. Darnell stopped their patrol car after turning onto 28th Street from Union. He said they were going to check out a man "crouching down behind a parked automobile with Florida plates," and were getting out of of the street.

of the street.
Police sources called the incident a "planned ambush."
Cazadd said the two policemen radioed for help and received reinforcements from the Cakland and

Emeryville police forces. They sealed off a two square-block area surrounding the house.

The suspects were said to have run around the corner, and charged into a house at 1218 28th, Others were reported to have fled to another address at 30th and Union.

oner address at soft and dimonical.

No version of the story indicates how many were involved in the street battle, or to whose house or houses they fled.

POLICE FIRE

Police said they themselves were armed with automatic weapons, shotguns, handguns, and tear gas. They besieged the house firing from cars and utility poles,

firing from cars and utility poles, playing a strong searchlight on the small white house.

The gun battle which followed tore large chips of wood from the house, showered seventy or eighty bullets into the basement side, knocked all the windows from the building, and finally when tear gas was used, caused it to catch fine

Reports indicated that at least two residents, two women, or a woman and a child were allowed to leave the burning house while police held their fire. No one was identified, however, and as late as Wednesday, Panther head-quarters didn't know whose house it was.

Hutton was the first Panther to leave the building. He was shot running toward the police barri-cade. Deputy Chief Cazadd said Hutton was the first Panther to save the building. He was shot unning toward the police barriade. Deputy Chief Cazadd said utton refused to halt on comiand.

It was reported that the youthful Panther leader was felled "as he left the home, hit at least seven times."

SIX SHOT

Two other Panthers were wounded in the battle, as were the two Oakland police officers who radioed for help and two other un-

identified cops.
Cleaver, 32, was wounded in the leg, presumably in the street battle that preceded the basement barrage. The Vacaville State Medical rage. The Vacaville State Medicar Facility reported Sunday that Cleaver had sustained a "considerable number of gunshot wounds." Cleaver was transferred to Vacaville from a San Quentin dispensary where he was taken as a parole violator, Police said the transfer to Vacaville was made "for

to Vacaville was made "for security reasons." Warren Wells, 21, another Pan-ther, was hit in the buttocks by police fire and was reported to be in "fair condition, under guard," at Highland Hospital, Oakland on

Policeman Jensen was reportedly the most seriously wounded of the four cops. He was said to be in good condition at Merritt Hospital. Jensen claims he

did not fire a shot in the fray.

His partner Darnell also listed in good condition at Merritt, says he got three shots off, one of which he says hit Wells.

The other two policemen were said to have received minor in-

of the eight arrested were in jail Tuesday with \$40,000 bail on each of them. Wells is also under \$40,000 bail.

Cleaver, who is being detained until Friday at Vacaville, was put under a \$63,000 bail. On Friday, he will appear before the California Adult Authority for a hearing on his marole. Wells was reing on his parole. Wells was released from Highland Hospital
Tuesday. John Scott was still being detained in Juvenile Hall.
Seale admitted that they were
going to have a tough time getting

Scott out.

Scott out.

"He's a righteous brother and I'm sure he's giving the pigs a time. He won't lie to them the way they want him to. He won't give them their statement. We'll havea tough time with getting him out because he's a juvenile."

Scott and Hutton were the same age, 17.

Each of the six under \$40,000

Each of the six under \$40,000 bail faces two counts of assault and intent to commit murder against a police officer.

Cleaver, under the higher bail, faces three counts, which include assault, intent to commit murder, and parole violation. As a parolee he is not permitted to have a weapon.

The Panther Minister of Information faces a life sentence,

The Panther Minister of Information faces a life sentence, which because he is still on parole, can be imposed without a trial. Cleaver was convicted by a Los Angeles County court and sentenced to prison in March 1958 on three counts of assault. He was paroled in December 1966 after having served 8 years at San Quentin. Quentin.

Cleaver, a staff writer for Ramparts Magazine and author of a new book, "Soul on Ice," was in semi-seclusion until recently. His post as Minister of Information had

semi-seclusion until recently. His post as Minister of Information had been listed as "underground!"

A spokesman for the Peace and Freedom Party charged that police had been following Cleaver prior to the Saturday night incident.

COPS KNEW

"For all intents and purposes, it seems the police were trailing Cleaver. Few people knew where he was that night when the cops just happened to show up on the right street with the right guns."

Cleaver, in a statement issued to the press Monday through his lawyer, said, "Police moved against Huey P. Newton, our Minister of Defense, and are now well-advanced in framing Bobby Seale, our Chairman. And now, for the first time, they have moved directly against me, shooting me, and attempting to kill me. I think this is a calculated plan."

The arraignment of the eight Panthers which began Tuesday was continued to Wednesday. Panther

Panthers which began Tuesday was continued to Wednesday. Panther Defense attorney Charles R. Garry sought early in the proceedings the reduction of the severe bail and release on own recognizance for six of the Panthers

All of them pleaded innocent

to the charges which stemmed from the shoot-out.

Cleaver appeared in court Wed-nesday in a wheelchair, Wells in pajamas and on crutches. Munici-pal Judge Stafford P. Puckley denied Garry's bid for a reduction calling the move "standard bail structure."

structure."
Preliminary examination was set for April 22 at 10:30 a.m., after a bid for an immediate hearing was also denied. Cleaver was then returned by ambulance to Vacaville.

BLACK MONEY
Later Wednesday, Panther Chairman Polyky.

Later Wednesday, Panther Chairman Bobby Seale held a brief press conference at Panther head-quarters, 4421 Grove. Seale announced rather triumphently, although the six had falled to get a reduction, the Panthers would be freed.

"We bailed out, this morning, the first of them," Seale said, "Even though the bail is set at \$40,000 each, an atrocious price. They are beginning to come out today."

"We have raised the first \$40,000," Seale told the press, "and we are half way into the next \$40,000. And I want this made known; this is the black community's money supporting us, It is munity's money supporting us. It is the black community that is giving us this money, and I hope they will continue to give us money." Seale said either Wells or Hilliard were the first out this

ILLEGAL GUNS
Hilliard was one of six Panthers arrested in Berkeley on February 25 when police raided Seale's home and arrested persons leav-ing it. Seale, his wife, Hilliard and three others were charged with felony gun violations. The case was handed up to a superior court last week.

Oakland police claimed Monday that an illegal cache of weapons was also discovered on Saturday night. According to the Oakland Tribune, "Police said Cleaver and Hutton were holed up at 1218 28th Street with two 9 mm automatic pistols, two AR-15 and one military-type M-14 automatic rifle, and a large

supply of ammunition, some armor-piercing."
A report said that 18 rifles and handguns "not obtainable on the open market," were seized in the

MORE PANTHERS

A PFP spokesman said "Black Panther membership has doubled in the past three weeks since the harassment of their leaders. The

harassment of their leaders. The Panthers have opened new offices in Oakland, San Jose and San Diego. "Their growth seems to be directly proportional to the harassments," the spokesman commented. "It increases with every action the cops take against them."

A nationwide drive to begin more Panther groups, in conjunction with a similar PFP program, will get under way immediately following Hutton's funeral Friday.

HUTTON BURIAL TIME FOR ACTION **NOT FOR MOURNING**

Bobby James Hutton was born on April 24, 1950 in Arkansas. He lived at 898 56th St., Oakland with his mother and two brothers.
"He attended Oakland Tech for a while," a Panther told BARB, "but he didn't finish. You know how hard it is for a smart black boy in white man's school..."

now nard it is for a smart black boy in white man's school..."

Bobby Hutton became Treasurer of the Black Panther Party for Self-Defense at its inception in October 1966. A trusted friend of Huey P. Newton and Bobby Seale, the two made him an officer of the Party in spite of his age. Hutton was 16.

RACISM REACTION

When the gas and the smoke had cleared after Saturday night's street battle, first reaction to Hutton's slaying was powerful. It came directly in the wake of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King in Memphis, Community officials seared more trouble.

Panther Chairman Bobby Seale called for quite, denouncing spon-

Panther Chairman Bobby Seale called for quite, denouncing spontaneous outbursts as unneccessary and unproductive. "The East Bay was quiet because we told it to be quiet," Seale said later.

By Monday, Hutton's name had already been added to the list of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X., Medgar Evers and others. On the Berkeley campus, Hutton's name was a rallying cry.

The Peace and Freedom Party joined with the Black Panthers to march against racism. Thousands of students and concerned citizens trekked to Oakland's Alameda County Court House on Monday, through the white neighborhoods, to protest the racism that struck down King and Hutton and dozens of others.

We will chronicle this slaughter for all the world to see; to every nation we will present the ugly facts we have collected. We will ask the U.N. to sponsor a national referendum in this country,

and ask that they send observers into the ghettos. Finally we shall ask them to have the U.S. censured by all the world.

ask them to have the U.S. censured by all the world.

"On Friday we will also launch a campaign to begin immediately Black Panther and PFP groups all across the country."

The PFP spokesman said it was "a significant political action" that the first group to successfully organize in the ghetto was the Black Panthers.

Peace and Freedom Party also revealed that a massive telegram campaign to aid Eldridge Cleaver's fight for freedom had been undertaken on Tuesday, to rally support from prominent figures all over the country and bring many of them to Oakland. Carlos Aponte, a PFP spokesman, said the telegrams addressed to the Chairman of the Adult Authority had already begun to arrive by Wednesday.

WHERE FUZZ SPRUNG TRAP

The 1200-block of 28th Street is a quiet factory street in the West Oakland ghetto. One side is lined with little white houses. One of them, the third from the corn-er of Union, Number 1218, had a red and white aluminum awning over the front window last week.

Wednesday when this reporter-visited the 28th Street, the house had an awning but no windows and barely had three sides. It looked like any other house that had been bullet-ridden and gas-

bombed by police.

Bobby Hutton walked from that house on Saturday night as it was burning. He left it with his hands

house on Saturday night as it was burning. He left it with his hands in the air, and was slain by Oakland police.

He fell to the sidewalk just beyond the house. A shrine was placed on the spot of blood there at the corner of the property. Originally, it was just a shattered print of a painting and a few

Although Gregory uses such means as 40-day fasts and follows a vow that "I am not going to have my hair cut, or shave, or wear anything but work clothes until the war in Vietnam is stopped," he does not ever put down advocates of militant black power.

"Rap Brown and Stokely Carmichael taught me nonviolence," he said, "but then they saw the same rat that bit a baby five years ago bite another one today."

"I am a nonviolent vegetarian pacifist," Gregory told an Evanston audience earlier this year. "I amopposed to violence, but that's my hangup, I can't tell Rap and Stokely they should be against violence. I'm a vegetarian, I think it's wrong to kill animals. But I won't knock a steak from your hands."

On another occasion Gregory

On another occasion Gregory commented on the effectiveness of black militants: "They have or black militants; "They have scared the mightiest nation in the world to death, Why? Stokely doesn't have a missile, Rap Brown doesn't even have a canoe, Why? They told the truth.

"Stokely has been accused of reverse racism -- whatever that is.

The real meaning of Stokeley's message is I got a right to hate you the same way you hate me.
This is an honest ethical statement. Stokeley helped make the
movement honest by giving the
hypocrites a reason for copping

The Peace and Freedom Party The Peace and Freedom Party may select DickGregory as its presidential candidate. He has al-ready received the endorsement of the new party's Black and Brown Caucus, PFP groups in Kentucky, New York, and Pennsylvania have

Seale attended the King funeral—in Atlanta Tuesday.

"We understand the murder of Martin Luther King. It is significant much in the same way as the murder of our Bobby Hutton. We see it as the same kind of racist bullet."

TO MARK FULL YEAR WITHOUT **EXECUTIONS**

"California holds the world's record for the number of people record for the management of citizens

Lyons, chairman of Citizens Against Legalized Murder (CALM) stated this week.

Of the 448 people sitting on death row in the US, 4 are teenagers, and 75 of those await death in the state of California, Lyons and DAPP

in the state of California, Lyons told BARB.

Lyons and Reverend Lester Kinsolving will speak Monday noon in Sproul Plaza, on the first anniversary of the last state execution in

sary of the last state execution in California. Rev. Kinsolving, an Episcopal minister, was a leader of last year's abortion-liberalization drive.

The rally in Sproul Plaza Monday will commemorate the death of Aaron Mitchell, executed by the state on April 12, 1967. Mitchell, a black man was convicted of killing a white Sacramento policeman. Governor Reagan refused to commute the sentence.

Governor Reagan refused to commute the sentence.
Since Mitchell's death, both CALM and the ACLU have been testing the constitutionality of the death penalty. Until a decision is reached in the California courts, all executions have been stayed. "This is causing a backlog of people sitting on death row," Lyons stated. Last Monday, 13 new cells were opened to accommodate this backlog at San Quentin.

Lyons told BARB that these men will sit and wait to die "for an

Lyons told BARB that these men will sit and wait to die "for an indefinite amount of time," because if the California Supreme Court refuses to eliminate the death penalty, the case will go into the federal courts, and a federal stay on executions is expected until a ruling is made.
"If by that time, the US Supreme Court also refuses to abolish the death penalty, there will be such a backlog on death row that a bloodbath will ensue," Lyons said. The ACLU is challenging the constitutionality of the death penalty because it is a "denial of due process" and "constitutes cruel and unusual punishment." According to an ACLU spokes-

cruel and unusual punishment."
According to an ACLU spokesman, these two constitutional
guarantees are sacrificed because guarantees are sacrificed because the death penalty is imposed whimsically and "without stand-ardards or guidelines," because people under penalty of death are denied counsel in legal procedures beyond the supreme court, and be-cause of the exclusion from juries of those opposed to the death pen-

Lyons also pointed out that more than half the people who have been executed in the US have been black, "Blacks are executed far out of proportion to their popu-lation and to the black crime rate," he said.

On the first of this month, as-

semblymen Lester McMilan and John Miller introduced a bill in John Miller introduced a bill in the California Legislature to abolish the death penalty, but Lyons was pessimistic about the bill's success. "Reagan said he would veto any bill to abolish capital punishment," Lyon stated.

CALM's rally in Sproul Plaza on Monday will be part of its continuing effort to have the death penalty outlawed throughout the US.

"Although the ban on executions still exists in California," Lyons said, "we want to impress upon people that the law is still on the books and that the gas chamber is

books and that the gas chamber is

books and that the gas chamber is still kept in working order."

The most common argument for the existence of the death penalty is that capital punishment is a deterrent to crime.

Lyons pointed out however, "Tennessee has capital punishment, but the killer of Dr. King wasn't deterred -- Texas too has a very active electric chair, but the killer of President Kennedy wasn't deterred either."

OF STRYX AND SHUX--DJ ON RECORD AS JUST A WEE **BIT SCRATCHY**

At precisely 8pm Wednesday night Larry Miller showed his true colors to the entire listening audience of KMPX. They were a bright shade of chickenshit.

Miller, who was fired by Station Manager Ron Hunt four months ago for assorted fucking off, returned saccharin-voiced in the 8-12pm spot,

returned saccharin-vowhich, in his opening words, he "covets." The spot used to belong to D J Tom Donahue, whom Miller blames for his firing.

Shortly before Miller went on the air he issued a vague statement, in the Bobby Kennedy tradition, saying that he had "been forced to re-evaluate" his position in the strike. He charged that "the strikers have apparently been misled by irresponsible and self-interested leadership" and may be doing "irreparable damage" to themselves.

At 9:30 pm this reporter enter-

At 9:30 pm this reporter entered the KMPX control room to ask Miller for a clarification of the ambiguous release. His reply was that legal complications and re-strictions brought on by the strike and negotiating lawyers prevented him from saying anything for pub-

lic record.
"That doesn't make any sense,"
said striking DJ Bob McClaylater.
"We're dealing in specifics,
whereas he's making vague
charges for which he expects equal
consideration from the public."

Miller denies that one of the reasons for his breaking the strike is a personal vendetta against Tom Donahue. "This whole thing has been blown out of proportion," Miller contended, "I was as straight with him as I could possibly be. We didn't get involved in getting uptight with each other till after the strike."

Miller came back as Program Director, a position which Donahue had held since shortly after joining the station a year ago, Donahue quit his position several days before the strike.

Dusty Superphiek into apri-

fore the strike.

Dusty Superchick, irate engineer, had a different story.

"Bullshit, man. We all worked with that paranoid mother for a year. It's his own ego thing; it's his contention that he started KMPX and that it's really his thing; therefore he ought to be in control. That's bullshit man."

Everything else aside, somebody in there is scared. The night Miller went back on the air they hired a rent-a-cop to stand guard outside the station door in the event anyone unsympathetic should get overly carried away. At least get overly carried away. At least one person (not a striker) did, but was prevented from entering the studios.

According to the station's According to the station's secretary, listener reaction calls were running "about 10-1 in favor" of Miller's return. But perhaps Miller explained it away himself when he inadvertantly remarked that "Most listeners are confused. All than know is that KMPX doesn't

"Most listeners are confused, All they know is that KMPX doesn't sound as good as it used to and they're not sure why."

For the first time, BARB was able to speak with Lee Crosby, owner of KMPX and its sister station KPPC in L.A. However, once again as in the past, Crosby maintained that things were going very well.

When questioned about the strikers' charges concerning financial conditions Crosby took cover behind "legal restrictions against making any public statement," but assured that the BARB would be notified as soon as Management was "prepared to make a state-ment."

The management did have some-thing to say to several advertisers who went back on the air Tuesday. Despite their contention that "We're not trying to convince anyone that the strike is over," striker Bob McClay had a version of

his own.
"United Air Lines told me that the station management told them the strike was over, and that if they withdrew their ads now the

station would send the NEW employees down to picket."
United canceled shortly after informational leafletting began outside their offices. Western Desk, one of the first advertisers to be heard on KMPX, also regardled

cancelled.

Nitty gritty time for Miller, according to McClay, was early this week. "It was either go on the air or leave town and go back to Detroit." In a call to Miller Wednesday evening McClay said, "You're where we'd all like to be with honor, except you're there without it."

Miller, whose attitude out.

with nonor, except you're there without it."

Miller, whose attitude and expression reflected the weariness of the circumstances surrounding his decision to return to the air, allowed that it was "a very difficult decision to make, It's really putting me through changes,"

Miller was invited by McClay to participate in an all-night show on KPFA to discuss the issues with the strikers, sans Donahue, but declined. He told BARB, "Man, what can I say? I've already talked to those people all week, and legally I'm restricted to say anything in public."

in public."

This reporter then pointed out that perhaps he had an obligation to the listeners to clear up whatever "confusion" he could re-

ever "confusion" he could regarding the present situation at the station. He shrugged it off with basically the same comment.

"If Miller hadn't gone back on the air we could have ALL gone back in two days," McClay said.

"Now it will be at least another two weeks."

In this reporter's view what it amounts to is that Miller doesn't give much of a fuck about see page 16

"The causal point of view tells us a dramatic story about how D came into existence: it took its origin from C, which existed before D, and C in its turn had a father, B, etc. The synchronistic view on the other hand tries to produce an equally meaningful picture of coincidence. How does it happen that A', B', C', D' etc., appear all in the same moment and in the same place? It happens in the first place because the physical events A' and B' are of the same quality as the psychic events C' and D', and further because all are the exponents of one and the same momentary situation."

This, from the introduction to the I CHING (Princeton University Press) by Jung, is one of the best explanations of the structure of the new film. If we take the letters ABC to represent elements of the film, shots, or frames, or sound elements, then we can see that synchronicity is a fundamental principle of experimental film construction.

Commercial films go out of their way to drain this spurious color out of their photography, even in location shooting, thereby drain-

struction.

I'm not saying that every good experimental or advanced film must base its construction on this

must base its construction on this non-linear, or non-causal basis, because some rather good films are made which more or less avoid the synchronistic form.

Fred Camper's JOAN GOES TO MISERY is an example of an interesting film that is constructed essentially in linear terms. Although it is a character study, it more or less follows a dramatic or story form.

Joan receives something from a men on a street corner. What

man on a street corner. What it is I don't know, and you never find out. He hands it to her and says: "It's not exactly pretty, but I guess it's what you want." Most of the film is silent, until

Most of the film is steich, units of the film is steich, units telephone rings, or she turns on the radio. Joan goes home, gets undressed, and stuffs herself with cake and cookies. Anyway, that's her problem. Psychologically speaking, she's a fat pig. I think Freud talks about the

pig. I think Freud tanks
syndrome.

The grooviest part of JOAN is
the color, which is swirly-grainindoor-sunset. That's one way to
describe it. Another, is to say describe it. Another, is to say that the overall color, Joan's skin color, her clothes, everything in fact, is tinted by the color of the walls of the room the scene was shot in.

According to its modest little yellow catalogue, "it seeks to develop the concepts and forms of experience necessary to comprehend the events of this century and the meaning of one's life within it, to examine artistic expression beyond the scope of the usual academy and to promote a position of social integrity and commitment from which scholars now stand aloof."

.....which can hardly be disputed.

Read the first paragraph again, the quotation from Jung, and you'll see that the key to the home movie is coincidence. A conventional point of view would have it that home movies are examples of total disorganization. True they don't tell a story, or even involve the kind of progression that might be found in a non-narrative, but linearly constructed work.

Many of the techniques of the home movie have been applied to the experimental film because they add authenticity. The techniques are in opposition to the techniques that have been accepted as the grammar of the film. And films which use the conventional theatrical grammar, more often than not, lie to tell lies. Experimental

cal grammar, more often than not, lie to tell lies. Experimental

which use the conventional theatrical grammar, more often than not, lie to tell lies. Experimental films lie to tell the truth, if they are any good.

Naturally, when these new techniques, or rather home movie techniques, are used self consciously, they stick out like a blanched pelvis, as does any improperly used technique.

The free elements, home movie elements, that I can isolate in JOAN, are jump cutting, and the colors. JOAN, as a character study, is completely believable. It rings right. It's surprising that so few underground films have attempted to portray a character, however so briefly.

How foxy can you get, and what do you get if you're foxy?

If you listen to the critics (or even read the ads), "The Fox" is a dirty movie. Director Mark Rydell, the story goes, has foxily plundered D. H. Lawrence's novella to legitimize what nonetheless remains a "sexploitation film." But if that's what Rydell was working for, I'm afraid he

failed.

True, the film has its moments. Three of them, to be exact: first, March (Anne Heywood) arises from her bath, looks longingly at her body in the mirror, puts one hand

to her crotch and masturbates while the camera moves demurely to her shoulders; second, March and Paul (Keir Dullea) play out and Paul (keir Dunes) play out a fairly standard (nude) love-scene on the floor of a shed; and finally, March and Jill (Sandy Dennis) indulge themselves in a very beautiful, very passionate

Those who are offended by these Those who are offended by these scenes defend their position by maintaining, quite correctly, that Lawrence never wrote them, and, perhaps less correctly, that he never would have. I personally find the issue as irrelevent as it is unanswerable: Lawrence wrote as much as he could at the time, and the film contains nothing not implied by him.

the film contains nothing not implied by him.

"The Fox" IS per Lawrence.
Lewis Carlino and Howard Koch, who did the adaptation, remained remarkably faithful to the text.
Where they deviated from Lawrence, they did so for the better.
Jill's parents are cut from the end, and one wonders why Lawrence didn't do the same. A tree which he brings in only when he needs it is converted into a thematic element of the film. A wayward cow carelessly thrown out of the novella is marvelously returned to the screen.

The casting, too, is superb.

The casting, too, is superb. Sandy Dennis plays her usual dazed Sandy Dennis plays her usual dazed and fluttering female, but here she fits. Keir Dullea (David in "David and Lisa") is properly male and menacing, a true fox in the henhouse. And Anne Heywood, seen in this country for the first time, seems to be precisely the woman Lawrence was talking about.

Two things, however, did bother me. The first, confessedly personal, objection is the slaughter of the fox. Lawrence treated this scene almost perfunctorily, almost as an accident of fate. But Rydell has converted it into a display of inutterable cruelty, beginning with a butchered chicken, and ending with a full-screen (color) close-up of the fox as the buckshot tears it to pieces.

The second problem is that of The second problem is that of the ending, Both Lawrence and Rydell make the Jill-March relationship seem much healthier, much more joyful and honest, than that between March and Paul. Yet the Hero gets the Girl by callously, if somewhat fortuitously, murdering Jill.

Sic semper Lesbianis. Despite

the best efforts of all involved, the scene contains a definite, al-though elusive, note of falseness. (Perhaps it's the sound of the deus ex machina.)

deus ex machina.)
But if one wishes to quibble with the film (Rydell's first), the complaints, I think, will ultimately have to be referred to Lawrence. As a measure of the skill which has gone into the making of "The Fox", I suggest that you compare the film's final image with last few pages of the text. In this case, one picture seems to be worth approximately 2,160 words.



"Many of the GI's question the whole thing," said Petrick. "After all, Johnson was the one who was laying the pattern for the war in Vietnam and he was the one who was telling the GI's to go offleroically and fight. Then when he ically and fight. Then when he turns around like this and just withdraws it means he is expressing alto if doubt about the whole program he was carrying out in Viet-

Petrick also spoke of the atti-tudes of Black soldiers toward the

But in the last thirty seconds of discussion, Mayor Johnson somehow got it to come out as supporting their own proclamation. The surprised look on Margaret Gordon's face indicated she either was not aware she had supported the PFP, or that the Mayor had given her the shaft.

Dr. Gordon (a professor of economics at UC) did get passed, however, a "Martin Luther King Memorial Fund" to provide money for a "West Berkeley Health Clinic" and other human rights projects.

Since the PFP resolution was not on the agenda, Mario got on the mike immediately and asked if the

Dr. Gordon moved that it be brought in after the City Manager's report, and the council supported this motion, with the Mavor voting against.

It was after Mario made his
presentation that the audience began to vocalize. When councilman

But the Mayor said, "I wish to compliment the good sense of humor of these remarks made in an emotional situation."

The ugliest insult of all was made by DeBonis against Dellums. He said the black councilman had "just moved upnear me. Mario repeatedly pointed out Tuesday night that "America is about to go down" over White Racism "and you must do something about it."

The first march to end white racism ended on the green shores of Lake Merritt within one hundred yards of Huey Newton's prison cell atop the Alameda County Court House in Oakland.

There, nearly five thousand people who had marched from the UC campus in Berkeley shouted "Free Huey" -- Free Huey" and Huey heard it up there in his cell because prisoners and trustees thrust their hands out through the bars in the "V for Victory" sign of the march.

march.

Tiring of the speeches made from the top of the Peace & Freedom Truck parked in the museum hall (Jack Weinberg was left in mid-sentence), the students and youths, black and white, got up off the grass and swarmed across the street to the building.

All traffic was stopped and the marchers flowed up to the main entrance behind which was a solid phalanx of helmeted policemen. Holding up signs of protest for the cops and office workers inside to see, they pounded on the glass-doors until the cops came out and slowly pushed the demonstrators back across the street.

No confrontation took place. Somebody in the Peace & Freedom Party wisely collected all the shields and placed them inside their truck.

After shouting their slogans and

After shouting their slogans and making their point to the passing commute auto and bus traffic, the

members slowly broke up and went

This was the most non-violent violent demonstration that ever took place in the experience of this reporter (who has been in all of them since the troop-trains in Ber-

keley).

We pushed the cops to the brink,

the cops pushed us back to the sidewalk, and everybody knew that nothing else was going to happen. Earlier, one black was rapping away before the speeches started. "If you want to free Huey, go get him," he was shouting to anybody who would listen.

who would listen.


Many did. "How long have you sung 'We Shall Overcome' and nothing happened? I'm no leader. We don't need no leaders. Go get him?" he said.

Bob Avakian, of P&F, got on the mike and said, "I didn't come five miles just to hear speeches." He asked for a show of hands to "surround the Court House whether the pigs like it or not."

Most everybody held up a hand. But the speeches did go on. Prof. Moe Hirsch, of UC Mathematics Dept., was chairman (and made a speech). Bob Mandel, an organizer of Stop The Draft Week, pointed out that there are "now over 30,000 troops in America, while in Vietnam in 1964 there were only 16,000 men."

He said that on April 23, they will "close down the Oakland Induction Center, and when the buses come and we can't stop them, we shall march over to this Court House and support Huey and Cleaver. This year, the Stop The Draft Week will have both these points."

Mike Jones asked people "to get up off it" and tell it to "your



city councils."
Paul Jacobs spoke, and his eloquence nearly made Lake Merritt overflow.

overflow.

By this time, people were shouting "let's go free Huey."

Jack Weinberg attempted to put HIS political content to the meeting. "We must understand that it is necessary to make the following decisions..." and the marchers started getting up and leaving.

A young black somehow got on

the mike and made stinging indictment of white power structure. "We're all Americans, but us blacks don't get nothing. Black and white get killed in Vietnam, but us blacks at home don't get nothing. I'm ready to die here instead of Vietnam. I want freedom now!"

was overwhelming," she said.

"Since everything Eldridge was doing was for the defense of Huey Newton, it simply means that the support for Huey goes up."

Kathleen couldn't find words adequate to convey her feelings about the Oakland cops shooting 17-year-old Bobby Hutton to death as he was trying to surrender.

"I, myself, am more shook up over Bobby Hutton's murder than over any other killing in the civil rights struggle," she said. "It was subhuman. It was - it was savage.

"That whole attack - with machine guns, floodlights, teargas, just because more Panthers were gathered there - was so blatant, so, so brutal, it shook up the community to no end.

"If they're interested in stop-

"If they're interested in stopping the spread of the Panthers, that's the worst thing they could have done."

Kathleen Cleaver spoke in a calm, quiet even voice which betrayed not even her exhaustion after days and nights of work to aid the Panthers arrested in the Saturday battle.

She smiled that Eldridge, her husband, since December, was in

husband, since December, was in good spirits during jail visits, despite being shot, gassed, kicked, locked in solitary, and quickly shuffled from Highland Hospital to City Jail to San Quentin

to Vacaville.

When BARB suggested that the Adult Authority has customarily had an easy time violating parolabels into price on a whim

had an easy time violating parol-ees back into prison on a whim, Kathleen pointed out that it would be different with Eldridge. "When the Adult Authority takes Eldridge Cleaver, they have one of the most powerful leaders work-ing to defend Huey Newton, and the author of a book (Soul on Ice) that looks like a budding best sel-ler.

"With Eldridge, the issue becomes clearer and deeper: the rights of the individual against a police state. It becomes a key case in regard to their supposed right to violate people into prison."

With attorneys Charles Garry

and Alex Hoffman watching the legal side, and thousands of outraged citizens keeping alert to his fate, Kathleen doesn't expect Eldridge to disappear unnoticed behind the walls, as happens to most ex-convicts sucked in for alleged parely evolutions parole violations.

The importance of the Black Panthers and their Minister of Information, Eldridge Cleaver, is indicated by the fact that Cleaver's parole was suspended by the Adult Authority meeting in Sacramento to invoke an emergency suspension procedure.

A formal hearing of the Adult Authority will be held on Friday, April 12, at the Ferry Building in San Francisco to affirm or reject the emergency action.

Kathleen Cleaver surmised that inaccurate accounts in the daily press of Eldridge's record arose from overzealous interpretations of "Soul on Ice."

The local dailies said Eldridge was convicted of rape. In fact, Kathleen pointed out, he was never charged with rape. The only likely source of such a notion is some descriptive passages in Eldridge's

Panthers have always strongly opposed spontaneous outbursts of violence -- "which only hurt the black community," Kathleen noted -- and adamantly insist upon self defense, not offense, the Oakland police have branded them as the cause of violent botto includer.

cause of violent ghetto incidents.

The way the Panthers tell it, the branding is no accident.

"The attack on Saturday was just the latest in a series of attempts to wipe out the Panther leadership," Kathleen said. "That day we got information from a black policeman, who was very upset, about plans by the Berkeley, Oakland, and San Francisco police departments to destroy our leadership. leadership.

Huey Newton, Minister of Defense; Eldridge Cleaver, Minister of Information; Bobby Hutton, Treasurer; Bobby Seale, Chairman -- these are only the most well known of the Panthers who have been arrested or imprisoned or shot or killed in their fight for black liberation.

The usual pattern for less well-known Panthers is night-time hassles by bands of cops whose actions have made "pig" the univerword for cop in the Panther

One Oakland Panther pointed out One Cakland Panther pointed out that he was never bothered by cops until he began wearing the idenfiable "uniform" of leather jacket, "Free Huey" buttons, and black beret. Since then, he says, he has been repeatedly harassed by the "fascist pigs."

What harvesse when they but a

What happens when they bust a leading Black Panther was related by Kathleen Cleaver after she spoke with Eldridge at the Vacaville prison.

"When he was in the squad car, she told BARB, "they kicked and beat him. Here he was shot in the foot and couldn't see or breathe because of all the tear gas, and they

still had to do that to him.
"When they got him to Highland
Hospital they tried to get rid of
all the nurses so he couldn't get
medical help. Then they took him
to City Prison for booking, but
didn't have any charges, so they
shot him to San Quentin immediate-

"Then they sent him to Vaca-ville for 'medical treatment,' but put him in solitary where there's no ventilation so he could hardly

breathe and they couldn't hear him if he needed medical care.

"He told me, 'If I didn't need medical attention when I was at Highland, I sure did by the time I reached Vacaville."

reached Vacaville."

While authorities were playing this shell game with Cleaver, his attorneys were going from jail to jail trying to catch up with him. Kathleen has a hunch about another reason for moving Eldridge around. "They know Eldridge," she said.

she said.
"The prisons were already tense

over the King murder, and they were afraid he might set something off.

"He told me he felt the only thing that saved him was that he had taken all his clothes off (when had taken an ins clothes of (when he walked from the besieged house into the police floodlights)," Kath-leen said. "Since he was naked, they couldn't claim they thought he was armed."

She said Eldridge had told Bobby Hutton to disrobe before sur-rendering, but he had been too embarrassed. So seven bullets cut

him down, unarmed,
"When they killed Bobby in cold
blood, they created another symbol," Kathleen Cleaver said, "Now
they have intensified the feelings
of the people on a broad scale.
People now feel they have to take some kind of action, action to pro-tect the leaders of the black lib-eration struggle nationwide. "When they murdered Martin

Luther King, they were killing the past. But when they murdered little Bobby Hutton, it was like they were trying to kill the future." -- jas

"The police account that the Panthers attacked them is a lie," the joint statement said. "Rather, the Panthers did what they always said they would do. The were attacked by white police in their community and the defended themselves."

The statement accuses the police


This picture of my grandfather hung in the living room of his farm house in Millington, Michigan. As a child I was fascinated by the big curl in his hair that looked like a large BUMP. Later when trying to decide on the shape of Gumby's head I remembered my grandfather's "bump." I therefore immortalized this bump in my semi-abstract boy-hero, Gumby.

From phone calls and people in the street I get comments such as these: "Hey, what is it???...Who is this Arthur?... What's all this Candid Candidate and Valentine Party thing anyway? Well, let me begin and answer these questions in order. Over the next several weeks it should all be clear to you. First, What is IT? — IT is my MANIFESTO which is defined by Webster as "A public declaration, usually of a sovereign or political group, showing intentions and motives." I declare my intention to offer myself as your Host at my Valentine Party: I invite you to be my guests at a Valentine Party. My motive is that I want to give New Heart to this nation first and eventually to the world, I feel America's Heart is broken and needs renewal and regeneration, Part of that New Heart is hidden in each of you. I intend to help uncover and bring out and bring together these precious Parts into a Valentine PARTY. I do my part first, opening my heart to you by starting to answer your question: Who is Arthur? Arthur is a CLOKEY, However, since you are not likely to know Clokey, I will begin with a more familiar part of Arthur; that is, the GUMBY of Arthur. A few years ago I had a delightful experience in Boston where I had gone to persuade toy jobbers to distribute my Gumby doll. The largest jobber there had just turned me down saying he didn't think Gumby was very well known and didn't have any sales potential. Dejected I walked away from the office and down this street in a poverty district toward my car. Walking up the street toward me came three black boys about 12 or 13 years old. I pulled out a green Gumby doll and held it up saying: "Do you fellas know who this is?" They all answered in unison: "GUMBY!" By their expressions on their faces I knew they loved Gumby.

This incident occurred at a time when my Gumby Film Company was on the edge of collapse financially. Ilearned the hard way that honest quality films for children were not considered "commercial" enough by most TV stations. Thanks to the tiny minority of the smart station managers (like Fred Thrower of WPIX, N.Y.) who could see the true potential of my honest creation Gumby, I received enough exposure in a few large markets to prove my point; namely, that everybody loves Gumby! Gumby is my Child of Clay, green clay. The children of this continent and of Europe, Australia, Asia, and Africa have been tripping with my little Clayboy for over ten years now. A few weeks ago at a rally where I heard Dr. Spock it occurred to me that whereas Spock specialized in concern for babies' bodies, I followed up with concern for 'their hearts and minds through Fantasy during childhood, Now like Spock I feel deep rage at what the Manipulators are doing to Gumby's former "claymates," the young rebels thruout our land trying to live a life of joy like Gumby instead of stereotype robots, It was interesting the way Gumby was born. About 1955 I made an experimental Abstract Art Film entitled GUMBASIA which, by the way, has the distinction of being the only ABSTRACT film included last year in Playboy Magazine's series History of Sex in Cinema!! Gumbasia, a film of clay changing shape and color to music, was shown to Sam Engel of 20th Century Fox. Sam, who loved children, suggested that I create a clay puppet boy character for a children's TV film series using my Gumbasia Dimensional Animation technique, I did this and he financed a pilot film, the first Adventure of Gumby. When Tom Sarnoff of NBC saw the film, he immediately signed me up. NBC financed the first part of my Gumby adventure, Within two years I was able to start producing the Gumby Series independently of NBC. Well, enuff fer now.

FLOWER POWER TOPPLES TOWER

"If I could turn off the lights for awhile, they might listen."
That, Dale Morrow told BARB, is why he drove a bulldozer into a PG&E power tower in San Mateo last week, blacking out ten Peninsula towns.

Morrow called BARB an hour before turning himself in to the lawmen "to make sure people know the real story." Essentially, the real story is that he wanted to end the war and to cut the Achil-

end the war and to cut the Achilles Heel of The Man.

'Now that the blacks are rioting,' Morrow told BARB Monday, 'they are listening, but they wouldn't listen before. The only thing they understand is power.

'They're nothing without their machines. They can't fight a war without electricity.'

Morrow said he had planned to continue disrupting major power lines all summer, 'but I can't continue to fight them on their own terms. I can't justify destructive actions—as they always do.''

He described a way to use an ex-plosive charge to throw a cable over high voltage lines to short them out. "I was going to do over high voltage lines to short them out. "I was going to do that Friday night—there's a place near South San Francisco that would black out the whole city (San Francisco)—but I'm glad it didn't work because it would have caused bloodshed."
Other cities the Friday night

Other cities that Friday night were fighting flames and calling in troops. Twice that night Morrow failed in his efforts to shutoff all electrical power in San Francisco. Francisco.

Francisco.

"Something greater prevented it," he said.

Although he says he has not been involved in other recent raids on electrical power lines in the Bay Area, Morrow indicated that such action could affect the war.

"It would force them to bring the troops out of Vietnam to protect their own selfish interests,"

Recently a construction laborer working on BART, Morrow spent by years in the 2nd Airborne where he learned about methods of chem-

he learned about methods of chemical and biological warfare.
"I know what kind of madmen are creating these instruments of death," he said.

Morrow turned himself in because "this way I'll have a chance to say something. Besides, right now they are doing the worst they can do to me. It would be better to be locked up than forced to work for their goals."

He said he wasn't sure where he would turn himself in, but would wander around the SF City Hall until he found someone willing to take him. It wasn't easy.

take him. It wasn't easy.

Morrow then ambled into the City Hall press room, where the Chro-nicle reporter there interviewed him for about a yard of good copy before taking him to the Hall of

Since details of his story checked out with unpublicized facts, the San Mateo D.A. decided to charge Morrow with a felony, maliciously injuring or interfering with electric power transmission lines.

Police now may not use only the language of the statute in accusing a person of a crime. 


