

Cliff Breedlove was standing in the Forum when two plainclothesmen walked by. "Hey, they're cops," he announced.
The fuzz, without identifying themselves, moved in quickly to cart Breedlove off.
"What did I do?" he asked. The fuzz accused him of slander for calling them "pigs."
"I called you cops," Breedlove protested as they dragged him down the street.

The street people began to fol-low the cops shouting names and feebly attempting to rescue the

prisoner.

Persian Fucker Haj Razavi approached the fuzz to ask what Breedlove was charged with. He received for his efforts, a forearm in the chest, a club across the head, and also was arrested. One of the fuzz carried a black-

jack and the other had a set of "brass knuckles," witnesses reported.

The fuzz threw their prisoners in

a squad car, then turned on the crowd and busted two more of the hecklers.

"It takes a big man to knock a man down," a girl described as being "about four feet high," told the cops from behind.

One of the cops whipped around blindly, slugging her in the face with his backhand, then came any with the other first lunging.

P & F FACTION FIGHT THREATENS TO SPLIT **STATE CONVENTION**

A major battle may erupt at the Peace and Freedom convention this weekend over charges that P&F national organizing has been "rig-

The critical importance of this conflict in the development of the new party is hinted at by the fact that people on both sides of the dispute charge that the other group is "wrecking the party."

"wrecking the party."
Although the schism has for months been bubbling visibly at all levels and locales throughout California, it could boil over publicly in San Francisco on Saturday. Decisive acts may be a proposal to make the forthcoming National Peace and Freedom Convention an open, mass convention of all interested anti-war and anti-racist persons and groups committed to persons and groups committed to

persons and groups committed to breaking from the major parties. The expected proposal is based on charges that the P&F National Organizing Committee has been favoring the Eldridge Cleaver—Presidential campaign. The National Organizing Committee decides who is qualified to take part in the National P&F convention August 17-18.

The phrase "California Imperialism" has been in common use to describe the criteria used

The phrase "California Imperialism" has been in common use to describe the criteria used to determine whether or not a group should be credentialed for the national conference. Basically, a group must fit the pattern set by the policies adopted at the California P&F Founding Convention in Richmond.

David Rynin, P&F Congressional candidate in the 16th District and a supporter of the King-Spock Caucus was working on the word-ing of an open-national-convention proposal as BARB went to

tion proposal as BARB went to press.
"What the National Organizing Committee has done is set up paper Peace and Freedom Parties in various states which are equivalent to Eldridge Cleaver for President Clubs," Rynin told BARB.
"What's bugging all the groups

"What's bugging all the groups outside of the Cleaver caucus is

outside of the Cleaver caucus is that Peace and Freedom is getting a bad name throughout the coun-try as a puppet-show set-up." At the latest state steering com-mittee meeting on Sunday, mem-bers from Los Angeles insisted hers from Los Angeles insisted that the credentialing committee for the national convention be ex-panded. Their demand was met by adding four members, two from California and one each from Mich-

California and one each from Michigan and New York.
Under rules initially established by the California State Steering Committee, voting participation in the national convention will be limited to groups committed to building an independent radical political party. Only one such group per state could be a voting participant.
First preference could be given

First preference could be given to Peace and Freedom Parties, second preference to organiza-tions with "a Peace and Freedom perspective." Groups working partially with-

Rynin said his proposal would be designed to broaden the base

be designed to broaden the base of the party.

"We're all agreed that the national convention should be open only to those who break from the major parties, are committed to a new party, and eppose war and racism," Rynin said.

"There are two major problems. One is the limitation of one group per state.

"In virtually all states except

"In virtually all states except California there is no single third-party operation. There are student groups, peace groups, black and Mexican-American groups work-ing in their communities. The result of the 'one group' rule is that the majority of the groups are left out."

(The one-group-per-state rule was revoked at a State Steering Committee on Sunday, but will be reconsidered at an emergency steering committee meeting on Friday, the day before the California P&F Presidential convention.

Ric Hyland, administrator of P&F national organizing, and a Cleaver supporter, replied to Ry-nin's charges. He told BARB that in no state,

He told BARB that in no state, with the possible exception of Illinois, are there two groups which fulfill the steering committee's criteria, "and it would be rather silly to invite competing organizations from the same state to the

Peace and Freedom members convention, this weekend will have a wideopen chance to select the California P&F Presidential nominee. vention will

Caucuses for Eldridge Cleaver, Dick Gregory, and King-Spock have been most active, along with noticeable stirrings for an "un-committed" delegation and, in San Diego, for Eugene McCarthy.

Simultaneous mass conventions in San Francisco and Los Angeles will be open to all persons who are Peace and Freedom members -either P&F registrants or those ineligible under state law who sign statements that they would register in P&F if qualified.

The combined results of the voting at the SF and LA sessions will be transmitted by delegates to the National Peace and Freedom Con-vention in Ann Arbor, Michigan on August 17-18.

The composition of California's delegation to the national conven-tion will be proportional to the vote at this weekend's convention -- a candidate who receives 37% of the ballots Saturday will have 37% of the California delegates to the Ann Arbor convention.

Ann Arbor convention.

The August 3 sessions in California will open at 10 a.m. with High School, meetings of the various caucuses, whose most pressing business will be the selection of a list of proposed delegates to the national Elysian Park.

During the morning interval the main microphone at each convention will be open to presidential candidates, to make it possible for them to speak to both the northern and southern meet-

Both Eldridge Cleaver and Dick Gregory -- the only two men actively seeking the P&F nomination -- plan to speak to both sections of the convention, in SF in the morning and in LA in the after-

The Plenary Session of the whole convention, starting at 2 p.m., will be divided equally between the different official caucuses, for presentation of their candidates or positions.

Caucuses offering positions ra-ther than candidates will have the same status as those putting forth Prospective Presidential nomi-Balloting is scheduled to begin

Balloting is scheduled to be at 4 p.m.

The afternoon session will be chaired by James Vann, north-state P&F vice-chairman, noted as an impartial chairman.

Northern California's section of the Presidential nominating convention will be held in Mission High School, at 18th Street and Dolores, in San Francisco. Simultaneously in Los Angeles, the P&F convention will take place at Elysian Park.

The two people hurry up toward the avenue in search of a cop.

They aren't sure whether the bangs they hear behind them are gunshots or a car backfiring.

the shots he ran to the window of
the nearby house in which he was
visiting.
Below him is a "straight-looking
guy with short, dirty-blonde hair,"
sticking a gun in his belt and looking down at the ground under the
bushes. The man is young, about
5'9", medium build, and wearing
a blue zippered jacket and dark
trousers. trousers.

The police later determined that the gun used was a .45. They found

spent shells at the scene.

The gunman then pulled his jacket up over his head and runs through a parking lot to Dana and north along Dana, according to BARB's informant. Rumors on the street say that the mafia is moving in on independent

New York - We were kicked out of the Newport Folk Festival Sunday, then quickly driven to the border by three cops and thrown out of town "for giving pornographic literature to a nun."

This story will sound incredible to everyone but those who experienced the Newport festival firsthand last week end. Even the nun seemed surprised.

Tim Buckley was just finishing his fourth song around 5 p.m. when I noticed four nuns sitting quietly in box seats a few feet away. I walked over to give them a copy of the free yippie newspaper, a brightly-colored, 10-page paper including drawings, poetry, and spiritual thoughts from our anarchist-revolutionary point of view. Included in the paper is valuable information like: "How to Make a Firebomb." Also an essay on America titled: "America Eats the World for Dessert," and scattered thoughts like:

"The theatre continues. We are life actors, laughing, getting into our flesh, kissing our neighbors, and ridding ourselves of garbage. Our liberated spines are creating an ecological network manifesting itself in a life oriented energy circus without authority systems.

our flesh, kissing our neighbors, and ridding ourselves or garnage.
Our liberated spines are creating an ecological network manifesting itself in a life oriented energy circus without authority systems.
We support our inner concepts through action by recognizing that there are no problems, only things to do."
There was a drawing of a couple making love in the paper. There was one passage which included a slight putdown on muns. It read:
"Who says that rich white America can tell the Chinese what is best? How dare you tell the poor that their poverty is deserved? I screamed at the blonde woman.
I was furious.
"You can't hand out literature on festival grounds," the woman said.

"I am one person and I was giving another person something to read," I said. "Who are you to grab it out of her hands like

'I am Mrs. Sweeney, the wife

of the co-director of the festival."
Catching her off balance, I grabbed the newspaper out of her hands and returned to my seat with it.
SMALL ARMY
Five minutes later a small army of six festival cops headed by George Wein, director of the Newport Folk Festival, descended on me.

me.
Wein's neck was red with anger.
"Who are you? Who are you?"
he kept asking.
He ordered his cops to kick me
and Peter Rabbit, who had a stack
of yippie materials in his arms,
off festival grounds "and if you
come back here we're calling Newport police and putting you in jail."
I wasn't in the best position to
argue since I hadn't paid to get

argue since I hadn't paid to get into Wein's festival. On my chest was a phony press pass. How can you pay four dollars to hear a concert? It's an outrage. Paying money to hear the music turns it into another consumer shuck. How into another consumer snuck, How many people can't hear the music cause they can't afford it? Music concerts should be free or run by the community for the community at razor-thin costs. Profit is por-

wein saw the defiance in my eyes; the defiance I feel toward business and businessmen, especially those who live off the movement; there was war in my eyes and war in his eyes.

"Scum, you are scum," he kept
shouting. "Get out, stay out."
Wein and the cops led us personally to the exit.
Three armed Newport case are

Three armed Newport cops arrived. They conferred privately with one of Wein's assistants. Nancy, my girlfriend, then arrived "IRREVERENT **RUMP THAT** IRRELEVANT? RAISES HELL WITH **EVERYTHING** SACRED!"

to find out that a lot had happened while she was in the john, "The

while she was in the john, "The scum were giving pornographic literature to a nun," Wein repeated. "Hands up and against that car," a Newport cop said to me, Peter and Nancy. (Nancy slipped two joints into her bra, never to be discovered.) We are searched, and pushed into a police car and told to sit on our hands. "You're going to the police station for an investigation."

At the station the captain care-

Investigation."

At the station the captain carefully reads the yippie paper and announces our punishment: immediate banishment from Newport, R.I. The whole thing was ending like a Western movie. Three cops drove us to the border, the ferry out of Newport, and told us:

FERRY

"You have till the next ferry to

FERRY

"You have till the next ferry to get out of town. If we see you again, you're going to jail."

What was pornographic was not the newspaper which neither the nuns nor Mrs. Sweeney nor George Wein nor the festival cops ever read but the mere drama of long-haired rabble in dirty clothes and beads daring to walk over to a nun and give her something to read.

Handing out literature in the first

nun and give her something to read.

Handing out literature in the first place is "against the law" at the Folk Festival. A nigger giving pornographic literature to a nun is a capital crime.

Getting kicked out of the festival at least made it worthwhile going to Newport. The only other thing worth remembering happened Friday night after the concert when Phil Ochs and I recognized William Buckley sipping a beer. We were infatuated with the idea of Buckley coming to the Folk Festival, and we irresistibly began following him. A friend of Buckley's stopped him. A crowd of about 100 people began to gather. Ochs told Buckley that he had list come from singing at a McCarthy rally in Fenway Park in Loston. Ochs said that Pete Seeger also was there, and that this was the first time since Henry Wallace that Seeger had sung for a Presidential candidate.

"You mean the first time since
Mowcow?" Buckley replied,

"I hope," Buckley continued,
winking his famous Buckley wink,
"that Pete Seeger will be singing

festival?" Buckley asked Ochs.

"I'm not. I wasn't invited,"
Ochs said. "I guess I don't fit
into the Folk Music Establishment."

"Oh, is there a Folk Music Establishment too?" Buckley said, his eyes twinkling, and a sly look on his face.

At that point George Wein spotted Buckley, and he entered the crowd smiling proudly, like the impresario of a festival which had attracted a celebrity like William Buckley. After introductions, Buckley snapped at Wein: "Why wasn't Ochs invited to sing at your festival?"

Wein was caught off guard. Here

was right-winger William Buckley asking him in front of left-wing protest singer Phil Ochs and a hundred other people why Ochs was not invited to sing at his festival. Wein passed the buck, saying, "Phil, why didn't you sing?" implying that Ochs had been invited. "Why didn't you invite him?" a number of people in the crowd shouted.

shouted.

Wein then invited Buckley to a performers' party and left, embar-

rassed.
Later Ochs, Nancy and I went to the party, but at the door a festival official said, "Phil, get rid of your friends and you can come in."

CRUDE

That was the crude tune played all week end: one hassle after another for those who upset the festival decorum. Wherever you went there were officials and cops asking: "Who are you?" "Where is your ticket?" "What is your business?" By Sunday there was hardly a person around who didn't have at least one harassment story to share.

share.
This was all ironical because six yippies and myself hadcometo
Newport to disrupt the Folk Festival. We were inspired by what

German SDS did to German left-wing singers at a festival last month in Germany. Midway through the concert SDS jumped on stage and took over the micro-

phone.
They called it a "bourgeois festival" and said that people were consuming protest songs the way they consume clothes. "The times are too revolutionary for this," one said. After an hour of debate with the audience, they left and the concert continued amidst NLF flags and huge pictures of Ho Chi Minh. flags and Chi Minh.

The yippies came to Newport with similar ideas, but with no specific plan. MARCHING FOR MAC IN THE SAME OLD TRACK

Senators Eugene McCarthy has
the votes but not the delegates -nor the black vote.

This was brought home from
both sides of the United States
last weekend when in San Francisco over 15,000 people marched
from Golden Gate Park to the City
Holl while in Pactor groun 45,000 Hall while in Boston over 45,000 "overflowed Fenway Park for Mc-Carthy."

This reporter was on the SF March For McCarthy, and the pavement greeted his feet (once more) with a "Oh, no -- not YOU again!"

again!"
However, his feet were about the only feet to be recognized. Most of the 15,000 or more people were marching for the first time, busloads of high school boys and girls with gay banners and original placards making up much of the march.
"Who ARE these people" the street kept asking my feet and

"Who ARE these people" the street kept asking my feet, and my feet replied: "Street-people a-borning."

But it took a black youth to come up with the most original political demonstration. He was collecting money for Huey Newton's trial and was carrying a full-length mirror which he held up to each marcher.

As each McCarthyite looked in the mirror and saw him or her self, they read a small slogan pasted on top: "Vote For Me."

Other blacks kept calling out to the marchers as they went through the fringe-ghetto area of Fulton street, "McCarthy doesn't care about Negroes,"

One black youth drove past and shouted, "Rip y'all!" Many houses had "Free Huey" posters in their windows here. There were very few blacks

in the march. In fact it should be be embarrassing to the McCarthy forces -- but they don't seem to Another embarrassment is the

care.

Another embarrassment is the question this reporter kept putting to various people: "What are you going to do if McCarthy DOESN'T get the nomination?"

Nobody, repeat, nobody would give any sort of an answer, clear or unclear. Just a simple shrug and hope it won't happen. This, of course, is no way to runfor President of these YOUnited States.

What the marchers lacked in political reality they made up for in sparkling spirits, as expressed by some of their signs ... "Pull the plug on the machine-vote for Eugene" was lettered across a cardboard light-plug. "Would you let HH fill YOUR perscription?" read another.


A little boy, age 2, carried a small placard which merely read "MAC." He was more interested in a mounted-fuzz and his horse than in listening to this reporter's questions, however.



Wells has been clad in his underclothes since April 11, when he was confined at the Presidio stockade for refusing to report for active duty. He has donned blue jeans and a jacket for his court appearances.

He was forced into uniform this week despite the protests of Capt. John O'Brien, his army-appointed attorney.

Wells was taken to Fort Leaven-worth, Kansas. Federal Judge Lloyd Burke on Monday denied his petition for writ of habeas corpus, Wells' civilian attorney, Lloyd McMurray, expressed confidence that his client still can win. He argues that Wells' case requires civil rather than military court action.

and inactive status since September 1966, Wells was ordered into the Army Reserves. He refused. He has repeatedly informed his Army headquarters that he cannot, in good conscience, participate in any military activity.



By Thursday, the four alternate jurors will probably have been chosen so that the actual trial can get underway next Monday.

On Tuesday Garry sought to have the case dismissed once again because of prejudicial publicity in the local press, but Superior Court

cause of prejudicial publicity in the local press, but Superior Court Judge Monroe Friedman maintained that Huey is getting and will continue to get a fair trial. Yet, the events of the first three weeks of the trial only seem to confirm the conclusions of the sociologists who testified during the first two days — that Huey could not be tried fairly under the present system. present system.
Of the blacks who were ques-

of the blacks who were ques-tioned as possible jurors, an amazingly large proportion were dismissed for cause by Judge Friedman because they were un-alterably opposed to the death

penalty.

Of those blacks who did make it past the judge, all but one were dismissed without cause by prosecutor Jensen.

Within twenty minutes the three boys and Henry Stinson were under arrest for resisting arrest, Gallen and Stinson had been punched around, Dolores Stinson (Henry's sister) had been knocked to the ground by a cop and left there, and the girls were left standing on the street outside the police station. Henry Stinson, who came out of the house as his friends were being arrested and asked for his radio out of the Gallen car, told of being kicked, clubbed, and punched both on the street and at the police station in his sworn deposition.

Monday night, about 8PM, John Within twenty minutes the three

Monday night, about 8PM, John Gallen had been released from jail and was riding -- as a passenger-in the car of a friend. Suddenly a cruiser pulled alongside and a cop in it yelled, "Gallen, pull over," according to Gallen's affidavit.

Other cop cars arrived, One contained the arresting officer of the

The ten thousand dollars, which the State demands in ball, is of course punitive, his wife points out. It "was so established just so that he was not able to get out of sail"

so that he was not able to get out of jail."

The judge rejected all motions to lower the bail. Lincoln was taken to Greystone at Santa Rita Rehabilitation Center.

For those of you who have never seen Greystone, Lincoln urges you to try to get an opportunity to see the place. It is an experience you will never forget.

Lincoln has been there now for nearly a month, the forgotten man, receiving treatment that makes 1968 look like "1984," his wife told BARB.

He was brought into court for a preliminary hearing (which was postponed) on the 16th of July, wearing the torn and filthy clothes in which he was beaten and arrested. Although a suit of clothes had been delivered to Santa Rita, by his wife, and she had a receipt for these, it seems that had been delivered to sainta Rias, by his wife, and she had a receipt for these, it seems that someone "forgot" to deliver them to his cell.

At the next court appearance, he was wearing the suit, on July 24th. He had been aroused at two c'clock in the previous morning.

he was wearing the suit, on Juliy 24th. He had been aroused at two o'clock in the previous morning, to sit throughout the night on a hard-backed chair.

His wife is allowed to see him for half an hour every Sunday. She must stand behind a rope, six feet away from the cage which he occupies, and yell to him. Lincoln has four children, too, but he is not allowed to see them at all.

He has, of course, lost his job, so that he must worry about his ability to support his children, when and if he ever comes home to them. He is a sick man, physically ill and sick with worry for his own future and that of his family. He has been drugged daily, due to the severe depression which he suffers.

What has the man hop convised. he suffers.

What has the man been convicted of, that he should be subjected to this kind of treatment at the hands of American Justice, asks Mrs. Drummond? This seems to be the point.

The answer is, nothing. He has not been convicted of anything at all. No judge has found him guilty of any crime, he has not even been through a preliminary hearing yet,

she charges.
His wife and children would like His wife and children would like to get him back, if possible, before he is completely broken in mind and body. His eight-year-old son, the oldest child, has managed to collect sixteen dollars for the beginning of a bail fund. But that leaves a long way to go to ten thousand dollars.

At the corner of Lombard and Lyon, outside the Presidio, a little knot of people shivers in the summer fog beneath the outstretched arms of Benny Bufano's statue of St. Francis, patron saint of peace.

In front of ever-burning torch of peace, the Reverend Richard York intones, "our hero and leader, Jesus the son of God, stand here beside us," "Stand here beside us," the little group of some thirtypeople responds.

Soon the wine and bread of communion moves from hand to hand in the group, each person taking a taste, committing himself a little more to the concept of peace.

The communion service, last Friday night, is for the "Nine for Peace," nine ex-servicemen who refused to go to Viet Nam and kill.

Since being dragged from a church by Mp's at the close of a similar communion for peace two

similar communion for peace two weeks ago, three of these men have been held in the Presidio Stockade: Chuck Jones, George Dounis and Keith Mather. Two of the men were sent to Fort Ord: Steve Anderson and

Fort Ord: Steve Anderson and James Seymour. Ex-sergeant Oliver Hirsch is at Hamilton Air Force Base. Jack Robinson is in the Marine brig at Camp Pendleton.

Ex-sailors Dale Herrin and Paul Howard are being held at Treas-

The 24-hour vigil outside the gates of the Presidio is for all of them.

price of maintaining the rie price of maintaining the vigil has been painful at times, but the vigilers seem undaunted. They have been the objects of insults, thrown beer bottles, and, in one case so far, physical as-

sault.
This occurred on July 20.
On July 20, five "men" from the Presidio who spoke of themselves as "off-duty MP's" waded into the vigilers with their fists.
Vigiler Tom Baker told BARB that these men stood talking to those who kept the watch for more than two hours that Saturday night—until nearly midnight. The soldiers then walked off a distance and talked among themselves briefly.

briefly.

When they returned one of them

when they returned one of them became nasty to a lady vigiler who said, "I refuse to talk to you." At that point vigiler Randy Kehler walked up and said, "Well, I'll talk to you." Immediately the man yelled at Vehler, and hit him in the interior to the well as the said hit was the wall of the said hit was the s

Immediately the man yelled at Kehler, and hit him in the side of the head. His cohorts began swing-ing on other members of the vigil, concentrating on those with long hair. Five male vigilers were knocked to the ground and beaten. The statue of St. Francis was

kicked out into the street.

Sali McAllister, one of the young women on the vigil sat on the prone figure of St Francis as a protective gesture. The five All-American heroes, unable to get a fight out of the male pacifists in the vigil, rushed up to Sali. But All-American heroes can't stand to see a woman beat; so they tossed a blanket over Sali before they beat her

An Army colonel, who had been parked in a car across the street, watching the action, strolled over and began talking to the men. They bad-mouthed him and walked back into the Presidio.

The vicilers have been effec-

The vigilers have been effective. Randy Kehler estimates that "at least a hundred soldiers have told me they agree with our opposi-

tion to the war since I have been on the vigil."

Perhaps this is the reason that military personnel from the Presidio have been told to avoid the

sidio have been told to avoid the Lombard gate.
Randy told BARB that "a fifteen-year man came up to us and said, 'my wife has been telling me that I should get out of the Army now that it's going downhill. But it took you guys sitting out here all night every night to convince me."

NATIONAL P&F PLANS AT STAKE

Present plans to make Peace and Freedom a national party might

and Freedom a national party might have to be scrapped.

An emergency meeting of the California State Steering Com-mittee of P&F is being called to head off a developing conflict between the sponsoring group, Cali-fornia P&F, and the host organi-zation, the New Politics Party of

Michigan.

P&F National organizing administrator Ric Hyland told BARB late Wednesday that he is contacting steering committee members to urge them to meet Friday to rescind their decisions made on

rescind their decisions made on Sunday.

He explained that the arrange-ments for the P&F National Con-vention in Ann Arbor, Michigan on August 17-18 had hinged upon mu-

August 17-18 had hinged upon mutual agreements by the California and Michigan parties in regard to the credentialing of delegates.

Last Sunday the California Steering Committee made several decisions contrary to the agreement with the Michigan party, Hyland said. The Michigan group subsequently indicated that it did not want the credentializing criteria changed.

These are the decisions Hyland did he is urging the steering committee to reconsider Friday

They revoked the only-one-organization-per-state rule.
They tabled a motion to remove
Hyland as administrator of national organizing.
They reconstituted the membership of California's national organizing committee.
They doubled the size of the

nationwide National Organizing Committee. Hyland indicated that if the

jury, we're not going to abandon San Francisco to a bunch of juana-smoking people who wan-der around nude and offend our opportunity to do something about it. We have to draw the line some-

where."

"Or shall the decent citizens just abandon Golden Gate Park to the kooks? If you think so, just find Mr. Minzey not guilty. The Berkeley BARB will love you."

In such words, prosecutor Steven Gurainick pushed his basic argument against Rev. Wilbur Minzey of the Shiva Fellowship: "Are the inmates going to run the asylum?"

Municipal Judge Leo R. Fried-man gave him able assistance by telling the jury that Shiva wor-shippers are not entitled to free-dom of religion when mulity, ob-scenity, or marijuana are involv-

ed.

Friedman suppressed much of the defense evidence on religion, by upholding the prosecutor's objections and even by making numerous objections himself from the bench. The elderly judge implied Shivaism should not be considered a true religion.

After three days of trial, the jury found Minzey guilty of indecent exposure because he had worn a loin cloth near Hippy Hill on June 23. They split six to six on his obscenity charge, and reach-

on June 23. They split six to six on his obscenity charge, and reached no verdict. (Minzey had said, "What do you have to do to get the attention of the fucking police?") Minzey's attorney, James R. White III, will appeal the exposure verdict when the minister appears for sentencing Aug. 5, at 10 a.m., Muni Court 17, SF Hall of Justice. Meanwhile Minzey sits upstairs in City Prison by Friedman's order, not eligible for bail. His honor was incensed by testimony that Shiva Fellowship has been publicly sacrificing marijuana and publicly sacrificing marijuana and LSD in the park almost every Sunday morning, with unspoken police permission.

Jury selection occupied the first

Jury selection occupied the first trial day, with the prosecutor kicking off several prospective jurors to create a tougher panel. Finally, on the second morning, the brownshirted bailiff swore in 7 white men, 4 white women, and one black man, mostly white-collar workers. San Francisco's population is 38% minorities.

One pig testified he saw Minzey early in the afternoon wearing his loin cloth, but ignored him because he was seated on the

ground, so that his genitals were not visible. Later during the five-hour smoke-in, he claims he saw Minzey "prancing around," with his genitals flapping in the breeze, through "slits" in the cloth.

through "slits" in the cloth.

White offered Rev. J. Fuck Poland, SFL founder, as an expert witness on contemporary community standards of sexual candor, but Friedman rejected Poland as an expert but he was allowed to testify. Poland told in great detail about the smoke-in, as reported in the June 28 BARB. Guralnick shouted outrage at free acid and

Next a male go-go dancer. Bou-Next a male go-go dancer, Bou-chay, was offered for comparison, since he professionally wore a loin cloth much more revealing than Minzey's, so his genitals were easily visible to the panting pa-trons of a gay bar. But the judge refused to let him tell how he

remised to let him tell how he was dressed.
"I don't care if he was naked," thundered his honor, famed as the judge who legalized topless night clubs.

clubs.

Rev. Augie Lowe, currently
California Primate of the NeoAmerican Church, testified briefly, followed by hippies Jay Wiseman and William Barr.

On the third day, defendant Minzey took the stand. He explained
that his loin cloth adequately covered his genitals, and had no
slits in it. He showed the jury an
identical loin cloth which he had
purchased in Benares, India. The
original cloth, he admitted, got
lost 3 weeks after the arrest, when
he foolishly lent it to a friend

lost 3 weeks after the arrest, when he foolishly lent it to a friend to tie down a loose trunk-lid on the friend's car.

Minzey said marijuana should be sacrificed to Shiva, but did not claim any religious significance for nudity.

for nudity.

The Hindu evangelist maintained, as had Poland, that his cursing had redeeming social value, since he was trying to prevent or protest the repeated disruption of Shiva services by mounted pigs. According to California Penal Code Section 302, "Every person who willfully disturbs or disquiets any assemblage of people met for reassemblage of people met for re ligious worship . . . is guilty of a misdemeanor."

In closing argument, just before lunch, Guralnick argued that the original loin cloth really had slits, and that Minzey had destroyed the

and that Minzey had destroyed the evidence.

During lunch break, the defense group located Minzey's friend, who had carelessly allowed the cloth to be broken, taken off his car trunk, and thrown away. The friend rushed to court to explain, but was not allowed to testify.

Defender White argued Minzey had innocently lost the evidence—and even if his balls did slip out of the cloth, it happened accidentally, unknown to Minzey. He contrasted Minzey's attempt at modesty with Poland and Dwayne Abadie, both of whom stripped stark naked at the same smoke—in. White outlined the tests for obscenity.

Then Judge Friedman instructed the jury on the law, going out

ed the jury on the law, going out of his way to rule that freedom of religion does not protect mari-juana possession or distribution (two offenses for which Minzey has not been arrested or charged).

The jurors retired at 3:45, came back twice for legal instructions, took two and a half hours off for supper at a restaurant, and de-livered their final report at 9:30

livered their final report at 9:30 p.m. -- guilty of indecent exposure, hung jury on obscenity.

Trial of this heinous crime, scarcely equalled in the annals of villainy, cost the taxpayers at least \$4,500 so far. And for his appeal, the pauper defendant will need a complete transcript at public exposure.

Minzey must be bailed out for the lengthy appeals, which may last several years, by posting cash or real estate as security. To help, phone Poland at 626-6196 or 654-0316.

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IF THE PIGS DON'T KILL **CLEAVER, WATCH HIM**

On the evening last week when he opened his presidential campaign, Eldridge Cleaver was questioned by "pigs of the mass media" as he called them later and with good reason.

They were talking to a man who the past six months has brought together the quixotic Black Panthers of Huey Newton, the intellectual activists of SNCC, the Peace & Freedom Party and even PL into a kind of working coalition.

These are historic developments and they represent quite an accomplishment for a man who was born 'up against the wall in the ghetto' and has spent nine of his 33 years in prison. But the well groomed porcine gentlemen of the press could think of no questions more appropriate than 'If Huey Newton is convicted, will indiscriminate appropriate than "If Huey New-ton is convicted, will indiscriminate slaughter of innocent whites take place?"

Cleaver's answer to that was a metaphor that became a main theme of his talk that evening in San Francisco's California Hall, "We're not going to fight fire with fire. We're going to fight fire with water." The water will be organization of people who say "Free Huey."

Cleaver's talk that night was re-markable against the backdrop of the past year and a quarter. It was only that long ago that 20 some Panthers walked into a meeting of the state assembly in Sacramento, carrying shotguns, to lobby against

gun control.

It was only six months ago that the "Free Huey" rally in Oakland Auditorium wound up with Stokely passionately calling for complete black separatism and measures to encourage the development of an encourage the development of an effective black bourgeoiste.

Contrast that with Cleaver last week in California Hall: "We do not

week in California Hall: "We do not recognize these people who say they own the resources of the planet earth. Every man and woman on earth has a right to the best that the earth can produce. If this means reorganizing the economy of the country, then we will have to get into that. If this means we must have a war to keep the economy going, we say no, the war can be stopped. The culture we have inherited is not the property of Rockefeller and the other millionaires. Those deeds are other millionaires. Those deeds are

on paper and that paper will burn."
Cleaver talked a little about the thinking behind this revolutionary(in two ways) change: "Before last fall we agreed with Stokely's position that we would have to wait until the white radicals were ready to work with us. But with Huey Newton in jail and white people organizing a radical party we saw the possibility of a coalition. Some of us thought that most blacks would not support Huey; certainly that whites would not. We tried it. We decided to join with them. We are glad we did that."

Hutton, Cleaver was held in Vacaville Medical Facility for parole
violation without benefit of a

"Is someone who smokes pot

That's the question Mrs. Garnett Brennan's attorney Stu Weinberg will pose to a Marin Court this coming week. He contends the state will have to make the court say, yes; or else make amends for firing his client.

Mrs. Brennan, as a grade school principal, was among hundreds of people who signed an affadavit last year admitting that she smoked

She did so in support of Melkon Melkonian, a Marin County me-chanic who at the time was under indictment -- and has since been convicted -- for selling marijuana.

After signing the afficavit, an administrative hearing immediately fired Mrs. Brennan in midsemester last year.

Next week, the superior court in San Rafael will determine whether or not Mrs. Brennan's content or or Mrs. Brennan's content or or Mrs. Brennan's content or or Mrs.

ther or not Mrs. Brennan's con-tract can be terminated for "im-

tract can be terminated for "immoral conduct." The trial will also pre-empt the decision of the administrative hearing.

A teacher can be fired for "immoral conduct" or "unprofessional conduct" in the State of California, but because such a charge is unique the terms have never been defined.

Mrs. Brennan sees the charges as a threat to academic freedom because as long as they remain

because as long as they remain undefined, they can be used arbitrarily

bitrarily.

"7d like to see the time when teachers can have complete academic freedom," Mrs. Brennan told BARB two weeks ago," when they can present both sides of a problem without being labelled."

Since early this year, Mrs. Brennan has been tutoring without pay at Oampali Ranch, a commune of about 40 people porth of San

about 40 people north of San Rafael.

There, Mrs. Brennan says, she can work with complete freedom, and because of this she has been able to eliminate many of the faults of the public school sys-

She has also been able to put into practice her own educational philosophy which she character-ises as: "When children are ready, give them what they want.

A number of educators and lec-A number of educators and lecturers who agree with her thinking, have already offered their services to the school, Mrs. Brennan told BARB.

Many investigators have noted that a large proportion of individuals with pyschiatric illness have used drugs like LSD in at attempt at self-medication. Those who suffer adverse and prolonged reactions following LSD use undoubtedly reflect this highly skewed population. tion.

A curious fact, which may blow A curious fact, which may blow the minds of many, is that Czech-oslovakia permits the use of LSD in psychotherapy. Czech psychia-trists have several LSD sessions, then administer the drug under supcapable of conducting their own sessions.
