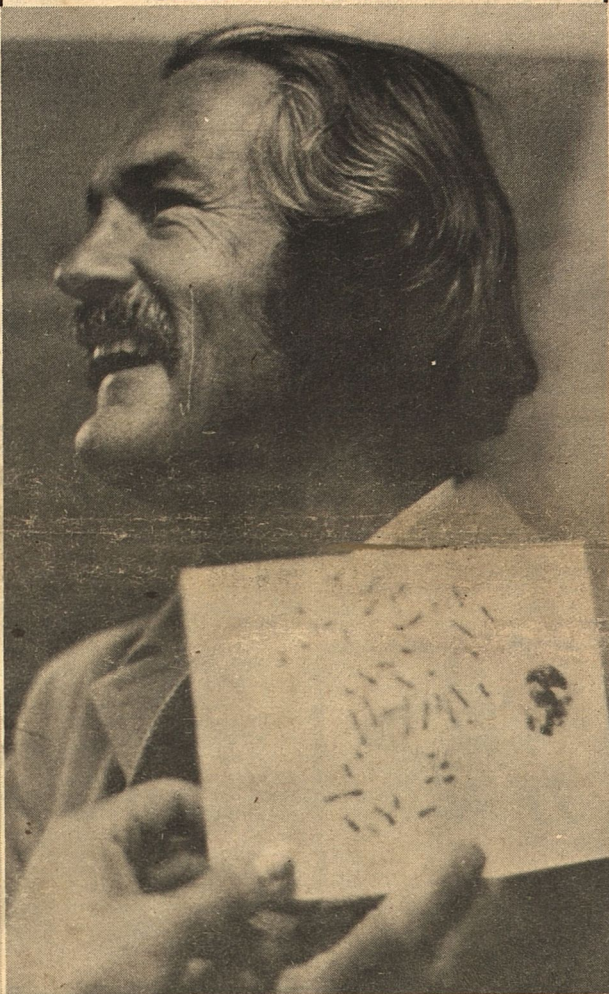

person for a moment & then gave him a breadwrapper with Marijuana in it. (During this period of time I stood close by, observing with interest.) We turned to go but were detained by a show of badges (a 2nd Nark had appeared from nowhere) & were Frog-marched around the corner down Cole St. We were searched in a door-way & then taken to Park Station in a Police cruiser hailed by one of the Narks. We were booked & jailed for 16 days. Needless to say, I returned to my place of employment to find that my job no longer existed. I have been searching for a job since then, but no one will hire me with a narcotics charge on my record.

Now I have been "remanded to the custody of the Sheriff" (ie. jailed) for being a poor OR risk. I go to trial on the 29th of May for "joint possession with intent to sell," or Violation of Health & Safety Code 11531.

I suppose this is standard for this sort of thing. But Barb, I didn't even know that my friend had the stuff on him. I said nothing to the arresting officers, and had no drugs of any sort upon

my person. (I don't even take Asprin!)

I appeal to you for help but it is really only half-hearted. I have been branded as a fel on & a drug-addict. My previously snow-white record (Not even a traffic ticket) has been ruined. And I can obtain no job in my specialty.

I realize that you probably can't help, but I had to tell someone. I am confused, dazed, & bewildered. I never in my wildest dreams thought that I would face prison for walking down the street & humming & signing a song with a friend.

U.S. TROOPS TO FRANCE ALA HITLER

Johnny Carson has replaced the Paris Peace Talks. From such insignificant things, great moments of history are pre-taped. Marxists, diplomats, experts, CIA, Nixon, may be meeting, studying, spying, and wire-tapping like crazy, but listed in the SF Chronicle's TV Section for 11:30pm, May 24, was the "Paris Peace Conference."

Carson was there instead of Harriman.

De Gaulle quits as Prime Minister of France, having been de-bailed by the students and workers. Even the CP couldn't save him. He will resign this week (May 31).

Meanwhile, back in the Av Shucks valley are the North Vietnamese. They retook it last week. Hue, once again, is "open to attack." Saigon, too, is not only

PFM IN CAMPAIGN FOR NATIONAL PARTY

California's Peace and Freedom Movement is now launching a summer project to transform the PFM into a national political party with candidates on many state ballots.

The decision to go ahead with full-scale nationwide organizing springs from the results of several months of field work by PFM organizers - working outside this state.

Reports from the organizers indicate that it is definitely worthwhile to carry on the campaign to make Peace and Freedom a third national party.

A series of June conferences will build the framework for the summertime drive.

Political organizations with positions similar to the California PFM have been formed in Colorado, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Utah, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming.

"We've already found enough groundswell to put a third party into the picture in 15 or 20 states," Rick Hyland told BARB this week. Hyland is administrator of the PFM National Organizing Committee.

He indicated that the immediate need is to locate people willing to work on national organizing teams during the summer, and to train the volunteers during the June conferences.

Arrangements are being made to provide full-time volunteers with room, board, and \$5 per week, Hyland said. A smaller number of traveling organizers will receive subsistence salaries.

"One of our major hangups," Hyland said, "is convincing movement people of the necessity for the left to go into the national electoral bag. We have to convince them that electoral action is a valuable organizing tool." Local recruitment conferences for potential organizers begin June 6 with a session in Menlo Park, near Stanford U, at the Free University bookstore.

The initial San Francisco organizers meeting will be held June 6 at the PFM office at 55 Colton. Similar meetings in Los Angeles and San Diego are scheduled for the same date.

The Berkeley organizers meeting will be held Friday, June 7, at a place not yet determined.

Committed PFM national organizers will then gather in Berkeley for a three-day orientation conference June 18-20 to detail the methods, techniques, policies and problems involved in the task, under the guidance of experienced political and community organizers.

The PFM summer action project will be coordinated through the state office in the East Bay. A biweekly national Peace and Freedom newspaper is planned to serve as a communications link at least until the PFM national Presidential nominating convention, expected early in September.

The nominating convention will probably also be the founding convention of the national Peace and Freedom Party, Hyland said.

"It's evident that the Left in America has no national voice, and as a consequence can pro-

ject no solution to nationwide problems, such as the entire struggle for black liberation and the struggle to end American imperialism," Hyland said.

"It's also evident that the Democratic Party offers no solutions on other than rhetorical levels, so we are calling on people who are truly interested in resolving our serious national difficulties to organize, organize, organize."

He indicated that the PFM national drive might be the last chance for white radicals and black militants to devise a means of co-operating, "by projecting our coalition (with the Black Panthers) into the national community."

Like many Peace and Freedom leaders, Hyland anticipates that many people who now support Eugene McCarthy will return to the

PFM after the "disillusionment" of the Democratic National Convention in August. The results of summer organizing are expected to give them something substantial to come back to.

Responding to President Lyndon Johnson's call to make Memorial Day a time of prayer for peace, the Shiva Fellowship is planning worship that day on "Hippy Hill" in Golden Gate Park.

The Shiva Fellowship, led by the Rev. Willie Minney, is a local division of the Neo-American Church - Shiva is the God of Destruction. Rev. Minney, who said he recent-

ly spent 3 months in Benares, India, told Barb how the prayer meeting will unfold.

"It begins by preparing a sacrifice to Shiva in the form of such sacraments as hashish, ganja, alcohol, bang or LSD," he said. BARB asked whether LSD is used in Benares.

"Oh yes, the holy men love it," Rev. Minney said.

He went on. "Loud sounds, made by the drum, the conch or the voice, invite people to join in the sacrifice. Then the sacrament is held to the forehead--lighted if appropriate--and a prayer said to Shiva.

"A prayer such as 'Hari Om Nammo Shiva.'

"The God then accepts as much as he wants, including any harmful substances which might be present, and the worshipper consumes the rest."

BARB asked whether marks on the scene might be considered "harmful substances." Rev. Minney replied that it might be so, and that in India nobody messes around with worship of the God of Destruction.

To conclude the worship service, "people chant and dance as Shiva moves them," Rev. Minney said.

He notes that the hemp plant is considered a gift from God to man, and that it is appropriate to return some freely to the God.

The prayer service begins at 11 a.m. on May 31.

SCIENCE TRIUMPHS AGAIN, YET

CLEAVER OUTCUTS SUSSKIND

Several of Eldridge Cleaver's words were cut from the tape of his appearance on the David Susskind Show.

The words apparently were "white racist pig". Cleaver was describing the cops that Huey Newton was accused of shooting.

The show, taped sometime prior to Cleaver's shooting and imprisonment, demonstrated why the power structure felt it had to put him away.

Cleaver was intelligent, articulate and forceful. He didn't take any bullshit from Susskind, who froze after the first five minutes into calling the Panthers' programs and principles "madness".

"What is madness for the mother country is sanity for the colony" answered Cleaver.

When a white questioner mentioned that he had hired some "Negroes" Cleaver interjected: "We want to hire you."

When a questioner with a Jewish accent expressed shock that the Panthers were setting up a "government within a government" Cleaver recounted how Theodore Herzl had formed the government of Israel in exile before the state existed.

The cuts came as Cleaver was answering Susskind's hints that since so many Black Panther leaders had been imprisoned they must be common criminals. Cleaver noted that in any colony the mother country's jails are full of freedom fighters.

Just before the sequence KQED, the educational station on which the program appeared Tuesday night, warned the viewers that the cuts had been made by attorneys for Susskind and were not their fault.

At the end of the interview, when Susskind called him "mad" for the last time, Cleaver replied: "Yes, I am mad. It's the time of a mad man."

EVERYBODY'S HACKLES UP

The struggle at SF State College ended Tuesday just as it began, unresolved.

Who won is still a matter of dispute.

Gaining three of the original four demands is considered by most participants to be a victory for the students, especially the minorities.

But others wanted to push for the fourth demand, the limination of the Air Force ROTC which was one of the original commitments of the sit-in.

Students called off the sit-in after a two-hour meeting in front of the administration building during which they decided to postpone further action on the AFROTC until the Fall semester.

When the sit-in had ended, the fuzz stationed across Holloway Ave. left goose-stepping, just as they had come.

The students went home to study for final exams which were to begin Wednesday.

What HAD happened, as one demonstrator said, was "the elimination of apathy from the SF State campus."

Students who had never become politically involved before suddenly understood "the importance of the issues" members of Students for a Democratic Society (SOS) and the Third World Liberation Front (TWLF) were struggling for. They began to pick up a microphone and talk, or write leaflets, or just hand them out asking for a little of your time to explain the nature of the demands.

Other students who still found themselves opposed to the demands organized opinion poll; and jocks on campus banded together to heckle the demonstrators.

Summerskill's departure from the college constituted a great change for the administration and demanded participation of most of the administrative officials to keep up with the students' demands and tactics.

After Summerskill left, they suddenly were forced to view the issues directly and to take some kind of stand on the issues and the student actions.

But the greatest release from lethargy came from the faculty members.

Six members of the faculty were arrested with the 52 students and 30-40 more attended the "productive dialogue" sessions called "listen - in" while the school policy, suggested again by the faculty remained in effect.

Another group of professors formed in opposition to the demonstrators and their supporters, terming two of the students demands hoaxes, and arguing that they had already been agreed to before the sit-in.

Professor S.I. Hayakawa stated at the beginning of the week that special admission of 400 minority students and inclusion on the faculty of nine minority professors had already been guaranteed by the administration.

Professor Juan Martinez denies this. He told BARB that before Summerskill signed the statement, white students as well as minorities were allowed into State under the special admissions program.

When Donald Garrity closed the campus at 10 p.m. Friday night, the education department offered students 24 hour use of their building to help gain a settlement in the standoff between the administration and the participants of the sit-in.

The humanities department Monday, decided not to allow ROTC credits for majors in the humanities; they also issued a statement condemning Garrity for suspending the "free campus" rule. However, AFROTC has a stay of life.

Opposition among members of the faculty grew intense and at one point a fist fight broke out between professor John Edwards and professor Richard Fitzgerald. After a short argument, some eyewitnesses claimed Edwards swung at Fitzgerald. If he did, he struck air. Fitzgerald's counter-attack did not.

Fitzgerald is one of the professors who was not retained for next year. On the day that he sponsored a black history course,

at SF State, he received a letter of retention. The following day he received a letter of dismissal, and the third day he received a letter stating that the first letter had been a "clerical error."

Professor Juan Martinez, like Fitzgerald was not rehired for the coming year, but TWLF and SDS members were successful in keeping Martinez, the only Chicano professor at State on the faculty.

The sit-in ended Tuesday because participants felt they could no longer win the other demands. "We didn't have anywhere to apply force," John Levin told the BARB, "no tactic will win those

demands now . . ."

"The purpose of the leadership was education and building a movement. Our purpose is to win and to bring people into the struggle," Harri Dillon told the sit-in's last meeting. "We have done that."

Pat Salaver of TWLF doesn't agree with the position taken by Dillon and Levin though.

He feels that because the sit-in didn't go all the way, the board of trustees will rescind Summerskill's promises and suspend the sit-in leaders.

"The 400 minority students were lost somewhere in the talk about building a movement," he said.

MACE THEY KNEW IT MEANT MAYHEM

A basic ingredient of MACE is a nerve-poison. For twenty years, since 1948, this fact has been a matter of public record.

Scientific papers published in 1948 issues of the Biochemistry Journal reported the neurotoxic properties of CN, chloroacetophenone, decades before the General Ordnance Equipment Corp. (GOEC) included the nerve-poison in its recipe for MACE spray.

Newly-published reports show that CN has caused the removal of fourteen chemically-damaged eyes, and in one instance has killed bone tissue of the eye-socket and face.

In some cases CN has caused permanent anesthesia of parts of the hands and fingers.

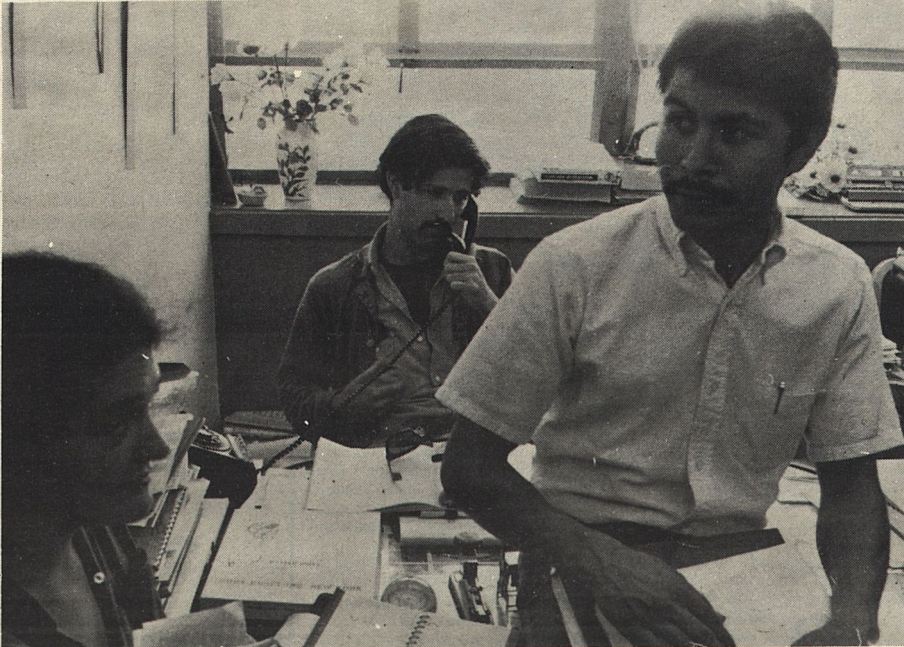
These facts are most recently revealed in the April 1968 issue of the American Journal of Ophthalmology in an article titled, "Eye Injury Caused by Tear-Gas Weapons," written by Capt. Robert A. Levine and Comdr. Charles J. Stahl of the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology, Washington, D.C.

Earlier this month the liberal Berkeley City Council rejected a proposed moratorium on the use of MACE, in the same week the Oakland police also decided not to ban it. Police and GOEC advertisements refer to MACE as "humane."

The manufacturer of MACE states that their canisters fire "a highly refined form of CN."

CN, according to Capt. Levine and Comdr. Stahl, is the most common tear gas.

"Attention has been drawn recently to the particular neurotoxic-see page 7

SHORT-ARM OF THE LAW

The bailiff puts out his cigarette, saunters up to his desk and says in a bored monotone: "the Municipal Court of the County of Alameda, honorable Judge Stafford says in a bored monotone: "the Municipal Court of the County of Alameda, honorable Judge Stafford P Buckley presiding, is now in session -- all rise."

So begins another day in the Oakland Municipal (Muni) Court, where judges will hear cases ranging from overdue traffic tickets to preliminary hearings for armed robbery. The court docket is always crowded. During the morning when there are usually motions for bail reductions or continuance of a case, an efficient judge will hear 20 or more cases in a single hour. With the 11 judges in the Oakland Municipal Court that makes 550 cases in any one morning.

After the lunch break, the court proceeds at a more leisurely pace. The judge might have two totally complete trials, a couple of sen-

tencings of previously convicted prisoners, and a coffee break.

In America justice proceeds with all the deliberate speed of a conveyor belt.

Let's run it down. You've been busted. Guards shuffle you from cell to cell; you're searched, fingerprinted, photographed, put into another cell, transferred to a sleeping cell, and finally to the holding tank directly behind the courtroom. All this time you wear the same clothes you wore when arrested.

You're in a "holding cell" that reminds you of a cross between a septic tank and one of Berkeley's new student apartment buildings. You look at the dull green concrete walls and breathe in the dull green smell of human excrement and disinfectant. A TV camera in the corner of the ceiling looks back at you and in your mind you picture the guards watching. As you sit on a concrete slab waiting for the bailiff to stick his pot belly in the doorway and call your name, you begin talking with your

cellmates. If you're white and middle class, chances are you're alone. Most of your cellmates are black or Mexican-American. Most of them can't make bail, so they have spent several weeks in Santa Rita County Jail.

These men who are "presumed innocent until proven guilty" are held in maximum or medium security facilities while the vast bulk of convicted criminals stay in minimum security barracks. These Santa Ritans are rousted at 3:00 A.M. in preparation for their 30 minute drive for a 9:00 A.M. appointment at the Oakland courthouse.

The bailiff screams out your last name, first name, middle initial, and from your stark holding tank you suddenly emerge into a wood-paneled, nicely carpeted, air-conditioned courtroom. Your first reaction is total shock. While the bailiff hands you a copy of the charges and the mouth of the judge drones on about legal amenities such as the right to counsel and

bail, you try to recover your senses. Your case is probably put over a week until you get a lawyer. Your first "day in court" has consisted of three minutes in front of a judge who has 19 other cases to hear that hour.

Five days a week, 52 weeks a year, the poor and especially the blacks and Mexican-Americans get screwed by your American judicial system. The usual notions of legal justice and procedural fairness simply don't apply to poor people caught on the judicial conveyor belt. The poor just don't have a "fair and speedy trial", "trial by jury", "right to counsel", "right to reasonable bail", and "full due process of law."

This situation is not the rare exception, the occasional slip-up of a basically humane system -- it is a process accepted and practiced every day by judges, district attorneys, and defense attorneys alike.

S.F. STATE AS BATONS BEAT BRAINS

A police mill-in ended the eight-day crisis at SF State Tuesday afternoon.

The demonstration was the fourth such action of the militant S.F.P.D. in a week.

But students on the campus side-stepped violence by temporarily ending a demonstration of their own and avoiding a confrontation with the outside agitators.

The 500 students, who had been sitting in for eight days, called it a victory. They won three demands out of five, although the smell of an establishment sell-out fouls the air.

Two demands -- amnesty for arrested students and removal of the Air Force ROTC from campus -- were not won as students promised to return in the Fall

and continue their struggle.

The three demands gained by the revolt sparked by SDS and the Third World Liberation Front, are: special admission of 400 minority students next Fall, the employment of nine minority teachers, and the retention of the only Chicane prof. on the faculty, Juan Martinez.

The more than 50 militant off-campus fuzzi staged their disruptive mill-in Tuesday in Park Merced, the residential neighborhood across the street from the State campus.

Armed with clubs and guns, they sealed off an entire block area for most of the afternoon, obstructing traffic, and threatening to invade

the campus if the students re-occupied the State administration building.

With the addition of 100 more bulls stationed on the shore of Lake Merced, the demonstration turned out to be the largest of all S.F.P.D. rallies at State.

The scene was set: 150 fuzzi, 500 students, and almost 1,000 spectators. But no go.

After their eight-day seige, students were ready to end the demonstration. They argued that nothing would be gained by submitting to mass arrests or by fighting with the police.

"We have won three of our demands and we have built a movement," Bruce Hartford told the

students meeting on the steps of the administration building. "I don't think we can accomplish anything else right now."

The rest of the demonstrators agreed, and the two-hour meeting concluded with a vote to end the sit-in and a commitment to disrupt the graduation ceremony June 6 at the Cow Palace, if either the concessions they have won are withdrawn or if disciplinary action is taken against any of the protesters.

Earlier Tuesday the administration declared a "state of emergency" proclaiming: "students who disrupt the operation of the college are subject to immediate disciplinary action."

In defiance of the emergency proclamation the students marched to the administration building and sat-in until the paddy wagons and squad cars began arriving across the street.

Both the proclamation and the call for police were issued by the "troika" which has ruled at State since Friday when John Summerskill split for Ethiopia, apparently to look for another job.

Although there was some confusion about whether Summerskill was canned or resigned, most observers believe that his term at State has ended.

Summerskill called the San Francisco police onto campus the first night of the demonstration, April 21, when students who were sitting-in refused to leave the building at closing time, 10 p.m.

Police then arrested 26 students, lawyer for the Associated Students, Kayo Hallinan, and demonstrated the militancy of their

Falling clubs, they marched into the crowd of spectators, sending 11 to the hospital with busted heads, including Hallinan.

The following night, acting on a faculty recommendation, Summerskill declared an "open campus" to allow students and faculty members to "carry on a meaningful dialogue" in the buildings throughout the night.

On Thursday, Summerskill bowed to three of the students' demands and promised to hold a student-faculty referendum on the ROTC issue.

But when Summerskill left unannounced Friday, the "troika," headed by Donald Garrity, vice-president of academic affairs, and including Glenn Smith, vice president for administrative affairs, and Ferd Reddell, dean of students, immediately assumed power.

The new administration's first act was to renege on the ROTC referendum promised for the following Tuesday; its second was to cancel the "open campus" policy established by Summerskill.

At closing time Friday night, Garrity called police to haul off 27 students and 5 faculty who volunteered to remain in the administration building to get busted.

The second wave of arrests brought added support to the demonstrators Monday when they escalated tactics by staging a mill-in.

More than 600 students seized the Ad building again, taking over offices, jamming the phone lines, banging on walls and seeking members of the administration to confer with.

The troika was finally discovered to be locked in one of the Dean's offices, and after shouts of "Come out and face the people," Garrity agreed to meet with students and faculty members.

Garrity refused to grant the ROTC demand or even the new demand of amnesty, however, and students banged, pounded, and kicked the walls and doors until Garrity again called the police to clear the building.

In their appearances at the college, the fuzzi made no arrests but were able to rescue the trapped administrators and escort them safely home.

They then seized the Ad building, locked it off, and stood guard until the spectators dispersed.

At a late meeting Monday night, the demonstrators agreed to try the same tactic themselves on Tuesday, barricading and sealing off the Ad Building. The emergency proclamation made them change their plans. They sat-in.

Mayor Alioto offered to mediate the settlement as an "impartial party." The steering committee members laughed, John Levin, a member said.

Finally, after another unsuccessful meeting between Garrity and the steering committee, the afternoon sit-in was called, followed by the vote to end the demonstration.

Although Garrity has promised to honor the three commitments already made by Summerskill, the board of trustees may act to cancel them.

The State Senate, according to Senator George Moscone's office passed a resolution Monday recommending that the trustees rescind Summerskill's promises.

STANFORD STUDENTS SECRET

"Psst - want to join the movement?"

It may not be long before radicals here will begin to hear this whispered call to action.

The movement will change. It must change. The old come-one-come-all us-against-Johnson days are drawing to a close. A new force - less cumbersome, more effective -- is needed. And a group at Stanford University is showing how it may well be done.

During the recent Stanford sit-in I was struck by the quiet, orderly fashion in which the minor functionaries operated. I ascribed it to their supposed upper-middle-class gentility and anxiety for approval.

I was wrong. It was the result of good prior organization and genuine militancy.

Many of those "operatives" were members of the Peninsula Red Guard, study-action groups. These units are organized in small groups of no more than a dozen.

They do not organize around specialities. During inactive periods they study the power structure and its vulnerabilities. They get to know each others' strengths and weaknesses.

A spokesman describes their activity as "applying Marxist-Leninist theory as developed through Mao and attempting to relate the theory to practice and to build an American theory based on the practice."

The groups are totally separate and independent. Some of the leaders know each other, and a loose command structure is maintained. Each group has a sort of roving commission to attack the power structure at points of opportunity and fade back into the obscurity of the middle-class milieu.

Members of the Red Guard have organized these groups in addition to the other projects they undertake. To the Red Guard's delight there are apparently other action groups operating independently.

Somewhat the Stanford NROTC shack burned down on the first night of the sit-in there. No one in the Red Guard seems to know who the arsonists might be, nor are they interested in inquiring too diligently.

During the sit-in, Red Guard units aided with the tasks of press relations, building security and tactical contingency planning. Their operation was smooth and efficient not because they had trained for the specific tasks but because they knew each other within the groups.

The implications for the movement are clear. If you want effectiveness, this form of organization is hard to beat.

Interested persons could form groups on their own initiative. Only persons who are judged capable and safe should be asked to join. The last thing you want is a fink running loose. Beware of eager-beaver volunteers.

These groups should study the power structure and locate its

David Victor Harris testified in his defense Tuesday, the second day of his three-day trial for resisting the draft. He said that America must stop the shuck now, the waiting game, must "affirm man's brotherhood" before we kill ourselves.

"In the present state of affairs, I don't see any other choice but that," he said.

And the old man with bright white hair nodded with the whole bend of his body, an affirmation that filled the packed courtroom. Carmel attorney Francis Heisler, 72, commanded all attention virtually at will, and with

the slightest movement or inflection of his Austrian accent. At BARB press time the jury was still out.

The government's case was restricted to proving that Harris "willfully and knowingly" refused to submit to induction. The charge is limiting. Most testimony on moral or ethical grounds was excluded as irrelevant.

Besides Harris and his mother, only one of three experts were allowed to testify, by Judge Oliver J. Carter. Written statements by the excluded witnesses were entered in the record, however. Heisler said this was for appeal purposes.

Sociologist Prof. Nevitt Sanford of UC and Stanford's Center for Study of Human Problems, testified only as a character witness. When the jury was sent out, he was permitted to say that condescension is part of the American system's destructive inconsistency driving thousands to drop out and resist the draft.

Prosecuting attorney F. Steele Langford was easily frazzled by

Heisler. When he twice tried to second-guess the defense and complained to Judge Carter, Heisler said, "I would ask that Mr. Langford act as a lawyer and not as a soothsayer." It was a grandfatherly rebuke. Langford was doing so badly at one point that his colleague Paul Sloan apparently had to coach him. Judge Carter did not seem impressed.

In his closing argument Langford said that we all learned in the fifth grade, "Our government is a government of laws and not of men."

Harris said of all the things we can choose from to affirm our lives, "we've chosen to organize around fear." Realizing that, he decided to throw his "little bit in the ring" for brotherhood.

"There is absolutely nothing unusual about my case," Harris stressed. He said he was trying to show that anybody can do it.

Harris said that he cannot oppress or kill another because that person "is part of oneself." (The see page 21

leafletting at plant gates throughout the Bay Area. In their leaflets they point out that a similar sit-down wave in France in 1936 helped spark the sit-downs which swept 1,000 factories in this country in '36 @ '37.

The leaflets indicate similarities in the causes of the uprising in France and problems beginning to effect American workers-inflation, automation and speed-ups.

BUST A BORDER FOR BUDDHA

We live in a global village, says McLuhan -- our laws and our awareness simply haven't kept up with this reality. The world is already one, and it would only take a few quick shocks to prove how true this is. Administering these shocks to help our laws and awareness along is well within the range of existing provo techniques.

Take today's borders, for instance, those feeble, fading remnants of a Nineteenth Century system of nation-states. Most of them are lonely, under-manned places which have long since stopped really keeping people out except as the merest formality. Whether you cross by car or train, the rule of the border guards is usually to get people through as quickly as possible. Borders are little more than a symbol, a pretext -- their only function today is to hold up the sadly drooping grandeur of most European states. A vindictive society still sees them as tools to pick up escaping criminals, but the real professionals among them have figured out their way through long ago, and the only ones who get sucked in today are terrified amateurs -- or solitary beatniks, if the guards are feeling bored or sadistic.

These borders can be busted, or at least held up to so much ridicule that the great majority of peoples everywhere will see that their day is done, that they are nothing but a farce. Consider the possibilities. What would happen if --

1 - One hundred patient people of varying nationalities went through by car or train from France to Belgium (or wherever) one day, carrying all necessary documents plus some protest signs. As soon as they reached the other side, they would drive or take the next train back. And then again. All day. With replacements, all week.

2 - An entire trainful of people were to attempt to pass through a crosspoint, although not a single one of them were carrying passports or other identifying documents.

3 - Several hundred cars full of passengers were to try the same thing, or a variation of plan 1, at a crowded crosspoint at the hour of maximum traffic.

4 - Bring in Public Hysteria Number One by spreading a rumor that pot is being smuggled across --

then send a thousand young people over, all clean but looking as suspicious as possible.

5 - The next step could be passportless march-throughs, sing-throughs, and smoke-throughs. Care must be taken to be as kind to the border guards as possible.

6 - Purposely use other people's documents, passports belonging to the dead or to people of different nationalities than one's own. Most people's passport photos look nothing like them -- once you had been waved across, you could complain to the passport control about faulty inspection.

There will be certain difficulties. America and England, being seabound, will be harder to crack (though the American-Canadian border is a natural), but a boatload of determined people can manage anything with a little thought and persistence. The Communist Countries take their borders more seriously, but things are very much in a state of flow there too, as recent events clearly demonstrate. The Austro-Czech and Austro-Hungarian crossing points should be cased and considered -- likewise Checkpoint Charlie in Berlin. Casing is essential in all operations everywhere.

The possibilities are endless, and the publicity could be enormous. The point is not to press for any immediate, precise legislation but merely to impress upon the public that our borders no longer serve a practical function. The money would be better spent in some other way. And all the energy we spend in building up our supposedly spontaneous national identities would be better spent exploring ourselves and each other and finding out who we really are. The really big issues are ultra-national -- leisure, inner space, the conquest of violence, birth control, food distribution.

One anticipates the objections. One's continental friends proudly proclaim they have already done away with passports between the Common Market countries -- all you need is an "ordinary" police identity card. But what the hell is ordinary about a police identity card? No one carries them in England or America. Why should Europeans need one? Why should a human being have to present any kind of documents to go anywhere? At the beginning of this century passports did not exist -- let us hope that the same is true when the end of the century has come.

SHAPE OF THE DEAL FOR EUROPE

Below are extracts from Appendix 3 to Annex N Civil Affairs, of USIN-CEUR OPLAN NR 100-1 (U), emanating from Headquarters United States European Command.

It is in effect a draft treaty of occupation, giving the US Forces the right to put down civil disturbances, make arrests, and act with total immunity from the civil law of the country that signs it.

The document, accompanied by an authentication (marked TOP SECRET), is signed by Major General B. E. Spivy, Director J-3 Division. This is dated October 1962. Whether this means everything is out of date I am not in a position to say -- however the draft is marked to be "Downgraded at 17 year intervals, not automatically." Nor can I say whether this agreement has been signed, and with what countries. Correspondents of larger newspapers might care to find out, or Congressmen could try asking questions in Congress. Already the Dutch newspaper "De Groene Amsterdammer" has broken the story (on March 2nd) and Dutch MP Hein van Wijk has put questions to his government. So far the English and American Press have ignored the story.

What follows is a draft of the emer-

gency status of forces agreement: cy SOF Agreement will be concluded in the form of an Exchange of Notes between the Foreign Ministry or other appropriate authority of (country) and the US Ambassador, or Commander of the US Forces in (country).

SUBSTANTIVE PROVISIONS
2(b): The US Forces shall have the right to occupy any area or facility considered necessary for the accomplishment of their mission or for their safety and continued security, as determined by US military commanders (emphasis added) and to install such equipment therein as they shall deem necessary for these purposes.

(c): Military commanders of the US Forces may take such measures as they deem necessary to provide adequate security for their installations, personnel and equipment, and for the movement of supplies and personnel in () . . . In the event of acts of violence against US installations, equipment or personnel by persons other than members of the US Forces, such persons may be apprehended by the US Forces and turned over to the Government of () for appropriate disposition in accordance with the laws of that country.

(d): In the event of internal dis-

order which may materially affect the mission or security of the US Forces, such as armed violence or widespread rioting (emphasis added), the Government of () will endeavor to quell such disorders with its sources. However should these measures prove ineffective, or should the Government of () request assistance, or should the US military commander consider that the Government of () does not possess the capability of quelling such disorders effectively or in time, the US Forces may take such action as the US military commander deems necessary, either unilaterally or in cooperation with the Government of () (emphasis added).

(e): The Government of () shall make available to the US Forces such information and intelligence reports as will assist them in achieving their mission or as the US military commander requests (emphasis added).

(g): No civil action shall be brought in the courts of () against any member of the US Forces.

(m): The Government of () will furnish to units of the US Forces, free of charges of any kind and without present or future US liability for claims arising out of the US use there-

of, installations and facilities which are deemed to be necessary to support US Forces in their mission . . . The US Government will be under no obligation to restore these areas to their original use or to repair roads and bridges utilized by the US Armed Forces . . .

(n): . . . Authorized operators of vehicles of the US Forces shall be exempt from compliance with the local laws and regulations pertaining to the operation and use of vehicles

(r): The Government of () authorizes the US Forces to bring nuclear weapons into () ; to station them at such locations as may be deemed necessary.

(t): This agreement shall come into force immediately upon being signed by both parties and shall remain in force until ninety days after the departure of the US Forces from () unless previously terminated by mutual agreement . . .

Final Clause
4: The Embassy of the United States of America (the Commander US Forces in ()) avails itself (himself) of this opportunity to renew to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs the assurances of its (his) highest consideration. From EVO (UPS)

SEALE BLASTS JUDGE

"He knew what he was doing would be an insult to the black community," Bobby Seale charged in discussing the extended sentence handed him a week ago by Judge Redmond C. Staats, Jr. "By virtue of his own statement," the Panther Chairman told BARB, "Mr. Staats knew this parole sentence would be an insult."

Seale was placed on a strong three-year probation by Judge Staats on May 23 on a charge that he carried a loaded shotgun near the entrance to the Oakland Hall of Justice in May 1967.

Staats' sentence requires that the Panther leader must not own or carry dangerous weapons, must not associate with known criminals, and must find regular employment.

Seale and his attorney Charles R. Garry, announced immediately that they would appeal the decision.

"They railroaded me through the courts," Seale charged. "They're using this parole to control me, to take me from my work of helping free Huey, and this new situation of helping Eldridge." "They have falsely accused the Panthers as criminals. They are attempting to incriminate the Panthers."

"My mother is a Panther. She has no criminal record and no criminal tendencies," Seale said. "We refuse to accept the white definitions of criminal. Mayor Reading, Police Chief Gain, the judges, (Seale named a host of others)—they're the criminals," he said.

Seale is seeking the Assembly seat in the 17th District. Although Judge Staats suggested that Seale "seek another type of office" for regular employment as stipulated by the sentence, Seale reports his campaign is moving along successfully.

"Well, we think we're doing pretty good," he told BARB. "We still need some help with it."

Two other Panthers seek political office. Minister of Defense Huey P. Newton is seeking the 7th Congressional District seat, and in San Francisco, Panther Communication Secretary Kathleen Cleaver seeks an assembly office.

Convicted of the Hall of Justice weapons charge on April 11, Seale also faces charges of possessing illegal weapons stemming from a police raid on his home last February. Seale and his wife, Artie, are scheduled to appear in Superior Court Judge Zook Sutton's court on June 7 to begin arguments.

NO TIME FOR MOCKERY

The mock trial of a black political prisoner (admittedly Huey P. Newton) took place in Wheeler Auditorium on Sunday. Members of the Afro-American Students Union called their court to order only to find it very much out of order very shortly afterward.

Gathered before mock judge Haywood, the black students were enacting a fictional interpretation of the issues at stake in the forthcoming Huey Newton trial, when another issue was brought from the floor.

The players, almost all of whom were wearing white grease paint to create the atmosphere of an Oakland courtroom, were interrupted when a black man took the stage.

Black Panther Chairman Bobby Seale had his day in mock court, but Seale wasn't playing. Not with anybody.

"You think you can sit up here in the big walls of the University of California, but there's black people in the black community who is dying," Seale told the players according to the Daily Cal.

Seale claimed that Huey Newton's mother was opposed to the presentation of such a play. The leader said that Panthers who participated in it would be suspended.

Seale suggested political organizing instead of cultural and dramatic programs.

P&F DISASTER UNLESS CANDIDATES MAKE IT

No one is placing bets on the success of Peace and Freedom candidates in the Bay Area in the June 4 primary election, although most of the candidates are unopposed.

PFM organizers are pointing to the need for write-ins for most candidates as one of the chief handicaps added to the problem of moving bodies to the polls.

This weekend PFM is calling for door-to-door precinct work throughout the area.

Two arguments are most often repeated in urging PFM registrants to cast votes for their candidates: if Peace and Freedom fails to support the Black Panther candidates at the ballot box, the PFM/Panther coalition will probably collapse; and the failure to get PFM candidates on the official November ballot will mean the loss of a major organizing tool for the entire peace and minority liberation movement.

California laws new and old are creating obstacles to placing Peace and Freedom candidates on the printed November ballots. Most recently, Assembly Bill 69 required write-in candidates to pay filing fees, a new statute which Governor Ronald Reagan said is designed to keep "Mickey Mouse" off the ballot.

To appear on the printed November ballot, each write-in candidate in the primary must receive at least one per cent of the number of votes cast for that office in the previous election.

The goal for Assembly candidates Bobby Seale and David Rynin, running in the East Bay's 17th and 16th districts respectively, is 1,000 votes each, with a slim margin or invalid ballots.

The 17th Assembly District includes the Berkeley-Oakland flatlands. The boundary between the 16th and 17th A.D. in Berkeley runs along Spruce St., Oxford, Shattuck, Oxford again, Fulton, and Woolsey; in Oakland along Telegraph Ave. to 14th St., Harrison, and 11th St. to Merritt.

The combination of the 16th and 17th A.D. covers exactly the same area as the 7th Congressional District, where Huey P. Newton is the Peace and Freedom Congressional Candidate--the same area covered by the Scheer Campaign two years ago.

Huey P. Newton needs about 1,500 write-in votes to appear on the November ballot as the PFP candidate.

In addition to precinct workers to get out the vote all day on June 4, PFM activists indicate they need poll-watchers to observe the vote-count after the polls close.

Repeated emphasis has been placed by PFM on the necessity to do two things to cast a valid write-in vote: the candidates name must be written in the correct place on the ballot, and a circle must be stamped next to his name.

The same write-in problem on a larger scale faces the San Francisco Peace and Freedom Movement.

ment, which is fielding five write-in candidates.

Kathleen Cleaver is running in the 18th A.D.; Ivo Buddeke in the 19th; Joe Edmiston in the 20th; Eric Murphy in the 9th State Senatorial District; and Walter Battaglia in the 6th Congressional District.

Ballots of PFM registrants in the Bay Area will include some candidates' names already in print: Paul Jacobs, US Senator; Marvin Garson, US Congressman, 5th District; Mario Savio, State Senator, 11th District.

Michael Jones, running for Alameda County Supervisor, 4th District, has full PFM support.

Peace and Freedom leaders make it clear they are seeking as much help as possible in getting PFM registrants to the voting booths on June 4, to ward off the potential disaster they anticipate if the party's candidates fail to make the official November ballot.

IT WORKS! MIKE JONES MOTORCADE MAY PAY OFF

"It was a great thing," the candidate told BARB, "I would like to recommend it to anyone." Well, maybe not anyone. Few people who become candidates for county supervisor are like Mike Jones.

On the other hand, most candidates for county supervisor wouldn't be so happy with their reception in West Berkeley. John DeBonis is also in he running.

The Mike Jones Peace and Freedom Motorcade last Saturday was an unequalled success.

The string of cars, led by Jones in a blue Chevy station wagon and by a VW sound truck, spent the day snaking through most of the neighborhoods between San Pablo and the Bay, stopping periodically for Jones to speak to the house-holders.

Jones is the youngest of the four candidates for fourth district supervisor, but that doesn't make him any less serious. In fact, Mike Jones the Black man takes the all-white County Board of Supervisors very seriously.

"The Supervisors control all the money that comes into Alameda County," Jones told BARB. "They hire department heads, set

employment standards, make well-employment standards, make well-easy or hard to get, run the jails and control medical centers."

This is the bureaucratic structure with which many poor, and therefore many Black, people have to deal. Yet they are not represented on the board that controls the structure.

One reason for this lack of even a single vote, Jones feels, is the way the supervisorial districts are gerrymandered.

He is currently suing to have the county redistricted to give the Black community control over part of the Board.

Only then, he believes, will the rich and white character of the board be changed. Last year this board appropriated \$5,400,000 to the county Sheriff's department to apprehend suspects - mostly poor men - and provided only \$300,000 to the public defender's office to defend suspects - mostly poor men.

Having worked as a neighborhood organizer for the past five years in places as diverse as Louisiana and Oakland, Mike Jones feels he knows the problems of the poor people well, and could do something about them. He condemns the welfare program out of hand as "the worst in the state."

"Right now a mother with one child is only allowed \$45 for rent.

With rents the way they are in this area, pretty soon she has to dip into her food money to have a roof. And then they go hungry."

These are the things Mike Jones told his listeners. Their response was as much as a candidate could hope for.

"As we moved from one block into the next," he told BARB, "we saw people behind us putting up the signs we gave them in their windows."

"In fact," said Leo Bach, the organizer of the motorcade, "there wasn't one negative reaction in the whole drive. This was the most effective thing we've done in the whole campaign."

So effective that Jones is planning to carry his motorcade campaign to the campus area and to the hills this Thursday. Watch for him.

ic potential of CN," the Levine-Stahl article states.

"This report described three persons injured by accidental discharge of tear-gas pens into their hands. Following the injury there was prolonged and sometimes permanent anesthesia of portions of the hands and fingers. Microscopic examination revealed marked thickening of the epineurium and loss of axis cylinders."

The article cites biochemical studies in 1948 showing that CN "results particularly in denaturation of enzymes associated with sensory nerve activity." This indicates that MACE can cause permanent damage to nerve tissue on a chemical level. Its ingredient CN has already done so.

Most of the Levine-Stahl article discusses tear-gas damage to fourteen eyes which had to be removed anywhere from three weeks to 15 years after the injury.

The article indicates that the long-term nerve-poison capacity of CN may explain the fact that half of the fourteen eye-removals were performed three or more years after the original injury.

"Aging alters the physical characteristics of the chemical (CN)," the article states, "with a tendency to form clumps or a solid mass. When expelled as a solid mass, the material acts as a low-velocity missile, and by this means physical and mechanical factors may augment the inherent destructive capacity of the chemical."

The Mark IV Chemical MACE manufactured by General Ordnance Equipment Corp. boasts an "effective range" of "12 to 15 feet" and an "effective minimum life" of four years.--jas

Party does not quite have a monopoly on black radicals. While I support the Panther-PFP coalition, I want other black radicals to feel welcome also. Nominating a non-Panther for President will tell them the door is still open.

(2) Just as in "real life", geographic loyalties are important for organizing movements as well as for getting votes. PFP is strong in California, but weak everywhere else. Our national campaign should build and strengthen parties in other areas. Which means we should NOT nominate Californians, but should choose movement leaders from elsewhere, such as Gregory of Illinois and Tijerina of New Mexico.

(3) While Cleaver may well catch up by '72, he is not yet nearly as well known as Gregory nor as widely supported.

(4) To me, and perhaps I'm too conservative, Gregory's pacifism is still more inspiring than Cleaver's pistol. Probably we will and must move toward violence in the coming four years (unless the Ruling Class buys off the blacks), but this trend will require slow and patient re-education of many whites and blacks in the movement. If PFP prematurely imposes a pro-violence Presidential candidate on these advocates of non-violence, we may frighten and alienate them, and lose them into inactivity or even into the vile swamp of the Democratic Party.

(5) For millions of simple-minded folk, Cleaver's ineligibility because of age will be a stumbling block for their faith. Why hang them up?

So let's nominate Gregory & Tijerina for '68, and consider Cleaver for '72.

Practically every poet who read during the four open readings connected with the small press publishers conference held here last weekend was interrupted with applause.

The first reader on Friday night, Andy Clausen, took off his clothes and read for a full 30 minutes to the packed crowd in 145 Dwinell who entirely grooved with his performance, one chick so much so that she spontaneously joined him and stripped off her clothes while cheering from the gallery.

The other poets were more traditional in their delivery but some of the best underground poets read in what must be considered the most important series of readings since the 1965 poetry conference held (where else?) in Berkeley.

Doug Blazek, brilliant editor of Ole magazine and heavy met poet, read on Saturday, as did r.j.s. from Cleveland, where they are constantly busting poets for obscenity and contributing to the delinquency of listeners and readers. (who says Black Mayors are necessarily good?)

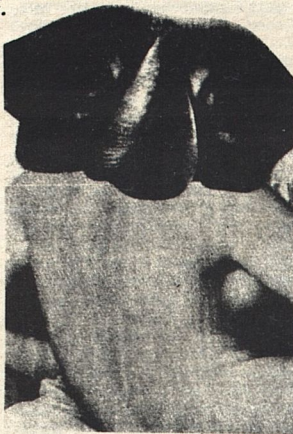
The readings were obviously heavily biased in favor of local poets, but where else but at Berkeley could such a conference have taken place with no bad vibrations from local campus authorities. Bay Area poets who read included folksinger poet Hilary Fowler, black poet editor Al Young and unpronounceable Mr. Laffing Water.

Out of these 4 readings (there were off campus readings on Thursday and Friday at the Berkeley Art Center and Shakespeare & Co. Bookstore) will come an anthology published and financed by some local publishers and editors of little magazines and edited by the poet himself.

Each poet who read at any of the 4 readings was requested to send a poem to the anthology for inclusion. Photographs taken during the 4 days will make the book an important document. Those people wishing to reserve copies should send \$1.50 to the undermine press, 2315a Russell St., Berkeley 94705 and wait.

Other events at the conference (the correct title is: Conference of Small Mag - Press Editors, Publishers and Associates, COSMEP) less interesting to the general public were panels and open discussion on such technical aspects as distribution, how to cut down on printing costs, postage costs. How to copyright material so no one can steal it from the magazine but the poet retains full rights.

Caroline Rand Herron from the Coordinating Council of Literary Magazines, CCLM, which has been funded by the National Endowment for the Arts attended the conference and returned to Washington with a message from COSMEP saying that more representation should be given to non-establishment non-university affiliated magazines and that financially sound magazines don't need extra money as much as small magazine edi-



tors who often spend most of their extra money on their magazines & who are most often publishing more important poets than the deadacademic journals anyway.

The message was quite strongly worded and as one man in a suit from an established magazine said "If I was on that board I'd feel like the cocksucker of the 20th century if I didn't agree with it."

The vote on this message was about 20 to 2, in favor. Laffing Water, local editor of Litus magazine, voted against the message because of an amendment which said the underground representatives would only get PART control of the money. Mr. Water has been listening to The Doors.

There has been some controversy about the conference or the anthology being financed by the government, and I'd like to correct any misunderstandings. The conference, under the direction of Jerry Burns, publisher of Goliards Press and Len Fulton of Dustbooks (publisher of The Small Press Review, look for it if you're interested in this article), received about \$2,000 from CCLM which they spent on the conference. The conference as a body representing about 100 editors & publishers (they all weren't there Sunday morning when the vote was taken, but they are being approached by letter and a correct count will be sent on to Miss Herron with the final wording of the document) went on record as believing that the CCLM could represent ALL independent publishing but should not give money to establishment magazines.

Yes, the majority of the conference said that they would accept government money (through 2 front groups, NEA & CCLM) if there were no strings attached and the money was distributed where it was needed.

John Simon, editor of Aldebaran Review who wrote the document, told Miss Herron "Our aim essentially is to destroy CCLM".

The anthology has no government money behind it. All money is coming from COSMEP and from individuals who are purchasing copies.

The NLF have no qualms about using U.S. G.I. equipment. All money is dirty. "Break on Thru to the Other side". -Richard krech p.s. this is a non-partisan article, i abstained from voting.



PERSECUTION IN THE FOREST

A few miles north of Big Sur's Limekiln Canyon, the tiny settlement called Lucia juts out over the waters of the Pacific. Lucia is a combination gas station (Standard Oil), cafe and general store. Above the entrance to the store a faded sign reads "NO HIPPIES." I stood before that sign recently and recalled similar signs I had seen years ago in the South. They had referred to "Jews" or "niggers." Later that day Patrick Cassidy reminded me that Hitler's first scapegoats were the gypsies, people who had few material possessions, dressed flamboyantly, lived in wagons, and who had long hair.

Somewhat reluctantly I entered the store to ask directions, two LOLS sat behind the counter sizing me up as I walked in. They apparently decided I was just another camper and were very helpful and pleasant. As I was talking to them, a long-haired boy carrying a pack walked in and asked for a drink of water. To my surprise they directed him to a water fountain without comment. I wondered how they defined a "hippie." Someone wearing a regulation uniform of beads and flowers?

I went to Big Sur to check out reports that peaceful campers were being turned out of the forest by government officials because they were considered to be "hippies." Charges had also been made that health officials in Monterey County eagerly participated in the hippie-hassling. Not long ago, a Monterey County Health Department physician established a temporary VD clinic at Big Sur Hot Springs' Esalen Institute. He treated 25-50 cases a week of gonorrhea and reports later reaching the daily press told of strange new penicillin-resistant strains of gonorrhea, presumably grown in the vile bodies of hippies.

It's true that gonorrhea is becoming more and more difficult to treat with penicillin alone. But the most likely source of new strains of gonorrhea is Asia, specifically Viet Nam. For the past several years, physicians in Saigon and on troop transport ships have reported a high percentage of gonorrhea cases resistant to the usual doses of penicillin. Often alternate antibiotics like tetracycline must be used. Now that most Viet Nam veterans return by plane rather than ship, symptoms of VD may appear only after sexual contact has occurred in the U.S.A.

Big Sur residents must travel 60 miles or more for health care. Several complained of brusque treatment at the general hospital in Monterey when they gave their address. They hope the Monterey County Health Department will set up a small clinic in Big Sur. But they fear the information gleaned from the temporary Esalen clinic will be used only for political purposes. Another excuse to roust hippies out of the woods. Unfortunately, most public health officials are but cogs in a bureaucratic machine.

HEALTH IN THE WOODS
Many of the complaints of unsanitary conditions amongst campers appear to have been justified. City-bred people seeking a more healthful life in the forest are often ill-prepared for life out-of-doors. Health department officials in rural areas could help prevent dis-

ease by assisting those who wish to spend time away from our rotting cities.

After the Equinox Celebration in Limekiln Canyon, many of the celebrants of the thousands assembled there decided to continue living amongst the redwoods. Some constructed outhouses on or near Limekiln Creek while others downstream bathed in and drank the same waters. A latrine can be easily built in a matter of hours in a way which can satisfy health standards. There are sound reasons for paying attention to proper disposal of human waste - quite apart from middle-class hangups. Two common fecally-borne diseases are typhoid and infectious hepatitis.

HOW TO BUILD A LATRINE
I'll describe here a simple, fool and fly-proof method for building a pit-privy. First of all try to preserve the natural ecology of the land and your bodies. Don't contaminate your own water supply or that of others. Latrines should be 100 feet from streams, springs or wells deeper than 20 feet. They should be 200 feet from shallow wells. If the ground slopes, build the latrine on the downhill side of the stream or well (unless you are aware of underground water-flow moving against the slope of the land).

A latrine should be at least 3 feet deep. Shallower holes will fill up faster, requiring more work in the long run. The edges should be raised slightly above the surrounding terrain and packed down. When possible, line the edges with tar or oil paper and tack the upper side of the paper to the wood planks which will be covering the hole in the ground. If no lining paper is available, make sure there is a tight seal between the elevated rim of the pit and the covering planks. Provision should be made for a

YELLOW POWER

The Asian-American Political Alliance, a newly-formed Bay Area group, will meet this weekend to discuss its role in the minority liberation movement and to plan the forms of its political action.

"We (Asian-Americans) have been, and still are, used politically to the detriment of oppressed minorities," Yuji Ichioka, a founding member of the AAPA pointed out. He indicated that the new organization intends to "break the silence" of the Asian-American community on the issues now confronting America.

Discussion at the Sunday planning session in Berkeley is expected to center on questions of the Asian-American relationship to a nation "which now shows every evidence of liquidating Black people" and is "waging the politically and morally insane war in Vietnam."

"We must redefine our relationship to the Black, Mexican-American, and Indian liberation movements," Ichioka said.

The AAPA was formed because of their belief that "all existing organizations in the Asian-American community are too committed to the status quo," Ichioka said.

The June 2 planning meeting of the AAPA will begin at 8pm at 2005 Hearst St. in Berkeley. They can be reached through their chairman, Yuji Ichioka, at 845-7156.

round or square hole in the boards covering the pit. A lid covering the hole in the planks should be provided, preferably tied to the planks.

Refinements are building up a seat for the structure and putting a building around it, i.e. a standard outhouse -- but these are unnecessary from a health standpoint. The important thing is to prevent flies from entering the pit.

An alternate method is to dig a long, fairly shallow, narrow "slit" trench. The excavated dirt is left by the side of the trench with a shovel. Each time the trench is used, dirt is shoveled into the trench.

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STUDENT MOBILIZATION PRE-CONVENTION CRISIS

The following statement by Pete Camejo, who is West Coast organizer for YSA, is his official position and not necessarily that of the BARB.

Less than two weeks after its astoundingly successful national student anti-war strike, the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) is in a state of crisis. The crisis was initiated at a meeting of the New York National Staff's Working Committee where Syd Stapleton and Kipp Dawson were voted off their staff positions. The Working Committee "majority" decided that no one could work in the SMC office who belongs to a political group like the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), Communist Party (CP), etc. Both Kipp Dawson and Syd Stapleton are members of the YSA. Another staff member representing the CP voted for the exclusion of herself along with the two YSA'ers.

Behind this organizational exclusionary move are political differences over the future course of the SMC. A debate on the issues is gradually developing and will hopefully be resolved at a future SMC convention. The majority in the New York staff are unfortunately anxious to win the debate without an open discussion and without a democratic convention. This was revealed when Linda Morse (leading pacifist on the SMC staff) refused to allow Stapleton to include his viewpoint in a mailing on the firings. And although the previous convention of the SMC voted to hold another convention after the April Strike, the N.Y. staff majority has so far refused to call for a convention.

What are the political differences? The main fight revolves around the present SMC "single-issue" orientation. The YSA is associated with the "single-issue" position while others want a "multi-issue" orientation. Those who want to change SMC from its present course argue that the "single-issue" period is over, that the movement has grown and must move into new areas. They argue that you can't change society or even understand the war in Vietnam with a "single-issue" approach.

The main problem with this argument is that it poses the wrong question. The real question before the movement is whether we want an anti-war coalition. Why is this the real question? Because the people involved in this discussion all have a multi-issue perspective of the world, the war, and every other political question, but they cannot agree on which perspective is best. Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), Peace and Freedom Party (PFP) members, YSA'ers, DuBois Club members, SNCC'ers, pacifists, and a host of other groups and individual views participate in the SMC. All of these people, in spite of their differing views, have been able to agree on specific actions against the war in Vietnam and have carried out mass actions together within the SMC.

The real question before the SMC is whether it should continue as such a COALITION or dissolve. If we had no differences we could dissolve SMC and form one happy, multi-issue organization. But, unfortunately, we don't agree. Take electoral activity, for instance. Some pacifists oppose participation in elections on principle (e.g., Dave Dellinger). The Communist Party supports McCarthy. Some people support PFP. The YSA supports Halstead, the Socialist Workers candidate some SDS'ers don't think that electoral politics are relevant. Could a single-issue coalition be formed around electoral activity? Obviously not. Should SMC "adopt" a position on the elections? Not if we want an organization that can unite this wide range of people to work jointly in anti-war actions. (This doesn't mean that those groups which have the same views on electoral activity can't get together. The SMC isn't the only coalition possible.)

Another pressing issue today is that of American racism. A few years ago, the Communist Party and most liberals considered Malcolm X a "racist". The CP, referring to the Muslims under Malcolm X, actually used the term "neo-fascist". The SWP at the same time considered Malcolm X the greatest living Afro-American revolutionist. Some groups can form a coalition on the question

of racial oppression; others will find it impossible. To suggest that the SMC be a coalition COORDINATING ANTI-WAR WORK is simply to be realistic if you really want to see MASS UNITED ACTIONS. Such a position does not mean rejection of importance of other issues such as racism or electoral activity. So the real question is: do we want future mass united anti-war actions? If we do, we need a single-issue coalition apparatus. That is the role the SMC has played and that is the role it can continue to play. If it tries to become "multi-issue" it will either result in an endless fratricidal war between the different factions or it will be "captured" by one viewpoint and thus become isolated.

A good example of the value of a single-issue, coalition organization is the recent April anti-war actions. SDS, which has been very reticent about participating at a national level in anti-war coalitions, called for "Ten Days To Shake the Empire". The SMC seeking to co-ordinate its activity with SDS called an international student strike during the "ten days". It is estimated that 1,000,000 students participated in the SMC Strike nationally. In New York City alone, the official Board of Education figures show that some 200,000 high school students participated. SMC worked with all groups, especially the National Black Anti-War Anti-Draft Union which made a joint call with the SMC. With a few sporadic exceptions, all student groups in the country coordinated their plans with the SMC and not with SDS or any other specific group. Why do some want to end the single-issue coalition orientation of SMC? Invariably, it stems from a desire not to have the kind of mass united actions which the SMC has built, such as the Student Strike and the April 27th marches. Some are openly opposed to such actions, such as Progressive Labor (which along with some SDS'ers at the last SMC convention introduced a motion to dissolve SMC). Others are only interested in their specific actions against the war. For instance, many pacifists prefer moral civil disobedience projects, oriented towards individual actions rather than mass demonstrations.

At present, however, the main opponents of the SMC orientation are those who feel that street actions should be de-emphasized or put aside in favor of involvement in the McCarthy or Kennedy campaigns. The SMC's existence -- with contact and support

throughout American campuses, independent of the power structure, the Democratic Party, or any of its candidates -- appears to them as a block to the re-orientation of the anti-war forces into these electoral campaigns.

Without exception, those who oppose the SMC approach reflect their own failure at building an organization around their "multi-issue" views. The DuBois Club, for instance, has declined steadily during the growing radicalization of the anti-war movement. The so-called pacifist "peace" organizations have been by-passed by the new young activist. The Jerry Rubin, Hippie-oriented types have failed to build anything comparing to the coalition actions. The same goes for SDS or really any other group.

As revolutionary socialists, the YSA'ers have their own views around which they are building the YSA. But the YSA does not try to impose its views on SMC. Instead it favors maintaining an SMC coalition in order to make united actions possible. The YSA believes such united actions are essential if we are to maintain and build a mass anti-war movement.

Mass anti-war actions help to involve new people, to get people started thinking about all kinds of questions related to the war. In other words, mass actions which are only possible through a coalition are helpful in creating an atmosphere where other radical issues can be discussed and where socialist views can grow. The YSA sees no conflict between its own orientation and coalition actions.

In fact, it would be a terrible blow to the anti-war forces and the left in general in this country if the SMC coalition were broken. It would weaken opposition to the war precisely at a time when it is of paramount importance to continue mass action in the streets against the war. The thousands of independents who have actively worked against the war in Vietnam would be deprived of an organization which can unite their efforts without imposing any specific ideological view. And last, but not least, we should remember the international impact of united mass actions. The Vietnamese themselves on more than one occasion have indicated the inspiration the achievements of the American anti-war movement and the SMC in particular have given them.

If some in the coalition are not satisfied with the SMC "limits", they are free to organize any activity they want. Why do they have to destroy the SMC in order to engage in their particular program of activity?

Unfortunately those who want to change the policies of the SMC are trying to do so through organizational manipulation rather than through open discussion and a democratic process.

We urge all those who have participated in SMC activities and are concerned with its future to demand three crucial steps from the national staff. 1. That a national convention be called. 2. That all viewpoints be included in mailings, or the SMC publication the Mobilizer, in the pre-convention discussion. 3. That the two YSA'ers Syd and Kipp be reinstated pending a decision at the convention regarding the composition of the staff and election of leadership. ORGANIZER BEATS BACK BULL AT DOOR

Dave Mikesell has been trying to get reinstated at Berkeley's Airco Temescal plant since last year when he was fired after putting up a poster.

Earlier this month Mikesell roused Airco management people from his home when they insulted his invited guests, and one Airco man threatened to punch him.

Now, instead of reinstatement, Mikesell finds that his wife Priscilla has been fired from Airco, and that the company sacked the cops on him.

The Mikesells say the real reason for the hassles is that they are union organizers.

Tuesday night at about 9:30 a knocking on the door turned out to be Berkeley Police Officer Peter T. Smoot. According to Mikesell's still-warm account, the conversation reconstructs like this: "What is it, officer?" Mikesell asked wearily, having been jolted out of a drift into sleep.

"Can I step inside?" the officer asked. "I'd rather you didn't," Mikesell said. He stepped into the hall, holding lightly onto the collar of his large, blonde German Shepherd.

"Temescal's received a bomb threat," the uniformed Smoot said. "I'm investigating it. And you look like a likely suspect," Smoot continued, smiling.

That remark started Mikesell's adrenalin. "Do you have a warrant?" "Why, are there warrants out for you?"

"Look, what time is it, officer?" Smoot said around 9:30, Mikesell asked whether that wasn't a bit late for such an investigation, Smoot said he didn't think 9:30 was very late, Mikesell said as far as he was concerned it damn well was late since he had to get up at 5:30 in the morning to go to work and if he wanted to investigate he could do it in the daytime.

Smoot said something else about threats and intimidation of Temescal.

"You talk to me about threats and intimidation?" Mikesell said hotly, "When those bastards (I'm Airco) were in my home making

threats against me? Why, I'm the one who should be calling you to investigate them."

He went on at volume explaining who was intimidating and harassing who when cops bent by Airco banged on his door at night. He demanded the officer's card, got it, bade him adieu, simmered, and called BARB.

Last week Airco-Temescal did its thing to Mikesell's wife Priscilla.

Thursday afternoon she left work suddenly as a result of an illness for which she had been receiving medical attention. Within an hour, Gary Burnett, an Airco Supervisor, sent her a telegram:

"DUE TO YOUR ABSENCE TODAY AT APPROXIMATELY 3:00 PM WITHOUT NOTICE OR APARENT JUSTIFICATION, WE THEREFORE, UNDERSTAND THIS TO BE YOUR RESIGNATION OF EMPLOYMENT FROM AIRCO TEMESCAL DIVISION EFFECTIVE THAT TIME. YOUR CHECK WILL BE MAILED TODAY."

The telegram capped a series of Personnel Department memoranda which include allegations which Priscilla denies. The latest, dated May 10, ends with the notation, "Priscilla has been given a copy, but she refused to sign it."

She told BARB that her next formal step will be to inform the National Labor Relations Board of the circumstances of her firing.

Meanwhile, due to the Mikesells' treatment, Area 3 of the Peace and Freedom Party is calling for an all-day picket of the Airco-Temescal facility at 2850 7th Street in Berkeley on Monday, June 3, beginning at 6am when workers report to the plant.

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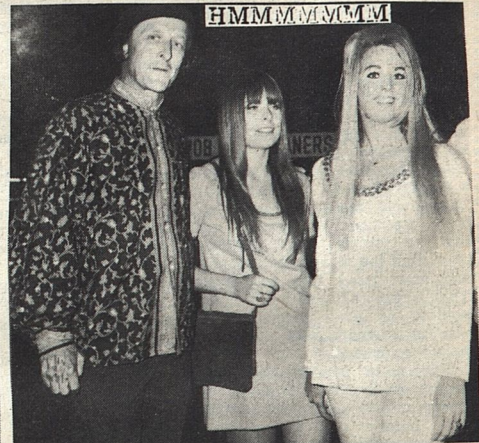

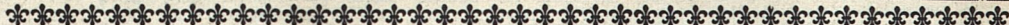

This is turning into a revolution. The revolution we've been working towards and pushing for, in desperation, for more than ten years. At last the spark has caught the wick. When I say "we all have been working" I mean ALL the non-stalinist nuances on the extreme-left.

Here is an attempt to define the forces behind the past week's revolutionary activity:

The U.E.C. (Communist Student Union) cut itself off from the revolutionary action because of its own stale dogmatism. The Communist paper, "l'Humanite" made things clear by insulting Cohn-Bendit and other "anarchist" student leaders since the first days of the insurrection.

At a sit down on Boulevard St. Michel, Aragon (the communist "poet" who was sent to try to infiltrate us) was shouted down, told to go to Budapest and that he and his party were counter-revolutionaries. They nevertheless are trying to channel the student revolutionary movement, and twist it into a power lever for their own parliamentary aims.

The C.L.E.R. and F.E.R. (Trotskyist students); their paper is REVOLTES. The slower and more dogmatic of the live forces involved less inclined to merge within the other groups but nevertheless actively present on the Street scene. They have a disciplined organization of about 2,000 militants.

The J.C.R. (also Trotskyist but of another faction) extremely active, their paper is AVANT-GARDE. They provoked the general merger by turning their last meeting at the Mutualite into a general discussion and coalition of all the revolutionary groups. Representatives from the German S.D.S. and the Dutch, Spanish and Italian youth movements were there. Strong and passionate avant-garde militants.

The Pro-Chinese; their paper SERVIR LE PEUPLE. Few militants, active mostly within the CGT (Communist Union) as a disruptive force.

U.N.E.F., Student Union, Bureaucratic and luke warm, trailing behind its most active militants, trying to slow things down, in the movement, but not as the avant-garde.

Le 22 Mars: (a coalition of Guevarists, Anarchists and Trotskyites from the Nanterre Faculty). The most active, determined and spontaneously revolutionary force in the movement. It has many leaders and dynamos. The bourgeois and stalinist press picked out one of them, Cohn-Bendit, and made him famous by insulting and slandering him.

A handful of them began to take over the Nanterre faculty by stopping lectures, interrupting the routine and propagandizing. When the police came to arrest them, 1,000 students came to their rescue and the movement was born. (They became the militants of the insurrection forces). Permanent and global denouncing of the power structure, of all bureaucratic authority, of every single alienating institution (from State to University) and permanent call to action. No bureaucratic organization, plurality of leaders, no "experience" but a tremendous dynamism and improvisatory genius. "Taking advantage" of the explosive situation its militants have created in Nanterre and at the Sorbonne to push for a creative insurrection.

Wednesday 8th. 35,000 students, workers and intellectuals marched from the Science Faculty to the Place du Luxembourg. Screaming "Liberez nos camarades". "A bas l'Etat Policier," "De Gaulle res-

ponsable," "Etudiants, Ouvriers, un seul combat" and upon passing the Theatre de France: "Pas dans la salle, dans la rue"—meaning get up off your ass, you "spectators" and participate, the only revolutionary theatre is in the streets.

But instead of fighting and re-occupying the Sorbonne, like at least 8 or 10,000 demonstrators wanted to, the U.N.E.F., stopped and shut the whole thing off.

At least 8,000 armed police occupying the Sorbonne area. From then on the revolutionary groups realize they must push beyond the student bureaucracy.

THURSDAY

Thursday 9th: J.C.R. meeting at Mutualite regrouping all the revolutionary forces. 4,000 present, mostly extremely aware and ready for action.

FRIDAY

Friday 10th: 10 A.M. Meeting at Nanterre of the 22 Mars militants. (The faculty closed by government was reopened that day). A class on NIETZSCHE is interrupted by militants who demand participation in General Strike. We take over the chair from the professor who is obliged to close his class. The S.N.E.S. sup. (Professor's union) decides upon general strike too and will refuse to participate in any exam or class until all jailed demonstrators are freed.

Boycott of exams and disruption of University. Occupation of all University property across France (in many cities: Stasbourg, Caen Lyon etc., it is happening) not ONLY to "reform" the structure of the class University but to destroy it and the State as well.

The teacher says "at least the insurrection has allowed prof and students to make contact and fight together in the streets against police" (he is cheered).

6:30 P.M.: At place Denfert-Rochereau demonstration called by U.N.E.F. 22 Mars collects 20,000 people, blocking traffic for 3 KMS. The mob is asked by Cohn-Bendit and other leaders where it wants to go. It decides upon the Prison de la Sante, the Ministry of Justice then the O.R.T.F. While marching at least 5 or 6,000 more join in. We circle around from the Sante prison defended by thousands of armed police to Maubert towards right bank or O.R.T.F. By very clever strategy and disposal of police, we are forced to turn up the Boul. St. Michel instead of down St. Germain. This was our big mistake, not to push through there. We realized later we were then falling into a trap. The enormous demonstration was halted at the place du Luxembourg and Boul. St. Michel by gigantic Police forces—we were to be encircled by police.

Midnight: 22 Mars militants begin to dig up cobblestones. Some UNEF people and bystanders try to stop us. Dean of University asks to see representatives, of profs and students. Cohn-Bendit and 4 others go to see him, come out an hour later saying "Nothing happened."

Decision is taken to occupy the Latin Quartier pacifically, not to provoke police but to defend ourselves if attacked. This was followed to the very end. Barricades were defenses and all participants merely defended themselves from police attacks. We just wanted to hold the Quartier Latin to show police who had been occupying the Sorbonne for 5 days that they had to leave.

It must be clear (regardless of Police and TV lies) that what happened on this historical night was totally improvised: no direction, no preparation, not even any coordination. It was a spontaneous explosion for which we supplied an outlet, that's all. (French television has been insulting and disgustingly untruthful in its reporting).

1 o'clock, literally thousands help build barricades (Europe's No. 1 Radio reported that "more than 60" barricades were built in different streets). Women, workers, bystanders, people in pyjamas, etc... human chains to carry rocks, wood, iron. A tre-

mendous movement is started.

Our group, most have never even seen the others before, is composed of 6 students, 10 workers, some Italians, bystanders and 4 artists who joined later. We never even knew each other's names but organized the barricade at angle of rue Gay Lussac and St. Jacques.

One hundred people help carry the stuff and pile it across the street. From then on I was so busy coordinating work at our barricade that I don't know what happened elsewhere down on place Luxembourg or down rue Gay-Lussac. But witnesses say it all happened at the same time and more or less in the same way all over the Quartier Latin.

Our barricade is double: one meter high row of cobblestones, an empty space, then a 3 meter high pile of wood, cars metal, etc... Armament: stones, metal, etc. found in street. Of course majority of people simply look on.

We organize a cordon to keep photographers and bystanders away from us (some writers and painters recognize me and offer to help and carry stones—can't name them without their consent)—mostly spontaneous help from inhabitants of nearby houses who offer water, sugar and cloth against gasses and warn us of police movements.

We continue building up barricades, organizing supply of rocks, medical centers every 100 meters. I try to coordinate run-

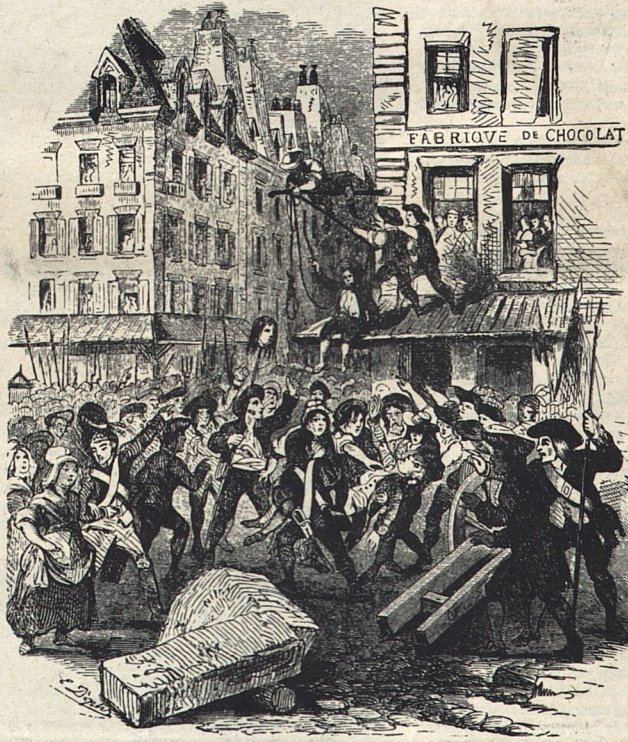
nerl gas grenades by rifle, which blind, suffocate and knock us out. This gas is supposed to be MACE (Vietnam and Detroit MACE). Also small explosive grenades (one student near us picked one up to throw it back, it tore his whole hand off) tear gas and phosphorus grenades.

From the start our defense is courageous. Later we find that practically every barricade without police at least an hour, sometimes 4 hours, regardless of blinding and suffocating gases.

At the end of resistance, if police grenades have not yet set fire to the barricade, we set it on fire ourselves to retard their advance. They are slowly advancing on Gay-Lussac. Crowds are running away. We have a hard time calming them down and channeling them towards exit down Gay-Lussac where police are fewer.

But then police attack at 3 points simultaneously: At 2 extremities of Gay-Lussac, at our barricade and at rue d'Ulm. Casualties are heavy on our side mostly of people knocked unconscious by gas, some blinded.

Thousands of voices scream together: "De Gaulle assassin," "liberez nos camarades," "Revolution," "A bas l'Universite bourgeoise," etc... Some make Molotov Cocktails. I try to dissuade them for fear of police massacre, not so much of us but of thousands of onlookers, just standing there, fascinated.



ners between different barricades near ours (rue d'Ulm, de l'Estrapade etc...) but we lack time and are caught by attacks before we can coordinate.

Practically no news from other points of our territory. Someone finds a French flag, we tear off blue and white part—red flag now floats over our barricade. I am told many red and black flags floated on other barricades.

In front of us we turn over cars to prevent police from charging with their buses and tanks (radio said tanks were coming but we never saw any) It also said 15 thousand workers were on the way to help us from St. Denis but were surrounded by army.

(They never materialized either although a great many workers were already helping us to construct barricades).

I must insist again that the general mood was defensive, not offensive: we just wanted to hold the place like an entrenched sit-down strike. If we had not been savagely attacked there would not have been violence at all.

After police riot last Monday (805 wounded) it was the least we could do to hold our ground: the Quartier Latin.

Police attack on place du Luxembourg. Their tactics are simple: at 100 meters distance they

me there.

I look outside. Police are everywhere. Our barricade across the street burning. Yellow gas fumes are so thick you can't see.

I try to run out, thinking to rejoin our forces further down but police are charging from both sides with grenades and sticks. We are cornered.

We organize inside building. At least 60 students, some wounded. Others faint. Try to barricade door. Some desperately ring door bells; nobody dares answer.

We crowd staircase. Police arrive, break down door. Grab a few and beat them to a pulp. Throw 3 gas grenades in staircase which are murder on our lungs and eyes. Police leave to come back later.

A girl on second floor tells us to come in. We crowd in like sardines in her apartment. She very nicely provides water. Outside: explosions, explosions, explosions.

6 o'clock: Still fighting outside. We all vote to call Red Cross because one of us is bleeding badly. We are scared of Red Cross because they sometimes turn us into the police. But other times they protect us; you never know.

It is a fact that many Red Cross workers who tried to help wounded or faint students were also beaten by police. (See LE Monde for details of this and of police armament, gas, etc...)

The police are searching house by house, room by room. Anybody with black hands, gas spots on clothes (gas attacks leather) or wounds is beaten and arrested. (More than 500 arrested in all).

We 60 decide to leave together in case we have to fight our way down the street. Helmets are given to girls. Sun is up. We run: what a sight!!! Smoking barricades everywhere, overturned cars, street unpared for half a kilometre. Painted words on walls: Vive la Commune du 8 Mai, A BAS L'ETAT POLICIER, etc...

I can't help it, I run over to see if our barricade still stands, deserted. Some onlookers, stunned, watch unbelievable sight of empty battlefield. This rue Gay Lussac was ours all night till about 4:30 or 5 A.M. OURS.

I ask a student for a piece of his dirty red shirt. We tie it to a stick, put it back on our barricade and run. Police are charging on other side of street. I can hardly walk from pain.

We circle around to rue d'Ulm. There the police are arresting everybody including those in medical center. Barricades and cars smoking on every street and every corner. Passerby worn us where police are; people in cars and taxis volunteer to take us out of police zone. We pass thru in front of enormous police buses full of our troops taken prisoner. It's all over, for today.

7 A.M. Saturday The radio announces Cohn-Bendit and 22 Mars calls all labor unions to our rescue. There is to be a General Strike on Monday. The only danger now is the Communist party; it can break our movement by outnumbering us and absorbing us. Radio also says many universities are with us.

Noon: I take train to Tours, for a meeting with local groups to coordinate action there on Monday. We publish leaflets for Monday. We must be ready for next big confrontation.

Combat headline: 45,000 Students held the Latin Quarter." That is exaggerated; we were 20,000.

Police are everywhere, hundreds still being arrested in streets. First word about police brutality: many students beaten to a pulp after being arrested. Approximately 400 students hospitalized and about 1,500 wounded outside hospitals.

At Police Commissariat of 5th arrondissement police break both arms of 3 students and torture other ones with nails and knives. Red Cross doctors told us many police were drunk, stinking of alcohol. (The letter ended here)

Of course, the general feeling is of trance. We are high, higher than on a psychovitamin trip, high of Great Marriage of our creative subconscious poetic energies and of the revolutionary collective consciousness, high like coming out of the long nothingness which was being caught in the fascist structure, high of having surpassed our egos at last and flowing into a vast electric current, high like zombies suddenly turned into human beings and saying "WE EXIST, WE ARE ALIVE"

A Vietnamese student is with us. We all scream "VENCEREMOS" as cops attack. The Vietnamese is incredibly heroic, unconscious trance, grabs red flag and leads us into cops thru gas and grenades.

To our utter surprise we outnumber cops and they retreat. Crowds behind us cheer wildly. We come back behind our barricade, only one slightly wounded. But gasses are our worst enemy. We can't breathe. We can't see. Finally we are forced back. Our barricade burns.

At this point all I can remember is that I fainted from lack of air. I come to in a corridor. Two girls slapping my face and putting wet cloth on my eyes. Water is only thing that helps. They tell me a student carried

Rosemary and I spent five days observing the planet from the space-ship cone of the tipi at Millbrook and then drove to New York for the meeting that Jerry Rubin and Abbie Hoffman had arranged with the Black militants. This was Mid-February 1968.

Paul Krassner was there and Bob Fass of station WBAI and Allen Katzman from EVO and some veterans of the New York draft demonstrations and the Pentagon. And the Black spokesman, cool, dignified, reserved, proud.

After a while I made a rap. The only political issue was generational. Youth versus the menopausal. The old power-holders were highly organized and completely in control of all the mechanical muscle. The young were numerically stronger but disorganized and scattered. A natural alliance forming among young blacks, young Latin Americans, young pacifists, the young hippie. But the strategy must be neurological-electronic not muscular-mechanical.

The tactics of dramatic confrontation. Bolshevik bomb throwing was out. The new bombs were neurological. You don't blow up the Czar's palace. You blow minds. Total revolution was the goal. The old system is finished. Our task is to bring it down on our terms. The laughing gentle, sensual drop out. Not on their terms, violence, blood, fire. LBJ's re-nomination in Chicago was the natural stage for a mutational ceremony. The plan was to build up a set of energies so mind-boggling that LBJ couldn't possibly come to Chicago.

I have spoken. The Black listened and then spoke. The Yippies could not join the Blacks. No white man could. They had their own plan for Chicago and every other American city. Whitey had dues to pay and couldn't join their club.

Less cool now. Leaning forward on the couch talking intensely. There would be civil war. A handful of V.C. guerillas held the city of Hue. A battalion of V. C. held off an American division. Ten snipers could tie up Harlem. They knew that they would die. But the symbolic gesture would live for millions of black kids who would see what they did and grow up proud and vengeful. Malcolm X and not Willy Mays would be the new model. Violence is the only language Whitey listens to. If you want to help, give us guns and stay out of the way.

It was the standard Black Power rap and it was valid and moving. A cold contemptuous rejection of the entire white system. A refusal to be tempted by any of the old scams. No compromise. No little steps and gradual change. No integration into the system. No phony civil rights come-on. No legal appeals to a system which was murderous, rapacious and completely illegal by any standard of human morality. No patient waiting for crumbs from white liberals. No desire to become educated in the white tradition. No ambition to struggle up to the white middle class. A healthy neurological rejection of the whole business.

The old conditioned reflexes no longer worked and the old punishments and rewards had no more meaning. Neurological Freedom. A clean drop out from the American dream.

He sat back. He had spoken. I paid by obeisance. You speak the truth. If I were black I'd be with you. Long live black power! Use the threat of guns and riot. But be realistic. There are two things to remember. The white machine is ruthless, murderous. There was once a country named America, conceived in slavery, bred in racism, and dead in 1968 of racism. The menopausal power-holders of this tormented land will stop at nothing to keep control. Look at the Sioux and the Apache and the Cheyenne.

And be clear on tactics. The enemy of life and freedom is the aging mind, racist, regardless of color. Old blacks are as neurologically crippled as old whites. The DNA code is color blind. Young whites are neurologically open. And the battle must be fought on our new terms not theirs. On our fast shifting electronic turf not on their heavy metal-concrete slabs.

Chicago in August. You do your thing. And we'll do our thing in our own style. We are not blacks and we can't be White Panthers. We are a various crew of musicians, poets, anarchists, alchemists. Can you imagine strapping Allen Ginsberg into cartridge belts? Or Joan Baez throwing molotov cocktails? We are all members of different tribes, of free men, allied in the common growth, each tribe has its natural, valid way of doing its thing.

The Black nodded. Whitey can't join us but he can help. The next few days there were planning meetings. It became clear that there were two points of view on Chicago. Muscular politics and neurological politics. One part of us was concerned with concrete details. The logistics of men and material. Which park in Chicago? Permits? Busses. Tents. Soup kitchens. Vegetarian or carnivore? P.A. systems. Speakers? Police brutality. Need for planning? Hurry. We have only five months to organize. Worry.

Another part of us was concerned with the logistics of consciousness. The war of nerves. Chicago in August is five light years away. We can only stop LBJ's nomination here and now in men's minds. If we are successful next month there'll be no confrontation in Chicago.

In the pre-historic age of mechanical-muscle you plotted a single, linear course. Stability over time. In the electronic age everything changes in one second. Multiphonic, multiphonic, infinity channels. If we goof tomorrow we'll all be in jail by June. Battles to control and manage space are archaic. Now we work to control consciousness. And you control by letting go. Keeping loose.

The aim of the game is to have no one go to Chicago in August. A deserted stage set. Anticlimax. The studio ghost town by the Lake. We'll make it inconceivable for LBJ to go to the convention.

Spell out the unthinkable possibility. A million kids on State St., that great street. A hundred rock bands. Divisions of troops needed to clear traffic. The American political system exposed on world-wide T.V. The purge of Dallas.

The power of the pure, centered consciousness. When Dick Gregory says "over my dead body", don't hear him typographical. It's a war of nerves. He doesn't mean blood flowing from the five wounds in his brown body mailed to a celluloid cross by crew-cut, sweating, beefy FBI agents in black suits with shoulder holsters. Dick means that his consciousness (and hopefully yours) could not conceive of LBJ's triumphant renomination.

If enough nervous systems could get this vision, be tuned in to the possibility, then Chicago would not happen and the war in Vietnam would end.

As the discussions continued the pre-historic mind in

each of us kept replaying the old tapes. The outworn neurological loops. What about our responsibility to the kids who are saving their money planning to come? And the rock bands whose business managers have to set up their schedules in advance. Business managers? Are you kidding?

We kept reminding ourselves--no old thought tapes. If we are right today there'll be massive celebrations in every city in the world by May.

And Merry Jerry Rubin kept issuing ecstatic manifestos. PIN THE TAIL ON THE DONKEY... PANHANDLERS... PLAN NOW... SMILE... HARE KRISHNA... LETS GROK... TAMBOURINES... PAUL WILLIAMS... NAKED... CARNIVAL... COLOR... BROTHERS... TOGETHER... STEVE MILLER'S BLUES BAND... VISIONS... NOW... FREE... EXPLOSION... JOHN WILCOCK... END WAR... SPIRIT... PLAY... COMMUNITY... JUDY COLLINS... FANTASY... REALITY... ALTERNATIVE... BREAD AND PUPPET THEATRE... SWIMMING... MASKS... HUZZA... DELIGHT... NORMAN MAILER... GEODESIC DOMES... MEDIA... WASHINGTON FREE THEATRE... GURUS... FLOWERS... That weekend Dick Gregory was playing the VILLAGE GATE. Rosemary and I met him at a friend's house for dinner. He had changed.

I hadn't seen him for 10 months. He had come to Millbrook the day of our spring festival. The marriage of Bob and Carol. He was a bit paunchy, then, wearing a black silk suit and a countess mara tie drinking a little and smoking filter cigarettes. He seemed nervous and out of place on the wide green lawns surrounded by a hundred gentle, robed deer people high on lycergic and the Indian temple dancing and the flower shrines of Millbrook. He was a night-club political comedian. But now he sat lean and bearded in blue work clothes eating a vegetarian dinner, serene, decisive, in poised control of some gigantic, internal spiritual energy. He had become a saint and he felt secure with it.

Backstage at the GATE his dressing room was jammed with satellites. He sat quietly on a couch looking over some notes for his gig and listening idly to the high-powered talk. An official from the Pennsylvania Peace and Freedom party discussed putting his name on the presidential ballot. An emissary from the New York PFP was asking about a vice-presidential running mate. Gregory and King? Gregory and Spock? I suggested he run with a holy woman. Like Joan Baez. Or Mrs. Gregory.

Dick said nothing. Just smiled and nodded. I felt I knew where he was at. He's running for president. Vote for me. Ron Thelin is right. Dick knows that he himself is the best of all candidates. Don't you? Yourself? Dick knows that what this country needs is a young, funny, turned-on, vegetarian pacifist, Black man. But he's not hung up on the old power-politics. He wheels no deals. Makes no promises. No ambition.

Does your group want to support Dick Gregory? Groovy! But no smoke-filled rooms. He doesn't expect to win and he won't complain when he loses. He'll be able to tell his grandchildren that he was the only presidential candidate in 68 who told it just the way it was.

And he won't accept defeat either. After November he'll form his own government in exile and everytime the old, grim, turned-off carnivore, commander-in-chief white president announces a program, why Dick Gregory, the People's choice, will counter with his program. And let history and world opinion decide who was crazy and who was holy in 1968.

The next day Rosemary and I flew to Chicago for lectures. We were met at the airport by a faculty chaperon and the student lecture chairman, portly, cigar-smoking young campus operator majoring in night-club administration and a local Yippie who had hitched a ride. He talked confidently about being able to arrange anything in Chicago so I asked him if he could rustle up a cow, a lantern and a televised press conference in 24 hours. He nodded O.K.

That night we met with the Chicago yippies. They were worried about muscular problems. Police violence and black violence. Bet your bottom dollar you'll get the blues in Chicago. It's a rough, tough, brawling town.

There was one young man named Ben Jenner who talked a lot, putting everyone down, especially Jerry Rubin. He owned a little shop that catered to kids, records and roach holders, and he was worried that his business would be hurt. "Rubin has invited a hell of a lot of people to serious injury and possible death. The ruthlessness and thorough lack of moral compunction of Rubin is bad for retail trade."

The next morning the bearded Yippie met us at the hotel and drove us to the cow-barn at Lincoln Park Zoo. There were several police cars and TV-radio trucks. Mrs. Leary and I posed with the lantern in front of a cow and said that this time we were going to "light-up" Chicago not burn it down. LBJ wouldn't be able to walk the streets in August unless he was barefoot with a flower in his hair. Rock dancing on the air strip at O'Hare. The reporters and cameramen were grinning. One cigar chewing cameraman asked Rosemary to kick the lantern over. She just grinned.

As we were leaving a friendly TV commentator pointed to a man carrying a tape recorder. He's from the mayor's

office. They'll be on the phone to the White House within an hour. Mayor Daley has promised LBJ that the town will be calm.

At Champaign-Urbana six thousand people in the huge mushroom auditorium. I didn't talk much about dope. Mainly the youth revolution. No one over the age of 40 should vote or hold power over seed-carriers. Control by the menopausal is genetically dangerous to the survival of the species. The ominous statistics. Fifty-two per cent of the population is under 25, but the largest voting bloc is people over the age of sixty. LBJ, please drop out! Forty years in office! Man you've done enough! Time to go back to Texas and take off your shoes and turn-on and love God and laugh. LBJ, please let go! Let the kids take over!

After the lecture an old friend on the Illinois faculty came up to our hotel room. He brought with him a visiting Polish scholar. A big man with broad hands and a far-away look. He seemed to assume that we belonged to some conspiracy. You are doing fine, Brother Tim. Chicago sounds right but it will all be settled by August. Chicago is not the time or place.

Oh, what is it? In the universities. And it will be decided by June. Warsaw and Prague and Berlin will be first. Spain, too, but we'll lose there. France will come next and it will be a big one. Canada and the Scandinavian countries will have young leadership within a year. England by the fall of 68. Russia in 69. Italy and Egypt? Touch and go. Forget about Greece. The rest will follow. He was talking precise Oxfordian English laid over a Slavic accent.

And America? Nothing can happen until you stop the war. But that's what you are doing. Right, Brother Tim? But you've got to hurry and mind you don't get in jail. You are being watched very carefully.

Far out. He was predicting with assurance a worldwide series of youth revolutions on a time-schedule. I pressed him for details on who and how and when. He shrugged and smiled. America is not unique. The same process is emerging all over the world. It's obvious to everyone what is happening. The old days are gone. Right, Brother Tim?

Back in New York. Allen Ginsberg had a funny report on his meeting with Bobbie Kennedy. There had been wire-service pictures on Mrs. O'Leary's cow. NEWSWEEK had run an alarmist piece forecasting chaos in Chicago. Synaptic skirmishes. Bobbie wanted to know if it were true that the hippies were lining up with the Black Power people. Allen asked him if he had ever smoked pot. Bobbie said no. Allen edged forward and smiled and said, "Aw, come on, I won't tell anyone." Bobbie said, "I know you wouldn't tell anyone but I really haven't." Allen edged forward some more. "Why haven't you?" Bobbie looked uncomfortable. "Well, all the medical evidence isn't in yet." Allen jumped in his chair and shouted, "Aw come on. That's a cop answer. And that's your problem. The fuzz image."

And then Allen lectured Bobbie on where it was at, repeal the drug laws. Rockefeller's financial interests in three of the top five military contractors. The problem of noise and air pollution and water pollution poisoning people and making them feel bad and mean and ruining their sex lives. And Bobbie listened hard and said that Allen talked like a poet.

And they ran a three-day YIP festival at the ELECTRIC CIRCUS which raised several thousand dollars and there were YIP-ins all over the city and continual press coverage of silly, mind-blowing events and then came the big bloody gathering in Grand Central Station. The Civil Liberties Union got involved in that one and Abbie brandished a thick manuscript and shouted, this is the best documented incident of police-brutality in history!

Towards the end of April I went to Atlanta Georgia. Gov. Mattox had personally banned me from the state college and lots of people warned against going. But at Georgia Tech the crowd was so large I had to give two lectures and in this deep-south-straight-square-engineering school they laughed at the same political jokes and cheered the way they did in Utah when I said the voting age should be the seed-carrying years---the franchise beginning at puberty and ending at menopause. The youth revolution cuts through all of the pre-historic divisions of race, nationality, region, class and caste. Its not a ideological head-trip. Its a DNA-sperm-ovum-psychedelic-you-feel-it-or-you-don't-biological upheaval, baby.

After the lecture I went with Jim McGraw, Dick Gregory's Boswell and a white SNCC worker to a party in the Black ghetto. The police car followed us as usual. It was a small apartment. Eight blacks were sitting in the kitchen drinking beer. They were a little shy. One girl asked me for my autograph. We sent out for some more beer and then, one by one, informally, goofing it, really, each made a speech. About dignity. That's all, baby. Do you get it? Dignity.

During the speeches couples kept drifting into the living room to dance. Then the white SNCC worker began to put me down. He couldn't see that I was saying anything sensible. In fact it sounded like a crock of shit to him. The last black couple quietly slipped out to the living room. I was picking up beer cans and cleaning the ash trays. The SNCC guy was saying that there was no time to joke around. Guns, man. Bullets in the head. Jim McGraw began to defend me. "He's blown more middle class minds than you can count. Encouraging mis-fits. Get it? Tim Leary is creating misfits.

Suddenly the SNCC worker banged the table. Lookit this. Who is left here? Just us three whites. The old racism still with us. I was bending over the garbage can emptying dishes and grinning. The living room reflected soft lights and soul music and couples were dancing. I sure wished I could have been in there with the black folks. But I knew my place and it was all right. We waved good night.

Black Father and Black Mother I know that this land won't get back its soul until we have black power and a black president, and black governors and black police chiefs and whites cheerfully being told what to do.

We drove to an all night restaurant. Police car followed. Half of the booths were filled with uniformed cops and the rest were crew-cut, husky men in plain clothes. The atmosphere was heavy. My two companions began to argue with the waitress. What's the matter?

Jim McGraw was trembling with indignation. She says she won't serve us. The waitress was fat, white hair and very determined. Hands on hips, I'll serve you two but I won't serve him. She was pointing to me. Why not? Because he's got long hair and he's dirty.

Four cops were standing behind us. If y'all make any noise we'll arrest you. Jim said. I'm talking very quietly but we insist on our rights. The cops smiled. We're just about ready to bust y'all for disturbing the peace.

Jim and SNCC were ready to get busted. Hell, man, I've been in jail six times to open up the restaurants of Mississippi and now they won't serve long hairs. It's ridiculous.

The police car followed us back to the hotel.

The next day the papers reported the Eartha Kitt episode. Making Lady Bird cry in the White House dining room. I wondered what Mrs. J said to Mr. J that night.

Rosemary and I returned to San Francisco. The general attitude there was negative towards Chicago. Dark predictions about violence. An eastern caper. On Haight Street, that great street, I just want to stay. Lots of Hegelian and Freudian attacks on Jerry Rubin in the underground press. Has Jerry copped out? Wiggled out? Deserted the Progressive cause? What does Jerry really want? Does he have an underlying wish for violence? Is the Bay area provincial?

McCarthy won in New Hampshire. The college kids did it.

Bobbie Kennedy becomes a candidate. He asks for the hand of the youth.

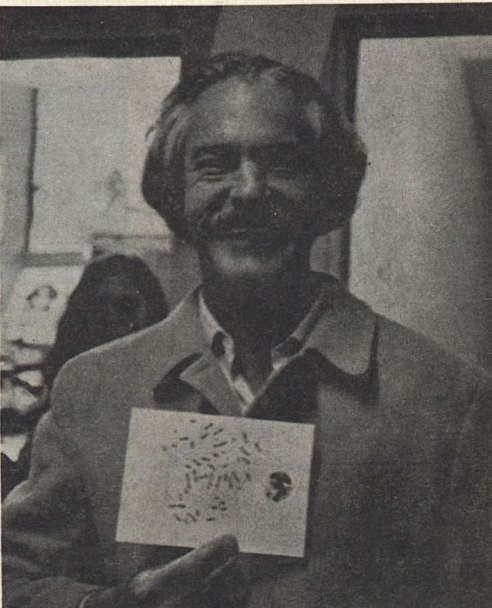

President Johnson's poll-rating slipped to a new low. McNamara and Westmoreland were replaced. It was an obvious fact that the president of the United States did not dare show his face in any American city---except unannounced at military bases and at labor union banquets.

Many experts, we are told, were amazed at Johnson's drop out. Many experts still believe it's a ploy to get LBJ drafted. They are wrong. LBJ is out and he won't be back. And the icecaps are melting. De-escalation has begun and it will continue.

LBJ was toppled from power by four events. The sober CIA reports on VietNam; the children's crusade in New Hampshire; the build-up of opposition in Chicago, and Eartha Kitt making Mrs. Johnson cry right in their own White House. Things had gone too far.

So there it was on world-wide TV. An era had ended. The hateful circle started at Dallas was closed. LBJ's drop-out was a mind-blowing as his tragic accession. Several hundred million people felt a simultaneous burst of pleasure and hope. Zap! He's quit. The bad thing is ending! Light at the end of the long tunnel!

Chicago was now irrelevant. McCarthy and Kennedy anti-climactic. The Peace and Freedom Party an old silver trophy cup on the mantel. Faded playing cards from a worn out game. The current was turned off the old circuits. A new historical cycle had begun.

The situation must be understood neurologically. The American mind was blown. We were at that stage in the trip when the old conditioned reflexes were suspended and a new paranoia was lurking in the wings.

Check the hallucinatory hit for the average American. The war is not a war. The Tet offensive was a victory for us. But Westmoreland needs 250,000 more troops. Westmoreland is a hero. Romney is the top candidate. Kennedy won't run. Rockefeller won't run. Johnson is a cinch. No, wait a minute. Romney is out. McCarthy is possible. Johnson is out. Wow! Kennedy will run. Nixon is a cinch. Wait a minute. Humphrey is in. Peace talks start. The bombing is halted. Air Force flies the highest number of missions! De-escalation. Highest casualty rates. Dr. King is killed. His assassin is a lone psychotic. The nation must make it up to the Negro. Rap Brown and Cleaver are jailed. The assassin is a clever, skillful paid agent. The New York Yankees are in last place.

Wow! Have you ever heard of an acid-trip crazier than that?

Anyone with first hand experience in neurological experimentation knows about the moment in the session when all the familiar categories start spinning and the old causal relationships loosen. It is exactly at that moment when the mind is completely vulnerable to a new imprint, a new vision, a new paranoia.

That scary instant of neurological freedom. The critical choice. Hang on. Or let go. Hang on in terror to the old, even though you know that the old pieces are dead, plastic, and cut off from the energy source. Or let go, move on to the next live sequence.

The name of the game is mutation, baby.

Having witnessed this process several thousand times in the recent past, I was most interested to see which Americans would be ready to move to the new reality. And which

would cling to the old postures.

For example, what would Jerry Rubin and Abbie Hoffman and the Yippies do about Chicago?

Beginning of April Rosemary and I flew to New York. I dropped by the EVO office. It's the pulse of the circulatory system of young Manhattan. Abbie phoned and said the Yippies were meeting just a block down Second Avenue.

I sat down on the couch and looked around at the smiling faces. Well, what do we do now? Jerry Rubin grinned. Damned if we know. What DO we do now?

Beautiful, The Yippies were loose.

I brought them a message from Allen Ginsberg. A new model is needed. Neither Kennedy nor McCarthy knows what to do. They are open to suggestions. But they still want to patch up the old machine. And it won't go no more. The youth of America and of the entire planet is just not going to lie down on a government hospital cot and let their veins be tapped and transfuse fresh blood into Governor-Senator Whats-his-name old wrinkled corpse.

The Yippies nodded agreement. So what next?

I just happened to have with me a new Declaration of Independence. WHEN IN THE COURSE OF ORGANIC EVOLUTION IT BECOMES NECESSARY FOR ONE SPECIES TO SEVER THE BONDS THAT CONNECT THEM TO THE PAST.... I'm going to start a new country, brothers. Everyone should help start their new nation. Write their own Declaration of Evolution. Thousands of new states. The United States of Mind. And recognize the sovereignty of the Black nation. Send ambassadors to the noble Indian tribes. Turn in our passports and issue new documents.

And what about Chicago?

Call off the million teeny-boppers. Call a constitutional convention. Invite every tribe in the country to send representatives. Start a new political game so that men and women can grow freely and in peace.

Everyone present yipped in pleasure. Then the meeting broke up quickly. Something was brewing at Columbia. Jerry and Abbie were needed there. Every one jumped into cabs and headed uptown.

Rosemary and I split New York and slipped through the armed blockade around Millbrook, up to the tips. The Hitchcocks hadn't de-escalated their war against the Buddha. Helicopters hovered over the Sacred Hill. Pittsburgh Mellon spies or the Sheriff's? We had a taste of what the Vietnamese peasants feel. Armed men, unfriendly, in machines overhead. Or what the Comanche felt. The white-money-metal monster relentlessly closing in on us.

We left after a few days to throw off the heat.

Back in New York Jerry and Abbie were in jail. Busted at Columbia. Chalk up another assist for Merry Jerry. He ambushed Custer. He fought gallantly at Morningside. He's loose. He keeps popping up where the mutations happen.

Great sense of triumph. The Columbia revolt was the the score board. The racist gym was dropped. The defense contract cancelled. Formal classes called off. Classes at the consent of students and teachers. No exams. No grades. No one knows whether the university is in session or not. Panic among the septagenarian multi-millionaire trustees. And still the students revolt. What do they want, anyway? They are completely unreasonable.

Right! The kids in the Dean's office were burning papers and smashing chairs. One amazed sophomore said, hey, what are we doing? We are destroying the university. Exactly. The university of marble buildings, and endowments, and foundation grants and faculty tenure and robot assembly lines is over. Get it?

The steel-grey-haired administrators in San Francisco and Paris and Prague and Tokyo are freaking out. These kids won't bargain fairly. Like any good executive we know when to compromise. Give 'em a little more money. Give 'em a little larger share of the system power. There's plenty of gravy here for everyone, boys. The military gets its share and labor leaders get their share and industry gets its share and the senior citizens get their pensions and cops and the professions get their cut and EBONY magazine and Jackie Robinson and Whitney Young get their share. But these kids won't play the game fairly. They don't make specific selfish demands. They don't want cheaper textbooks, or fatter fellowships or later hours for dating on weekends. They're insane. They want to take over the whole gold-plated, billion-dollar system that we worked so hard to set up.

Hubert Humphrey and Charles deGaulle and Andrei Kosygin and Ronald Reagan just don't understand. These kids don't want to grow up and be president or dean or chairman of the board. They want to start a whole new fresh thing. George the Third. Something about life, liberty and the pursuit of ecstasy. The old pay-off won't pay off. Spiritual inflation. The dollar don't buy what it used to in the way of human bodies and souls. Neither does the franc or the ruble.

A new myth was being born and it was fascinating to see who was home free and who was holding on compulsively, trying to replay the old routines.

Norman Mailer, do you still aspire to be the Jewish Ernest Hemingway? Or the George Plympton of Brooklyn?

Norman Podhoretz, do you still lust to make it as the Jewish Norman Mailer?

Gene McCarthy, do you still want to be the Catholic Adlai Stevenson? The darling of the intellectuals polishing lines for your gallant loser's speech? Old movies! Wow, isn't there an original script writer left?

If Gene were hip to the scene he would have gone on TV the night after the LBJ acid-flash and said something like, Well folks, I did my thing and it's over and now I'm going to return to Minnesota and get high with God and have fun and write poetry and if the nation gets in another jam and needs a free, happy, unambitious hand again, why give me a ring. Wouldn't that have created an eternal myth?

The technique of how and when to drop-out is the greatest lesson of God. She teaches us every autumn.

And does Bobbie Kennedy really want to replay 1960? Become the Italian Jack Kennedy? Or the Irish Elvis Presley?

If Bobby's what-does-youth-want espionage system had really worked, he would have gone on national TV and said, contratulations Eugene. Count on my help. And then he would have put the wind-up-dolls Pierre and Arthur and Larry-O back in the souvenir chest and he would have created a legend that would last forever.

If they'd only turn on and get the message that letting go produces the eternal come!!!

And then the Freace and Peedom Party, Party? What do they mean by that?

Beloved Peace and Freedom Brothers what a beautiful coup you pulled, way back, ages ago last winter! You got on the ballot. That was your thing and it worked. But then to keep it going? A funny mock convention in Richmond and organizing caucuses and fighting over candidates and nominating miniature dress-up make-believe senators and congressmen. Good grief, boys, it's getting comic book. Let go see page 17

CLEAN GENES

Supposed chromosome damage caused by LSD was splashed last year throughout the mass media, bringing on a scare as widespread as the well-founded thalidomide panic.

Tim Leary, the original acid oracle, recently had his chromosomes examined by a nationally-known, highly regarded institution engaged in cancer research. He received the 'spectacular' results in a letter two weeks ago.

"Tim Leary, much to our surprise, showed very little," says a letter written by a M.D. with the research center.

"In 200 cells there were only two with chromosome aberrations, one in each cell. This finding is as spectacular as must be the amount of LSD and other drugs that you have probably taken in the past 8 years."

The M.D. said he is "at a loss to understand or explain this negative finding."

"In our own work," he stated, "we have had positive and negative results, which makes for a nice balance."

A further comment by the M.D. suggests the possibility of an interesting way for good heads to guard against chromosome damage:


"Interestingly enough, there are a few more aberrations in Rosemary, but nothing to be concerned about. The Yuppies got the message.

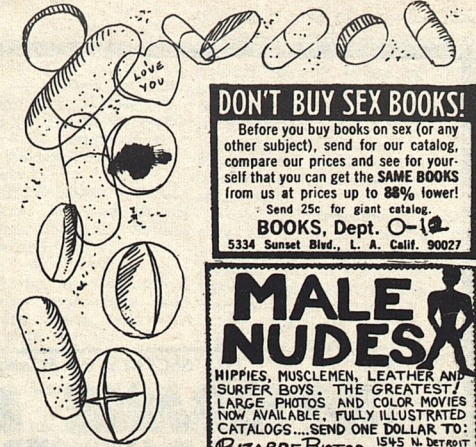

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This last Sunday in Provo Park Gil Patchett, 39, was sitting on the grass enjoying the music with a friend, Miriam Levitt who had just finished rolling a cigarette from a newly opened package of Bull Durham tobacco with Wheat Straw papers, when two uniformed B.P.D. members walked up. They claimed they had smelt something in the air and took the unlit cigarette from Miss Levitt. (note: rolling tobacco & cigarette papers are legally sold in California to any person over 18 years of age, Miss Levitt is over 18 years of age.)

Badge #15 asked if he could look inside the cigarette. "No, I'd like it back" said Mr. Patchett. He told me: "He disregarded what I said and tore it apart". Upon finding tobacco in the cigarette the cop handed it back and split without any apology.

Mr. Patchett would press charges he said except he fears police harassment if he did so, therefore he won't.

The Spontaneous Pig Control did take action however. They were walking near the concrete area when a cat who looked like he was smoking a huge bomb-walked past them. The other cop grabbed the wheat straw rolled cigarette and smelled it. Since it too was tobacco he got his share of applause from the spontaneous people who then escorted the two mistaken cops out of the park.

This unplanned spontaneous theatre takes place every Sunday. The Police Department supplies the props and you and I supply the action and the dialogue. The purpose is to stop the B.P.D. from harassing innocent people whose only crime is to enjoy free sunshine and free music while sitting on the grass and bothering no one.

Leave your fears at home, bring your wheat straws, your cameras, your people's mace and plan to have an exciting time smoking on the grass, listening to the music and marching in spontaneous parades.

Mr. Patchett wanted me to add that everyone should be aware of his right to refuse to submit to a search of himself or his property unless he has ALREADY been arrested. They can't search you without your permission in order to obtain evidence, and you don't have to say anymore than your name. (Resisting arrest is

France there IS a cause -- the cause of Workers Councils, or "Soviets." This is brought to light in Sunday's SF Chronicle "This World" Section (page 22) May 26, in a full page article by Neal Ascherson, of the London Observer, titled "Student Power" vs the Modern Society."

It is REQUIRED READING by all BARB readers. Its main thrust is that the trade unions and the CP of France are REJECTING "workers councils" or "soviets" because "a roaring mass of spontaneous student committees and assemblies are running their own revolution" in the Sorbonne.

"Already, the secondary network of workers councils is springing up across Paris. In Berlin, the Technical University, after Easter, housed the committee of workers, school children, and students, and here, too, the net of councils has spread across the city."

Ascherson asks the question, "How did it all get started?" He answers, correctly, "The great Berkeley upheaval in 1964 produced the phrase 'student power' and is now being paralleled at Columbia."

(This week, SF State - tomorrow, the World?)

The "Marcusian doctrines" mentioned in last week's column (student and worker alienation due to technology) "met with angry criticism this week" in Paris, says Ascherson. The students feel "they not only but perhaps can get through the factory door" to the workers.

This, then, is the revolution WITH a cause -- to reach the workers (once again) who are being established by the Communist Party of France.

"Red flags, with the fanatical

boys and girls of the Rue Gay-Lussac who fought all night against gas and police batons, with the French workers occupying their own factories without union orders (ho!), a new force has entered politics," states Ascherson.

It sure has. What this columnist wonders about, however, is: what is the slogan - the overthrow of the CP?

This just in from the NY Times, May 28, after this column was written: "The negative vote of the workers came as a surprise to the labor leaders and shook their control over the movement..."

"Georges Seguy, secretary general of the Communist-controlled GCT, Benoit Franchon, one of the best-known officers of the politburo of the French CP, and Andre Jeanson, a boss of the Catholic-oriented Christian Democratic Workers Federation, all went before the workers to 'explain' the draft agreement with the government."

They got dumped. Also, French police "have started massive arrests" (Chan 4, May 28) to break the strike and the student protests.

"The Communist Party is supporting the strikers" says Chan 4 They had better - and also, they had better support the students if they want to remain any sort of force in the history of France.

It was reported this week that the French government is meeting with the trade unions "for the first time in thirty-two years."

THIRTY-TWO YEARS! No wonder the young students and workers are pissed off at their "leaders" in the CP and elsewhere. Denial through channels for over thirty years creates its own revolution.



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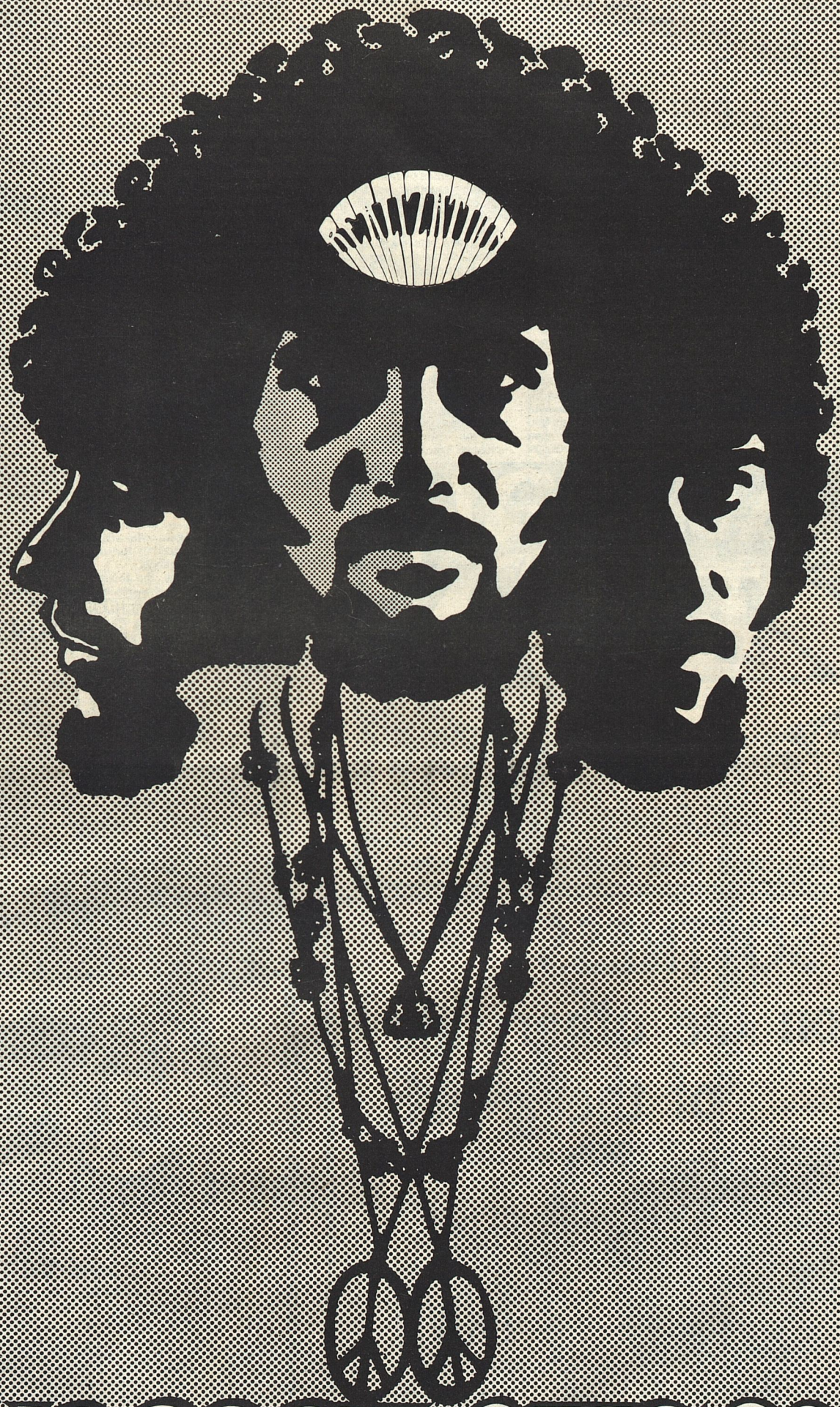

Beatles put it, "I am He as you are he as you are me as we are all together.")

For him, "To fail to stand up now is to fail to exist." Harris dropped out "to organize a political system built on the brotherhood of man." The decision made him feel "involved in a joyous kind of struggle."

But he emphasized that the act of refusing induction was "nothing special," no more "dramatic" than the way he has chosen to live day-by-day.

If found guilty, Harris expects the average sentence for his district, 18 months.

In the interest of existential-mystical-underground journalism he was pleading not guilty to the charge of refusing induction. Nothing special, anyone can do it. Paul Kleyman



A Parable for the Right Wing: In 1988, President Theobald Gooch appointed J. Herkimer Snoko to be U. S. Secretary of Defense. This despite the fact that Snoko had a long record of supporting Communist backed causes.

Revered dignitaries implored President Gooch to withdraw the appointment. His reply was quite simple: "I am the one who must make these decisions."

Influential groups in the Senate said that they would not ratify it. To them, President Gooch pointed out that, some years before in an emergency situation, the Senate had given the President carte blanche in making his appointments. The resolution involved no time limit, so was still in force, so the Senate had no say in the matter.

His response was quite affable, at first. These people, he said, had a right to disagree. Privately he added to himself, "Because they can't do anything about it."

But then some people started adopting tactics intended to do something effective about it, and

Church and State are not quite separate.

Ministers of more than 20 churches in the 7th Congressional District have agreed to devote their Sunday sermon to a plea for support to John George in the Democratic Primary for Congress.

then it was different. The President called these people fascist storm-troopers. Some even called them traitors. Certain Congressional factions suggested that the active dissenters might be considered technically at war with the United States, and hence eligible for concentration camps.

The Right Wing, understandably, was stricken with dismay. Doom seemed imminent, and it hardly seemed that they could still be living in the good old USA.

A respected political pundit of many years' experience pointed out that these high-handed Presidential tactics were precisely the ones that the Right had heatedly upheld, two decades earlier, when they were being used by a different President in the aid of a different cause.

Predictably, the Right couldn't see it that way. That was DIFFERENT! Then those methods were being used AGAINST the Commies. Not FOR them!

But it was too late. For everything the Gooch Administration chose to do, there was ample precedent. Plus precedent of wholehearted support of such action by the very people who now stood to lose the most by it.

Naturally, by 1990 the Communists took over the country, thereby fulfilling the predictions of the Right—as well as a prediction by a onetime Soviet head of state.

MORAL: It does matter what precedents are set by Presidents. And it does not matter much who is Right, but who is right. R. R.

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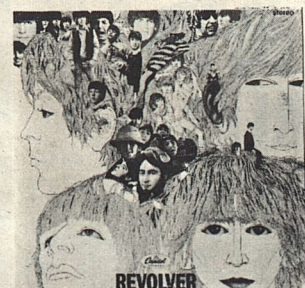
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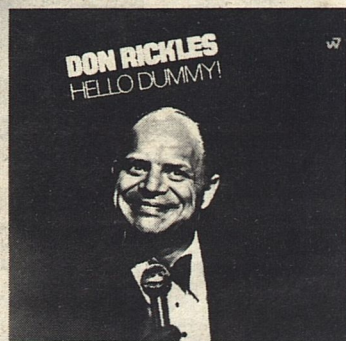


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HOPE FOR HERRICK

It looks as though Herrick Peace and Freedom Park may yet live on.

In spite of the bulldozers that ripped out the tiny green triangle last week, the friends of Chuck Herrick in Ecology Action may be successful in having their work restored -- even improved upon. Ecology Action members Charlie Devlin and Cliff Humphrey

told BARB this week the Berkeley Parks Commissioner, Mr. Mosher, and a number of landscape architects worked with them willingly to develop the best park use of the corner.

"It turns out," Devlin said, "that there is quite a bit of interest in the professional planning staff of the city in having things like this done. Normally officials

working on projects like this are working in a vacuum, without community help. They either have to work on their own or take the easy way out -- by not building a park."

The plan which the city had originated for the three-sided fragment left by the Dwight-Telegraph cutoff was a simple bricked-in area with three tree planters. As now envisioned, however, Herrick Park will be a small but very green little oasis with hedges and grass, and benches for the foot-sore.

Humphrey and Devlin have even constructed a tiny model of the proposed park which is now on

view in Shakespeare and Co., across the street from the site.

The plan developed by Commissioner Mosher and Ecology Action will be submitted to the design review committee of the Civic Arts Commission at 8 am this coming Monday, June 3, in the city council chambers. Even then, it will only have begun its long journey through the winding channels of City Hall before it arrives on the agenda of the city council.
