CZECH CRISIS TALK LAST WEEK JUST A DRAG!

"Frankly, I was bored."
That was the way a young girl described the discussion on the Czech crisis Friday night at Finn Hall held by Friends of the People's World.
"I'm 15 years old," she told the audience of nearly 100 people (mostly over 40). "I am interested in Communism. But the way you explained it, I'm confused. The young people are up on the street (Telegraph)."
The "explainers" were Miss Dorothy Healy, of the LA Communist Party, and William Mandel, author and Russian expert.
The 15 year old girl's remarks were directed to Mandel.
It was unfortunate that the speakers were such a bore, quoting endlessly from Marx, Engels, Stalin, and Mandel, because they had a lot to say, especially Miss Healy.
She pointed out that "this is my position—not the Party's", leaving hanging in air what in the hell the Communist Party's position on the crisis was.

There was no confusion over what her (and Mandel's) position was vis a vis the USSR and the Czechs: the Russians were clearly out of order (it took paragraph after paragraph of dreary quotes to arrive at this point, hence, of course, the young girl's comment).
This reporter brought two students from the East Coast to the meeting. They were quite impressed by Mandel, however, especially when he showed up in a blouse and beads in protest over the banning of some Czech hippies from the World Youth Festival by the Bulgarian government (also banned were hippy youth from Holland, Belgium, UK, Denmark, Iran).

Miss Healy presented the role of ex President Novotny as a "non-personality" (a Czech quote), detailing error after error of his regime. She remained silent, however, over the USSR's insistence on keeping this non-personality in power.

This reporter questioned her silence. "I am not sure they want-

ed him," she replied. (Note: it was precisely his end that triggered the crisis).

"Did they ever express any feeling about Novotny before he was dumped by the Czech people?" I then asked.

"If they did, the world never knew about it," was her answer.

Miss Healy felt that the 14 communist nations have the right to determine their own roles, a point that seems to be open to question in other sections of the communist world, especially New York, who apparently feels Czechoslovakia is another Hungary.

Mandel quoted from the critical writings of a Czech CP leader who is now being slandered "by the Novotny gang as a Jew." Mandel said he "managed to survive under the Nazi's" after being arrested during WW II.

"Will he still survive?" Interrupted.

"I think he will," replied Mandel.

The students asked Dubcek "how do we know the Stalinists won't come back?" and he answered with "you are the proof."

THE MOON IS UP

The struggle in Czechoslovakia may have to be a nonviolent struggle. If they can pull it off it will make history.

The Red Army has walked in unopposed. Hungary has taught the Czechs (hopefully) that you can't go right out and shoo the tanks out.

The Czechs are, from every indication, strongly united. The potential collaborators have been identified during their revolution of a few months back.

There have been some indications of preparation. Many Czech radio stations had built alternate clandestine broadcasting facilities so that when the soldiers took over the transmitters they found the air still full of defiance.

The model of wartime nonviolent resistance is in the Danish example of World War Two. True, they did not throw the Nazis out, but they did evacuate the Jews and pull off a threatening general strike.

In Denmark the Nazis did not imprison the King and he thus served to rally and unite the populace. Will General Svoboda, Czech President and a wartime hero, be accorded kid-gloves treatment by the Russians? It is too early to tell, though perhaps by the time this hits the street the issue may be determined.

The street fighting in Prague cannot last. It can, as a confrontation, serve to unify the people further, if they still need it.

A general strike remains a good possibility. But it cannot last forever, since the people would be the first to suffer.

The job of the Czech people should be to make the position of the invading armies untenable. There are lots of clandestine ways to do this, but the most effective in light of the Russian propaganda line would be massive, public nonviolent demonstrations.

It may sound strange for BARB's Military Editor to advocate nonviolent resistance, but I advocate

it only because it seems as if it would work.

Advocates of nonviolence have constructed scenarios of nonviolent national resistance, but these have always seemed to assume a far greater degree of unity among the invaded than seemed possible.

Only a Czech would know for sure, but from here it seems as if the right kind of unity is prevalent in Czechoslovakia now.

Every Czech who sells an apple to the invaders willingly must be ostracized (though with opportunity for redemption). No enemy soldier must be made to feel welcome. If a soldier can be used to help the eventual withdrawal, then he may be dealt with.

Otherwise, the gap between the invaders and the invaded must be made as wide and as deep as the generation gap.

In the broader analysis, that's where it's all at. The revolution

isn't black against white, Communist against Anticom--it's people against apparatchiks (Czech word for Establishment bureaucrat).

And that very often breaks down along generational lines.

What's Czech for "Up against the wall, motherfuckers"?

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CZECH BANG JUST LATEST BY THE GANG

The gang-bang of peoples goes on...

Prague is occupied by Prussian Russians, Chicago by the National Guard, and Saigon by the US Army.

"Our men are trained to react violently to violence, and they did." Who said that, Mayor Alioto or a US Army officer? Where was the statement made, in the San Francisco Mission district or in the Mekong Delta?

"Machine-gun and small arms fire crashed and rattled through the night--street fighting left some dead and wounded as thousands surged into the streets and shouted defiance of the invaders."

Where did this take place -- Saigon? Prague? Chicago? Watts? You name it, man--sooner or later it's YOUR Telegraph avenue.

What was considered by "experts" on the Soviet Union, from the People's World to William Mandel, as "Warsaw Pact maneuvers", turned out to be the real thing.

The Warsaw Pact Powers are "maneuvering" INSIDE Czechoslovakia this time--for keeps. They are even bringing their own President with them, the much-hated "non-personality", Antonin Novotny.

Why did Russia blow it? The US and the USSR were "getting closer," as the saying goes. McCarthy, McGovern, Kennedy all felt that Russia was being "reasonable." Now the doves are fucked by the hawks, with the Red Army leading the gang-bang.

It is rather curious that most of the Russian leaders had to be "called back from their vacations." Who called them back? If such a momentous decision had been made before their vacation,

is this the time to take a dip in the Black Sea?

Sgt Pepper (and a student hitchhiker he picked up) feel that the Red Army hawks pulled a fast one on the top Soviet leadership.

The Air Force (or Pentagon) has done much the same with Pres Johnson, notably at the time of Kosygin in London with Wilson. They ALMOST had a bombing-halt then we hit downtown Hanoi, causing one official to say, "We've lost control."

(Note: this is now out in a book, title forgotten at the moment).

A clue to what is happening over Czechoslovakia may be found in the ending of the war in Vietnam. The Russian hawks want to keep it going, apparently.

Last week, Sgt Pepper said "the war is over." This week Elliot Roosevelt said "I anticipate that a spontaneous draft will arise (at the Demo convention) demanding the renomination of President Johnson. Faced with the factors of reuniting the party and that he is the only solidifying force, the President will place the country and party ahead of himself."

All this, said Roosevelt, will "stem from the announcement of a cease fire."

All this business, too, in Czechoslovakia stems from this pending announcement, Sgt Pepper feels. For as sure as God made little green apples, LBJ has had the "cease-fire" ploy to win the election pulled out from under him.

Our President now has absolutely no program. Nixon has it all, while McCarthy et al is pushing a doorbell on some disputed barricade that no longer exists.

Meanwhile, back at OUR invasion, our head-dealer in the crap game of peace, Ambassador W. Averell Harriman, rolls more loaded dice. While we say one thing in Saigon, he says another in Paris.

The US Mission in Saigon gives out with civilians killed since Jan 1 as 2818, wounded 6164, and kidnapped 4642. The US Mission in Paris gives out with 8,000 killed, 20,000 wounded, and 6,000 abducted.

"This discrepancy worries some US diplomats. And other sympathetic observers have been equally disturbed. To them it appears that the US government is basing policy positions on statistical foundations of dubious validity."

He noted that almost every country sending troops into Czechoslovakia had had some revolt in the near past.

"We are going to be like a

bomb ticking away and the cops and convention people are going to pull our fuse any way they can," said another traveller.

The Berkeley Yippies very strongly urge that all Berkeley people get together as a group as soon as they get to Chicago to make common plans, and to communicate to the National movement

which will be assembled in the stockyard city, where Berkeley is at.

"The people running that convention aren't going to like us one bit," said one expectant traveller at the Yippie table.

Why go, in spite of the threatening vibrations? Most organizers agree that the most promising development in Chicago will be the communication which takes place between all segments of the national movement: Hippies, Yippies, radicals of all stripes coalesced into the National Mobilization Committee, McCarthy liberals who come despite their leaders disavowal, all will be thrown together into an uptight revolutionary situation.

HOW TO GET YOUR OWN

Hippies, gypsies, and wanderers, at long last, get welfare payments in San Francisco.

Until April 19, you had to be a resident of California for one year continuously before receiving aid, which knocked out most hippies and students. Then a federal court injunction stopped such discrimination. Now just being physically in the area is enough.

The injunction will be reviewed by the U.S. Supreme Court, and meantime the cash flows. Most new applicants are between 18 and 25 years old.

The General Assistance (social services) Office for San Francisco city and county, at 585 Bush Street, handles well over a hundred cafes every day and claims to be short of funds.

Welfare boss Ronald Bern complains relief payments to non-residents will cost the city an extra quarter of a million dollars by the

end of September. Mrs. John M. Douglas, a welfare commissioner, charges "90 per cent of those people who are coming in without residence requirements and applying for assistance are hippies." Rumors of impending crackdown swirl among young liberal welfare workers, many of whom wear beards.

If you want to apply for welfare, please remember that it is not given out merely because you have no money and no job. You must prove you are UNABLE to get and hold a job. Like, you're recovering slowly from hepatitis. Or, you're crazy. Or pregnant.

Three types of welfare aid can be sought by hip applicants: General Relief, the lowest level, is easiest to get and consists merely of rent and food orders and a few bus tickets; no cash to speak of. AFD, Aid to the Totally Disabled, is very hard to get, but pays

up to \$185 a month for a single man.

Chicks who are pregnant or have kids can always get AFDC, Aid to Families with Dependent Children -- but the chick must live in a manless pad, and the State will try to hunt down the child's father (if known). A pregnant hippie girl may find it convenient to "not know" who the father is.

Broke, hungry, and crashless kids are sent to private agencies and the Salvation Army for help. Very few "hippies" apply for assistance according to SF Supervisor Brown.

Instead, the increase seems to consist mostly of young disillusioned people fresh on the scene, who are given the choice of getting a job or going back to where they came. Brown also stated that the social workers contact the parents of all single persons under 21 before assistance is given.

CLEAN HOME DOPE NEWS

Now -- you can read all the local dope news in your "clean home paper".

The Berkeley Daily Gazette, a minor daily, has at last begun to report the Berkeley dealing scene. Their first try was a little clumsy, though.

Red Scare headlines (which the Gavotte carries every issue) proclaimed that "Visitors" had been "robbed of \$2400" by dirty filthy hippie dope dealers.

Reading the article, the spectator is struck by the fact that the "visitors" were two "young out-of-town businessmen" from Oregon and Washington.

They were carrying \$2400 cash. They responded to an offer of a kilo of grass and were ripped off (square translation -- had their money stolen).

Perhaps the Law and Order Brigade will get up a campaign to stop unjust grass practices which spoil our tourist trade.

In the same paper, interestingly enough, is a short story on the conviction of a would-be grass dealer in Cleveland.

It seemed that he had sold some stuff that was not grass to the narks. He was convicted because both parties thought the stuff was real. 20 to 40 years was the sentence.

Does this mean that the intrepid pair who got ripped were in violation of the law for thinking they were going to get some grass? What if they had just gotten burned and been sold some jimsonweed? Would they have been thrown in the jug for twenty years anyway? What will this do to the tourist trade??

Hopefully the Gas Jet will use its great influence to drum up support for supervision of the local grass trade by the Chamber of Commerce. Unreasonable ripping practices in the private sector and Thought Control legislation in government must be moderated! Law and Order Forever! L.F.

FOOD SPOILERS GROSS BILLIONS LOSE MILLIONS

The anarchy of the market-place continues unabated--with sales in the BILLIONS, leading supermarkets of America continue to report LESS earnings.

One reason for this can be observed locally at University and Grove where a gas-station gives QUINTUPLE (five times) blue-chip stamps when you buy gas.

Consider: first, there were no stamps. Then, stamps were issued. Naturally, some brain comes up with giving TWO stamps instead of one. Then, three--then, four--and now--FIVE stamps instead of one.

Free enterprise is driving itself into bankruptcy.

Meanwhile, back at the check-stand, things are tough. The SF Chronicle of Aug. 17, 1968, reports that "there's trouble at the top and bottom of the Top Ten (Supermarkets) list.

It reports that "The Great Atlantic Pacific Tea Company, with its 4700 stores spanning the country, has been earning a miserable penny on every dollar of sales. Now it has dipped even lower...a corporate head rolled with this drop" (Gene Manilla, head of the Bay Area Co-Ops -- look in the mirror, man!).

The Chronicle goes on to report that "First National is also the only big food chain which not only has a poor return--it has no return...it lost \$6.6 million last year (on \$640 million sales)."

The Co-Ops here are fast approaching this point of no return ("Mirror, mirror, on the wall--who's the best manager of them all?"). Answer: "Winn-Dixie became a \$1 BILLION retailer last year for the first time (its sales have expanded ten times since 1960).

"Although it ranks eighth in sales, its profit return of 2.3 percent places it fourth in earnings.

CONTESTS SF ARRESTS AT FUNSTON

City fuzz can't arrest nude bathers at Old Fort Funston Beach, argues arrestees' defense attorney Mrs. Dorsey Redlands, because the property belongs to Uncle Sam. She'll present her case Aug. 23 to SF Muni Judge Joseph G. Kennedy, who has already hinted he'll uphold municipal power.

Elsewhere in the maze of Justice, Judge Lee R. Friedman delayed giving a free trial transcript to inclothed Rev. Wilbur Minzey, convicted of indecent exposure. He told pot lawyer James R. White III that Minzey, a welfare recipient, would have to prove he is really a pauper unable to pay the cost himself.

Meanwhile the Hindu evangelist sits in SF County Jail #2 at San Bruno because he lacks \$250 to bail out during his appeal. He can receive letters at the jail, and bail contributions can be sent to Neo-American Church, Box 6196, SF.

Winn-Dixie (southern-based chain) makes more money than National Tea, Acme, Jewel, and Food Fair, all of which have bigger operations."

Here are the Top Ten (with Safeway figures regrettably absent in earnings): "A&P - \$5.4 billion. SAFEWAY - \$3.3 billion. Kroger - \$2.8 billion. Food Fair - \$1.3 billion. Acme - \$1.2 billion. Jewel - \$1.0 billion. Grand Union - \$935 million. National Tea - \$1.1 billion. Winn-Dixie - \$1.0 billion. First Nation - \$640 million."

GRAPE STRIKE GOING INTO THIRD YEAR

The Delano Farm Workers will celebrate the third anniversary of their Grape Strike on Sept. 8 with Huegla Day Parade through San Francisco's Mission District.

As the grape-strikers go into their fourth year of the strike, the owners and managers still refuse to negotiate with the AFL-CIO union. But congressional action and nationwide boycotts of California table grapes may soon bring the growers to their knees.

Recently, in San Francisco, a congressional investigating committee held preliminary hearings on the grapestrike, but the owners spurned the meeting and didn't appear.

The Berkeley Co-Ops has refused to sell the grapes, and chain stores in other cities are beginning to follow suit.

Friends of the Farmworkers have been canvassing bay area stores to determine support for the boycott. According to a recent newsletter 148 out of 184 stores are supporting the strikers cause.

The city of San Francisco is considering formally endorsing the boycott, but a recent letter to Mayor Joseph Alioto from Governor Reagan delayed the action. According to straight press reports, Reagan asked Alioto to hold off on any decision until the matter could be carefully studied. Reagan accused the strikers in his letter of making false statements about the strike..

Meanwhile, the families of the strikers in Delano are still suffering from hunger. The monthly food caravan to Delano will leave tomorrow, August 24 from both San Francisco and Oakland. Anyone wishing to join the caravan or donate food can call 655-3256.

The Oakland Caravan leaves at 7am from 568 47th St. The San Francisco caravan leaves at 8am from 2940 16th St. near Capp and Mission.

Organizers for the Caravan advise those making the trip to Delano tomorrow to bring their bathing suits. Caravaners will be the guests of the strikers for a tour of the union buildings, then an afternoon of drinks and swimming at Lake Woolemes.

An organizing meeting for the Huegla Day Parade on Sept. 8 will be held August 29, 7:30 pm in the YMCA at 4080 Mission St. in San Francisco.

TRAVELLER ESCAPES BLOODY MEXICO SCENE UNSCATHED

I entered Mexico, D.F. after 95 hours by diesel bus spurred on by Mexican Sicilian blood. The capitol city under a light siege of rain mist. Window glass broken; boarded household appliance stores and tanks. Industrial and police guards stood inside ready to shoot looters or agitators. Riots. Students!

Difficult to have a satisfiable answer to civil unrest. Students study violence, right?

Similar to Watts, one policeman became over-zealous and became the student target for police brutality. The students holed up in a school and the army blasted a hole in the door with a bazooka, result 32 killed (Ed. Note: No news report is anywhere near this number.)

POLICE MUM ON ACLU BRUTALITY REPORT

One hundred and seventy-seven complaints concerning police misbehavior in Berkeley over the weekend of June 28 to July 1 (the Telegraph Avenue thing) have been collected by the Police Conduct Complaint Center, investigative arm of the Police/Community Relations Committee of the Berkeley chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

The ACLU retained the services of a statistician to assist in preparing a report which will be released to the news media and distributed to the City Manager and members of the City Council Monday for inclusion in the agenda of the Tuesday, August 27th meeting of the City Council.

The Police Conduct Complaint Center is part of a three-pronged attack being waged by the ACLU against police misconduct in Berkeley.

Other functions of the Police/Community Relations Committee are: an intensive study of Berkeley police procedures -- recruitment, training, arrests, booking, etc.; and a project aimed at educating the public, the city officials, and the police themselves concerning the proprieties of arrest and detention.

Meanwhile, Berkeley police have been conducting their own investigation of a list of complaints, partially overlapping the list compiled by the ACLU, Sergeant O'Keefe of the Berkeley police told BARB Wednesday.

When asked what action the Berkeley police contemplated in response to the ACLU report, Sergeant O'Keefe said, "no comment."

THEN ELDRIDGE BLEW THEIR MINDS

CLEAVER TELLS HOW HE'LL LEAD

The hard-core politicos, reputed as the shrewd manipulators of the Peace and Freedom Party, suddenly found themselves standing on air at their own National Convention.

Almost everything about the Peace and Freedom National Convention was predictable until presidential candidate Eldridge Cleaver picked Jerry Rubin as his running mate.

As expected, the Credentials Committee had stayed up all night Friday, hassling over the seating of voting delegations. As expected, the two dominant factions of the Cleaver Caucus--the radical caucus and the Independent Socialist Clubs (ISC) -- wrestled each other for power.

After the Ann Arbor convention last weekend gave Cleaver the P&F presidential nomination with 16 1/2 votes, over Dick Gregory's 54 votes, dozens of names were mentioned as possible vice-presidential candidates. No one had much backing.

Then Eldridge Cleaver said he wanted Jerry Rubin.

"You would've thought I'd thrown a bomb," Cleaver said in a conversation with BARB the day after his return to California.

"Their class prejudices came out when they talked about the white community having to explain and deal with people like the Up Against the Wall Motherfuckers, Yippies and hippies," Cleaver said.

"They talked about them as 'those scum,' and things like that." Rubin, a BARB correspondent, is one of the founders of the Yippie movement now converging on Chicago. His political style is action on the streets, action designed to frazzle the mind of the establishment.

Rubin was co-founder of the Vietnam Day Committee in 1965; was short-time campaign manager for Robert Scheer in 1966; ran for Mayor of Berkeley, helped coordinate the massive Pentagon demonstration, and turned on to the psychedelic revolution in 1967; and helped sire Yippie in 1968.

Eldridge Cleaver is Minister of Information of the Black Panther Party. He described the reaction to his selection of Rubin as his running mate as "the only lively thing at the convention."

"It was good!" Cleaver said. "It galvanized the internal spirit of the group."

But why choose Rubin, whose current affinities are with Diggers, hippies, Yippies, Up Against the Wall Motherfuckers, and other street people?

"The Peace and Freedom Party was failing to come to terms with the cultural revolution," Cleaver told BARB. "The cultural revolution in the white community is to the left of the political left in the white community. Jerry Rubin understands that."

Cleaver described the political spectrum in P&F as ranging, in order, from McCarthy supporters on the right, through Gregory supporters, the Yippie caucus on the left. "I'm going to take the party in that direction," Cleaver said. "Peace and Freedom has been getting panicky watching McCarthy people drifting away, and the party has been inclining to the right. Our bias should certainly be to the left."

He indicated that, despite the initial reaction of horror and outrage when he chose Rubin, people who opposed his choice have recently been telling him they're beginning to agree.

"I knew that they (the radical caucus and ISC) wanted to structure my campaign completely, and I'd be a parrot. They wanted to

Wearing a Yippie button, Eldridge Cleaver stood before the 500 delegates of the Peace and Freedom founding convention and offered the name of Jerry Rubin as his choice of a vice-presidential running mate. Eldridge had been easily nominated for the presidential spot the night before.

The speech created a psychic pandemonium in the uptight nineteenth-century linearity that has been the central core of the Peace

and Freedom Party. I saw women crying and grown men driven to distraction. But Eldridge told it the way it is -- and if the Peace and Freedom Party did not hear the message it is because there is very little that a near-corpse can hear.

What Eldridge's speech and the reaction to it showed was that he was a revolutionary amidst a new generation of fellow-travelers -- people who will watch the black revolution on TV, take sides with

the heroes, and then switch channels and watch a panel discussion on Karl Marx. When it comes to the white world, they are mere bourgeois snobs. Longhair, pot-smoking streetfighters are never invited to dinner.

I had a long talk with Eldridge outside the hall and he is determined to ally with those people who are really taking care of business in the white community. He

will take support from wherever he can get it, but comrades will be chosen very carefully. The Yippies, SDS, the lumpen dropouts of the urban streets -- they are the only whites he sees who are really into revolution.

He decided to fight for Jerry at the convention because Jerry was the guy who could best pull the street thing together. To Eldridge, Jerry best represented the street people, those who were making revolution in their own lives and trying to revolutionize the American system.

Eldridge had been a member of the socialist-oriented radical caucus which has been working within the Peace and Freedom Party, so he attempted to win their support for Rubin's candidacy.

But it was impossible. The majority of the people in the room could do nothing more than bathe in their own jealousies, masked as a political attack on Jerry's integrity, sincerity and seriousness, and hold up to view a nonexistent working class.

When Eldridge spoke to them, he made the point that this time around and in the foreseeable future there would be no alliance with the AFL-CIO and that if a worker bought a gun the chances are that it would be used for George Wallace.

When he realized that he might just as well have been arguing with Pope Paul, Eldridge called the radical caucus a bunch of middle-class snobs and went on doing his own thing throughout, together with a Rubin Yippie caucus made up of blacks and "white niggers." It wasn't big but it was the first bit of soul I had seen at the convention.

The modd on the convention floor was crazed and could best be summarized by the look on the face of one up-and-coming young college professor who, when he careered headon into Eldridge's chest eye-level with a Yippie button, stuttered and said, "My God, it's true! How could you?"

I guess these cerebral souls, men of the library, never got around to reading Cleaver's "Soul On Ice." If they had, they would have known that it was the most natural thing in the world for Eldridge to be supporting Jerry, because the thing is that being white is a state of mind and Jerry and the people he represents are breaking with that state of mind, with a decadent and inhuman western civilization.

Why should Eldridge Cleaver want to run with a white man? One who thinks white and acts white and hasn't the least idea of what the new world will be about?

The attitude of the Peace and Freedom bureaucracy has been they would run Cleaver and use him to build their party. Cleaver made it clear that the purpose of the Party will be to build the revolution and the ideology of the campaign will be that of the Panther and not the bureaucrat.

The Peace and Freedom Party did not choose Jerry and it has to be said they had no excuse. Eldridge's acceptance speech was a brilliant, concise declaration of the American reality. It is all so obvious. And yet, these white men staggered around the hall, muttering, "How could Eldridge do this to us?"

This only means that the Peace and Freedom Party has been looking into a mirror and not into Eldridge's Soul.

But it really doesn't matter. Eldridge Cleaver will run for president on his own ideology, and those strange aspiring revolutionaries who accidentally find themselves in white skin will do all they can to help the campaign get the job done.

If Peace and Freedom wants to signify more than a Black Panther Defense Fund, they will listen to what their candidate has to say. People change. Eldridge was once a Black Muslim. A lot of us were once Stevensonian liberals.

So there is still some hope. The movement is in the streets and that is where P&F should be. But history does not give its actors an eternity in which to decide. Peace & Freedom will have to be dragged kicking and screaming into the twenty-first century or they will die beyond hope.

RIGHT WING THREATENS TO KILL TOM HAYDEN

ANN ARBOR (UNS) -- The Secret Service agent assigned to protect radical organizer Tom Hayden at the National P&F Convention last weekend confirmed Hayden's information that a right-wing group named "Breakthrough" was planning to assassinate him.

As Hayden and a carload of his friends drove away from the convention here, they were followed by three cars equipped with shortwave radios.

Expecting to be hit with gunfire, Hayden and his companions swung back to the P&F convention hall on the University of Michigan campus. There they arranged a special reception for their pursuers.

When they pulled away from the convention site, the same cars followed them again. They Hayden car circled back. So did their shadowers.

As the caravan passed the P&F meeting place, about 100 activists, bearing sticks, rocks, and bricks, blocked the street as soon as Hayden rode by.

The cars following Hayden came to a halt. One of the men jumped out brandishing a handgun. During the ensuing stalemate, Hayden and his friends got away safely.

Later a group of P&F members went to the Ann Arbor police headquarters. After lengthy argument, the Ann Arbor police admitted that the men following Hayden were police officers -- but from Detroit, not Ann Arbor.

They said that Detroit police had no jurisdiction in Ann Arbor. They would say nothing else.

Among movement people in Michigan, it is common knowledge that the Breakthrough organization has infiltrated the Detroit police department.

Hayden is now Program Director of the National Mobilization action aimed at the Democratic Convention in Chicago. He is internationally known as the first president of Students for a Democratic Society, a welcomed visitor to North Vietnam, and as a community organizer in Newark.

According to Yippie activist Stu Albert, who was in the car with Hayden during the chase, the Secret Service watched over Hayden during the convention "because his being done in would be an incident internationally embarrassing to the United States."

The SS man assigned to Hayden told him he was being guarded because of a death threat originating from Breakthrough.

POLICE PACK POLICE GOON SQUAD HEARING

A paranoid San Francisco Police Commission stacked its own meeting last Monday as 'Kayo' Hallinan produced another teniveness in the continuing investigation of Mayor Alioto's squad of Black Shirts.

Still clearly in control of the show Attorney Terence Hallinan demanded that the Gestapo-like 34 man Tactical Squad of the SFPD be disbanded.

Kayo directing his comments to only two of the three police commissioners said that when "this squad of bullies and perhaps sadists responds it is going to over respond."

The uptight Police Commissioners concerned with their bullshit public image of dignity and justice which a protesting crowd besmirched last week, sneaked in about twenty off duty cops, patriotic old ladies, and the pseudo fascist Veterans Political Council.

The doors of room 551 in the squat prison-like Hall of Justice usually open a few minutes before the hearings begin. Monday, they were opened an hour early to accommodate the picked audience that filled almost every seat.

Only a few hip chicks and a couple of blacks who arrived early were able to get past the four pigs stationed at the door. People who came to testify had to wait in the outside corridor until they were called.

Hallinan immediately aware of

the blue-blood bleachers and the fact that over 75 people from the hip and black community were trying to get in requested the commissioners to move the hearing to the larger Police Auditorium so that the audience would be fairly representative.

The commissioners voiced their sense of social justice with a flat NO.

Throwing a different punch, Kayo then asked if all the police officers in the audience would stand up. Not a one did.

But Sgt. Sunshine told BARB "I recognized 15 or 20 off duty cops, and the rest of the audience was filled with Birchers and The Squad supporters."

BARB was also able to count 19 uniformed cops in and around the commission chamber, there no doubt to help in 'keeping the peace.'

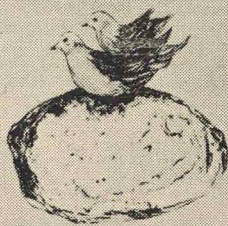
The Tac Squad set up over six months ago as a separate unit to break up riots and riot situations is being charged as responsible for the violence and injuries at recent demonstrations in the city.

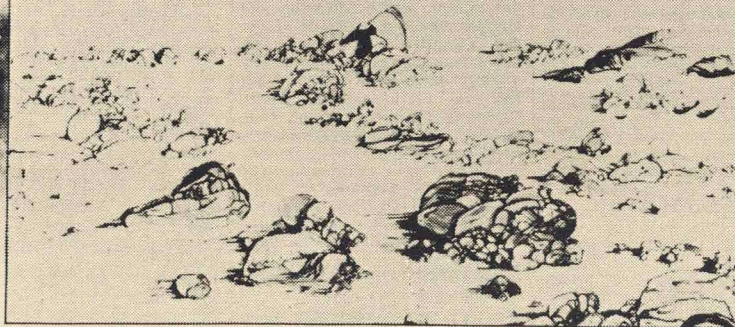

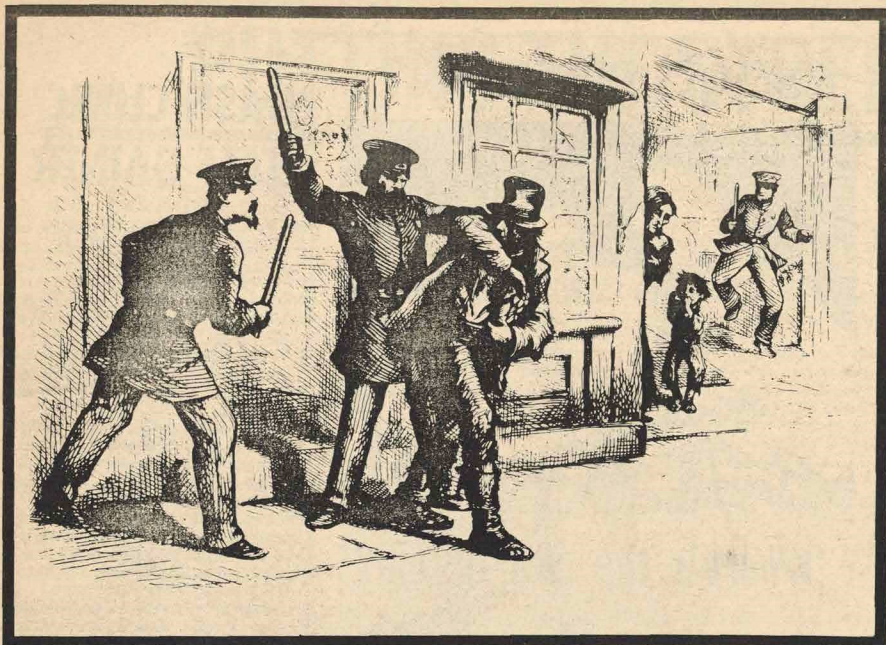

LAWYER ASKS JUDGE TO ADMIT PREJUDICE

"I will prove they are lying", Superior Court Judge Joseph Karesh shouted Wednesday afternoon.

He was responding to a declaration filed Monday on behalf of five of the "low rent seven" by their new attorney, Mr. Richard Gladstein, which attempts to disqualify Judge Karesh on grounds of prejudice.

They are Larry L. Larsen, Stephen Gendel, Nelson A. Medina, Stephen C. Morse, and John S. Ross.

They state, under penalty of

perjury, that Judge Karesh "harbors a fixed and strong conviction that the defendants should be convicted of the charge" and that "in his mind they stand already convicted of felonies and all that remains to be done is to sentence them to prison."

"Judge Karesh displayed a marked bias in favor of the police officers who gave testimony," continues their declaration. On four different occasions, Judge Karesh asked witnesses whether the defendants had called the cops "fas-

cist pigs", it avers.

The men declare that they have "uniformly rejected any offers of a deal." According to their version not only the DA but also the judge had used language that was interpreted by them as offers of a deal.

The men, members of the Progressive Labor Party, a group working for lower rents in the San Francisco Mission District, are charged with attacking the cops during a raid on a tenants' celebration party last year. The first trial ended with one conviction, one acquittal and no decision for the five men presently involved.

During the dramatic two-day colloquy between Mr. Gladstein and Judge Karesh, Judge Karesh commended the attorney and said "I would regret it if you would walk out, Mr. Gladstein, I enjoy listening to you. This trial is going to be interesting since you are skilled, experienced and able to reach back into history for your arguments."

Mr. Gladstein had referred to the Caryl Chessman case and suggested that Judge Karesh was guilty of a 16th Century judicial tactic where the more a defendant pleaded innocent, the more guilty he became.

At one point on Wednesday, Mr. Gladstein calmly and quietly admonished Judge Karesh. "I am aware that it is unpleasant in any person's life to be accused of bias," the attorney said, "but you must be prepared to face the slings and the arrows. Besides there can never be a perfect judge because there are no perfect human beings."

Mr. Gladstein pelted the court with motions. He asked for a continuance, Monday, until he could obtain a transcript of the trial (denied because the court reporter was too busy).

Wednesday, he informed the court that he talked with Mrs. James, the court reporter, and she felt she had been placed under injunction not to transcribe any part of the transcript."

Judge Karesh retorted, "I am not ordering her anything!" So Gladstein ordered it and the transcript will be prepared--for a price to the defense.

Monday, Mr. Gladstein also sought a new trial for Eric Johnson, the only man convicted of a battery charge. He claimed Judge Karesh had made an "empty gesture in giving instructions when Johnson was arraigned." The Judge denied the motion.

Outside the courtroom, Johnson said the trial had "ranged from a kangaroo court to a vigilante raid".

In the preliminary rounds, Monday morning and Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Gladstein clearly outpointed Judge Karesh. The main bout promises to be an exciting event when the trial begins on September 10 at 10:00 a.m.

The five now facing trial are all activists involved in getting a rent-control measure on the November ballot. They are seeking support from the people and funds for their new trial.

HEROIN RAP LEAD TO REVOLT

Martin Sostre, as Afro-American, is locked in solitary confinement in a jail near Buffalo, New York. This may mean little to Bay area residents, but the events leading to Sostre's confinement and since make his case a potential revolutionary cause.

Sostre, the owner of an Afro-Asian bookstore in the Buffalo ghetto, was arrested last June on a charge of selling heroin. Sostre charges the heroin was planted in his store. His only real offense, he says, is the fact that he was selling "highly political and radical" literature in an exceptionally conservative northern industrial community of Buffalo. He was a follower of Malcolm X.

The bookstore owner was beaten inside his store and thrown into jail where he remained eight months before a three-day trial in May. He was found guilty and sentenced to 31 to 41 years confinement.

Since his conviction, Sostre has been moved into solitary confinement. In an unprecedented administrative decision by Gov. Rockefeller's commissioner of correction, Paul McGinnis, he has been cut off from visits and correspondence with his attorney. Ground set forth for the severed legal connection is that Sostre's NAACP attorney is not a member of the New York Bar, only of the Michigan Bar.

ceded Newton's this week, there seems little reason for him to speak in his own defense -- except that he wants to. No rational, honest jury could convict him.

The next phase in the case will be the jury placing itself on trial; or perhaps the testing of Judge Monroe Friedman if the defense asks for a dismissal of the charges.

When Allen McKinney, the man who says he was with Newton at the time of the shooting, took the stand, the last shred fell from the shoddy fabric of the prosecution's case.

McKinney refused to answer on grounds of possible self-incrimination, when defense attorney Charles Garry asked him if he shot Officer Frey.

McKinney said he could not remember what he was wearing that early morning of October 28, 1967. Then, when Judge Friedman directed him to answer a question about when he met Newton that day, McKinney again refused to answer.

Judge Friedman found him in contempt of court and sent him straight to jail.

If anything was left of the prosecution's case before McKinney testified, his court appearance demolished its last scrap.

All Newton's defense has to do is establish "reasonable doubt" of his guilt. Now, in addition to previous conflicting, inconclusive testimony by prosecution witnesses, it has been established that another person was at the scene, a person whose actions are unaccounted for.

What the flimsy case made against Huey Newton really shows is the extremes to which the white establishment of Oakland will go in order to "get" a Black Panther Party leader. The D.A.'s office has made the best case that the trial is political.

Much of the testimony earlier this week brought back the overt theme of white racism, which occupied the court during the trial's opening days. A series of witnesses indicated that the slain Oakland policeman was aggressively racist.

With that testimony, the Newton trial completed a full circle, leading back to the jurors, who have been largely ignored by the press since they were seated despite defense arguments that they are incapable of giving a black man a fair trial.

Now the trial of the judge and the jurors begins.

The question is no longer one of evidence. The question is whether those few people will be able to see clearly into their own minds, molded from birth in a white racist society.

The question now is whether those few people, heavily guarded by Oakland police, can see their way to the truth, or will see only what they want to believe about a black man, militantly dedicated to the liberation of his people.

'FURCKED, IN SHORT

Liberation News Service bifurcated itself last week. Now each LNS is fingering the other as the bad guy.

Press packets from each -- totalling over 8,000 words -- indicate that the other group has engaged in criminal acts to take over the LNS money and equipment, in order to pervert LNS to its own ends, contrary to the best interests of the movement.

And thus the facilities of the underground press continue to expand.

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dozen out of uniform, drunken brawling Tac Squad members started fights in the Mission-Excelsior district. As a result, Alioto under pressure from a briefly self-righteous establishment press ordered the suspension of Boyd and Dougherty, the only two Tac men that were identified.

Kayo, who is presently charged with felony assault upon a Tac Squad officer who was clubbing a chick at SF State, is optimistic and said, "Everything indicates that the Tac Squad will be abolished, this is a great victory."

Sgt. Sunshine was of a similar opinion.

As additional testimony charging the squad with brutality continued another unexpected attack was made by John E. Storer, chief of the State Narcotics Bureau.

It seems like one of his undercover boys working in the Hashbury on the night of June 24 was severely beaten by two Tac Squad goons as he was trying to identify himself.

Storer has challenged Police Chief Cahill to bring in the two Tac men responsible and have a lie detector duel with his undercover man Myron A. Gilbert. Cahill, out of town for a while has not responded.

Tac Squad supporters were scarce, but the most notable was Attorney Edward E. Heavey, oft known for his defense of HUAC in the past few years. Aside from presenting a signed petition asking that the Tac Squad be retained, all Heavey could do was express his own fears of being raped, robbed, or molested by everyone but the Tac Squad itself.

Acting like a misplaced Orange County Bircher, Heavey at one time impugned the professional ability of Hallinan. This was too heavy even for the commission which reprimanded Heavey.

It is interesting that not one cop or Squad officer was willing to speak up for their own defense, probably only too aware that they would blow the scene completely.

NEXT week the show continues in Rm 551, at 4:30 Monday inside the Hall of Justice. Hallinan, expecting a favorable ruling from the

commission to disband the Tac Squad, urges everyone to get there an hour or so early and grab the best seats. If the seating isn't adequate Kayo intends to have an injunction issued to force the commission to move to a larger room.

Also featured Monday is Sgt. Sunshine, who after receiving another continuance because of the extensive publicity centered around the Tac Squad has demanded that the commission hear his case.

COMMUNE MARRIAGE

The Berkeley Free Church refused to marry Simone Martinez and Cheryl Martinez, so the Berkeley Commune is going to have its first street wedding.

This information comes to BARB from the Reverend Hajj, who is performing the ceremony for the couple this Saturday morning at 11 AM in front of Cody's.

The bride and groom "are both panhandlers," Rev. Hajj told us, "who found themselves in each other's hands."

"They are married already, but they want to affirm their relationship before the community, to declare themselves a part of the richness of the street culture," Hajj said.

Jack Brown, and Episcopal minister at the Free Church said he knew nothing about the wedding or about the bride and groom, but admitted that the refusal to marry them was "very possible."

"We have to act under canon law in weddings and there are certain restrictions," Brown told BARB, "like we cannot marry someone who has been married before. And the state will recognize our authority only as far as the church will."

After the wedding the couple will honeymoon in Guadalajara where the groom's father has a farm, Rev. Hajj said. --dc

MALCOLM X COLLEGE TALK RAISES RACIST IRE

The name of Malcolm X was all it took to bring the racists out of the hills in Santa Cruz last week.

On August 7 members of the Santa Cruz Black Liberation Movement stated their need for a black-oriented college on the University of California's Santa Cruz Campus.

To a receptive crowd at Cabrillo College in Watsonville they gave their plan for a college plant which would: 1) be designed by a black man to reflect the black experience, and 2) be named after Malcolm X.

The name is important "Because Malcolm X is the black experience in this country," Black Liberation Movement spokesman Bill Moore told BARB.

"His father was lynched by the Ku Klux Klan, his life in crime and his prison experience, his Muslimism and white hatred, and his development beyond that hatred to become an example and spokesman of a whole generation of black men," is something that most black men can identify with and find pride in.

"Are Hate and Violence being spawned in Santa Cruz under the Guise of 'Racial Harmony & Civil Rights'?", screamed a large ad in the Santa Cruz Sentinel in bold, black letters on August 13, less than a week after Malcolm X College was proposed.

The ad announced a program called "Anarchy U.S.A." for the following day, presented by TACT, a group of whites who practice their racism under the banner of "Truth About Civil Turmoil".

It invited the public to find out why "they call for the establishment of a 'black-oriented college in Santa Cruz carrying the name of Malcolm X College--when in fact the X means that the name holder has seriously maimed or killed a white person?"

"This will give you some idea of the sort of lying TACT is capable of," Bill Moore said. "In fact, the X is the name a Black Muslim adopts when he gives up the slave name given his family years ago."

Moore is an articulate, serious man. He was in the BARB office with other Movement members Hubert James, Jesse Moore (no relation), and Norman Guliford to talk about the school the Movement envisions.

It will be black-run, manned by blacks and other minorities, and will attract black scholars from all over the United States and Africa. It will, in fact, provide a forum for the entire Third World of Asia, Africa and Latin America. An open "forum room" with constant lectures going on to provide interaction with the larger (nonstudent) community will be a permanent part of Malcolm X College.

It will be a place where students -- of all colors -- in anthropology, sociology, psychology or the other social sciences "may end up studying white society from a black perspective among other things," Moore told BARB.

The plan of the Santa Cruz campus is to build 20 small self-contained colleges on one site to avoid the giant coldness of a Berkeley style "multiversity". As such it lends itself easily to the idea of a separate Malcolm X College teaching 400-600 students.

Right now Santa Cruz has four of the intended colleges and is breaking ground for the fifth. One of these, Merrill College, "was dedicated vaguely to the Third World," Moore said, "but it really doesn't represent us."

The Black Liberation Movement proposes that college number seven, to be built in 1970, be Malcolm X. They are giving the Regents plenty of time to act.

The college will be unlike the typical black school in that "it would be the first black school on a white campus," Moore said. It would be a black rallying point and the best possible source of information on the nation's black community for the colleges around it.

Already the plan of the Black Liberation Movement has gained considerable ground. It has the

support of the Santa Cruz Peace and Freedom Party, the local NAACP, the local Panther chapter, and the Martin Luther King Direct Action Committee, among others.

Any person or group wanting to add their support can contact the Movement at Box 1502, Santa Cruz, or by calling 408-438-0384, "and we're not averse to receiving money," Moore said.

Asked if Malcolm X College might become the center of black revolution, taking stands in favor of freeing Huey or other controversial issues, Moore replied, "Of course. And this is something the Regents will have to face."

"The school must be free," Moore added, "Malcolm X was a free individual and the school must be too."

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capitalize on the Black Panther image," Cleaver said.

After he announced his selection of Rubin, he said, he called a meeting of his caucus "and they refused to allow me to continue to talk. David Welsh chaired the meeting. They were afraid to listen to what we had to say. They cut off Stu Albert."

"We demanded the right to speak, or we'd have to split. And we had to split."

"It was the people who had been on the fringes who came with us, and we formed the Yippie caucus. There were a lot of people at the convention who were not represented by the delegates."

"We'll be campaigning with those people. I'll still be wearing my ear ring, and I might wear some beads. People have been giving them to me."

"We're going to speak for the cultural revolution, and by November we expect the people involved in the cultural revolution to constitute a majority of the party."

Cleaver told BARB that the Up Against the Wall Motherfuckers struck him as "the most profound" group at the P&F national convention. "Those cats are out of sight," he said.

He said he expects the party to stay together when the factions understand the implications of his selection of Jerry Rubin for the V-P slot.

In a quick reaction to Cleaver's unexpected choice, the delegates at Ann Arbor decided in a fairly close vote to let each P&F state party select its own vice-presidential candidate.

In California, the decision will be made by the State Central Committee, meeting in Sacramento this Saturday, August 24. The Central Committee consists of all the California P&F candidates and county chairmen.

All bets are off. -jas

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RECALL REAGAN?



'Where's the rest of me?'

The Recall Reagan Committee brought legal action in Sacramento against Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan Thursday (BARB press-time), according to Bob Compton, Alameda County committee chairman.

The action, filed by Ed and Joyce Koupal, state chairmen for the drive, makes three main demands on Jordan.

Jordan has released an unofficial count of 336,496 as the state total. The recall committee in a canvas of only 14 of 58 counties claims a total of 386,028. The committee is asking that Jordan make public the total valid signatures for the state and the counties.

They are also asking that Jordan answer for throwing out petitions not filed by the 4:30 p.m. deadline July 31. They claim he had announced that petitions would be accepted until midnight that day.

The third demand is that 50,000 signatures invalidated in Los Angeles county because they weren't precincted in time, be held valid.

In a related controversy, Jordan has said that the state election code allows only one filing date for a petition and that the supplementary petition provided for in Article 23 Section 1 of the State Constitution will not be honored. Recall advocates a claim supplementary petition in a recall issue may be circulated according to the Constitution.

Mrs. Virginia Appleton, Contra Costa Recall chair-woman told BARB, the committee will seek to force county clerks to turn petitions over to the Secretary of State, and to force him to accept them or deny them. "Then we will try to take that to court."

The initial petition was due July 31. Under the law allowing for another 60 days, the latest any petitions can be turned in is Sept. 29. Anyone still interested in signing a petition or sending one around, may phone 526-3102, 526-5456 and 535-1564, locally.

FAIR RENT COMMITTEE HITS 'CLOSET LIBERAL'

The Committee for Fair Rents and Taxes (CFRT) ran into a 'liberal in the closet' as they attempted to award their second 'Golden Rat' award for slum lord of the week.

They tried to confront the head of the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency, (SFRA) Justin Herman.

"Herman must have smelled a rat," Ron Loomis of CFRT told BARB, "so the slumlord of the week shuffled us off on the apologist for SFRA, James Van." Van is also head of the Northern California Peace and Freedom Party.

Van is having a hard time lately explaining SFRA's bureaucratic mishandlings to its many opponents. In addition to the CFRT, his agency is being confronted with stiff opposition from two Fillmore based groups: the Poor Peoples Crusade and Western Additions Community Organization (WACO.)

Harry Tate of WACO accompanied Loomis and his 'rat pack' to the offices of the SFRA. Tate told BARB, "I was quick to realize the inconsistencies in what Van is doing and was just as quick to confront the Peace and Freedom official." I read the list of grievances of the Fillmore people and also told him that if he couldn't give us satisfaction on these needs then I would see that he was recalled as an official in Peace and Freedom."

Van replied that he was "only an architect trying to bring about changes in this agency." He further promised Tate that he would draft a letter to Justin Herman about these grievances. As of press time Tate had heard nothing from Van or the SFRA.

BARB checked into WACO grievances by going to Tate's apartment at 1443 Fillmore, where WACO was holding an open press conference. BARB was the only paper that showed up.

There were several large plaster holes in the walls of one of the apartments in the building. Two of the holes were filled with plaster contrasting to the other gaping holes in the same wall.

"I complained to the SFRA (they are the landlord)" the tenant said, "and they finally sent a repairman out to repair these holes. He only patched two holes, didn't touch the rest, and left plaster and dirt all over my kitchen. It took them about three months to fix two of the holes but I'm still on them to fix the rest."

The tenant was very angry and bitter and told of many more instances of repairs neglected, faulty plumbing, and lack of garbage cans.

"SFRA is the worst landlord I have ever had," she continued. The roaches and rats are so thick I have to sweep them away from my four kids. SFRA is supposed to send out a man to spray for roaches once a month, but none have been here since SFRA took over the building last February."

WACO is supporting the tenants who are going to hold out for repairs and better housing even under threat of eviction by SFRA.

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HASH CLINIC HALF GAINER

In what is hoped to become an annual event of international importance the Haight-Ashbury Medical Clinic and The Athenum Arts Foundation will present a four-day music and light show festival over the Labor Day Weekend.

The Palace of Fine Arts in the aristocratic Marina area of San Francisco has been leased for the occasion.

The commission approved the festival, raised the attendance limit to 6,500 and did away with all unnecessary permits. The clinic had pleaded for a 12,000 limit.

Dr. Smith, director of the clinic told BARB that the great majority of the testimony given at the commission hearings was in support of the festival.

Uptight property lords from the local estates also showed. After voicing fears of property damage from the festival goers, they resorted to character assassination and called Dr. Smith a "Dirty Hippie Doctor."

The Commission under pressure told Smith that he must provide adequate security for local residents and keep the festival lawful and peaceful.

Proceeds of the Festival go to the Haight-Ashbury Medical Clinic. The clinic has rendered valuable medical service for the past fifteen months and recently opened an Amphetamine Research Clinic.

There will be six sessions beginning on Friday night, August 30, at 8:30, continue on Saturday afternoon from 12-6, Saturday night from 8:30, again on Sunday afternoon, 12-6, and Sunday night from 8:30 and Monday from 12-6. Tickets are available through downtown box office outlets in S.F., Berkeley and Oakland.

boycott of Fillmore churches and picketing of churches all over the city until they become part of the community and actually help better the housing problem of the ghetto.


"The reason the churches are targets is not because we are anti-religious," stated Tate, "but because they are another absentee landlord using the threat of hell and damnation to keep the poor down."

"They are exploiting the poor, black sisters and as an example," he said, "they actually coerce the sisters into cleaning the ministers' wives' home free, when the sisters should be tending their own house and kids."

Boycotting and picketing will begin this Sunday at St. Dominic's in the Fillmore.

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PUTTING THE STREET TOGETHER

"Be our parents," Hajj Razavi of the Persian Fuckers told the merchants assembled before him, "admitting that we are bastards."

"The street is filthy and the establishment doesn't come down here any more. The kids out there are just escaping their responsibilities," the proprietor of Nicole's told members of the Berkeley Commune.

"The cops don't hurt the dealers or the Angels," said a Communist. "They know they'll get their asses kicked. They pick up little kids and panhandlers instead."

"We know that the guy who smokes a couple of joints on a Saturday isn't an addict. But he's a damned fool if he blows it in a cop's face on the Avenue," said Larry Dundon of KPAT.

"Don't deal in front of my shop," Mary Reeves of The Alley yelled for the second time this Friday evening, "Show enough class to walk two blocks away and deal. I've had it."

Then she bent over to light another cigarette while every man in the room watched fascinated.

This was a meeting of the minds of The Telegraph Avenue Establishment and The Berkeley Commune, in the cave-like banquet room at the back of the Forum.

There until the late hours of both Friday and Monday night this last week the two groups most disturbed by the recent hostility in The Block have been making an attempt to understand what the other wants.

Fred Cody is the reluctant chairman of the meetings; it sort of landed on him.

The Commune made its single greatest irritation clear on the first night: cops.

The merchants find this a possible point of view, but they aren't sure they can do anything about it.

On Monday night Undertaker McNary gave an involved explanation of how the merchants really lost all of their power to do anything because a bunch of Liberals were elected to the city council a few years ago.

Roger Salomon proposed a free, legally immune clinic for the street people and an ongoing art festival where they can display their creat-

ivity. Cody passed around a sign-up sheet for people interested in being on the clinic committee.

On Monday night a Doctor Gino Pelle who has been working for the Haight-Ashbury free clinic told people about the problems involved in setting up such an operation.

"Hey," someone from the Commune yelled in the midst of a dialogue, "the clinic is secondary, we came here to talk about the fucking pigs."

Irv Garelick objected to the use of foul language.

There was a lot more discussion of the clinic.

When members of the Commune did get a chance to talk about the cops they again complained about how the fuzz treated the political protest people on the west side in front of Cody's as compared to the people on the east side. They seemed to limit the Commune to one side of the street throughout the discussion.

They agreed that they couldn't get rid of the police but they wanted to see the Berkeley plainclothes cops off the street, and uniformed cops maintaining regular patrols instead of sporadic cruiser patrols.

The Commune wanted the mer-

chants to take these demands down to City Hall.

Jock Brown pointed out that "some of the merchants here have not bought the demands 100%..."

"I am one," McNary said, raising his hand.

"Are there any hip merchants?" asked Communist in a cap, with some sarcasm.

"No," said Fred Cody, "A hip merchant is almost a contradiction in terms. But that doesn't mean because I'm a merchant that I'm not a human being."

Around the end of the meeting Monday night there was some talk about a community-maintained

crash pad and a few merchants seemed to agree vaguely that they would talk to City Hall about the cops.

Just before press time Wednesday, BARB talked to Fred Cody. He said he was encouraged by the progress made at the meeting. He also said "We're working hard on constructive projects that will build a community of the whole."

He complained, "We've heard a great deal of talk but very few people are actually sitting down and working on these things."

There's another meeting tonight, Friday, in the back room of the Forum.

Banners, Artists, writers, poets, busy doing their thing. Red banners black banners fund collecting cans doing thing. Speakers, Yippies, representatives, Port Chicago people, socialists, revolutionary connections, and

Well I was just sitting down at one of the little tables in front of Cody's book store, (the now renowned Cody's Plaza) about to rap with Hajj of the dread 'Persian Fuckers' one of the beautiful people, along with the Berkeley commune and others out there to help you, when a cat from the flower section came over to move the table, without any particular reason, to some given jurisdiction, but was confronted by refusal from Hajj, the small but potent 5'4" fellow, who was telling me to sit back down and disregard this mission of establishment, but having gone into a fit of well restrained

formal nature). For he indeed was as modest as our salary.

"I am not very pertinent," Hajj boasted (Hajj people is quite important as a function in the cause as well.)

"Do not put water melons inside my arm pits". (It has something to do in Persia-not the South - with building one up to be bigger than he actually is.)

"I should be interviewing you on your poetry", he said.

After having put credit where it was due he said "Breed (That's me) I am in the garbage can, looking up at the sky. And the sky is the limit!" and thus we commenced to rap on.

Much has been done within a comparably short time, they have been on the streets for exactly 46 days. Within this time they have

stimulated merchants to have meetings, greatly weakened the force of the Establishment which pressures managements, especially restaurators into cooperating in various devious tactics such as hiring narks, and has inspired numerous managements to take on enough initiative to do as they REALLY believe and not as they are PRESSURED to believe.

They have performed several successful boycotts. Such as one at U.C. corner with a mere designate 'X' mark upon the sidewalk just in front of it. The Chess-in at the Med, as a result of a woman nearly being busted for merely playing chess - I don't know if she was playing with herself or naught. Providing as best they can what is considered by the people of the plaza as the livelihood of the street people's economy. Food, clothing, crash pads, surplus, etc.

The PF, along with the Berkeley Commune and less groups and individuals, now look upon busts -- that is being busted -- as an unusual as well as most expected thing and are prepared, that is they do most everything in their power to bail or have as many people released as possible.

Just last Saturday a dance was held, 'Notes from the Underground' played for a while for the benefit of Lin Drummond, busted on charges of firebombing. Toni, a sweet little red headed chick from the Berkeley Commune at various intervals of the night would grab the mike and rap about the fact that if he was busted on those charges you KNOW we need him out here.

The famous crash pad bust of

twenty-six people on July 15, - all released. The six in a street fight beaten by three pigs and a plainclothes man, were all released. Their limited bail funds have made all these things possible.

The 'Shit Bowl' coronation on campus consisting of an authentic shit bowl was designed to dramatise the fact that campus, despite its new builds and its book stores and special programs, is actually pulling shit in the form of hypocrisy.

Unlike the free Church the plaza gives, and does not believe in free food, free sex, free crash pads etc, nor free assistance and surplus but it shares food sex crash pads, etc.

The people of the plaza being uncommitted to anything particular, some taking more or less responsibilities making more or less decisions but doing their own thing for each other, seek to survive man and encourage and provide his (our) own materials.

There will be a working people - peasants militia organized soon where they will cut out to San Jose or Sacramento and pick their own fruits and stuff.

Starting now is the interdimensional scene, put together to preserve, human culture and freedom for the people consisting of some cool artists, writers, and other street people.

The three interdimensional scene is conveyed from that of being: audible vocal visible.

I quote Hajj again as saying "When I come out of the garbage can and make it to the hills," as he said pointing to the ones in Berkeley, "I shall only be that much near the sky" ---- And the sky is the limit.

HOPE IN THE HOLE

A ray of hope has finally flashed into the dark hole where Lincoln Drummond has been held for almost two months at Santa Rita.

At his preliminary hearing Friday in Berkeley Municipal Court the defense was allowed to send a motion to a higher court to reduce bail without prejudice from Judge Floyd Talbott.

Drummond's defense attorney told BARB, "the court finally realizes that the bail of \$10,000 is too high. The reason it is so high is because they don't have past experience with firebomb cases and therefore classified it right

along with murder."

Drummond was mobbed on the last night of the Berkeley cop riot by Officer Lloyd Clifton and numerous other pigs. He is charged along with Jim Baird with "possessing" a firebomb in Jim's car trunk.

The odor of Officer Clifton is still haunting Lincoln, even after Clifton collaborated in Lin's beating at the arrest scene. Clifton testified at the hearing on the circumstances of the arrest.

This week Clifton made it a point to stop by the Commune table, which is raising money for Lincoln's bail. He hassled bail raisers about a nude picture of

Lin taken at Ft. Funston, and told them to put a piece of tape over Lin's privates. Symbolic castration!

Drummond's arraignment is scheduled for September 6. At this time, "we are going to stress getting Lincoln off on illegal search and seizure of Baird's car," said the defense attorney.

Lincoln's wife wishes to thank all the concerned people who have given bail money at tables around town, sent money, and offered assistance. She said, "the bail fund is progressing nicely."

SEATTLE ROCK FEST AIMS TO BE GREATEST

What promises to be the greatest and most successful rock festival of the year is scheduled for Labor Day Weekend in the Pacific Northwest.

The Sky River Rock Festival and Lighter Than Air Fair will run August 31-September 2 in Sultan, Washington, 40 miles north of Seattle. The festival is a benefit for the New American Community, a non-profit organization encompassing all Black and American Indian minority groups in the Northwest area.

More than forty rock bands and folk acts, most of them from the San Francisco area, have been signed for appearances at the festival. Among them are Country Joe and the Fish, It's A Beautiful Day, Ramblin' Jack Elliott, Pink Floyd, The New Lost City Ramblers, Santana, Sons of Champlin, Steppenwolf, Muddy Waters, and the Youngbloods.

Site of the festival is Betty Nelson's Organic Raspberry Farm, a privately owned 25-acre plot of cleared land surrounded by dense woods. The festival grounds can accommodate 30,000. Overnight camping will also be permitted and facilities have been made for as many as 10,000 nature lovers.

Festival Director John Chambliss, who also co-directs the annual Berkeley Folk Festival, announced this week that in addition to the bands and other acts, most of the Northwest American tribes and Indian singer-composer Buffy St. Marie will be participating.

The fair will also include arts displays, theatrical productions, films, and a number of "unusual contests and happenings." Chambliss said a specifically-constructed theater will be used to show films of young filmmakers and to present plays by outstanding young playwrights.

"We are going to make this fes-

tival everything we believe a festival can and should be," Chambliss said. "With the support and dedicated effort of the artists and other workers involved, we believe we can present a festival which can serve as a model for other similar fairs and festivals."

Advance tickets for the full three-day bash are priced at \$6 and

When the great history of rock and roll is written in the 1970's everyone will know of the legendary giants of our time--the Al Kooper's and the Mike Bloomfield's. And when rock fans gather for all night listen-ins there will be much frantic discussion of their various bandhoppings and sessions, and the little magazines will be filled with articles speculating about reject takes, unissued masters, and the like, and all the trappings of futile scholarship gone wild.

There will be some young college kid who collects the old rock lp's, and being unable to afford the \$200 for an early Butterfield, or Blood, Sweat, & Tears, he'll go out into the quaint hip ghettos and buy all the old lp's he can find for 50¢ each.

One evening he'll go to his motel room, somewhere in Berkeley, and put the day's pile on his portable record player for a preliminary sort of the gems from the debris, and suddenly he'll smile and play one over, and then play it again, and he'll break out into a huge smile because he's done it, he's found an unknown masterpiece.

It's by the Youngbloods, and its called EARTHMUSIC. Back home all his friends will come over and they'll spend all night listening to it and flashing happy.

Later still he'll be researching old BARB's for information about the old groups, and this is for him.

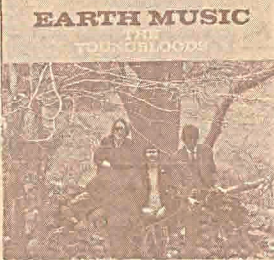
The group seems to have started in the Cafe Au-Go-Go in late 1966, in the shadow of the successes of the Blues Project--that's the way I first saw them. They played there for months, somehow never quite able to break clear of having been second bill. Ultimately they moved to Frisco, which turned out to be much more hospitable to the new music.

Their music is part of a really fine second current in pop--it's not the driving screaming blues which really hold everyone's attention presently. Rather its c&w based, owing, I believe, a great deal to the good time music of the Loving Spoonful, a Village band who were quite successful in 1966. It doesn't drive, it floats along with everyone together, no tension, and no distortion from great egos.

There are other bands in the same general bag: lately the Byrds, and the recently disbanded Buffalo Springfield. They make a sort of breeze, instead of a storm. At its best the music is just happy, with a very low key message, no shrillness. It's not a part of what we despisingly call hubblegum music aimed at the teenies, but then too it's not an anguished cry against all that's wrong.

They seem to have an old American stance of well fuck it all, politics and business are a big drag I'll just sit back and let everyone else do all that stuff. Like the Blue Ridge mountain men have been saying for a hundred years.

Daddy told them to drink moon-



shine, but they like wine one song says, it gets you stoned. The lp opens with an old favorite about that called "Euphoria" in the old spirit of a lot of weird things going on, without the Dylan streak of real madness. "There's a man under the table, making faces at a union label." And it sounds like a Dixieland jazz band.

All the way thru the lyrics seem to be just outdistancing the mind. One of them yells at a guitarist during a solo "Ah pick it, Wilson" and if you like to trip around with ideas just what does it mean to say a girl is "a natural fat," and what philosophical blend lies behind "It's been clearly revealed/ that dreamer's dream can only be reality/ if two dreamers dream it."

The music is quite distinctive. There is a unique tone and feeling in Banana's piano playing, and in Jesse's singing, or whoever is doing it, and the guitar and bass work together just fine. They have mellowed together, and I like it alot.

I imagine that the remake of Chuck Berry's "Too Much Monkey Business" is the track I like the best. It's about that thing I was talking about earlier, and it sounds like a track that Berry would have liked to have done, if he hadn't done this other thing with the music. It's no imitation, but it's in the same spirit. Tasteful, inventive, happy, it's a nice record and so was their first one.

BUT THEN AGAIN THERE'S SF, POPS

The San Francisco Pop Festival is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, October 6th and 7th.

The location will be the natural wonder of Searsville Lake, located in Woodside California. There will be 500 acres of land accessible to those who attend. Swimming and boating are added attractions.

The bandstand, located between two oak trees, will face a huge hill. The audience will be seated on the hill gazing down upon the performers creating an amphitheater affect.

Rich Romanello is the man who is the organizer and main driving force behind the forthcoming festival. BALL AND CHAIN: The eight second pause after the opening bar is to give you time to sit down, hold on, and get it together.

Cause Janis and James and Peter and Sam and David are going to take it apart again in a big way.

PIGASUS BOUND TO WIN



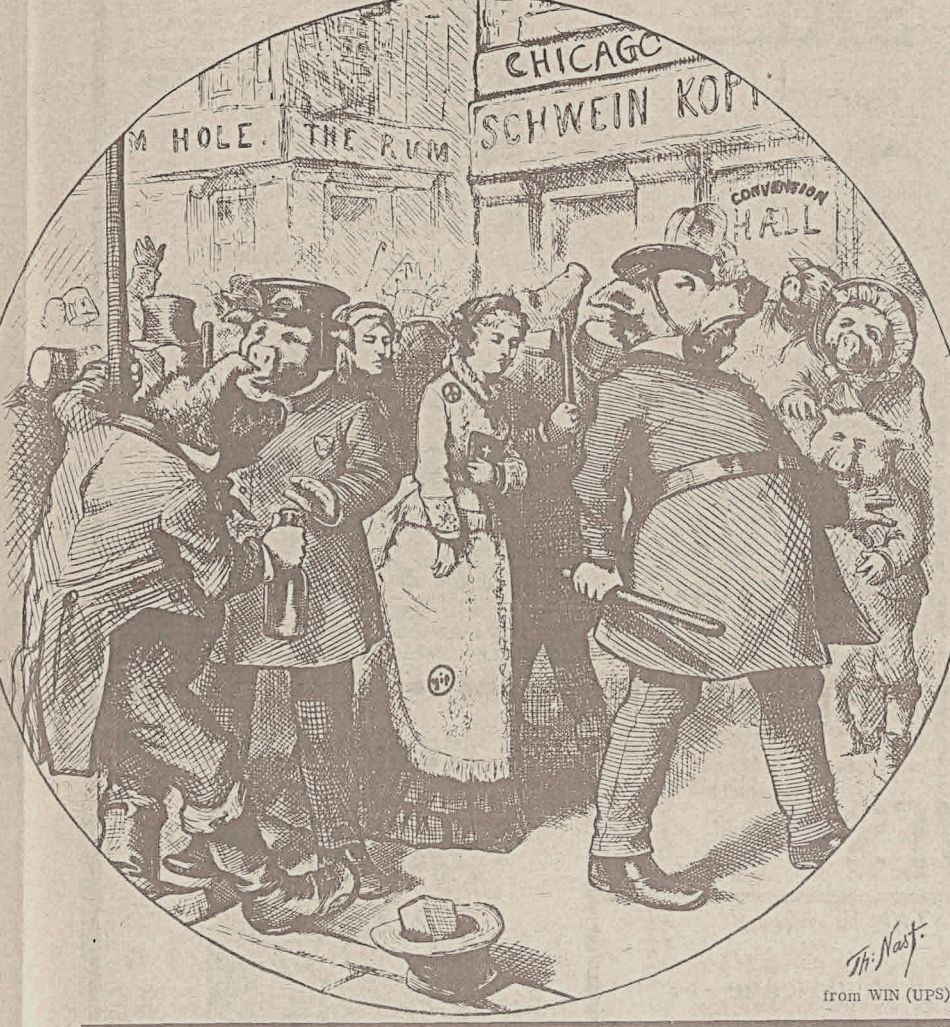

A GUN FOR EACH YIP

Twenty-five thousand armed troopers are now ready to keep the civilian populace in check while the Democrats elect The Man in Chicago next week.
Two brigades of the First Armored Division last week practiced their role in American politics during a three-day exercise called "Operation Jackson Park." Several thousand Yippies are planning to camp and do their thing in Chicago's Lincoln Park.
The 7,500 men from the First Armored can be flown from their training ground in Texas to Chicago in 12 hours.
Parks throughout the city are being reserved as bivouac areas for the 6,000 National Guardsmen ordered to report for duty in Chicago beginning Friday and Saturday.
The whole Chicago police force, 12,000 armed men, will be working on 12-hour shifts. All vacations are cancelled.
Countless agents of the FBI, Secret Service, and Federal Marshals will be on duty in plain-clothes.
Manhole covers have been tarred shut. An eight-foot fence topped with barbed wire protects the Democratic convention hall. Bullet-proof glass has been raised at the entrance.
Chicago's deputy police chief, John Hartnett, says, "anybody who

parades or demonstrates without permits will be arrested."
Yippies say their festival will be held in Lincoln Park with or without a permit. National Mobilization Committee leaders say their demonstrations will be held with or without permits.
At BARB press time permits had not yet been issued.
Despite the customary high estimates of the expected size of the demonstrations -- some say 100,000 supporters of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, plus 50,000 Yippies -- most sources indicate that there actually will be several more protesters than armed militiamen.
Yippie originator Abbie Hoffman told Lawrence Lipton of the LA Free Press that the YIP office in New York received 3,000 letters in July alone. Two thousand people showed up at a Yippie rally last week in Chicago.
Hoffman told Lipton he expects 20-25,000 people from New York.
When Ramparts editor Robert Scheer talked to the National Student Association Congress in Kansas recently, he urged them to demonstrate at the Chicago convention site. The 600 student delegates stood up and cheered.
If a confrontation erupts between Chicago police and the Yippies or the Mob Comm protesters,

it will be this nation's second massive collision between establishment troopers and white middle-class youth.
The first was last year at the Pentagon.
The only silent presence in Chicago is probably the most important. The city's vast black ghetto stretches out near the Democratic convention hall, the International Amphitheatre.
The New York Times describes the black slum as "explosive."
No one, except themselves, knows what Chicago's black militants will do if the fuse is lit at Lincoln Park or the Amphitheatre.
The scene is already beginning to resemble Yippie organizer Jerry Rubin's New Year fantasy, published first in the January 5, 1968 Rubin imagined this:
"The time: August, 1968.
"The place: Chicago.
"Chicago is in panic. The American Youth Festival (Youth International Party) has brought 500,000 young people to Chicago to camp out, smoke pot, dance to wild music, burn draft cards, and roar like wild bands through the streets, forcing the President to bring troops back from Vietnam to keep order in the city while he is nominated under the protection of tear gas and bayonets."

no permit has as yet been granted for the Park, but the Yippies believe that if 5,000 people show up they will be their own permit.
Different kinds of radicals and cultural revolutionaries are coming to Chicago, producing tensions among Yippie leadership. It is a difference more of tendency than of essence. Both factions believe that to be serious you don't have to be dull and that the best way to communicate is through guerrilla theatre.
But one group wants to cutefy, to fight the revolution -- on CBS and in the Chicago Daily News. The "horrifier" section wants to

"Dear Dr. Schoenfeld:
I wanted to comment on the letter from the girl who does vaginal pushing exercises. I've found that my boyfriend likes it when I use this set of muscles during intercourse (though not hard enough to push him out).
Personally, I doubt her claims regarding the potential strength of these muscles. Perhaps she is using an object resembling an erect penis but not attached to a man.
I've never had a child but I've used these muscles regularly for a long time. My boyfriend says that these muscles contract during an orgasm (only more frequently) so they would probably get exercise even if a woman didn't put her mind to it consciously."
QUESTION: A friend of mine wants to drop acid for the first time but is afraid to because she may have gran mal epilepsy. She won't know for sure until she has another seizure (which she really doesn't want to have).
Could you tell me just what the possibilities are in the combination of LSD and epilepsy and whether it's advisable that she drop?
ANSWER: LSD has been known to precipitate seizures (convulsions) in people who have never had them before. Some of these individuals have then continued to have seizures until properly treated. Recently, I learned of a known epileptic who had a seizure after taking what was said to be LSD. Speed (amphetamines) may also touch off seizures.
In short, there is a strong possibility that LSD would cause seizures in a known epileptic or in someone who has previously had a seizure.
QUESTION: What happens when a blind person takes LSD (visually and so on)?
P.S. I'm not blind, just curious...
ANSWER: A person blind since birth could not report sensations of color because this would be a conception outside of his experience. But a few weeks ago, I met

a man, blind since the age of 16, who had taken LSD many times. He had hair to his shoulders, a beard, a lovely and gentle woman, and a far-out mind. I asked him the question you posed and he said he had, on several occasions, experienced sensations of color under the influence of LSD.
In recent columns I have indicated that evidence linking LSD with chromosome damage was equivocal and that prolonged adverse psychological reactions to the drug may occur mainly in those with a previous history of mental instability. My opinion is that LSD and other psychedelic drugs could be valuable in many ways when administered to those prepared for the experience by those prepared to guide the experience.
In "primitive" cultures one does not see the unsupervised or purposeless use of native psychedelic drugs even when they are freely available. Only those considered capable of guiding the experience -- shamans, witchdoctors, gurus -- may give the drug. Almost always this is a custom, not law. Our witchdoctors are still suspicious of the usefulness of psychedelic drugs; moreover, most are not trained to use them even if permitted to do so by the government.
Psychedelic drugs available "on the street" are nearly always impure, adulterated or misrepresented.
Even the best-intentioned dealer may, unknowingly put people on terrible bummers, to say nothing of those who'll do anything for money. The dealer may not know his product is only 25% LSD and the rest unknown chemical, or a mixture of speed and acid, or belladonna and speed.
There's a difference between paranoia and reasonable caution. Beware of chemical garbage.

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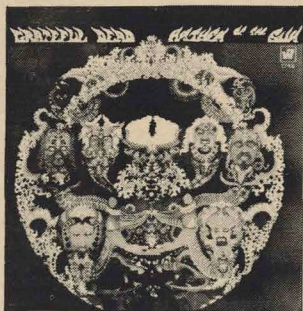


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By now of course you've heard the rumor, Bob Dylan is really Jewish, and his real name is Zimmerman. Just why the German word for "carpenter" should be so readily assumed to be Jewish, I don't know.

I do know this. I've been in Duluth, and it has an extensive Welsh community that includes plenty of Dylans. Also an extensive Jewish community, and the two are generally on good terms. So it might be true either way.

I also know something about those "real name" rumors about celebrities and popular entertainers, and about the patterns they take, and the will to believe that keeps them cropping up.

If you were told that a singer's or actor's real name was Juris Chiriskis, or Constantin Dobreanu, or Sahid Eyuboglu, your reaction would be "don't blame him for changing that." But, told that his real name is Luigi Romanza, or Isadore Greenberg, you're supposed to feel that he's been out down to size, and that now you've got something on him.

Exactly why is not easy to tell. There are plenty of popular public figures with Italian and Jewish names, so it's not mere prejudice. Nobody has anything against Frank Sinatra or Sam Levenson just on those grounds. It seems to go deeper than that.

In the case of an Italian operating under an assumed name, I suppose the idea is that it indicates some connection with the Mob. In the similar case of a Jew, I suppose it has to do with traditional stereotypes of Jewish slyness.

The most extreme of such "real name" rumors was the one about

Yma Sumac, the sensational Peruvian singer who was one of the few justifications for being alive in the early fifties. Understand, I don't know that she was really Peruvian, she might have been Ecuadorean or something.

And I do suspect that "Yma Sumac" was a stage name. I do know that it is authentically Peruvian; it's the name of a princess in an old classic Inca drama, and it means "how beautiful."

The rumor was that she was really from Brooklyn, and that her real name was Amy Camus (spell it backward).

Dig that for preposterous. There happened to be in Brooklyn a girl of exotic beauty and amazing voice, whose name just happened to be the converse of a classical Peruvian name, and she or someone was sufficiently hip to Peruvian lore to spot this and make use of it.

Yet, some people actually found this easier to believe than that the girl might actually be what she was.

As far as Dylan is concerned, I don't give a damn if his real name is Pancho Lopez. He's still Bob Dylan, and he'll still be Bob Dylan, and we'll all still take him that way. --R.R.

the place. On this "new fighting," AP reports that the US command in Vietnam admits "even the enemy's strength was being guessed at."

"US Error Killed 72 in Vietnam...killing five times more civilians than what military reports from the scene indicated at the time."

"The Viet Cong charged over the barbed wire defenses set up by the Leathernecks." The Marines (again) had to call down artillery and bombs on their own positions, but we couldn't even do THAT correctly.

"US Artillery fire, asked by the Marines, blew up the little post's ammunition dump and blocked the way" for South Viet reinforcements who were on their way like the Marines to save the Marines.

At opposite ends of South Viet-

If Vietnam is doing this to us, what can the Czechs do to Russia?

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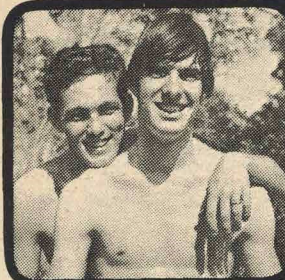
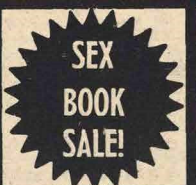
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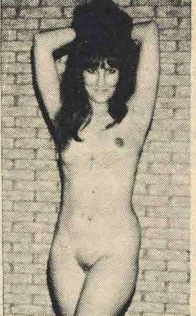
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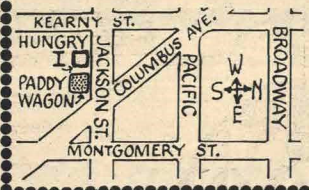
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FREE HEALTH CENTER

 Pending approval by city plumbing inspectors, the new free health center on San Pablo Avenue should open soon.

It is located at 2630 San Pablo, at the site of the short-lived Brain Power Bookstore. The old bookstore sign is still up, and the new facility has as yet no name.

The setup will provide free showers, rest rooms, and laundry facilities for the so-called "dirty-hippies," and future plans involve the setting up of a program of psychological counseling.

The project is the brainchild of the Social Concerns Committee of Newman Hall, operating in conjunction with the late lamented Free Church. Mary Gornley, director of the plan, was not available for comment at the time I called.

I did talk to Lettie Jo Glaude, who described herself as a "weary volunteer," and whose father, Remus Glaude, did most of the carpentry in the remodeling. She

informed me that all materials and labor were donated, and that there were as yet no paid employees. Additionally, she said that fund-raising events will be scheduled in future.
