

SAIGON, PARIS A FINE PAIR, **BOTH MAY FALL**

Saigon and Paris are no lon-ger "secure" cities. How Saigon got that way is pretty well understood by everybody but the US Military. How Paris got the US Military. How Paris a that way is understood by abs lutely nobody, especially

lutely nobody, especially De Gaulle.

Paris has arrived at that point in history which the NLF has been trying to reach in Saigon - collapse of social order. Lenin put it this way: the conditions for a revolution exist only when the following situations occur all at the same time -1) the government can't rule, 2) the capitalists can't produce, 3) the presence of a Communist Party.

All these things appeared this week on the stage of history. Nothing will keep De Gaulle in power. So, instead of the US being "deballed and De Gaulled" in Paris, the locomotive of history has castrated mon General.

Where this puts the "peace talks" is anybody's ball-game (no pun intended).

talks" is anybody's ball-game (no pun intended).

One student in Berkeley suggested to Sgt Pepper that the talks be brought to Berkeley "then something might happen here," (Sgt Pepper attended the CDO meeting the night before Friday's UC Vietnam Commencement. This has happened before. Why does the US Military CONTINUE to stock-pile munitions and planes, only to have them blown up again and again?

Answer: there is no place to

Answer: there is no place to hide.

The function of the US Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Airforce, the CIA, the FBI, and Hubert Humphery, is to make Saigon "secure". Day, the FbJ, and tubert fully here, is to make Saigon "secure". But apparently, at will, the "enemy" can zero in on any street in town, or any US base in Vietnam. It is no wonder, then, that the London Express (via front page of SF Examiner, May 19), can state that "respected foreign policy experts...who not long ago believed America was winning the war in Vietnam...appeared to be shocked by what it heard."

What it heard was this: "Not to escalate, to cut back the bombing and start phasing out the American combat role."

The British reporter also says the "conference strangely resembled the special commission on Vietnam that Sen Robert Kennedy months ago proposed should be convened, only to be rebuffed by the White House."

Obviously we can't hold the valley (we can't hold Vietnam, for that matter). Press reports speak of "the North Vietnamese moving back in within two weeks."

This points to our BASIC MILITARY problem in Vietnam – we can't hold the ground we take. The Infantry is the "The Queen of Battles" but we are fighting an Airforce war of mass destruction of the most brutal sort.

The Airforce holds no ground.

The NLF and the North Viets

The Airforce holds no ground. The NLF and the North Viets have no Airforce. But they have a "Queen of Battle" that completely outmaneuvers the US Military twenty four hours a day.

No further definition is needed.

"Paris had taken on its 19th century aspect. It turned to its last resort when things had gotten too far: barricades, By 2 a.m., students had put up 50 barricades. Before them was the provocating armed police of a generation that had too often resolved its problems with wars,"

"The population of Paris was with the students Ifeel," says Lise. "I saw again and again police throwing grenades inside cooperative Parisians' open windows. A Marin County lewspaper, The Independent Journal, got wind of the health disaster at the prison, They sent a reporter to investigate. He reported that he saw nothing noteably unsanitary.

gate. He reported that he saw nothing noteably unsanitary.
What the Journal reporter didn't know, according to subsequent reports from San Quentin inmates, was that he was taken to inspect the wrong place, where he would find only dusty steam pipes.
Inmates state that the excrement owas finally removed by "select" opprisoners who had much to lose if they refused or made the truth a publically known. The free men in charge of the plumbing shop arefused to send their inmate staff into the noxious sub-basement, the sewage had backed up into some cells, South Block inmates report. The control of the recent developments at a San Quentin include the growing unity of militant black, Mexican-had American, and Anglo prisoners, a according to informed sources inside.

side.

The word from a black militant group inside is that prison guards this week prevented a meeting of about 50 black prisoners. The meeting had been sanctioned by a prison official, to allow two black groups to meet together to talk out problems which had been developing between them.

When the men gathered, a captain and two lieutenants broke up

When the men gathered, a captain and two lieutenants broke up themeeting, although they were told that permission for the meeting had been granted.

San Quentin is apparently becoming increasingly the reservoir of men who have bucked the system at other California prisons. Despite gestures at "rehabilitation," 501 of about 4,000 inmates at San Quentin were unassigned to any work as of March 30.

when the ind blows, according to predictions by observers of the prison situation, the Warden and other custodial officials will place the blame on "racial disturbances," not on Medieval prison conditions.

Some went directly into the many classes still in session to explain the goals of the sit-in.

Others met with members of the administration in an attempt to ward off another confrontation between students and police.

Six hundred students liberated the entire SF State campus Wednesday when Summerskill, acting on a faculty resolution, suspended normal hours and allowed all buildings to remain open around the clock "indefinitely".

A number of faculty members made the same request of Summerskill Tuesday night, English professor Leonard Wolf told BARB, but Summerskill rejected the idea

fessor Leonard Wolf told BARB, but Summerskill rejected the idea at that time.

Instead, he authorized the Tac-tical Unit of the San Francisco Po-lice Department to remove 200 students sitting in when they re-fused to leave the administration building at its normal closing time

building at its normal closing time 10 pm.

Twenty five of the students volunteered to be arrested, and marched peacefully into the awaiting paddy wagons.

But violence erupted, according to all reports, when the crowd of 500 spectators outside failed to disperse quickly enough for the city police. As the wagon began to pull away, 20 of the fuzz suddenly waded into the crowd with clubs swinging.

waded into the crown with a swinging.

The Daily Gater, State's student newspaper, reported seven people were hospitalized including the Associated Students lawyer, Terence (KAYO) Hallinan.

Halling was clubbed four times

Sociated Students lawyer, Terence (KAYO) Hallinan.

Hallinan was clubbed four times over the head, an eye-witness told BARB, then later arrested as he stood on a street corner talking to newsmen.

He was booked for resisting arrest, inciting to riot, and battery.

Hallinan reappeared with a bandaged head Wednesday as the students resumed their sit-in. Tripling their strength at a noon rally, more than six hundred students marched to the administration building and occupied it for the entire day and night.

At BARB press time they remain entrenched in the building, which is open to anyone while the "free

The call for students was issued by the Rev. Dr. Ralph Abernathy, who as successor to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. now heads the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Abernathy and 100 of the poor people already assembled in Washington's new "Resurrection City" began this week to present their demands for decent housing, employment and housing, employment and both black

other rights.
"I urge all students who support this Poor People's Campaign of militant non-violent action to join us in Washington as soon as studies and examination permit," Abernathy said.
"We especially need students

Abernathy said.

"We especially need students starting May 27, when we will be building up our demonstrations and preparing for a great march on Washington. We are encouraging students to come and stay as long as possible," he said.

He called American students, both black and white," a great







McCone, who is a young, combedblond hair nice type was the only other park walker with the Mayor. He was called forth on at least one occasion to make a regular appointment for a community organizer who had earlier attempted to obtain a mayor's appointment without success.

SEEKS FREEMEN FREEDOM RIDES FOR BIG SUR

Freedom Rides may begin to roll again soon, this time not to the Deep South but to the south of San Francisco into the Big Sur

country.

Business establishments in that region have been practicing classic forms of discrimination not against black people but against

against black people but against "hippies."
Restaurants, novelty shops, grocery stores, hostels and gas stations in the Big Sur area have been refusing service and employment to people bedecked with long hair, beads, beards, and flowers. "No hippies" signs flourish on that stretch of State Highway 1.

In a recent incident, a service station refused to sell gasoline to a young couple who needed fuel to get their ailing child to a hospital. The family VW bus was painted in psychedelic designs.

The recent-experiences of Steve Booker show the patterns of antihip prejudice in the Sur. According to Booker, many persons have been pressured into living dangerous miles into the wooded hills away from the "civilized" stripof highway, due to hassles by the roadside merchants.

He told BARB of his own difficulties in fidding employment.

He told BARB of his own difficulties in finding employment, despite the availability of jobs and his experience as a construc-

tion worker.

Booker said he had been working and living in the Sur, wearing a beard and long hair, when he lost his job due to illness of his employer. When he applied for work at the California Department of Parks, he was told nothing was available. available.

Two hours after he applied, an acquaintance who worked in the state parks department told him there were jobs, but not for 'hippies,'' Booker said.

While the answer cannot be an unequivocal NO, It can be a qualified "yes" by saying that the "HIPPIES" perhaps have a greater KNOWN incidence of VD because of free public clinics which make public their monthly caseload statistics (NOT NAMES!) and a more relaxed attitude toward sexual conrelaxed attitude toward sexual conrelaxed attitude toward sexual con-tact which leads them into an area of probable infection due simply to an increased probability fig-ure only.

Please bear in mind that a vast

Please bear in mind that a vast majority of public health physicians and case-workers are still urging ANYONE who feels that they have VD problem, ie . . . drip, macropapular rash, chancre, unexplainable skin lesions or loss of hair to seek out medical attention at THEIR public health clinic. About the best protection is education. Mr. Health

lodge told him they had no posi-tions open. Booker talked later with the lodge-owner, another ac-quaintance, who told him work was available--but he would have to

available--but he would have to back up his manager.

As a special favor to a friend, the lodge-owner offered Booker a nighttime dishwashing job, provided that Booker left each day before sunrise and took his car, decorated with painted handprints, away from the lodge by daylight. daylight.

In hungry desperation, Booker cut his hair and shaved off his beard, leaving a discreet moustache. He then applied to a firm oing work in the state park. Ie left his car a good distance rom the employment office. He was hired. doing

Before many days had passed on the new job, Booker said, a park Ranger complained to his boss

park Ranger complained to his boss that Booker was "bringing a hundred-thousand hippies" into the area, evidently referring to Booker's habit of giving rides to hip hitch-hikers.

Booker said the Ranger sometimes came to his residence on the park grounds brandishing a flashlight and gun, claiming he had seen "hippies" there. The Ranger finally told Booker's employer to get rid of him or another firm would be found to do the park work, Booker said.

He said the Ranger's attitude toward "hippies" was captured in his words, "bust them on anything and get them out' in time for the big tourist season.

When BARB's reporter-photographer checked out the Big Sur story last weekend, he found dozens of anti-hippie signs posted in the waremongers' shops.

At one open-for-business place, when he walked up to a door to photograph a sign, a woman out front said, "You can't take pictures here." As he focused his camera, she called to someone.

"What about your milkman? Arsenic works slow, but sure.

"Your auto mechanic may stay up nights studying booby traps.

"These patriots are not going to let you take your freedom from them. They have learned the silent knife, the strangler's cord, the target rifle that hits sparrows at 200 yards.

"Traitors beware. Even now yards.

It was signed "Minutemen".

All of the letters, according to Inspector Conway, were mailed May 13 from Wichita Kansas.

Almost two years ago a wave of similar threatening letters hit the hay area.

At that time, an independent sleuth discovered that the sender was a Berkeley postman. The postman resigned his position be-fore the postal authorities had a chance to act.

Recently stories have circulated underground purporting to describe the manufacture of the bombs that felled the PG&E
towers a while ago. The information
contained in these reports is possibly
erroneous and definitely dangerous. Some
clarification on technical matters is neces-

contained in these reports is possibly erroneous and definitely dangerous. Some clarification on technical matters is necessary.

The stories describe bombs consisting of a cylinder of ammonium nitrate, a common fertilizer, with a primer charge of mixed potassium chlorate and powdered sugar set off by a rifle cartridge.

A device made in such a fashion is dangerous and capable of exploding spontaneously. Ammonium nitrate is comparatively dangerous when stored loose, It may be safened and possibly improved by mixing with oil or wax.

Potassium chlorate is a near-violen oxidizer. Mixed with powdered sugar it can go off by itself. It, too may be tamed somewhat by mixing with oil or vax.

Potassium chlorate is a near-violen oxidizer. Mixed with powdered sugar it can go off by itself. It, too may be tamed somewhat by mixing with oil or Vaxeline. Hand grenades and land mines were used during World War I having a bursting charge of a 90%-10% mixture of potassium chlorate and Vaseline by weight.

For other possible mixtures consult text-books on explosives available at better libraries.

Thebomb described by stories has an inseparable primer and bursting charge. This is a dangerous way to construct a bomb in general. The primer (usually a low explosive which produces a blass strong enough to set off the high explosive bursting charge) should be assembled at the last possible moment.

Primer charges and devices are a valid pojecfor practical development work, Blasting caps and firearm cartridges use mercury fulminate, but this is very sensitive when crystallized and usually cannot be transferred. It can be manufactured fairly simply, but if it is even slightly impureit may detonate by itself at some ternader.

Apossible avenue of research wouldbe to developan explosive which could be denonated by the amount of fulminate in a tifle or shotgun cartridge. The charge in the cartridge could then be replaced with

this explosive and the device used to explode larger charges.

Note that gunpowder as used in rifle cartridgesdoes not explode but burns. It will therefore not touch off high explosives (it sets dynamic on fire). The homemade charge could be something like the oil-ammonium nitrate or oil-potassium chloratemixture discussed or perhaps nitrocellulose (guncotton). Experimentation would be necessary to obtain a practical mixture,

would be necessary to obtain a practical mixture.

The stories describing the PGRE bombs mentioned that the charge was "shaped" by grinding thin one end of the capped pipe that contained the charge. This is at best a poor way to shape a charge.

Most shaped charges are conical in form and are detonated at the tip. The shock wave forms in such a fashion as pulverize the base of the cone and blow it straight out the bottom in a thin tongue. The bursting charge of the bazooka is such a shaped charge. It is light and shot against the tank wall at low speed, the charge pulverizes the tank armor and blows it into the tank with tremendous energy.

Includedwith the bomb story are some specifications for a clandestine broadcast transmitter. The specs are extremely impractical and potentially dangerous, also. The impracticality comes from their suggesting a one-to five-kilewatt transmitter capable of operation at 12 or 24 volts. Even a one kw rig would require 166 amperes of current from a 12 volt source if it is 50% efficient (about the best available). It would also have to dissipate 1000 watts worth of hat and might require water cooling. Its current drain would assassinate a battery.

Imaginewhat a 5kw transmitter would do to those problems.

But the main danger from this concept of clandestine broadcasting would come from the danger of detection. Two kids with transistor radios and possibly \$7 field-strength meters could track it down from anywhere within a ten-mile radius.

Clandestinebroadcasting should be carried out on a distributed basis. Several small transmitters should be put on the air either simultaneously or alternately to avoid detection.

THE JOURNEY TO THE EAST

Three buses rolled out of Oak-land on the morning of May l6 at 11 am. Three buses carrying 129 people and a station wagon loaded with \$1500 of medical supplies The Caravan of Love from the Bay Area to the Poor People's Campaign in Washington — off to "Resurrection City." Driving one of the three Greyhound buses was Earl J. King, 36. Because of a company technicality, Mr. King and the two other Negro drivers for Western Greyhound Lines who left Oakland were only permitted to drive as far as Rock Springs, Wyoming.

as Rock Springs, Wyoming.

Despite the disappointment of not being able to go all the way with the caravan, Mr. King returned to the Bay Area full of enthusiasm and praise for the Poor People's ipaign.

Campaign.

In an exclusive interview with BARB, Mr. King described the spirit of the Caravan of Love. "You know, I've never really been involved in anything so exciting. From the very beginning, it was like the Pilgrims, headed for a new country, knowing the dangers, knowing what trouble and propaganda would be drummed up but going on any way. These, the poor and the weak, they're the bravest and the strongest. They drafted themselves to fight their own fight."

bravest and the strongest. They drafted themselves to fight their own fight."

Mr. King admitted that he felt "a horrible sense of guilt," having to return to Bay Area, to his family and his comfortable job. "At first I was alien to the group even as a black man. I mean, they were fighting for me, I was the weak one, I know I'm a man. But I don't feel real at all any more. I feel very guilty.

"It's like I'm leaving my problems as a black man, but these people are confronting it,"

King described the group as a mixture of cultues, a melting pot of California people; blacks, Chinese, Japanese, Indians, Mexicans, and even hippies. They were mostly about his age, but infants, and grandmothers were also prsent. "They all blended in. They learned to live together," he said. "People were free to be free, you know what I mean? Whatever your habit is, well, we'll dig it. That's how it was."

One of the events that King recalls as symbolic of the atmos-

One of the events that King re-

phere surrounding the trip was right at the beginning, while load-

right at the beginning, while loading the buses.

"A black woman ran to the bus, she still had her laundry with her, and she hopped on, her hair not ready, she just came along. Well, she was a woman, and she knew she couldn't do her hair, but she just said to me, 'Hell, with it, I'll cut if off if I have to,'' That's what the people were like "

I'll cut if off if I have to." That's what the people were like."

King said that as the miles wore on toward Reno and then to Salt Lake, he became one of them, though he lacked their strength, he said.

'It was terrific, these people,

he said,

"It was terrific, these people, so courageous. Most of them quit their jobs, some of them had to leave their families."

He related how one man told his wife: "You're gonna have to make it alone. I'm going on to make history, our history, and I'll give up my job, I'll give up my family; but I'll not give up my integrity, and if I come back, you'll know you have a man."

"These weren't violent people," King told BARB, "They weren't sounding like they were full of love, but they're serious about their purpose. We're not going to wear hard hats, we don't know how to duck. That was the way the people felt."

King said there were some gay times on the trip. He described the scenes in two cities upon their arrival.

"Police motorcycles gave us

"Police motorcycles gave us the "Hi" sign outside of Reno. Follow me, they said. They took us into town in style, in a parade. After we settled at the Synanon and the Methodist church, the town took us in

and the Methodist church, the town took us in.

Because Greyhound drivers are not allowed to drive more than their ten-hour union maxiumu, the campaigners were left without transportation until the Mayor saw to it that the police department deployed paddy wagons for in-city transportation (to those who wanted).

ted).
"In Salt Lake," King said, "we pulled up to the park where we planned to unboard to find people like hungry wolves waiting for us to get off — to show us their hospitality. There was food covering the block-long park. Each of the supporters had been asked

to bring enough food for eleven people. We stayed at the Greek Orthodox Church there and by the time we left, people were pleading with us to take them along."

with us to take them along."

The driver had only praise for Mark Comfort, Director of the OaklandDirect Action Committee and James Mock of the San Mateo Peace Center who went along as coordinators, "They were like cointer they know eachly what to saints, they knew exactly what to

do."

King said that there were difficulties along the route, but that the trouble couldn't contend with the spirit of the caravan.

"When we left Salt Lake emotions were running high.

tions were running nigh.
Theyknew that I and the other
driverswould be leaving shortly
after, and theyfelt, at first, that
it would be highly impossible for
white drivers to carry on the spirit

of the caravan.

"I told them, though, 'Your scene's got to be D.C.' and so it was resolved. And now I'm back here, feeling guilty, about being home."

King predicted that the caravaners would be "rady for anything when they arrived in Washington." The tent city was already occupied by the time they
were midpoint crossing the country, and they were aware that only
uncertainties awaited them "These people realize. They're uncertainties

"feel as though it can't be any worse than what they left Some of them have actually bee starving in this modern state," aid.

Kingwas adamant about con-demning reports in the media abou stealing and corruption among the Poor People's Campaigners.

"These people want nothing from each other, there can't be any stealing. I've seen them give the proverbial shirts off their back. One doesn't even have to ask, they just know and they give. These reports are just straight-out lies. I want everyone to know that."

GET IT BECAUSE YOU PAID

Because the work "welfare" is such an evident hangup for so many people, a new San Francisco group called the Legion for Social Insurance has been formed to help erase the semantic boggle and to inform people of their welfare rights—by any name.

Legion members station themselves at the SE welfare depart—

selves at the SF welfare department at 585 Bush St, every Wednesday to give information to potential applicants.

"Welfare is not a charity," a Legion member explained to

"Welfare is not a charity," a Legion member explained to BARB. "It is taxes we and our brothers and sisters have paid to the government all our lives. For emergencies. Like unemployment insurance. Like Social Security. "In fact, the same law created all three agencies."

all three agencies."

At the end of April a caravan of over 100 welfare recipients went to Sacramento to object to a proposed bill which would clamp severe limits on the amount people on welfare can receive—such as \$275 per month for mothers.

on welfare can receive—such as \$275 per month for mothers.
When the legislators saw the group, they postponed the hearing, according to Legion spokesmen, although the people had to use food money to make the trip. "Among the most discriminated against are single people, students, Haight-Ashbury types, and Tenderloin people," a Legion statement says.

A recent social insurance victory was a court ruling that residency requirements are not valid. Persons who have been in a town

Persons who have been in a town or only an hour can be eligible

for welfare.
And "BARB salesmen can apply for supplementary money," a Le-gion spokesman pointed out.

The Legion for Social Insurance

The Legion for Social Insurance is planning for a massive welfare application day to show that the present system could not stand the strain if people used their present social insurance to the degree they're entitled to it.

The original plans for the 30th were to coincide with the Memorial Day weekend," the spokesman said. "It was originally hoped that the middle class, the students, the clergy, and the working population would be able to turn out if it were held during the legal holiday."

"But Dr. Abernathy feels that the poor people must organize themselves first, and they're just not ready. There was a core of 3,000 a week ago, soon it will be anywhere from 5 to 10,000. They're going to want a million before they're through," the coordinator told BARB.

While the Bay

While the Bay Area Caravan of While the Bay Area Caravan of Love was able to leave almost on schedule after on-the-spot fund raising helped them meet payments, there is some concern growing now that more trouble will be in store for the return trip, Also, according to the organizers, there are expenses that have to be paid while in the tent city.

A financial statement released this week indicates that the Bay this week indicates that the Bay Area Caravan has, at this time, \$1370, after meeting pre-departure expenses of over \$14,000. But Bay Area leaders indicated that they must raise at least \$4,000 for on-site expenses in the next month and then another \$11,000 to bring the caravan home. bring the caravan home.

Concerned students and individ-uals who are anxious to partici-pate in the Poor People's Cam-paing have been urged to come to Washington. Earlier this week, the Rev. Dr. Ralph Abernathy made an appeal to students to join the nation's poor in the capital after

Mrs. Davis suggests that those who plan to go to Washington should be able to pay their own way, round trip, and to provide for their own food and lodging in Washington if possible.

A group of Santa Barbara folksingers have formed the Poor People's Concert and have begun a fifteen-city tour en route to Washingtonto raise money for the Campaign. All of the performers were granted leaves of absence from their jobs to make the tour. In the Bay Area, it was announced this week that Berkeley's own folk singer, Malvina Reynolds, will appear at a benefit program on May 29 at the Sun-Reporter Building, SF. A donation of \$1 will be asked for what the group calls "a nohost cocktail party." The event is scheduled for 9 pm at 1366 Turk.

The five demands are: The cancellation of the Air Force ROTC contract; hiring of nine minority teachers including professor Richard Fitzgerald who was terminated after sponsoring a black history course.

The rehiring of the only Mexican American teacher on the faculty,

American teacher on the faculty, Dr. Juan Martinez, the admission of 400 minority students next fall;

of 400 minority students next fall; And complete amnesty for arrested students and sit-in leaders.

In an editorial Thursday, the Examiner incorrectly stated that students voted to keep the AFROTC on campus. Both the AS legislature and the student body overwhelmingly voted to have the Air lature and the student body over-whelmingly voted to have the Air Force contract cancelled. In a fac-ulty vote Tuesday, the proposal was narrowly defeated. SDS and TWLF joined forces three weeks ago to resolve both the AFROTC issue and the minor-

issue, which they say are one the same.

Power is not what we have and we are not ready for a shootout in the streets, Black Power is good but it is not always there. When Black Power comes, that is the time for whites (and everybody else) to do something. If you know what to do, do it by all means. If you don't know what to do when the next riots break out, march on your local induction center.

The induction center.

The induction center is a place where militants who would survive can take direct action simply by their presence. Don't wait until the riot is over, but try to get there before the police commander will have to consider guarding an extra sensitive area while he is deciding which men to send where. Take some empty bottles and some cotton just in case all the cops are busy someplace else.

Some fine demolitions have been done in the Berkeley area. In Los Angeles we have been a little slow in blowing up, but it will come. Young people should try to turn their parents on -- but don't ston their parents on -- but don't ston there. Get the parents to turn on with blacks. That will be the day!

As you know guerilla theatre and free theatre can be fundemonstrations -- done by small groups of friends. Recreate the crucifixion, Lynch a klansman. Perform a

REAGAN FACES RUIN

Ronnie Reagan's ambition to become president may cost him the governorship of California, and that, of course, may also stop him from receiving Republican presidential nomination.

While he is apparently looking the other way The Recall Reagan Committee is predicting that Reagan will be out of office by July 31, four days before the Republican National Convention.

Signatures of 780,000 people are needed by July 31, to have Reagan automatically removed from office. The attorney general then has 60 days to call a new election. In the interim the lieutenant governor would assume office.

To date more than 400,000 voters have signed the petition to have Reagan recalled, Jeff Stern, a spokesman for the organization told BARB.

The Recall Reagan Committee, Stern said, is projecting over a

The Recall Reagan Committee, Stern said, is projecting over a million signatures before the dead-

Stern told BARB that the Committee was formed primarily be-cause of Reagan's destruction of the mental health program, his cuts in higher education, and be-cause he has used the governor's office "to advance his own ambi-tion at the expense of the people."

"Crossing all party lines," the organization has offices in every county of the state, and has recently received the endorsement of the California Labor Council,

NEW YORK, N.Y. -- I never would have believed it, but Columbia Uni-versity President Grayson Kirk has once more ordered what are seemingly his personal troopers onto the campus of the university to quell yet another demonstra-

This one was sparked by the suspension of SDS President Mark Rudd and three other leaders of the demonstrations which have effectively paralyzed the university for the remainder of the academ-

for the remainder of the academic year.
Students resisted police assaults a la Francaise, this time, with tompup paving bricks.
When the suspensions were announced, widespread and obvious-

ly planned outbreaks began; students for the second time poured into Hamilton Hall, the scene last time of the sit-in by black students on the Morningside Heights campus. This time, Hamilton was the nucleus of the SDS demonstration.

tion.

The suspensions were announced on the grounds that Rudd and the others had refused to appear before Columbia College Dean Alexander Platt. Columbia College is the Liberal Arts undergraduate division of the university.

Later acknowledged by President Kirk to be virtual expulsions, the suspensions were officially made by registered letter to the students' homes and campus ad-

In a news conference Wednesday afternoon, Kirk smilingly said that these suspensions are tantamount to expulsion, in that the students must reapply for admission on the basis of their acamination of the statement of the stateme demic and university records.

demic and university records.

Beginning about 4 p.m. on Tuesday the 21st, the student takeover of the classroom building located adjacent to one of the main gates of the University was ordered to be broken up by the New York city police soon thereafter. When I contacted the University Security Officer at 11 p.m., I was informed that the police were deployed and would probably move in shortly after midnight.

Actually, it was about 3 a.m., timed almost to the minute of the last campus bust, when the boys in blue moved in.

A diversionary action staged in the street outside the campus near Hamilton gave another squad the opportunity to move in through the opportunity to move in through underground maintenance tunnels and enter the Hall. The dispersal of the occupying students was relatively peaceful and uneventful. The demonstrators were then moved out through the same tunnels to a confrontation with the crowd at the gate. This was successful. cessful.

The real trouble started about half-hour later, when a crowd about a thousand spectators

and demonstrators, by University count, gathered at the gates.

Some enterprising revolutionaries had followed policemen as they set up their sawhorses along the street, and as the policemen progressed up the street, had removed those sawhorses, behindthe policemen's backs.

They then piled the barriers into a barricade in the east main gate of the university and sealed it off to a height of about 15 feet.

All this was done to the accompaniment of more occupations of more buildings, some reported fires in the buildings, and generally terse name-calling be tween pro-SDS and anti-SDS students, and between these groups and the police and bystanders.

The bust that ensued was horrendous. But at least this time the fuzz got theirs.

A la Sorbonne, the student strikers tore up paving bricks from College Walk and made neat piles of them, which bricks were later hurled at the fuzz. It sort of made up for the excessive brutality of last time.

All told, about 50 students, 18 cops and 10 others were treated at nearby St. Luke's Hospital. These others included an assistant chaplain at the University and two members of the medical volunteers staff here.

The scene at the Emergency Room was something unbelievable. In suturing rooms normally equipped for one operation at a time, three stretchers were arranged

n suturing rooms normally equip-ped for one operation at a time, three stretchers were arranged head-to-toe so that three different doctors could each sew up a patient at a time.

The scene in the corridors was equally hectic as harried clerks rushed to and fro, trying to get medical information from the new arrivals, and everybody ducking out of the way of nurses and assistants hurrying back and forth with the sterile equipment.

The hospital had taken good and careful preparation for just such a happening, and seemingly had profited from its experience of early May, when they treated the bulk of the casualties from the first Columbia bust.

By and large, there is little The scene in the corridors

By and large, there is little criticism to be made of the hospital's handling of the situation, except that again it allowed interrogation of students, both before and during treatment in some cases, and again allowed the police free access to the records of the

cases, and again allowed the police free access to the records of the injured on the next day.

To those of us who thought it would never happen again, Grayson Kirk has issued a statement in the name of the Board of Trustees of the University, to the effect that it is now University policy to call in the police to break un every such future demonstraup every such future demonstra-tion.

The situation now, in the early hours of Thursday morning, is calm but apprehensive. There have been one or two minor shouting incidents, but they dispersed themselves without police "help." two minor shouting

SECOND WEEK OF PIG POKING AT PROVO PARK

For the second week in a row the Spontaneous, Pig Control has effectively kept Policeharassment to a minimum in Provo Park on Sundays. A large crowd gathered spontaneously as the two uniformed B.P.D. members entered the liberated area and took what could be regarded as a brisk walk around the park and then split back to the station followed by spontaneous clapping. The large crowd which followed them did sort of disrupt the park for a while which led the crowd to speculate on the advisability of instituting a citizens arrest upon the two men for leading a parade without a permit. One policeman was heard to say to the other "lets lead them up around the front." There were no attempts to block the Police's way but it would be nice if they conattempts to block the Police's way but it would be nice if they confined their walk to the grassey area so that their parade wouldn't mess up the people's view of the performers. Actually the Police should turn on to the music & the vibrations and never have to pack to juil again. go back to jail again. - Richard Krech

At 7:30, the Acting Dean of the College gave everyone ten minutes to clear the building. His announcement was countered with repeated shouts of "up against the wall, motherfucker". Ten minutes later he came back and announced that everyone who did not leave would be busted and suspended.
The suspension threat was soon extended to anyone arrested anywhere on campus.

where on campus.

Student debate continued on whestudent debate continued on whether more arrests would further the strike demands. A crowd was massing outside. A group of jocks, the campus conservatives, began lobbing eggs at the front of the hall.

A line of community sympathizers bore the brunt of the egg attack on their picket lines.

thizers bore the brunt of the egg attack on their picket lines.

The University turned off the electricity in the buildings. Later the Student Liberation Electricians got the power turned on. The Uniyer sity turned off the water in the building; the students let the toilets fill up.

At one point, the Marsailles was repeatedly played over Hamilton Hall's loudspeaker system.

Outside Hamilton Hall, forty students weeked a minor building but

dents rushed a minor building, but a Dean blocked their way. "All right," one student shouted, "we'll go where we are loved." They marched to Grayson Kirk's Office, chanting.

was seen pulling the blinds

kirk was seen putting the blinds down on the windows, a few of which were soon shattered.

At 2:00 a.m. the cops were spotted near the campus. About 500 students rushed to the only two campus entrances left unlocked and campus entrances tertumockectamatomstructed barricades. One was built of police barricades reinforced with pieces of campus fences and a fire hose. The other was made of fences and flaming trash harrels.

By now students were running all over campus. One with a bull horn urged a crowd of 250 to "get" two plainclothesmen. The plainclothesmen grabbed him, and the crowd went after them. They escaped only when uniformed cops came to their aid.

Two fires were started in campus

buildings.

At this point, Columbia President Grayson Kirk ordered the po-

lice to clear the campus of all students. Dean Platt, relaying this announcement at the sundial in the middle of the campus was cursed. Hi bullhorn was yanked away from him and used by leaders to urge the students to return to the bar-ricades.

At one of the barricades students at the of the parricades students tore up bricks out of the payement and were heaving them at the cops. The cops soon dismantled the other barricade and a phalanx of 200 riot police charged onto campus swining clubs, scattering everyone in sight.

It took over 30 minutes of such It took over 30 minutes of such charges by the cops to clear most of the students off their campus. Even then, whenever the cops pulled back from the entrance of a dorm, the students would pour out of their

the students would pour out of their buildings, hundreds screaming the Algerian guerilla war yell made famous here by the film "The Battle of Algiers."

At one point, the police charged into one of the dorms, Furnald Hall. Most of the students in the lobby made it to the second-floor balcony overlooking the lobby. Capturing one student in the lobby, five cops began kicking and beating him.

turing five cops began kicking ing him.

The enraged students threw potted
The enraged students threw potted
and ashtrays at the plants, lamps and ashtrays at the cops below. The cops charged up the stairs into the balcony where two plainclothesmen captured at least one student, LNS reporter Norman Jenks, and beat him with their handsuffs.

one student, LNS reporter Norman Jenks, and beat him with their handcuffs.

For over two hours the campus resembled an occupied but unsub-dued ghetto. Several times during the night students attacked the pothe night students attacked the police. 16 policemen were reported injured. Within minutes of the first police charge, stretcher-bearers could be seen scurrying across campus with the wounded.

At least one student suffered a fractured skull. A girl was seen badly bleeding after she was pushed by the rushing cops thru a window of the Student Union Building.

SDS leader Mark Rudd, arrested in the first part of the bust, over an hour before the battle of the barricades, was charged with inciting to riot, and held on 2500 dollars bail.

Another strike leader, a black, besten in front of the Stu-

lars bail.

Another strike leader, a black, who was beaten in front of the Student Union by two plainclothesmen while a third held a gun on a watching crowd, was charged with inciting others to commit murder.

Police announced they had netted 174 arrests, but this may not include people taken to remote precincts.

The campus is once again agarrisoned university. Grayson Kirk says graduation will be conducted as normal on June 4th. No one believes it.





SMC SPLIT LOOMS WITH INFIGHTING AMONG SPLINTERS

Two leading members of the Young Socialist Alliance charge that the Communisty Party-USA has deliberately ousted them from key positions in the Student Mobilization Committee due to their nolitical ylews. political views.

A widely-circulated letter from ex-Berkeleyans Kipp Dawson and Syd Stapleton, both of the YSA, also accuses the Communist Party of trying to maneuver a forth-coming Student Mobilization conference into territory where the CP can load the meetings.

The letter refers to a May 8 meeting of the Working Committee of the Student Mobilization at which Stapleton and Miss Dawson "Were fired from the staff for our political associations,"

"We voted against the exclusion-

tical associations."

"We voted against the exclusionary motion," the letter states,
"Representatives and supporters
of the Communist Party voted
for the exclusionist motion. In effect, then, of all those political
tendencies who have up to now
worked together successfully for
the SMC, it is only the young
Socialists at whom the exclusionist policy is aimed."

The letter indicates that the
SMC Working Committee later

The letter indicates that the SMC Working Committee later "felt they had revealed their intentions too openly," and on May 16 withdrew the motion, only to fire the two YSA members for alleged "unsatisfactory" work.

A subsequent motion to hire PFC Howard Petrick, another YSA member, is described in the Daw-

son-Stapleton letter as "a fraud on the face of it," because Petrick is unavailable.

"To add insult to injury," the letter states, "we were denied the right to send a letter (via SMC) stating our position, along with the minutes of the two meetings, thereby depriving members of the right to hear both sides of the disagreement."

Dawson and Stapleton point out

agreement."
Dawson and Stapleton point out that the previous national SMC conference decided that the forthcoming conference "will be held in a relatively central part of the country so that large numbers can attend."

They note that we confirm the confirmation of the country and the confirmation of the c

They note that "a Continuations Committee meeting has been scheduled for New York City on the weekend of June 29," a meeting which would be especially convenient for "those who live in New York and those who will be attending a convention of the Communist Party in New York the following weekend."

Stapleton and Miss Dawson in their letter urge people to protest the SMC "policy of political exclusion," and to demand that a full national conference be held

full national conference be held in the mid-west.

CDO's Vietnam Commence-ment rally came off virtually without a Hitch or a Hevns and in

out a Hitch or a Heyns and in spite of Ronald Reagan.
Before noon on Thursday, May 16, 24 hours prior to the scheduled ceremony, a federal court upheld the Regents' decision to ban the Campus Draft Opposition from holding a "Vietnam Commencement" on University property.

CDO leaders met that night and drafted plans for a commencement
- rally to be held on Sproul Steps
instead of the planned program
in the Greek Theatre.

Ronald Reagan, the governor, landed Thursday in San Francisco after a campaign trip and asked that the ceremony be canceled.

The event was held as promised

on Friday. Stretched defiantly across the pillars of Sproul Hall was a huge banner proclaiming: "Vietnam Commencement." But the 58-minute ceremony itself did

the 58-minute ceremony itself did not defy anything in the way of campus rules.

The resulting Vietnam commencement-rally involved no loss of face for CDO, although it was perhaps a dull victory. When the Regents met Monday in Santa Barbara, Chancellor Roger Heyns defended CDO and attempted to console the other irate Regents.

fended CDO and attempted to console the other irate Regents.
Heyns told the meeting, "participants obeyed all University regulations and quit at two minutes before 1 p.m."
""Commencement paraphernalia, such as academic robes were dropped," the Daily Cal reported, and so the ceremony was not a

and so the ceremony was not a commencement. Printed programs distributed to the crowd were for a "Vietnam Commencement" but they were printed in advance of the

court decision.

Regardless of whether it was a commencement or a rally, CDO's tribute to draft resisters was well - organized, well - publicized and well-attended.

On the evening before the park was wiped out, about 15 people from Peace and Freedom's Area 4 chapter gathered for a last supper of soup and cornneal bis-



EXPERT EXPOSES THE DEAL ON MACE

To The Editor:

After four doctors testified be-fore the Fire, Police and Safety Committee of the S.F. Board of Supervisors, the full board passed a resolution yesterday to adopt a policy that the use of toxic or potentially toxic chemicals should be suspended until health officials have reported that there is no possibility of long-term toxic effects on persons. (The vote was

When I went before the board I followed a pharmacologist and cardiologist, both of whom reported the toxic systemic effects of Mace.

The following was emphasized before the board:

(1) The General Ordinance Equipment Company (GOEC), the manufacturer, perpetrated an outrage on the public and the police by:

a. Performing totally in adequate safety tests on animals, and quoting hearsay evidence on human tests.
b. Pushing sales by reassuring all of Mace's complete safety and recommended no restrictions with regard to its

3. The only statements were from the F.B.I. and the Federal Riot Control Commission (FRCC), both of which brought and stocked Mace -- after consulting only the manufacturer. This apparently became the go ahead for all local police departments.

4. There are new numerous weapons under consideration by the waviews celling consideration by

weapons under consideration by the various police agencies, and' will decisions be made the same way the Mace decision was made? By in large most local police departments are continuing to use

Mace. In California the state legislature is now considering bills to encourage the use of Mace by our state police and to allow the

our state police and to allow the use of Mace in prisons. In view of what we now know about Mace these bills before the state legislature are incredible.

The Las Vegas Juvenile Authorities are now considering the use of Mace on detained juveniles. It is absolutely imperative that our state legislature consider all of the short and long term potential effects of this dangerous chemical (Mace) before passing any legislation encouraging its use. They should at the very least consult physicians that have treated Mace victims and those people in Mace victims and those people in the biologic sciences that are now conducting experimental studies with Mace.

He authored the widely publicized Moynihan Report "The Negro Family: The Case For National Action," released in 1967. "I would not be particularly proud to have run that in a newspaper," Moynihan said on KQED-TV. He stated that kind of an ad is an effort to scare white people, frightening them with the

Scores of callers on the bay area's talk-shows have been reacting to the Tribune's full page by stating they would cancel their subscriptions. One female caller stated she intended to canvass her neighborhood asking her neighbors to do likewise.



This spring a political process, long time in pre-paration, suddenly emerged as the central force on this planet, stopping the war, toppling menopausal gov-ernments left and right and showing every evidence of reshaping the sociology of the world.

This process has no name. Its name is spring. Call it youth international party. Party in the sense of joyful gathering. Call it YIP. Call it what you like, the process doesn't care.

The process has no leaders. Spokesmen pop up all over the world in response to local pressures. When needed they seem to appear.

The process is amparently guided by no hymon exence.

The process is apparently guided by no human agency. Extra-terrestial? UFO? DNA? I dunno. Every aging power-holder senses the process as an

Extra-terrestial? UFO? DNA? I dunno.
Every aging power-holder senses the process as an alien and dangerous force.
The communists call it reactionary. The FBI and CIA and the USA and the USAF call it red, Tall, old de Gaulle calls it foreign agitation. He's right, A foreign process invisible and irresistable taking over every country in the world.
Biological warfare.
I myself have been dimly aware of the process for some seven years, during which time I have been its faithful agent, always speculating about, never knowing who charted the direction. In the course of a recent assignment I learned considerably more about the scope and style of the network and I pass this on to dispel rumor and to further complicate the hopelessly simple situation. It happened like this.

In January 1968 Rosemary and I rented a cottage on a cliff overlooking the ocean at Laguna Beach. The surf (ancient time piece of the universe) rolling out the passage of hours, There. The needle point of unity. At sunset war planes began to home back to the military bases that blockade the coast south of L.A. Metal rents in the gossamer fabric.

Suddenly the ocean (they call it Pacific) was a sea of blood and the TV dial flipped to battle ship. Portugese slavers dragging off the soft-eyed polynesians. Russian frigates coughing red cannon smoke south of the Kurils. Peary's destroyers at Tokio Bay. Uncle Sam's fleet smoking it up at Midway, Kwajalein, Coral Sea. British dreadnaughts steaming into Singapore, guns booming, the orient trembling at the thunder.

Rosemary murmured in pain with tender flower girls from a thousand mountain villages chained down to the whore houses and dance halls of Hong Kong and Manila, and Saigon and Rangoon. Soft brown seed-carrying bodies gouged by the metal grappling hooks of His Majesty's White Fleet.

Then screaming whine and shriek of ruptured air. The fighter jet dove down on us, and hung circling, shrill high cry of turbine rage: EEEEEEEEEEEEEEE Metal claws raking our exposed bodies, EEEEEEEEEEEEEE Metal is destroying seed. Stop the war!

I sat up. Frowning. Thinking.

Rosemary said it again, Stop the war. Do you hear me? Stop the war!

I was still thinking about it the next day. Tiny Tim. Stop the war! Yes dear. Sure thing. O.K. Right! Stop the war was the medical properties of the story o

re? Stop the war.

Protest. March? I read the news that day. Oh boy. Dick Gregory had called a march on the Democratic convention in Chicago. I tried to call Dick Gregory but he was hard to reach. Barnstorming around the country, nine lectures a week, being met at the airport by the students, the press conference, the SRO funny, serious show, and then bull sessions with the students until dawn. I kept leaving my number at college-town motels and student union buildings. He finally called at three in the morning, still rapping breathless. He was going on another 40 day fast. He wasn't going to shave or cut his hair or buy clothes until the war was over. We agreed to meet in New York. y clothes New York

day fast. He wasn't going to shave or cut his hair or buy clothes until the war was over. We agreed to meet in New York.

My own winter lecture tour started at Salt Lake City. The field house was packed. Pretty good for square Utah. I didn't talk much about turning on Love is where its at... Jews don't kill... Christians kill... your best hope is dope... drop out or cop out... 1943 was the end of history... the new race of mutants... young blacks... and young peace kids and young turned-on saints... lots of uplevel jokes about LBJ and J. Edgar and the cops. Thunder-ous applause. Pretty will for tame Utah. There was something in the air, in the laughing wisdom and the hunger for change. The kids are ready.

In New York a meeting got arranged. The doorman at Peggy's Park Avenue apartment didn't blink at Paul Krassner in faded jeans, and Abbie Hoffman with wide grin and Jerry Rubin with wild hair and the Evo people, Allen Katzman and Jacob Cohen.

I was interested to meet Abbie and Jerry. I had seen Jerry Rubin at the big January '67 Be-In in San Francisco and he seemed out of place. Young, driving radical shouting activist slogans at the Kumba Mela meadow of smilling, stoned saints.

Jerry Rubin had changed. He was relaxed. Jolly. Almost elvin. He had been studying acid. Nancy was with him and that was mellow and cheerful. The dogmatic leftist activist chapter had been written and here was Merry Jerry the Lycergic Lenin, the grass Guevera, the mescaline Marx.

And everybody says that Abbey Hoffman is the brains behind Jerry. Abandon the creeping meatball, he shouted in a hahd "A" Boston accent. Abbie laughed a lot. Paul Krassner made silly jokes. Everybody says he's the brains behind Abbie. A hundred thousand kids would throng to the Monterey-type rock and roll festival. S.D.S. was coming too in caravans and a Chicago activist group headed by Renny Davis was gearing up and the Blacks were sympathetic but warned the white hippies to stay out of the ghetto to avoid the violence but Dick Gregory wanted the Yippies on the black south side to march with the Brothers. Dick guaranteed the black neighborhoods would be friendly.

We agreed to ask the Black Power people to meet with us in a week.

Next day I had lunch with Allen Ginsberg at the Kansas

Next day I had lunch with Allen Ginsberg at the Kansas City Steak House. Allen was worried about the violence. He giggled his Allen laugh. I'm scared of violence. We agreed not to go to Chicago if a bloody scene seemed inevitable.

inevitable.

Then Rosemary and I went to Millbrook, driving by night to avoid the ring of armed agents that surround the League headquarters, the state police stake-outs on the parkway, the Sheriff's patrols in the county and the Hitchcock's Brink guards at the Gate House. We changed to the Land Rover and bumped up to the League tipis hidden in the north woods, We climbed on foot to the ridge to pay respect to the Amitabha Buddha and to consult the oracle by the tribal fire. The Amitabha Buddha is the tangle, visible center of the League for Spiritual Discovery. It's a Tibetan bronze of the Gautama in the Earth Touching Mudra (the time He grabbed the ground during his freak out just before His Illumination) and it had been with us in our wanderings after we were thrown out from Harvard, from Mexico, from the Carribena, from the meditation house at Millbrook up to the secluded tipi camp.

A tipi, when all is said and done, remains the holiest structure designed by man. It's perfectly constructed for free living, for human harmony, for consulting God, for staying high. At the ground level is an unbroken circle with a fire in the center. People sit around with the red glow playing on their faces and the central flame throws the shadows of each person on the white canvas behind him. Ancient non-electronic light show. The entrance is a cunt slit and you have to bow your head to enter. The cone of white peeled poles pulls your eye up and your spirit up...no matter where you look the direction is up to the hole cut in the sky above.

Chicago. Chicago. On State Street, that great street, I just want to stay. They do things that they don't do on Broadway. A gigantic alignment of forces unconsciously centering on this one space/time coordinate—Chicago in August. The armies of war and peace, forces not so much historical as mythic, Homeric, Tolkienian, lumbering into confronatation on the shores of Lake Michigan. You'll have a time, the time of your life. On the one side pressing to defend and extend military control were the forces of Mordor, metal, smoke, centralized power, L.B.J., Mayor Daley, handcuffs, the Windy City police, Cook Country hog-butcher sheriffs posse, mace, the aging Democratic regulars, the labor machine, the National Guard, the gun-toting Texas Ranging orc cops of the world. Old whites.

And why Chicago in August? This too, seemed clear.
It all had to do with the politics of consciousness and
it went back directly to Dallas, November '64.

You just can't understand Vietnam and Chicago in
August unless you see that the assassination of John

history of human psychology. Future scholars studying the evolution of human consciousness will point to Dallas as the first world-wide linking of the nossphere, the term used by Teilhard de Chardin to describe the plantary consciousness network. Television hurtling images around the globe at the speed of light and creating a simultaneous unified emotional convulsion. Murder in Dallas: See it now. On all channels.

Television focusing the consciousness of several hundred million people on the same place at the same time experiencing the same violent emotion. The prophecies of McLuhan and Pere Teilhart came true, zap, but unhappily in a context of rage and grief. Confusion at the hospital. Autopsy in Texas. They'll fly to Washington. Conspiracy. Rebellion. The hearse drives up. The bereaved widow. The airport. LBJ appears. The new president. The wily, shadowy Texan. What side is he on?

At this moment the rage and grief of several hundred million people descended upon one figure. The unfortunate lumpy, scarred lightning reed Shakespearean body of history's greatest scapegoat. Lyndon B. Johnson was to carry the bad vibrations of the planet on his head, A global bolt of negative charged emotion zapped down upon the bewildered, well-meaing, over-ambitious, naive, ill-prepared Texas politican.

Note that it was not Oswald who became the target for the global energy blast. Oswald was too anonymous, too transient, too wispy to receive and store the consciousness of several hundred million people, He appeared on camera for one short scene, the

A Marine Corporal --- AWOL for 64 days --- turned himself in this week on advice of an anti-war patriot, Fred Chard.

fought for freedom and won. was with the Army Security Agency in Okinawa when he decided the Viet Nam War IS immoral. He took the "Confrontation Route" by applying for Conscientious Objector status

tor status.

With legal help from several anti-war groups in the San Francisco Bay, Chard was released with an administrative discharge

cisco Bay, Chard was released with an administrative discharge including full veteran's privileges. "When I become a divilian, I intend to try helping other G-I's who feel morally opposed to the War," Chard told me just before his discharge. He meant it. Chard had the opportunity to talk for several days with Marine Mike Oliver, a 22-year old Lance Corporal stationed at the Santa Ana Marine Air Facility. "Like Army guys in the Security Agency, Mike was different, highly individualistic, a man of his own thinking," Chard explained. "He was against the war and went AWOL when his unit was put on alert for Viet Nam duty."
"He agreed the "Confrontation Route" was his best alternative, so he decided to return this week for heirs AWOL 6d days." "Chard

Route" was his best alternative, so he decided to return this week after being AWOL 64 days," Chard reported, Oliver will try to get a discharge for the convenience

















Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"We are going to try to close down the Avalon or get our money back," Joel Clark toldBARB Mon-day, Clark is chairman of the Dick

Clark is chairman of the Dick Gregory for President Committee in the bay area.

The Committee wants Family Dog Productions, the Avalon Ball-room crew, to make up \$300 which it lost, according to Clark. when a benefit for Dick Gregory was cancelled last Wednesday May 15.

Ed Terry, chief fund raiser for the committee told BARB that

ted Terry, chief fund raiser for the committee, told BARB that the loss was incurred in advertising expenses including radiospots, posters, and tickets,

"We feel it is a little unfair," Terry said,
"We went to a lot of work and expense, when at the last moment the Avalon canceled the benefit."

Chet Helms, head of the Family Dog gave "various reasons" for the cancellation, Terry said. One was that he wanted to avoid a "confrontation between blacks and Hell's Angels" who were holding a beer bash of their own at the Carousel Ballroom the same night.

Chet Helms however, claims that he was "scammed".

"Mr. Terry led us to believe that it was a benefit for the Peace

and Freedom Party. We okayed it because we have a lot of friends in the party and we sympathize with them," he said.

"We made it explicitly clear that we wouldn't put on a benefit for a person."

But three days before the benefit, Helms said, he learned for the first time that it was a benefit for Dick Gregory. After considering what to do, he canceled it on Tuesday, he said.

The Gregory Committee distributed leaflets in the Haight this week, informing people of the cancelation. The Committee has threatened to picket the Avalon during this weekend if a settlement isn't reached before then.







QUESTION: I would like to know what effects peyote could have on a person. Does peyote cause any known damage? ANSWER: Peyote (Lophophora wil-

ANSWER: Peyote (Lophophora williamsii) is a small, spineless cactus with a gray-green top or "button" and a brown carrot-shaped root. The part of the plant extending above the ground is cut off and usually dried to form the peyote "button".

some evidence indicates Mexical Indians used the plant for ceremonial purposes as early as 300 B.C. Spanish conquistadors described its use as early as 1560. The Spanish invaders denounced peyote as a diabolical root and peyote as a diabolical root and in 1620 passed a law against its

The peyote cactus contains 9 interactive alkaloids which together are known as peyote (or panpeyotl). Mescaline is the prin-

peyotl). Mescaline is the principal alkaloid but psychedelic connoisseurs consistently claim subtle differences exist between peyote and mescaline.

Peyote was probably spread to Texas around 1870 though it may have occurred a hundred years earlier. The drug was used seasonably in Mexico but throughout the year amongst the Plains Indians of the United States.

Christian elements were grad-

dians of the United States.
Christian elements were gradually added to the peyote ceremony and in 1914 the "First-born Church of Christ" was organized. This was later to become the "Native American Church". The Native American Church now claims more than 200,000 members, some of whom live as far north as Saskatchewan. Peyotism

is the native religion of more than

is the native religion of more than 50 American tribes including the Cheyenne, Arapaho, Chippewa, Blackfoot, Crow, Delaware, Shawnee, Pawnee and Sioux.

Mescaline was isolated from peyote in 1896 and synthesized in 1919. The drug was used by such respected 19th century scientists as William James and Havelock Ellis. Ellis found the experience "an education influence of no mean value," More recently, psychiatrist Humphrey Osmond (who coined the word "psychedelic") wrote the following:

Peyote often causes nausea and vomiting but otherwise the immediate physiological effects are minimal. Mescaline sometimes cause

imal. Mescaline sometimes causes nausea, rarely vomiting. There has never been a long-term study of the effects of mescaline or peyote on humans.

One of the accusations made against peyote is that the drug is an aphrodisiac but according to psychologist William H, McGlothlin, "the only persons who find peyote to be a reliable aphrodisiac are missionaries and magazine writers."

Most states permit use of pey-

azine writers."

Most states permit use of peyote by members of the Native American Church. Mescaline use is prohibited by federal law except for selected research groups. The effects of both drugs last approximately 10–12 hours and wear off gradually. Bad trips are possible but seem to be rare; their true incidence is unknown. 
