ARE YIPPIES HIPPIES?

Early this year, when the proposed Yippie Convention in Chicago had the support of most of the leading musical groups, artists and other leaders of the current cultural renaissance and seemed

and other leaders of the current cultural renaissance and seemed to have a real potential for drawing hundreds of thousands of young hippies to Chicago, I wrote to Jerry Rubin in New York telling him my feelings that, with so many people involved, provision should be made for emergency services at Grant Park.

Jerry's reply to me was written the day that Martin Luther King was shot (in fact, he interrupted his letter to mention this news).

When Lyndon Johnson announced his decision not to run for another presidential term, I thought a major objective of the Yippies had been realized. The assassination of Martin Luther King and the wave of demonstrations and riots which followed made me further doubt the wisdom of a Yippie gathering in Chicago at the time of the Democratic National Convention. cratic National Convention.

My doubts continued to increase when Dick Gregory announced that he no longer supported a demon-stration at the Democratic Con-vention site, fearing for the safety of the black people in the neigh-

borhood.

"Yippie" stands for Youth International Party. To call it loosely organized would be an exaggeration—the FBI probably has the only membership list. A recent meeting had to be moved to Manhattan's Union Square because Jerry's firly friend had gone to Long Island for the weekend, taking the key to the hall where the meeting was scheduled.

Last April, in a Chinese restaurant on Second Avenue in the East Village, a neighborhood where I often visited my Tante Rose (past the Yiddish vaudeville theatres, one of which has become the Fillmore East), I met several of the Yippies, including Jerry Rubin, Paul Krassner, Abbie Hoffman and John Gerassi. I had associated

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with Hippies, so was startled to hear one of the group defend the physical attack on the editorial staff of the San Francisco State newspaper by some students at the

Later that evening, some of us went to Jerry's apartment. Istated my concern that serious physical harm was a possibility if any of the Yippies gathered in Grant Park were to go on to the Democratic Convention site (an entire regular Army division has been training for the past eight months specifically for disorders which might arise at the Democratic National Convention).

I told them my feeling that the best way to achieve lasting change was by example. I believe people more readily change their values and style of life when they feel they have something pleasurable to gain, rather than when force is applied and change occurs as the Unresult of fear.

Some Yippies would welcome a bloody confrontation in Chicago net his summer. They believe that, while a few people might be hurt I told them my feeling that the

this summer. They believe that, while a few people might be hurr or killed, in the long run it would do good for people in this country and over the world. Let me emphasize that most Yippies do not want violence. But those who expect and welcome violence may use their skills of oratory to urge crowds in Chicago to provoke the authorities. They can easily be provoked. All the latent and overt prejudices against minority groups provided. An the latent and overty prejudices against minority groups (including hippies) lay very close to the surface in that capital of America's torment. I had been intending to write to

Jerry shortly to tell him my feelings about the proposed Yip-in, but the recent killing of Robert Kennedy prompts me to do this publically. Whatever one may have thought of his political career, his murder was an outrage. And the "climate of violence" blamed by some for his death may be used as an excuse to further curtail civil liberties.

Last October, I participated in the Friday demonstration at the Oakland Induction Center. At the end of the day, when automobiles were being pushed into the middle of the streets and their tires deflated while streets. and flated while street benches trees were strewn about as addi-tional barricades, I felt a sense of excitement on being involved in the most direct protest of any that I had witnessed.

had witnessed.

At the same time I recognized that simply because this kind of protest was effective, it woule be followed by more violent protests and met with increasing violence by the opposition. These fears have been realized.

by the opposition. These fears have been realized.

There is no doubt that black people have suffered more persecution in this country than any other minority group. Claims have been made recently that there is a plot to exterminate the black man in the United States. I don't believe there is such a plot but I do feel there is a possibility of this occurring—a kind of self-fulfilling prophecy. The assassination of Martin Luther King has led to a vacuum in black leadership, rapidly being filled by black militants, some of whom espouse violence as a means to obtaining their ends.

The Yippies who planned the loot-in at Macy's in New York City on June 8th had no specific complaint about Macy's but chose the store because it is probably the best known department store in the

United States. The Yippie looters think this kind of chaotic action may lead to some changes. But we need only look at Nazi Germany to

need only look at Nazi Germany to notice many striking parallels. When Germany was affected by the world-wide depression, paper money there became virtually worthless. I recall seeing old mo-tion picture films of people carry-ing money in wheelbarrows to buy groceries. During the same years in the Linted States we had a proin the United States we had an op-posite problem—the scarcity of money. However, it was far worse for a money-oriented society like Germany to find its currency worth nothing than to have it worth a great deal and unavailable.

Our unions concern themselves not Our unions concern themselves not with political issues, but only with questions of increased pay and benefits for their members. Union members, for the most part, are among the most conservative groups in the United States and truly feel they have a stake in the status—quo.

truly feel they have a stake in the status-quo.

In a vacuum created by anarchy, violence and economic catastrophe, "status-quo" people look to a strong man or a leader to help them. German communists thought they could use Hitler and later take his power from him. They were among his first victims. Some of the Yippies feel that creating anarchy and chaos will indeed lead to a rightist reaction but then ing anarchy and chaos will indeed lead to a rightist reaction but then a turn to the left. German communists believed the same until they were eliminated,

Violence leads to more violence.

If the Chicago Yip-in ends in vio-lence it could do no more harm to the cause of peace and black pro-gress in this country than if it were directly supportive of the radical right.

radical right.

The Free University of Berkeley this summer is offering a course in the use of small arms. It is said that this will be a highly popular course, I see no difference between middle-aged housewives in Detroit training with guns or blacks training with guns or long haired so-called hippies training with guns at the Free University.

There are ways of achieving social change without destroying the entire society. Some members of the underground and overground press believe that the present evpress believe that the present evernts in history will occur whatever is said, that they move with inevitable force, But I cannot remain silent, I will not contribute to a situation which potentially could lead to another Nazi Germany, or a situation which might result in thousands or millions of deaths.

I think the Vinnies had an impact of the situation which might result in thousands or millions of deaths.

I think the Yippies had an important role in forcing President Johnson to decide to step down at the end of his current presidential

term. But all Yippies are not Hippies. One should distinguish the essentially non-violent and pacifistic hippie from militant New Left groupe.

groups.

I think it is time for everyone to seriously decide whether the situation in this country is so odious and so unamenable to change to warrant riots, rebellions, the possibility of thousands killed or imprisoned and the eventual take-over by the right.

We have only to look to the example of Russia to know that intellectual tryanny can continue 50 years after the end of a revolution. We must ask whether the economic and social inequities in the United States are so severe that they warrant the risk of a destruction of a society and a race

of people.


I say things are not yet that bad. I say the non-violent course fol-lowed by Gandhi and Martin Lu-ther King is an ideal toward which we must strive. The alternative may be an unprecedented period of barbarism.

English students and lecturers English students and lecturers began last week an all-Britain clash with education authorities by organizing the Revolutionary Socialist Students' Federation (RSSF), and the Higher Education Action Committee of Lecturers. This week, students at Bristol University were the first to seize a British university building. On Monday, more than 500 participated in the first demonstration here patterened after the Columbia

here patterened after the Columbia sti-in. Other sit-ins and student strikes are now in progress and more are expected. Meanwhile the Revolutionary Federation's found-ing/meeting continues. At sessions held in the London

At sessions neight in the London School of Economics (which is far more reactionary than the name suggests), RSSF delegates from Great Britain's universities emphatically denounced Cohn-Bendit for "personality-cult tactics."

Angered students here referred Angered students here referred to the French speaker as "a megaphone built up by the press," and "a leader invented by people who cannot conceive of a genuinely mass movement," Ironically Cohn-Bendit was blasted by the English press as well following an ill-fated BBC interview with "The Red" last week.

The inaugural meeting of the RSSF yielded an organization most similar to Students for A Demo-

similar to Students for A Demo-cratic Society. After rejecting Cohn-Bendit, the group called for a total rejection of personality relities.

"We intend to use union tactics our ends," the stuto achieve our ends," the student's union vice-president announced. As the conference continues, leaders hope they will be able to clarify their tactics and goals, Certainly the most accepted

goal thus far is the demand for "radical and total democratiza-tion of higher education."

PARTY **PLUGGERS PLUNGING ONWARDS**

The first wave of grass-r Peace and Freedom national Peace and Freedom national or-ganizing is spreading across the United States this weekend from a coordination center in San Francisco.

About two dozen organizers who

About two dozen organizers who were oriented during three days of workshops this week are on their way to build new P&F groups in communities from Massachusetts to Arizona.

A recent anonymous donation of \$20,000 for a national Peace and Freedom newspaper is expected

of \$20,000 for a national react and Freedom newspaper is expected to help them promote the P&F cause from coast to coast, "We want to create a national voice for the left," head national organizer Rich Hyland told BARB.

We want Peace and Freedom to "We want Peace and Freedom to become the political umbrella for all active movement organizations, "There's no reason Peace and Freedom shouldn't be the elec-toral arm of the whole movement." He said the target states were

selected on the basis of move-ment activity already present, and the likelihood of getting on the

the likelihood of getting on the ballot.

Training workshops for the first contingent of organizers ranged from instruction in running a duplicating machine to discussion of strategies against the Democratic Party. A trainee might be a veteran SDS community organizer or a novice in movement politics.

Initial target areas for the nationwide drive are upstate New York, Massachusetts, Maryland-Delaware-New Jersey-Eastern Pennsylvania, Virginia, Kentucky-Ohio-West Virginia, Colorado-Utah-Wyoming, Texas-New Mexico-Arizona, and Washington-Oregon-Idaho.

Hyland said the flow of national organizers from the San Francisco training center is expected to continue all summer, with orientation sessions for two or three trainees at a time.

VHAT THE REAPER SOWED

"Judge Porter is the kind of man who'll make a speech about how it hurts him to sentence a young man for an act of conscience.' Wessner told me. "But then hands down three year sen-Jim

Jim is a realist who seldom errs on the side of optimism. He did this time. Judge David Porter sentenced him to serve four years in Ohio Federal Prison. I visited Jim and his wife, Hester Butterfield, in Cincinnati a few weeks ago. The court had found Wessner guilty of refusing his deferment as a Berkeley graduate student, or burning his draft card, of refusing induction and burning his induction papers.

In short, Wessner was found guilty of being a member of the Resistance.

Resistance.

Jim's sentence could have been as brief as six months but he made the hard choice between convenience and conviction and chose to have his case tried back in Ohio rather than California.

share, had come to understand and sympathize with young men who resist the draft.

Stanley Kubrick's 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY is a masterpiece. I don't know how I found my way back across the bridge after looking at the thing, last night. Special effects very nearly al-ways look like special effects, be ways look like special effects, be they travelling matte, rear screen or whatever. You can always see that "second-generation look," that build up of grain, or matte fringes, or some such shit, like weird jiggle between foreground and background

well light between toreground and background.

Well, when a rocket skims across the earth-light surface of the moon, in SPACE ODYSSEY, and you glimpse through the observation windows at the crew doing their thing, and you see the earth hanging up there in the sky, and the moon glides by, man, it doesn't look like a trick. It looks like it

And dig this: Almost every foot,

And dig this: Almost every foot, every frame in this film is that way. I hate to say it, but it blew my mind. I lost my mind engulfed in my childhood fantasies. Let rockets fly upfrom the earth to the orbiting space station, let the space suited men make deep space repairs floating down the hull of their giant ship, let the moons of Jupiter rise and fall across its pearly blue streaked hide, and I ask you Stanley, how does it feel to be god, even with a small "g"? The fantastic beauty of this film!

The fantastic beauty of this film! It is graceful. It accomplishes what Emshwiller tried to do in RELATIVITY. There is a scale against which to measure human action, feeling and drama, and that

scale is the night sky. It is the impulse of the sophomore and the philosopher to feel dwarfed and insignificant by the titantic creation that surrounds us.

Each frame of SPACE OPYSEY seems to make this point and

seems to make this point, and through this reiteration, the power of wonder accumulates; and like sex, it must be discharged in what I will describe as a reel of "coming. Because that's what the last reel is.

So this sounds like crazed praises, and it is. We can claim SPACE ODYSSEY for our own, it is an experimental film. If your head is over thirty, you won't dig it. The film might possibly play

head is over thirty, you won't dig it. The film might possibly play until 2001 to an audience of younger heads. I don't think mom and dad are going to dig this flick.

This film uses the full potential of motion picture high fidelity—Cinerama. I may be straining here, but the 78 rpm phonograph record, is to the hi-fi stereo record (played over the grooviest system), as the normal window-framed boxed-in film, is to Cinerama. You get lost in that screen. It's life, it's bigger than life, like Mr. Barnum said.

Nobody has used that curved screen, those six sound tracks, that color the way Kubrick has. Nobody. In the lobby I overheard stuff during intermission and I realized that a mind bred on the printed word is so hung on symbols, it cannot experience experience as just that—experience, without looking for the metaphon What a ghastly audience at the press preview! tinis, you jerks, you blabbering morons. These symbol freaks, so tripped out on second and third level meaning that essence es-capes them. They're half-dead

But like any rich experience, A SPACE ODYSSEY can be, must be, and calls for interpretation, but there is a time and a place. Analysis at the time of experience is fear of and a retreat from that fear of and a retreat from that experience, but after the fact, why baby, I'd be the last person in the world to tell you to turn your head off

world to tell you to turn your head off.

I hate to rap too hard at you about the film, hoping not to impose my own concepts, but I know that won't happen, because in the last month or so I've read half-adozen reviews, a dozen magazine articles, and the promo put out by MGM, If that didn't turn my brain occream cheese nothing will so I MGM. It that didn't turn my brain to cream cheese, nothing will, so I figure my humble little, but let's be fair, brilliant, review will not spoil the film for you. If those millions of words of garbage I've digested have left me with the ability to relish this film, it must be improvious to such workel abuse.

armed, and that they never hesitate to shoot fleeing suspects in the back, as they feel that property is more valuable than life.

Rudimentary logic clearly indicates this was a case of die running with a slug in the back or taking a chance in a face to face gun fight. We all know the choice that was taken and now those who loved this man must mourn.

Now let us suppose that Pete and his partner had some distinguishing feature on their uniform such as a red ribbon on their hats indicating that they were unarmed. What would be likely to flash through the minds of the fugitives upon making this perception? Would it make sense to gun these men down and risk a murder rap or upon making this perception? Would it make sense to gun these men down and risk a murder rap or would it seem a wiser course to try to out run the law and flee into the dark security of the park?

The lesson seems clear. Peter McElligott died BECAUSE he carmidd early serviced early would be the sense of the sense of

ried a gun.

The real tragedy is that unless policemen soon realize that a sidearm is more of a liability than an asset. Peter McElligott's name will soon be joined by the names of other and better men on the memorial wall of the Hall of Jus-

The idea of police disarmament is not new. The SFPD has already disarmed a segment of its forces. The parking meters were policed by armed personnel for years, Now we have "meter maids" doing the we have "meet hands doing the same job without guns. In four years without weapons none of these people have been shot "in the line of duty." Since this proves that this area of enforcement can be effectively performed by un-armed personnel, wouldn't it follow that other areas of police work can be similarly accomplished by without weapons? Something like 85% of police man

Something like 85% of police man hours are expended in gathering reports of crimes and other routine information. I contend that in the bulk of police activities a tape recorder would be of far greater value than a gun.

The ideal device would be a tiny radio transmitter on a policeman's belt which would broadcast everything said in the course of a police investigation to a receiver and tape

thing said in the course of a police investigation to a receiver and tape recorder located in the trunk of the radio car. At the end of the shift the tape would be removed in a sealed cartridge by a supervisory officer and forwarded to the court as evidence, if necessary.

The investigating officer would be protected by the presence of an armed officer who hears everything said in the house from the radio car, and would be in a safe

thing said in the house from the radio car, and would be in a safe position to intervene if weapons were necessary and to summon help by radio if the incident was of an emergency nature, Such electronic equipment is already in existence and could be readily adapted to police needs.

Many officers have a reputation of lying on the stand to get a conviction. A tape would stop this abuse of police authority and forethe cop to observe the citizen's constitutional rights. The court would know what really took place at the incident because everything said would be repeated by the tape in open court.

No longer would the court have to rely on the officers' veracity. Even the police officer would bene fit. He would be protected by the tape from false charges of mis-conduct levied by a vengeful defen-

SF IRANIAN ARRESTED FOR BUGGING SHIFTY SHAH

Khosoro Kalantari, the Iranian activist from SF State, is in hot water with the government againthis time in Washington, D.C.
Kalantari was arrested there on June 13 for distrubing the peace and speaking in front of the White House. He was protesting the visit of the Shah of Iran, who was in the White House at the time seeking 600 million dollars worth of war armaments from

time seeking 600 million dollars worth of war armaments from President Johnson.

Kalantari had just unfurled a banner which read THE SHAH IS A MURDERER when he was approached by FBI agents, Haj Razavi another Iranian activist told BARB, After he was hassled about the banner Kalantari began addressing the passers-by, and ended up in the hands of the law. He is now restricted, Razavi

ended up in the hands of the law.

He is now restricted, Razavi said, to the District of Columbia until his trial on July 26.

Kalantari still faces the threat of deportation from a San Francisco federal court due to his involvement in bay area protests. The SF trial has been indefinitely postponed, however, to allow Kalantari's defense lawyer time to show that he will be persecuted if deported back to Iran.

American law forbids deporta-tion when the result would be physical persecution.

physical persecution.

Kalantari, a member of the Iranian Student Association, has been on the trail of his Shah, ever since the Emporer of Iran began his visit to the U.S. on June 11.

In New York, Razavi told the
BARB, Kalantari and 200 other
student protesters met the Shah
outside his hotel suite at the Waldorf Astoria.

Later in Cambridge, Mass., the
Shah was greeted with jeers and
shouts as he accepted an honorary doctoral degree from Harvard University.

movement of March 22nd."

More moderate and confused, it found later its leader and superstar in Dany Cohn-Bendit, an anarchist of the archaic "Noir et Rouge," himself nevertheless a kind of honest radical.

Fortunately after an upsurge of street confrontation May 11, and the spontaneous joining in of the workers occupying their factories, the base was able to withstand the sellout and manipulation of unionsellout and manipulation of union-bosses. Almost all Parisian facul-ties functioned as popular clubs and a direct democracy prevailed which seeks to put society inques-tion, seeks unification with the

workers and which resolutely con-demns the stalinist bureaucracy. It has as its objectives; the aboli-tion of class society, wage-labor, the spectacle and the international

the spectacle and the international constitution of workers councils. This lasted till the 17th, when the putchkistes of the left (J.C.R. and the F.E.R.)* combined with the bureaucrats of the Student Union (U.N.E.F.) betrayed the occupation committee which was elected on May 14th by the General Assembly of the occupants of the Sorbonne. bonne.

By the end of May the news-By the end of May the news-papers spoke only of the struggle for power with the Communist party (and other established left-ists) on one hand, and de Gaulle on the other.

It is clear that both sides wish

It is clear that both sides wish to maintain the domination over the proletariat. In the event will the workers, students, farmers, soldiers provide the cannon fodder? The crucial problem is to know if the proletariat has forgotten itself, or what comes to the same thing -- does not yet know itself for what it is. 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

Act III. Of Course. The fuzz arrives, seven in all. Park. Walk. Talk. "Okay, okay, the party's over."



When it was suggested that US forces in Vietnam adopt a "hot pursuit" policy of crossing borders into Cambodia, he rejected it with the statement that such a po-"extended the supply lines far."

licy "extended the supply lines too far."

On my map of SE Asia, the border of Cambodia is 60 miles from Saigon, Hanoi is 780 miles from Saigon (these are straight-line measurements).

Now-if 60 miles is "too far" for the mighty US Army etc., just how in the holy hell does the North Viets and the NLF get THEIR supplies to the center of Saigon?

The General's other statement was made this week. He said "we are going to put a stop" to the

was made this week, He said "we are going to put a stop" to the NLF rockets because we have the "electronic means" to do so. Now—the late Sec of Defense MacNamara ALSO had an "electronic means" to stop "infiltration": it was a live-wire fence across the DMZ and down the border of loss. across the DMZ and down the border of Laos.

Obviously, it hasn't stopped that 780 mile trek of rockets that our

General is so sure of stopping.

One method of NLF supply was reported this week. "A chain of sampans" from Haiphong, down sampans from Haphong, down the coast to Saigon, keep up the shipment of rockets. Once in the Saigon delta area, they are sunk (each rocket being in a waterproof container and brought to the sur-

container and brought to the surface only when used.

The Air Corps (as usual) is loused up on this deal, too...

With eleven flights of "eight jet-engine bombers" dropping 8,000,000 pounds of bombs around Saigon in one day without any efect, apparently the best defense against a rocket is a cat.

According to one UPI reporter in Saigon, his cat "scurries for cover before the rockets come crashing down in the dead of night, I think he can hear that super-high whistle which is inaudible to human ears."

man ears. man ears."

Contrast this to what happened during WW II and you will note we haven't learned a goddamned thing: "The German Wehrmacht's first maket wearen." first rocket weapons . . . were fired from cover of a hole in the ground by an electric ignition de-vice. The powerful jets of fire caused considerable dust clouds which made frequent changes of

which made request changes operation necessary in order to escape spotting by the enemy.

"The noise when a mortar (rocket) was fired was frightful, Whenever a camoutlaged mortar battery went into action, everybody ran in terror for cover"—from the book 'Invasion' by Paul Carell, 1960 (Bantam, 75¢).

Today, twenty-four years later, the US Army is WITHOUT rocket artillery (at least in Vietnam) while cats and people still run "in terror for cover."

We keep hearing that "enemy rockets" are hard to find, Okay—if the Nazi rockets were easy to

rockets" are hard to find. Okayif the Nazi rockets were easy to
spot because of their flame and
roar, the Chinese and the Russians
must have come up with a "silent" rocket, at least in take-off.
This must be because they are
somewhat damp. mewhat damp.

American civilians in Saigon American civilians in Saigon are buying arms. They feel that the US Military and ex-Gen Ky's bullshit "Defense Corps" can't save them. Neither can the \$26,-000,000 Hq of the US Military. To place such a building within "enemy" reach again shows the bancruptcy of the American military mind.

car, and killed.

Can the Air Corps do anything right? Yes.
Here is a report from Gen Bayerlein, commander of the Panzer Lehr Division, on the night his outfit was approaching the French town of Argentan . . .
"The little town was quaking under the ceaseless hail of bombs. The whole of Argentan was burning. We were in a witch's cauldron. Dust and smoke reduced visibility to nil. The Peace and Freedom Council of Delegates meeting in Fresno last weekend to some observers resembled the P&F Founding Convention in Richmond despite the procedur-al tangles, factional hassles, and sotto voce cynicism, enough got done to make it all worthwhile.

The delegates, representing P&F groups throughout the state, decided to set up a national Peace and Freedom presidential nominating convention to be held August ting convention to be held August

Open P&F presidential conven-tions will be held in northern and southern California on the week-end of August 3-4. Possible tic-kets mentioned at the Fresno meetkets mentioned at the Fresno meeting include Eldridge Cleaver, Dick Gregory - Reies Tijerina, Benjamin Spock - Coretta King, Eugene McCarthy, Linus Pauling, Alan Watts, and Howard Zinn.

Two major trends were noted in arguments for various candidates. Some wanted a candidate with broad appeal to try to draw support from

appeal to try to draw support from the entire left-of-center political spectrum; others wanted a visibly radical candidate to keep the is-sues as sharp as possible.

Aware of the fact that P&F in California is much more mobi-

lized than similar groups in other states, the delegates decided that the results of the national presi-dential convention should not be binding. Otherwise, groups from other states might balk at the pros-pect of California stacking the con-vention, it was argued. Problems of distributing funds

Problems of distributing minds were resolved by a decision to divide the money fifty-fifty between the state organization and the counties. Highest priority was given to financing the administrative tasks of the state and county offices, which will now operate on fixed budgets.

budgets.

Policy on fund-raising activities was shifted from emphasis on rock dances which draw relatively impecunious young people, to community events aimed at adults with more in their wallets.

one in their wallets.
One of the major informal achievements of the Fresno meeting was a realization that the problems are much the same every-

where, according to one observer.

The mood at the end for many was a heightened enthusiasm arising from the realization that Peace and Freedom finally has an active statewide decision - making body which closely represents P& F constituencies throughout Cali-

The next Council of Delegates meeting will be held in three months.

John, a young black guy from the
West Oakland ghetto, gets caught
with some grass. Immediately after he's booked the cops set a
standard \$3,300 bail on him.
According to all the law books
only judges set bail. But with the
thousands of arrests in Oakland, the
cops find it easier to have a standard sliding scale for everything
from selling dope to jamming a
parking meter with pop-tops.
For John, \$3,300 is a wet dream,
not a sum of money he can raise
in a few days. He has to get a bailbondsman.

in a few days, He nabondsman.

The minute the cops let him make



Spock is guilty. No doubt he

is, The question is, of what? And the answer is: Guilty of supposing that this monolithic once-free society still keeps itself amenable to social

change.

Guilty of running afoul of a federal regime intent on blotting out all opposition going beyond mere "disagreement."

Guilty, mainly, of being so ignorant of law as to lay himself open, while in good faith thinking that he was legitimately protesting, to being technically guilty of a technical law enacted for the sole purpose of enabling the authorities to find people technically guilty of it, when it suits their purposes.

Guilty of mopery. On which I will now deliver a short lecture.

Remember the case of the Communist Ten, about twenty years

Remember the case of the Communist Ten, about twenty years ago? The charge: conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the U.S. government. Not just advocating the overthrow of the government; that's as legal as advocating anything else. But the laws are so set up that "conspiracy" to do something legal in itself cancarry a felony rap, if They want to push it.

Remember the Apalachin, New York, bust, about ten years ago? The one that nailed all the big wheels of the Cosa Nostra. Now, it's true they weren't the kind of characters I'm eager to have on the street. But dig the charge: conspiracy to agree to conceal evidence. evidence.

evidence.

Not concealing evidence, since there was no investigation going on. Not conspiracy to conceal evidence, in the sense of getting together to dispose of the body. In plain laymen's language, they were convicted of not being willing to talk, if they had been questioned, if they had known anything.

And that carried a fifteen-year federal ran.

And that carried a inteen-year federal rap.
You see now what's meant by mopery. Technicalities for getting anyone who is actually wanted on other grounds. Unobtrusive little laws, not pushed most of the time but still there, which make illegal actions legal, and which laws the authorities can always use when-ever they wish, Catch-22 in civil-

ian life.
Catch-22: They can do anything to you that you can't stop Them from doing. And They make the laws that determine what you can or can't do to stop Them.

Along with the traditional American attitude of regarding this

as a free country, there has grown up the popular paranoia of belief in top-secret agencies that can Get You if you're too far out of line. It's not done that way.

Really, they just arrest you for conspiracy to agree to disregard the prevalence of spitting on the street. You get bail, and due process of law, and representation by counsel, and trial by jury, and it's all nice and constitutional. It lets this country brag about not using this country brag about not using the methods others use, and it does you in just as effectively.

-R.R. his phone calls, John calls a black eastbay bondsman named Marvin Nelson. Nelson doesn't screw his clients by overcharging them. He even bails out demonstrators for a

even bails out demonstrators for a discount price. But Nelson has to follow the state laws.

John has to raise 10% of his bail and find a co-signer. Bail jumpers are a Sword of Damocles for bondsmen. If a defendant skips town without paying his full bail, the bondsman has to make up the loss to the county. Therefore they strictly require co-signers to all bonds; co-signers who are property-owners and "established members of the community."

John doesn't want to waste the \$330 and, being black, few of his friends would be considered "established members of the community" so he just sits in jail.

Marvin Nelson estimates that well

Marvin Nelson estimates that well

over half of the black, Mexican-American, and poor white de-fendants don't ever make bail. John stays in jail over the week-

end until he gets a five-minute hearing in front of an Oakland judge. He asks to be released on his own recognizance (O.R.) Oakland used to have a Ford Foundation Bail project which would

check into the background of defendants and recommend O.R.'s to the judges. But the project folded.

Now the judge rarely gives O.R.'s.
The judge brushes off the reuest. It isn't deliberate cruelty. quest.

quest. It isn't deliberate cruelty.
After all, John is just one man on
the Oakland judicial conveyor belt.
After his court appearance, John
packs up his gear and the Sheriffs
give him a free ride to Alameda
County's "rehabilitation center"
at Santa Rita. They restrict him
-- "presumed innocent" -- to
"little greystone," a barracks
specially fenced-in to prevent escapes. CONVICTED criminals
there walk freely inside the prison
grounds.

He sits in Santa Rita for two and a half weeks. He finally gets a lawyer, a public defender ap-pointed by the judge. The lawyer gets the charges dropped because

gets the charges dropped because the cops had illegally searched John's house. But John considers himself lucky. He hadn't put out the \$330 to the bondsman

bondsman,
Originally, posting bail was to
ensure that a defendant would appear in court at the proper time.

like to meet the right man, get married and have children?"' She replies: "I have already met the right man, and we plan to have children some day,"
One copsays: "How come you're so much against Napalm?" and another cop says "I bet you're also against the H-bomb!" THE BEA FING
After booking, Jerry and Nancy are taken to the courthouse. It is now about eight-thirty in the evening, and Jerry is about to be ushered into a cell. A narco takes Jerry aside and punches him several times in the head, turns him around and kicks him in the spine. Jerry falls to the ground.

When he is thrown into the cell the cop tells the other prisoners that "Rubin is a communist and he hates America". This statement makes no impression on the other prisoners, mostly blacks and Puerto Ricans. They tell Jerry that they got beaten up by the cops too, and have no bread to raise bail. For the first time in several hours Jerry is out of hostile company, among people he can relax with.

Rubin's temporary lawyer is a guy from Legal Aid, and when Jerry tells him he has been busted at Columbia the lawyer says "you've ruined a fine university, don't expect any help from me."

Bail is set by the Judge at a thousand dollars, and charges against Nancy for some reason dropped. Jerry's friends are in the courtroom — they include Abby and Anita Hoffman (New York Super-Diggers), Paul Krassner, Super-Diggers), Paul Krassner, myself, and a bunch of the Yippie

gang.

One of the arresting cops tells the bailiff (who is friendly and who tells me this later): "You see those guys in the back? They're all a bunch of Communists, and the blond guy with the beard (me) is wanted by the F.B.I."

This is the first time I've heard of such a thing, and if it's true,

Nancy is freed. She tells us that Jerry has been beaten up, and is in quite a bit of pain (this is the first we have heard of how he was treated) and he thinks he's going to get worked over some more.

We must understand that this is the message of the media 'hippie', the weekendy-summer dropout," says their manifesto. their manifesto.

"What remains is a struggle for survival. The kids in the street can't go back -- they have been burned out and there's only one way to go -- into the streets. But that doesn't make good copy for ego -tripping 'leaders'; it only makes sense for those who are the shit of America."

The motherfuckers' spokesman is always "Henry." The Newspaper of the Streets is always scrawled on the stencil by hand. They have adopted the Thomas Nast representation of the communistanarchist - free - levite- deadheadist-Kearnyite of 1873.

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

His wife has urged him to appeal with the one argument that would move Jim: "If you appeal, you'll be free to continue organizing during the summer."

When Jim appeared in court for sentencing, he implemented his yow to continue non - cooperation with Selective Service laws. Hester circulated a statement written by her husband which declared he would not move, eat or dress himself while in custody for an act of conscience. "If you attempt to keep me alive," his statement read, "you are guilty of the same crime for which I have been imprisoned: respect for human life."

If Jim goes to jail there will still be a thriving Resistance movement growing in Cincinnati. It is staffed by young kids who, six months ago, had never heard any friend, parent or relative speak Ill of napalm, saturation bombing or

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

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
