





FREEDOM SCORES WIN

Freedom of Expression scored
a quick and surprising upset victory Monday night when the Richmond City Council refused to interfere with the Richmond Library

fere with the Richmond Library and its selection of books.

The action came after Mrs. L. Klock, on behalf of a newly formed group of "concerned Richmond citizens," requested the council to remove the Berkeley BARB from the city Library.

remove the Berkeley BARB from the city Library.

In less than a minute, the council refused to consider the request, and adjourned the meeting amidst the cheering of more than 300 supporters of the Richmond Lib-

"Beautiful!" one person in the crowded council chambers yelled. "It was too easy," shouted another happy citizen standing close to this

reporter.
When it was over City Librarian when it was over City Librarian John Forsman stood smiling and shaking hands with his colleagues. He had come to the council prepared for a fight, but the sudden action of the council made any rebuttals from the neo-fascist underground impossible, and he won

The only fight, in fact, occurred after the meeting at the rear of the council chambers.

the council chambers.

As they were leaving, some of
the would-be BARB-burners who
weren't able to address the council launched an attack on the BARB.

"I don't want my children to read
that smut," one woman who refused

that smut," one woman who resused to give her name shrieked. She was immediately surrounded by a dozen BARB supporters who responded in fighting fashion. The argument stopped short of physical contact.

contact.

"Why don't you stay home and take care of your children?" an Oriental woman queried.

"How long have YOU lived in this area?" the elderly woman sneered in reply. "You're probably all from Berkeley."

Councilman Weyman interrupted. "Where do you live?" he asked, She refused to reply. "Don't you think anyone has

"Don't you think anyone has the right to print what they want?" he asked again. Again, the garrulous anti-BARBer could find no words to respond.

Beside this BARB reporter, Berkeley City Councilman John DeBonis was one of the few Berk-eleyans on the scene. "We're going to do the same thing to the BARB in Berkeley,"

Councilman DeBonis was reported as saying before the meeting.
After the adjournment, BARB asked Mr. DeBonis how he felt about the City Council's action. "None of your god-damned business," he replied.
The BARB was the last item on the agenda Monday, A member of the ACLU, a Richmond clergyman, a representative of the Intellectual Freedom League, and a number of Freedom League, and a number of professional librarians were all prepared to render their opinions. But to almost everyone's surprise

they weren't needed.
Councilman A.E. Silva suggested that the matter be referred to the Library Commission.
"The Commission has already recommended that the BARB be kept in the library and has reaffirmed our book selection policy." Mr. Eorsmantald the council.

cy," Mr. Forsman told the council.
"We should allow our Library
Commission to continue selection
of books," Councilman Walter

Weyman proffered.

There was no dissent on the council and the meeting was quickly adjourned, before anyone from the opposition had a chance to reach the microphone for a rebuttal. "It was a victory for all libraries," Mr. Forsman stated afterward. "Book selection was being used for a political purpose to the detriment of the library."

grade school principal was fired for "immoral conduct" last year after signing an affadavit in support of an arrested pot dealer, Melkon Melkonian. In the affadavit, Mrs. Brennan states that she had smoked grass for 18 years without harmful effects.

Since that time, Mrs. Brennan has been waiting for a court decision on the legality of her dismissal. Last week, Judge Gardiner listened to defense and prosecution arguments for two days, then concluded the hearing by taking the

cluded the hearing by taking the case under submission and asking

the two attorneys to submitbriefs.
Stewart Weinberg, Mrs. Brennan's attorney, maintains that the
State will have to prove that Mrs.

State will have to prove that Mrs. Brennan is guilty of "immoral conduct" or make amends.

To support his argument in denial of the charge, Mr. Weinberg presented the court with a sociologist, a criminologist, a psychiatrist, a minister and a teacher to illustrate that someone who smokes grass isn't necessarily "immoral."

"The prosecution made no re-

"Immoral."

"The prosecution made no rebuttal to these opinions," Mr.
Weinberg told BARB. Instead it
tried to show that teachers have
a tremendous influence on stu-

The defense countered the argument with testimony of another Marin County schoolteacher, David Sedgwick, who stated that the mass media was the greatest influence on today's students.

"As far as we're concerned, the only issue is that of morality," Mr. Weinberg said. "We have a very good chance of winning if the courts stick strictly to that point." The fact that Mrs. Brennan came to the aid of a friend with the possibility of jeopardizing her job is an indication of her moral conviction, Mr Weinberg stated.

The solemnity of the hearing was broken at one point during the trial when Don McCoy of Oampali Ranch entered the courtroom and passed out loaves of bread. Mrs. Brennan has been tutoring the children at the Oampali Commune since early this year.

Digger bread is baked on the ranch every week for free distribution throughout the bay area.

win," Garry said, "We can't lose,"

He explained that neither he nor Newton has any faith in the courts of a white racist society.

"But, in that case, what do you mean, you can't lose?" we asked. "Don't they have Huey in a position where they could kill him?" him?'

"He can't lose because he's "He can't lose because he's a beautiful human being," Garry said. "He can't lose because he understands what's going on, be-cause he doesn't buy the white man's dream."

"You mean, he's not at all worried about his neck?" "No," Garry said, "he's not worried about his neck. He wouldn't

worried about his neck. He wouldn't be a Black Panther if he were worried about his neck. He's not worried about his neck — and neither am I, by the way."

Garry pointed out that Huey Newton is not just a black man being tried in a white court, but "this is a political trial, Huey Newton represents a cause a

being fried in a white court, but "this is a political trial. Huey Newton represents a cause, a cause that throws white racism right into their laps,"

Garry added that he didn't recall ever losing either a jury trial or a political trial, of which he has had many.

Unlike Charles Garry, prosecutor Lowell Jensen, an assistant D.A., is probably feeling grim these days.

So far he has been able to produce three "star" witnesses: Officer Herbert Heanes, whose eyewitness testimony is marred by a "lapse of memory" which leaves him unable to account for one of the two bullets missing from his .38; Dell Ross, allegedly kidnapped by Newton after the October 28 shooting, who frustrated Jensen's questions with a series of appeals to the Fifth Amendment and to "I don't remember"; and bus driver Henry Grier, whose eyewitness account contradicts both his own testimony to the Grand Jury and the testimony of Officer Heanes.

Still missing from the trial are Huey Newton's unidentified companion at the scene of the shooting, the three passengers Grier says

panion at the scene of the shooting. the three passengers Grier says

were on his bus at the time, and

were on his bus at the time, and two handguns the prosecution says were fired that night — the slain Officer John Frey's .38, and a 9 mm. German P-38 they claim was used by Newton.

Medical and autopsy reports show a total of nine bullet wounds in the three men. Evidently five slugs hit Frey, three hit Heanes, and one hit Newton. But the only gun in evidence, Heanes' .38 had only two bullets missing from the chamber, according to the first Oakland police to arrive after the shooting.

chamber, according to the inrst challand police to arrive after the shooting.

Assuming that Heanes gun wasn't reloaded during his "lapse of memory," at least seven bullet wounds came from an unidentified weapon, or weapons.

Heanes testified that he remembers firing only once, although two bullets were missing from his gun. Heanes testified that he held the gun in his left hand when he fired, because he was wounded in his right arm. He said he had never fired a gun with his left hand, and that he is not ambidextrous. He said he fired at Newton while Frey and Newton were grappling, and "I don't know if I hit him (Newton)." ton)."

What did Heanes' bullets actu-ly hit? Newton? Frey? Both?

what did Heanes' buries actu-ally hit? Newton? Frey? Both? Neither? According to ballistics testi-mony produced by the prosecution, neither of the two slugs recovered from bullet wounds was fired from Heanes' .38. If that is true, it proves only that Heanes' gun did not inflict the wound in his own knee or the wound in Frey's lower back.

back.
What it does not prove is the source of the fatal wound made by a slug which, according to the medical testimony, entered Frey's back, went through his lungs, and exited through his chest. That slug is not part of the evidence. Heanes said that after firing one shot, the next thing he knew he was sitting in Frey's squad car.

Another witness, AC Transit bus driver Henry Grier, testi-fied that he watched the shooting

in the illumination of his head-lights from a few feet away. Grier testified that, insequence, Newton turned, then Frey grap-pled with him, then a gun went off and the first shot struck Officer

nand the first shot struck Officer
Heanes.
Heanes testified that, in sequence, he heard a shot, then
saw Frey move towards Newton,
and then received a gunshot in his
own arm. He said he never saw
a gun in Newton's hand.
Grier told the court, "In the
process of the officer (Frey) falling, the gun was fired." While
Frey was going down, he said,
'the guy fired at least two or
three more shots."

In his earlier Grand Jury testimony, Grier described Frey's alleged assailant as "short...
a peewee type," about five feet
tall. Huey Newton is 5' 10", and
155 pounds.

No testimency other than Grier's

No testimony other than Grier's
has placed a full-sized transit
bus with blazing headlights on the
scene at the time of the shooting.
None of the three passengers
alleged to be in Grier's bus has
come forward as a witness.

The prosecution's other star
witness, Dell Ross, first took the
Fifth Amendment. Then, when he
was given immunity against selfincrimination, he said he could
not remember his testimony to
the Grand Jury, could not remember a tape-recorded conversation with defense attorney Garry,
and could not remember what happened on the morning of October
28, 1967. 28, 1967.

He was dismissed.

When assistant D.A. Lowell Jensen opened the prosecution's case, he said the evidence would show that Officer Frey was walking Huey Newton back to Heanes patrol car, and when they reached it

LOW RENT SEVEN GET TOO SWIFT ACTION FOR ONCE

When the jury failed to conwhen the jury failed to con-vict all seven members of a group working for lower rents in the San Francisco Mission District, Sup-erior Court Judge Karesh immed-iately set a new trial date for Mon-day, August 19.

The seven are charged with at-tacking police officers who raided a

tacking police officers who raided a

tacking police officers who raided a private party last year.

The jury dismissed this week by Karesh acquitted one, convicted one, and could reach no decision on the remaining five men. Their final cerdict was reached (or not reached) last Monday, after a three week trial, four days of deliberations, and a cost to the city of over \$10,000.

"This means we won't have adequate legal preparation, or trans-

over \$10,000,

"This means we won't have adequate legal preparation, or transcripts of the last trial, or funds," defendant John Ross told BARB. What's more, Ross pointed out, all the defendants have lost their jobs by now. Their attorney, Sonja Sandeman, who received much notoriety and a contempt of court sentence for protesting Judge Karesh's courtroom tactics, is being threatened personally with eviction.

But Judge Karesh is so eager to get on with the case, Ross told BARB, that he has cancelled his facation to be sure that it is assigned to him. Ross stated that District Attorney Frank Shaw and Karesh publicly agreed in court that the case was a "very important one for the morale of the police department."

Presumably, observed Ross, if the jury is convinced that the police lied and were the attackers rather than the attacked, then the morale of the whole outfit (there

rather than the attacked, then the morale of the whole outfit (there are 1800 men in the SFPD) will

are 1800 men in the SPPD) will go down. In talking with members of the recently dismissed jury, Ross says he found that six believed that the cops involved had lied.

Ross was knocked cold by a police night stick during the invasion. A hung jury left him

hanging.

COUNCIL OILED TUESDAY

The Berkeley City Council was working like a well-oiled machine Tuesday night, and those lucky enough to attend the meeting got a glimpse of real "democracy in action."

Although Berkeley didget a sem-blance of a police review board early in the evening, many other items of importance on the agenda were dismissed without discus-

One such item was another request by the Resistance to close Telegraph Ave. on four consecu-

Telegraph Ave. on four consecutive Saturday nights.

The "democratic" procedure went something like this—
Mayor Johnson: "Next item,"
(Street closing.) "Do I hear a motion for denial?"
"So moved."
"Second."

"Second."
Johnson: "All in favor..."
'Aye."
Johnson: "Opposed..."
Johnson: "Next item."
Almost half of the council's agenda was disposed of in like manner, and it wasn't until the council was on the next item that Councillman Ron Dellums recovered enough to place himself on record as favoring the closing of Telly.

Telly.

Earlier in the evening, before council members became too tired, the four-man council subcommittee read its report on the Harriet Smith case.

Mrs. Smith is the 65-year old black woman who has charged that two Berkeley Brownshirts barged into her home, MACED her, and then assaulted her with a telephone. Both police Chief William Beall

Both police Chief William Beall and City Manager William Hanley have cited one of the two cops, officer Slavin for "improper con-duct."

Slavin has since resigned, but irs. Smith is still charged with

The sub-committee stated that since Mrs. Smith didn't testify --on the advice of her lawyer--no definite finding in the case could

be made.

The subcommittee did submit five recommendations to the council however, the most important of which was request for a permwhich was request for a perm-anent four-man sub-committee to

review conduct of city employees.
Put in the form of a motion,
the proposal carried, with only
John DeBonis dissenting.
The sub-committee will have the

power to subpoena, but, according to City Manager Hanley, can only recommend dismissals. The power to dismiss is granted solely to the city manger.

Other sub-committee recommendations included immediate

mendations included immediate treatment for victims MACED by police, and increased training in social relations for city employ-

ees.
The investigating subcommittee consisted of Councilmen Ron Dellums, William Brown, John De Bonis, and Daniel Dewey.

After opening speeches by Don After opening speecies by Loui Duncan and some newer faces, including Ron Alexander (ex-special Forces), Dennis Steele (ex-fulst Airborne), and Airman First Class Michael Locks, the mike was thrown open. It remained occupied for several hours.

Most of the speakers suggested that servicemen who wished out might become "GFO's"; general fuck-offs. Don't do anything right and they'll get rid of you fast, they said.

Others suggested that anyone facing the military machine simply refuse to accept the psychological killer conditioning. Just be yourself, they said,—an individual—and they'll ease you out fast.

Airman Locks, a Reservist called up for the Pueblo crisis and kept at Hamilton AFB, is organizing a serviceman's union and a serviceman's antiwar march scheduled for Sept, 21st in San Fran-cisco. Locks read his announce-ment from notes he was carry-ing in order not to violate the Air Force's regulations prohibiting free speech,

There were doubtless plenty of agents in the crowd of 500.

Don Duncan advised the ideologues to "cool it" and those with no military experience to "do your homework."

SAN JOSE (LNS)--The "B" in IBM doesn't stand for brotherhood a black San Jose State Psych. grad student learned Wednesday.

was fired from his menial

He was fired from his menial warehouseman's job with the data processing colossus after staging a 17-hour sit-in at the plant manager's office.

Six San Jose cops waited until the local press had gone to bed, then entered the plant at 5AM and wordlessly ushered Raymond Williams from the building.

But he says he's contacting San Jose State Professor Harry Edwards and plans to launch an attack on IBM racism. Edwards initiated the black athlete's boycott of this year's Olympics.

Williams, 24 years old and 8 units from an MA in Psych., had turned out to be a bit too black for the enlightened management of IBM.

of IBM.

For one thing, he'd asked why anyone with a BS degree in Psychology should be slaving in a warehouse.

For another, he'd held a meet-ing at his home with several other brothers who work for IBM. They drew up a tentative list of grievanasking a few embarassing questions.

questions.

Like:

How come black people seldom get promoted at IBM, and has the firm really only been able to find only 253 black people for its work force of 7000, and why is it that black people comprise only 2% of the nationwide corporation's employment.

The day after the meeting, Williams' friends were called one by one into management offices and grilled about it.

"The word was out right after that, that all the brothers at the meeting would be cut, and my

that, that all the brothers at the meeting would be cut, and my name was at the top of the list," Williams told BARB.

Management got so uptight about the meeting that it started a real fuss, he said. "They really created a lot of interest on the part of other black employees who hadn't known about the meeting."

Shortly after that, Williams got a paternalistic lecture from one of his superiors.

of his superiors.

"You know, he told me 'any time my boys have a problem, all they have to do is come see me,' and said how good he was to his maid—that kind of stuff..."

BARB talked to one of the concerned staff of the Parks Dept., Lenore Thompson. "We've been having problems in the park that are a real concern," Lenore said, "the motorcycle clubs, the wine, and the belligerent and obnoxious behavior are beginning to bother a lot of people who use the park regularly."

Lenore told the BARB that although there are only two more weeks left in the present summer program, the "recent incidents" may cause the Park and Recreation Dept. to cancel the program for next summer.

"The Sunday rock band concert in Provo Park," the leaflet states, "which has been in the past a gathering place for people to enjoy and groove on the music, spontaneity and freedom in an openspace area, is now in grave jeopardy of continuing (sic)."

"In the past two months, a series of events have been causal

"In the past two months, a series of events have been causal in changing the free, open and spontaneous climate of the Sunday Happening program."

The leaflet goes on to list some of these "events." "The increase of drinking of large quantities of

of these "events." "The increase of drinking of large quantities of alcoholic beverages (drinking of alcoholic beverages is not permitted in public parks). The brutalization and repeated confrontations by some groups and individuals committed against other individuals, and the abuse of individual freedoms and decency have become an increasing concern."

"There will be ample opportunity to disrupt the Democratic Creep-Follies. There are many reasons to disrupt the Death Gala. If you feel compelled to cavort, then this is action city. There is no reason to wear flowers for masks. If you want to goupagainst the wall, then come."

Despite such warnings, radical theater groups from at least six, cittes (Washington, New Orleans, Minneapolis, New York, Los Angeles and Detroit) have agreed to perform.

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POWER STRUGGLE **AHEAD?**

The likelihood of a power struggle at the National Peace and Freedom Convention this weekend was foreshadowed last week in a tug-of-war at the California P&F state steering committee meeting in San

The steering committee Saturday split 7-7 on a motion to recall and reconstitute the Credentials Committee -- the body that will decide who can vote at the National Convention.

Behind the conflict is the allegation that retired executives.

gation that national organizing and planning for the convention is over-loaded with supporters of Eldridge Cleaver's P&F Presidential candidacy.

didacy.

Each roll-call vote at the Saturday meeting resulted in a nearly-even split. The clear pattern of the division was Alameda (Berkeley) and San Francisco counties versus Los Angeles and the small counties of Northern California.

While delegates to the August 17-18 National Convention in Ann Arbor express hope that a united, nationwide party will be born this weekend, many anticipate a pitched battle at the start, over the seating of voting participants from groups from several states.

The key issue is expected to be

The key issue is expected to be whether or not the organizations are "independent" of the Democratic Party. A letter sent to groups around the country lists one criterion for voting participa-tion as "commitment to the devel-opment of a political party which is completely independent at all levels from other political par-ties."

Only California, New York, and Michigan are initially presumed to fulfill all the criteria. All groups

Michigan are initially presumed to fulfill all the criteria, All groups from any other states asking to be voting members will be evaluated by the credentials committee.

Other states with organizations on the "National Contact List" for P&F are Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Utah, Rhode Island, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

Although the California steering committee on Saturday did not oust the credentials committee, they filled the one vacancy on that committee with Les Aisenman, a member of the Dick Gregory Caucus.

cus.
Originally, the California steering committee had adopted a rule that only one organization per state could be credentialed as a voting participant in the National P&F Convention.
Three weeks ago the steering committee reversed itself, deciding to allow more than one voting group per state. Two weeks ago the steering committee re-established the one-organization-perlished the one-organization-perstate rule.

Last Saturday a motion to re-verse that decision once again failed by a tied vote, Voting par-ticipation at the national conven-

ticipation at the national conven-tion will be limited to one organi-zation per state.

Because much of this pendulum action was created by separate, poorly-attended state steering committee meetings in LA and SF, the meeting last Saturday decided to establish a quorum -- 13 of its 25 members -- and to require 48 hours notice of the high-level P&F sessions,

sessions.
Since the California delegation of 71 familiar activists is expected to be the dominant force at the National Convention in Ann Arbor this weekend, the political infight-

this weekend, the political infighting customary here can be expected to shape the convention, both on and off the floor.

One built-in safety valve which may help keep the party together is that the decision of the National P&F Convention -- their selection of a candidate -- is not binding on the state organizations.

BARB's reporter at the Ann Arbor convention will be Stu Albert, Berkeley activist who last year transmigrated to New York.

CHICANOS RILED

ANGELS RAISE HELL

At midnight August 9th, approxi-mately 25 to 30 Hells Angels attacked La Cueva Mexican Kitch-en, 5802 Foothill Blvd, in Oakland.

en, 5802 Foothill Blvd, in Oakland.
They entered through the front, side and back doors simultaneously, beating the customers and employees with chains, pipes, clubs and even La Cueva's telephone (which they ripped out), according to eyewitnesses.

Twenty people were treated at the Highland Hospital Emergency Room for wounds ranging from bruises to serious cuts requiring, several stiches. Five were kept overnight and released in the morning.

overnight and released in the morning.

The damage to the restaurant is estimated _ at almost \$2,000. Windows, mirrors, heat lamps, tables and juke boxes were broken. The Oakland Police classified the incident as a riot, and warrants have been issued for the arrest of the Angels who have been identified. By press time, four Hells Angels had been arrested. There were around 100 people in La Cueva when the attack took place. Chicanos in the restaurant defended themselves and their familes valiantly, witnesses reported. ported.

Within four minutes the Angels retreated out to the sidewalk, where the fight continued for another four or five minutes. Two Angels were badly beaten and wait-

Angels were badly beaten and waiting for the police who arrived about five minutes after the fight was over. Another Angel was found in an empty lot a block away where he had crawled to escape. In spite of professed knowledge of Angel activities and locations of their main hide-outs by the OPD, chicano community spokesmen had some serious misglvings about the OPD's efforts to protect the owner of La Cueva, and to capture the Hells Angels responsible.

capture the Hells Angels responsible.

Tony Rodarte, La Cueva's owner, was able to talk to some of the Angels afterwards. They claimed, he said, that last Friday afternoon two chicanos beat up an Angel who was walking alone. When they heard about it they decided to "get" the two chicanos. "In the last year and a half that the Hells Angels have come into my place to eat," Tony said, "I have never seen one of them alone, so I don't believe that's the real reason.

"Another thing, when they entered the restaurant they didn't ask anybody anything about the chicanos who beat up their buddy, they just entered and started beating

just entered and started beating up everybody. They ripped out the telephone and started smashing things. If all they wanted was to get two chicanos they wouldn't have acted like that."

At press time, this reporter

view with him.

"I told him the problem was not a specific one, but a general one of discrimination, And I complained about printed ethnic jokes that are passed around the plant."
Watson, head of one of the world's most powerful corporations, said "there's nothing I can do about that," according to Williams.

"I told him there's a lot you can do about that, He said he thought it was a petty problem and I told him it wasn't and that and I told him it wasn't and that if he can keep employees from pringing in their girlie pictures, he ought to be able to keep our a few ethnic jokes."

The meeting didn't get anywhere, and it didn't get Williams out of the warehouse.

He started with the corporation two years ago while studying at

two years ago while studying at State. The first job was a good

one, with the Industrial Design department's Human Factors division.

Later another student worker was hired. He and Williams compared paychecks, and discovered Williams was on the short end of the stick by about \$40 a month.

"I pointed it out to management that he was making more than other department, and that me was making more than other departments but Personnel me for the same work, and they said 'sorry about that.' My paycheck was corrected but I never would have found out about it if it hadn't been for the other guy."

Newton turned quickly and shot Frey, who then grappled with him. Then, Jensen said in his opening statement, Newton took Frey's gun and shot him again, and as Frey fell, Jensen said, Newton fired the fatal shot into Frey's back. Then, Jensen said, Newton fired on Officer Heanes, who was wounded in the arm, chest, and knee, but was able to switch his revolver to his left hand and shot Huey Néwton in the stomach.

Jensen's version, any reading will show, doesn't fit with the testimony of either Officer Heanes or bus driver Grier.

Asked by BARB what he expected the outcome of his hearing might be, Bergess could only answer. "I don't think they're going to put me back to work."

Newton driving.

Huey Newton, who founded the Black Panther Party, known not only for its advocacy of armed self-defense, but also for its advocacy of 'no spontaneous riots' and for working to keep the Oakland black community calm while other ghettos are having their revolts crushed by the militia.

Huey Newton, who views encounters with the police with a cool political appraisal, and who, on October 28, 1967, reached for a lawbook when he was arrested by Frey.

lawbook when he was arrested by Frey.

This is what the prosecution wants the jury to believe:
That Huey Newton, Minister of Defense of the Black Panther Party, was arrested but not frisked immediately upon getting out of the car he was in.

That, as he reached the rear police car, he drew a gun, spun around, and fired point-blank at Officer Frey, but at best shot him through the shoulder, through the thigh, and grazed his right arm.

him through the shoulder, through the thigh, and grazed his right arm.

That he then disarmed Frey during a tussle and shot Frey with his own gun.

That at some undetermined time during this struggle Newton also shot Officer Heanes three times from a distance of not less than two full car-lengths.

That Officer Frey, having been wounded by Newton only in the shoulder, thigh, and arm, suddenly fell down face foward, at which moment Newton fired two shots into his back.

That the wounded Officer Heanes, firing a gun -- twice -- for the first time in his life with his left hand, was able to shoot Newton in the stomach and completely miss Frey while Newton and Frey were grappling.

That Huey Newton was able to shoot two armed Oakland policemen a total of eight times, while both officers shot him only once.

That Newton would kill Frey and then ignore Heanes while Heanes was in the midst of a "lapse of memory."

With such witnesses, such evidence, such a case being offered by the D.A.'s office, it is no surprise that Huey Newton says, "I am very anxious to testify" -- even in a court he knows as white racist.





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CONS READY GIG--TO GO DOWN WITH SAN Q

San Quentin convicts won't wait
forever. They are now watching
Sacramento for signs of a legislative investigation into the prison system, especially into the arbitrary power of the Adult Authority.

Not all of the cons are patient.

If the legislators fail to act soon, some cons are ready to act. Even before the peaceful August 3 Unity Day at San Quentin, it was widely known that men inside have access to gasoline and other potential

eapons.

A man who identified himself as a recent parolee from San Quentin came to the BARB offices Wednes-He talked the language of the

came to the BARB offices Wednesday. He talked the language of the men inside,
"They (the convicts) are going to try the legislature just one more time," he said, "and then they're going to go down with the joint."
"What will they do?"
"They're ready to burn it," he answered.
He said men who put out "The

"They're ready to burn it," he answered.

He said men who put out "The Outlaw," San Quentin's contraband paper, asked him to bring a message to BARB,

"What's needed is cold-blooded support from outside," he said. "If somebody can go to Sacramento, that is where it has to be. Go to Building Number One—that's where both the Adult Authority and the chief of the CDC (California Department of Corrections) are—and do in Sacramento what you did on February 14th,

"Do it in Sacramento what you did on February 14th,

"Do it in Sacramento instead of at Q. Going to Q is not going to do any good,"

Twice this year, in February and early August, San Quentin inmates called successful nonviolent demonstrations, with visible black brown and white support

and early August, San Quentin inmates called successful nonviount demonstrations, with visible black, brown and white support outside the walls. Each time "The Outlaw" urged the inmates to stay cool, so their eager custodians could not label them "mad dogs." What they demand is a legislative inquiry. So far they have seen no stirrings in that state capital to convince them that their voice has been noticed.

Support outside has been only a token of what it could be, despite

token of what it could be, despite the fact that so many people active in the movement may soon find themselves locked behind the same

themselves locked behind the same walls with the other cons.
Felony raps now face dozens of activists in the Oakland Induction Center and Fairmont demonstrations, the Battle of Berkeley, the Black Panthers, the LA Chicano leaders, and countless people charged with holding grass.

Any person active against the war or against the draft, any person active in the minority liberation struggle, any person with

eration struggle, any person with long hair or a beard or beads or sandals could swiftly become a con, asking for the same things they now seek.

He is Elvin Hodges, a founder of the Group to Industrialize the

Ghetto.

He tells how GIG ("job" dig) grew from after-hours discussion

grew from after-hours discussion in a weight-lifting class.

In just four months it has become an awesomely successful amalgam of Black-Chetto-Socialist-Capitalism, if you can dig it. "We started out really radical and I'm not ashamed of it," says Hodges. Every year 65,000 jobs are available in Oakland, yet 22,000 city dwellers, mostly black, remain out of work. This fact and the reasons behind it fired the earliest demands of these weightearliest demands of these weight-lifting shakers and movers. "We demanded 25% employment

from local industry or we'd burn 'em.down," Hodges recalled, "And we were prepared to."
Hodge sees two ways to revolution, with a gun or...with a pen-

Hodge sees two ways to revolution, with a gun or...with a pencil.

"The papers keep saying what radical groups of Blacks want is to take over the country but that's bullshit," he says. "We wouldn't WANT to have this country even if we could take it over."

What Hodges insists on is the basic demand that men exercise control over their own lives. And that means control over their communities and their economies.

Here's how Liberation Capitalism — that is, GIG — secures this control. Like, GIG leases a printing shop, hires ghetto blacks and turns a profit. The profit, however, is reinvested TOTALLY in further creation of more ghetto—owned and operated business. Non—profit capitalism, its goal, is now "economic development not economic destruction, although that always remains a last resort," Hodges points out.

After four months of activity.

After four months of activity, in addition to the printing shop, GIG now mans a fleet of "mobile co-op" trucks, operates a catering service and contracts to maintain vehicles for Pacific Telephone where a GIG car-wash station has been created. Hodges expressed distaste for

been created.
Hodges expressed distaste for the insitutions of "manual work for menial pay." "If we can't pay a man more than Whitey does we won't hire him." Hodges points out that GIG runs the only carwash whose employees earn \$2.75

out that GIG runs the only carwash whose employees earn \$2.75 to \$3.00 an hour.

Luther Smith walks in and announces he will acquire enough lumber and paint to keep a crew of GIG workers busy for two days refurbishing the ghetto storefront GIG is turning to a grocery. After the grocery store has opened GIG will turn its attention to opening a restaurant. restaurant.

they now seek.

Until a radical change is made, the Adult Authority can play cat and mouse with the life of every inmate throughout the duration of the maximum sentence set by law.

What the inmates want from the people on the streets is political heat on the legislature—letters now, and thousands of bodies in Sacramento when the time comes. The cons have tried peaceful protest, and tried it again. The legislators are the ones who now have a firm grip on the match.

A job placement service whih GIG runs as a sideline has a better employee record than many established personnel agencies and has placed people with Pacific Telephone, Standard Oil and the Lawrence Rad Lab at Livermore. GIG provides references and apprentice training at good wages.

GIG has a man touring the state's correctional institutions informing inmates that if they need work when they are released GIG doesn't give a hoot if a man's got a criminal record, "we take a man at his word and keep him or cut him loose on performance,"

Fifty people had gathered at the Friends Meeting House in support of Wilson. Most did not know Mark personally. Some were hip looking

personally. Some were hip looking young people, others were old ma-trons and men in business suits. The people worshipped in silence.

"We felt the whole meeting was called in order to rally forces which are oppressing the black community because of our stand at the city council over the Harriet Smith case," Bobby told BARB. The Berkeley Boycott Committee, consisting of 500 members of the black community, is preparing to talk to merchants individually and explain its demands.

Those who won't endorse the demands will be boycotted in the coming weeks.

"We're going to let them know,"

contributed to help Drummond gain his freedom.

Lincoln's case is more than just a random instance of police absurdity. It has been apparent to those following it that the DA and others want to make an example out of Drummond.

This means, they feel, that the community has to make the case an example to the "authorities."

Every person considering him-

an example to the "authorities." Every person considering himself a revolutionary, a humanist, or a citizen should offer to help however he best can.

Fortunately, John Escovito, a lawyer in Charles Garry's firm, has agreed to help with the defense, But defense is more than legal maneuverings; experience shows that only a sustained public uproar over the case can assure the least amenities of justice for the accused. the accused.

Ten thousand dollars in property bond is needed; students are needed to help in fund-raising on campus; money is needed not only to purchase the ball bond but to

¿BANDIDOS O GUERRILLEROS?

INTRODUCTION

In 1967 the state capital of Guerrero in Mexico, Chilpancingo, was the scene of the massacre of approximately 60 peasants-men and women who had gathered to protest the increasing control over their lives by local landlords, real-estate agents and politicians. A teacher from a agents and politicians. A teacher from a rural area, Genaro Vazquez Rojas, had been working with the peasants and organizing them to demand other rights. Being one of the leaders of the Movimiento Civico Guerrerense, he was jailed for inciting to rebellion. Early in May, 1968, the press in its sensationalistic manner covered the story of Genaro's escape from prison. escape from prison.

While being transported from prison to a dentist due to an alleged toothache, he was freed by his men after a short struggle with the police force in which several policemen were killed, and fled to the Guerrero Sierra. Ever since, Genaro and his men have been constantly on the move throughout the jungle setting up the first guerrilla focus since the short-lasting unit of Gamiz in the state of Chihuahua in 1966. Both government and state forces have unsuccessfully tried to capture or finish Genaro's movement. Meanwhile, the press has been trying to fool public opinion into thinking that Genaro and his men are merely bandits. Twice his guerrillas have hit army garrison outposts in order to capture weapons Twice, the press has tried to obscure the true nature of Genaro's movement.

A letter was written by Genaro to the national press and the major newspapers explaining the reasons for his actions. The press has obviously kept this letter from appearing and spreading the news of the newly formed guerrilla movement. The reason for this apparently is to protect the national and international economic interests of those involved in the 1968 Olympic games to be held in Mexico in October. Also, there's the desire to pre-

it "subversive" ideas from spreading.
We feel that it is our duty to provide the letter and information that, hereto-fore, has been denied to the public by an international imperialistic press.

Dear Mr. Editor: Respectfully I address myself to you and keep you from your various duties to present the following matters:

resent the following matters:

Knowing your concern for important information and your desire to present the public with the true incidents occurring in the country. I want to express some opinions on what has been called my "escape" from Iguala (state of Guerrero) prison prepared by "outlaws" as the establishment press has been calling my harches; is structed when seed a set is they brothers-in-struggle who took part in that

For those who fight for progress, members of the Civic Movement (Movimiento Civico) which I represent, the adjectives used to describe us do not surprise us. We know that the same words were used against those who fought for the independence of our people. Only the desire to objectively explain the truth of the facts motivates me to write these lines and to kindly ask you to enter them in

and to kindly ask you to enter them in your famous newspaper.

First of all, the anti-popular and genocidal conduct of the Governor of Guerrero State, Raymundo Abarca, is well known; also our people know the true reasons, all of which are obviously arbitrary, for my imprisonment in the jail of Iguala. Also well known is the fact that numerous sectors of the Guerrero population and other progressive forces pro-

of Iguala. Also well known is the fact that numerous sectors of the Guerrero population and other progressive forces protested my imprisonment by which my constitutional rights were stepped upon and the demands for better living conditions and progress for the people of Guerrero state were drowned.

It is unjust and false to classify as "outlaws and trigger-happy gunmen" the true sons of the people, my contrades who planned and executed my escape, an act by which they did nothing but restore my legal and constitutional rights, knowing the unjust and illegal reasons for my imprisonment.

The people of Guerrero and Mexico. Now our reasons for fighting: we fight to solve the fundamental problems which have gravely accumulated, harming the popular working majorities in Guerrero and Mexico. It is known that in spite of the fairness and legal status of our demands to the government, it, far from attending to them favorably, has added its support to the repressive forces which attending to them favorably, has added its support to the repressive forces which have brutally suppressed the voices of the

people during the Abarca-Mirand govern-mental period[1]. This has forced us to fight against the unwillingness of the government to listen and the desire to keep the whole state outside the political arena by use of its oligarchic and anti-popular methods which are responsible for the instability and political chaos in

Guerrero state.

The fight for the political and social the light for the pointed and social transformation in benefit of the people in the state and the country a fight corresponding to the dramatic reality imposed upon us by an oligarchy of big capitalists and feudal land owners, allies of Yankee

and feudal land owners, allies of Yankee imperialism which for many years has governed us, trying to create an illusion of political and economic independence through its demagogy and "revolutionary" mask[2].

Roque Salgado Ochoa and Filberto Solis Morales are martyrs of the social struggle which the people are waging against the oligarchy and imperialism. Their honest conduct as conscientious citizens prove this. The first, a teacher, and the second, a drop-out student from the National Teachers' School. In their struggle for the restitution of the rights of the people, these are nothing of "outstruggle for the restitution of the rights of the people, these are nothing of "outlaws" or "bandits" as they are falsely classified by the official newspapers. They were, up to the ambush set up against us by the army at Icatepec where they lost their lives, true and honest fighters for the liberty and rights of the people. Likewise we affirm these qualities in our contrade Zeferino Contreras, an honest peasant and another member of our organization who was detained and kidnapped at the prison of the 35th Military Zone where he was tortured brutally to force him to make declarations of guilt or invented accusations.

Certainly we deplore our confronts

tions of guilt or invented accusations.

Certainly we deplore our confrontations with the army and police forces since we know that both the army and police are made up of poor people from the country and cities. But, unfortunately, these forces are the executors of criminal repression which is perpetuated against the people by the governing oligarchy of the state of Guerrero.

These opinions which try to explain our position and conduct, constitute the true cause and context of the Federal Government's ferrocious efforts to perse-

cute and repress the noble people of Guerrero by use of terror, and to have these people denounce and turn in those democratic fighters who are led by me.

The Government's efforts have been

sterile because of the enormous revolu-tionary qualities of the people of Guerrero who have given us their friendship and confidence, being conscious that we who fight for their rights and neither bandits nor outlaws as the Government's publicity would like us to appear.

Our struggle has its roots and inspira-tion in the history and the actual reality of our country; our banner is the same one which Hidalgo, Morelos and Guer-rero, Juarez and Zapata once fought for. That is, we want an authentic Land Reform, the expropriation of companies owned by foreigners and national oligarchy who exploit our natural riches, the restitution and broadening of the rights of the worker and a government truly of the people which serves only the people's interests.

This is the context of our struggle, If we fall in the struggle, let us welcome death because we will die honestly foldeath because we will die nonestly fol-lowing our social responsibilities and fol-lowing the example set for the young generation by our fallen comrades Roque Salgado Ochoa, Filberto Solis Morales and many other revolutionaries who have fallen in the struggle for national libera-tion. Because we know that the cause we fight for, the cause of every true Mexican who loves his country, will never die and finally, by the effort of the people will

emerge victorious.

Finally, we salute the democratic and revolutionary forces of Mexico. We repeat our decision to integrate with them and struggle together with all honest and justice-loving Mexicans for the progress and liberation of Mexico.

MEXICO CITY (UPS), August 2 --A united struggle of students and faculty has gained momentum. At a general meeting of the University community on Wednesday some community on wednesday some 30,000 or more students were told that the army had beaten the rector of the university preparatory schools in its invasion, that students had been bayonetted, and that many were killed.

The faculty announced that all

that many were killed.

The faculty announced that all professors would resign if the Army took the University proper.
Fighting continued Wednesday night with the army and special police in downtown Mexico City.
Newspapers have printed photographs of empty machine gun belts, and observers report that more students and onlookers were killed and wounded.

Meanwhile all else in the city continues as if nothing were happening, except that the American

Embassy is under heavy pro-

Thursday's mass demonstration was controlled by University higher-ups. (The rector is a political appointee). Consequently, an immediate split between the cal appointee). Consequently, an immediate split between the leadership and the majority of students developed when the army gave permission for the march to go a third of the way downtown, the students wishing to defy the limitation and march to the government that we would be found to be supported by the students with the students w

limitation and march to the govern-ment center, where much of the fighting had taken place.
Possibly a hundred thousand stu-dents marched Thursday, chanting such things as "Unite the People," "Special Police -- Assassins," and "To the Zocalo."
But the leaders prevailed, and the largest demonstration that Mexico has seen returned peace-fully to the University. while tanks fully to the University, while tanks sat ready for action in the down-

TO SAVE TWO LIVES

MEXICO CITY (UNS) -- Two exicans, an artist and a pro-Mexico on a crist and a pro-fessor of economics, are appeal-ing to the international community of "intellectuals and artists" to help save their lives. Both have been in a Guatemalan

Both have been in a Guatemalan prision for over four months, subject to frequent physical tortures and attempts at their lives.
The victims, Carlos Jurado Delmar, a Mexican artist, and Carlos Perzabal, professor of economics in the National University of Mexico, have also appealed to the United Nations Commission for Human Rights.

Human Rights.

They relate how they had scarely crossed the border of Guatemala, erossed the border of Guatemala, enroute to Salvador and Honduras, when they "were violently arrested by members of the Guatemalan Army in a place called El Cable, just four kilometers (2-1/2 miles) from the Mexican border."

They were then taken to a place They were then taken to a place called Buenos Aires where "we were held for the night and subjected to physical and mental tortures." The next day a Guatemalan Air Force plane flew them to the capital of the country, where they are now imprisoned and "also subject to physical and mental tortures that are endangering our

town area.

Thursday night 80 people were arrested in their homes allegedly for participating in the "con-

spiracy."

This morning the earth shook strongly for several minutes, but it was the gods, not the revolution.

The prisoners wrote friends that on July 30 their captors tried to kill them. To save their lives these friends are asking the international community of "intellectuals and artists" to send telegrams or letters to Sr. Hector Mancella Pinto, Ministro de Mancella Pinto, Ministro de Gobernacion, Palacio de Gobierno, Guatemala, Guatemala -- request-ing their immediate liberty and placing the responsibility for their lives on the Guatemalan govern-

In the plea to the United Nations, the prisoners point out that the Guatemalan government is holding them for trial with the "deliberate purpose of covering up their own error."

"So obvious is the error," tinues the plea, "that in spite of the fact that our detention took place on April 13, as can easily be proved by witnesses who were present and the fact that we were held from that time in prison, the neld from that time in prison, the Guatemalan government accuses us of having been arrested on the seventeenth of the same month in the streets of the city 'distributing subversive propaganda',''

Since April 26, both men have been in a "concentration camp" where the prisoners' lives and "the violence to which prisoners are subjected are shocking as can be easily proved to the Com-mission for Human Rights."

BARB's informant points out that it is impossible to ask help from the Mexican government be-cause of the current political situ-

ation in Mexico, where a "witch hunt" is taking place so that "our intellectuals are afraid of their own shadows."

own shadows."
In addition, the painter Carlos Jurado has been branded in Mexico as a nonconfor mist (currently translated to anti-government and even communist, according to BARB's informant).
Some news of the prisoner's situation has infiltrated the Mexican press, but their supporters consider an international campaign to free them "of utmost importance." Appeals are also being made in Europe through the underground press there. the underground press there,

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

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
