Dear Sirs:
I have read several letters from GI's on the line in Vietnam. I thought your readers might be interested in what happens in the

thought your readers might be interested in what happens in the rear.

On the 19th of August I was convicted by Special Court Martial for possession of Pot. I received four months at hard labor, reduction to the lowest grade (E-I), and forfeiture of 2/3 pay for four months. At that time, I had 48 days left in the army.

While there, I was beaten just short of hospitalization during a riot of the prisoners (the riot was a result of putting 800 men in a stockade built for 350), I was released shortly after the riot on a suspended sentence.

This morning (46 days after my release) the CO's driver, SP/4 Hartin found a bag of pot in his jeep. The C.O., Capt. Durban, had me brought before him.

I refused to make any statement without counsel. Later this morning, I was taken to the 4th Div. ludge Advocate (General's office.

ing, I was taken to the 4th Div. Judge Advocate General's office. The lawyer, a Major, told my C.O. that he had no case against me. The fact that I had ridden

The lawyer, a Major, told my C.O. that he had no case against me. The fact that I had ridden in the jeep yesterday proved nothing, as the jeep sat overnite in the motor pool unattended.

The pot was sent to a crime lab in Saigon. My orders for return to the states and release from the Army have been flagged pending charges. It takes three weeks to get a reply on a lab test. I am being held even though there is only one statement against me (written by a man I've never met). This man claims to have seen me put the pot under the back seat of the jeep.

I am now living in the Orderly rooms under armed guard.

In conclusion, I would like to say that I have met several officers like my present C.O., all have been in non-combatant units in rear areas. There is no comparison between them and a combat officer.

It seems the Army has become little more than a playground for mentally deranged children. The

It seems the Army has become little more than a playground for mentally deranged children. The people who have to have power to survive have no place in the Army, nor in society. We should all work nor in society. We should all work to put these people in institutions under the control of the proper authorities. These menneed mental help

You can fight now."), Actually, we now have three Vietnams - North Vietnam, South Vietnam, and the NLF Vietnam. How this ever came about is one of the modern mysteries of man. But they are all there, either in Paris or in Saigon.

The actual person who could care less is the American fighting man. Liz Trotter (Chan 4) said: "These Marines aren't interested in peace. All they want is just to come home."

Marines helicoptered in to 'Dodge City', an NLF and North Viet ''staging area'' only 15 miles from Da Nang, the biggest US Marine base in the entire world.

"As it happened so many times before," she said, "the enemy was not there. All the Marines could find was rice and bunkers."

For the "enemy" to set up a "staging area" only a few minutes from Da Nang this week gives lie to the claim we are "winning."

We not only have three Vietnams, we now have two Soviet Unions. How this came about is one of the modern mysteries of Marxism.

On November 6 - right smack dab in the middle of Red Square -Marshall Andrei Grechko addressed the 51st anniversary of the Russian revolution by calling for "the normalization of relations with the United States." (Shirley Temple is alive in Moscow)

Yet a week later, the Russian government's paper Izvestia called upon the US 6th Fleet to quit the Mediterranean, The USSR is "concerned with peace and security of this area located in the direct VICINITY (emphasis added) of the southern Soviet borders."

IN-LAW **FAVORS MALCOLM X** COLLEGE

Hakim Jamal, Malcolm's brother-in-law and founder-president of the Malcolm X Foundation, told some one hundred or more students on the Santa Cruz campus Monday night that the plan to name one college of twenty at Santa Cruz for the charismatic black freedom fighter was a "beautiful idea" that had his organization's blessing.

fighter was a "beautiful idea" that had his organization's blessing.

The struggle of Malcolm X is gaining increasing recognition across the country. The famous "Autobiography" is climbing in sales and Hollywood is reported set to film a movie version of his life -- written by James Baldwin.

On November 22, the Regents of the University of California will sit down in San Diego to determine whether this man, who is a legend already, is worthy of having his name on one small college in Santa Cruz.

Bill Moore, spokesman of the Black Liberation Movement which originally proposed the idea of Malcolm X College, will go to San Diego, along with UCSC student Richard Townsend and a UCSC professor (as yet unnamed). There the trio will present the report on the college prepared for the Regents' consideration and explain the importance of the idea behind it.

The Black Liberation Movement tried to do this at last month's Regents' meeting and was ignored.

tried to do this at last month's Regents' meeting and was ignored. This time, Moore told BARB, "They got to understand: there isn't going to be any more bull-shit."

WHO RUNS SF STATE, **ANYHOW?**

The SF Police 'Tactical Squad' is now running SF State. In using "all force necessary" to keep the campus open, Mayor Alioto succeeded where others have failed - he closed it down. Thus, the dreary dialectics of reaction continues its predictable pace: law and order is maintained with all the peace and dignity of a graveyard.

The calling in of cops to the campus was bad enough, but the stupid 'Tactical Squad' proceeded directly at high noon to the Black Student Union building and set up their phalanx of clubs.

No flercer provocation could be arranged to enrage the students. As the fuzz marched around and around in a tight circle, the taunts of the students who surrounded them grew louder and louder.

The cops struck out repeatedly (as seen on TV). Chan 9's 'Newsroom' cameraman was struck across the shoulders as he was helping a girl who had fallen in some bushes.

The situation was becoming

The situation was becoming more frantic and dangerous as the cops marched around and around like puppets on a string. The striking professors, however,

The striking professors, however, cooled it somewhat...

They brought their picket line down from the entrance of the campus and placed themselves in between the cops and the students.

The presence of cops on campus created the biggest noon rally ever held during the strike, Pres Robert Smith told the students "this is no way to run a university."

sity."
He was referring to the striking

San Francisco State College President Robert Smith conceded defeat Wednesday after a bloody collision between students and the Tactical Squad.

But student and faculty strikers were not claiming victory.

President Smith closed down the campus indefinitely, but gave no hint that any demands of the Black Student Union would be met.

A BSU spokesmanurged spreadge the strike to all state college mpuses in California.

ing the strike to all state college campuses in California.

The campus was calm Wednesday until the Tac Squad unit arrived. Student picketers were joined for the first time that morning by about 60 faculty supporters.

Faculty strikers face loss of pay and risk losing their jobs. Under state law, faculty members who strike for five days are considered to have resigned.

When Smith shut the campus, he removed that obstacle to faculty support of the student strike.

A general faculty meeting the same morning voted to close the campus, and demanded the censure and dismissal of State College Chancellor Glenn Dumke. Chancellor Dumke ordered the suspension of Black Panther George Muray from the St. E. State Scalut. sion of Black Panther George Mur-

sion of Black Panther George Mur-ray from the S. F. State faculty, which caused the strike.

The faculty support reinforced an earlier decision by student strikers to keep their Wednesday action nonviolent.

Then the Tac Squad bulls ar-

rived.

No one seems to know who called them. The mass media report three different versions of who blew the whistle.

Before they left, the men with the long clubs had flailed and knuckled students and faculty men who didn't retreat fast enough.

who didn't retreat fast enough. They arrested at least eight stu-

one cop drew his gun on the crowd, bringing SF State a short step away from Mexico City.

President Smith noticed that calling the cops onto campus "has moved us along farther and farther toward physical confrontation and injury to people."

Both black and white students were divided among themselves in

were divided among themselves in their reaction to the outbreak of

Black Student Union would be met.
rock-throwing Wednesday, Black
Students Union leader Jack Alexis
was seen being restrained by his
brothers to prevent him from venting his intitial outrage at the
actions of white radicals.
Other BSU leaders were heard
to voice their approval of the confrontation against the Tac Squad.
The head-on collision with the
cops followed the pattern of recent
white radical action -- unlike the
swift appearance and disappearance of black militant-guerillas
who have been jolting the SF State
campus for the past weeks.

The mass of students several times forced the Tac Squad unit to retreat. Once several hundred students had the dozen cops surrounded.

The 20-minute battle ended only when striking faculty members.

BATTERED **STUDENT**

An SF State student who went to e hospital Wednesday with the hospital Wednesday with sprains, lumps and bruises says he plans to sue the television cameranan who hit him. Here's what the

man who hit him. Here's what the student told BARB: He was taking photos of the noon press conference by the Black Stu-dents Union when a dozen SF Tac-tical Squad troopers lined up on the other side of the BSU build-

tical Squad troopers lined up on the other side of the BSU building. He took the line-uppic topping this page.

A crowd of students quickly grew near the row of cops. Nobody knew why they were there, since there had been no violence. They began to shout "Pigs off campus!"

On command, the squad began to march around the end of the building. Someone in the crowd threw a rock, Others followed suit. Few of the missiles hit anything but the wall of the building.

The cops broke ranks and waded into the crowd, still more. One Tac Squad hulk hit the student photographer with his fist, preventing him from taking a picture of the violent arrest of a black student.

Running around the building, the

of the violent arrest of a black student.
Running around the building, the photographer ran into another arrest scene. He took the picture shown on this page.
An instant later a television cameraman hit the student with his TV camera. Then two Tac Squad cops hit the student with fists and clubs. He fell down and blacked out.

out.

When he regained consciousness, he was in the clutches of one of the cops. He was busted. His glasses were broken. His watch was smashed, stopped dead at 1:05.

Then other students hit the cop, and the photographer got away.

A minute later the thin blue line was being backed up against the wall by a large group of studets shouting "We will win!"

The TV cameraman was again

The TV cameraman was again swinging his equipment at nearby students.

The photographer decided to go to San Francisco General Hospital for treatment. He was there for

reatment. He was there for seven hours.

He noticed that every person brought into the hospital under police custody was either a Chicano, or a black, or a white student.

Eventually a sympathetic hospital employee came up to him and said they were taking a long time with him because they had to make sure his records would not 'ndicate police brutality.

Nevertheless, with his injuries on record, the student photographer says he plans to sue the TV cameraman.





If you're black, stay back

When Alvin Price told the of-ficer behind the booking desk a lie about his age, he became en-meshed in an inhumane penal system which has little room for

system which has little room for correcting its own mistakes. Price is a junior at Jefferson High School, He is a big, good-looking kid with a broad, cheerful smile that is becoming more guarded as he grows older. Alvin is a member of the Black Panther

is a member of the Black Panther Party.

On the morning of September 27, Alvin Price was on his way to school when he saw a friend of his under arrest inside a squad car. When Price stopped to look, one of the arresting officers told him to keep moving.

He moved on but another bystander asked what was happening and Price told him the pigs were messing with his friend.

"You come here, blue," oinked one of the officers. Price knew better than to argue. He was arrested without being told wley. In the squad car on the way to the

the squad car on the way to the 77th Street station, they told him he was charged with using profane

language.
From that early Friday morning encounter, Price would spend three weeks in jail, It was two weeks before anyone was notified what has happened to him, His mother feared that he had been killed. The police department ignored the fact that Price had con-

Alvin was placed in a six by eight foot detention cell. A half hour later Officer Helms, one of the arresting officers, entered the cell to search him. Helms empties Price's pockets but kept the handcuffs on. Then Helms

Helms came back and said he Helms came back and said he wanted to search Alvin again, Price noticed the officer had something closed in his hand, Helms reached out to put his hand in the prisoner's pocket. Since Price's pockets were already inside out, he saw no reason for the officer to put his hand in them, He didn't know if Helms wanted to plant something on him wanted to plant something on him

wanted to plant something on him or grope with him, He was sure

session charge. "Wait," he said.
"Let me see what's in your hand."
"You little old punk. You don't

tell me nothing," Helms growled as he reached for the pocket with his closed hand, Price swayed out out of his reach.

out of his reach.

Helms grabbed the youth and started choking him. He smashed his handcuffed arms against the cement wall. Just then some other officers entered the cell. More force was applied to "calm" the prisoner. Price was taken to the booking desk and asked his name, address, age and other particulars.

culars, age and other particulars.

Price was only sixteen but he told the Man he was nineteen. He gave a false name and address. He would be treated as an adult law offender.

Alvin's wrist was throbbing when they put him in the regular cell block. When he asked for medical attention, the jailer told him, "Shut up or I'll throw you in the hole." Throughout Friday afternoon Price insisted his wrist had been injured, About 11:20 p.m. he was again handcuffed, put in a squad car and driven to Morningside Hospital. ingside Hospital.

ingside Hospital.

According to Price an officer with badge number 3108 repeatedly struck him in the ribs with his club on the way to the hospital. "I'm going to teach this nigger a lesson, He thinks he's bad, but he's not bad," 3108 said.

Price did not answer while the officer continued to prod him with the butt of a flashlight. "Are you bad?" 3108 kept at him until his partner told him to lighten up.

While at the hospital, behind the doctor's back 3108 continued poking Price in the ribs with his riot baton. The doctor thought the arm was fractured and he asked the officers to take Price to Central Receiving Hospital for X-rays. The police took Price to County General and the doctor there said his arm was all right, He was then taken to Central Jail.

On Monday, October 1 Price was arraigned before Judge Mary Waters, When she asked if he had been informed of his constitutional rights, Alvin said no. Only then were the names of his family taken so that they could be notified. Price was charged with using profane language and disturbing the peace. He pleaded not guilty and was returned to jail to await his trial scheduled for October 17.

A public defender has been as-

A public defender has been assigned to Price's case but he never came to see him, Sgt, Polley of the LAPD and Sgt, Wacker of Internal Affairs were interested enough to visit Price, and it was Sgt. Polley who finally called Alvin's mother after he had been in jail for two weeks.

been in jail for two weeks.

By the time his mother found him, Price had been transferred to Juvenile Hall, He had been subjected to all sorts of physical and verbal abuse from jailers and officers who didn't like him talking about the Black Panthers with other prisoners.

Price is out of jail now, He has missed a month of school, He wasn't a bad boy when he went to jail, but he thinks he might be now, from L.A. Free Press

You can't reply to these slan-You can't reply to these slanders. The courts are the most monarchical institutions in our pig republic, and if you don't kiss His Honor's Ass you will be led off to the coldness of some uptight jail cell. The temptation is strong to keep even a Yippie mouth shut.

shut.

Judge Brunn considers himself
a Ghandian pacifist, and he used
to volunteer his services for the
ACLU. When he first received
his judgeship, the Bay Area's
leftish lawyers thought the millenium had come, and that, wrapped
in his black robes George Brunn in his black robes, George Brunn would pronounce "people's" jus-tice. His former comrades in arms now call him "Attilla the Hun."

Brunn has been the most vicious brunn has been the most victous judge sitting on the Berkeley bench. In his vindictiveness, he has topped his fellow monarch, Judge Talbott, who, according to the frame of reference of Co-op liberalism,

Maybe I can convince a couple of Berkeley jurors that it isn't a crime to fight for Eldridge Cleaver's right to teach at the University. It won't be pleasant to spend six months in Santa Rita, especially since a pig-headed bailiff in Brunn's courtroom told me they "were going to take care of they "were going to take care of you there." they

cnanging their policy on guest lecturers came the foregone conclusion -- they wouldn't allow credit to be given for the Cleaver course.

Prof John Searle reported what was discussed when the faculty's Academic Freedom Committee met with 8 regents on November 7. He reported that the regents would in principle "support" the delegation to the faculty of authority over courses and curricula but it was clear they would not do it in fact for 139X.

Searle urged the faculty to refrain from any action until the Regents full board meeting November 22 in San Diego and condemned those students who had taken action at Sproul and Moses Halls.

Student apathy was such last week that Tuesday and Wednesday there were no rallies held in Sproul

there were no railies neut more varieties. The only visible student action (apart from the hunger strikesee story this issue) in support of the Cleaver course was the circulation of petitions by the Campus Community for Non-Violent Alternative (CCNVA). The petitions affirm academ: freedom and demand that the Regents rescind their resolution of September 20.

CCNVA is circulating the petition state wide and asking TA's to pass it around in their classrooms on

campuses. Plans are to deliver the petition to the regents on No-vember 22. Meanwhile Rick Brown is now

working on long range goals. "We don't have the support right now to do anything else," he said. "Maybe we never had it. There is a lot of verbal support but that's as far as it goes."

The project Brown has in mind is a Student Union that would organize the students for next term.
"Our failure shows the need for a union," he told BARB.



Our eyes see the fine print of the BARB ads. We see the little word "pig," but we don't see, our eyes, our minds don't perceive the message of the young people saying to us, 'stop being hypocritical. Berkeley's Health Information' Center at the heart of Telegraph Avenue is handling 15 to 20 cases a day.

Funds for the new referral ser-

Finds for the new referral service are expected to last for at least two more months. After that, new sources may have to be tapped.

Brian Young, a volunteer worker who has been with the center since it opened, said he thinks more people are receiving medical care since the service opened.

People who might hesitate going straight to a private doctor or to a hospital are using the Health Information Center to break the ice, Young indicated.

Most referrals are to Highland Hospital, the county facility which is free to those who cannot pay. No treatment is available at the Telegraph Center itself, although a doctor is usually available for consultation at the office daily from 6 to 8 p.m.

Health problems so far handled by the Center range from colds and blisters to pneumonia and drugs. Young estimated that drug problems are involved in less than ten percent of the Center's cases.

The Board decided the publication should remain on the library shelves despite a massive assault by self-styled moralists and Bible thumpers.

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BRIGHT KNIGHT OF THE NUDIES

His hand is on her breast, the soft skin yields like velvet under his touch. Her neck is arched, her mouth gnawing with the agony of rapture. (Riddled with acne and fears of premature ejaculation, Rodney Smear—sixteen and dreaming—sucks his thumb and fondles his weenigh.)

...Hot and passionate, the Southern California sun is bouncing diamonds off the lush, receptive pool. His lips meet hers beneath the rippling water. Deft hands unlock the upper half of her bikini, her tits are squeezed like sponges, soft and succulent. (Fifth row back, on the aisle, Harold Smegma sits and curses the woman he's fucked and doathed for fifteen years—if only he could get a piece of THATI Just once in a while, just a little.)

...She's pinned beneath him, struggling to avoid his lips, eyes full of tears and pain. His mouth rips into hers, his hands mangling the billowy flesh of her mammoth breasts. (Alone in the rear of the theatre, old Tenderloin Jake clenches his teeth, fighting to recall his last erection.)

Then suddenly three shots ring out from the screen (Ohhh! Oooohhh!!! OOOO!HHHH!!!!!) Rodney stiffens, Harold jerks bolt upright, old Jake trembles like an aspen leaf. Their pants grow damp and oozy. Thank God they've made it through another day.

And who do they have to thank? None other than Russ Meyer, King of the Nudies, unheralded American Saint. Who but Meyer gave them "The Immoral Mr. Teas," "Motor Psycho," "Faster, Pussycat, Kill, Kill," and now—"Finders Keepers, Lovers Weepers."

Meyer is the undisputed Champion of the Breast, a Tycoon of Titillation, a Saver of Lost, Sadistic Souls. And what does he get for it? Nothing but money.

"I make films that excite me," says Meyer, "and whatever excites me seems to excite most of the red-blooded citizens of this world."

And he's probably right, This, effor all, in America the alterial sides in the red-blooded citizens of this world."

red-blooded citizens of this world."

And he's probably right. This, after all, is America, the plastic, parthogenetic land of the freak. Meyer, in fact, can cite case histories: "This guy came up to me once and said, 'You know, I saw your last film and went home and gave my wife a good cocking'—that was the way he said it—'It's the firstgood relation we've had in years.' And you know, that made me feel good."
"Finders Keepers, Lovers Weepers," like all of Meyer's films, is built on three staple items in the American diet: 1) the tits—and—ass—are—fine—but-pussy—is—a—no—no syndrome; 2) the sky's—the—limit theory of violence; and 3) undiluted bullshit.

Meyer's teste in women runs. uted bullshit.

Meyer's taste in women runs from cheap to sleazy: all that counts is the size of the bra. Tits-A-Rama, Tits-A-Go-Go, Tits IIIS-A-Kama, Tits-A-Go-Go, Tits for Tit's Sake--but never so much as a hint of beaver. Like all good Americans, Meyer is convinced that some things are best left to the imagination: who wants to SEE a cunt when he can THINK of one?

The same goes for fucking—he boasts that he's never had to resort to the "real thing" in making

his films. He wants to keep films like Vilgot Sjoman's "I Am Curious (Yellow)" out of this country for fear that greed might force him to curb his genitophobia.

"I'm constantly striving to put better content into my films," he says with a straight face. "I don't want to have to rely on the 'ultimate'. Where do you go from there?"

there?"
Despite the fact that his films are hymns to the pornographic—filled with lurid promises they never keep—Meyer maintains that he is a profoundly moral man. Whatever they may do on the screen (which is nothing, really), his starlets are chaste on location: "We're very business—like. The girls must swear not to indulge in any outside swear not to indulge in any outside activity." The men, of course, "are a little harder to control."

This indulgence toward the male is only what one might expect from a man who has raised the double-

standard to its greatest heights. Take this scene from "Finders Keepers":
Paul, the hero, is being held captive—along with his wife and his bartender—by two men bent on robbing Paul's nightclub (topless, natch). The thugs want the combination to the safe, but Paul won't smill. (Money after all ly sacred) natch). The thugs want the combination to the safe, but Paul won't spill. (Money, after all, kusacred.) Cal, the head safecracker, rams a pool cue into Paul's nuts. Nothing doing. Cal then plants a well-tossed blade into the bartender's back. Still no word from Paul. Then Cal gets a brainstorm: he turns Feeny, a punk straight out of Bunuel's "Belle de Jour," loose on Paul's wife. Feeny sprawls herout on the pool table and Paul finally breaks.

Now THERE'S a value system, especially for a guy who's spent the first half of the film balling every whore in town. "But," says Meyer, "that's the way life

is."

However touchy Meyer may be about pubic hair, he has a gourmand's love of violence. The bartender is only the first to go. During the exorcistic denouement, Claire, a Negro whore with a somewhat tarnished heart of gold, wipes out Cal before Cal can wipe out Paul — and of course, gets plugged herself. Paul then wipes out Feeny, thus restoring justice to her Christian niche.

Meyer was somewhat upset when people "noised off" about violence in the wake of the most recent Kennedy assassination. Who would come to see tits-and-ass sans violence?

"There's no point waving your arms around" he says, waving his arms around. "Everybody has to roll with the punches and face up to economic realities."

After all, he oplnes: "Nothing's sadder than a had gross."

After all, he opines: "Nothing's sadder than a bad gross."

A fast buck is indeed the American Way, and Meyer is nothing if not "a good, patriotic American."
His next film, "Vixen," involves the efforts of a Maoist-Castroite to win an American Negro's help in hijacking a plane to Cuba, No stranger to "art," Meyer has placed the Commie's seductive speeches over shots of a torrid love scene, "I put down Communism so clearly that even a third-grader can understand it." Unfortunately, no third-grader will get the chance, because Meyer doesn't think that young people should be exposed to nasty things like sex.

(Among other things "Vixen"

should be exposed to nasty things like sex.

(Among other things, "Vixen" contains a Lesbian scene so hot, says Meyer, that "I was actually physically aroused while filming it," And more than that—"One of the girls confessed to me that she'd actually had an orgasm during the scene," Beat THAT off, my friend.) friend.)

Meyer is also a liberal on the race question -- "Finders Keepers" uses a spade chick for the heavy. "But," says Meyer, "i never make a point of her being a Negro. Negroes should be treated just like human beings, and not make anything out of it."

Except, of course, money: "I don't deny that I use Negroes for commercial reasons -- but I treat the relationships SINCERELY."

"Finders Keepers" opened last Friday at the Presidio -- an event which Meyer finds most prestigious. Especially since his film is following "Belle de Jour": "It's great to follow Bunuel -- I'm a great admirer of his." Mr. Bunuel, take note.

FREE LEGAL SERVICE SET TO PROD COPS

Berkeley will now have a free legal service not only to protect poor people against police mal-practice but also to help them prod the cops to protect them.

Corbin Houchins is chief counsel for the Berkeley Neighborhood Legal Services which is funded by the office of Economic Opportunities, OEO. The telephone for service is 841-9274.

ities, OEO. The telephone for service is 841-9274.

According to Houchins, the service will handle police brutality cases, but "more immediate" and important to Houchins, it will handle cases of "police inaction".

Rights of citizens are violated often because "police choose not to protect", partly on "racial grounds". Thus Hippie types and minority groups often find themselves double victims of the prejudices boiling inside the otherwise friendly neighborhood cop (of movie fame).

Houchins says that his main impetus for running the service is "social reform." "Litigation," he says, "is an important means" (to get social reform), and Houchins believes that "society can be reformed".

He believes that a large number of cases will not only give people relief from arbitrary police methods, but that some of the cases will have just the right elements for a broad attack on unfair court practices, police methods

ods, or police hiring practices.
Houchins said, also, that with
a police malpractice service operating regularly, he will be able
"to handle and bring to attention

police issues in large scale actions such as sit-ins, street actions, and riots.

While much attention will be given police malpractice, Houchins indicated he will not just be handling relies relieved to accept the street of t indicated he will not just be hand-ling police malpractice cases. At this moment he has an important welfare suit before the Federal District Court, and he is also very interested in the problems of ghetto merchants vis a vis whole-salers and retailers, or consumer problems, especially where they effect the whole community. Houchin, who has been with BNLS since late September for merly was an Anti-Trust Lawyer in San Fran-

since late September formerly was an Anti-Trust Lawyer in San Francisco. He saw humor in Barb's question about the future of Neighborhood Legal Services and OEO, with a President Nixon peering from the stars.

He said that the Bar Association "is in favor of some kind of legal service for poor people", so that BNLS will probably continue to exist.

Although the program is passed by congress (controlled by the Democrats), he added, "OEO is administrative", and Nixon's aides will decide into what specific pro-grams its funds will go.



ARMY EYE BACKS 27'S **DEFY TALE**

An Army photographer has bolstered the case for freeing 27 Pre sidio GI's facing a muntiny charge which could bring the death pen-

alty.

Private David Haywood testified

Private David Haywood testified at Private David Haywood testified at a preliminary investigation at the Presidio Wednesday that he was assigned to take photographs of the 27 prisoners on October 14, the day they refused to work in protest of the fatal shooting of Richard Bunch, a fellow immate.

Richard Bunch, a fellow inmate. The photographer told how feedback from a loudspeaker used by the MP to read the mutiny act interfered with the reading. At times the speech was inaudible. Haywood also affirmed the prisoners were never violent and did not use abusive language on the guards, he described the protest as "a moving demonstration."

"His testimony agrees with what we claim," Hillinan said. "But higher authorities have already

higher authorities have already made the decision. Despite any testimony they are going to charge the men," Hallinan contends what



they soldiers did does not con stitute mutiny because they

stitute mutiny because they did in no way conspire to take control of the military post.

While the investigation is con-tinuing Hallinan has filed for dis-charge applications for his clients in lieu of court martial. He has asked the dischrages to be given on grounds of conscience, hard-

asked the discrizages to be given on grounds of conscience, hard-ship and psychiatric disability. All but a few of the men were originally imprisoned as AWOL's, Hallinan revealed. They generally come from poor backgrounds, and only one has finished high school,

The pre-trail investigation will continue into next week. On completion results will be sent to the Commanding General of the Sixth Army, who will then decide if the men are to face a general Court-Martial on the capital offense.

In the Buddhist view, what obstructs the effortless manifestation of this state is ignorance, which projects into fear and needless craving. Historically, Buddhist philosophers have failed to analyze out the degree to which ignorance and suffering are caused by social factors, considering fear-and-desire to be given facts of the human condition. Consequently the major concern of Buddhist philosophy is epistemology and "psychology" with no attention paid to historical or sociological problems. Although Mahayana Buddhism has a grand vision of universal salvation, the ACTUAL achievement of Buddhism has been the development of practical systems of meditation toward the end of liberating a few dedicated individuals from psychological hangups and cultural conditionings. Institutional Buddhism has been conspicuously tyrannies of whatever political system it found itself under. This can be death to Buddhism, because it is death to any meaningful function of compassion. Wisdom without compassion feels no pain.

No one today can afford to be innocent, or indulge himself in ignorance of the nature of contemporary governments, politics, and social orders. The national politics of the modern world maintain their existence by deliberately fostered craving and fear: monstrous protection rackets. The free world has become economically dependant on a fantastic system of stimulation of greed which cannot be fulfilled, sexual desires which cannot be satiated, and hatred which has no outlet except against oneself, the persons one is supposed to love, or the revolutionary aspirations of pitiful poverty-stricken mar

means.

The joyous and voluntary poverty of Buddhism becomes a positive force. The traditional harmlessness and refusal to take life in any form has nation-shaking implications. The practice of meditation, for which one needs "only the ground beneath one's feet" wipes out mountains of junk being pumped into the mind by the mass media and universities. The belief in a serene and generous fulfillment of natural loving desires destroys ideologies which blind, maim, and repress and points the way to a kind of community which would amaze "moralists" and eliminate armies of men who are fighters because they cannot be lovers.

points the way to a kind of community which would amaze "moralists" and eliminate armies of men who are fighters because they cannot be lovers.

Avatamsaka (Kegon) Buddhist philosophy sees the world as a vast inter-related network in which all objects and creatures are necessary and illuminated. From one standpoint, governments, wars, or all that we consider evil are uncompromisingly contained in this tota-istic realm. The hawk, the swoop, and the hare are one. From the "human" standpoint we cannot live in those terms unless all beings see with the same enlightened eye. The Bodhisattva lives by the sufferer's sandard, and he must be effective in aiding those who suffer.

The mercy of the West has been social revolution; the mercy of the East has been individual insight into the basic self-void. We need both. They are both contained in the traditional three aspects of the Dharma wisdom (prajna), meditation (dhyana), and morality (sila). Wisdom is intuitive knowledge of the mind of love and charity that lies beneath one's ego-driven anxieties and aggressions. Meditation is going into the mind to see this for yourself — over and over again, until it becomes the mind you live in. Morality is bringing it back out in the way you live, through personal example and responsible action, ultimately toward the true community (sangha) of "all beings." This last aspect means, for me, supporting any cultural and economic revolution that moves clearly toward a free, international, classless werld. It means using such means as civil disobedience, outspoken criticism, protest, pacifism, voluntary poverty, and even gentle violence "If it comes to a matter of restraining some impetuous redneck. It means affirming the widest possible spectrum of non-harmful individual behavior-defending the right of individuals to smoke hemp, eat peyote, be polygunous, polyandrous, or homosexual. Worlds of behavior and custom long banned by the Judaeo-Capitalist-Christian, Marxist West. It means respecting intelligence and learning, but not as gree

"Forming the new society within the shell of the old" -- the IWW slogan of fifty years ago.

The traditional cultures are in any case, doomed and rather than cling to their good aspects hoplessly it should be remembered that whatever is or was in any other culture can be reconstructured from the unconscious, through meditation. In fact, it is my own view that the coming revolution will close the circle and link us in many ways with the most creative aspects of our archaic past. If we are lucky we may eventually arrive at a totally integrated world culture with matrilineal descent, free-form marriage, natural-credit communist economy, less industry, far less population and lots more national parks.

Moving with deadly precision, night-fighters from the Berkeley, Oakland, and San Francisco police departments - with an assist from US Narco's - invaded the home of Dr. and Mrs. Derdivanis in the posh, segregated section of the Oakland hills area near Skyline High School.

"A San Francisco narcotics officer fired two shots through the front windows, kicked in the door, and held them at gunpoint until he learned he was raiding the wrong house," reports the Oakland Tribune (the Berkeley Gazette ignored the whole event, even though Berkeley's finest was part of the snafu). of the snafu).

The Tribune described this family as being "momentarily terror-ized" and added that "SF Police Inspector Robert Martin realized the error almost at once and ap-ologized to the Derdivanis and their friends."

According to Chan 5 Saturday, the Derdivanis are suing the SF Police. The Sunday SF Examiner, however, felt this was not news because they did not print this information. information.

The wrong-house raid took place last Thursday. The SF Chronicle on Friday, said that Mrs. Derdivanis "made a point of calling Inspector Martin back to obtain his badge number. She accused him of shooting through the windows' (actually, according to Chan 5, "without warning.").

In Saturday's Chronicle, Mrs.
Derdivanis had more to say on what the Ockled Tribute stricts.

"Martin shouted 'Get that dog, get that dog!' Mrs. Derdivanis said she got the feeling the inspector would have shot Sheba if she hadn't grabbed her —he (the Inspector) was so cold-eyed and horrid.

"In the middle of it all, her "In the middle of it all, her young daughter and son, age 9 and 7, trooped into the handsome modern living room and asked, 'Mommy why has Daddy got his hands up?'"

Derdivanis thouht the Mrs. Mrs. Derdivants thouht the plainclotes cops were the "criminals" the other cops outside were "looking for." Not once did the fuzz identify themselves as police

INZZ Identify themselves as police officers.

Mrs. Derdivanis said that the only fuzz on the scene "who was polite and showed any human qualities" was Oakland police officer, Chuck Thomas. The role of the Berkeley Police remains a mystery (they sure get around—SE

Berkeley Police remains a mystery (they sure get around-SF State, Oakland, etc).
"Support your local police?" she concludes her interview with the Chronicle. "I've seen another sticker -- "Control your local police'. That's more to the point, perhaps."

Reese said.

He found that ten other inductees He found that ten other inductees he talked with had independently decided to foul up the machine, each in his own way. Even among the enlistees he found many who joined up only to beat the draft, and some who had schemes to use enlistment in various ways to heat the every

use enlistment in various ways to beat the system.

Response by inductees to his leafletting was largely favorable, with only a few hostile reactios. One friendly GI told him that, during Berkeley's street war last June, trucks and about 20,000 soldiers fresh from boot camp were ready to move here from their riot training at Fort Ord.

Near the end of Reese's day at the induction center, when the group gathered to sign the security oath, Reese stood up and announced that refusal to sign would delay their induction. He refused to sign.

They sent him to the Security

They sent him to the Security Department and then to the 'Moral Waiver Room,' where they grimaced at his arrest record. Then tey told him he'd hear from them in 30 to 60 days.

'The gist of it was,' Reese said, 'that I was physically and mentally qualified, but morally and politically suspect.'

He said that, in the army, his approach would be similar. He would talk about things like the war and a serviceman's union, without overt disobedience. 'Il wouldn't consider myself morally wouldn't consider myself morally superior if I go to the stockade," he said. Reese noted that, although leaf-

Reese noted that, although leaf-letting is theoretically against the rules, old men passing out Gideon Bibles apparently had the blessing of induction center brass. "But our leaflets were much more popular," he said.

WILL PUT THE MAN ON TRIAL

The Oakland 7 are preparing their own trial of The System when The System puts them on trial in

Invariably, in political trials, the judge rules much of the defense testimony irrelevant. This time, while their trial is going on, the Oakland 7 will have a simultaneous Citizens Commission of Inquiry to hear the overruled points. points

points.

For the Commission panel, they plan to invite such persons as Dr. Benjamin Spock, Mrs. Coretta King, and Howard Zinn to hear the testimony, along with movement activists such as Tom Hayden and Carl Oglesby.

While the trial continues, the Commission of Inquiry, meeting in a hall near the courthouse, will examine American involvement in

examine American involvement in Vietnam and suppression in the U.S. They will invite testimony from Black Panthers, victims of the SF Tactical Squad, and other experts.

At issue in the trial of the oak-Land 7--Frank Bardacke, Terry Cannon, Steve Hamilton, Reese Erlich, Bob Mandel, Mike Smith, and Jeff Segal--is whether people can freely organize political demonstrations.

IS KOREA KOOL?

Dear BARB:
Korea is one of those places
no one looks into very deeply
because there are few hot controversies over here; but mili-

because there are few not controversies over here; but military anthropologists and new draftees should be interested in my observations.

The American concentration in Korea is located below that portion of the DMZ known as the "iancient invasion route" to Seoul. The frontline troops are the 2nd Division to the west and the 7th Division to the east. South of the combat divisions are the combat support units of I Corps: Artillery, Signal, and Engineers. Seoul and farther south is the Eighth Army provides advanced medical care, logistical support, and administration.

The Pueblo incident didn't cause a hell of a lot of excitement record.

a hell of a lot of excitement around here. We were far more concerned with the 31 infiltrators. The day before I got to Korea, an infiltrator and some cops were killed about 40 yards from my new home

killed about 40 yards from my new home.

Guys in my unit who had talked to some green beret types said that the Pueblo was supporting South Korean infiltrators in North Korea. I'm sure the green berets do everything they can to assist. The way I heard it, North Korea knew what was going on all the time but warned that the next ship would be stopped.

There are two distinct kinds of infiltrators. The patrols on either side of the DMZ often make raids on the other side. These are standard military patrols harassing enemy military

These are standard military patrols harassing enemy military operations. They are probably spur of the moment adventures.

Boredom is a factor on the Korean DMZ. Sometimes the EM put on a stage production to blow the minds of their leaders. Once everyone on a line agreed to open fire at a signal, to make it look like a full scale invasion was underway. With timing and pause geared for dramatic effect, a claymore mine went off in the barbed wire. Along the line, flares streaked into the sky, followed by increasing rifle, machine gun and grenade blasts. grenade blasts.

There is another kind of infil-trator that nobody fucks with. He doesn't come down very often, but when he does, the whole country

goes on alert. They are supermen, Let me illustrate with a story that was given in a mandatory class by my commander: Last January, when 31 heavily



armed infiltrators were accident-ally discovered at the gates of the President's palace, a huge dragnet was formed to catch them. Every available man in the ROK Army scoured the mountains in the day-time and set up ambush positions and hidden watchposts at night.

and hidden watchposts at night.
One of these ambush patrols occupied well-camouflaged positions in a mountain pass. There was no moon. It was impossible to see anything more than shadows. Someone approached and the officer in charge challenged him. With lightning precision, the infiltrator spotted everyone in the patrol. He shot the stragglers and was about to toss a grenade parrol. He state the straggers and was about to toss a grenade into the main body of the patrol, when his grenade blew up in his hand. He might have killed all his concealed ambushers without a shot being returned if his grenade hadn't malfunctioned,

hadn't malfunctioned.

May I remind you that the ROKs are among the best fighters in the world and as I said before, this is not enemy propaganda, but command information.

They are using a "super secret" night scope on the DMZ to spot monkey business at night. The news I have is that it's not secret. A Katusa stole one worth \$20,000 and took it to North Korea.

Katusa are under the authority

A Ratias after one with \$25,000 and took it to North Korea.

Katusas are under the authority of the U.S. Army. They live with us in American compounds. We sleep in the same barracks, eat at the same tables. A Katusa DFC makes about a dollar a month for toothpaste, soap and razors, as do ROK soldiers.

Anybody who was drafted between August and October of this year has a fair chance of going to Korea, since they will get their first assignments when about 30,000 troops are scheduled to rotate from Korea (Jan., Feb., & Mar.).

Mar.).

Before I came to Korea last January, I was enthused by the pro-posal to use newspapers like the Bond and The Ally to reach ser-vicemen, but now I think there is a better medium. If you look into the Overseas Weekly you will find an established, well-financed newspaper that is strongly anti-establishment, anti-lifer, and well represents the point of view of servicemen.

represents the point of view of servicemen.

It does not speak to servicemen, it speaks up for them against their NCO's and officers and the bullshit they have to endure. Its main offices are in Hong Kong with editorial headquarters in Saigon.

Our unit gets several complimentary copies regularly, but they never get farther than the orderly room. The First Sergeant told the battery clerk to destroy the last set that came in, swearing that if anything was "communist" backed, that paper was. Somebody swiped a paper while the First Shirt was talking.

I don't know of anyone who has ever subscribed to the paper, but somehow most guys know about it and agree that it's a damn good paper.

I'd like to suggest that all those hot studs that advertise in the BARB enlist for Korea and save the draftees. A young, pretty prostitute with a well-furnished room can be had for \$1.50 away from the GI traps, and most young Korean men have strong homosexual tendencies.

Sapir had asked the Palo Alto Chief of Police to confront him at a rally at the Medical Center on campus so that the issues couldbe discussed. Many of Sapir's colleagues from the Med Center were there with him to offer moral support.

The C.O.P. was a no-show, but The C.O.P. was a no-show, but as Mark began to leave, two plain-clothes fuzz emerged from the shadows and handcuffed him. They then led him for several miles all through the Med Center, hoping to lose their tail of 58 angry students. Drewes and District Attorney John O'Brien did their worst to keep the core of the "marijuana problem" from being brought into the open for the ears of the jurors.

Throughout the trial, Sunshine's defense attorneys, James White III and Vasilios Choulos repeatedly attempted to bring to light information regarding the effects of marijuana, but were shut out by the court.

Various expert witnesses were on hand to testify about grass and the mistakes in the present laws, but were not allowed to speak as their data was termed "irrelevant and immaterial to the case" by O'Brien and Drewes.

References were made by attorney Choulos Tuesday to the Nuremberg Trials, O'Brien tried to tape the mouth of the defense. He could hardly contain his zeal in objecting. Judge Drewes sustained O'Brien's objections, so the jury could hardly help picking up on the message.

NEW MOVE TO HELP CLEAVER

"Either we keep Cleaver alive, or let him get killed," a neatly dressed white man told BARB Monday. "We want to help the Panthers any way possible, if they'll use our help."

Bill Evans, a 35-year old San Francisco engineer, plans to offer assistance to the Panthers if he can get enough support from other like-minded whites.

In a talk with BARB, he said that he already is in contact with some ten people who share his views.

mat he already is in contact what some ten people who share his views.

"We are tired of an establishment knocking off people with leadership ability who speak for the poor," Evans said. "Somewhere we have to make a stand and a good place is with Cleaver. He has established himself as enough of a leader. All the groups the establishment keeps down should come together in this one situation," Evans said.

He plans to seek aid from the Hell's Angels to pitch in and help keep Cleaver out of jail.

Sunday noon he will hold a meeting in Alamo Park in the San Francisco Fillmore area. Those

ing in Alamo Park in the San Francisco Fillmore area. Those sharing his views are invited to come to the knoll in the middle of the park. "I don't expect a big turnout," Evans said, "but a handful of sincere activists is better than a thousand who come to sign a petition.

thousand who come to sign a petition.

"When we assess our strength, we'll go to the Panthers and see how best they can use us. It's their game and we'll take orders from them."

Evans is a graduate of the University of Utah and went there during the Silent Generation 1950's. Now he feels that the country cannot be free "until all its people

Terry Popek, outgoing President of the Polk St. Merchants Association and owner of the Town Squire ation and owner of the Town Stuire said that many of the businesses on Polk Street stay open later at night specifically because of the Avalon. He attributed much of the business done by clothing stores, record stores, and dress shops in the area directly to the Family Dog. Dog.

The music industry, realizing its stake in the hassle, came out heavily behind Helms. The Pres-ident of Gramophone Records sent a three page telegram citing the Avalon as a major cause for fantastic record sales in San Fran-

cisco.

George Matthews, head security guard at the Avalon, summed up the good vibe situation at the ballroom when he stated that he had made "only one arrest in three years and that was so long ago I don't remember what it was about."

about."

The dance permit for the Avalon was revoked November 4th. Helms will attempt to get it back Monday. If the Dog goes down under the absurd charges of the "over 50 crowd", as the Haight Free Clinic did, the Avalon (or at least the Avalon's business) will be up for grabs among the heavily financed commercial promotion financed commercial promotion companies.

companies.

The previous court date was opened by testimony from a Colonel Norton, speaking for Butterfield & Butterfield, an auctioneering firm directly below the Avalon Ball-room. B & B has applied for a permit to run night auctions and the noise from upstairs doesn't fit in with their plans.

The permit revocation stems from a "noise" complaint by a Mrs. McClain who runs the Madison Hotel, directly across the

Mrs. McClain who runs the Madi-son Hotel, directly across the street from the Avalon, She claims after hours noise from the Avalon is costing her a loss of tenants. Helms categorically denies both charges, pointing out that an Oc-tober rent raise of up to 50 per cent wasn't a small part of the problem.

One such place in San Francisco is on the verge of success—or collapse. The new sounds heard at the New Committee Theater for the past two weekends are part of a touch-and-go effort to bring a noncommercial folk-rock scene

The new enterprise, as yet with out a name, has the virtues and faults of non-professionalism. The "faults" hit directly at the pocket-book. They give away perhaps too many free tickets, the bands are good but of no reknown, and they good but of no reknown, and don't have a massive promotional campaign.

Bands, dancers and folk singers have been doing free gigs to help it get going. People working on the venture were missing meals, so someone began serving from a community pot. If it makes it, performers will be paid.

What they're trying to do is a community thing. Joe Bailey, one of those who started it, thinks

Where can new, not-famous rock the New Committee setup is right

the New Committee setup is right for that: it has a sunken dance area surrounded by tiers, bringing everybody closer to the performers and to each other.

Bailey mentioned that they're not 'North Beach people,' meaning they're not slick shucksters. That's why they have to eat less when an amplifier tube blows. So far they've given shows by Harvey Mendell; Marble Farm; Glass Theatre; Ohm; Dancing, Food & Entertainment; Boogle; White Lightning; Sons of Champlin; Free; and Meridian West.

Sessions begin at 9 p.m. and last until the bands are wrung out. It's at 836 Montgomery Street.

This weekend, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, the bands will be Ohm, Devil's Kitchen, Womb, and Day Blindness. The door is \$2.

Bailey says that anyone wanting to perform or help in any way can reach them at 986-4379 or 986-1640. "We're trying to shake up the medium," he said. The way they want to do it is through participation.



The avant-garde in Paris and later, notably Maya Deren in New York, concentrated on the surrealist form of expression. They used a mode that had proved successful in painting and literature, and grafted it onto the film medium. The work of Dali, Cocteau and Bunuel at the time of the introduction of the sound film, is in this vein.

Deren's work in the later of the later of the sound film in the later of the sound film in the later of the sound film.

this vein.

Deren's work, in the late forties and early fifties, at least as far as I am able to understand it, is influenced by this group of European avant-garde surrealist filmmakers.

Stan Brakhage in his earliest films is clearly influenced by Derens, but Brakhage went far beyond Deren, and the Europeans. While European "advanced" film has not outgrown the influence of the early avant-garde, and its surrealist modality, American filmmaking has, primarily because of Brakhage. I should note that there are some exceptions to this statement, in particular the work of the Austrian Kubelka comes to mind.

But I am not so much concerned with the reasons for the failure of film to discover itself in Europe as I am with the discovery of film in America. This is not a question

in America. This is not a question

in America. This is not a question of progress, but rather of regression. We owe most to Brakhage who went it alone and discovered or rediscovered the true nature of the filmic experience.

the filmic experience.
Others have discovered other

Others have discovered other aspects of film, like Warhol, who abandons melodrama and discovers humanity, but Brakhage's discovery is of far more fundamental importance. It is not so much that films made in the present avant-garde look like Stan Brakhage's work, because they don't for the most part.

Rather, Brakhage opened up the gates of experimentation that has led to the many discoveries film-

led to the many discoveries film-

makers have made in the last few

makers have made in the last few years.
Brakhage found a new way of manipulating film; a new way to physically handle the pieces of film themselves. He scrubbed film, he scratched, drew on it, trampled it, pressed moth's wings against it. Others before him had done work that was like this, but Brakhage synthesized the techniques into a new esthetic. He saw the relationship between the film medium and the psychology of the eye-brain. In other words, he understood preciselq how the film technology was an extension of one of man's senses, vision. His major work, THE ART OF VISION, is not pretentiously titled, as I once believed; it is aptly named. As a matter of fact, it was THE ART OF VISION that turned me on to filmmaking more than anything else.

I had seen the film several

I had seen the film several times, or portions of it, and once, when I least expected it, it zonked

mind.
Part of the explanation of Europe's stagnation might be explained by the fact that the surrealist films were very effective, and much of the work done by these artists is still very effective. That which was more clearly Dada is terribly dated, but the work most nearly in the Freudian bag remains more stimulating.

Film activity in Europe may have been stifled not only by its past,

been stifled not only by its past, but by wars and by the relative economic hardship on the Europeans aspiring to make films. Talented men like Truffaute and

Movie janitors are still on strike in San Francisco, holding the line for better holiday pay. Elsewhere, from Fresno to the northern Cali-

from Fresno to the northern Cali-fornia border, the strike is settled. Theater and Amusement Jani-tors Local 9 is still picketing about ten cinema halls in SF, They're locked out of almost all other theaters throughout the city.

Picket lines are mostly ignored by young people of high school age, according to Bob Skillman, Business Representative of Local

Similar picket crashing was the pattern during the 180-day strike

in the East Bay. Frank Figone, Secretary-Treasurer of Local 121, told BARB that people aged about 25 or less paid little attention to their lines. "Unions went through out our lines, too," he said. About 140 movie janitors have been on strike in San Francisco since April 22.

Skillman, speaking for SF Local

since April 22.

Skillman, speaking for SF Local
9, indicated that agreement had
been reached with union halls,
Winterland Arena, and the California Hall Association.

Movie houses which are "O.K.,"
according to Skillman, include the
Embassy, Gateway Cinema, Gold-

en Gate Theatre, the Orpheum, the Penthouse, the Powell, and the "girlie shows."

The six union locals that settled with management reached a five-year agreement on wage increase, medical benefits, and pensions. None achieved the expensions that the wear helicular pensions that were recorded.

pensions. None achieved the extra holiday pay, although, according to Figone, "we would have settled for time and a half." Current information on which San Francisco theaters are being struck is available from Theater and Amusement Janitors Local 9 at 775-2677.

this moment. THE ART OF VI-SION unclogged my mind. My work doesn't look like Brak-hage's, and it is often difficult to discover what it is in a filmmaker's work that has been influenced by Brakhage discovered that the

Brakhage discovered that the film medium was the message. Scratches on the film became an important way to communicate for him. You can't deny that a scratch is part of film, for scratches have always been there, and they are impossible to get rid of.

Brakhage did not deny the medium, he exploited it. He communicated with what had been considered its deficiencies, and he discovered that the swirling patterns of grain were not to be

terns of grain were not to be abhorred as they are and were by "straight" filmmakers, but rather that they are a part and parcel of the film experience, and more-over, that film grain and eye

grain were very much the same

experience.

If you take the trouble to look up into the blue sky, or at a wall, and study not only what you are seeing, but how you are seeing, you will discover that everything

seeing, but now you are seeing, you will discover that everything is made up of grains, everything! Brakhage used the splice to communicate. The visible splice became a valid punctuation. He used everything and anything, especially those things that had been shunned by others but which were part of the film medium. He recognized that we see even with our eyes closed, and many of his films are an exploration of closed-eye vision. His perception of this phenomenon is remarkably astute, but it is to be expected that a great artist would also be a great psychologist.

As far as his subject matter is concerned, Brakhage is first and foremost a humanist to use that misused term. His values were communicated on the screen in film after film. We watched

birth and love-making and many things that it is possible to avoid witnessing in a life-time in the twentieth century. His courage is extraordinary, and he has repeatedly battled the mor-onic forces of entrenched censor-

His celebration of the simple and good values of life, family and children, give his films a homespun flavor that is terribly rare, unfortunately rare, and beautiful because of their very neglect. More important important

fortunately rare, and made more beautiful because of their very neg-lect. More important, they were, and are beautiful because Brakhage has the ability to recognize what is has the ability to recognize what is beautiful, from clouds swirling across the top of a mountain near his home, to his wife giving birth to one of their children.

This affirmation of basically beautiful values makes Brakhage a powerful influence on what has happened in America. I'd better see p. 13

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MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE RANCH, THE PIGS WERE...

As these words are written earlier this week a college campus is living through police state terrorism which harkens back to Germany of 1934.

Police in uniform and plain clothes occupy the campus with blank arrest warrants. Forty students have been arrested at this writing.

Felony charges of kidnapping, burglary and assault have been brought against the black arrestees. Brown and white victims are subject only to misdemeanor charges.

charges.
South Africa? Alabama? Guess again. The heel is grinding on the students of San Fernando Valley State College, in the heart of applepie plastic America.
BARB was told the grim details by two members of the Steering Committee of the November 4th Committee, an ad hoc group formed to support the student victims of the reaction to a demonstration held on that date. held on that date.

The demonstration, centering a-round the occupation of the campus administration building, was ini-tiated by 34 black students trying to get an administrator to agree to talk with them about their griev-ances. They decided to stand their ground when told College President Blomgren was out.

their ground when told College President Blomgren was out. The central grievance was that the head coach had refused to talk with them about an incident in which an assistant coach had allegedly struck a black student during a football game. A significant accompanying issue, however, was the attempt by the administration to discontinue the fledgling program which enabled black students to attend Valley State under an Economic Opportunities Program.

At noon on Nov. 4th, the black students, who were all members of the Black Students Union, began their occupation of the 5th floor of the Administration Building. The news was conveyed to an SDS rally being held outside the building in protest of the elections.

After a discussion, members of that rally went in and occupied the second floor in a gesture of support. Chicano students took

the second floor in a gesture of support. Chicano students took the 4th floor.

Hysterical news reports began saying that the black students were holding the employees of the fifth floor at knife point. These reports were false, say BARB's informants, and are now being qualified with the word "alleged" in the honky press. There were no weapons in the building, they say. There were plenty outside, though. The specter of black students standing up to racism was

dents standing up to racism was enough to result in an eleven division tactical police alert with hundreds of cops sent to the campus along with three fire engines.

After an arrest threat failed, President Blomgren agreed to a fourteen-point pact which boiled

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daily talks with the principals in the struggle. He announced that there would be a complete am-nesty. All students then left the

Administration Building. Blomgren reneged the next morning and announced that ar-rests and suspensions would be made "as soon as possible." Police were conspicuous on campus that day. Seventy arrests war-rants, thirty-eight of the "John Doe" variety, were issued for charges ranging from kidnapping

charges ranging from kidnapping to trespass.

The campus' leading white radical activist was arrested at midnight Wednesday. He had been photographed at the rally outside the building. Homes of activists were placed under conspicuous surveillance.

The Nov. 4th Committee was formed in this atmosphere to support the arrestees. Student support was estimated at at least one-third by BARB's informants. The black students were unmolested by the cops as long as they stuck together (a girl was arrested as soon as she left the group). They gave themselves up at 1l a.m. on Thursday.

The liberal faculty is performing exactly as might be expected, deploring the conduct of the students who dared to assert their manhood. No mention was made of the racism and treachery of the administration. There are a few faculty supporters, but very few.

The students need ball and de-

The students need bail and defense money badly — all were free on bail as of last weekend but there are still warrants out. Contributions may be mailed to Rev. Tom Laswell, 18204 Nordhoff

Militant action did close the campus, but many students feel that it will reopen Monday with no progress toward winning the Black Students Union demands.

President Smith said he would meet with faculty and admin-istrators to figure out what to do. Then he would talk with students, he said. Such meetings have not, in the past, advanced the cause of either black power or student

power.
Smith said the campus would remain closed "until our meetings can function on a more rational basis."

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
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
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IN MEMORIAM Myra L. Burlingar 1885-1968

It made me feel real bad to see the notice of her death the other day in the paper. I knew, of course, that she was in her eighties, had suffered several strokes, was nearly blind, and could not be expected to last long, but it is saddening to know that someone who has been good to you is gone, especially if you weren't able to be as good in return. Not till later did I learn what a strain that was on her and her non-income.

She didn't put me out until doctor's orders forced her out of the landlady business. I left owing her so much money that I was afraid to ask the amount. Over the years I paid most of it back, in dribs and drabs, and she kept a careful account.

And I had the best of intentions of having another payment for her during this month of November. Then I saw the paper, and now I can never pay her.

Myra Burlingame, nee Ripley, was from Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. She married a farmer, part-time logger, and all-round handyman named Arthur Love, and they came to the Bay Area in 1919. Her husband died, and she made it from then on the tough way: twelve hours a day in the cannery, then come home and do the necessary to run a boardinghouse. How she made it through to eighty-three is a good question. But then, those Pennsylvania Germans are tough people.

And she raised six kids on top of that, and they all turned out good.

I have to admit that there was

a generation gap between us. She had mannerisms that could be irritating. I did get bugged by her constant reminiscences about "back east on the farm." And I never did like her casual use of the word "nigger"; I had to keep reminding myself that she was a product of a time and place when it was regarded as a mere colloquialism.

And I'd like to make mention of her last husband, Oscar Burlingame (1874-1960), who also was mighty good to me, and who died horribly of cancer.

Now I'll never again be able to go around to 1705 Derby St. and ring the doorbell, and get a friendly reception. That's life. But primarily, that's death.



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

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CHINA **HANDS**

The thing about films from Red China is this: turn off the lecturers, and they all pretty much show the same thing—people (750, 000,000 of them!) smiling, happy, working, playing, not starving and—above all—a CLEAN China.

Anybody who has ever been to China (as this reviewer has, Shanghai and Hongkong) before the revolution can appreciate what a clean and happy China is.

But listen to the lecturers (Bjerre of Felix Greene) and it comes out different, Greene adds too much joy to his films whereas Bjerre keeps referring to the Chinese as "automatons."

There is ONE thing, however, neither brings out of China (per-

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
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
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

in wheeler Hall with all the impact of a wet noodle. What gave it some life was the audience. "This is bullshit -- you come on like Billy Graham," was the opening remark from the floor after listening to the noble and spendiforous rhetoric of David Harris

His wife, Joan Baez, and Ira Sandperl, on the other hand, had the good sense to make a simple statement of their position and then sit down.

Mrs. Harris was her warm, striking self throughout the even-ing, even to the point of expressing wifely concern over the repeated questioning (and attacks) on her

Harris' most telling tactic was to challenge his challengers with

"Where's YOUR draft card?"
(Harris is going to jail rather than serve the military).

His weakest point, Sgt Pepper felt, was his statement of what he was going to do while in jail.
"I'm going to see to it that that jail doesn't function," was his reply.

jail doesn't function," was his reply.

In the discussion that followed THAT answer, nobody repeat nobody asked what was an immediate and palpable contradiction, so Sgt Pepper finally shouted out:

"Mr. Harris --you have yet to explain why we can't do in the Army what you intend to do in jail!"

In the dialogue that followed

In the dialogue that followed (little did he dream he was being interviewed— the BARB works in mysterious ways), something like the following emerged...
Harris: "If you do that, you'll

end up in military jail, and they're worse!"

Sgt Pepper: "Be subtle.."(voice from audience, "Fool them").

Harris: "You show up with your beard and" (rest lost in confusion).

Sgt Pepper: "Use your imagination-- fuck up the Army, man!"

This jail-kick of Harris' brought a sporadic discussion reflecting the following attitude, as expressed by a student: "Going to jail means you are still supporting the thing you are against. It is their institution and you are doing their terms."

Earlier, another student got up and said Harris' position "ignores economics." He also pointed out that "GI's in Vietnam stick their guns out of their foxholes and simply pull the trigger without looking. It's TECHNOLOGY that's fighting the wars, not men."

Then he walked up to the platform and read a peem "written just this morning."

Another student got up and immediately held up his draft card, to the cheers of the audience. "I went down and signed up then never showed up again," he explained.

He urged others to do the same.

He urged others to do the same, "Be hired by Dow Chemical then don't show up. Do this elsewhere. It will tie up men just in paper work."

What 'The Resistance' found out Saturday night were new ways to rsist the draft. One glaring example, however, of how they have falled was the almost total absence of blacks (there may have been two in the audience).


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
