





PFM IN CAMPAIGN **FOR NATIONAL PARTY**

California's Peace and Freedom Movement is now launching a sum mer project to transform the PFM

into a national political party with candidates on many state ballots. The decision to go ahead with full-scale nationwide organizing springs from the results of sev eral months of field work by PFM organizers working outside this

Reports from the organizers i icate that it is definitely worthwhile to carry on the campaign to make Peace and Freedom a third nat-

ional party.

A series of June conferences will build the framework for the summertime drive.

summertime drive.

Political organizations with positions similar to the California PFM have been formed in Colorado, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, Newada, New Mexico, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Utah, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming, "We'ye already found enough

"We've already found enough groundswell to put a third party into the picture in 15 or 20 states," Rick Hyland told BARB this week. Hyland is administrator of the PFM National Organizing Commit-

He indicated that the immediate need is to locate people willing to work on national organizing teams during the summer, and to the volunteers during the train

train the volunteers during the June conferences.

Arrangements are being made to provide full-time volunteers with room, board, and \$5 per week, Hyland said. A smaller number of traveling organizers will receive subsistence salaries.

"One of our major hangups," Hyland said, "is convincing movement people of the necessity for the left to go into the national electoral bag. We have to convince them that electoral action is a valuable organizing tool."

Local recruitment conferences for potential organizers begin June

r potential organizers begin June with a session in Menlo Park, ear Stanford U, at the Free University bookstore.

The initial San Francisco orga-

nizers meeting will be held June 6 at the PFM office at 55 Colton. Similar meetings in Los Angeles and San Diego are scheduled for the same date.

The Berkeley organizers meet-g will be held Friday, June 7, a place not yet determinded. Committed PFM national organ-

izers will then gather in Berkeley for a three-day orientation confer-ence June 18-20 to detail the meth-ods, techniques, policies and prob-lems involved in the task, under the guidance of experienced polit-

the guidance of experienced political and community organizers.

The PFM summer action project will be coordinated through the state office in the East Bay.

A biweekly national Peace and Freedom newspaper is planned to serve as a communications link at least until the PFM national Presidential nominating convention, expected early in September.

The nominating convention will probably also be the founding convention of the national Peace and

vention of the national Peace and

Freedom Party, Hyland said.

"It's evident that the Left in America has no national voice, and as a consequence can pro-

ject no solution to nationwide prob-Ject no solution to nationwide prob-lems, such as the entire struggle for black liberation and the strug-gle to end American imperialism," Hyland said.
"It's also evident that the Demo-cratic Party offers no solutions on other than rhetorical levels, so we

other than rhetorical levels, so we are calling on people who are truly interested in resolving our serious national difficulties to organize, organize, organize."

He indicated that the PFM nat-

ional drive might be the last chance for white radicals and black militants to devise a means of co-operating, "by projecting our co-alition (with the Black Panthers) into the national community."

Like many Peace and Freedom eaders, Hyland anticipates that

answering Susskind's finits that since so many Black Panther leaders had been imprisoned they must be common criminals. Cleaver noted that in any colony the mother country's jails are full of freedom fighters.

Just before the sequence KQED, e educational station on which e program appeared Tuesday ght, warned the viewers that the night, cuts had been made by attorneys for Susskind and were not their

fault.

At the end of the interview, when Susskind called him "mad" for the last time, Cleaver re-plied: "Yes, I am mad. It's the time of a mad man."

EVERYBODY'S HACKLES L

The struggle at SF State College nded Tuesday just as it began, ended unresolved.

Who won is still a matter of dis-

or demands is considered by most participants to be a victory for the students, especilly the minorities.

But others wanted to push for the fourth demand, the limina-tion of the Air Force ROTC which was one of the original commit-

ments of the sit-in.
Students called off the sit-in after a two-hour meeting in front of the administration building during which they decided to postpone further action on the AFROTC

until the Fall semester.

When the sit-in had ended, the fuzz stationed across Holloway Ave. left goose-stepping, just as

they had come.

The students went home to study for final exams which were to be-

or man exams which were to begin Wednesday.

What HAD happened, as one demonstrator said, was "the elimination of apathy from the SF State campus."

Students who had never become politically involved before suddenly understood "the importance of the issues" members of Students for a Democratic Society (SOS) and the Third World Liberation and the Third World Liberation
Front (TWLF) were struggling for.
They began to pick up a microphone and talk, or write leaflets,
or just hand them out asking for
a little of you time to explain
the nature of the demands.

Other students who still found
themselves opposed to the demands
organized opinion poll: and jocks on

organized opinion poll; and jocks on

organized opinion por; and jocks on campus banded together to heckle the demonstrators.

Summerskill's departure from the college constituted a great change for the administration and demanded participation of most of the administrative officials to keep up with the students' demands and

tactics.
After Summerskill left, they suddenly were forced to view the suddenly were forced to view the issues directly and to take some kind of stand on the issues and the student actions.

But the greatest release from lethargy came from the faculty

members.

members.

Six members of the faculty were arrested with the 52 students and 30-40 more attended the "productive dialogue" sessions called "listen - in" while the school policy, suggested again by the faculty remained in effect.

Another group of professors formed in opposition to the demonstrators and their supporters.

onstrators and their supporters, terming two of the students de-mands hoaxes, and arguing that they had already been agreed to be-fore the sit-in.

Professor S.I. Hayakawa stated

at the beginning of the week that special admission of 400 minority students and inclusion on the faculty of nine minority professors had already been guaranteed by the administration.

Professor Juan Martinez de -nies this. He told BARB that be-fore Summerskill signed the state-ment, white students as well as minorities were allowed into State under the special admissions pro

gram.
When Donald Garrity closed the when Donald Garrity closed the campus at 10 p.m. Friday night, the ducation department offered students 24 hour use of their building to help gain a settlement in the standoff between the administration and the participants of the sit-in. of the sit-in.

The humanities department Monday, decided not to allow ROTC credits for majors in the humani-ties; they also issued a statement

ties; they also issued a statement condemning Garrity for suspending the "free campus" rule. However, AFROTC has a stay of life.

Opposition among members of the faculty grew intense and at one point a fist fight broke out between professor John Edwards and professor Richard Fitzgerald. After a short argument, some eyewitnesses claimed Edwards swung at Fitzgerald. If he did, he struck air. Fitzgerald's counterattack did not.

Fitzgerald is one of the professors who was not retained for next year. On the day that he sponsored a black history course,

at SF State, he received a letter of retention. The following day he received a letter of dismissal, and the third day he received a better stating that the first let-ter had been a "clerical error."

Professor Juan Martinez, like Fitzgerald was not rehired for the coming hear, but TWLF and SDS members were successful in keeping Martinez, the only Chicano professor at State on the faculty.

MACE THEY KNEW IT MEANT MAYHEM

A basic ingredient of MACE is A pasic ingredient of MACE is a nerve-poison. For twenty years, since 1948, this fact has been a matter of public record.

Scientific papers published in 1948 issues of the Biochemistry

Journal reported the neurotoxic properties of CN, chloroacetophenone, decades before the General

none, decades before the General Ordinance Equipment Corp. (GOEC) included the nerve-poison in its recipe for MACE spray. Newly-published reports show that CN has caused the removal of fourteen chemically-damaged eyes, and in one instance has killed bone tissue of the eye-socket and face.

In some cases CN has caused permanent anesthesia of parts of

permanent anesthesia of parts of the hands and fingers.

The bailiff puts out his cigarette, saunters up to his desk and
says in a bored monotone: "the
Municipal Court of the County of Alameda, honorable Judge Stafford says in a bored monotone: "the MunicipalCourtofthe CountyofAla-meda,honorableJudge Stafford P Buckleypresiding, isnow in session
--all rise."
So begins another day in the Oak-

land Municipal (Muni) Court, where judges will hear cases ranging from overdue traffic tickets to preliminary hearings for armed robbery.

The court docket is always crowded. During the morning when there are usually motions for bail reductions or continuance of a case, an efficient judge will hear 20 or more cases in a single hour. With the 11 judges in the Oakland Municipal Court that makes 550 cases in any one morning.

After the lunch break, the court proceeds at a more leisurely pace. The judge might have two totally complete trials, a couple of sen-The court docket is always crov

tencings of previously convicted prisoners, and a coffee break, In America justice proceeds with all the deliberate speed of a con-veyor belt.

veyor belt.

Let's run it down. You've been busted. Guards shuffle you from cell to cell; you're searched, fingerprinted, photographed, put into another cell, transferred to a sleeping cell, and finally to the holding tank directly behind the courtroom. All this time you wear the same clothes you wore when arrested.

rested.
You're in a "holding cell" that reminds you of a cross between a septic tank and one of Berkeley's a septic tank and one of Berkeley's new student apartment buildings. You look at the dull green concrete walls and breathe in the dull green smell of human excrement and disinfectant. A TV camera in the corner of the ceiling looks back at you and in your mind you picture the guards watching. As you sit on a concrete slab waiting, for the bailiff to stick his pot belly in the doorway and call your name, you begin talking with your

If you're cellmates. white and cellmates. If you're white and middle class, chances are you're alone. Most of your cellmates are black or Mexican-American. Most of them can't make bail, so they have spent several weeks in Santa Rita County Jail.

These men who are "presumed innocent until proven guilty" are held in maximum or medium security facilities while the vast bulk of convicted criminals stay in minimum security barracks. These

imum security barracks. These
Santa Ritans are rousted at 3:00
A.M. in preparation for their 30
minute drive for a 9:00 A.M. appointment at the Oakland court-

house.

The bailiff screams out your last name, first name, middle initial, and from your stark holding tank you suddenly emerge into a woodpaneled, nicely carpeted, air-conditioned courtroom. Your first reaction is total shock. While the bailiff hands you a copy of the charges and the mouth of the judge drones on about legal amenities drones on about legal amenities such as the right to counsel and

bail, you try to recover your senses. Your case is probably put over a week until you get a law-yer. Your first "day in court" has consisted of three minutes in front of a judge who has 19 other

has consisted of three minutes in front of a judge who has 19 other cases to hear that hour.

Five days a week, 52 weeks a year, the poor and especially the blacks and Mexican-Americans get screwed by your American judicial system. The usual notions of legal justice and procedural fairness simply don't apply to poor people caught on the judicial conveyor belt. The poor just don't have a "fair and speedy trial", "trial by jury", "right to counsel", "right to reasonable bail", and "full due process of law."

This situation is not the rare exception, the occasional slip-up of a basically humane system — it is a process accepted and practised every day by judges, district attorneys, and defense attorneys alike.

"Psst - want to join the move-

"Psst - want to join the movement?"

It may not be long before radicals here will begin to hear this whispered call to action.

The movement will change. It must change. The old come-one-come-all us-against-Johnson days are drawing to a close. A new force - less cumbersome, more effective -- is needed. And a group at Stanford University is showing how it may well be done.

During the recent Stanford stin I was struck by the quiet, orderly fashion in which the minor functionaries operated. I ascribed it to their supposed upper-middle-class gentility and anxiety for approval.

I was wrong. It was the result of good prior organization and genuine militancy.

Many of those "operatives" were members of the Peninsula Red Guard, study-action groups. They do not organize around specialities. During inactive periods they study the power structure and its vulnerabilities, They get to know each others' strengths and weaknesses.

get to know each others' strengths and weaknesses.

A spokesman describes their activity as "applying Marxist-Leninist theory as developed through Mao and attempting to

through Mao and attempting to relate the theory to practice and to build an American theory based on the practice."

The groups are totally separate and independent. Some of the leaders know each other, and a loose command structure is maintained. Each group has a sort of roving commission to attack the power structure at points of onepower structure at points of op-portunity and fade back into the power obscurity of the middle-class mil-

Members of the Red Guard have

Members of the Red Guard have organized these groups in addition to the other projects they undertake. To the Red Guard's delight there are apparently other action groups operating independently. Somehow the Stanford NROTC shack burned down on the first night of the sit-in there. No one in the Red Guard seems to know who the arsonists might be, nor are they interested in inquiring too diligently.

are they interested in inquiring too diligently.

During the sit-in, Red Guard units aided with the tasks of press relations, building security and tactical contingency planning. Their operation was smooth and efficient not because they had trained for the specific tasks but becuase they knew each other within the groups.

Although there was some confusion about whether Summerskill was canned or resigned, most observers believe that his term at State has ended.

Summerskill called the San Francisco police onto campus the first night of the demonstration, April 21, when students who were sitting-in refused to leave the building at closing time, 10 p.m. Police then arrested 26 students, lawyer for the Associated Students, lawyer for the Associated Students, Kayo Hallinan, and demonstrated the militancy of their Flailing clubs, they marched into the crowd of spectators, sending 11 to the hospital with busted heads, including Hallinan.

The following night, acting on a faculty recommendation, Summerskill declared an "open campus" to allow students and faculty members to "carry on a meaningful dialogue" in the buildings throughout the night.

On Thursday, Summerskill bowed to three of the students' demands and promised to hold a student-faculty referendum on the ROTC issue.

But when Summerskill left un-

But when Summerskill left un-But when Summerskil let un-announced Friday, the 'troika, headed by Donald Garrity, vice-president of academic affairs, and including Glenn Smith, vice presi-dent for administrative affairs, and Ferd Reddell, dean of stu-dents, immediately assumed pow-

er.
The new administration's first The new administration's first act was to renege on the ROTC referendum promised for the following Tuesday; its second was to cancel the "open campus" policy established by Summerskill.

At closing time Friday night, Garrity called police to haul off 27 students and 5 faculty who volunteered to remain in the administration building to get busted. The second wave of arrests brought added support to the demonstrators Monday when they escalated tactics by staging a millin.

in.

More than 600 students seized the Ad building again, taking over offices, jamming the phone lines, banging on walls and seeking members of the administration to con-

omices, jamming the phone lines, banging on walls and seeking members of the administration to confer with.

The troika was finally discovered to be locked in one of the Dean's offices, and after shouts of "Come out and face the people," Garrity agreed to meet with students and faculty members.

Garrity refused to grant the ROTC demand or even the new demand of amnesty, however, and students banged, bounded, and kicked the walls and doors until Garrity again called the police to clear the building.

In their appearances at the college, the fuzz made no arrests but were able to rescue the trapped administrators and escort them safely home.

They then seized the Ad building, locked it off, and stood guard until the spectators dispersed.

At a late meeting Monday night, the demonstrators agreed to try the same tactic themselves on Tuesday, barricading and sealing off the Ad Building. The emergency proclamation made them change their plans. They sat-in.

Mayor Alioto offered to mediate the settlement as an "impartial party." The steering committee members laughed, John Levin, a member said.

afternoon sit-in was called, followed by the vote to end the demonstration.

Although Garrity has promised to honor the three commitments already made by Summerskill, the board of trustees may act to cancel them.

The State Senate, according to Senator George Moscone's office passed a resolution Monday rec-ommending that the trustees re-scind Summerskill's promises.

BUST A BORDER FOR BUDDHA

We live in a global village,
says McLuhan -- our laws and
our awareness simply haven't kept our awareness simply haven't kept up with this reality. The world is already one, and it would only take a few quick shocks to prove how true this is. Administering these shocks to help our laws and awareness along is well within the range of existing provo techniques.

Take today's borders, for in-stance, those feeble, fading rem-nants of a Nineteenth Century sys-tem of nation-states. Most of them tem of nation-states, Most of them are lonely, under-manned places which have long since stopped really keeping people out except as the merest formality. Whether you cross by car or train, the rule of the border guards is usually to get people through as quickly as possible. Borders are little more than a symbol, a pretext—their only function today is to hold up the sadly drooping grandeur their only function today is to hold up the sadly drooping grandeur of most European states, A vin-dictive society still sees them as tools to pick up escaping criminals, but the real professionals among them have figured out their way through long ago, and the only ones who get sucked in today are terrified amateurs -- or solitary

ones who get sucked in today are terrified amateurs -- or solitary beatniks, if the guards are feeling bored or sadistic.

These borders can be busted, or at least held up to so much ridicule that the great majority of peoples everywhere will see that their day is done, that they are nothing but a farce. Consider the possibilities. What would happen if --

1 - One hundred patient people of varying nationalities went through by car or train from France to Belgium (or whereever) one day, carrying all necessary documents plus some protest signs. As soon as they reached the other side, they would drive or take the next train back. And then again. All day. With replacements, all week.
2 - An entire trainful of people

were to attempt to pass through a crosspoint, although not a single one of them were carrying passor other identifying docu-

ports or other identifying docu-ments.
3.- Several hundred cars full of passengers were to try the same thing, or a variation of plan 1, at a crowded crosspoint at the hour of maximum traffic.
4 - Bring in Public Hysteria Number One by spreading a rumor that not is being smuggled across-

that pot is being smuggled across -

then send a thousand young people

then send a thousand young people over, all clean but looking as suspicious as possible.

5 - The next step could be passportless march-throughs, singthroughs, and smoke-throughs. Care must be taken to be as kind to the border guards as possible.

6 - Purposely use other people's documents, passports belonging to the dead or to people of different nationalities than one's own, Most people's passport photos look nopeople's passport photos look no-thing like them -- once you had been waved across, you could com-plain to the passport control about

plain to the passport control about faulty inspection.

There will be certain dif-ficulties. America and England, being seabound, will be harder to crack (though the American-Canacrack (though the American-Canadian border is a natural), but a boatload of determined people can manage anything with a little thought and persistence. The Communist Countries take their borders more seriously, but things are very much in a state of flow there too, as recent events clearly demonstrate. The Austro-Czech and Austro-Hungarian crossing points onstrate. The Austro-Czech and Austro-Hungarian crossing points should be cased and considered --likewise Checkpoint Charlie in Berlin, Casing is essential in all

Berlin. Casing is essential in all operations everywhere.

The possibilities are endless, and the publicity could be enormous. The point is not to press for any immediate, precise legislation but merely to impress upon the public that our borders no longer serve a practical function. The money would be better spent in some other way. And all the energy we spend in building up our supposedly spontaneous national identities would be better spent exploring ourselves and each spent exploring ourselves and each

spent exploring ourselves and each other and finding out who we really are. The really big issues are ultra-national -- leisure, inner space, the conquest of violence, birth control, food distribution. One anticipates the objections. One's continental friends proudly proclaim they have already done away with passports between the Common Market countries -- all you need is an "ordinary" police identity card. But what the hell is ordinary about a police identity card? No one carries them in Engcard? No one carries them in Engcard? No one carries them in Eng-land or America, Why should Eu-ropeans need one? Why should a human being have to present any kind of documents to go anywhere? At the beginning of this century passports did not exist -- let us hope that the same is true when the end of the century has come,

SEALE BLASTS JUDGE

"He knew what he was doing would be an insult to the black community," Bobby Seale charged in discussing the extended sentence handed him a week ago by Judge Redmond C, Staats, Jr. "By virtue of his own statement," the Panther Chairman told BARB, "Mr. Staats knew this parole sentence would be an insult." Seale was placed on a strong three-year probation by Judge Staats on May 23 on a charge that he carried a loaded shotgun near the entrance to the Oakland Hall of Justice in May 1967.

Staats' sentence requires that the Panther leader must not own or carry dangerous weapons, must

or carry dangerous weapons, must not associate with known crimin-als, and must find regular em-

Seale and his attorney Charles R. Garry, announced immediately that they would appeal the de-

that they would appeal the de-cision.

"They railroaded me through the courts," Seale charged.

"They're using this parole to con-trol me, to take me from my work of helping free Huey, and this new situation of helping Eldridge."

"Theyhave falsely accused the Panthers as criminals. They are attempting to incriminate the Pan-thers."

"My mother is a Panther. She has no criminal record and no criminal tendencies," Seale said, "We refuse to accept the white

definitions of criminal. Mayor Reading, Police Chief Gain, the judges, (Seale named a host of others)—they're the criminals,"

Seale is seeking the Assembly seat in the 17th District. Although seat in the 1/th District, Although Judge Staats suggested that Seale "seek another type of office" for regular employment as stipulated by the sentence, Seale reports his campaign is moving along suc-

his campaign is moving along successfully.

"Well, we think we're doing pretty good," he told BARB. "We still need some help with it."

Two other Panthers seek political office. Minister of Defense Huey P. Newton is seeking the 7th Congressional District seat, and in San Francisco, Panther Communication Secretary Kathleen Cleaver seeks an assembly office.

Convicted of the Hall of Jus-tice weapons charge on April 11, Seale also faces charges of posseasing illegal weapons stemming from a police raid on his home last February. Seale and his wife, Artie, are scheduled to appear in Superior Court Judge Zook Sutcourt on June 7 to begin

The players, almost all of whom were wearing white grease paint to create the atmosphere of an Oakland courtroom, were inter-rupted when a black man took

the stage.

by Seale had his day in mock court, but Seale wasn't playing. Not with anybody.
"You think you can sit up here in the big walls of the University

in the big walls of the University of California, but there's black people in the black community who is dying," Seale told the players according to the Daily Cal. Seale claimed that Huey Newton's mother was opposed to the presentation of such a play. The leader said that Panthers who participated in it would be suspended.

Seale suggested political organizing instead of cultural and dra-matic programs.

No one is placing bets on the success of Peace and Freedom candidates in the Bay Area in the June 4 primary election, although most of the candidates are un-

opposed.

PFM organizers are pointing to the need for write-ins for most candidates as one of the chief handicaps added to the problem of moving bodies to the polls. This weekend PFM is calling for door -to-door precinct work throughout the area.

throughout the area.

Two arguments are most often repeated in urging PFM registrants to cast votes for their candidates: if Peace and Freedom fails to support the Black Panther candidates at the ballot box, the PFM/Panther coalition would probably collapse; and the failure to get PFM candidates on the official November ballot will mean the loss of a major organizing tool for the entire peace and minority liberation movement.

tool for the entire peace and minority liberation movement.
California laws new and old are creating obstacles to placing Peace and Freedom candidates on the printed November ballots. Most recently, Assembly Bill 69 required write-in candidates to pay filing fees, a new statute which Governor Ronald Reagan said is designed to keep "Mickey Mouse" off the ballot.
To appear on the printed Nov-

off the ballot.

To appear on the printed November ballot, each write-in candidate in the primary must receive at least one per cent of the number of votes cast for that office in the previous election.

The goal for Assembly candidates Bobby Seale and David Rynin, runnin g in the East Bay's 17th and 16th districts respectively, is 1,000 votes each, with a slim margin or invalid ballots.

is the youngest Jones Jones is the youngest of the four candidates for fourth district supervisor, but that doesn't make him any less serious. In fact, Mike Jones the Black man takes the all-white County Board of Sup-

ervisors very seriously,
"The Supervisors control all
the money that comes into Alameda County," Jones told BARB.
"They hire department heads, set

employment standards, make wel-fare easy or hard to get, run the jails and control medical centers."

This is the bureaucratic structure with which many poor, therefore many Black, people have to deal. Yet they are not rep-resented on the board that con-trols the structure. One reason for this lack of even

a single vote, Jones feels, is the way the supervisorial districts are gerrymandered.

He is currently suing to have the county redistricted to give the

Black community control over part

of the Board.
Only then, he believes, will the rich and white character of the board be changed. Last year this board appropriated \$5,400,000 to the county Sheriff's department to apprehend suspects - mostly poor men - and provided only \$300,000 to the public defender's office to defend suspects - mostly

poor men. Having worked as a neighbor-Having worked as a neighborhood organizer for the past five years in places as diverse as Louisiana and Oakland, Mike Jones feels he knows the problems of the poor people well, and could do something about them. He condemns the welfare program out of hand as "the worst in the state." "Right now a mother with one child is only allowed \$45 for rent. With rents the way they are in

child is only allowed \$45 for rent.
With rents the way they are in
this area, pretty soon she has to
dip into her food money to have
a roof. And then they go hungry."
These are the things Mike Jones
told his listeners. Their response
was as much as a candidate could
here for

was as much as a candidate could hope for.

"As we moved from one block into the next," he told BARB, "we saw people behind us putting up the signs we gave them in their windows."

"In fact," said Leo Bach, the organizer of the motorcade, "there wasn't one negative reaction in the whole drive. This was the most effective thing we've done in the whole campaign."

So effective that Jones is planning to carry his motorcade campaign to the campus area and to the hills this Thursday. Watch for him.

(1) Though we are anxious to run black candidates, we should remember that the Black Panther

Party does not quite have a monopoly on black radicals, While I support the Panther-PFP co-alition, I want other black radicals to feel welcome also, Nominating a non-Panther for President will tell them the door is still

(2) Just as in "real life", geo-graphic loyalties are important for organizing movements as well in California, but weak everywhere else. Our national campaign should build and strengthen parties in other areas, Which means we should NOT nominate Californians,

other areas, Which means we should NOT nominate Californians, but should choose movement leaders from elsewhere, such as Gregory of Illinois and Tijerina of New Mexico.

(3) While Cleaver may well catch up by '72, he is not yet nearly as well known as Gregory nor as widely supported.

(4) To me, and perhaps I'm too conservative, Gregory's pacifism is still more inspiring than Cleaver's pistol, Probably we will and must move toward violence in the coming four years (unless the Ruling Class buys off the blacks), but this trend will require slow and patient re-education of of many whites and blacks in the movement. If PFP prematurely imposes a pro-violance Presidential candidate on these advocates of non-violence, we may idential candidate on these advo-cates of non-violence, we may frighten and alienate them, and lose them into inactivity or even into the vile swamp of the Demo-cratic Party.

(5) For millions of simple-minded folk, Cleaver's ineligibility because of age will be a stumbling block for their faith. Why hang them un?

ic potential of CN," the Levine-Stahl article states.

"This report described three persons injured by accidental discharge of tear-gas pens into their hands. Following the injury there was prolonged and sometimes permanent anesthesia of portions of the hands and fingers. Microscopic examination revealed marked thickening of the epineurium and loss of axis cylinders."

The article cites biochemical studies in 1948 showing that CN "results particularly in denaturation of enzymes associated with sensory nerve activity." This indicates that MACE can cause permanent damage to nerve tissue on a chemical level, Its ingredient CN has already done so.

When expelled as a solid mass, the material acts as a low-velocity missile, and by this means physical and mechanical factors may augment the inherent destructive capacity of the chemical."

I went to Big Sur to check out reports that peaceful campers were being turned out of the forest by government officials because they were considered to be "hippies." Charges had also been made that health officials in Monterey County eagerly participated in the hippie-hassling. Not long ago, a Monterey County Health Department physician established a temporary VD clinic at Big Sur Hot Springs' Esalen Institute, He treated 25 - 50 cases a week of gonorrhea and reports later reaching the daily press told of strange new penicillin-resistant strains of gonorrhea, presumably grown in the

the daily press told of strange new penicillin-resistant strains of gonorrhea, presumably grown in the vile bodies of hippies.

It's true that gonorrhea is becoming more and more difficult to treat with penicillin alone, But the most likely source of new strains of gonorrhea is Asia, specifically VietNam. For the past several years, physicians in Saigon and on troop transport ships have reported a high percentage of gonorrhea cases resistant to the usual doses of penicillin. Often alternate antibiotics like tetracycline must be used. Now that most VietNam veterans return by plane rather than ship, symptoms of VD may appear only after sexual contact has occurred in the U.S.A.

Big Sur residents must travel 60 miles or more for health care, Several complained of brusque treatment at the general hospital in Monterey when they gave their address. They hope the Monterey County Health Department will set up a small clinic in Big Sur. But they fear the information gleaned from the temporary Esalen clinic will be used only for political purposes. Another excuse to

clinic will be used only for po-litical purposes. Another excuse to roust hippies out of the woods. Unfortunately, most public health officials are but cogs in a bureaucratic machine.

HEALTH IN THE WOODS Many of the complaints of un sanitary conditions amongst camsanitary conditions amongst cam-pers appear to have been justified. City-bred people seeking a more healthful life in the forest are often ill-prepared for life out-of-doors. Health department officials in ru-ral areas could help prevent dis-

Refinements are building up a seat for the structure and putting seat for the structure and putting a building around it, i.e. a standard outhouse -- but these are unnecessary from a health standpoint. The important thing is to prevent flies from entering the pit.

An alternate method is to dig a long, fairly shallow, narrow "slit" trench. The excavated dirt is left by the side of the trench with a shovel. Each time the trench is used, dirt is shoveled into the trench.

taminate your own water supply or that of others. Latrines should be 100 feet from streams, springs or wells deeper than 20 feet. They should be 200 feet from shallow wells. If the ground slopes, build the latrine on the downhill side of the stream or well (unless you are aware of underground waterflow moving against the slope of the land). A latrine should be at least 3 feet deep. Shallower holes will fill up faster, requiring more work in the long run. The edges should be raised slightly above the surrounding terrain and packed down. When possible, line the edges with tar or oil paper and tack the upper side of the paper to the wood planks which will be covering the hole in the ground. If no lining paper is available, make sure there is a tight seal between the elevated rim of the pit and the covering planks. Provision should be made for a complete contact lens service

STUDENT MOBILIZATION PRE-CONVENTION CRISIS

The following statement by Pete Camejo, who is West Coast organizer for YSA, is his official position and not necessarily that of the BARB.

Less than two weeks after its astoundingly successful national student anti-war strike, the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) is in a state of crisis. The crisis was initiated at a meeting of the New York National Staff's Working Committee where Syd Stapleton and Kipp Dawson were voted off their staff positions. The Working Committee "majority" decided that no one could work in the SMC office who belongs to a political group like the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), Communist Party (CP), etc. Both Kipp Dawson and Syd Stapleton are members of the YSA. Another staff member representing the CP voted for the exclusion of herself along with the two YSA'ers. Behind this organizational exclusionary move are political differences over the future course of the SMC. A debate on the issues is gradually developing and will hopefully be resolved at a future SMC convention. The majority in the New York staff are unfortunately anxious to win the debate without an open discussion and without a democratic convention. This was revealed when Linda Less than two weeks after its astoundingly successful national

tunately anxious to win the debate without an open discussion and without a democratic convention. This was revealed when Linda Morse (leading pacifist on the SMC staff) refused to allow Stapleton to include his viewpoint in a mailing on the firings. And although the previous convention of the SMC voted to hold another convention after the April Strike, the N.Y. staff majority has so far refused to call for a convention.

What are the political differences? The main fight revolves around the present SMC "single-issue" orientation. The YSA is associated with the "single-

is associated with the "single-issue" position while others want a "multi-issue" orientation. Those who want to change SMC from its present course argue that the "single-issue" period is

that the "single-issue" period is over, that the movement has grown and must move into new areas. They argue that you can't change society or even understand the war in Vietnam with a "single-issue" approach.

The main problem with this argument is that it poses the wrong question. The real question before the movement is whether we want an anti-war coalition. Why is this the real question? Because the people involved in this discussion all have a multissue perspective of the world, the in this discussion all have a multi-issue perspective of the world, the war, and every other political question, but they cannot agree on which perspective is best. Stu-dents for a Democratic Society (SDS), Peace and Freedom Party (PFP) members, YSA'ers, DuBois Club members, SNCC'ers, paci-fists, and a host of other groups and individual views participate in the SMC. All of these people, in spite of their differing views, have been able to agree on speci-fic actions against the war in fic actions against the war in Vietnam and have carried out mass actions together within the SMC. The real question before the SMC whether it should continue as

such a COALITION or dissolve.

If we had no differences we such a COALITION or dissolve.

If we had no differences we could dissolve SMC and form one happy, multi-issue organization. But, unfortunately, we don't agree. Take electoral activity, for instance. Some pacifists oppose participation in elections on principle (e.g., Dave Dellinger). The Communist Party supports McCarthy.

Some people support PFF. The
YSA supports Halstead, the Socialist Workers candidate some.

SDS'ers don't think that electoral politics are relevant. Could a single-issue coalition be formed around electoral activity? Obviously not. Should SMC "adopt" a position on the elections? Not if we want an organization that can unite this wide range of people to work jointly in anti-war actions. (This doesn't mean that those groups which have the same views on electoral activity can't get together. The SMC isn't the only coalition possible.)

coalition possible.)

Another pressing issue today is that of American racism. A few years ago, the Communist Party and most liberals considered Malcolm X a "racist". The CP, referring to the Muslims under Malcolm X, actually used the term "neo-fascist". The SWP at the same time considered Malcom X the greatest living Afro-American nist. Some groups can coalition on the question revolutionist.

throughout American campuses, throughout American campuses, independent of the power structure, the Democratic Party, or any of its candidates -- appears to them as a block to the re-orientation of the anti-war forces into these electoral campaigns.

Without exception, those who oppose the SMC approach reflect their own failure at building an organization around their "multi-jesue" yews. The DUBOIS Club.

organization around their "mutual issue" views. The DuBois Club, for instance, has declined steadily during the growing radicalization of the anti-war movement. The so-called pacifist "peace" organso-called pacifist "peace" organizations have been by-passed by the new young activist. The Jerry Rubin, Hippie-oriented types have failed to build anything comparing to the coalition actions. The same goes for SDS or really any other group.

goes for SDS or really any other group.

As revolutionary socialists, the YSA'ers have their own views around which they are building the YSA. But the YSA does not try to impose its views on SMC. Instead it favors maintaining an SMC coalition in order to make united actions possible. The YSA believes such united actions are essential if we are to maintain and build a mass anti-war movement. UNITED ACTIONS. Such a position does not mean rejection of importance of other issues such as racism or electoral activity.

So the real question is: do we want future mass united anti-war actions? If we do, we need a single-issue coalition apparatus. That is the role the SMC has played and that is the role it can continue to play. If it tries to become "multi-issue" it will either result in an endless fratricidal war between the different factions or it will be "captured" by one viewpoint and thus become isolated.

Mass anti-war actions help to Mass anti-war actions help to involve new people, to get people started thinking about all kinds of questions related to the war. In other words, mass actions which are only possible through a coalition are helpful in creating an atmosphere where other radical issues can be discussed and where socialist views can grow. The YSA sees no conflict between its own orientation and coalition

cidal war between the different factions or it will be "captured" by one viewpoint and thus become isolated.

A good example of the value of a single-issue, coalition organization is the recent April anti-war cations. SDS, which has been very reticent about participating at a national level in anti-war coalitions, called for "Ten Days To Shake the Empire?" The SMC seeking to co-ordinate its activity with SDS called an international student strike during the "ten days". It is estimated that 1,000,000 students participated in the SMC Stricke nationally. In New York City alone, the official Board of Education figures show that some 200,000 high school students participated, SMC worked with all groups, especially the National Black Anti-War Anti-Draft Union which made a joint call with the SMC. With a few sporadic exceptions, all student groups in the country coordinated their plans with the SMC and not with SDS or any other specific group.

Why do some want to end the single-issue coalition orientation of SMC? Invariably, it stems from a desire not to have the kind of mass united actions which the SMC has built, such as the Student Strike and the April 27th marches. Some are openly opposed to such actions, such as Progressive Labor (which along with some SDS'ers at the last SMC convention introduced a motion to dissolve SMC). Others are only interest of the second of the strend of the second of t actions.

In fact, it would be a terrible blow to the anti-war forces and the left in general in this country if the SMC coalition were broken. It would weaken opposition to the war precisely at a time when it is of paramount importance to continue mass action in the streets against the war. The thousands of independents who have actively worked against the the streets against the war-e thousands of independents who ve actively worked against the r in Vietnam would be deprived an organization which can unite eir efforts without imposing any ecific ideological view. And last, t not least we should remember have specific ideological view. And last, but not least, we should remember the international impact of united mass actions. The Vietnamese themselves on more then one occasion have indicated themselves.

themselves on more then one occasion have indicated the inspiration the achievements of the American anti-war movement and the SMC in particular have given them. If some in the coalition are not satisfied with the SMC "limits", they are free to organize any activity they want. Why do they have to destroy the SMC in order to engage in their particular program of activity?

Unfortunately those who want to change the policies of the SMC are trying to do so through organizational manipulation rather

change the policies of the SMC are trying to do so through organizational manipulation rather than through open discussion and a democratic process.

We urge all those who have participated in SMC activities and are concerned with its future to demand three crucial steps from the national staff, 1. That a national convention be called. 2. That all viewpoints be included in mailings, or the SMC publication the Mobilizer, in the pre-convention discussion. 3. That the two YSA'ers Syd and Kipp be reinstated pending a decision at the convention regarind the composition of the staff and election of leadership. Communications to the leadership. The Mikesells say the real reason for the hassles is that they are union organizers.

Tuesday night at about 9:30 a knocking on the door turned out to be Berkeley Police Officer Peter T. Smoot. According to Mikesell's still-warm account, the conversation reconstructs like this: "What is it, officer?" Mikesell asked wearily, having been jolted out of a drift into sleep.

"Can I step inside?" the officer asked.

"I'd rather you didn't," Mikesell said. He stepped into the hall, holding lightly onto the collar of his large, blonde German Shepherd.



MILLION WORKERS MARCH.

Here is an attempt to define the forces behind the past week's revolutionary activity:

The U. E. C. (Communist Student Union) cut itself off from the revolutionary action because of its own stale dogmatism. The Communist paper, "PHumanite" made things clear by insulting Cohn-Bendit and other "anarchist" student leaders since the first days of the insurrection.

first days of the insurrection.
At a sit down on Boulevard St.
Michel, Aragon (the communist
"poet" who was sent to try to
infiltrate us) was shouted down,
told to go to Budapest and that
he and his party were counterrevolutionaries. They nevertheless are trying to channel the
student revolutionary movement,
and twist it into a nower lever

and twist it into a power lever for their own parliamentary aims. The C.L.E.R. and F. E.R. (Trot-skyist students); their paper is REVOLTES. The slower and more dogmatic of the live forces involved less inclined to merge within the other groups but nevertheless actively present on the Street scene. They have a disciplined organization of about 2,000 mili-

tants.

The J.C.R. (also Trotskyist but of another faction) extremely active, their paper is AVANT-GARDE. They provoked the general merger by turning their last meeting at the Mutualite into a general discussion and coalition of all the revolutionary groups. Representatives from the German S.D.S. and the Dutch. Spanish and S.D.S. and the Dutch, Spanish and Italian youth movements were there. Strong and passionate avant-garde militants.

The Pro-Chinese; their paper SERVIR LE PEUPLE. Few mili-tants, active mostly within the CGT(Communist Union) as a disruptive force.

U.N.E.F., Student Union. Bu-reacratic and luke warm, trailing behind its most active militants, trying to slow things down, in the movement, but not as the avant-

garde.

Le 22 Mars: (a coalition of Guevarists, Anarchists and Trotskyites from the Nanterre Faculty). The most active, determined and spontaneously revolutionary force in the movement, It has many leaders and dynamos. The bourgeois and stalinist press picked out one of them, Cohn-Bendit, and made him famous by insulting and slandering him. A handful of them began to take over the Nanterre faculty by stop-

over the Namer Peacuty by stop-ping lectures, interrupting the routine and propagandizing. When the police came to arest them, 1,000 students came to their rescue and the movement was born, (They became the militants of the insurrection forces). Permanent and global denouncing of the power structure, of all bureaucratic authority, of every single alienating institution (from State to University) and perma-nent call to action. No bureaucraitic organization, plurality of lead-ers, no "experience" but a tre-mendous dynamism and impro-visatory genius. "Taking ad-vantage" of the explosive situation its militants have created in Nanterre and at the Sorbonne to push for a creative insurrection. Wednesday 8th. 35,000 students,

workers and intellectuals marched from the Science Faculty to the Place du Luxembourg, Screaming "Liberez nos comarades", "A bas l'Etat Policier," "De Gaulle responsable," "Etudiants, Ouvriers, un seul combat" and upon passing the Theatre de France: "Pas dans la salle, dans la rue"—meaning get up off your ass, you "spectators" and participate, the only revolutionary theatre is in the

But instead of fighting and reoccupying the Sorbonne, like at least 8 or 10,000 demonstrators

wanted to, the U.N.E.F., stopped and shut the whole thing off.
At least 8,000 armed police occupying the Sorbonne area. From then on the revolutionary groups realize they must push beyound the student bureaucracy.

provoke police but to defend ourselves if attacked. This was followed to the very end, Barricades were defenses and all participants merely defended themselves from police attacks, We just wanted to hold the Quartier Latin to show police who had been occupying the Sorbonne for 5 days that they had

It must be clear (regardless of Police and TV lies) that what happened on this historical night nappened on this historical night was totally improvised; no direc-tion, no preparation, not even any coordination, It was a spontaneous explosion for which we supplied an outlet, that's all. (French television has been insulting and dis-gustingly untruthful in its report-ing).

One hundred people help carry the stuff and pile it across the the stuff and pile it across the street. From then on I was so busy coordinating work at our barricade that I don't know what happened elsewhere down on place Luxembourg or down rue Gay-Lussac, But witnesses say it all happened at the same time and more or less in the same way all over the Quartier Latin. all over the Quartier Latin.

Our barricade is double: one meter high row of cobble-stones, an empty space, then a 3 meter high pile of wood, cars metal, ngn pile of wood, cars metal, etc... Armament; stones, metal, etc. found in street. Of course majority of people simply look on. We organize a cordon to keep photographers and bystanders a-

way from us (some writers and painters recognize me and offer to help and carry stones—can't name them without their consent) —mostly spontaneous help from inhabitants of nearby houses who offer water, sugar and cloth against gasses and warn us of police movements.

We continue building up barricades, organizing supply of rocks, medical centers every 100 meters. I try to coordinate run-

hurl gas grenades by rifle, which blind, suffocate and knock us out. blind, suffocate and knock us out. This gas is supposed to be MACE (Vietnam and Detroit MACE). Also small explosive grenades (one student near us picked one up to throw it back, it tore his whole hand off) tear gas and phosphorus grenades. phosphorus grenades.

fire to the barricade, we set it on fire ourselves to retard their advance. They are slowly advancing up Gay-Lussac, Crowds are running away, We have a hard time calming them down and channeling them towards exit down Gay-Lussac where police

But then police attack at 3 points simultaneously: At 2 extremities of Gay-Lussac, at our barricade and at rue d'Ulm. Casualties are heavy on our side mostly of people knocked uncon-scious by gas, some blinded. Thousands of voices scream

together: "De Gaulle assassin,"
"liberez nos camarades," "Revolution," "A bas l'Universite
bourgeoise," etc. Some make
Molotov Ocktails, I try to dissuade them for fear of police massacre, not so much of us but of thousands of onlookers, just standing there, fascinated.

see.
I try to run out, thinking to rejoin our forces further down but police are charging from both sides with grenades and sticks. We are cornered.
We organize inside building. At least 60 students, some wounded. Others faint, Try to barricade door. Some desperately ring door. From the start our defense is courageous, Later we find that pratically every barricade withstood police at least an hour, sometimes 4 hours, regardless of blinding and suffocating gases. At the end of resistance, if police grenades have not yet set fire to the barricade, we set it on fire ourselves to retard their

ed, Others faint, Try to barricade door. Some desperately ring door bells; nobody dares answer.

We crowd staircase. Police arrive, break down door. Grab a few and beat them to a pulp. Throw 3 gas grenades in staircase which are murder to our lungs and eyes. Police leave to come back later.

sardines in her apartment. She

6 o'clock: Still fighting outside, We all vote to call Red Cross because one of us is bleeding badly. We are scared of Red Cross because they sometimes turn us into the police. But other times they protect us; you never know. It is a fact that many Red

Cross workers who tried to help wounded or faint students were also beaten by police, (See LE Monde for details of this and of

Monde for details of this and of police armament, gas, etc...)

The police are searching house by house, room by room, Anybody with black hands, gas spets on clothes (gas attacks leather) or wounds is beaten and arrested. (More than 500 arrested in all). We 60 decide to leave together in case we have to fight our way down the street, Helmets are given to girls. Sun is up. We run-

given to girls, Sun is up, We'run; what a sight!!! Smoking barri-cades everywhere, overturned cars, street unpaved for half a kilometre, Painted wordsonwalls; Vive la Commune du 8 Mai, A BAS L'ETAT POLICIER, itx...

I can't help it, I run over to see if our barricade still stands, deserted. Some onlookers, stunn-

deserted. Some onlookers, stunned, watch unbelievable sight of empty battlefield. This rue Gay Lussac was ours all night till about 4:30 or 5 A.M. OURS. I ask a student for a piece of his dirty red shirt. We tie it to a stick, put it back on our barricade and run. Police are charging on other side of street. I can hardly walk from pain hardly walk from pain.

We circle around to rue d'Ulm. There the police are arresting everybody including those in medical center. Barricades and cars smoking on every street and every smoking on every street and every corner. Passerby worn us where police are; people in cars and taxis volunteer to take us out of police zone. We pass thus in front of enormous police buses full of our troops taken prisoner. It's all over, for today.

7 A.M. Saturday The radio announces Cohn-Bendit and 22 Mars calls all labor unions to our Mars calls all labor unions to our rescue. There is to be a General Strike on Monday. The only dan-ger now is the Communist party; it can break our movement by outnumbering us and absorbing us, Radio also says many univer-sities are with us. sities are with us.

Noon: I take train to Tours, for

a meeting with local groups to coordinate action there on Mon-day. We publish leaflets for Mon-day. We must be ready for next big confrontation.

ners between different barricades near ours (rue d'Ulm, de l'Estra-pade etc...) but we lack time and are caught by attacks before we can coordinate.

Practically no news from other points of our territory. Someone finds a French flag, we tear off blue and white part—red flagnow floats over our barricade. I am told many red and black flags floated on other barricades.

In front of us we turn over cars prevent police from charging with their buses and tanks (radio said tanks were coming but we never saw any) It also said 15 thousand workers were on the way to help us from St. Denis but were

Rosemary and I spent five days observing the planet from the space-ship cone of the tipi at Millbrook and then drove to New York for the meeting that Jerry Rubin and Abbie Hoffman had arranged with the Black militants. This was Mid-February 1968.

Paul Krassner was there and Bob Fass of station WBAI and Allen Katzman from EVO and some veterans of the New York draft demonstrations and the Pentagon.

- After a while I made a rap. The only political issue was generational. Youth versus the menopausal. The old power-holders were highly organized and completely in control of all the mechanical muscle. The young were numerically stronger but disorganized and scattered. A natural alliance forming among young blacks, young Latin Americans, young pacifists, the young hip. But the strategy must be neurological-electronic not muscular-mechanical. mechanical

The tactics of dramatic confrontation. Bolshevik bomb throwing was out. The new bombs were neurological. You don't blow up the Czar's palace. You blow minds. Total revolution was the goal. The old system is finished. Our task is to bring it down on our terms. The laughing gentle, sensual drop out. Not on their terms, violence, blood, fire. LBJ's re-nomination in Chicago was the natural stage for a mutational ceremony. The plan was to build up a set of energies so mind-boggling that LBJ couldn't possibly come to Chicago. The Black listened and then spoke.

It was the standard Black Power rap and it was valid and moving. A cold contemptuous rejection of the entire white system. A refusal to be tempted by any of the old scams. No compromise. No little steps and gradual

No legal appeals to a system which was murderous, rapacious and completely illegal by any standard of human morality. No patient waiting for crumbs from white liberals. No desire to become educated in the white tradition. No ambition to struggle up to the white middle class. A healthy neurological rejection of the whole business.

He sat back. He had spoken.
I paid by obeisance. You speak the truth. If I were black I'd be with you. Long live black power! Use the threat of guns and riot. But be realistic. There are two things to remember. The white machine is ruthless, murderous. There was once a country named America, conceived in slavery, bred in racism, and dead in 1968 of racism. The menopausal power-holders of this tormented land will stop at nothing to keep control. Look at the Sioux and

the Apache and the Cheyenne.

And be clear on tactics. The enemy of life and freedom is the aging mind, racist, regardless of color. Old blacks are as neurologically crippled as old whites. The DNA code is color blind. Young whites are neurologically open. And the battle must be fought on our new terms not theirs. On our fast shifting electronic turf not on

Chicago in August.
You do your thing. And we'll do our thing in our own style. We are not blacks and we can't be White Panthers.

Dallas.

The power of the pure, centered consciousness. When Dick Gregory says "over my dead body", don't hear him typographical. It's war of nerves. He doesn't mean blood flowing from the five wounds in his brown body mailed to a celluloid cross by crew-cut, sweating, beefy FBI agents in black suits with shoulder holsters. Dick means that his consciousness (and hopefully yours) could not conceive of LBJ's triumphant renomination.

If enough nervous systems could get this vision, be tuned in to the possibility, then Chicago would not happen and the war in Vietnam would end.

The youth revolution cuts through all of the pre-historic divisions of race, nationality, region, class and caste. Its not a ideological head-trip. Its a DNA-sperm-

its not a ideological head-trip. Its a DNA-spermovum-psychedelic-you-feel-it-or you-don't-biological up-heaval, baby.

After the lecture I went with Jim McGraw, Dick Gregory's Boswell and a white SNCC worker to a party in the Black ghetto. The police car followed us as usual. It was a small apartment, Eight blacks were sitting in the kitchen drinking beer. They were a little shy. One girl asked me for my autograph. We sent out for some more beer and then, one by one, informally, gooffing it, really, each made a speech. About dignity. That's all, baby. Do you get it? Dignity.

During the speeches couples kept drifting into the living room to dance. Then the white SNCC worker began to put me down. He couldn't see that I was saying anything sensible. In fact it sounded like a crock of shit to him. The last black couple quietly slipped out to the living

Supposed chromosome damage caused by LSD

Supposed chromosome damage caused by LSD was splashed last year throughout the mass media, bringing on a scare as widespread as the well-founded thalidomide panic.

Tim Leary, the original acid oracle, recently had his chromosomes examined by a nationally-known, highly regarded institution engaged in cancer research. He received the 'spectacular' results in a letter two weeks ago.
