"The list is constantly updated fed to it by the FBI, CIA, military services, State Department, im-migration people and a host of other groups keeping tabs on dis-

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"About one million Federal In-ternal Security Warrants are al-ready printed, and the FBI esti-mates that it could pull in from mates that it could pull in from 3,000 to 12,000 people overnight and have them whisked off to federal detention camps at Avon Park, Fla.; Allenwood, Pa.; El Reno, Nevada; Tule Lake, Calif.; Wittenburg and Florence, Arizona."

There's much to be said for a free press, even undercapitalism. The FBI et al must be blowing their stack over publication of this information. For example: what just IS a "Federal Internal Security Warrant"?

You can be arrested AFTER you rob a bank, but can you be served a warrant and arrested because you might rob a bank? That is what a "Federal Internal Security Warrant" is - a fake.

Now come reports we are being not only out-missiled but, quite obviously, out-mooned.



raps by outlining various "selfhelp" projects. His main grievance involved the Forum.

"Since full resistance costs us too much blood," he said, "we should hassle the Forum in a limited way." The crowd voiced proposals: Picket? Boycott? The decision was made: Go over right now and demand to use the john? Without any debate, about 15 of the remaining 40 protesters immediately voted for the third proposal, indicating so with their feet. The group walked through the restaurant to the rear, where owner Frank Albanese greeted them with an open toilet.

He also informed them that he had already fired Ed Khoury, the employee who called the pigs. The prospective piss-inners scatter-

employee who called the pigs. The prospective piss-inners scattered.

BARB's on-the-spot rap ses-

BARB's on-the-spot rap session reporter asked Albanese how long the toilet had been locked. "Not really locked at all," he replied. The manager explained that the key must be obtained each time from a Forum employee, and must be returned immediately afterwards.

"We would love to keep the doors open if only the people would keep it clean and wouldn't mess up the toilet in piggish style."

Back at the rally site, a faithful handful regathered. BARB queried Axelrod about having to ask for a key. Axelrod seemed to believe the door will remain completely open, and nobody will

Besides the piss-in, the only political activity at the October First rally was collecting spare change for Huey in a tin can decorated with bumper stickers.

Albanese admitted that he was Alpanese admitted that he was extremely sympathetic with the street people, that of course they needed a place to go. "No, I wasn't angered in the least by the demonstration. I understood them and their grievance," he told BARB. "What I don't understand is why they come to me. Wa'rea business.

they come to me, We're a business establishment. There's nothing we can do, really. The toilets here are for our patrons and our staff."

"As it is they're no longer

are for our patrons and our staft."

"As it is, they're no longer working," he confessed.

Albanese said he had indeed agreed to let the group use the toilet, providing they returned the key, although he admitted he didn't have to.

"When they came as a group, of course, they were right. I played along. But their grievances should be brought before the City Council, not to me."

BARB asked Albanese if he was an "up-tight commercial opportunist" as charged by the rally committee. He leaned back and said cooly, "I like them. They're good people, when they don't come in groups."

"One other thing," he added,
"the fellow from the rally this afternoon -- he didn't return the

key."

Later reports at press time indicate the johns are still open.

KILLER COP'S RAGSM

Some further aspects of S.F. Police Officer Michael O'Brien's racist background were revealed to BARB by several sources this

week.
O'Brien, 27, involved in the fatal Sunday night shooting of a truckdriver father of two, was found to have had previous on-and-off-duty hassles with blacks, and as a juvenile, in Portland was arrested twice, newspapers reported earlier.

An eyewitness to the murder of George Baskett, identified only as Lucille, told BARB that she heard policeman O'Brien yelling 'Nigger'' and saw him waving a gun, prior to the murder Sunday

ger" and saw him waving a prior to the murder Sunday

O'Brien's friend, Willis Gar-riot, later returned to the Bush Streat alley with a special "police-man (in blue uniform but without badge or cap, according to an eyewitness). They forced several blacks up against a wall at gunpoint while Baskett and O'Brien fought in Brush Place, according

to the witness.

"Baskett was holding a chair rung, and yelling 'put away your gun, let's fight hand-to-hand'"
Lucille said. "O'Brien dared Bas-

Lucille said. "O'Brien dared Baskett to move, saying '1 want to kill a nigger', all the while holding the gun on him."

The witness complained that there was no indication that O'Brien and Garriot were cops. "Why didn't they say they were cops?" she asked.

She learned only through later.

cops? See asked.

She learned only through later radio reports that they were on "Cahill's force".

BARB also found this week that O'Brien and his friends had caused

O'Brien and his friends had caused trouble in the Brush Place neighborhood on several occasions prior to Sunday's incident.

Last August, Lucille told BARB, O'Brien pulled a gun on a seventeen year old neighborhood girl, again while off duty.

The woman also said that O'Brien had held loud all-night parties in the Brush Place garage. The party-goers were said to be other cops and "motorcycle dudes."

Complaints from the working-class neighbors directed at O'Brien were completely ignored, she said.

class neighbors directed at O'Brien were completely ignored, she said.

Residents also complained of the cop's practice of trailing his boat through the narrow street.

Prior to his transfer to the Richmond District, O'Brien had a reputation in Hunter's Point as a "head-beater" according to Phil Kay, a Hunter's Point resident.

Kay told BARB, "Last August O'Brien answered a patrol carcall from a mother about the molesting of her daugher, and responded to the wrong address."

"O'Brien and his partner busted in to the "New Thing," a Negro Youth Club, where they called the patrons 'little niggers'".

According to Kay, O'Brien's now-famous "Gas Huey" button was on his p.d. tie clasp. When questioned, O'Brien told the youths 'I'm proud of the pin. I hope it proves true in the week to follow". (The last week of Newton's trial). O'Brien was also allegedly involved in the beating and arrest of three of the 'New Thing' youths. A S.F. judge threw the case out, according to Kay.

BARB also learned this week that police Community Relations officers have been sticking their necks out in the case. They have been responsible for "spurring the investigation on."

been responsible for "spurring the investigation on." PCR members also saw that the four black suspects held after Sunday night's incident were freed on their own recognizance, and that Mrs. Baskett was able to file a Federal court complaint, a source revealed. --KW a source revealed.

LOVE, PEACE FEST BUMMERED BY FUZZ

Berkeley's Festival of Love and Peace last Sunday ended as an Exercise in Law and Order.
While hundreds of diverse people strolled through Live Oak Park gazing at sculpture, painting, photography and unnamed artforms, Carl Worth, director of the city's official art center, was spending much of his time on the phone, trying to keep the heat off.

off.
Police arrived Sunday afternoon, gesturing a stack of complaints several inches thick. A call to City Manager William Hanley kept the festival open.
When a group described by one observers as "members of the Geritol set" complained that they couldn't use the park, the fest nevertheless went on.
Hanley's support was withdrawn Sunday at 10 p.m., the hour Berkeley's sound ordinance goes into force. Police arrived promptly to squelch the noise emanating from the Art Center's small indoor theatre.

The noise was a Rock Mass being offered by the Free Church, sponsor of the weekend festival. According to people outside the building at the time, the sound of the band was far from loud, even near-

Despite the efforts of Carl Worth and Free Church Reverend Dick York, the police insisted that the sound must cease.

Hanley and Worth did succeed for two days in fending off those who objected to the display of "street culture" throughout the park and in its Art Center gal-

Just before the 10 p.m. crack-down Sunday, the Floating Lotus Magic Opera Company completed its ceremony-drama, the Quest for

the Inner Eye of Truth. Costumes, the inner Eye of Truth. Costumes, gestures, music and words woven by the Floating Lotus led a procession of spectators into a spontaneous dance.

That dancing mood, at a slower tempo, seemed to be reflected in the eyes of most of the thousands

of people who wandered among the artworks during the two days. Many were heard to remark on the

Many were heard to remark on the good quality of the work.

Even the rock bands didnot pack the people too tight together, but there always seemed to be acrowd. Unlike many of the classic Beins, at the Live Oak festival a weary body had room to lie on the grass without encountering stray feet.

Although many street people ex-pressed bitterness that The Man ended the arts fest on a harsh note, several are still working on a project to develop an Arts Center for the Telegraph Avenue com-

munity.

They invite interested persons to attend a meeting for that purpose at the Berkeley City Hall on Friday, October 4, at 1:30 p.m.

PICKET **SYNAGOG FOR HUEY**

The Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, a dozen Jewish Berkeley-radical-types celebrated the holy

radical-types celebrated the noly day by picketing for Huey Newton on the steps of Temple Beth Abraham and Temple Siai in Oakland. Their signs said, "Judge Friedman, Atonel" and "Germany Had Laws Too" and listed "Judge Friedman's 10-Point Program for Panthers."

They were called a "shame"

Panthers."

They were called a "shame" and a "disgrace" by members of the congregation. They called members of the congregation a "shame" and a "disgrace."

A wealthy businessman came out and ordered them off the steps

out and ordered them off the steps of Temple Beth Abraham.

"I thought God owned the temple," a picketer said.

"Well, I built most of it."

"Weil, I built most of it."
"To people come here to worship God or to worship you?"
"Mmmm, both," the businessman replied.
Although the picketers were careful not to interfere with the religious services at either temple, their presence out front was met with overt hostility by many worshippers.

was met with overt nostlinty by many worshippers. Argument sometimes led to mu-tual cursing in Yiddish. Challenges to fight were accepted by at least demonstrator, but fists did

one demonstrator, but fists the not start to swing.

"The response was a generational thing," a picketer told BARB. "They young kids liked it, but there was an overwhelming feeling of outrage among the adults. adults.

"For the kids I think we added a whole new dimension to Yom Kippur, by the contrast of the way they observed it inside and the way we were observing it outside."

The demonstration was aimed partly at Huey Newton's trial judge, Monroe Friedman, but one member of Temple Sinai told them that Friedman avoided that temple

when he got word of the impend-ing picketing.

Another reason given for the protest was that Jews, who have suffered historically from racism and oppression, should be at the forefront of the black liberation struggle.

Some opponents of the demonstration accused the picketers of interfering with freedom of religion.

"We didn't interfere with the services," a picketer said. "By practicing Yom Kippur in the ideology of our choice, we were expanding--not abridging--the notion of religious freedom."

But CPE leaders told BARB that Motion One, if passed in entirety, would be unsatisfactory. "Even if the motion passes, Webel said, "this cannot be regarded as acceptable in any sense of the word, for three reasons: 1) There is no provision to offer credit for 139X and that must be guaranteed; 2) there is no explicit provision for there is no explicit provision in the assigning of a room for 139X and this must be set down, when and where; and 3) there is no mention of any of the other CPE courses, several of which are al-

courses, several of which are also in limbo.

It appeared late Thursday evening that the Senate could not possibly rally to include all of CPE's demands, even though a major victory was won earlier in the day with the defeat of the moderating Stampp Amendment ot a vote of 575-348. The broadly-based CPE coalition seemed to have great support on campus and even in the Senate chambers. But the inclusion of Webel's planks

have great support on campus and even in the Senate chambers. But the inclusion of Webel's planks seemed virtually impossible in the light of the day's debate.

University President Charles J. Hitch spoke first at the session, declining to take part in the debate or the voting, but calling for stalling measures to prevent "the prediction of self-destruction" from coming true at Berkeley. Chancellor Roger Heyn urged but gently a "student-sponsored non-credit program of instruction," to the dismay of the outside crowd. Professor Troy Duster of sociology presented the strongest case for the Board of Educational Development in trying to keep the 139X course intact.

At noon on Sproul plaza, Black Panther leader and author Eldridge Cleaver gave his first lecture of the 139X that he is forbidden to teach, promising that he would give "20 or 30 or 40 more" before he is through. Cleaver has already been sentenced to serve the remainder of his prison term

NEW TACTICS FOR CLEAVER, AND LATER?

A new student organization is growing up on the Berkeley cam-pus around the Cleaver issue. Still without a name, it is a mass-based representative struc-

ture. Students are organized in groups of 20 to 40 which send representatives to a central body. This body selects a steering committee to handle the nit-picking details.

The present organization draws its legitimacy from its representative structure and can refer decisions back to the membership. But the leadership can act on a mandate during crisis periods when representative democracy would be too slow and vulnerable.

The organization also has the potential of lying dormant for extended periods of time and being reactivated intact for future cri-

It appears that it could easily go underground should it have

and can be jailed at almost any moment.

Lecturing to six or seven thou-

sand at the noon-rally-and-first-class session of his course in Dehumanization and Regeneration, Cleaver began with a peptalk and then exploded into his more power-

then exploded into his more power-ful oratory.

"When they try to shut you up, when they lock the doors and shut the buildings, there's no recourse but the streets and the Plaza," Cleaver said, also taking the opportunity to condemn Mickey Mouse Reagan and Donald Duck Rafferty. "They don't own the State of Cali-

DEMOCRACY NOW GROUP AIMS FOR THE DEAD CENTER

Quietly, very quietly, a new group steals onto the campus, with the idea of being in the dead center of things. "That's where the possible is," Ed Winn, founder of Campus Democracy now told BARB.
"At present the group consists

"At present the group consists of about three dozen," Winn said.
"We're not activists, we're not extremists. We hope to act, not as a mass, but as individuals acting as models for the community."

The group hopes to tackle all of the University's difficulties in a slow-moving, well-planned, yet unplanned campaign to restore deunplanned campaign to restore democracy to the entire community. "We're not taking issue with the hippies, the straights, the merchants or the police. We recognize that everybody's got to live here, and that there's room enough for everyone to do their thing."

"But," the CDN founder emphasized, "there is no room for violent behavior. We do not view anyone as our enemy, except those who resort to violence. We feel there is absolutely no excuse for

there is absolutely no excuse for

violence."

Winn, a graduate student in education, told BARB that the idea for the group came to him late in the summer when he realized "it wasn't safe for me, for other people, to do the things we do."
At the same time, Winn said he felt it was unfair to "damn everynes" the street people on one

At the same time, with sain efelt it was unfair to "damn everyone -- the street people on one side, the police on the other -- for the violent behavior of a few."

The Campus Democracy group, just getting underway, favors widespread reforms which could begin by improving the University's image with the taxpayers and work on up from there.

"We want to establish means of talking things over, ways to work out living together. For example, we understand that students are not the total University, that the so-called street people and the police are not the only people on the Avenue."

Few concrete proposals were

and the police are not the only people on the Avenue."

Few concrete proposals were mentioned during the interview with BARB. Winn said because of Registration Week, their work wasn't fully underway. He declined to comment specifically on the Cleaver case, although he said his group was well aware of the problems of racism in the University community.

"Here again, we cannot see where breaking windows helps. Buildings are non-entities. That money used in repair could go for scholarships. High school kids in this state still think Cal is for rich kids," Winn explained.

"We feel all cultures should be represented in the curriculum. We feel that every viewpoint must be heard. The noon rallies don't seem to represent a good portion of the campus and its people. We

seem to represent a good portion of the campus and its people. We feel there should be more than a facade for student government. We feel that there should be a

student or students on the Board of Regents in the way other schools have done."

of Regents in the way other schools have done."

A Berkeley Gazette story last month quoted Winn saying his group "was prepared to join the Police Reserve." Winn explained to BARB: "I meant we are preparing to study the policeman from inside, to find out what, in fact, a policeman does, and what reactions the people have to their actions."

The CDN neither condemns for praises the Berkeley cops for their summer stock performance this year. Instead they stick to their guns by indicating that all kinds of violence is unnecessary and deplorable.

Winn reaffirmed several times his organization's position in the

Winn reaffirmed several times his organization's position in the middle: "We hope to be an interracial, broadly-based coalition, a political and seriously concerned with genuine academic, economic, and racial grievances. As we see it, the extreme right and the extreme left are the destroyers. They have nothing with which to replace have nothing with which to replace the present system, unless they hope to establish a dictatorship and suppress all the rights of all of

"This may sound corny," Winn said, "but I believe in the American Dream, and I think we can start to rebuild it here and now."

'WOMEN' **WANT ADS** ON WAY OUT

Sexually segregated employment ads must stop Dec. 7, warns Uncle Sam's Equal Employment Oppor-

sam's Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

No longer can separate "Men Wanted" and "Women Wanted" categories be used to discriminate against women in the job market. Except for a few jobs where sex is a "bona fide occupational qualification" (f).

cupational qualification" (I).

Uncle took this enlightened step forward after being kicked in the ass by NOW, the militant National Organization for Women. Feminists sued EEOC and picketed the New York Times. Uncle has been pretty slow about enforcing Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, which forbids job bias against chicks.

SFPO COOL ON HAIR

No, the San Francisco Post Office does not limit employees' hair to military length, assures Charles W. Harper, SF Management Procedures Director.

"I would certainly like to find out who in our organization, if anyone, uses the phrase 'military standards'," he told BARB. The inquiry arose from a phoned complaint by an anonymous hippie applicant.

Appearance standards flow from a new regulation issued August 1 by P.O. brass in Washington, Harper explained. In order to maintain the public's confidence in employees, the regulation states, "Hair--and beards and moustaches, if worn--must be kept neatly trimmed and clean." Also, non-uniformed employees "whose duties require contact with, or exposure to, the public must dress in a manner and present an appearance which conforms to good

business practice."
Local postmasters translated these generalities into specifics. On hair length, said Harper, "Basically we require a man to have his hair where he shows some neckline." No length limit for beards, "as long as the beard is neatly trimmed and does not present a shaggy appearance."
Dress regulations apply to new and temporary employees, since Uncle won't buy them a uniform until after 90 days of service.
Jeans pass, "as long as they are clean." No "adornment" or jewelry can be worn by either sex. Exotic costumes and robes are definitely out. Standard shoes are

finitely out. Standard shoes are required for safety reasons, Har-per added, not just to impress the public.

public.

His comments cover San Francisco on., Regional Office officials denied the existence of any regional policies on appearance.

From that original California experiment in clean living, came the Synanon Foundation, now a national organization run by exaddicts for their own rehabilitation.

in San Francisco, Synanon has been located for several years in the historic Seawall warehouse on Lombard. Next Wednesday, as national Synanon celebrates its tenth anniversary, SF Synanon leaves its home in the Seawail, the city's oldest commercial build-

the city's oldest commercial building.

Though Seawall is scheduled to be demolished shortly, Synanon's work of "absorbing people into the responsible community" will continue. "We don't know where, just yet," Synanon told BARB this week. In the meantime a Synanon-operated Texaco dealership will continue to do business at 2098 Lombard.



MOTHERS BEG DOCKERS TO REFUSE WAR CARGO

Two East Bay mothers have gone to the docks to find out how the longshoremen feels when he loads full of the tools of death

a boat full of the tools of death and destruction.

Mrs. Ginnie Proctor of Berke-ley and Mrs. Vivian Rainier of Oakland are taking their question to the Ferry Building in San Fran-cisco this week in the form of an open letter leaflet which they'll give to dockworkers at pay win-dows. "Where do you stand, Mr. Longshoremen?" they ask in a respectfully-worded plea to the

respectually-worded pied to the men.

"Would you consider that a war cannot be waged without armaments, munitions, and other warcargo? Would you consider that the present illegal and immoral war in Vietnam could not be waged if you, the longshoremen, refuse to load those arms and other warsupportive cargoes?"

"You are helping to prolong the horror," the two sisters tell them. "Do you square it with yourself by saying that you're not letting our boys down?"

"Is not the best support to our sons there, the only meaningful and pertinent support, that which demands: Bring Them Back Alive, that which demands: Stop The War, that which refuses to cooperate in the waging of that war including

the waging of that war including

the loading and shipments of munitions and other war cargo?" they

The women call upon "the long and proud history" of the long-shoremen's union. "You fought and and proud history" of the long-shoremen's union. "You fought and died for labor's right to organize. You refused to load scrap metal for Japan in the 30°s. Because of you, the American working man and his union have the power to speak out in many ways (or take direct action.")

"Would you consider," they ask, "how great a strike for peace you could deal to the war machine by stilling those powerful hands when it comes to loading?"

"Would you consider refusing to work the docks from which arms and other war-supportive cargo is shipped? Would you consider that, Mr. Longshoreman?"

Mrs. Rainier told BARB that the protest was a personal, spontaneous action, on the part of herself and her sister. "We have no plans to make anything larger out of this. We just felt we could do something, and we thought of this."

Supreme Court Justice William
O. Douglas has issued an order that the Air Force halt proceedings to ship Lt. Hugh Smith to Taiwan. Smith is a leading organizer of the GI and Veterans' March for Peace scheduled for October 12th.

Smith has been appealing his transfer in the Federal Courts. The Machinery was preparing to ship him out anyway until Douglas' order was received blocking further action until the appeal is heard by the next court up. A judgment by the local appeals court will come down on October 10th. Smith has orders to be on a plane a few hours after the decision comes down.

He is going to have a lawyer sitting in Justice Douglas' living room at that time, though. Douglas is currently fishing in Washington state out in the boondocks, but Smith says they'll have a phone installed in Douglas' cabin if they have to. He expects another order from the Supreme Court Justice if his appeal is refused.

Another organizer of the March, Airman Michael Locks, was grabbed by the Air Police while he was in Washington last week to speak with Congressmen. Needless to say, he was kept in custody past Congress' closing time. The pretext was that they wanted to verify his leave, which they did within fifteen minutes after he was picked up.

As Locks was finally turned loose, an NCO told him "I don't know how you get out of this.

GI'S VOW TO GO AWOL TO BE IN ANTI-WAR MARCH

GPs will march October 12th if they have to go AWOL to do it. The office of the GI and Vet-erans' March For Peace has beto receive reports that military bases throughout the West are scheduling special inspections and parades to keep servicemen on base that day. But march organizer Lt. Hugh

But march organizer Lt. Hugh Smith told the weekly march meeting Tuesday that "GPs are going to march if they have to go AWOL to prove that the rights of dissent outweigh the threats of punitive reaction by the armed services." "If they are willing to squash our rights as human beings we are willing to take the matter to the public and the courts," Smith added.

added.

added.

A suit against the armed services has been filed in Federal Court Wednesday asking that they be enjoined from preventing servicemen from participating in the march.

Legal defense is being arranged for those who choose to attend the March against orders. Sev-eral AWOL's may introduce them-selves on the speaker's platform Civic Center that day, BARB is told.

Support for the GI's and Veterans' March for Peace has been growing rapidly among servicemen in the Bay Area. March stickers have been going up so freely in Hamilton Air Force Base recently that the brass there have posted notices assuring that anyone who turns in a sticker-slapper will be "... justly rewarded."

Leaflets are being distributed

Leaflets are being distributed daily by civilians at bases urging participation in the march. Several of these leafleteers have been kidnapped and held without charges by MP's. All have been released within minutes after March lawers called the bases.

released within minutes after March lawyers called the bases. Despite the heavy-handed attempts at suppression, 23 thousand leaflets had been distributed to servicemen last week.

The March is being organized primarily by GPs, headed by three Air Force men; Lt. Hugh Smith, Airman 1/c Michael Locks and Airman 1/c Richard Bright Local radicals, students, unionists and churchmen are helping, as well as a continuous stream of off-duty servicemen who help staff

the March office in the rectory of the Sacred Heart Church in San Francisco.

March organizers wish to make it clear that all persons are welcome at the march; the more the better.

Pictured at left is Ralph Ginzburg, publisher of the most notorious and wanted magazines of the 20th Century.

First he launched the quarterly Eros a magazine dedicated to the joys of love and sex. Eros was an instantaneous succès de scandale and over a quarter of a million people ordered subscriptions, despite the fact that they cost \$25. But the U.S. Post Office declared Eros "obscene" and drove it out of business (and incidentally obit out of business (and, incidentally, obtained for Ginzburg a five-year prison sentence, which has since been appealed).

Then he brought out the crusading bimonthly Fact, which was the first major American magazine to inveigh against U.S. involvement in Vietnam, cigarette advertising in the mass media, and Detroit's ruthless disregard for car safety (Ralph Neder was a Fact discovery). The intellect ruthless disregard for car safety (Ralph Nader was a Fact discovery). The intellectual community was galvanized by Fact and bought—devoured!—over half a million copies, despite the fact that Fact was not available at most newsstands (most newsdealers found it too controversial) and it was priced at a steep \$1.25. But certain Very Important Persons got mad at Fact—including Barry Goldwater, who sued the magazine for \$2 million—and it, too, was driven out of business.

Undaunted, Ginzburg rallied his forces and last year launched still a third magazine, Avant-Garde, which he describes as "a pyrotechnic, futuristic bimonthly of intellectual pleasure." This magazine, he predicted, "will be my wildest yet, and most universally wanted."

The Walker letter is a fine example of scurrilous political misinformation. For example: Walker claims that a group of parents went to head librarian John Forsman to protest the BARB, that Forsman yelled "censorship" and immediately went to the city council. the city council.

Fact: Mrs. Lois Klock complain-

Fact: Mrs. Lois Klock complained about the BARB before the city council last August 12. Two days later Forsman received his first complaint about the BARB on paper complaint about the Barks on paper under the letterhead: Mother of Perpetual Help Institute--of El Cerrito. It wasn't until August 23 that Mrs. Klock and her Rich-mond Mothers deigned to show up at the library to talk to Fors-

man.
"They went directly to the most political body they could find,"
Laurel Burley told BARB, "the city council. The correct procedure is to complain first to the librarian, then to the library completely and they to the mission, and then to the city council."

Another gambit of the Walker letter was to discredit the political intentions of the freedom to read defenders. "The librarian next used an old trick and screamed John Birch Society," it read.
The irony of this statement was multiplied by the appearance of Mrs. Klock's admission of Birch Society membership right next to the Walker letter on the same page

Furthermore, the Walker letter went on, in its most blatant attempt at character assassination, Forsman "has even printed, probably at library expense, thousands of flyers denouncing the 'supporters of the John Birch Society."

Fact: The Freedom to Read Committee, supported by donations from people in Richmond and around the Bay Area as well as elsewhere, paid for the flyers in full.

"Obviously John Forsman would not use public monies for this kind of activity and he's not so stupid that the idea would even occur to him," Laurel Burley told BARB, her voice angry.

Forsman is known throughout California as a fine librarian. Miss Burley, as Chairman of the Freedom to Read Committee, knows full well where the money came from. It wasn't pilfered from the public.

With this kind of political pressure birching out of the El Cerrito cell, perhaps the 5-man Richmond Library Commission's reluctance to get involved is understandable.

I was the last reporter to interview Huey P. Newton before the Man put him under wraps at Vacaville.

We spent three rewarding hours together last Thursday, the day before he was sentenced to two to fifteen. His attorney, Charles Garry, was with us.

The next day Garry led the press to Huey's last conference. It never took place. Without ceremony or precedent his captors had whisked Huey off to the Vacaville prison.

Much of what Huey told me is too hot to reveal right now. What follows, however, is very important to the

Huey was in a relaxed mood.

"I guess they're going to com-plain about the candy", he said. He had been chewing on a gum drop. "I'm not allowed to eat in between meals here!". Garry left the cell to find out

the pigs were complaining

about.

We were in a small glass and bar cell, where we could be seen but supposedly not heard by the guards. The cubicle reminded me a little of the gas chamber prosecutor Lowell Jensen wanted so bad-

a inter of the gas chamber prosecutor Lowell Jensen wanted so badly to put Huey in.

"It's okay," Garry said when he returned, "they were interested in something else,"

It was a sort of a going away party for Huey. The next day the pigs would send him off to Vacaville, and Huey was pretending to be looking forward to it.

The talk ranged from loose rapping about the taverns where Huey used to do some of his best Panther organizing to the Yippie way of making the pigs freak out in the desired manner to hard talk about the state of the white-black revolutionary nation we are trying to build.

volutionary nation to build, I told Huey that in Chicago Yippies were treated like blacks-denied service in restaurants, thrown out of stores, their asses kicked by pigs in back alleys. Out of this came the beginnings a

"Pve always thought that a major difference between white and black revolutionaries", Huey said, "was that whites, being part of the Establishment, were interested in freeing themselves as individuals.

"Blacks, as part of the oppressed group, are interested in liberating themselves by achieving freedom for the group. But now, judging from Chicago and some of the things happening around Berkeley, radical whites seem to be developing a collective spirit".

Huey is beautiful. I kept thinking this the whole time I was with him. He has about him something of the eternal. So self confident about himself and his cause he doesn't have to prove anything. As we talked, I relaxed in that jail cell with Huey; I didn't have to prove anything either.

We discussed Yippie tactics. I said they sound super-individualistic, but they help create a collective state of repression.

"I hadn't thought of the tactical aspect of the Yippie philosophy," Huey said. "It seemed to me to be purely individualistic anarchism. But, okay, I can dig it. I can see how it makes the pigs over-react, and then whites begin to defend themselves collectively.

"Fighting back changes the way

We rapped about Yippie plans for revolutionary theatre on election day, and what he thought should tion day, and what he thought snound be the attitude of the Black Pan-thers toward it.

"We can't say to the black community, 'Vote in the streets on election day,' because to them that means get a gun and get ready for the shit to come down. We're not ready for that sort of thing just now. We want to use my electoral campaign and Bobby Seale's for organizing purposes."

I told Huey I hadheard a Panther say at a rally, "If Eldridge is elected President we will paint the White House black and then burn it down. We don't want to have anything to do with it."

"The presidential election is a different thing,"Huey said, "We can go along with a boycott of that, because the president is president of the mother country, and we are building a black sense of nationhood. But it's impossible right now to get blacks to participate in a street action that doesn't involve armed self defense."

"The Black Panthers," he said,

"The Black Panthers," he said,
"will openly support, but not participate in, Yippie street actions on election day. In the long run, it's the same revolution."

Huey's eyes laugh a lot. It is easy to see why the Panthers, who love each other, love Huey the most. His strength, too, is obvious. I got the feeling that Huey has spent his life doing the best possible thing a human being could.

It takes courage to be a human being; it's much easier to be a pig.

The talk got loose. Huey rapped about the days when he used to give out Black Panther buttons in the bars of West Oakland.

"I once gave fifty Free Huey buttons to an auto worker who wanted to give them out in his plant," he said.

plant," he said.
Then Huey laughed and corrected himself. "Wait a minute--that was before there were Free Huey buttons. It was just Black Panther in those days."
Garry interrupted. "Pm sorry, but we have to get down to some business."

"Yeah, I guess we were just bullshitting," Huey said. There was a sadness in his voice, and

As we were leaving, Huey said a few more words about the

Yippies.
"The Youth International Party Yippies.

"The Youth International Party should develop a program--something that young high school and college students can relate to. It shouldn't be abstract--something that just gives political direction. You know, I always thought that you should just call yourself the Youth International Party. It's really a great name. Let the Press call you 'Yippie'."

Charles Garry, not only Huey's lawyer but also a very close friend, then said, "The Yippies should come out for the abolition of all jails, and write up a very good reason why."

"I can really appreciate that position," Huey laughed, as he eyed the steel and glass surrounding him.

One more important matter had to be cleared up.

"Huey, you know there are some people around the movement who like to think there are splits between you and Eldridge because he supported Rubin for Peace and

like to think there are splits between you and Eldridge because he supported Rubin for Peace and Freedom vice-president in Ann Arbor. They think that when he publicly defends the Yippies he is acting on his own and against your ideas".

"I know about that talk," Huey said. "It's completely untrue, Eldridge and I run together, and we

trust each other. I support what he did in Ann Arbor with Jerry Rubin, and if he supports the Yip-pies, so do L."

We had to go. Garry deposited \$5.00 for Huey with his jailers, and we went downtogether in the eleva-tors. The lawyer was very em-phatic. phatic.

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

Preventors list for \$7.80 and are considered concealed weapons in California, as well as New York, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa. 250,000 have been sold through franchises by Defense Instruments, Inc., which is owned by GOEC.

Hanley then told the councilman "we just haven"t had time in the last 30 days" to study the costs and methods of visibly identifying

Berkeley policemen by name.

The Council, subsequent to the late - June curfew events, had asked that police have their names

asked that police have their names clearly visible.
At last Tuesday's session, John BeBonis shouted that the city should not "kowtow to Telegraph Avenue!" Hanley shouted back. DeBonis spoke of good citizens' respect for the badge. Hanley spoke of name-tags as helping to "personalzie" the police in peaceful stinations.

situations.

DeBonis reached a higher peak of histrionics later in the meeting when citizen Henry Schroerluke addressed the Council to oppose amendments to Berkeley's sound

amendments to Berkeley's sound ordinance.

Although Schroerluke was dressed in a spotless, sharppressed suit, DeBonis reacted to his beard as if it was a scarlet cape snapped at the nose of a frustrated bull.

But I think that Rosemary's Baby may well be the myth for our times. God is dead, the Devil now rules. Some of the Devil's people don't seem like such bad types . . . only you don't know where you stand with them.

Ever since that day in November, 1963, most of us have felt something of the sort. The old tried-and-trusted way of life just doesn't seem to be with us any more. Whether your concern is Right-to-Protest or Safety-on-the-Streets, the God who once upheld it seems to be dead, and the Devil seems to be in control.

Now we move toward a Presi-

be in control.

Now we move toward a Presidential election which a man once repudiated by the people seems certain to win . . . what kind of age are we living in? Understand, age are we living in? Understand, I don't equate Nixon with the Devil. No such cheap analogy as that. But when the people accept as good guys those whom they rejected a few short years ago as bad guys, you know something strange has happened, and some searching questions come to mind.

QUESTION: Does cutting or trimming hair stimulate its growth or is this an old wivestale? Are there any foods or treatments which can make hair grow? My hair seems to have reached the maximum length just below my shoulders. Though it seems healthy otherwise, it just doesn't seem to grow

Though it seems healthy otherwise, it just doesn't seem to grow any more.

ANSWER: The hair which appears above the scalp is, in effect, dead so that cutting or trimming hair cannot affect its growth whatsoever. There are no foods or medications which can alter the rate of hair growth. The maximum length to which hair grows seems to be determined by genetic factors. Some people can't grow hair even to their shoulders while others can grow hair long enough to tickle anyone's fancy.

QUESTION: Heeding the Surgeon General's advice, I smoked my last cigarette a week ago. Now I find my body reacting in strange ways. For the past week I have been able to sleep at night at most only six hours while before I averaged well over 10 (unless disturbed). I wake up after six

hours and cannot go back. Though I feel rested I wonder why I sleep less. Do you know?
