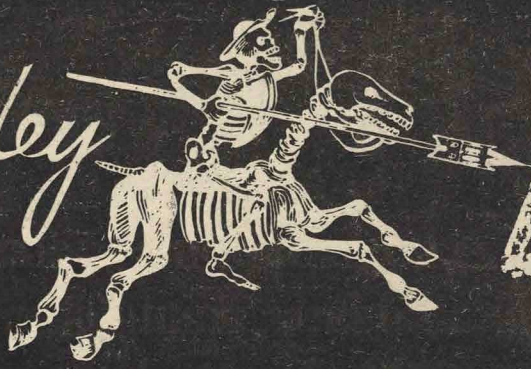

In point-of-fact, the world will self-destruct anytime within the next thirty years (so vote for yourself). Proof?

NOTE: The bombing of North Vietnam will stop Friday, Oct. 18. Hanoi, in turn, will negotiate "all other acts of war" by the US.

(Also, after this column was written, the AP comes out with a story (Oct 17) that Sec of Defense Clark M. Clifford "carried" an "American document to Europe" which details much of this column.

("Warning A-Blasts" would be used "to show an invading enemy that the West was not afraid to resort to such weapons . . . the study also sets forth disadvantages to such a move . . . that even limited nuclear shots might carry both sides into a devastating major atomic exchange," states the AP. "What worries some European allies is that if the 200,000 American troops in West Germany were in danger of being wiped out by sudden Soviet attack, an American president might not wait long for other allied governments to make up their minds before he authorized American commanders to use their tactical nuclear weapons," Smith continues.

What nobody discusses (or at least never reports): what happens when, after using "tactical nuclear weapons", the Russians KEEP ON COMING - then, what, Mrs. Smith?

Apparently, we are going to find out. We will note that a "tactical" nuclear war will escalate into a "total" nuclear war (note that the world "total" is never used in the press).

This total nuclear war will devastate Europe and the USSR, create a radioactive smog over the rest of the earth which will destroy food and people for thousands and thousands of years.

The former Premier of the USSR, Krushchev, was quite aware of this. Gen Curtis LeMay, however, is not - he still thinks of the atom bomb the same as a rusty knife!

So, what we are experiencing at the moment are the push-pull power plays between the THREE (not two) Superpowers of the earth, China, Russia, and the United States.

The Soviet Union holds the initiative. It started with Czechoslovakia. The Russians are raising the "anxiety-level" of the West via bold, calculated maneuvers.

## SAVANTS URGE WORLD PROTEST

Bertrand Russell and Jean-Paul Sartre have urged a boycott of the Olympic Games. October 27 has been designated as International Day of Protest against Mexican Government repression.

Russell and Sartre have expressed their support of the Mexican student strike and have compared the action of the Mexican Government to Nazi barbarity in Europe and American napalming in Vietnam.

People throughout the world have been asked to demonstrate at their Mexican embassy.

The noted peace spokesmen have charged that there is clear complicity between the US and Mexican Governments to meet popular unarmed resistance with massacre.

"If the Olympic games take place in Mexico, they will take place at the invitation of a barbarous government which is outside the pale of civilized society," they stated.

## MEXICAN STRIKE COUNCIL FEARS MORE OPPRESSION

Now that the Olympics have begun, reports from Mexico predict more and more oppression of the students and workers, and greater censorship of the press and radio.

A report from the Information Brigade of the National Strike Council indicates that since the exit of the army from the university late last month, students and workers have been able to hold demonstrations like the Mothers and Victims March and the National Polytechnic Institute March.

Another source reveals that the students have "significant worker support though no union support as the union leaders are subsidized (given mordidas or 'bites') by the government."

While support mounts, however, the Strike Council warns that the government is taking vicious steps against them. They cite the indictment of hundreds of those arrested on charges ranging from robbery and pillage to destruction of public communications and assault.

The charges, which are "accumulated and duplicated" according to the Brigade, come under a modified Penal Code which carries sentences of up to 60 years -- for vandals.

There is what they call "terrorism" in the labelling of homes with red-painted crosses and the receipt in the mail of similar signs for those who were arrested. They charge there is "terrorism in the schools, including armed attacks by bands of men with government weapons," and "terrorism against sympathizers, who receive threatening phone calls."

Dozens of deaths have resulted from the repression of the demonstrations in the provinces and

in the capital, especially in the states of Vera Cruz and Oaxaca, according to the Brigade's Bulletin #2. The directors of schools, professors, and students and public in general were being arrested in large numbers in those areas, they said.

The Strike Council also charges that weapons of up to 9mm and expansion bullets are being used by the military to restrain demonstrators. Tanks have been used to clean out residential buildings, with short canyon blasts and machine gun fire in at least one case (at Nonoalco - Tlaltecolco). Doctors and ambulance crews, they charge, were under extreme pressure "to forego attention to victims until they had been dealt with officially."

All of this occurred ten days in advance of the Olympic Games. The situation would not get better it was feared.

"Already individual liberties have been suspended and restricted zones have been created where all vehicles are searched at gunpoint and personal identification is demanded," the group wrote on October 6.

"The repression is expected to become even greater after the Games, in view of the fact that national public opinion and the protest from the provinces are unified against a regime whose only interest lies in demonstrating its power to control," they wrote.

## CHICANO VIGILERS BARRICADE CONSULATE

"THE OLYMPICS -- DIGNITY AND HUNGER DO NOT GO TOGETHER," read the massive poster at the doorway of the James Flood Building, 870 Market in San Francisco. The building houses the Mexican consulate.

Several other placards covering the outside hall-entrance, read "Out With Diaz Ordaz--Troops out of Mexico City," "Mexico Stooze of USA," and "Viva La Raza."

The signs, along with the red MASC banners with their viper head emblems and the dozens of Chicano youth in colorful serapes and in berets, were all part of the Mexican American Student Confederation Vigil held last Friday, October 11, in support of Mexico City's student insurrectionists.

The consulate demonstration was a counterpart to many other protests at Bay Area campuses and throughout various Western and Mid-Western states.


All were planned to coincide with the eve of the Olympic Games and also with "El dia de la Raza," (Oct. 12), the historic date commemorating the birth of a new race forged from the inter-marriage of Indian and Spanish on the American continent. The event stands as a symbolic expression of the solidarity and common destiny of "La Raza Nueva."

The vigil started with a rally at 2 p.m., and featured a Mexico City student among its speakers. The entrance area afforded an attendance of around 150. It was manned continually until dawn Saturday by 30 to 70 demonstrating MASC youth.

The vigil involved a general sit-in complete with a song festival and leafletting. A short wooden table displaying candles, flowers, and a framed portrait of the Virgin Mary sat in the center amid the protesters' outspread blankets and sleepingbags.

At midnight Father Largente, chaplain at San Jose State College, led the group in Mass to commemorate the fallen Mexican students.

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# TOEING THE LINE?

BARB was INSIDE the Presidio MP station when things got kind of tacky at the Lombard street entrance Friday. There, over 200 demonstrators gave moral support to four AWOL servicemen who wanted discharges as CO's and gave themselves up Saturday after the GI March For Peace downtown. Standing face-to-face and eyeball to eyeball with the MP's, they sang "America the Beautiful"

and tried to talk with them and other soldiers. Some of the demonstrators got carried away and overstepped a line drawn by the MP's at the Presidio. One actually got carried away by an MP - lifted right up in the air! INSIDE the MP station, Lt Col John C. Ford had a Sgt call the SF Police to "take care" of "those outside on the streets."

The Sgt reported back, "They won't come, sir." "They better goddamned well come - call them back!" he ordered. This time they arrived, crawling out of their patrol cars, pulling on gloves and smacking their billy-clubs in their hands. "It was kind of tacky for a while," BARB's informant said. "Cops behind them, MP's in front of them, but nothing happened."

# IS TODAY 'DER TAG-?

In a strongly-worded statement alluding to the "deprived minorities on and off campus," the CPE leadership issued a final set of demands prior to the Regents' meeting scheduled for today (Friday).

"Things are worse now than they were a few weeks ago," a CPE bulletin began. It accused President Hitch of "Non-politically scabbing the grape strikers," and told white students at the same time that they "have helped to preserve racism" in the University.

"Racism is a manifestation of the structure that runs the University," the CPE said, "and to fight racism, the entire structure must be combatted."

Insisting on support for the Chicanos, and reminding students of their earlier pledge to "Free Huey," the CPE's final statement indicated what they called the "most powerful interests in the state of California: the bankers, industrialists, grape growers, and Grade 'B' moviestars."

"If the Regents fail to accept the following demands, we will move into direct, militant action in the week that follows," CPE promised.

According to their statement, the following demands must be met by the end of the meeting: That the Regents

- 1) Rescind their resolution of September 20. This includes: full credit for all threatened courses such as Social Analysis 139X and Sociology 191B; no prior censorship for dramatic productions.
  - 2) Accept fully all the demands of MASC (boycott of grapes, amnesty for the eleven, etc.) and,
  - 3) Accept reforms put forward in the AFT "white paper" on the elimination of racism on campus: that hiring and admissions policies be proportional to the percentage of red, black, and brown minority populations in California. Negotiations on implementing these demands must begin next week.
- The CPE also presented a Long Range List of Demands, the last of which calls for the elimination of the Board of Regents and subsequent replacement by "individual student-faculty boards on an autonomous campus."

"The time has come," is their new rallying cry. Today is the day.

Earlier in the week, the battle for credit continued. Eldridge Cleaver gave his second lecture to the students of Social Analysis

139X Tuesday, but hardly anyone noticed.

In contrast to the furor that has surrounded the activities of the Committee for Participant Education and their participants, including the 100 students enrolled in the course on Dehumanization/Regeneration, this week there were no mass meetings, no rallies and no daily handouts.

It was assumed by observers that this was The Quiet before the Storm, that being the regular meeting of the Board of Regents scheduled for today (Friday) at Santa Cruz. It will be the Regents' first meeting since their session on September 20th when they outlawed Eldridge Cleaver and other "non-academic" guest lecturers from delivering more than one address to any accredited courses.

However, according to Berkeley

Chancellor Roger W. Heyns, the Regents will probably NOT discuss their earlier ruling at today's Santa Cruz meeting.

Last Friday, a rally and march on the Registrar's Office organized by the Coordinating Committee of the CPE failed to obtain credit for those taking the course. Social Analysis 139X has not been "duly approved by the appropriate University agencies in order for credit to be granted," the marchers learned. Study lists which listed it were not accepted.

On Tuesday of this week, the Academic Senate failed to pass a motion which would have made explicit their intention to obtain credit for the controversial course. The motion was tabled.

# PRESIDIO DEATH SPARKS OUTSIDE SUPPORT ACTIONS

A memorial service for Richard Bunch will take place Sunday in front of the San Francisco Presidio.

Bunch, a 19 year old GI from Dayton, Ohio was shotgunned to death by a stockade guard Friday, October 11, while trying to leave a work detail. The Army is investigating the incident, reversing its earlier judgment of "justifiable homicide."

Twenty-seven fellow prisoners have risked maximum life sentences to protest the needless and tragic shooting.

The Monday following the shooting the 27 disobeyed direct orders and refused to work. Instead they locked arms and sang freedom songs. Presently they are in the sidio while mutiny charges are being considered.

The 2 p.m. Sunday demonstration at the Lyon and Lombard Street entrance will also be in support of these GIs. They have charged that brutalizing and "illegal conditions" exist in the Presidio's military stockade.

In a letter smuggled out to their attorney, Terence Hallinan, the prisoners have listed their grievances. These include demands for improved medical and sanitary facilities, psychological evaluation of guards, and the elimination of shotgun details.

Hallinan has sent telegrams to the US Attorney General and the Secretary of the Army urging them to investigate the "illegal conditions." The War Resisters League has asked State Senator Burton and Senator Kuchel to look

into the matter.

Hallinan called the 27 a "new breed of GIs" and credited the GI Peace movement in giving encouragement for servicemen to stand up for their rights.

In talking with a GI for Peace, BARB learned that the Presidio is not an isolated case; most military bases treat their prisoners in the same manner.

Paul Ohluda, Military Counselor for the War Resisters League, who talks to approximately 40 AWOL GIs each week, verified this. Servicemen have told him of blatant cases of brutality and beatings on Treasure Island, Fort Ord, and other installations.

Ohluda has a file of letters, both from guards and inmates, attesting to the inhumane treatment of US servicemen by their own. "It is as bad as anything the Nazi's had," he said.

Some concerned groups have made plans to publicize and expose on a national level the cruel and unjust punishment used by the military on young Americans.

Some of the specific points raised in the letter of the Presidio 27 reveal what life is like inside the stockade there. The prisoners claim that guards are improperly trained, sometimes drink on duty, and often harass inmates needlessly.

There is only one latrine for 40 men, and conditions are crowded that some prisoners are forced to sleep on the floor. The Constitutional right to petition for grievances is denied those in the brig.

As an example of inadequate facilities, Hallinan told BARB that in the case of young Bunch it was obvious to everyone that the GI had serious psychological problems but apparently not to the Army.

Other prisoners attested to his unbalanced mind, noting that he often talked to himself, woke up screaming during the night, and was overly attached to his crucifix. The notes he left show inability to be molded into regimented army life.

"Young people who are unable to adjust to military life shouldn't be in the army," Hallinan stated. "Throwing them into the stockade won't help. They are entitled to be out."

Bunch was in the brig for the minor offense of going AWOL for 18 days. He had gone to see his pregnant wife.

On Friday, October 11, he was on work detail with three other prisoners. According to witnesses, he repeatedly asked the lone guard, identified by stockade prisoners only as a PFC O'Hare, what would happen if he ran. O'Hare replied "You'll just have to find out."

Bunch took off. There were no warning shouts, the witnesses said. He was shot in the back after getting about 35 feet.

Bunch was only 5 feet 2, 120 pounds, and 19 years old, but looked closer to 14, Hallinan told BARB.

Philip Drath, peace candidate for Congress (6th District) suggested the Presidio command provide a "full public explanation of the episode."

"It seems clear that killing this young man was not necessary," Drath said. "He was troubled, he was unarmed in the middle of a military installation, and nevertheless he was shot and killed."

## PIGASUS ERECTION DAY LOOMS

A Yippie happening will arise in Berkeley a few days before The Erection. Phil Ochs, a light show, Eldridge Cleaver, electronic rock, and Jerry Rubin are scheduled to occur at the Community Center on November 1.

Youth International Party members say plans are also taking shape for Erection Day, including a major role for Pigasus, "the only honest pig running for President."

The full November 5 program will be announced shortly, Yippies say.

## FEEL FREE, CLINIC'S OPEN

A free medical clinic opened on Telegraph Avenue last week. It is already in better shape, at least politically, than its Haight Ashbury predecessor.

"We're following the pattern of Timmy Rudyk, director of the new Berkeley Health Information Center, told BARB, but we're doing it WITH the sanction of the city.

Located at 2476 Telegraph (above Moe's bookstore) the new clinic is open to anyone for whom other facilities may be unavailable. Although, due to legal restrictions, direct treatment cannot be given on the premises, patients are referred to doctors working with the center.

"Everybody who has been in so far has been treated," said Miss Rudyk, and we will have interns working here shortly."

BARB was interested in what the new medical facility was doing for the street people. Miss Rudyk explained the center was picking up where Herrick Hospital left off.

"We're showing that Herrick's emergency policy is obsolete. They do not consider drug cases emergencies."

The Berkeley city government seems to be taking a more intelligent look at the importance of this type of medical facility

than San Francisco did at its own free clinic. The city is paying the rent on the office and footing the telephone bills. Also, Miss Rudyk explained, there is an agreement with police of non-interference.

The center is open from 3 to 8 pm on weekdays and 5 to 9 pm on Saturdays. For information call 841-8600.

Meanwhile, in San Francisco, The Black Man's Free Store Medical Clinic opened October 16th in the Fillmore District.



This clinic is FREE from government funds and restrictions. And according to medical director Doctor Bertram M. Meyer, the clinic hopes to do whatever the surrounding community wants it to do.

The clinic's board of directors, headed by Stephan Taylor, is composed entirely of black residents of the Western Addition.

About half of its staff of doctors and nurses are also blacks. Located at 689 McAllister Street, the clinic plans to serve mainly black people, because of its location, but its general purpose will be to provide medical help for indigent people in the area.

Of primary importance to the staff of the clinic is the establishment of sound physician - patient relationships, "with emphasis on individual concern for one person from another" Doctor Meyer states.

The Black Man's Free Store Medical Clinic will run somewhat on the order of the now-closed Haight-Ashbury Medical Clinic. Many of the staff-members of the Black Man's Clinic are veterans of the old clinic in the Haight.

Tentative clinic hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, 6pm to 9:30 pm; Saturdays, 2 to 6pm.

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# REGISTRAR RUNS LIKE RABBIT ON OWN TURF

It was like a rehearsal for a Beatles' recording - "Where Are You, Mr. Gilliam?" (copyright 1968 by the Committee For Participant Education.

It could be a rehearsal for more to come.

Clinton C. Gilliam is Registrar for the University of California. Friday was his brief moment of fame before he enters the Valhalla of bureaucrats - he confronted hundreds of angry students who showed up with their courses to be accepted by his office.

At first he spoke to them, then disappeared behind closed windows, then reappeared at window #15 in Sproul Hall where the students went after listening to a noon rally on the wet steps last Friday.

"Where are you, Mr. Gilliam - are you prepared to speak to those who employ you?" a student called out. Another student answered: "He's putting on his make-up" for TV.

When Lena Hittelman, presented her list for okay, she was told "a Dean has to sign it." She got the signature and came back. Gilliam told her, "We can't accept this unless you delete course Social Analysis 139X" - the moot cause of this confrontation.

This reporter was at the window and asked Gilliam, "If you knew this before you sent her to the Dean for signature, why did you send her in the first place?"

He had no clear answer for this little game he and other UC administration bureaucrats love to play with students. Gilliam is the type of university employee who castrates students, thus setting the stage for the next act (and his Valhalla): confrontation.

Another girl student asked Gilliam, "I paid \$108 fees. Why can't you take my list?" He handed her a mimeographed statement which read (in part):

"If today is your proper alphabetical group (Sd-Z), you should proceed immediately to the place designated for the filing of your

study list, provided it has been approved for the appropriate number of units excluding Social Analysis 139X. If your study list approval included Social Analysis 139X, you must return to your faculty adviser for a revised approval. If the total falls below the 12 units minimum program . . . you must also obtain the approval of the Dean of the College . . ."

Students who DID get the "approval of the Dean of the College" were STILL turned down by Gilliam. His excuse was, as he told Rick Brown, one of the organizers of the CPE, that he was "just following orders."

When Brown asked Gilliam, "Whose decision was it to delete 139X AFTER getting a Dean's approval?", Gilliam replied, "My decision."

Gilliam should take a course in Elementary Logic, for, if he is "just following orders" he then should ACCEPT a Dean's approval (as per his mimeo-statement). However, in putting his big foot in it, Gilliam obviously is NOT following orders but making them up as he goes along.

Brown protested that this was "not in the meaning" of the Academic Senate's ruling, and he was (again) given the mimeo-statement by Gilliam who, by this time, was smiling like a cat eating bird-shit.

Brown told BARB: "Asking students to alter their study lists is not within Gilliam's right."

Another example of confusion over registration of 139X can be found in the Daily Cal, Oct 10, page 12: "Parker (assistant professor, physics) also announced that the University Selective Service Office had agreed to certify that students who were enrolled in 139X were taking a FULL ACADEMIC LOAD (emphasis added), provided that the rest of their courses were in order."

But this is not how Gilliam handled it. BARB talked with a student who had a list with 20

# GRAPESTRIKERS KEEP SHIP'S HOLD EMPTY

Attempts by members of the United Farmworkers to block shipments of scab-picked grapes out of Alameda have met with success so far this week.

Members of the Teamsters Union and Longshoremen honored the picket lines of the grape

strikers, and there was no loading of grapes onto the Lion's Gate, the vessel scheduled to handle the shipment.

Tuesday morning, two trucks loaded with grapes from Santa Lorenzo attempted to enter the Universal Distributors Terminal, but were turned back by the line of pickets.

The two trucks returned Wednesday morning and crossed the picket lines; but that is as far as they progressed.

The drivers were forced to unload the scab grapes themselves, and longshoremen refused to load them on the awaiting ship.

"Those grapes are going to sit on the dock and rot," says Pete Velasco of United Farmworkers.

"We are going to picket the dock continuously until the ship leaves Friday, and with the cooperation of the longshoremen, the ship will leave with no more grapes."

Teamsters honoring the picket line Wednesday refused to enter the terminal of Universal Distributors. Velasco expresses hope that they will continue in their refusal to do so.

The strikers plan to continue their picket of the terminal until the departure of the Lion's Gate Friday morning.

In other actions, a caravan is going to Delano Saturday, October 26, to bring food to the grape-pickers on strike in that area. The caravan starts from 568 - 47th Street in Oakland at 7 a.m., and from the San Francisco Labor Temple at 2940 16th Street at 8 a.m.

United Farmworkers also is planning a leafletting campaign for the East Bay area, and volunteers are urgently needed for work on a house-to-house basis.

ing of the Coordinating Committee of the CPE were not massive. Professor of Chemistry Isadore Perlman reported that his Senate Policy Committee had formally condemned the University policy of granting "special titles" to some guest lecturers.

And Samuel Kaplan, instructor of sociology, announced Wednesday that he intends to violate the Regents' Sept. 20 resolution by inviting speakers who do not hold University appointments. The CPE had hoped for dozens of similar announcements to be made this week.

Eldridge Cleaver, lecturer in social analysis, appeared late, but gave a lecture entitled "Colored People Time," which dealt with the differences of being black rather than white in America. The Black Panther leader's address, the second in a series of 10 or more, was the first session considered "illegal" by the Regents' ruling last month.

CPE leaders have continued to speak of an upcoming confrontation with the University. This week, Larry Magid said they would involve more issues than just the Cleaver thing.

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# CHICANO HUNGER STRIKE

"We Mexicans don't like our women sitting in jail," attorney Robert E. Gonzales told BARB at the Alameda County Court House on Tuesday.

Three Mexican-American girls and eight men were arrested by University police on Monday over the issue of the grape boycott and the University.

Attorney Gonzales succeeded Tuesday in getting the girls released on their own recognizance, while their eight "carnales" (brothers) chose to remain in the Berkeley jail and began a hunger strike.

Toward the end of the week, officials of the Berkeley campus again affirmed that grapes would not be served, while no such statewide University position in support of the grape boycott was expected.

Ralph Arreola, acting chairman of the Mexican-American Student Confederation, explained to a noon rally on Lower Sproul Plaza that they had had promises like that in the past.

"There were meetings in the summer that most of you probably know nothing about. We met with Director of Purchasing and Finance Don Campbell and he agreed to stop purchasing and serving grapes. But we soon found that grapes were still being served in the residence halls," Arreola said.

"Then, on October 4, we complained to Purchasing Agent Scott Wilson that grapes were still being served. We obtained a written statement saying the University will not serve grapes. But then there was the matter of Earl Coate, the Agricultural Secretary to Reagan who was pressuring University President Hitch to stop this practice of compliance with us."

The situation which led up to Monday's arrests in Hitch's University Hall office began a week ago Friday when Hitch announced "the University has not taken any position, nor does it intend to, on the marketing of California grapes."

His subsequent remarks made it clear that ordering of grapes would be left up to each campus to determine for itself.

Though he labelled the University as neutral, his decision sides with the farmers, the Mexican-Americans charged. Tony Cedillo, a spokesman for MASC, cited Hitch's own statements made in Lower Sproul Plaza, calling for the University to take a leadership role in solving the ills of society.

Manuel Gomez, who spoke on behalf of the Oakland "Brown Berets," charged the University President with being "incompetent and inadequate" and called upon the crowd to "smash grapes against his office."

Manuel Delgado, chairman of MASC and one of the eleven arrested in the sit-in, had called the President's statement "reactionary and racist."

A statement from Delgado and the others read before the rally pledged themselves to a hunger strike "to demonstrate the sincerity and conviction of our actions."

In addition to their demand that the University declare itself in sympathy with boycott and stop buying and serving Delano grapes, the Mexican-American students also have a series of demands regarding improved education for their people.

The group wants the University to begin granting special scholarships to the children of farm workers, to establish a Mexican-American study center, and to increase the number of students admitted without strict academic credentials from 4 to 10 per cent. Later this week, the students added demands for increased Mexican-American enrollment and for their own "unconditional amnesty."

Demonstrations on Monday and Tuesday were well attended, drawing crowds of several hundred, the majority of whom were overwhelmingly brown. The Chicanos have said that they are going to

# WELL, HUNG JURY FREES NEO-NAKED REVEREND

"Jeff is a dangerous man," S.F. attorney Sal Balestrew told BARB this week.

"He has the ability to attract large numbers of followers, because he makes sense. They may not want to put him in jail, but they'd love to stop him."

Reverend Jefferson Fuck Poland, Minister of the Neo-American Church, and founder of the Sexual Freedom League, was tried in San Francisco this week for indecent exposure. But, due to a hung jury, Poland is free -- at least temporarily.

Poland was arrested last May 30 for disrobing in Golden Gate Park and reading the bible to about 75 members of his congregation. And again on July 7 for nude sunbathing at the Ft. Funston Beach with a group of friends.

In both cases, the arrests were made for infractions of an 1872 statute against "willfully and lewd-

ly exposing his person or private parts in a public place." "I was nude," admits Poland, "but not lewd," he claims.

"The D.A. offered to dismiss the charges if I would plead guilty to disorderly conduct. But I'm not making any deals."

The prosecution's case against Poland was full of phony moral platitudes. Dig: "Instinctive modesty, self-respect, and human decency require private parts to be concealed in the presence of others."

The central issue was whether Poland had committed a lewd act. The definition used by the court, was the one offered by the prosecution. Lewd, said the court, is "any lewd act, inciting to sexual desire and suggesting moral looseness."

In his instructions to the jury, however, Judge Emmet Daly re-

minded the jury that, "nudity is not per se obscene." This was the contention of the defense attorney, Sal Balistreri.

After less than 3 hours of deliberation, the jury announced that it was deadlocked, with 8 for conviction, 4 for acquittal. "It was no use taking any more votes," a juror said. "Everyone's mind was made up. I said 'damn' in the jury room and had to apologize to one of the ladies on the jury who was offended."

Said Poland, "This is a victory, but the next move is up to the D.A. The danger is that next time around, they could coach the pigs to lie that they saw lewd acts. Any pig will lie."

The case has been referred back to the general calendar for further action. October 22 is the date of Poland's next appearance. They'd love to stop him.

## ROOMMATE ARRESTED

American justice did it again this week.

Richard Gumbiner, Jefferson Poland's roommate, was a spectator at Jeff's trial in City Hall, and became very ill.

"He was falling all over the place like he was drunk," a witness told BARB. "He was acting crazy, so they arrested him."

The sergeant who arrested Gumbiner found several vials of pills on his person.

Gumbiner says the pills were

legally purchased under prescription. He has high blood pressure and sinus trouble, and is under a doctor's care.

"The problem was that I had a new medication, probably phenothiazine. That, combined with my other medication, had a bad side effect," he told BARB.

"I guess they wanted to harass me because I have long hair and a beard," he added. "But I'm an orthodox Jew, and it would

violate my beliefs to conform to their standards of grooming."

Unable to raise the bail money, Gumbiner will have to remain in jail until his trial. Deprived of his medication he is very ill. "I feel wretched," he said, "the pain is terrible."

According to one attorney, "This is certainly grounds for a false arrest suit."

So much for justice in the Hall of Justice.

The G-man's technique is to work closely with vice squad officers. Vice men tell IRS of women they know from the streets who have been arrested (not necessarily convicted) for prostitution. A subpoena is then made out with the woman's name on it and a vice squad car patrols the streets with a G-man aboard. V-men then finger the girl for G-men.

Since pimps are generally responsible for the business matters of the working chicks, BARB spoke to one such entrepreneur who faces the IRS men.

"This is outrageous," he said. "I may take the case to the Civil Liberties Union."

"The problem is, if you fight it, then you get publicity and bring the heat down on yourself. Once they know who you are, they'll put you in the clink for spitting on the sidewalk."

"The problem is," he continued, "that if you don't fight it

you're admitting your guilt and then they can get you anyway."

This policy, the pimp said, was "further alienating the girls from society. It has the effect of turning prostitution from a misdemeanor to a federal crime."

He claimed he went to a tax attorney who wants to charge him \$1500 to represent him "and he couldn't guarantee that I wouldn't do time for tax evasion."

"Furthermore," he continued, "how can you take a percentage of an income where no records are kept? You can't estimate the income or deductions."

One broad went down there this week and stated her income as \$5000. They asked for \$1,000. That's twenty percent.

"These girls are giving fair trade for fair pay. But in some places the Mafia takes its cut and now the government wants IT's cut. They both say 'pay up or we'll put you out of business'."

"Say," asked the pimp, "just who are the crooks?"

# ONE DOWN WHY NOT NEWTON JUDGE?

Last week Robert Waggener, a construction executive and one-time candidate for city council in San Mateo, told his local of the Elks Club to go to hell with their "whites only" membership drive.

Three weeks ago Monroe Friedman, Huey Newton's judge, told BARB, in effect, to go to hell when asked about his membership in the Oakland Elks Club, which also has a "white only" clause in its constitution.

BARB read of Waggener's resignation in the October 12 issue of the Chronicle, and asked and received an interview with him. Judge Friedman has refused to talk to BARB reporters.

BARB would like to see if the judge would deny an interview to the Chronicle. The question still is, "Why does Judge Friedman belong to the Elks Club, and what is he going to do about it?"

"I think his (Friedman's) membership is very questionable. His responsibility is to all the community," Waggener told BARB when asked what he thought of the man who sat in judgement of Huey Newton while a member of the white racist Club.

"We have a couple of judges in the San Mateo Club," Waggener said. "One, Judge Howard Hartly, is going to be an exalted Ruler in a couple of years. And people are sending them letters now, asking what they intend to do about the Elks."

"In fact," he added, "four city council members are members of the Elks."

Following Waggener's resignation community religious leaders in the Peninsula area have spoken up against the San Mateo Elks Club, the fifth largest one in the U.S. The Conference on Religion, Race and Social Concern (CRRSC), is a group of ministers and laymen from 18 churches in San Mateo, Burlingame, and Millbrae.

But fraternal racism goes even deeper than that. "City officials all across the board are tied up with one or the other," the Reverend Rufus Cooper told BARB, "if it's not the Elks, it's the Masons."

Reverend Cooper is the minister of the A.M.E. Zion Church of San Mateo and a participant in the weekly meetings of the CRRSC.

Another CRRSC participant, Reverend Alanson Higbie of the San Mateo Episcopac Church feels that membership in these discriminatory fraternal organizations could be due to ignorance -- before the Waggener resignation.

"I think a lot of people are involved in a lot of things without being aware of the problems. But this does not condone it," he told BARB, "when the members become aware of it, something should be done."

"Whether a guy is consciously involved in discrimination or not is hard to tell," Robert Waggener told BARB, "he can just not be aware of it, like I wasn't. But now the thing is out in the open. They don't have an excuse now."

This applies to Judge Monroe Friedman, too. Perhaps it is safe for him, and the rest of white America, to assume that this whole racial issue is just a teapot tempest and, if ignored, it will just go away.

And then there are men like Robert Waggener.

Russian warships off Scotland" while KPFA tells of a "guided missile warship" joining the Red Fleet in the Mediterranean "which now consists of more than fifty ships."

Mussolini called the Med "Mare Nostrum" ("our sea"). After WW II, Gen Eisenhower called the Med "Our sea." This week, the Russians have over fifty ships in "our sea."

The nation of Lichtenstein is so small that it is impossible to hit it with anything. Yet the Swiss, famous for their precision and craftsmanship, was able to land five artillery shells smack dab in the middle of its tiny neighbor.

"One of our guns was facing the wrong way," an embarrassed Swiss explained.

This military feat equals the Canadian Navy. A few years ago it shelled the coast of Washington state. One of their ships was obviously facing the wrong way. (Where is our "New Jersey" today?)

The West German reports of Russian "intentions" of not only "normalizing" their country but also of "sweeping to the English Channel by occupying Holland," makes sense - militarily, that is.

The US and the British can sweat it out while pondering whether or not to retaliate "conventionally" or with "tactical nuclear weapons." Meanwhile, the Russians have Europe.

Russians will die happy.

So will Eldridge Cleaver. "Mao, baby - you've done a beautiful job. You've got your hydrogen bomb, you don't have troops on anyone else's soil. You're just there to defend your own borders.

"If you are attacked drop your bomb, drop your bomb right on my head, blow me up and take the Americans with me. Let the people of this world have some peace," he has said.

Cleaver's error is this: whereas he is correct in pointing out Red China has no troops anywhere outside China, he is wrong in thinking that radioactivity does not cross borders or "anyone else's soil."

This is what Sgt Pepper meant at the beginning of this column that the world will self-destruct anytime within the next thirty years.

We have no leaders or thinkers. Instead, "We are the hollow men, We are the stuffed men, Leaning together, Headpiece filled with straw. Alas!...Between the idea and the reality, Between the motion and the act, Falls the Shadow... This is the way the world ends, this is the way the world ends, Not with a bang but a whimper." -- T.S. Eliot, "The Hollow Men", 1925.

# P&F's TERRY TEARS INTO M.C. FOLLOWERS

Stokely Carmichael told white radicals to go and organize their own communities, remember? Peace & Freedom Party vice-presidential candidate Peggy Terry didn't have to be told; she had already been doing it for some time.

Mrs. Terry, 47 years old and wryly soft-spoken, is a leader of Chicago's JOIN Community Union, a unique organizing project that has recently begun an effort to spread its techniques nationally through the National Organizing Committee.

She was the nominee of P&F's

Radical Caucus at the Ann Arbor convention last August, and was chosen as one of the vice presidential alternatives by the California party's state council after the national meet voted to leave the choice of a running mate for P&F presidential candidate Eldridge Cleaver up to the individual state groups. Cleaver named Jerry Rubin as his running mate.

The focus of both Mrs. Terry's organizing experience is poor and working class whites. On her six day campaign tour through California, she has emphasized this class continually.

The job of the radical movement, Mrs. Terry told a P&F forum Tuesday (Oct. 15) at Oakland's Emerson School, is to show white workers that their enemy is the economic system, not black people.

In criticizing the system, Mrs. Terry did not spare criticism of her audience, which was primarily middle class and student.

"The middle class has never seen poor whites as 'their people'" she said.

"They never came to us. Instead, they sat around moaning because they couldn't hold black people's hands any longer."

Her analysis of the working class, however, is not a simple, all-encompassing one. She advocates concentrating on young guys and girls; their minds are less fucked up than other people's. People in the shops, by the time they get my age, there's not much you can do with them.

Also speaking at Tuesday's forum were David Rynin, P&F candidate in the 16th Assembly District against Don Mulford, and Mike James, former Berkeley student who is now with JOIN.

James augmented Mrs. Terry's emphasis when he said, we're not just in this battle for the blacks and the Vietnamese; we're in it for ourselves. Too many people are afraid to look at their own lives and see what's being done to them.

## FUZZ HALTS BAIL RAISING ON TELLY

You can't collect bail for a busted friend on the streets of Berkeley. So say the fuzz.

Roger, a street person, was approached by cops Wednesday night on Telly and told he had walked on a red light. As he told the coppers he was sorry, they put him under arrest and began to search him. They found three ounces of Marijuana in a stash pouch. Off they went, with Roger.

Mykel, another street person, was with Roger when this illegal search took place. He rounded up some friends and went out with coffee cans to collect bail money on the avenue. Bail for possession is usually from \$1500 to \$3000.

Some cops saw him and asked him for his permit. When he said he had none, they told him to quit or be busted. Permits were available from the police station, they sneered.

Mykel rounded up his friends and stopped the collecting -- for that night.

They will continue from tables at Bancroft and at Cody's. Give-- it might have happened to you.

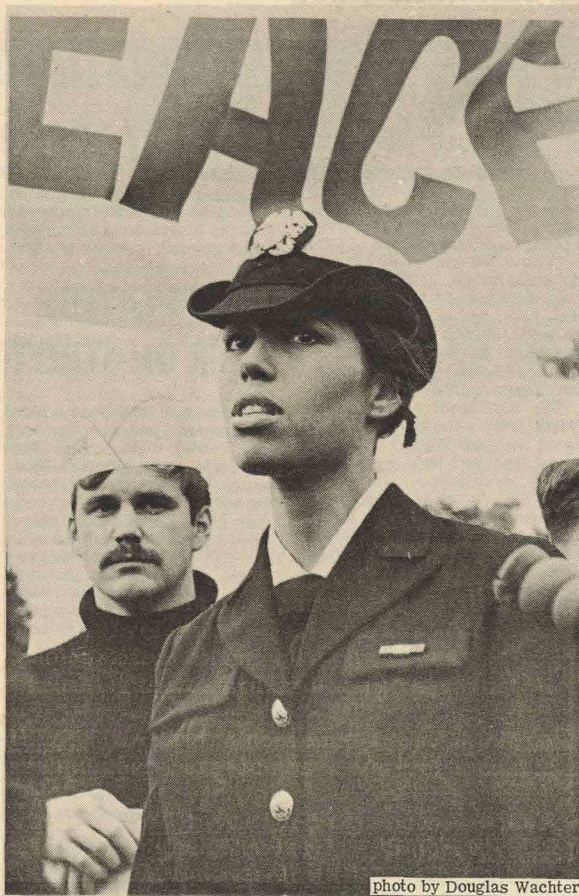

## SHE BOMBED FOR PEACE

Last Friday a small plane dropped 14,000 anti-war leaflets for Saturday's GIs Peace March.

Accompanying pilot Bill Gray, a Stanford med student, were Peter Schnall, Schnall's wife Susan who is a Navy nurse, and Vietnam Veteran Jim Ronda.

The plane "bombed" Oak Knoll Naval Hospital, Yerba Buena Naval Station, Treasure Island and the

USS Ranger.

"Servicemen need to have a voice," Gray explained. "We need to inform them of their right to demonstrate and show the validity of this march."

"The action was necessary because of naval regulations regarding literature and the fact that some leafleteers have been detained for their activities outside the gates."

## ONE WHO SURVIVED REPORTS ON NAVY PENS

US Military Prisons are places which make most civilian pens seem like rest homes.

"Once you're in you became a slave," Alan Weisenmuller told BARB this week. He is an inmate who had just finished 4-1/2 months in Treasure Island and Portsmouth (N.H.) Naval Prison on a pot charge.

Famed for turning on Lemoor Naval Air Station, (BARB, March 17, 1967), now sporting a curly moustache and a groovy peace medallion on his maroon turtle-neck, Weisenmuller gave the details of his experiences in the 19th century style prisons.

"It's a degrading trip," he said. "You learn to keep your eyes and ears open and your mouth shut," Weisenmuller pointed out that the guards have little formal training and go out of their way to hassle and ridicule inmates.

The majority of inmates are in for going AWOL, young people just wanting to be free of the military bag. Lately the stockades have been filled to capacity with more and more pot and acid heads. Only a small number have serious raps of assault or murder.

"If someone is cracking up they may tease the flipped guy," Weisenmuller stated. "Somebody who is psychologically screwed up cannot get out because the whole thing is screwed up."

He described medical facilities as very poor, aspirin being the only prescription for any ailment. Those going to the doc are classed as "troublemakers" which makes it twice as bad as before.

In comparison to treatment of hardened criminals in civilian prisons, the military can get away with a lot more in subtle forms of torture, boredom and useless repetitive work. Recreation areas and visitors are supposedly allowed, but both are almost inaccessible because of the many complicated bureaucratic steps that have to be overcome.

When first arriving prisoners may be given one rusty razor to shave off a full beard. Baggy non-matching clothing is dealt out on purpose. Prisoners are kept awake by guards spitting and urinating

on them.

Permission has to be asked for everything, even to take a leak.

There is a prescribed machine-like way to address all guards:

"Sir, prisoner number 2874 requests to speak, sir."

"Speak,"

"Sir, can I go to the toilet, sir?"

Several military prisons have an especially bad reputation, these include the Brooklyn Navy Yard and Treasure Island. These are smaller brigs, mostly for short-timers.

"I was actually glad to get to Portsmouth after Treasure Island," Weisenmuller said. He described conditions there as crowded, and filthy, with guards doing as they pleased. All the prisoners do is shine toilet bowls and drill. There is a library in the brig, but "with so many Napoleons to pass nobody tries to use it."

Despite his sordid experience Weisenmuller didn't seem bitter and anticipated more GIs turning off on the war because so many are now on the grass scene in Vietnam.

"The reason the war cannot be won," he stated, "is because everyone is too stoned to fight."

## WOW! IT PAID OFF!

The GIs and Veterans' March for Peace has made money.

That's almost man bites dog news; for the first time in a decade, organizers of a peace march have found themselves holding a bag that is full.

\$7,000 was collected from the crowd; an average of \$1 per person. This compares with a past average of 13 cents per person.

The March expenses ran \$4000. But further expenses may crop up.

Legal defense for the GIs who get shat upon by the military in retaliation for marching is considered the March's responsibility.

The scheduled post-March meeting Oct. 15th broke down into

## GI ANTI-WAR MARCHERS ROUT UNDERCOVER MEN

Despite heat from their commanders, about 250 GIs and reservists ignored the dismal weather to take part in the servicemen's peach march last Saturday.

Only a few showed up in uniform, in defiance of military regulations. Many of the rest were AWOL, since inspections were set for that day on most Bay Area posts, especially for the occasion.

After marching eight abreast from Golden Gate Park to the SF Civic Center, the GIs and about 7,000 supporters listened to veterans and GIs denounce the war and the military machine.

For those who spoke, and for the men present who were identified by the military intelligence spies circulating through the crowd, the peach march may be only the beginning of their confrontation with the brass.

A man who identified himself as a GI stationed at the Oakland Army Base said he heard tapes of interviews taken at the march, tapes made by agents posing as newsmen.

The two best-known speakers at the Civic Center rally are beyond the reach of military punishment. Former Green Beret Don Duncan and retired Brigadier General Hugh Hester have already served their time.

During the speeches, plainclothed military cops put the squeeze on various GIs. Several times the crowd nearby moved in to put the squeeze on the cops. Other plainclothesmen blew their cover coming to the rescue.

The exposed cops retreated to the safety of their cars after being jeered, razed, and slobbered with sodapop--not with the bottles.

Don Duncan reminded the GIs that not only the brass is uptight about servicemen in peace marches. "When you get back to your base, you're going to be at the hands of every lifer in the service," Duncan told them.

The GIs cheered and applauded. Duncan's remark paralleled recurrent reports that on bases throughout the country draftees and volunteers are becoming ever more hostile camps. When the volunteers go out drinking together at the local beer halls, the draftees gather on the beaches to blow pot.

Duncan went on to demand that the draft be abolished, that military involvement on campuses be stopped, that political prisoners be released from stockades and military prisons, and that dishonorable discharges be ended.

General Hester displeased his listeners with one comment in an otherwise well-received speech. He endorsed Richard Nixon as "the lesser of three evils."

The crowd rose to their feet with shouts of protest. Hester concluded, "I'll let you argue among yourselves."

Then USAF Lieutenant Hugh Smith stepped forward. "If I told you who I want, we'd have a revolution." Smith is the leading organizer of the GIs for Peace, which shaped up the march.

Before General Hester mentioned Nixon, he told the crowd, "Conscription is a form of involun-

tary servitude. The war must be stopped because it's illegal, immoral, and genocidal."

Prior to the march and rally, Lt. Smith called the demonstration "the most radical thing going on in the U.S. today". The full reaction of "military justice"--not yet unleashed at this time--may prove that the brass-hats agree with him.

The next step for GIs for Peace is the defense of the people punished for their part in the peace march. Help can be offered by calling 552-2939 between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m.

## SAIGON SUE GETS 'EM BACK

This week "for the first time" (a familiar phrase which shows our fuckup in Vietnam), Army and Marines are "sending thousands of men back for involuntary second tours" to the war.

This chilling news serves as a realistic backdrop to the GIMarch against our war in Vietnam Saturday in which nearly 7,000 people joined 200 soldiers, sailors, and marines in San Francisco.

Over 200 reservists and another 200 veterans took part in the march which started at Golden Gate Park and ended on the steps of the City Hall.

Organized by the Bay Area Veterans for Peace Committee, it was led by Navy Nurse Lt. (JG) Sue Schnall, Brig Gen Hugh Hester (Ret) and Airman Michael Locks.

Locks, who received an order from the Sec of Air Force not to wear his Air Force Blues, wore them anyway. He received a standing ovation and prolonged applause when he declared, "I can't see a better cause for wearing my uniform than in the cause of peace."

There were not many votessfxk Humphrey Saturday, and only one for Nixon - Gen Hester's, much to everybody's surprise and boing.

Sue Schnall (Navy Doll, JG) said that "it was the boys coming back from Vietnam that made me decide to do something." She was referring to the wounded Navy at Oak Knoll Hospital where she is a nurse.

One of the things she did (along with her husband and a friend) was bombard an Aircraft carrier in Alameda, as well as her own hospital. With leaflets, Sgt. Pepper better add.

Say what you will, but the American Flag is the MOST beautiful flag, ever. It is quite a thrill to see a massed-color display of ten flags flowing in the wind and serving as a phalanx-of-honor in front of the City Hall.

Other banners includes "Marines For Peace - 3rd Bn 23rd Mar, USMCR, San Bruno." "GI's For Peace" Reserves, and "Veterans For Peace."

Two Catholic orders were in the march. "Sisters of Mercy" headed by Sister Rosemary. Also (corrections are in order on this one): "Everyman Catholic League, Brothers of the Love of Jesus Christ", headed by priests in flowing black and red robes.

The "Berkeley Teachers Local #1078" had their banner, with the slogan: "Bring the GI's Home Now." Women For Peace were present, as well as a new organization from East Oakland, The Oakland Opposition Center.

The Center carried the sign the Oakland Police made them take down over their store at 2447 E. 14th St. it reads: "OPPOSE RACISM, WAR, POVERTY."

Regrettably, no Black Panthers showed up officially, in spite of Bobby Seale asking them to, and very few individual blacks were present.

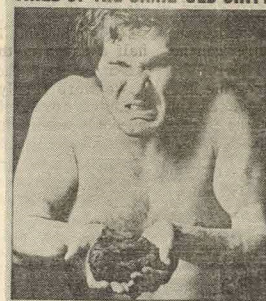

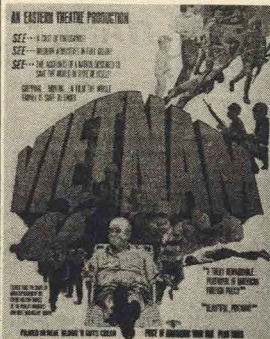
"Bring ideas, peaceful weapons, musical instruments, costumes, food and drink," the Players say.

the YSA," slyed Paul Glusman, out of the corner of his mouth. He was pointing at the Wallace literature and moneymaking table.

Behind the tables stood four dyed blonde frozen icepicks, Wallace girls who smile sweetly when they take money and their eyes promise you nothing more than the antarctic.

Inside they were treating the longhairs like niggers. A section had been reserved for the freaks in the back of the barn, and we could either go to it or get out.

The crew-cut music they were playing was the sort of watered-down and smoothed-over Ozark sound you hear in the cocktail lounges of Atlanta.

"When I'm President, I'll take care of you anarchists!" Wallace began speaking. His ghettoizing tactics were obvious, we were in

one section and he could point to us and build his own drama by using our disruption.

"You'll have to get a job when I'm in the White House," Wallace would say, and then his followers, the unhappy short-order cooks, laundromat owners, murderous pigs, and old bitchy Birchers would nod their heads in admiration and say, "He's got guts, old George has." "SEIG HEIL!" It was our shout and the one great moment of truth for the afternoon.

have been mobile, sitting down next to the Babbits and offering them a roach, forcing them to listen to us and making Wallace cut his speech short.

Instead, by staying in the balcony we were psychological sitting ducks for Wallace's demagoguery. That cracker brings a portable Haight-Ashbury dead-end electric chair with him wherever he goes. We should never willingly sit in it.

George Wallace has never known a decently fulfilled erection. He belongs to that class of American motherhood who pour cold water on their babies when they get stiff. Wallace and his followers grew up in an America where the archetypal hero was the slave-master. Every kid on the block

dreamed of owning something. In the Boy Scout Manuals George was taught to be the slavemaster of his own body. He was given instructions on how not to masturbate.

It was an age of scarcity, and you had to pull your ass tightly together in order to survive. No one ever learned how to make love, to stop trying to own, and to start giving. Everything decent in humanity had to be locked and hung-up.

George Wallace will lose. It's just that there are too many children being born, and too many old people dying. Wallace may get a few harpoons in, but the future belongs to the sensuous.

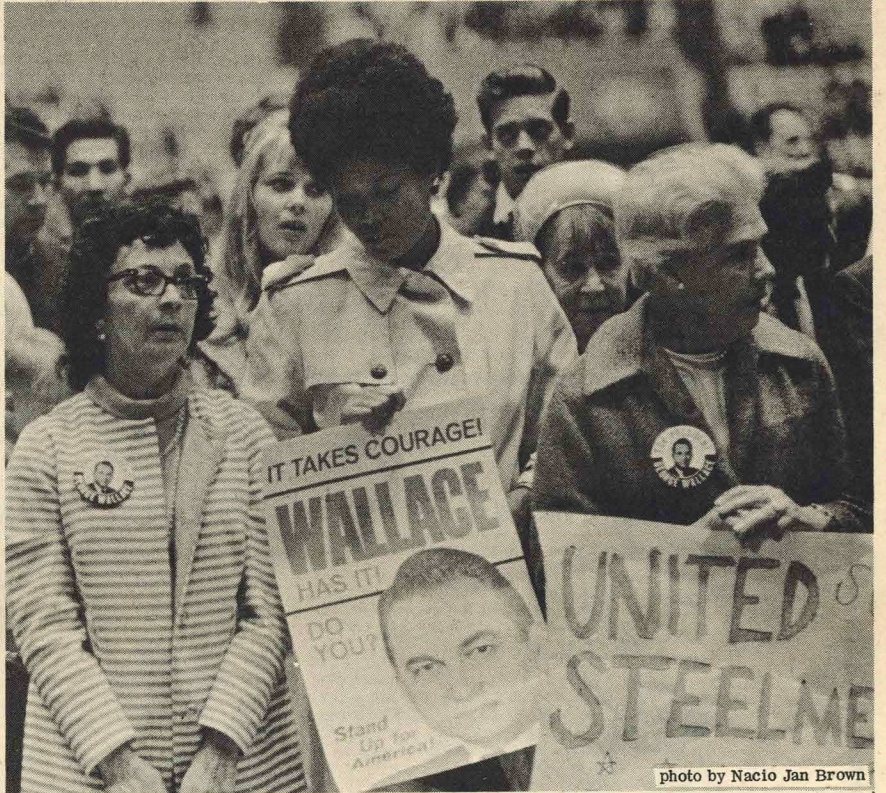

## SANTA CRUZ CHANCELLOR AFRAID TO TAKE CHANCE

"Dean McHenry appeared to be the most conservative of all those present," says a confidential report made by a University of California consultant four years ago.

The consultant was sent to study the problems of integration of the new Santa Cruz campus would face and he was talking about the future chancellor of that campus, Dean E. McHenry.

"... he expressed concern about the reaction of the community, when the first Negro comes to the Campus. He stated emphatically that the first Negro should be an exceptional person, so that there would be good acceptance," the report went on.

On June 17, 1968, four years later, how exceptional is made clear: out of 874 employees on the campus at that date, three were black. One of them was a professor.

Among the integration problems facing Santa Cruz, the consultant implied, was Dean E. McHenry.

Today, the Black Liberation Movement wants to have one of the twenty colleges to be built on the Santa Cruz campus dedicated to the black experience and named after the man who represents it best: Malcolm X.

Predictably enough, Dean McHenry thinks it is a bad idea. "... in my opinion, 'The Black Experience' is too narrow a base for a possible theme of a college," he says in a statement issued last September 13.

As of this issue of the BARB,

the Regents of U.C. are meeting on the campus at Santa Cruz. The idea of Malcolm X College, Black Liberation Movement spokesman Bill Moore assures us, is not on the agenda.

"They're just slapping black people in this country in the face and saying, 'Nigger, what you've done in this country isn't even worth consideration,'" Moore told BARB.

But the black people of Santa Cruz, and their white and Chicano sympathizers, aren't letting the Regents go home as ignorant as Chancellor McHenry would perhaps prefer.

Thursday and Friday planned demonstrations have been going on on the campuses of the Santa Cruz high schools, at Cabrillo College, and at U.C. Santa Cruz to call attention to the idea of Malcolm X College.

Moore says that neither he nor any other member of the BLM has had the opportunity to discuss their proposal with Chancellor McHenry, yet the Chancellor was able to issue his statement opposing the idea a month ago.

"People condemning us before they hear what we have to say -- that's exactly what lynching is all about," Moore told Barb.

As if this frustration isn't enough to discourage him, Moore says he has noticed a new form of pressure brought to bear upon him for his activities.

Actually, the tactics employed

## PERSECUTED SMITHS ASK WHO PAYS BRUTAL COPS

The trial of the Smiths, Mrs. Willetta, Harriet, and Fred Smith, has been postponed by the prosecution again -- to December 9th.

But the campaign to get justice for the Smiths, who were beaten by two Berkeley brownshirts who invaded Mrs. Smith's home last July 16, is gaining momentum.

The Berkeley chapter of Bay Area Blacks United (BABU) was formed this summer as a direct result of the beatings. It happened, BABU spokesman Bobby Thompson told BARB, "when 'responsible' blacks saw that the police weren't

are familiar to anyone who lived in this country during the days of Joe McCarthy. Suddenly Bill Moore has found himself the object of a careful check by FBI and CIA agents. For a person who has been in the Green Berets and long since given top security clearance for his job in a major electronics firm, this new investigation would seem ridiculous, if it weren't so ominous.

Moore and the members of the Black Liberation Movement have been bucking the vested white interests of Santa Cruz ever since they first tried to make their dream of black dignity come true. TACT (Truth About Civil Turmoil) first sounded the alarm for Santa Cruz right wingers.

But the blacks are realists. They expect persecution. Yet they are out to win.

It is with a very steady voice and gaze that Bill Moore told BARB, "By any means necessary,"

aiming at just the young black radicals."

Mrs. Smith, 65, is a long-time Berkeley resident who was baby-sitting four children at the time the two cops swept into her home in pursuit of her daughter, Harriet, who was making a phone call for help. Harriet, whom they suspected of posting handbills on a telephone pole, is a past president of the Merritt College student body. Fred Smith, a visitor who came to their rescue, is Student Body President of Merritt right now.

Shortly after the incident, when the black community took its complaints against the police to city hall, BPD Chief William Beall confessed to a "mistake" on the part of his animals, and Slavin, the cop involved, quit the force. Yet the Smiths are still being prosecuted.

"There is a series of questions that should be asked," spokesman Thompson told BARB.

"Like, why is the prosecution postponing the trial? Are they having trouble with their principle witness (Slavin)? Are they desperately searching for another Grier (witness at the Newton trial)? What police force is Slavin working for now? Are they hoping that by December 9th the Black community will have forgotten this?"

Most important, "Who pays for police brutality?" Mrs. Thompson asked.

This question is directed at the white community which has given only token support to the Smiths.

"From the lack of protest from the white community, one could assume only black and brown citizens pay taxes for false arrests and police brutality," Mrs. Thompson said.

(The insurance rates on Berkeley policemen for insurance against false arrests recently went up -- because of an overzealous cop who is rumored to still be causing trouble in the South Campus area.)

In fact, through higher taxes, higher interest rates, and higher rents, "discrimination is robbing the middle class white community blind," Mrs. Thompson said.

For this reason, she pointed out, the white community is foolish to ignore brutalities like these wreaked on the Smiths, BABU, and Bobby Thompson, are seeking support for the Smiths in the form of letters, to show the officials in this city that the problem is not just a black one.

They urge whites -- and blacks -- to direct letters of protest to Police Chief Beall, Mayor Johnson, and District Attorney Coakley.

Financial aid can be mailed to the Smith Defense Fund, P.O. Box 9001, Berkeley.

"The support given by the black community so far has been marvelous," Mrs. Thompson told BARB. But taxes pay for the prosecution while the Smiths have to pay for their own defense. More money is needed.

Finally, "be in court whenever possible," Bobby Thompson said, "especially December 9."

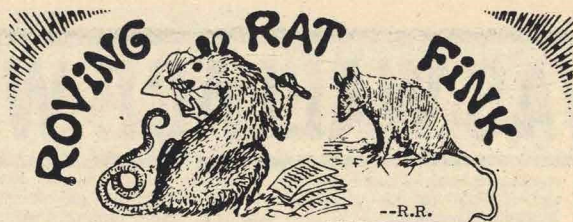
What a nightmare.

Dear Mr. Nixon:

Since it appears probable that you will be our next President, I would respectfully like to draw your attention to a matter of vital national importance.

Throughout your campaign, you have stressed the problems of crime and violence. And rightly, for the problem is pressing. But few of your statements have seemed to indicate concern over the sources of crime and violence.

There is no doubt a complexity of causes; there always is. But might I suggest to you that an important one is the new monolithic nature of American society?

It seems to many people in this country today that meaningful social action has been abolished, and replaced with a mere right to dissent. That possibilities of doing something to change things have been done away with, and that all we are allowed is the empty privilege of disagreeing. I submit that this situation produces frustrations, and that they will break loose somehow.

Some at least of that crime and violence occurs because some people see it as the only remaining alternative to accepting things as they are.

If I seem to be overstating the case, let me illustrate with the concrete example of the Vietnam war.

I know that our views on it differ

widely. But I believe that you would agree with me that (a) popular opposition to the war is on a scale unprecedented in American history; and (b) at any earlier period of American history, opposition on such a scale would have made some difference. Not FDR, or HST, or DDE would have felt free to go on doing as he liked if he knew that one out of every four Americans condemned it.

Thus too many Americans, especially the young (and remember, the average voter's age this year is 27) feel themselves powerless against a structure that commands them to confine themselves to peaceful methods and then casually ignores all their peaceful efforts.

Hence, crime and violence, or at least a significant part of it. You can't stop the war, but you can run up a criminal record and thereby stay out of it. You can't make the power-holders do what you wish, but you can smash their windows to make it such that they don't have everything their way.

There will always be hoodlums, of course. But a good deal of the trouble would be eliminated by this country's returning to the sort of open, responsive society it once had. I believe that even most of the activists would be ready to call off their revolution, if they could see prospects of getting something done in other ways.

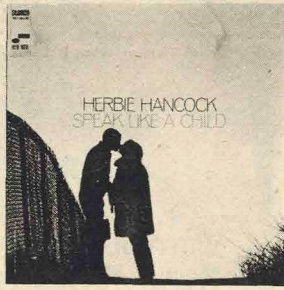
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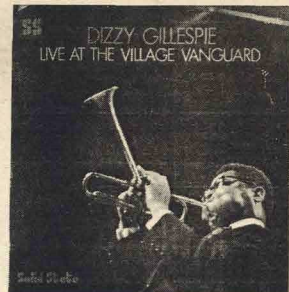
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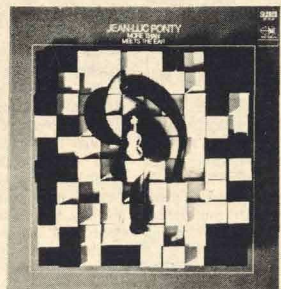


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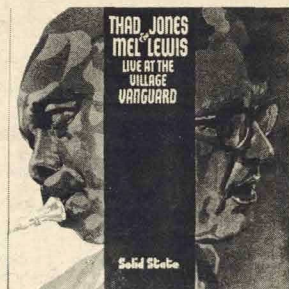
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# PIGS PEN PENINSULA FOLK IN

Three people have been arrested in Palo Alto's fight to prevent the liberation of its streets.

Barry Greenberg, Bob Cullenbine, and Shelby White were arrested last week on warrants for supposed activities a week earlier at a rally in Lytton Plaza.

They are charged with obstructing an officer. According to the fuzz they participated in, or may be organized an incident in which spectators locked arms around a rock band to protect it from the cops, who were ringed in with the band.

Greenberg is a self-described "professional revolutionary" and editor of the Peninsula Observer, the local underground paper. Cullenbine is an official of the Mid-peninsula Free University (MFU) and White is black.

The battle for Lytton Plaza has been underway for some weeks. Since the United Student Movement, a high school group, began holding rock rallies in the cement plaza in the city's heart. They were city center for Palo Alto's youth. The MFU had been denied the use of a building for such a center by a landlord who violated a contract.

Lytton Savings, which owns the land covered by Lytton Plaza, has been warning the officers of MFU to keep themselves and everybody else off their precious concrete after sundown and not to play any music.

These blandishments have been ignored, since the Plaza is a continuation of the sidewalk and is therefore an area with public access and covered by the Constitution.

Although Bart Lytton, recently deposed founder of Lytton Savings, described the scene as having less action than a church social, the town fathers have seen the rallies as a direct threat to their minds.

Cops turned up at the October 4th Mexican-student solidarity rally and attempted to get to the band. They were ringed in with the band by members of the crowd and kicked their way out. They were escorted back to the police pen by the crowd, who shouted helpful advice.

The next night there were just plainclothesmen with cameras and recorders and the crowd danced out into Emerson street, which was then closed off.

The next weekend there were cops in real riot gear grimly surrounding the plaza with barricades. They kept the people in Lytton Plaza and reserved the street for themselves. The same thing happened that Saturday.

That was the weekend of the busts; blatant attempts at political suppression.

But the Palo Alto town shiteheads know not what they do. If anything has been proven in recent history, it is that movements cannot be stopped by token arrests.

Gradually the young people of the paradisaical Peninsula are pulling themselves together. Look for a rally in the future featuring Big Brother (the band, not the cops).

Things could really get frantic.

# TOM OBJECTS

To the editor:

Men should begin to object to the sick male chauvinism that is emerging as a backlash against the women's liberation groups. Ramparts, the San Francisco Express Times, and now the Barb, have printed articles so condescending that they suggest how threatened men really are by "the woman question."

The case for women's liberation should be obvious, women are exploited as a consumer market, and made into reassuring servants for the Yankee in his insatiable search for domination, pleasure and justification. Within the Left itself, women play secondary and submissive roles. The Left is thus anchored to the foundations—the role structure—of the status quo. The question cannot be postponed until "after the revolution" because revolution is impossible without sharp personal breaks with bourgeois patterns of life, especially with America's repressive and property-oriented male-female relationships.

The Barb only appears to make a break with these repressive patterns. There is a sexual attitude in the Barb which seems to suppose that whatever is taboo in America should be celebrated by radicals. But there is such a thing as sexual decadence which

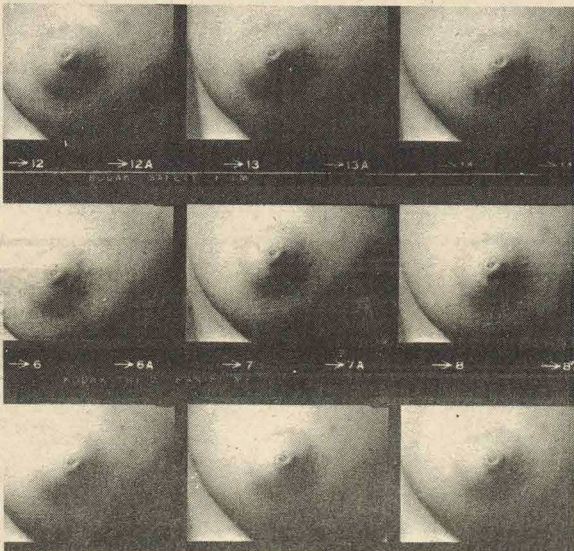
should be uninteresting, while not being taboo, to radicals. The Barb reveals this decadence in its sexual focus. The Barb represents a hip version of the morality of the Dirty Old Man, rather than exploring real alternatives to America's sexual neurosis.

Seeing a good story in the presentation of a vibrator to the women's group is a logical "climax" for the Barb. The vibrator is a plastic penis, and as such it says a great deal about the givers—and about those who advertise its sale. The plastic penis represents America's artificial and desperate attempt to create satisfaction in a society which is falling apart.

Instead of welcoming the development of a radical women's movement, the Barb seems to be uptight. So are many radical men, and not a few self-hating women. Not willing to confront a serious problem, they turn to put-downs, outbursts, and finally sick jokes. It is quite literally sick to wrap a plastic penis in a scroll which quotes the last words of a black leader, call it "final liberation", hand it to a group of white women, and take notes on their response.

Why doesn't the Barb, along with its co-conspirators, send a plastic white vagina to the Panthers' office and write up the reaction?

# HIP TRAVUS HIP HIPS AIR ADDICTS TO NEW MIND TRIP

Travus T. Hipp, the Bay Area's newest addition to its freaked-out airwaves, got the ball rolling last Saturday night, when on his first show, Travis advocated violent overthrow of the government by any means necessary.

Listeners who happened to catch

Hipp's first show on Oct. 12, a talk spot on the all-talk Metro-media station KNEW, were also treated to a few choice, seldom-heard on the air obscenities.

According to KNEW's program director, Ron Reynolds, Hipp will be heard again, in fact, regularly, despite his powerful politics and new-speak.

"Absolutely, Hipp will be on this weekend as planned," Reynolds told BARB. "There has been quite a reaction to his Saturday night show, but as yet we've heard nothing from the FCC."

Reynolds said that many complaints had come into the station following, even during, the Hipp Show last week. "There were phone calls in great number, on the air, and to me," Reynolds said. "And many of the letters sent to us were carbon copies addressed to the FCC in Washington," he added.

The KNEW spokesman said he didn't expect to hear from the Commission, although he told BARB, "there is always the possibility that they'll ask us to explain or they'll ask to hear the tapes." Reynolds said he'd be glad to send the tapes.

The program director predicted that the Commission would be more concerned with the obscenities than anything else.

"Actually, we do regret that," Reynolds said. He revealed to BARB how it, that is, how they, happened.

"On the talkshow set-up, the live conversation is delayed seven seconds before it's heard. We have this button that erases obscenities, of course, and Travus got to it in time."

"But it's very tricky," Reynolds continued. "And Travus didn't hold it down long enough. The effect was 'CENSOR, CENSOR, then OBSCENITY, OBSCENITY.'"

"I don't know if the Commission will want to accept that explanation," he added.

As far as the advocacy of armed revolution, the station spokesman said, "Our whole bag is tell it the way it is, as you, the communicator see it. I guess that's how he sees it."

The Travus T. Hipp Show will be heard this weekend and presumably every weekend night from 6-9 p.m. Except this Sunday, according to Reynolds, it will be heard earlier (from 4:15 to 8).

BARB attempted to speak to the Hipp one this week by calling him at work, only to find that the man was out sick.

# FEDS USE POLITICS OF POT

Federal men are now using the politics of pot against the Port Chicago vigil.

"The grapevine brought us the bone-chilling news that the Federal Government plans to prosecute three of our oldest project members, including Jim Bernard," a note from the vigilers says.

The expected charge is conspiracy to smuggle marijuana. A conviction carries a mandatory five-year minimum sentence; the maximum is twenty-five years.

Vigiling at the gate of the Naval Weapons Station in Port Chicago has been going on every day for more than two years. Monday October 14, was the 800th day.

If the feds have their way, the vigil won't see three years.

Jim Bernard raised money for the vigil by taking out loans, with his house in Canyon as security. The debt now totals \$13,700.

Vigilers say the immediate fee for lawyers will be \$5,000. Jim Bernard cannot have a public defender until he is so broke he loses his home, which now houses a handful of vigilers and his six children.

"Since the withdrawal of Johnson and the opening of the Paris talks," the vigilers note, "more munitions than ever are being shipped, yet financial support of the project has dropped off badly."

Where have the International Days of Protest gone? Are they being elusive along with National GI Week?

The problem for Bay Area activists is this:

National GI Week is November 1-5, according to National Mobilization Committee leaflets from New York. But it's October 21-27 according to Veterans for Peace in Vietnam leaflets from Chicago.

And October 21-27 is International Days of Protest according to material sent out by the Student Mobilization Committee at Antioch College in Yellow Springs, Ohio.

Bay Area groups, focusing on Election Day efforts, plan to give moral support to both, or either, or all three.

The Young Socialist Alliance indicates that their role in the GI March for Peace last Saturday was their kick-off contribution to National GI Week.

The Peace and Freedom Party in Alameda and San Francisco Counties indicates that their energies will be aimed at activities in the streets and at gaining votes for P&F candidates.

The Students for a Democratic Society indicates that they will be active in November 5 protests to expose the fraud of no-choice elections.

Regardless of labels and uncoordinated in the movement, Election Day 1968 will evidently be a noteworthy event in the history of the U.S.A.

Frank Zappa, leader and conductor of the Mothers of Invention, is the man of the day.

According to Francis Vincent, local coordinator of Zappa-for-President, thousands of voters throughout California and the United States are switching over to Zappa every day. Buttons and bumper stickers reportedly are selling faster than the supply can be replenished.

When asked about his candidate's platform Vincent told BARB, "No platform. Who needs a platform? They only get dirty anyway."

Vincent noted, however, that upon taking office Zappa will endeavor to pass legislation replacing all conventional chairs with toilet seats. "It gives you room to breathe," Vincent said.

# RAM'S HEAD OFFED

STANFORD (UNS) -- The "Ram's Head" follies and gaiety, reportedly a Stanford U tradition held every year since Herbert Hoover was a freshman, has been offed this year.

The script that will not be presented was written by noted black poet Johnnie Scott.

Ram's Head, an extracurricular activity, produces the annual vaudeville-style skitshow as part of the Big Game Week festivities. This year they asked Scott, a Stanford student, to write the play.

Scott has been published in Harper's, Antioch Review, and was nominated for an Emmy award for his work on Watts television.

He wrote Ram's Head a script about a black youth from Watts who

comes to Stanford shortly after a close friend has been killed in Watts and finds himself involved in the Stanford gaiety fest.

When Ram's Head saw the script they told Scott they couldn't produce it because there were no lyrics for the songs. Scott then wrote the lyrics.

Then Ram's Head told Scott they couldn't do it because there was no music to go with the lyrics. Scott then had music written by a friend, a Ph.D. in music who has worked with Count Basie and Duke Ellington.

Then Ram's Head told Scott they couldn't do it because the cast was all black, and they couldn't find enough black actors. Scott asked where they had looked, The Drama

Department, they told him.

Scott then found them a black cast of Stanford students with acting experience.

Ram's Head then discovered that their \$4,300 budget had somehow dwindled to \$2,000 -- not enough to put on the gaiety. Scott asked them why they didn't ask the administration for more money, since the event was a long-standing Stanford tradition.

Latest word from Ram's Head is that the follies will not take place due to "technical difficulties" within the organization.

"Do you think this is a case of racial misunderstanding?" the UNS reporter asked Scott.

"No," Scott said, "I'd call it a racial understanding."



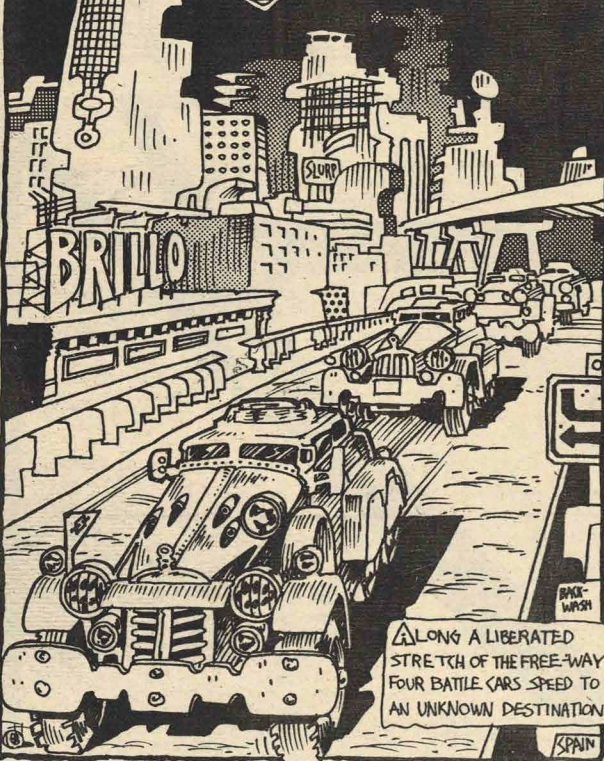

## Hippocrates

"Dear Dr. Schoenfeld:  
"A couple of weeks ago my girlfriend and I got loaded and were making love. She told me that she wanted to show me something new that would be a real thrill to me. She said that one of her old boy friends liked to have her do it to him often, so without knowing what it was, I agreed to let her try it.

What she did was to stretch my scrotum out tightly, then she took a pair of finger nail clippers and cut a small hole in the sac. I began to get scared then but she said not to worry, it was fun and didn't hurt much. Next she stuck a small plastic straw into the hole in my sac and started blowing air into it.

My sac got bigger than a baseball, but surprisingly it didn't hurt much and felt kind of good. I began to worry that it might burst so she stopped blowing and removed the straw. Then she quickly put a piece of adhesive tape over the hole to keep the air in. Then we continued with intercourse and I had a climax that was out of this world.

Afterwards she removed the tape from my scrotum and squeezed the air out with her hand. Then she dabbed my scrotum with rubbing alcohol (to prevent infection

ANSWER: I hesitated for a long time before deciding to print the above letters about very literal "blow" jobs. They appear in print only to point out that pleasurable sensations should be weighed against potential dangers.

To use drugs as an example, shooting speed (amphetamine) undoubtedly gives great immediate pleasure, but at the potential price of hepatitis, thrombophlebitis, deterioration of the personality and sudden death through overdosage. Heroin users quickly become heroin addicts. Nineteen known deaths have been caused in the last year by inhalation of freon gases from glass chiller aerosol cans.

If any readers doubt that the practices mentioned in the letters are harmful, I should point out firstly that more bacteria exist in the mouth than in any other body orifice. Our skin is a natural barrier to bacteria and other microorganisms which aren't normally found in the bladder or scrotum. Infections of the bladder (cystitis) may continue up the urethra to the kidneys. Infections of the scrotum? Not a pleasant prospect. Even more dangerous is the possibility of an air embolism. Air forced into a closed tissue space may enter the blood stream, go to the heart, lungs or brain and cause sudden death or a stroke. QUESTION: I have a "condition" which seems to worry my husband more than myself. Ever since my teens my inner or minor vaginal lips have hung outside my major lips.

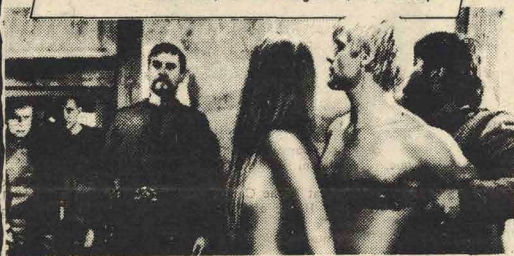
