READY FOR REDS AT HOME WHILE USSR IS AHEAD

The FBI is ready to "pull in" 3,000 to 12,000 people "overnight" from its "master pickup list" anytime the President decides there is an "internal security" emergency such as a "declaration of war by Congress, an insurrection within the US or any of its possessions."

Is this "top-secret" information?

It was until the magazine 'Electronics Illustrated' (page 12) published the above information in its current Nov., 1968 issue. "Operation Dragnet is a very touchy subject, news media stay clear," it points out.

(Long-time BARB readers may remember BARB exposed the whole deal over a year ago. Other underground papers and The Realist followed suit. -- ed.)

But the magazine did not "stay clear". In answer to a letter from reader Rudy Eriebach, Texarkana, Arkansas, who asks "What is something called Operation Dragnet . . . I've heard some fantastic speculations about it", the editors state . . .

"If we're to believe usually-reliable sources, Operation Dragnet is a hush-hush FBI plan to arrest well over 500,000 persons considered political undesirables and potential security risks . . .

"The FBI has the master pick-up list stored in a \$2-1/2 million Univac 1108 computer run by the Office of Emergency Planning at a secret location near Washington.

"The list is constantly updated and expanded with data and names fed to it by the FBI, CIA, military services, State Department, immigration people and a host of other groups keeping tabs on dis-

senters.

"About one million Federal Internal Security Warrants are already printed, and the FBI estimates that it could pull in from 3,000 to 12,000 people overnight and have them whisked off to federal detention camps at Avon Park, Fla.; Allenwood, Pa.; El Reno, Nevada; Tule Lake, Calif.; Wittenburg and Florence, Arizona."

There's much to be said for a free press, even under capitalism. The FBI et al must be blowing their stack over publication of this information. For example: what just IS a "Federal Internal Security Warrant"?

You can be arrested AFTER you rob a bank, but can you be served a warrant and arrested because you might rob a bank? That is what a "Federal Internal Security Warrant" is - a fake.

A lot of good this knowledge will do me and thee while we stand in chow line at Tule Lake some cold morning (just like the American-Japanese did during WW II).

Sgt. Pepper would be very upset if he were NOT picked up in the first "3,000 to 12,000 people" whisked away "overnight". He likes his eggs over easy.

Meanwhile back in Vietnam, nobody in Saigon believes what the candidates are telling us in America. Proof may be found buried in the middle of an AP report from Saigon about "HIGH COST TO US OF VIET CORRUPTION."

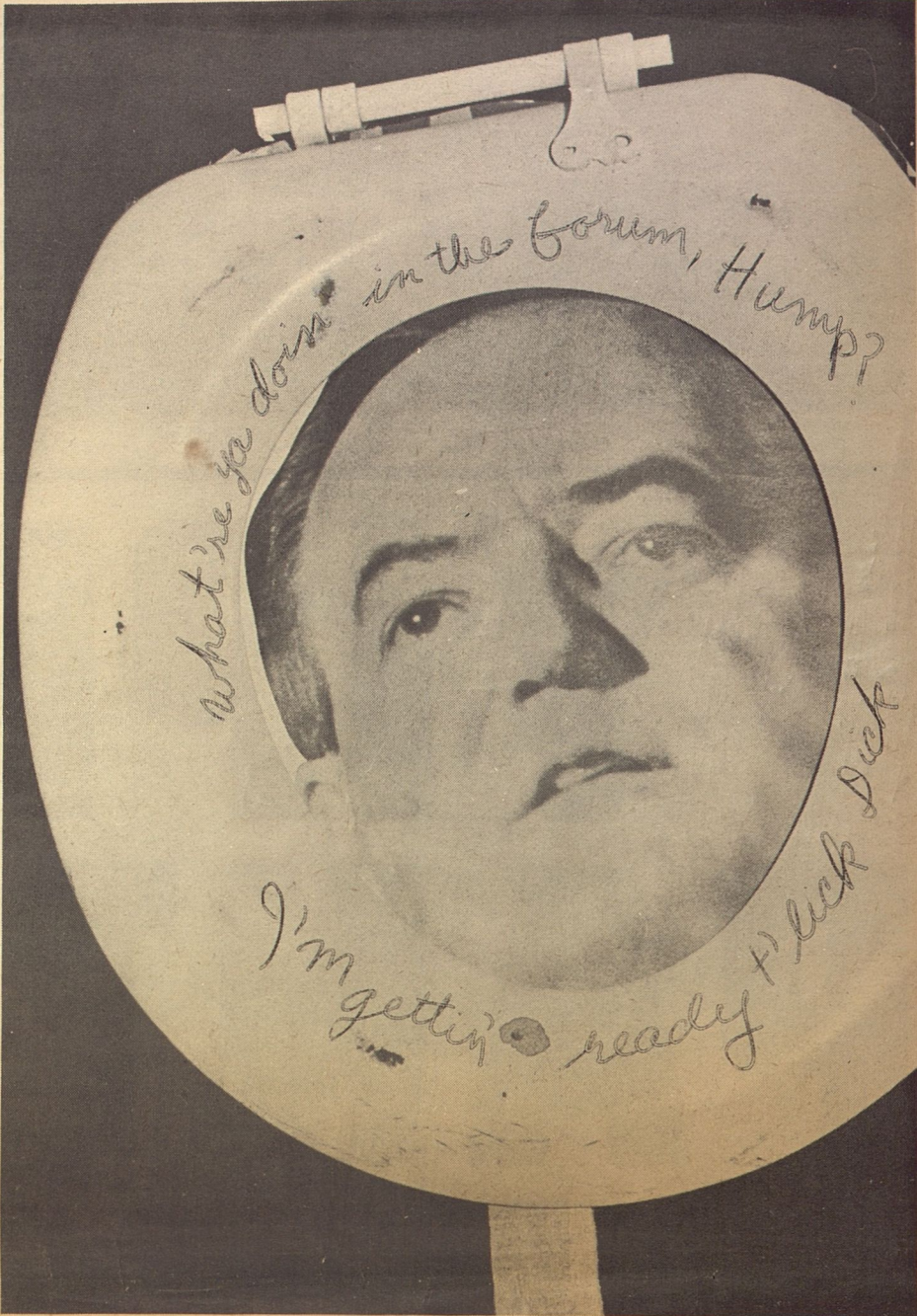

"Now here's a true story from the life of the Skiffle Band: we just walkin' in that door over there, right by that nark there in the white shirt and tie" -- the audience of 150 streeties laughed -- "and we met a cat dressed totally in burlap, wearing an undertaker's hat, wearing beads made of Quaker Puffed Oats. And he said the following words --" (breaking into a familiar tune):

WELL I'M A LONG TALL HIP-PIE, WEAR A LONG STRING OF BEADS (repeat twice)

PEOPLE LOOK AT ME, AND THEY GO -- YEEEEEEEEAAHH!

Softspoken David Axelrod, 20, of The Resistance, interrupted the music fest at Cody's Plaza to announce a Rap session. "The main problem here is pigs," he said. "This is a rap session, so get your words and your poetry together," he urged.

Though many of the Street People skiffled away with the musicians, some stayed on for the more serious business, announced by leaflet as: "continued police occupation of the Avenue; continued political busts; oppressive steps taken by up-tight commercial opportunists, i.e., the Forum; Free Huey; and Free Johns (Are

we ready to get our shit together, it asked).

The rally was also planning to prepare a list of demands on merchants, police, and the City Council.

Axelrod climbed atop the two-step aluminum ladder to start the raps by outlining various "self-help" projects. His main grievance involved the Forum.

The John and a pig-calling incident resulting in his roommate's bust.

"Since full resistance costs us too much blood," he said, "we should hassle the Forum in a limited way." The crowd voiced proposals: Picket? Boycott? The decision was made: Go over right now and demand to use the john?

Without any debate, about 15 of the remaining 40 protesters immediately voted for the third proposal, indicating so with their feet. The group walked through the restaurant to the rear, where owner Frank Albanese greeted them with an open toilet.

He also informed them that he had already fired Ed Khoury, the employee who called the pigs. The prospective piss-inners scattered.

BARB's on-the-spot rap session reporter asked Albanese how long the toilet had been locked. "Not really locked at all," he replied. The manager explained that the key must be obtained each time from a Forum employee, and must be returned immediately afterwards.

"We would love to keep the doors open if only the people would keep it clean and wouldn't mess up the toilet in piggish style."

Back at the rally site, a faithful handful regathered. BARB queried Axelrod about having to ask for a key. Axelrod seemed to believe the door will remain completely open, and nobody will

need a key.

Commune ideologist "Brother Hajj" Jahangir Razavi arrived late. The leading Persian Fucker read a Mayakovsky poem, then rapped eloquently.

Besides the piss-in, the only political activity at the October First rally was collecting spare change for Huey in a tin can decorated with bumper stickers.

Later that evening BARB's clean-up reporter returned to the scene of the afternoon piss-in to clear up the mess with Frank of the Forum.

Albanese admitted that he was extremely sympathetic with the street people, that of course they needed a place to go. "No, I wasn't angered in the least by the demonstration. I understood them and their grievance," he told BARB.

"What I don't understand is why they come to me. We're a business establishment. There's nothing we can do, really. The toilets here are for our patrons and our staff." "As it is, they're no longer working," he confessed.

Albanese said he had indeed agreed to let the group use the toilet, providing they returned the key, although he admitted he didn't have to.

"When they came as a group, of course, they were right. I played along. But their grievances should be brought before the City Council, not to me."

BARB asked Albanese if he was an "up-tight commercial opportunist" as charged by the rally committee. He leaned back and said coolly, "I like them. They're good people, when they don't come in groups."

"One other thing," he added, "the fellow from the rally this afternoon -- he didn't return the key."

Later reports at press time indicate the johns are still open.

KILLER COP'S RACISM

Some further aspects of S.F. Police Officer Michael O'Brien's racist background were revealed to BARB by several sources this week.

O'Brien, 27, involved in the fatal Sunday night shooting of a truckdriver father of two, was found to have had previous on-and-off-duty hassles with blacks, and as a juvenile, in Portland was arrested twice, newspapers reported earlier.

An eyewitness to the murder of George Baskett, identified only as Lucille, told BARB that she heard policeman O'Brien yelling "Nigger" and saw him waving a gun, prior to the murder Sunday night.

O'Brien's friend, Willis Garriot, later returned to the Bush Street alley with a special "policeman (in blue uniform but without badge or cap, according to an eyewitness). They forced several blacks up against a wall at gunpoint while Baskett and O'Brien fought in Brush Place, according to the witness.

"Baskett was holding a chair rung, and yelling 'put away your gun, let's fight hand-to-hand'" Lucille said. "O'Brien dared Baskett to move, saying 'I want to kill a nigger', all the while holding the gun on him."

The witness complained that there was no indication that O'Brien and Garriot were cops. "Why didn't they say they were cops?" she asked.

She learned only through later radio reports that they were on "Cahill's force".

BARB also found this week that O'Brien and his friends had caused trouble in the Brush Place neighborhood on several occasions prior to Sunday's incident.

Last August, Lucille told BARB, O'Brien pulled a gun on a seventeen year old neighborhood girl, again while off duty.

The woman also said that O'Brien had held loud all-night parties in the Brush Place garage. The party-goers were said to be other cops and "motorcycle dudes."

Complaints from the working-class neighbors directed at O'Brien were completely ignored, she said.

Residents also complained of the cop's practice of trailing his boat through the narrow street.

Prior to his transfer to the Richmond District, O'Brien had a reputation in Hunter's Point as a "head-beater" according to Phil Kay, a Hunter's Point resident.

Kay told BARB, "Last August O'Brien answered a patrol car call from a mother about the molesting of her daughter, and responded to the wrong address."

"O'Brien and his partner busted in to the 'New Thing,' a Negro Youth Club, where they called the patrons 'little niggers'."

According to Kay, O'Brien's now-famous "Gas Huey" button was on his p.d. tie clasp. When questioned, O'Brien told the youths "I'm proud of the pin. I hope it proves true in the week to follow". (The last week of Newton's trial).

O'Brien was also allegedly involved in the beating and arrest of three of the "New Thing" youths. A S.F. judge threw the case out, according to Kay.

BARB also learned this week that police Community Relations officers have been sticking their necks out in the case. They have been responsible for "spurring the investigation on."

PCR members also saw that the four black suspects held after Sunday night's incident were freed on their own recognizance, and that Mrs. Baskett was able to file a Federal court complaint, a source revealed.

LOVE, PEACE FEST BUMMERED BY FUZZ

Berkeley's Festival of Love and Peace last Sunday ended as an Exercise in Law and Order.

While hundreds of diverse people strolled through Live Oak Park gazing at sculpture, painting, photography and unnamed art-forms, Carl Worth, director of the city's official art center, was spending much of his time on the phone, trying to keep the heat off.

Police arrived Sunday afternoon, gesturing a stack of complaints several inches thick. A call to City Manager William Hanley kept the festival open.

When a group described by one observers as "members of the Geritol set" complained that they couldn't use the park, the fest nevertheless went on.

Hanley's support was withdrawn Sunday at 10 p.m., the hour Berkeley's sound ordinance goes into force. Police arrived promptly to squelch the noise emanating from the Art Center's small indoor theatre.

The noise was a Rock Mass being offered by the Free Church, sponsor of the weekend festival. According to people outside the building at the time, the sound of the band was far from loud, even nearby.

Despite the efforts of Carl Worth and Free Church Reverend Dick York, the police insisted that the sound must cease.

Hanley and Worth did succeed for two days in fending off those who objected to the display of "street culture" throughout the park and in its Art Center gallery.

Just before the 10 p.m. crack-down Sunday, the Floating Lotus Magic Opera Company completed its ceremony-drama, the Quest for

the Inner Eye of Truth. Costumes, gestures, music and words woven by the Floating Lotus led a procession of spectators into a spontaneous dance.

That dancing mood, at a slower tempo, seemed to be reflected in the eyes of most of the thousands of people who wandered among the artworks during the two days. Many were heard to remark on the good quality of the work.

Even the rock bands did not pack the people too tight together, but there always seemed to be a crowd. Unlike many of the classic Beins, at the Live Oak festival a weary body had room to lie on the grass without encountering stray feet.

Although many street people expressed bitterness that The Man ended the arts fest on a harsh note, several are still working on a project to develop an Arts Center for the Telegraph Avenue community.

They invite interested persons to attend a meeting for that purpose at the Berkeley City Hall on Friday, October 4, at 1:30 p.m.

ARCATANS DON'T LIKE HUMBOLDT

Student grape-boycoters picketed Safeway in sleepy Arcata last week, increasing the dislike of "Redwood Empire" bosses for Humboldt State College. If the college moved away, few townsfolk would complain.

In this grim atmosphere, SDS campus activists hope to publish an underground newspaper, from a guerilla theater team, and fight restrictive dorm rules imposed on coeds. They're also pissed off at a shortage of classes and instructors, which caused foulups and delays in registration.

Their nearest allies seem to be miles away in Ferndale, a restored "Victorian village" of art galleries and curio shops operated by hip merchants. Two teenagers recently set themselves up as light-show specialists, surrounded by placid dairy farms.

CRISIS CAMPUS TO CLOSE IF STUDENT'S BASE DEMANDS NOT MET

The possibility of massive demonstrations which could close the University next week loomed menacingly over Wheeler Hall, where the Berkeley division of the Academic Senate was still meeting as BARB went to press Thursday night.

"If we don't have a room next Thursday, there is a good chance some form of large confrontation will come about," Charles Webel of the Committee for Participating Education, told BARB.

After three hours of Academic Senate debate, which was sound-amplified to a thousand student vigil outside, it appeared likely that the original motion presented on behalf of the CPE by members of the American Association of University Professors would pass.

"It is still premature, but I would say it stands a decent chance of passing, although it will be close," Webel said.

Motion One, as presented by A. F. Kip of the physics department, is seen by most moderates as a

successful endorsement of the CPE and its controversial Social Analysis 139X course, center of the issue.

But CPE leaders told BARB that Motion One, if passed in entirety, would be unsatisfactory. "Even if the motion passes, Webel said, 'this cannot be regarded as acceptable in any sense of the word, for three reasons: 1) There is no provision to offer credit for 139X and that must be guaranteed; 2) there is no explicit provision for the assigning of a room for 139X and this must be set down, when and where; and 3) there is no mention of any of the other CPE courses, several of which are also in limbo."

It appeared late Thursday evening that the Senate could not possibly rally to include all of CPE's demands, even though a major victory was won earlier in the day with the defeat of the moderating Stamp Amendment of a vote of 575-348. The broadly-based CPE coalition seemed to have great support on campus and even in the Senate chambers. But the inclusion of Webel's planks seemed virtually impossible in the light of the day's debate.

University President Charles J. Hitch spoke first at the session, declining to take part in the debate or the voting, but calling for stalling measures to prevent "the prediction of self-destruction" from coming true at Berkeley. Chancellor Roger Heyn urged but gently a "student-sponsored non-credit program of instruction," to the dismay of the outside crowd. Professor Troy Duster of sociology presented the strongest case for the Board of Educational Development in trying to keep the 139X course intact.

At noon on Sprout plaza, Black Panther leader and author Eldridge Cleaver gave his first lecture of the 139X that he is forbidden to teach, promising that he would give "20 or 30 or 40 more" before he is through. Cleaver has already been sentenced to serve the remainder of his prison term

NEW TACTICS FOR CLEAVER, AND LATER?

A new student organization is growing up on the Berkeley campus around the Cleaver issue.

Still without a name, it is a mass-based representative structure. Students are organized in groups of 20 to 40 which send representatives to a central body. This body selects a steering committee to handle the nit-picking details.

The present organization draws its legitimacy from its representative structure and can refer decisions back to the membership. But the leadership can act on a mandate during crisis periods when representative democracy would be too slow and vulnerable.

The organization also has the potential of lying dormant for extended periods of time and being reactivated intact for future crises.

It appears that it could easily go underground should it have to.

and can be jailed at almost any moment.

Lecturing to six or seven thousand at the noon-rally-and-first-class session of his course in Dehumanization and Regeneration, Cleaver began with a pep talk and then exploded into his more powerful oratory.

"When they try to shut you up, when they lock the doors and shut the buildings, there's no recourse but the streets and the Plaza," Cleaver said, also taking the opportunity to condemn Mickey Mouse Reagan and Donald Duck Rafferty. "They don't own the State of Cali-

DEMOCRACY NOW GROUP AIMS FOR THE DEAD CENTER

Quietly, very quietly, a new group steals onto the campus, with the idea of being in the dead center of things. "That's where the possible is," Ed Winn, founder of Campus Democracy now told BARB.

"At present the group consists of about three dozen," Winn said. "We're not activists, we're not extremists. We hope to act, not as a mass, but as individuals acting as models for the community."

The group hopes to tackle all of the University's difficulties in a slow-moving, well-planned, yet unplanned campaign to restore democracy to the entire community. "We're not taking issue with the hippies, the straights, the merchants or the police. We recognize that everybody's got to live here, and that there's room enough for everyone to do their thing."

"But," the CDN founder emphasized, "there is no room for violent behavior. We do not view anyone as our enemy, except those who resort to violence. We feel there is absolutely no excuse for violence."

Winn, a graduate student in education, told BARB that the idea for the group came to him late in the summer when he realized "it wasn't safe for me, for other people, to do the things we do." At the same time, Winn said he felt it was unfair to "damn everyone -- the street people on one side, the police on the other -- for the violent behavior of a few."

The Campus Democracy group, just getting underway, favors widespread reforms which could begin by improving the University's image with the taxpayers and work on up from there.

"We want to establish means of talking things over, ways to work out living together. For example, we understand that students are not the total University, that the so-called street people and the police are not the only people on the Avenue."

Few concrete proposals were mentioned during the interview with BARB. Winn said because of Registration Week, their work wasn't fully underway. He declined to comment specifically on the Cleaver case, although he said his group was well aware of the problems of racism in the University community.

"Here again, we cannot see where breaking windows helps. Buildings are non-entities. That money used in repair could go for scholarships. High school kids in this state still think Cal is for rich kids," Winn explained.

"We feel all cultures should be represented in the curriculum. We feel that every viewpoint must be heard. The noon rallies don't seem to represent a good portion of the campus and its people. We feel there should be more than a facade for student government. We feel that there should be a

student or students on the Board of Regents in the way other schools have done."

A Berkeley Gazette story last month quoted Winn saying his group "was prepared to join the Police Reserve." Winn explained to BARB: "I meant we are preparing to study the policeman from inside, to find out what, in fact, a policeman does, and what reactions the people have to their actions."

The CDN neither condemns nor praises the Berkeley cops for their summer stock performance this year. Instead they stick to their guns by indicating that all kinds of violence is unnecessary and deplorable.

Winn reaffirmed several times his organization's position in the middle: "We hope to be an interracial, broadly-based coalition, a political and seriously concerned with genuine academic, economic, and racial grievances. As we see it, the extreme right and the extreme left are the destroyers. They have nothing with which to replace the present system, unless they hope to establish a dictatorship and suppress all the rights of all of us."

"This may sound corny," Winn said, "but I believe in the American Dream, and I think we can start to rebuild it here and now."

'WOMEN' WANT ADS ON WAY OUT

Sexually segregated employment ads must stop Dec. 7, warns Uncle Sam's Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

No longer can separate "Men Wanted" and "Women Wanted" categories be used to discriminate against women in the job market. Except for a few jobs where sex is a "bona fide occupational qualification" (!).

Uncle took this enlightened step forward after being kicked in the ass by NOW, the militant National Organization for Women. Feminists sued EEOC and picketed the New York Times. Uncle has been pretty slow about enforcing Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, which forbids job bias against chicks.

In San Francisco, NOW will hear political candidates Friday night, 8:15 PM, Oct. 4, at the sterile Homestead Savings meeting room, Geary and 22nd Ave., to judge their "Sex Quotients" on women's rights, maternity leaves, abortion, and child care benefits.

business practice."

Local postmasters translated these generalities into specifics. On hair length, said Harper, "Basically we require a man to have his hair where he shows some neckline." No length limit for beards, "as long as the beard is neatly trimmed and does not present a shaggy appearance."

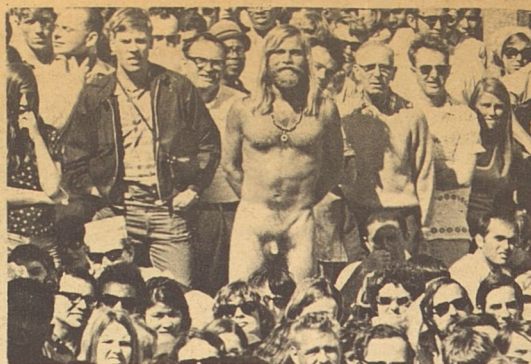

Negotiations were held this week, but the picket lines are still up around the Freight and Salvage coffee house.

Proprietress Nancy Owens met with boycotting theatrical group Dementia. The actors say they were not impressed.

"She offered us every Wednesday in October," Dementia spokesman Desmond Clark told BARB. "This is not agreeable to us. Midweek audiences are not acceptable. We would like to return to the initial agreement where we'd perform one day of any three weekends a month."

Miss Owens stated, "I offered them four Wednesdays in October. This is the best I can do. I'm already booked for all the weekends."

The dispute arose after cancellation of the drama group's weekend appearances at the new coffee house. Dementia claims they put 1,500 work-hours into the building of F&S in return for an agreement of regularly-scheduled weekend bookings.

Miss Owen's denies such an agreement. "I told them they could play once a weekend, that we'd

try them and see just for the time being, but nothing definite."

If they cannot return to the Freight and Salvage for regular weekend gigs, Dementia wants to be paid for their previous labor and the use of their stage.

Meanwhile, they plan to keep picketing.

WHY PANTHER RESIGNED

"When black people assume power, they try to get in and change the rules of the game," Fred Smith told BARB.

He gave that as the reason for his resignation this week from the Presidency of the Merritt College Student Body.

Smith, a young Black Panther, worked hard for Black-Directed Change at Merritt last year. When he returned to school this fall, he found that the fee for membership in the student corporation had been raised \$1, and that the 10% discount to corporation members had been abandoned -- without consulting him.

Four events during the week of Oct. 13 - 20 are expected to dramatize the fact that the first Oakland Stop The Draft Week happened one year ago.

By sponsoring the series of events which coincide with the anniversary of last October's demonstration, the defense committee is hoping to keep alive interest in the fate of the seven leaders, and to raise money for their legal expenses.

An Alameda County superior court this week set Nov. 18 as the trial date for the seven accused of conspiracy to commit misdemeanors.

The commemorative activities include a party at Provo Park, tentatively scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 13, which will feature Country Joe & The Fish along with other groups, and a showing of films by Newsreel about STDW and Cuba.

Arrangements have also been made for a panel discussion on North Vietnam and Cuba with members of the STDW and the Black Panther Party who have visited the illegal sectors. Terry Cannon who sat in on talks with the NLF, Ann Scheer, the defense committee chairman who has been in Hanoi; and the Black Panthers' George Murray, recently the center of an SF State dispute, will be participants.

Another event expected to take place during the week-long commemorative is a pre-induction physical party for Reese Erlich, who was reclassified 1-A following his expulsion from UC for STDW activities.

Large-scale demonstrations have been promised by the defense committee for the trial date next month. Interested persons are asked to call the STDW Defense Committee at 653-8509 or write to: 4802-1/2 Telegraph, Oakland.

BUT THEN, JUST TRY FOR TEN

Ten years ago a small number of men moved into an old armory on the beach at Santa Monica and decided to live clean. All of them were long-time heroin addicts. For them living clean meant going cold turkey, the excruciatingly painful process of total immediate withdrawal from all drugs.

From that original California experiment in clean living, came the Synanon Foundation, now a national organization run by ex-addicts for their own rehabilitation.

In San Francisco, Synanon has been located for several years in the historic Seawall warehouse on Lombard. Next Wednesday, as national Synanon celebrates its tenth anniversary, SF Synanon leaves its home in the Seawall, the city's oldest commercial building.

Though Seawall is scheduled to be demolished shortly, Synanon's work of "absorbing people into the responsible community" will continue. "We don't know where, just yet," Synanon told BARB this week. In the meantime a Synanon-operated Texaco dealership will continue to do business at 2098 Lombard.

two inducements for the students to join the student body corporation," Fred Smith told BARB. "Static from people who work for the corporation made it impossible for me to work as president of the corporation. Even accounting books for the past year weren't available."

SFPO COOL ON HAIR

No, the San Francisco Post Office does not limit employees' hair to military length, assures Charles W. Harper, SF Management Procedures Director.

"I would certainly like to find out who in our organization, if anyone, uses the phrase 'military standards'," he told BARB. The inquiry arose from a phoned complaint by an anonymous hippie applicant.

Appearance standards flow from a new regulation issued August 1 by P.O. brass in Washington, Harper explained. In order to maintain the public's confidence in employees, the regulation states, "Hair--and beards and moustaches, if worn--must be kept neatly trimmed and clean." Also, non-uniformed employees "whose duties require contact with, or exposure to, the public must dress in a manner and present an appearance which conforms to good

GI'S VOW TO GO AWOL TO BE IN ANTI-WAR MARCH

GI's will march October 12th if they have to go AWOL to do it. The office of the GI and Veterans' March For Peace has begun to receive reports that military bases throughout the West are scheduling special inspections and parades to keep servicemen on base that day. But march organizer Lt. Hugh Smith told the weekly march meeting Tuesday that "GI's are going to march if they have to go AWOL to prove that the rights of dissent outweigh the threats of punitive reaction by the armed services." "If they are willing to squash our rights as human beings we are willing to take the matter to the public and the courts," Smith added. A suit against the armed services has been filed in Federal Court Wednesday asking that they be enjoined from preventing servicemen from participating in the march.

MOTHERS BEG DOCKERS TO REFUSE WAR CARGO

Two East Bay mothers have gone to the docks to find out how the longshoremen feels when he loads a boat full of the tools of death and destruction. Mrs. Ginnie Proctor of Berkeley and Mrs. Vivian Rainier of Oakland are taking their question to the Ferry Building in San Francisco this week in the form of an open letter leaflet which they'll give to dockworkers at pay windows. "Where do you stand, Mr. Longshoremen?" they ask in a respectfully-worded plea to the men. "Would you consider that a war cannot be waged without armaments, munitions, and other war cargo? Would you consider that the present illegal and immoral war in Vietnam could not be waged if you, the longshoremen, refuse to load those arms and other war-supportive cargoes?" "You are helping to prolong the horror," the two sisters tell them. "Do you square it with yourself by saying that you're not letting our boys down?" "Is not the best support to our sons there, the only meaningful and pertinent support, that which demands: Bring Them Back Alive, that which demands: Stop The War, that which refuses to cooperate in the waging of that war including

the loading and shipments of munitions and other war cargo?" they ask. The women call upon "the long and proud history" of the longshoremen's union. "You fought and died for labor's right to organize. You refused to load scrap metal for Japan in the 30's. Because of you, the American working man and his union have the power to speak out in many ways (or take direct action.)" "Would you consider," they ask, "how great a strike for peace you could deal to the war machine by stilling those powerful hands when it comes to loading?" "Would you consider refusing to work the docks from which arms and other war-supportive cargo is shipped? Would you consider that, Mr. Longshoreman?" Mrs. Rainier told BARB that the protest was a personal, spontaneous action, on the part of herself and her sister. "We have no plans to make anything larger out of this. We just felt we could do something, and we thought of this."



FTAF

The Air Force has been prevented from sweeping some of its more bothersome members under the rug. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas has issued an order that the Air Force halt proceedings to ship Lt. Hugh Smith to Taiwan. Smith is a leading organizer of the GI and Veterans' March for Peace scheduled for October 12th.

Smith has been appealing his transfer in the Federal Courts. The Machinery was preparing to ship him out anyway until Douglas' order was received blocking further action until the appeal is heard by the next court up. A judgment by the local appeals court will come down on October 10th. Smith has orders to be on a plane a few hours after the decision comes down. He is going to have a lawyer sitting in Justice Douglas' living room at that time, though. Douglas is currently fishing in Washington state out in the boondocks, but Smith says they'll have a phone installed in Douglas' cabin if they have to. He expects another order from the Supreme Court Justice if his appeal is refused. Another organizer of the March, Airman Michael Locks, was grabbed by the Air Police while he was in Washington last week to speak with Congressmen. Needless to say, he was kept in custody past Congress' closing time. The pretext was that they wanted to verify his leave, which they did within fifteen minutes after he was picked up. As Locks was finally turned loose, an NCO told him "I don't know how you got out of this. I've never seen so much brass in my life." The order for Lock's release came from one of the top Air Force Generals.

EVER'BODY'S GOT THOSE TRIPLE-D'S

Did you spend your summer vacation studying explosives, incendiaries and demolitions? Apparently some students have. Dig: Several unidentified explosions were heard in Berkeley last Friday night. A Naval Reserve Training Center in Eugene Oregon (a university town) was attacked by saboteurs on Sunday night. A crane and six trucks were damaged by explosions and fires. In Detroit a series of dynamite blasts has punctuated the scene. They began after the Chicago obscenity and were directed at police

Pictured at left is Ralph Ginzburg, publisher of the most notorious and wanted magazines of the 20th Century.

First he launched the quarterly *Eros*, a magazine dedicated to the joys of love and sex. *Eros* was an instantaneous *succès de scandale* and over a quarter of a million people ordered subscriptions, despite the fact that they cost \$25. But the U.S. Post Office declared *Eros* "obscene" and drove it out of business (and, incidentally, obtained for Ginzburg a five-year prison sentence, which has since been appealed).

Then he brought out the crusading bimonthly *Fact*, which was the first major American magazine to inveigh against U.S. involvement in Vietnam, cigarette advertising in the mass media, and Detroit's ruthless disregard for car safety (Ralph Nader was a *Fact* discovery). The intellectual community was galvanized by *Fact* and bought—devoured!—over half a million copies, despite the fact that *Fact* was not available at most newsstands (most newsdealers found it too controversial) and it was priced at a steep \$1.25. But certain Very Important Persons got mad at *Fact*—including Barry Goldwater, who sued the magazine for \$2 million—and it, too, was driven out of business.

The Yippies will testify on Friday, along with Dave Dellinger and Tom Hayden of the National Mobilization. Abby Hoffman will be wearing the American flag and carrying a whip, and Jerry will be wearing an NLF flag as a cloak over his guerrilla costume.

Yippie Paul Krassner has called the appearance of the hearings "a surrealist acid dream," with freaks, pigs and squares meshing in a very nutty fruitcake.

Nobody is scared, everybody is having a good time, and HUAC is still very dead.

PROVO PARK GRAN FINALE

The last Provo Park Sunday concert of 1968 will feature four noted rock bands.

To fit the Youngbloods, the Sons of Champin, Fantana, and the Frumious Bandersnatch into one afternoon, the concert will begin at 1 p.m., an hour earlier than usual.

The October 5 rock session will end a season that began Easter Sunday. Despite midsummer rumors that a few fights in the park might lead to the closing of the series, none of the gigs had to be canceled.

Promoters of the Berkeley event remind listeners that No Parking is allowed in the area behind the bandstand.

HAIL! HUBERT

"Holy Hubert," Telly's favorite street preacher, is back in Berkeley.

He returned to his street pulpit and his faithful student congregation of hecklers and other admirers Thursday, after a 3,300-mile tour of college campuses in the West and Midwest.

Beautifully-freckled and resplendent rust-haired Hubert Lindsey, 55, plans to pick up where he left off. "I'm planning to stay," the man of God told BARB. "Berkeley's got me to put up with again, bless their dirty hearts."

The Rev. Lindsey took his Word of the streets on the road "to gain a better insight into student activity." "I took the same line of thinking, yes, of course. I preached to students all over. I told them that the only way society's gonna be changed is by God coming to dwell in man."

As a man of God in the streets, Hubert has become an authority on hecklers. He's at his best when they're at theirs. What were hecklers like in other parts of the country? BARB asked.

"I found the best hecklers at Reed. I appreciated their intelligence. The Minnesota hecklers, even the Chicagoans weren't as good. A man with a big brain can be mightily used for Christ, I told them at Reed. That's the reason I stay around here," Hubert added. "God tells me to stay in Berkeley."

"A riot squad greeted me at Portland State," the evangelist beamed. "Because there was such a crowd. But the students booed them, and I called, 'Check my I.D. if you want, I'm busy preaching, and went right on.'"

"I know street preachin' is illegal sometimes," the street preacher confided, "but sometimes that doesn't matter. I've been busted many times, many times."

In Portland, at a Hubert Humphrey rally, the famous Berkeley orator said he joined student demonstrators in their protest. "They were calling out 'Hell, No We Won't Go,' - and 'We Shall Overcome' and like that, when they asked me to help. I stood up and said, 'I used to stand for Hubert, now I stand for Jesus Christ.'"

Berkeley's Hubert admitted he took to calling himself "Holy Hubert" (after the BARB's usage) to distinguish himself from HHH.

This week, psychedelically-colored buttons featuring the legend "Jesus Saves" over an angelically toothless caricature of Hubert appeared in Berkeley, complete with the avant-God lower

legend, "Holy Hubert."

Revealing his stunted campaign for the Presidency, the preacher told BARB, "before the New Hampshire primary, there was a swelling of support to get me to run."

Speaking briefly of politics, Holy Hubert prophesied that what students want will be hard to get. "Like Hippies, for example, they increase a politician's chance by opposing him. Those who heckle Wallace, give him his best opportunity."

On the eve of his return to the pavement pulpit at Bancroft & Telegraph, Hubert appeared anxious to get back to work. "I was to the Universities of Arkansas, Colorado, Illinois, Oklahoma and Minnesota, to the University of Chicago, Portland State and Reed. I've spoken to a lot of students. I've preached all over now."

"I've come back to save as many students here as I can," said the three-year veteran of the Cal campus. "I know I'm more effective than the established priests. I know that the church and the stained glass, the high steeple and the high collar aren't the important things about belief. And I know I can deliver the Lord's word to the people from right there in the streets of Berkeley."

Holy Hubert, the Rev. Lindsey, who has "been a-preachin' for goin' on 40 years," said this week of his radical Berkeley parishioners, "I feel I'm getting to them."

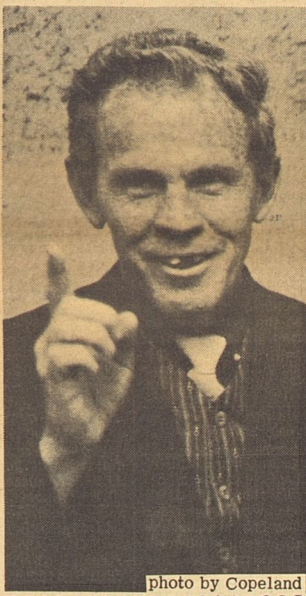

SMITHS IN COURT AFTER PIG-WHIPPING

The trial of the three Smiths has been postponed to 9 a.m. Friday, October 4.

The 65-year-old Mrs. Willetta Smith, who faces up to seven years in the penitentiary for "assaulting an officer", her daughter Harriet, a former Merritt College Student Body President, and Fred Smith (no relation) the present student prexy at Merritt were in court last Monday as arranged.

Prosecutor Anderson, of the

D.A.'s office couldn't make it because of his mother's funeral.

Vera Means of the Bay Area Blacks United handed BARB a copy of a news release that had been prepared for a 10 a.m. press conference. All the local news media, including T.V. stations, she said, had been notified. Only BARB showed up.

The turnout in the courtroom was inadequate, too, Miss Means told BARB.

"Tell your readers we need some bodies out here Friday morning," she said, "We'd like to have black people, but if we can't get them, we'd like to have anybody that will come."

Of the Smiths' chances for acquittal; Mis Means told BARB: "I think they're pretty good. I don't think the police have a case. If they had one, that policeman would still be on the force."

She was speaking of the cop who invaded the Smith home with his partner to beat and mace the three Smiths in front of four children that the elder Mrs. Smith was babysitting. He resigned shortly after the incident, with Police Chief William Beall admitting that his deadly duo had used "bad judgment."

"I'd like the public to know," said Miss Means, "that we're responsible black people -- and we're angry, very angry."

That's 9 a.m., Department One, Berkeley Municipal Court.

SUPPORT

The Blacks for Justice Committee boycott against downtown Oakland merchants -- to put community pressure on police brutality in the ghetto -- picked up support this week.

Chairman Alphonso Galloway told BARB that Social Workers' Union 535 and the Oakland branch of the Urban League announced their support of the Committee's goals.

"We're pretty optimistic about gaining more support from other organizations," Galloway said, "but we still need more help. Any kind of encouragement or donations will be appreciated."

WHO RULES RICHMOND?

CERRITAN TAKES LEAD IN MOVES TO BAN BARB

Birchers are breathing hotter and heavier over obscenities they think they have found in the Richmond Library, the BARB in particular.

There are picket lines of LOL's marching heavily up and down in front of the library these days, passionate letters in the daily rag, and frightened discussions in the library commission as to whether the freedom to read and know is really worth defending.

The picket by the Concerned Mothers of Richmond has been mounted since Monday. It crosses back and forth in front of a table where Dorothy Strindberg, who claims to be a relative of oft-banned playwright August Strindberg, has planted the foster children she cares for to hand out leaflets damning the BARB, Avant Garde, LA Free Press, and any other publication which appears to them lascivious.

But obscenity is far from the only issue involved. The BARB doesn't dig Birchers. Some people even say that BARB is antagonistic toward them.

So the Birchers have the answer: Ban the BARB.

"Librarians know," Laurel Burley, Librarian of the Speech Department at U.C., told BARB "that 99.9% of the time that the obscenity issue is raised, the objection is purely on political grounds."

If there was any doubt of the political nature of the Ban-The-BARB movement, it was removed last Saturday. Mrs. Lois Klock, a prime mover in the Concerned Mothers published a letter in the Richmond Independent stating that she had been asked to leave the Mothers because of her involvement in the Birch Society. So she had to leave.

Mrs. Klock, though a leading torch in Richmond book-burner circles, does not even live in Richmond. She is a resident of an unincorporated area of Contra Costa County outside the city.

Made curious, BARB looked into the home areas of other activists for censorship in the Richmond dispute. We found an interesting pattern developed: most of them were from El Cerrito.

If our telephone books are right, this includes Edith Paolini, Donald Sandifur, Rose Stewart, and Edward M. Walker.

This concern for residency would be nit-picking if it hadn't been people of this ilk who stood up in a Richmond City Council meeting a few weeks ago to yell, "Throw the outsiders out," when defenders of the BARB were speaking.

Edward M. Walker, who apparently both lives and works in El Cerrito, went so far as to dateline his letter from "Richmond" in last Saturday's Independent. Perhaps he was in town

when he mailed it.

The Walker letter is a fine example of scurrilous political misinformation. For example: Walker claims that a group of parents went to head librarian John Forsman to protest the BARB, that Forsman yelled "censorship" and immediately went to the city council.

Fact: Mrs. Lois Klock complained about the BARB before the city council last August 12. Two days later Forsman received his first complaint about the BARB on paper under the letterhead: Mother of Perpetual Help Institute--of El Cerrito. It wasn't until August 23 that Mrs. Klock and her Richmond Mothers deigned to show up at the library to talk to Forsman.

"They went directly to the most political body they could find," Laurel Burley told BARB, "the city council. The correct procedure is to complain first to the librarian, then to the library commission, and then to the city council."

Another gambit of the Walker letter was to discredit the political intentions of the freedom to read defenders. "The librarian next used an old trick and screamed John Birch Society," it read.

The irony of this statement was multiplied by the appearance of Mrs. Klock's admission of Birch Society membership right next to the Walker letter on the same page of the Independent.

Furthermore, the Walker letter went on, in its most blatant attempt at character assassination, Forsman "has even printed, probably at library expense, thousands of flyers denouncing the 'supporters of the John Birch Society.'"

Fact: The Freedom to Read Committee, supported by donations from people in Richmond and around the Bay Area as well as elsewhere, paid for the flyers in full.

"Obviously John Forsman would not use public monies for this kind of activity and he's not so stupid that the idea would even occur to him," Laurel Burley told BARB, her voice angry.

Forsman is known throughout California as a fine librarian. Miss Burley, as Chairman of the Freedom to Read Committee, knows full well where the money came from. It wasn't pilfered from the public.

With this kind of political pressure birching out of the El Cerrito cell, perhaps the 5-man Richmond Library Commission's reluctance to get involved is understandable.

In their most recent meeting "the commission couldn't get more than two votes on any one issue," David Brunton, Executive Director of the California Library Association p. 13

HISTORIC HIP HOUSE CEDED TO STRAIGHTS

Another Bohemian rooming-house shut down, bringing that species closer to extinction.

The grey Victorian labyrinth at 191 Haight had been hip for several years, managed by Big Brother's big brother (formerly manager of legendary 1090 Page).

Sokkagakkai chanters shook the rafters by night, and by day nude sunbathers basked on the back porch. Heads in basement workshops produced magician's equipment, wire jewelry, nude photos, manuscripts, imitation antique furniture, and electric dulcimers.

First floor housed the Haight Ashbury Models Society, while Shiva Fellowship sacrificed marijuana in their attic temple. One room occupied by SFL founder J. Fuck Poland, equipped with platform bed six feet above the floor, was pictured by Esquire as "the room where sex died."

The last tenant, longhaired British socialist David Kolsky, 19, gathered up his mountains of fac-

tional documents and staggered out last week. Time swallows this magic place, along with 1090, Greta Garbor Home, 279-281 Page, and North Beach's old Wentley and Monkey Block.

In our nostalgia, let us distinguish between hip rooming-house (composed of many separately rented units) and the typical commune (a shared flat, house, or apartment).

Rooming houses were bigger and usually lasted longer, afforded more privacy, and required less cooperation. Though common in Berkeley, only one remains readily apparent in San Francisco, at a location best unmentioned by BARB. Perhaps their function will be taken over by hip hotels downtown.

Though most of these hobbit warrens crumble under the wreckers' ball, 191 Haight will physically survive after remodeling, as large apartments for straights.

HUEY ONS YIPPIES

I was the last reporter to interview Huey P. Newton before the Man put him under wraps at Vacaville.

We spent three rewarding hours together last Thursday, the day before he was sentenced to two to fifteen. His attorney, Charles Garry, was with us.

The next day Garry led the press to Huey's last conference. It never took place. Without ceremony or precedent his captors had whisked Huey off to the Vacaville prison.

Much of what Huey told me is too hot to reveal right now. What follows, however, is very important to the movement.

Huey was in a relaxed mood.

"I guess they're going to complain about the candy," he said. He had been chewing on a gum drop. "I'm not allowed to eat in between meals here".

Garry left the cell to find out what the pigs were complaining about.

We were in a small glass and bar cell, where we could be seen but supposedly not heard by the guards. The cubicle reminded me a little of the gas chamber prosecutor Lowell Jensen wanted so badly to put Huey in.

"It's okay," Garry said when he returned, "they were interested in something else."

It was a sort of a going away party for Huey. The next day the pigs would send him off to Vacaville, and Huey was pretending to be looking forward to it.

The talk ranged from loose rapping about the taverns where Huey used to do some of his best Panther organizing to the Yippie way of making the pigs freak out in the desired manner to hard talk about the state of the white-black revolutionary nation we are trying to build.

I told Huey that in Chicago Yuppies were treated like blacks--denied service in restaurants, thrown out of stores, their asses kicked by pigs in back alleys. Out of this came the beginnings a

sense of real revolutionary community.

"I've always thought that a major difference between white and black revolutionaries", Huey said, "was that whites, being part of the Establishment, were interested in freeing themselves as individuals.

"Blacks, as part of the oppressed group, are interested in liberating themselves by achieving freedom for the group. But now, judging from Chicago and some of the things happening around Berkeley, radical whites seem to be developing a collective spirit".

Huey is beautiful. I kept thinking this the whole time I was with him. He has about him something of the eternal. So self confident about himself and his cause he doesn't have to prove anything. As we talked, I relaxed in that jail cell with Huey; I didn't have to prove anything either.

We discussed Yippie tactics. I said they sound super-individualistic, but they help create a collective state of repression.

"I hadn't thought of the tactical aspect of the Yippie philosophy," Huey said. "It seemed to me to be purely individualistic anarchism. But, okay, I can dig it. I can see how it makes the pigs over-react, and then whites begin to defend themselves collectively.

"Fighting back changes the way

blacks think of white rebels. Their original bias is to think of long haired people as being effeminate."

We rapped about Yippie plans for revolutionary theatre on election day, and what he thought should be the attitude of the Black Panthers toward it.

"We can't say to the black community, 'Vote in the streets on election day,' because to them that means get a gun and get ready for the shit to come down. We're not ready for that sort of thing just now. We want to use my electoral campaign and Bobby Seale's for organizing purposes."

I told Huey I had heard a Panther say at a rally, "If Eldridge is elected President we will paint the White House black and then burn it down. We don't want to have anything to do with it."

"The presidential election is a different thing," Huey said. "We can go along with a boycott of that, because the president is president of the mother country, and we are building a black sense of nationhood. But it's impossible right now to get blacks to participate in a street action that doesn't involve armed self defense."

"The Black Panthers," he said, "will openly support, but not participate in, Yippie street actions on election day. In the long run, it's the same revolution."

Huey's eyes laugh a lot. It is easy to see why the Panthers, who love each other, love Huey the most. His strength, too, is obvious. I got the feeling that Huey has spent his life doing the best possible thing a human being could.

It takes courage to be a human being; it's much easier to be a pig.

The talk got loose. Huey rapped about the days when he used to give out Black Panther buttons in the bars of West Oakland.

"I once gave fifty Free Huey buttons to an auto worker who wanted to give them out in his plant," he said.

Then Huey laughed and corrected himself. "Wait a minute--that was before there were Free Huey buttons. It was just Black Panther in those days."

Garry interrupted. "I'm sorry, but we have to get down to some business."

"Yeah, I guess we were just bullshitting," Huey said. There was a sadness in his voice, and

a longing for the streets.

As we were leaving, Huey said a few more words about the Yuppies.

"The Youth International Party should develop a program--something that young high school and college students can relate to. It shouldn't be abstract--something that just gives political direction. You know, I always thought that you should just call yourself the Youth International Party. It's really a great name. Let the Press call you 'Yippie'."

Charles Garry, not only Huey's lawyer but also a very close friend, then said, "The Yuppies should come out for the abolition of all jails, and write up a very good reason why."

"I can really appreciate that position," Huey laughed, as he eyed the steel and glass surrounding him.

One more important matter had to be cleared up.

"Huey, you know there are some people around the movement who like to think there are splits between you and Eldridge because he supported Rubin for Peace and Freedom vice-president in Ann Arbor. They think that when he publicly defends the Yuppies he is acting on his own and against your ideas."

"I know about that talk," Huey said. "It's completely untrue. Eldridge and I run together, and we

trust each other. I support what he did in Ann Arbor with Jerry Rubin, and if he supports the Yuppies, so do I."

We had to go. Garry deposited \$5.00 for Huey with his jailers, and we went down together in the elevators. The lawyer was very emphatic.

"We have got to organize an international Free Huey movement or he may be in jail for fifteen years--and Eldridge's situation is very bad. I would like to see a campaign to get a million signatures to the Adult authority in California demanding that Cleaver's parole be reinstated. We can't put ourselves in the position where we're solely dependent on the courts."

Huey or Eldridge in jail is the slavery of us all. They are being moved against because they have lived decently, with courage and dignity. They are human beings because they are revolutionaries.

If our rulers can crush them, they can get any of us. Then what will we have left but books to read, television to watch, and a continuing stream of rationalizations to make, without even a god to apologize to.

We will have to obey, to be well-fed spiritual faggots starring in Ronald Reagan's version of Animal Farm.

I ain't gonna work on Ronnie's farm.

LEGAL SWITCH

West Oakland Legal Switchboard, whose business it is to help people in trouble, has got troubles of its own, and is in danger of being switched off before the end of the month.

Organized about eight weeks ago to act as a hot-line for the troubled West Oakland community, the switchboard service began on August 12. Since that time, reports their secretary, business has gotten better, which means more residents are in need of their help.

"We've been getting 10 and 20 calls a day since I've been here," the spokesman told BARB, "and the lines are getting busier all the time."

"We might cease to exist very soon," she said. "The pilot grant from the San Francisco Foundation will be used up before the middle of the month. We are asking for money from any private groups or

individuals, but not for government money."

The Switchboard staff consists of Eddy Wesley, the founder, and three others, all black. Operators are in touch with 80 Oakland lawyers, most of whom are white. Boalt Hall law students are also on call, as are the others, at all times of day and night.

All it takes is a single phone call if you're in trouble. 863-3013 is the number. Beginning this week it will be listed on the back of every BARB in the "PHrequent PHones" column. It is suggested that you clip the column and keep it in your wallet.

If you're not in trouble, the West Oakland Legal Switchboard suggests that you let them know. Send a contribution to them at 2713 San Pablo Ave., Oakland, just to tell them everything's o.k. with you.

Another squad car arrived. Two Berkeley cops got out, strolled over to me, said, "Good Evening", and proceeded to question me assiduously, carefully noting my answers in a little black book.

Apparently my existence was not illegal. They left. On cue, the twelve fuzz across the street filed around the corner, got into their cars and rumbled off into the night.

Score: Citizens -- 1; Cops -- 0.

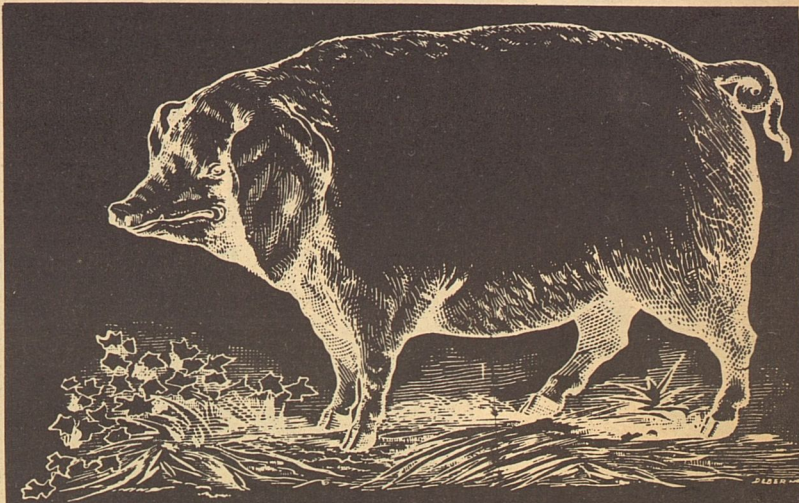
Let us join together with all those souls in Babylon who are straining for the birth of a new day. A revolutionary generation is on the scene.

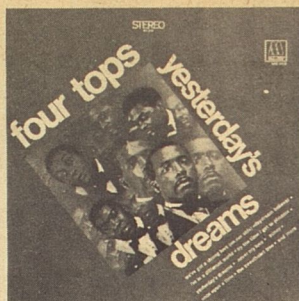

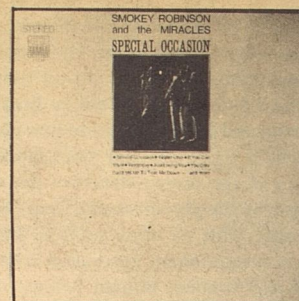

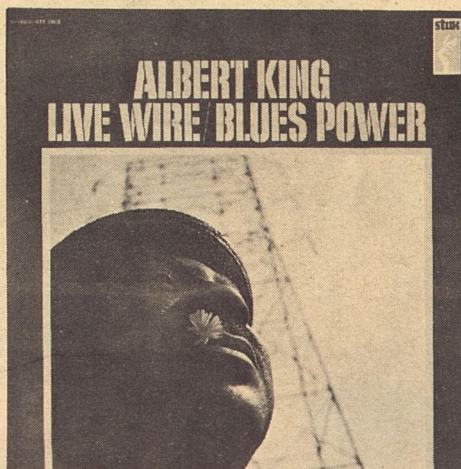

CITY COUNCIL CAPERS FEATURE MACE AND TAGS

Chemical Mace, police ID's, and proposed amendments to Berkeley's sound ordinance were briefly highlighted at Tuesdays City Council meeting.

City Manager William Hanley, noted for proclaiming city-wide curfews and civil disasters, reported to the councilmen that police have used Mace only three times in the past seven weeks.

The Council expressed most interest in the use of a personal pen-type Mace weapon by an off-duty policeman subduing a tres-

and rape. Mayor Wallace Johnson said that "Halt," a teargas anti-dog weapon, had been found on several persons arrested during Berkeley's recent disasters. He stressed the importance of looking into increasing numbers of citizens trying to grab policemen's guns.

Councilman Wilmont Sweeney expressed concern over the medical treatment of mentally incompetent persons sprayed with Mace during arrest.

Manager Hanley said a thorough report on Mace will be given to the Council at its October 8 meeting.

Hanley then told the councilman "we just haven't had time in the last 30 days" to study the costs and methods of visibly identifying Berkeley policemen by name.

The Council, subsequent to the late - June curfew events, had asked that police have their names clearly visible.

At last Tuesday's session, John DeBonis shouted that the city should not "kowitz to Telegraph Avenue!" Hanley shouted back.

DeBonis spoke of good citizens' respect for the badge. Hanley spoke of name-tags as helping to "personalize" the police in peaceful situations.

DeBonis reached a higher peak of histrionics later in the meeting when citizen Henry Schroerluke addressed the Council to oppose amendments to Berkeley's sound ordinance.

Although Schroerluke was dressed in a spotless, sharp-dressed suit, DeBonis reacted to his beard as if it was a scarlet cape snapped at the nose of a frustrated bull.

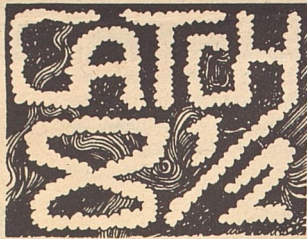
The councilman called the citizen "one of the troublemakers." He said he saw "you and your henchmen" on the Avenue many times. He fumed, harangued, and changed color.

The Mayor sat mildly blank as the sputtering continued.

Minutes earlier, when Schroerluke suggested that the City Council had relegated excessive authority to City Attorney Anderson, who drafted the proposed amendments, the Mayor had cut the speaker off.

"Please just discuss what you favor," Mayor Johnson told him.

City Manager Hanley wondered aloud whether the amendment should be put on the next agenda at all, in light of Council reaction against the proposal. DeBonis and the Mayor said they did, indeed,

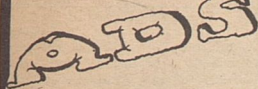

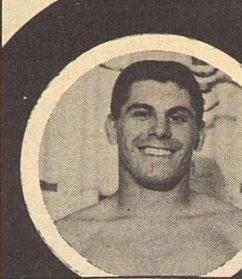

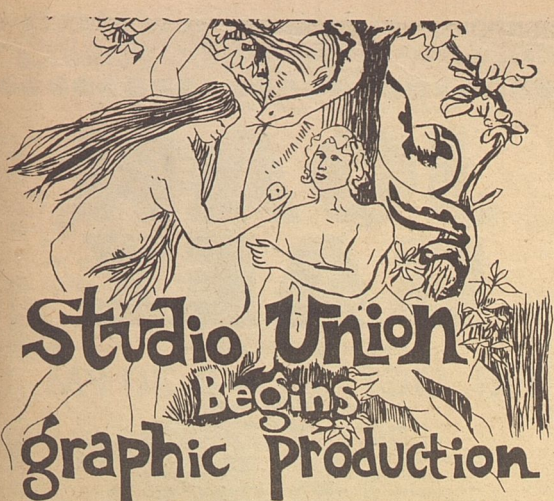

This is about Rosemary's Baby. If you haven't yet read the book or seen the film, I'd recommend doing them in that order. But my comments mainly concern the flick. A friend of mine has suggested a possible interpretation on the basis that since Mia Farrow portrays an ordinary American middle-class bitch, such are likely to give birth to devils. But I think that point is weakened by the fact of so many people's conviction that they already have.

But I think that Rosemary's Baby may well be the myth for our times. God is dead, the Devil now rules. Some of the Devil's people don't seem like such bad types . . . only you don't know where you stand with them.

Ever since that day in November, 1963, most of us have felt something of the sort. The old tried-and-trusted way of life just doesn't seem to be with us any more. Whether your concern is Right-to-Protest or Safety-on-the-Streets, the God who once upheld it seems to be dead, and the Devil seems to be in control.

Now we move toward a Presidential election which a man once repudiated by the people seems certain to win . . . what kind of age are we living in? Understand, I don't equate Nixon with the Devil. No such cheap analogy as that. But when the people accept as good guys those whom they rejected a few short years ago as bad guys, you know something strange has happened, and some searching questions come to mind.

But commenting on the film, the point that strikes me is the tiresomely wholesome American folksiness of that crowd of Devil-worshippers.

Satan's high priest, as portrayed by Sidney Blackmer, comes across as a kindly grandfatherly type. And there's the Chinese with his silly little candid camera, and the dumpy housewife reading the Reader's Digest, of all things (and through a magnifying glass yet).

But most of all, the acting job done by old Hope Summers. You know her so well as the chirpy small-town lady, or as someone's zany wife. But here, without stepping out of that character, and in only a few appearances and a few lines, she manages to plant the impression that there is something ut-

terly poisonous about her.

Here we may be approaching the nitty-gritty. A revelation of all that evil boiling beneath the surface of the well-known pleasant friendly mainstream American culture. A culture without social awareness, made up of people who only knew that they, and the people they knew, were nice people. A culture of people willing to do what they could to help those who were close enough to be personally grateful, or far enough away to be anonymous; and leaving in between an extensive area for evil to operate.

This year's election may be that culture's rallying for its last stand. The next stage may be the face of evil unmasked completely. R.R.

fornia, just as the Regents don't own the University of California, and if these pigs can't act in the public manner, then they've got to get the hell away from the public trough."

Cleaver suggested "closing the book of American history" so that we could take our heads out of it. "It's not going to help you face the fact that the United States of America has become the Number One obstacle to the progress of the entire planet."

"We've got to take a Fourth Reich stand right here for Berkeley. There are human-beings alive in Babylon," Cleaver said. "He vowed, 'I'm going to be here at the University of California as long as students and faculty can tolerate my profanity.'" The first lecture concluded with the call for "Student Power, Faculty Power and Guest-Lecturer Power."

Cleaver is expected to return to the campus on Tuesday to deliver his next lecture, the first of the lectures specifically prohibited by the Board of Regents' action. At this writing, it appeared almost certain that the Cleaver course will not be guaranteed credit nor provided with a room before that time.

If that is the case, CPE leaders who now claim a sizeable faculty and student backing, warn that a full-scale confrontation is probable next week.

If the Senate's action is in any way unacceptable to the group (there being little alternative other than full acceptance for them), CPE spokesman Paul Glusman predicted some kind of "direct action, probably disruptive or confrontational."

"If the faculty won't defend the students," Glusman said, "it is hardly to be expected that the students will defend their university."

QUESTION: Does cutting or trimming hair stimulate its growth or is this an old wives tale? Are there any foods or treatments which can make hair grow? My hair seems to have reached the maximum length just below my shoulders. Though it seems healthy otherwise, it just doesn't seem to grow any more.
 ANSWER: The hair which appears above the scalp is, in effect, dead so that cutting or trimming hair cannot affect its growth whatsoever. There are no foods or medications which can alter the rate of hair growth. The maximum length to which hair grows seems to be determined by genetic factors. Some people can't grow hair even to their shoulders while others can grow hair long enough to tickle anyone's fancy.
 QUESTION: Heeding the Surgeon General's advice, I smoked my last cigarette a week ago. Now I find my body reacting in strange ways. For the past week I have been able to sleep at night at most only six hours while before I averaged well over 10 (unless disturbed), I wake up after six

hours and cannot go back. Though I feel rested I wonder why I sleep less. Do you know?
 In addition, I find that my ejaculations have undergone a fantastic reduction in intensity. Though my erections are healthy, my ejaculations are meagre little squirts (the semen just oozes out) while previously they were powerful pumps. It feels as if my penis is clogged or my supply of semen is lacking. I've tried waiting two days without intercourse with no effect. Would smoking relieve this condition? What do you recommend?
 ANSWER: Camels, if the symptoms you described were directly related to cessation of cigarette smoking. But, so far as I know, these symptoms are not related to cigarette smoking or the stopping of cigarette smoking. The time required for kicking the cigarette habit varies greatly but you might notice changes in your sleeping habits for a month or two afterwards. You will soon notice your senses of taste and smell have become keener and I would suspect that you would become more powerful in all ways within a few months.
