Editor, Berkeley BARB:

This is a plea from myself for myself and my family to all dissenters against police harassment tactics from would you believe small town fuzz.

Up until the time I began reading the BARB a few weeks ago I considered myself a square solid citizen and was even stupid enough to be proud of the fact that I had a 21 year old son, who was aiding the narcs by agreeing to make grass purchases from "undestrables." Said undesirables being school children and others who saw fit to express desire to sell or use a little grass.

After playing joe citizen for several months my son declined to further aid the local honkies telling them that he was too busy. He had this awakening after viewing

had this awakening after viewing some of the local scene and find-ing that all is not pure with the ing that all is establishment.

He steadfastly refused to take part in what one fair-minded of-ficer of another department told him bordered on entrapment and conspiracy. He was then advised that he could be burned if he didn't cooperate.

After several weeks of phone calls from the fuzz urging his continued cooperation it died down -- So We Thought!!

At first we were subjected to checks for drivers licenses and possible equipment violations on our three cars, it got so that I couldn't drive anywhere at night without meeting a stormtrooper who would thoroughly shake down my car without giving any reason other than "just a routine check."

This eventually died without any prosecution except a couple minor equipment violation tickets and we thought we were free of the gendarmes unreasonable search.

We then turned our attention to

darmes unreasonable search.

We then turned our attention to writing articles for the local paper regarding civil rights for minorities, anti-war, and also we were active on local radio talk programs, anonymous we thought, on the subject of Vietnam, free thinking, unjust laws, and the minority program which I feel needs attention here by an organization or persons who have the ability to stop the persectuion of Negroes and Mexican Americans in this viand Mexican Americans in this vicinity.

This valley which has very few Negroes has a right-wing perse-cution group against black people larger than any I have ever heard of percentage wise by population. They don't even try to hide it. You hear the word "nigger" used on local talk shows in a derogative manner all the time.

manner all the time,

The next worst wordto "nigger" is peace creep, I have evidence and can furnish further evidence I believe that trailer courts as high as 50% vacant and advertising for customers will not rent space to Afro-Americans

space to Afro-Americans.

A "love-in" held here last July
2 was attended by more fuzz it
appeared than flower children. Ordinances which I believe to be unconstitutional were equickly passed by the Santa Maria Council and The Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors to "regulate" those who would use the parks. These ordinances were ac-cording to the press aimed at the hippy types whom the local hicks feared would invade their domain.

And now to the nitty gritty of what could happen and did hap-pen following my published ar-ticles against war and discrimina-

tion.

Today at 3 p.m. April 22 the local fuzz knocked at my door. My son, just turned 18, answered the door. Two plained clothed officers flashed identification and told my son after he identified himself that he was "under arrest" and "we are going to search the house." They barged right in and headed for a room he shares with his 21 year old ex-informer brother.

I asked them what the charge I asked them what the charge was and they told me that it was burglary continuing their search. I asked them if they had a search warrant and one said no. My wife asked them the same question and they told her they didn't need

they told her they didn't need one.

They thoroughly searched the room not finding anything incriminating except a rifle which I suppose they felt was incriminating. I had several other guns in a rack on the wall and one officer advised me that he was taking them all with him together with the ammunition and his exact words were 'you better be able to produce receipts for these weapons in a couple of days or you are in serious trouble. When I told them I couldn't produce a receipt immediately but produce a receipt immediately but could if I had time to dig out my ecords he said, "that's your prob-

lem.
They also contemplated taking along with them aguitar, amplifier, and a portable battery charger but when I told them they were making a big ass out of themself as well as causing me a lot of trouble, I guess it finally soaked through their right wing skulls that even the fuzz can fuck up.

their right wing skulls that even the fuzz can fuck up.

Anyway they took only the one rifle which was the fuck up of the century for the hick fuzz since I have complete records of purchase of the gun. It belongs to my older son. my older son.

They then proceeded to my garage which looks like an exploded hardware store of tools and equipment, They gave a search which If I had been hiding anything like narcotics for which they were apparently looking I could have had a ton stored and they wouldn't have found it.

One officer busied himself feel-

have found it.

One officer busied himself feeling through a sack of garden fertilizer. Another looked into a deep freeze and then began staring at a garbage can he had raised the lid on. He stared intently for several minutes at what I believe was the only bloody evidence in sight — a discarded kotex showing the midpoint of my wife's menstrual period.

PARIS PEACE TALKS DUE

'US' LEADERS SPLIT-New divisions have emerged within the Johnson admini-stration' over "Peace Talk Secrets" -- NY TIMES

The NY Times - which has more reporters and more money than The BARB - has come up with news reported two weeks ago by

news reported two weeks ago by Sgt Pepper.

This, of course (the split within the administration) is fully known in Hanoi - plus one other factor they are aware of, i.e., "the dollarcrisis," as they put it to Prof Franz Shurmann last month.

The assassination of Martin Luther King has ironically intensified

this crisis.

We, in the US are not aware of it. We think everything is "under control," including the dollar.

However....
Ultimately, it appeared, the nation had just three possible economic courses: to somehow end the nomic courses: to somehow end the Vietnam war, root of the payments problem and therefore heart of the matter; to adopt a full wartime economy, with sky-high taxes, wage and price controls, and perhaps rationing; or to face forced devaluation of the dollar and perhaps adepression-breeding world monetary mess."

This quote is on page 100, The New Yorker magazine, Mar 30, 1968 issue, in the article "In Defense of Sterling," Actually, it should have been titled "In Defense

fense of Sterling." Actually, it should have been titled "In Defense

of the Dollar."

Quite clearly, LBJ decided to get out of Vietnam.

He had just appealed for "a program of national austerity to defend the dollar, yet at the same time reportedly weighing the notion of a huge increase in the Vietnam force, which would be to the national balance of payments problem what high-octane gasoline would be to a fire," the article points out.

Rather than throwing gasoline on a fire to put it out. LBJ backtracked (or, somebody grabbed him by the shoulders and turned him and Gen Westmoreland COMPLETELY around, a fact, I feel, is much closer to the truth), so, here we are "negotiating."

LIBERALS LEND ZEST TO **OAKLAND BACKWASH**

The Home Defense Association Held its organizational meeting Tuesday night in Oakland. It turned out to be far different from what its neo-fascist organizers had planned it to be.

BARB's agent sat dressed to the gills in a 'white man's' suit as the audience, packed with blacks, white radicals and liberals, turned the meeting into a spirited attack on the principles espoused by the organizer of the group.

on the principles espoused by the organizer of the group, Herbert Clark, a small-time real-estate wheel from San Lorenzo, faced an audience of whom about two-thirds were opposed to the idea of a 'second line of defense' against ''rioters'. "which would value property above life and would assemble a para-military goon sound.

squad,
Clark, who had trained Cuban
exiles in Florida with his own
funds, received only one favorable
question during the hour-long question during the hour-long question period. Surprisingly, the brunt of the at-

Surprisingly, the brunt of the attack was brought by Ben Williams of KPIN News, who fired a string of pointed, acidic challenges at Clark. Williams, apparently a Black man off-camera, is a Negro while on the screen. No lights were on him this time.

The Home Defense Association was intended to organize residents of the East3ay by squads in blocks into what would appear to be standing lynch mobs. Clark said that during "emergencies" the members would "challenge" any intruders." The members would be armed. armed.

While Clark was evasive as to how a person would be determined to be a "rioter," it was obvious from the reaction of his honky cohorts that any Black would be

it." Clark tried hard not to project a racist image during the exchange at the Lake Merritt New Boat House. He said that he was also attempting to help residents of the Black community to form their own chapters, complete with "instruction" available from the police department. denartme

But Clark's disclaimer flew in the face of the other green arm-bands in the room. One of them was revealed as a convinced Nazi by a female reporter from an establishment rag. Others occa sionally shouted their own racist statements during heated exchan

ges.
The classic Oakland crackers bracketing BARB's agent also gave their own familiar muttering performances. There are plenty more where they came from.
As the audience filtered out of the hall, the tables at the rear of the room held about ten completed registration forms.

the room held about ten completed registration forms.
Perhaps the ranks of the HDA will be swelled by numerous chapters in the Black ghetto and student community which will take their cue from the Viet Cong Battalion who "defected" in a mass, took military training from the government forces, and then marched ment forces, and then marched happily off with their new equip-ment and skills, leaving behind a thank-you note.



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WOMAN BATTLES SLUMLORD

One woman's fight against her landlord has erupted into a major rent struggle in the Mission district.

BARB learned of Mrs. Martha Rodriguez' battle against the Frank J. Gallagher Realty Company of San Francisco from John Ross, a spokesman for the Mission Tenants' Union

spokesman for the Mission Tenants' Union.

Ross told BARB how Mrs. Rodriguez, mother of three, was evicted from her apartment after she brought city-wide attention to her grievances against the Gallagher firm. Mrs. Rodriguez' rent was raised from \$90 to \$125 and then to \$250 in two months' time after she deducted the cost of a needed doorlock from her rent, Ross said.

She sought aid from the Neighborhood Legal Assistance Center and from TV Channel 5's "Action Line" program. An "Action Line" program an early in February apparently disgruntled Gallagher and he gave her 30 days' notice, according to Ross.

and he gave her 30 days' notice, according to Ross.

The NLA obtained a 15-day extension, but advised her to move out. Gallagher then sued and won a \$300 judgment against Mrs. Rodriguez for damages. According to Ross, an NLA attorney arranged without her knowledge that the settlement be taken from her salary at the rate of \$30 a week. She filed an appeal, but the judge ruled against her.

The Mission Tenants' Union took

The Mission Tenants' Union took up her fight in March and began sending pickets to Gallagher's of-fice on the 3200-block of Mis-

The MTU was founded four years

The MTU was founded four years ago in the inner Mission district to help Latin, black and white low income families of the area defend themselves against exploitation by landlords.

MTU's strike against Gallagher was aimed at having him alter his decision to collect the \$300 settlement from Mrs, Rodriguez. Gallagher's response to the pickets was calling the police, Ross said.

After three weeks of picketing, upwards of 45 pickets were present in front of Gallagher's office. He moved to have a court injunc-

ent in front of Gallagher's office.

He moved to have a court injunction limit the number of picketers.

Ross charges that Gallagher has
used trailer trucks and paddy wagons to keep the pickets from approaching his office. Injunctions
have been issued which have attempted to limit the number of
MTII pickets to ten.

tempted to limit the number of MTU pickets to ten.

The spokesman for the MTU described this court action as "the only injunction issued against a community organization in recent years." Ross cited the Sheraton-Palace sit-ins in 1964 as the last known similar court action.

"This is the only significant rent struggle involving street ac-tion in the city at this time," Ross said. He said that reporters' stories submitted to the Chronicle the Examiner have been

on April 15, a municipal court judge, Fitzgerald Ames, refused to reverse the judgment against

to reverse the judgment against Mrs. Rodriguez.

A fracas which erupted on the courtroom floor between Gallagher and a sidekick, and John Ross, and several MTU workers resulted in the arrest of six. Gallagher and MTU men were confined to the same cell, Ross told BARB. "We asked him to negotifie in the cell but he wouldn't

told BARB. "We asked him to negotiate in the cell, but he wouldn't yield."

As of last Saturday, almost 60 pickets were still present in front of the store, despite the realtor's continued efforts to disperse them. Picketing is scheduled for every Saturday beginning at 10:30 a.m. at the Gallagher office, 3271 Mis-sion St.

POOR PEOPLE'S CAMPAIGN **READY TO GO**

The Bay Area is preparing to make its contribution to the upcoming Poor People's Campaign in Washington, hopefully not too little or too late since the Campaign

or too late since the Campaign begins Monday.

Next Sunday at the Oakland Auditorium, Andrew Young will lead a "rededicational" service in honor of the principles and practice of non-violence. Young is the Vice-President of SCLC, the organization led by the late Martin Luther King.

The service at the Oakland Auditorium will be free, but contribu-

torium will be free, but contribu-tions will be taken in support of the Poor People's Campaign. It will last from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. Local civil rights activists will speak.

speak.

The Poor People's Campaign, is expected to be the biggest demonstration in history, and officially begins in Washington next Monday. The leaders of the march will meet Monday with LBJ to inform him of their plans and their demands. demands.

How long the action will last depends on the "people's serv-

repends on the 'people's servants' there.

Plans are for the Campaign to last one month, unless Congress fails to pass legislation to help this country's 30 million poor

FIRST NORTH CAL **GREGORY-FOR-PRES HEADQUARTERS OPEN**

The mood of Dick Gregory's
Berkeley audience last Friday
night was best revealed when they
gave him a standing ovation after
he said, "when a long train of said, "when a long train of said," he said, "when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object evinces a design to reduce the people under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such a government..."

The same mood is apparently shared by the San Diego County Peace and Freedom Party, which voted "wholeheartedly" in an emergency Tuesday night meeting to endorse Gregory as the

stated that the survival of the Peace stated that the survival of the Peace and Freedom Party, especially on a national basis, may depend on Gregory's speedy nomination. He already has the endorsement of the PFM Black and Brown Cau-

cus.

Early this week the first Northern California headquarters of Dick Gregory for Peace and Free-dom President opened in Berkeley, temporarily at the home of Joel

Clark (849-4823).

Gregory's personal commitment to non-violence has audibly bothered some radicals, but much of their hesitance over his PFM candidacy has been dispelled after they heard him talk as militantly as H. Rap Brown.

"One time we measured progress by how fast black people climbed up," Gregory told his Berkeley listeners. "Now we gauge progress by how fast this system comes down!"

Supporters of his candidacy note that Gregory has already brought word of Peace and Freedom to students on about 75 campuses in 25 states during the past 90 days, with a militant stand on both the war and the black liberation struggle.

With the Peace and Freedom nationwide organizing drive currently getting bogged down in difficulties of communication and coordination, Gregory's coast-to coast campaigning can bring rapid life to PFM on a national scale, his backers point out.

Gregory's attitude toward activited the contraction of the state of the sta

life to PFM on a national scale, his backers point out.
Gregory's attitude toward activist-style politics is revealed both in his own participation in demonstrations and in his remarks about the Black Panther stance and anti-war protests.
Although he could probably cop a plea next month, he will instead go to jail for an expected 90-day sentence on a trespass rap resulting from a Fish-in on behalf of indians in Washington state. He told about 1,000 listeners at the Berkeley Community Theater last Friedrich and the state of the state keley Community Theater last Friday that he was looking forward to spreading the word to his jailmates.

When he tries to explain to white when he tries to explain to white youth where the Black Panthers and other black militants are at, he drives home the parallel of their position to that of the radical leaders of the first American Revolution.

leaders of the first American Revolution.

"Give me liberty or give me death," is what Rap Brown says," Gregory told the Berkeley audience. "The Black Panthers are audience. "The Black Panthers are just doing what Paul Revere did, saying, "The Redcoats are coming! Get a gun!" Then he quoted the "duty to throw off such a government" passage of the Declaration of Independence, bringing the audience to its feet.

He thanked the "young folks" for exerting so much pressure on LBJ through anti-war protests on the streets that he had to drop out of the Presidential race.

Each time he speaks, he makes it

Each time he speaks, he makes it clear that his personal ethics is not something he wants to impose on the movement, and that armed self-defense and liberation struggles were made an American birthright in 1776.

birthright in 1776. His aim, he says, is the liberation of all oppressed minorities. "When Governor Reagan said he'd heard about my concern for Negro rights, I told him, 'I don't give a damn about Negro rights. What I care about is human rights!"

Joel Clark, Gregory's PFM campaign manager for Northern California, emphasized that the formal effort in support of Gregory is just getting underway, and needs

is just getting underway, and needs immediate help, both volunteer work and donations of funds.

The upkeep on the candidate himself will be minimal, since he will be living only on juices until the November elections.

cisco Kennedy office went on to say that the ad on KMPX was "cer-tainly inconsistent" with Ken -

that the ad on KMPX was "certainly inconsistent" with Ken nedy's previous positions on labor,
and that it was simply a mistake.
Just last month Kennedy flew
to California from New York to
to California from New York to
to california from labor organizer Caesar Chavez who had just
completed a 25-day fast.
Chavez and his group of farm
workers have been on strike for
more than 2 years against the
scab-employing growers of Delano County.

lano County.

A spokesman from Berkeley Students for Kennedy blamed the 'mistake' on the San Francisco office, and the SF Kennedy office in turn blamed their ad agency.

Bill Thomas, a spokesman for the SF Kennedy backers, told BARB that as soon as he learned of the KMPX ad he had it removed from the air; and he even received a \$69 refund for the unused air

However, he said he couldn't divulge the name of the ad firm which botched the job because it had volunteered its services.

MACE WARNING PAYS OFF

BARB warnings on the dangers of MACE are finally being heeded by some responsible public officials

Jack Morrison, supervisor of San Francisco, has requested that the use of mace in the city be halted until tests of the blinding chemical could be made.

BARB revealed last month that the most extensive study of MACE, done by Dr. Lawrence Rose, has shown it to cause "complete and permanent eye damage."

Dr. Rose revealed this information to the press in March but no one in the bay area has acted on the medic's research and subsequent recommendations until Morquent recommendations until Morrison submitted his proposal last

week.

A government publication lists the main ingredient of MACE, methyl chloroform, can result in, among other scary things,...confusion, vertigo, anesthesia, and death from respiratory arrest.

One MACE victim, Rev. Donald Cowan, has suffered "corneal scars" and permanent loss of sight" from being blasted in the eyes with mace last January, according to Dr. Rose.

Other victims reported confusion, disorientation and the inability to answer questions coherently in subsequent police interrogations.

nerently in subsequent police in-terrogations.

One woman stated that she could not even remember her address due to the effects of mace.

Jack Morrison introduced his

resolution to discontinue the use of mace in SF after reading Dr. Rose's findings. The proposal is presently under consideration by the SF Board of Supervisors.

S.F. Police Chief Thomas Cahill reacted to Dr. Rose's findings and Morrison's proposal Thursday only by promising restraint in MACE's continued use.

Two cities in the U.S.

The chief was and App Arbor.

Milwaukee, Wisc. and Anh Arbor, Mich... have already outlawed the use of mace, BARB learned this

Rose has also received a number of calls from people across the country concerned that their cities are considering the use of MACE.

KMPX STRIKERS SET TO OPERATE ON OWN

Negotiations in the KMPX strike are creeping along . management seems to have little interest in hastening any form of resolution.

nastening any form of resolution.
In a mass-meeting last Thursday between strikers and bosses,
with most boycotting sponsors
present, Bill Graham, who has
been acting as mediator, brought
things down to a more or less
nitty gritty state.
Graham questioned whether on

Graham questioned whether or not the strikers and management were at all compatible, and whe-ther or not they agreed on what the station represented and was for.

Lee Crosby, station owner, said that he agreed with "90%" of what the strikers wanted to do, but that his interest was "solely financthat he

his interest was "solely financial."

The strikers, meanwhile, made several proposals in hopes of ending the strike. KM PX worker Milan Melvin told of these proposals:

1. That the employees would receive half the station's gross, and the employees would work out among themselves who received what salaries. (Formerly the employees had been getting about 60% of the gross.)

2. That the strikers would be willing to pay for whatever costs arose from station encounters with the FCC regarding the strike.

3. That the strikers would bear the cost of the strike as incurred by the station, hoping to raise

the cost of the strike as incurred by the station, hoping to raise money among "the community." Management said the proposals would be considered.

Graham suggested a three-day meeting where all parties involved would talk as "gentlemen," rather than on an official legal basis, to try and iron things out.

Management said they would call Strike Headquarters after considering the proposal and make known their decision.

their decision.

Tuesday, station manager Ron

Hunt call and said that manage ment "wasn't interested" in any-thing other than formal negotia-tions. According to Milan Melvin, Hunt also said that Crosby would never allow Tom Donohue or the girl engineers to return to the sta-

"We're going to maintain the strike. The sponsors are solidly behind us. We feel we've won, but Crosby would rather starve to death than let us back in," Melvin said.

Meanwhile, plans are underway Meanwhile, plans are underway to purchase or operate another station in the event the strike isn't settled. At strike headquarters a station is already under construction, complete with library and station log. "That's so we'll be ready to go on the air within ten minutes after we have a station," Melvin said. Melvin said.

"Our heads aren't really into
this striking thing," he concluded,
"What we really want to do is
operate a station."

Larry Blake, noted restaura-teur, proprietor of Telegraph Ave-nue's Rathskeller and various other eateries around the Bay Area, threw some cold turkey special at a BARB photographer this week. this week.

this week.

The story begins Monday when a volunteer KMPX strike assistant began informational picketing outside Blake's restaurant. Blake had been advertising on KMPX despite the strike.

Shortly, according to strike spokesmen, several employees of Blake's asked the leafleter to come in and talk to Blake. He agreed and stepped Inside.

Blake's asked the leafleter to come in and talk to Blake. He agreed and stepped inside.

He told Blake that he didn't think it was proper to advertise on the station given the existing conditions. Blake responded with something to the effect that he was taking the ad off anyway, and the conversation suddenly escalated to an altercation which ended when the leafleter was bounced out of the restaurant.

Tuesday night, in protest over the treatment received by their supporter, a half dozen strikers formed a picket line in front of Blake's Rathskeller.

At about 10 p.m., an hour after the line had formed, Blake came storming out of the door. The first figure his eyes impaled was BARB reporter - photographer Frank Herzog, standing with camera poised.

"Don't you take nictures of me

Herzog, standing with camera poised.

"Don't you take pictures of me, you bastard!" Blake shouted, according to Herzog's account. Blake slammed Herzog's camera right into the photographer's face an instant after the shutter clicked, cutting Herzog's lower lip and damaging the camera.

Herzog called the fuzz, A Sgt. upon arriving and hearing Herzog's story, commented, "Well, what did you expect?"

Herzog has retained an attorney, and says he will file a complaint with the D.A.

Wednesday afternoon, Stan Smith, Blake's public relations man, called BARB to "findout how the story was going to be handled."

man, called BARB to "find out how the story was going to be handled." He was told that BARB had talked to Herzog and KMPX witnesses to the incident, and would also talk to Blake and his employees if Blake so wished.

Smith assured BARB that Blake was right there in the restaurant, would be there all evening, and that he would call back as soon as he was free.

At press time Thursday BARB is still awaiting the call.

The truth: As a Wobbly and a fighter for years for workers' rights I can assure you the KMPX strike is not a simple case of workers fighting management. Much of the strike revolves around the dismissal by management of one of their bosses and his subsequent forceful harassing of the underpaid workers tog to out on strike to get him reinstated and seek better wages for themselves and him.

So by any standards Larry Miller's temporary return to KMPX as disc jockey while a strike was in progress was not scabbing since the strike was principally in support of the boss who unjustly fired him.

PANTHER HASSLES TO US JUDGE

Thursday, May 2, may be the beginning of the end of an incredibly long road of police harassment and court hearings which began against the Black Panthers in October 1967.

On Thursday, a Federal District Court in San Francisco will hear the City of Oakland and the County

Court in San Francisco will hear the City of Oakland and the County of Alameda try to show cause why all Panther trials now in progress or on the agenda should not be stopped as unconstitutional. Panther defense attorney Charles R, Garry has labelled police and court actions by these agencies as racist-"comotivated by the white racism that infects American society generally." Submitted before Judge William T, Sweigert last Monday, the com-

American society generally.

Submitted before Judge William

T. Sweigert last Monday, the complaint is for what Garry calls

"an injunction and declaratory relief." It names as defendants the City of Oakland, Mayor John Reading, Police Chief Charles Gain, police officer Herbert Heannes, D.A. J. Francis Coakley, and the Alameda Superior Courts.

The complaint seeks to stop the City of Oakland and the County of Alameda from continuing the harassment and persecution of members of the Black Panther Party for Self Defense and all blacks. It specifically charges that the Oakland police are determined to kill and maim the Black Panther Party. Party.

Named as plaintiffs are seven-Named as plaintins are seven-teen blacks, almost all Black Pan-thers awaiting court action in Ala-meda County. One exception is the Rev. Earl A. Neal, who charges that police have raided his St. Augustine's Episcopal Church, which is sympathetic to the Pan-ther cause

ther cause The bill reviews the arrests and trials of Panther leaders Huey P. Newton, Bobby Seale and Eldridge Cleaver. It brings to light new details in the recent police slaying of Panther leader Bobby Hutton. The complaint also goes back before the arrest of Huey Newton to charge that the city and county were specifically engaged in a campaign to wipe out Black Panther leadership.

Garry told BARB, "Admittedly bill reviews the arrests

Garry told BARB, "Admittedly e are dealing with an area of accretainties in many of these

claims."

The injunction asks that a cease The injunction asks that a cease-and desist order be issued against the Oakland police. It charges the Berkeley and San Franciscopolice forces as well with harassing and intimidating Black Panthers, trumping-up charges, and jailing Panthers without cause. It also

Panthers without cause. It also charges the police forces with illegal arrest, illegal search, and illegal shooting of Panther leaders. The injunction seeks not only to prevent several Panther trials from coming up, but also seeks to block the sentencing of Panther Chairman Bobby Seale, already convicted on a felony gun-carrying charge stemming from May, 1967. In his complaint, Garry reserved for the black people the right to protect themselves from "illegal and unconstitutional discrimina-

and unconstitutional discrimination against, attacks upon, and harassment of them by the white society and in particular the police department of the defendant, Oak-

land."

BARB asked Garry Wednesday

BARB asked Garry Wednesday all of his arguments. Garry said
"If we get a deaf ear, if we lose
here, we can continue to appeal."
There are at least eight other

court appearances contingent upon this injunction. At present, the schedule stretches as far as Aug-

berry wasn't desirous of returning to Kaiser and denied that she was

fired at all.

She simply quit of her own accord the PR man told BARB,

"I was told to remove my armband or my 'employment at Kaiser would be terminated'," Mrs. May-

berry affirmed.
She said that when she refused to take it off, she was fired.
She also said that she has written to the hospital several times requesting to be rehired but hasn't received a reply.--TAR

BARB informed Panther Com-munications Secretary Kathleen Cleaver about the junior Panther movement. "That's real good, I like that," she commented.

Meanwhile a Panther spokes-man at the headquarters reported a junior Panther bust,
"Two brothers, seven and eight Black Panther Movement head-

a junior Panther bust.
"Two brothers, seven and eight
years old, were stopped by police
in Berkeley for passing out Dick
Gregory buttons," the spokesman
said. No action was reported to
have been taken against the youths.

I told him not to say anything else and to sign nothing until I could get hold of legal advice.

ANTI-DRAFT POSTER ARREST

Philadelphia, Penna., U.S. Postal authorities arrested Steven Kuromiya, a former University of Pennsylvania student, recently, for attempting to mail 1000 posters to peace organizations throughout the country.

The posters depict a young man burning what might be a draft card, with the words "FUCK THE DRAFT" printed below.

Kuromiya was arrested at his home by three U.S. Marshalls just hours after he had made an inquiry at the post office about a delay in the mailing.

The posters were sent third class in mailing tubes along with supplementary material on how organizations could buy the posters in quantity for fund raising. Some apparently had been opened by postal inspectors.

He was arraigned before U.S. tal inspectors.

He was arraigned before U.S.
Commissioner Leomporra and charged with a violation of U.S.
Code Title 18, Section 1461. The charges maintain that he knowingly and unlawfully used the mails to send 'an obscene, indecent and crimes inciting!' present.

and unlawfully used the mails to send 'an obscene, indecent and crime-inciting" poster.

The charges read that the poster is 'too obscene and indecent to be set forth in its entirety upon the records of this Honorable Court." The Commissioner decided that there was "probable cause" and Kuromiya was held on \$500 bail. \$500 bail.

After being held overnight, Kuroniya was hand-cuffed and chained around the waist and then forced to walk seven blocks down Market Street, Philadelphia's main thoroughfare and shopping district, to the Federal Building where bail was mer.

GI'S WILL **LEAD MARCH AGAINST WAR**

The U.S. military -- about a battalion of them -- will take the lead in the April 27 Mobilization. The anti-war parade and rally Saturday has attracted servicemen from all branches of the Armed Forces, the Mobilization committee told BARB this week.

Armed Forces, the Mobilization committee told BARB this week. A spokesman for the committee said a contingent of 200-300 active duty servicemen are expected to participate in the demonstration. Many will be officers.

They will lead the parade from the Panhandle to the SF Civic Center at 11 a.m. Saturday, immediately behind Rear Admiral (ret.) Arnold True.

Backing up Admiral True and the active GFs will be a large group 'Vets for Peace', and behind them will come the civilians, some 20,000-30,000 strong.

The large number of people expected for the massive anti-war rally on Saturday will gather at the Golden Gate Panhandle at 11 a.m. They will then march to the SF Civic Center to hear Vanessa Redgrave, Muhammad Ali, Bobby Seale, Admiral True, and others speak out against the Vietnam war, for bringing the troops home, and for ending racial oppression.

The rally has received wide support from local groups and individuals. Included are Jack Morrison, SF Supervisor, Dr. John Summerskill, SF State College president, and a number of local AFL-Clo unions.

The Committee spokesman pointed out to BARB that it is be-

The Committee spokesman pointed out to BARB that it is becoming quite apparent "how deep the feeling is in America against the war."

The SF Mobilization will be held in conjunction with many others throughout the country involving millions of people.

on top by forcing the STDW people to get a permit to march and rally; but a last minute revision of the parade route, for which the OPD was unprepared made many of the demonstrators feel that they had beat the system.

Then again maybe The Man managed to corner his enemy so that they were rendered ineffective.

The march and demonstration of the 2,000 people who protested the war and racism, did in fact disrupt downtown Oakland for most of the morning Tuesday. In addition the training and preparation of 800 tactical policemen to deal of 800 tactical policemen to deal with the situation, required not only time, money, and energy, but also a confession by the establishment, that the protestors were a political force of such strength that they demanded to be recognized by means other than massive and wicker repression.

demanded to be recognized by means other than massive and violent repression.

Lack of agreement has characterized the preparation of this week's STDW demonstration; it was apparent even after the demonstration was staged.

It would be difficult to find 2,000 people anywhere with more disparate opinions on what should have, should not have, and actually did happen in Oakland Tuesday.

About the only thing agreed upon was that a protest did take place.

Many of the demonstrators themselves felt disappointed that no confrontation with police was made; some desired a more striking action similar to last October's rally.

ing action similar to last October's rally.

But Sandy Young of the STDW steering committee made it quite clear that the group sought to avoid another such bloody on-

Other demonstrators felt that the last minute change in the parade route so befuddled the un-prepared fuzz, that it made the entire day worth while and the de-

represented maze, that it made the demonstration a success.
Yet still others were angry and upset that they were innocently placed in a position to get busted for unknowingly marching down 14th St. instead of the designated 11th St. parade route.
Whoever made the decision has been alternately hailed and put down, depending on the politics of the speaker.
Even the news media could not agree on the number of arrests and other facts concerning the demonstation. For the massive number of newsmen who covered the event, the demonstration was the event, the demonstration was greatly underplayed in the straight

press.

And some of the underground
press (BARB,no) considered the
demonstation to have bombed out
or copped out, neither of which

demonstration to have connected or copped out, neither of which was clear.

The deomonstrators who met in Sproul Plaza at 4 am Tuesday, prepared themselves with shields, helmets, gogles and vaseline—to protect against MACE burns.
But for most, the tactics proved unnecessary. By the time the protestors arrived at the induction center at 6:30, the buses had already come and gone. The demonstrators were simply kept off Clay St. by police deployed from the public parking lot across from the induction center.

A steering committee member stated, "the cops were excellently trained, and carried it out beautifully—they were restrained, and there was little if any brutality."

and there was hard tality."

The fuzz, including the Oakland police, the Alameda County sheriff's deputies, and the California highway Patrol, were obviously well prepared, and knew exactly how to deal with the situation.

They carried plastic goggles, gas masks, clubs, guns, MACE, and essentially outnumbered the demonstrators since there was one bull for every three protestors. Those appearing to be squad see page 8

It was supposed to have ended at the Alameda County Court House, where Huey is imprisoned, but many returned to the Induction Center to continue the antiwar protest.

Between this roundtrip, many

Five students (three boys and two girls) sat in the doorway of the Center after the demonstrators had moved on to the Court

House. They posted the following sign on the door: "Enter At Your Own Risk - Wild Pigs Within."
One of the students burned his 2-A classification card as car after car of the California High-way Patral rolled out of the Site. way Patrol rolled out of the City Hall garage to follow the demon-

Nobody stopped to arrest him or move the students from the door. This was at 7:35 in the morning.

But at about this time, Robert Mandel was arrested by two plain-clothesmen while he was having coffee with friends, including Terry Cannon, another organizer of the march.

"Are you Bob Mandel?" he was asked. When he said he was, he

was informed he was "under arrest" with a warrant. Cannon and others were not arrested.

This was not reported in the Cakland Tribune, which listed the names of 18 other marchers taken in, even though a Trib sob-sister took copious notes. While bail for the others was around \$250 to \$500, Mandel's bail was set at \$2500.

"I feel this is because he was actively organizing the High School

"I feel this is because he was actively organizing the High School Youth for Friday's Strike Against War," his father, William Mandel, told the BARB. Mandel Sr. was one of the main speakers slated for the demon-stration

stration.

As the 2000 marchers began to move out to the Court House, they took the wrong street (14th - the center of downtown Oakland) instead of 11th St., listed on the permit.

The police stopped a flatbed truck used by the speakers and tore out the Public Address system and arrested the driver, Joe

tem and arrested the driver, Joe Weisman, of Berkeley. The police permitted the march to continue down 14th St., however, but at the Court House, they charged into the marchers with motorcycles roaring, forcing

The marchers fell back slowly at the request of leaders and monitors of the demonstration. When most of the students were in the park, the sheriff finally got HIS loudspeaker working and asking "everybody please go to the park."

This brought laughter and cries of "Oink, Oink, Oink" from the marchers.

Terry Cannon told BARB "it went well. We made our point."
The demonstration went well both ways, from the police who could have clobbered EVERYBODY

could have clobbered EVERYBODY on 14th St., to the demonstrators who slowly yielded to the police. This was evidenced by the remarks of Mario Savio. At the Park he pointed out that "ending racism doesn't happen overnight." He advised the students and others not to go back to the Induction Center and felt there should be no further confrontations that day with the police.

CITY FATHERS SEEKING RACIAL JUSTICE?

A public 'study session' on problems of racial justice has been scheduled by the Berkeley City Council for Tuesday, April 30, at 7 p.m. in Schwimley Little Thea-

The study session was set up after Peace and Freedom members

after Peace and Freedom members at a recent City Council meeting expressed dissatisfaction with the council's proclamation issued after the killing of Martin Luther King.

A Peace and Freedom proposal to the coulcilmen called for "the immediate ending of all acts of police harassment and brutality."

The City Council proclamation suggests that "each citizen will respect the law and seek change in the law only by constitutional means," and that "each law enforcement officer will treat every individual suspected of committing a public offense in the same mana public offense in the same man-ner irrespective os his race, re-ligion, dress, economic status or

oinions.'
Other Other dissimilarities appear throughout the proclamation and the PFM proposals. finally halted the truck beat at the window with clubs, and yanked the driver, Joe Weissman from the cab to a waiting squad car. The truck was then cleared and im-pounded.

Members of the Medical Commission on Human Rights reported that they treated one person maced in the ensuing scuffle, on the back of the truck. The new organiza-tion provided about 30 medics for the demonstration.

The 2,000 marchers continued down 14th St. as fuzz remained unable to move them to the sidewalk, But when the marchers reached the courthouse and sent up cries of "Free Huey" reinforcements moved in from the Sheriff's Dept, and the Highway Patrol dispersing the protestors across the street into Merritt Park

On the way back to the induction center the fuzz beat one demonstrator who apparently threw a trash can at one of the motorcycle cops at 14th and Broadway.

cycle cops at 14th and Broadway. Hundreds of workers and shoppers in down town Oakland watched with confusion as the young man, held by 2 officers, was punched in the face by a third.

Altogether 21 people were arrested Tuesday, including 2 juveniles and 2 Iranian activists. An ex-deputy sheriff lost his

An ex-deputy sheriff lost his hand in an attempt to bomb the Albuquerque, N. M. headquarters of the Tijerina land grant movement April 16.

A man identified as William Fellion apparently broke a window of the Alianza Federal de Pueblos Libre with his gun, returned to his car for dynamite and then stumbled over the curb as he again approached the building. His right hand was found in the debris in front of the building.

Although his entire right arm was badly torn, Fellion drove to his home, three miles away, in shock. He is now hospitalized in serious condition.

Reies Lopez Tijerina, founder of the Alianza, received a report in Los Angeles of the bomb attempt from his brother Cristobal Tijerina, one of those in the Alianza headquarters at the time of the attack.

Tijerina said, "Apparently the police want to use force against the Alianza because they have no law on their side. They know we are right in our claims for the land and our demands. It's clear that they are afraid of us.

"There have been all kinds of threats against the Alianza," Reies Tijerina said, "and this attack now is part of the pattern of attacks against black and brown leaders and organizations, Dr. King was killed, Bobby Hutton of the Black Panthers was killed. The black and brown must now unite stronger than ever.

"This bombing by the ex-deputy sheriff in Albuquerque, and the police statement, as reported by the Associated Press that there is no connection between the bombing and the Alianza," makes it that much easier to prove a conspiracy on the part of New Mexico police to assassinate Alianza leadpolice to assassinate Alanza leaders, a conspiracy reported to us months ago by Anglo friends."
Tilerina added, "The police are using dirty tricks against us. They attack us and protect others who attack us. This only proves we are dealing with cowards, not braves. This means we will win Victory.

CAN NEWTON GET WHAT NAZI GOT?

"I don't want any racial bias on the jury," explained Nazi Clyde Irwin to Judge Floyd Talbott.
Did the judge get the message? Do you? The judge dismissed four Negroes, three Japanese, and three Jews called for jury duty.
This took place in Berkeley, Jan., 1965. The Berkeley Gazette called it "the extraordinary trial of a member of the American Nazi Party."
Here's how an American Nazi got "equal treatment under the

Here's how an American Nazi got "equal treatment under the law almost absolutely. Can you imagine a Black getting the same even this year?

Accused of "disturbing the peace" (by spitting at him) of a black SF State student while this student was in the Telly Cafe Mediterraneum in the company of a white girl, Irwin had "a marathon trial of 14 hours" in which the jury hung up and could not come to a verdict.

Among those dismissed by Ir-

come to a verdict.

Among those dismissed by Irwin, who acted as his own attorney, were Mrs. Louis Simpson, wife of the Pulitzer prize winning UC poet; Mrs. John Miller, wife of now-state Assemblyman but then Berkeley School Board Members.

ber.
Irwin was "allowed to use" the words, niggers, Jews, and Communists, after being reprimanded by the Judge. He explained to the Court that he "went to school for two years in Georgia" where they taught him "it was perfectly all right to call them niggers."

The Nazi's attitude on race caused "the majority of prospective jurors to dismiss themselves from hearing the trail" and the Judge had a Deputy Sheriff "go into the streets of Berkeley" and stop citizens "passing by" in an effort to find 12 jurors.

Irwin also dismissed "on racial or religious grounds" wives of college professors because they Irwin was "allowed to use" the

or religious grounds" wives of college professors because they were "composed of Communists and Jews." He also felt they were "responsible for the mixed couples' he saw "everywhere in Berkeley." They finally got a "jury of his peers" in Berkeley. After listening to 14 hours of testimony, the "pure" jury came up with 10 to

2 for conviction on the "spitting incident" and 7 to 5 on the offensive conduct incident (when he shouted "Nigger-lover" across Telegraph and Bancroft at a group of Negro and white students),

of Negro and white students). In other words, two Berkeley citizens believed the Nazi's story on spitting, and five Berkeley citizens considered him inoffensive when he shouted 'Nigger-lover'. The judge had to continue the trial with a new jury.

Maybe there's a way Huey Newton can get that kind of "equal treatment" - that is, an all-black jury with nary a taint of brainwashing.

PROFS VOW TO USE GREEK THEATER, WIN LOSE OR DRAW

"We don't know whether they'll "We don't know whether they'll have the place surrounded by local police, state police, or national guardsmen, but we're still planning to use the Greek Theatre on May 17," Orville Schell, a steering committeman of Campus Draft Opposition told BARB Wednesday. Permission to use the university's Hearst Greek Theatre for the Vietnam Commencement was refused last Friday by the UC Regents, CDO was granted its use earlier by Berkeley campus of-

earlier by Berkeley campus of-

Last month, five professors of the Bealt Hall law facutly asserted in a memo to University Chancell or Roger Heyns, that it was "doubtful that illegal activities would occur to the processed Commencement". at the proposed Commencement. The Academic Freedom Commit-tee of the Academic Senate also

tee of the Academic Senate also sent a similar memo. "It's clear the Regents don't like what we're doing, and that's why they called it illegal' Schell

The action specifically prohibits CDO from using the Greek Theatre or any other university facility for the event. It does not indict CDO, its leaders, or its activities in any way. Regents Chairman Theodore Meyer explained that the Commencement would violate "time, place and manner rules." The Daily Cal reported that UC Regent Ronald Reagan labelled the proposed event as "so ill-conceived and so indecent it borders on the obscene." He said, however, that he believed in free speech,

ceived and so indecent it borders on the obscene." He said, however, that he believed in free speech, according to the Cal.

At a noon rally on Wednesday, CDO leaders announced that they had met with Chanceller Heyns and discussed the Regents' ruling. "The Chanceller read the Regents' statement. Then he explained --rather he tried to explain -- what they said." CDO told BARB.

"The Chanceller dodged the problem," Schell said. "He said he thought the ceremony was 'inappropriate' but not 'illegal'. He said he was personally disappointed by the Regents' action and told us that he himself voted in our favor.'

The vote on Friday's meeting was 14-2 with three abstentions.
'The role of the Chanceller of the Chan

"The role of the Chanceller of a university, Heyns told us, is not to become involved in politics. Yet he told us that he doesn't approve. Why doesn't he say the war in Vietnam is 'inappropriate?'' Schell asked.

"Our commencement was not illegal when we applied to the university," he said. "Somehow it became illegal when we became effective."

Extensive publicity and support has followed the original announcement of the ceremony. Dr. Robert Hutchins, former president and Chanceller of the University of Chicago, and president of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions has been announced as the principal speaker.

"It is clear that pressure is being put on the Chanceller by the Regents and their legal counsel, Thomas Cunningham," Schell said. "Heyns said it was "inappropriate", the Regents said it was the wrong time, place and manner, but Cunningham said it was "illegal". We don't think it is."

Schell said, "There has never been a legal confrontation on this. But today, we begin." CDO an-nounced Wednesday that the times

nounced Wednesday that the times would be many, the places several (mostly Sproul) and the manner consistent. They promised to hold ceremonies of the Vietnam Commencement type often.

"We're doing what we said we'd do. What was called illegal there (the Greek Theatre) is being done here (Sproul steps) now," they told the crowd that gathered Wednesday.

here (Sproul steps) now," they told the crowd that gathered Wednesday.

"In addition, our lawyers are beginning litigation now. We expect it will be completed in time (by May 17) to hold the Commencement as scheduled in the Greek Theatre. If not, we'll hold it any way," the spokesman said.

At Wednesday's rally, three graduating students read aloud the CDO pledge they have signed refusing induction, and three UC professors read pledges to support. Professors John Kelley, mathematics, David Krech, psychology, and Thomas Parkinson, English, participated in the dramatization of the Commencement.

English, participated in the dra-matization of the Commencement. The CDO Pledge to Refuse In-duction reads: "Our war in Viet-nam is unjust and immoral. As long as the United States is in-volved in this war I will not serve in the Armed Forces."

The Commencement ceremony scheduled for May 17 would honor those who have signed such a pledge, CDO describes it as "rite of passage," ---sbg

It is exactly the qualities that conventional critics put down, that I groove with in Hollywood Flicks. It seems to me that the chief virtue that a story film can have, is what I am going to call its TRIP FACTOR, Precisely what other critics might label escapism; or merely escapism, to be more exact, is what I dig.

The trippiness of a film is an index to its success. Let me make this clear to you: The virtue that critics find in the cinema of film-makers from a Houston to a Godard is purely literary virtue.

The kind of delving that the novel-based mind of the film critic engages in is all perfectly legitimate, if one is willing to proclaim the singular virtues of the medium to be development of social themes or any of the other things that might be better and more concisely put forth in an essay or play.

These critics give their own bids away when they swo on about "beautiful photography," or the "smoothly moving camera," or "wonderful composition."

Take a film like PLANET OF THE APES, When it is its worst, it is operating on this forced literary level. Everytime the film tries to make some kind of comparison between ape and human society, it becomes intolerably stupid.

But when the film is pure es-

But when the film is pure es-But when the film is pure escapism, pure trip, it is superb. The film chronicles the voyage of a group of astronauts who travel in a space ship just below the speed of light. They crash-land on a planet, and after a trek of many days they find primitive human beings. Subsequently they are killed or captured by intelligent apes.

w what I really want to say, gent apes.

Now what I really want to say, and what this whole column ought to have been about, because it's the thing that impressed me the most, is that Charlton Heston, as Taylor the astronaut captain, deserves the Academy Award for teeth. He has the biggest shiniest evenest set of teeth I've ever seen. Diane thinks they're false, but I don't believe that. No other actor uses his teeth as well, or gets a chance to show as many of them. 

With all the racist ugliness cur-With all the racist ugliness cur-rently going on, it might seem strange that I should single out the bad situation at Luther Col-lege, as reported in last week's BARB, for special comment. But it made me particularly heart-sick because I am myself an al-umnus of a small Lutheran col-

You may have heard of it. Concordia College, in Moorhead, Minnesota. When I was there, in the late forties, it was an excellent little institution. The atmosphere was of course churchy, but the humanistic orientation was strong. There was no fanaticism and no proselytizing, though the atmosphere of the place was contagious, and made a good many converts by itself.

The curriculum was up-to-date, the quality of teaching generally

The curriculum was up-to-date, the quality of teaching generally good and we students had every chance to become familiar with all the latest trends in art and thought. Liberal ideas were encouraged. The Wallace Progressive Party was very big on campus in '48. A year later, Concordia was one of the few colleges in the state to refuse to let its textbooks be checked by HUAC. It was a fine little academic community of faculty and students, concerned about each other, except he kind of thing FSM set up as its ideal. If it were not for the beastly winter weather, I'd probably still be there.

As to the racial situation on cam-

As to the racial situation on cam-pus, there wasn't any. The student body was predominantly Norweg-ian, but we had a scattering of every kind: Poles, Jews, Chin-ese, several Iranian Moslems (whom phody tried to convert)

every kind: Poles, Jews, Chinese, several Iranian Moslems (whom nobody tried to convert), and one Negro.

He was not only a Negro, but also a Catholic (we had plenty of them on campus too). Nobody could care less. In general, everyone put themselves out to be friendly and make him feel at home. And this was particularly true of my roommate and buddy, who was from St. Louis and usually made a big deal out of being an unreconstructed Southerner.

One of our visiting lecturers was a Negro clergyman who spoke on human relations. He was a huge handsome imposing man, and made a tremendous impression on the chapel audience.

a tremendous impression on the chapel audience.
That was a long time ago. Pardon my nostalgia.
Don't conclude that Concordia was a Shangri-La where nothing nasty ever happened. We had some suicides, and one unsolved murder. That can happen anywhere. And the sniper at Decorah reported in the BARB story was undoubtedly just a dangerous nut, and they too can crop up anywhere. But the overall tone of the re-

anywhere,
But the overall tone of the report seems to indicate that the general breakdown in this country has poisoned the Lutheran college scene along with everything else. Which makes me feel very very bad. Because that was one of the few features of this culture that I ve been able to go on believing in.


QUESTION: This may sound ridiculous but I swear it's the truth:




