


Figure 7-4. Rooftops are secured before committing forces.

FM 19-15 -- the Army plan published in March, 1968 for deal-ing with uprisings in Black com-munities -- can be bought for a check or money order for \$1 made payable to the Superintendent of Documents addressed to the U.S. Government Printing Office, Wash-ington, D.C. 20402. The manual, an updating of the

ington, D.C. 20402. The manual, an updating of the 1959 booklet of the same title, contains information on Army plans and tactics "assisting civil autho-rities in the restoration of law and order" in the event of "civil disturbecese" 1959

disturbances". It includes sections on "con-taining and isolating the area, op-erations in built up areas; arson and protection of firefighters; artson and protection of firefighters; anti-looting measures; anti-sniping measures; riot control for mations; riot control agents; relief proced-ures; and termination".

For example:

"A violent mob can be effec-tively developed by a trained agi-tator," notes the Manual.

tator," notes the Manual. "... Some of the common techniques are--The Use of Ex-tensive Propaganda... A Force-ful Harangue by a Flery speaker ... The Appearance of an Irri-tating Individual or Object ... An irritating object frequently used is a newspaper photograph de-picting alleged police brutality ... The Successful Accomplishment of an Act of Violence ... The Use of an Emotion-Provoking Rumor." The Manual is full of goodies

the average BARB reader may never have thought of. All of the following is verbatim: "Objects may be thrown from various vantage points, such as windows and roofs of nearby build-


windows and roofs of nearby build-ings and overpasses. These objects may include rotten vegetables and fruits, rocks, bricks, bottles, im-provised bombs, or any other ob-jects available at the scene. When troops are located on a slope or at the bottom of a slope dangerous objects can be directed at them such as vehicles, trolley cars, carts, barrels, liquids, etc. On level ground, wheeled vehicles can be driven toward troops, and the drivers can jump out before the vehicles reach the target. This tactic may also be used for breach-

the ventices reach the target. The target is the tactic may also be used for breach-ing roadblocks and barricades. Rioters may set fire to buildings and motor vehicles to block the advance of troops, to create confusion or diversion, or to achieve goals of property destruction, loot-ing and sniping. They may flood an area with gasoline or oil and ignite

area with gasoline or oil and ignite it as the troops advance into the area or pour gasoline or oil down a slope toward the troops or drop it from buildings and ignite it. Dynamite, or other explosives may be placed in a building, timed to explode as troops or vehicles are opposite the building, or they may be exploded ahead of the troops or vehicles so that the rubble blocks the street, Demolition charges can the street. Demolition charges can be buried in streets and exploded as troops or vehicles pass over them. Vehicles rolled or driven as troops or vehicles pass over them. Vehicles rolled or driven against the troops may contain explosives. Dogs or other animals

with explosives attached to their bodies may be driven toward the troops. The charges may be ex-ploded by remote control, fuses, or a time device.

Demolition charges may be em-ployed to breach a dike, levee, or dam to flood an area, or the charges may be employed to block an under-pass by demolishing the overhead bridge.

Weapons fired against troops may take the form of selective snip-ing or massed fire, and may come from within the ranks of the rioters or from buildings or other adjacent

cover. The weapons used will vary from homemade one-shot weapons to sophisticated automatic rifles. The imagination and resources of the rioters should not be underesti-mated.

mated. One commonly used tactic is to employ weapons fire against troops to inspire more daring and violent action by rioters. Weapons fire may be intended to cause troops may be intended to cause troops to employ more severe measures for purposes of developing antogo-nism toward the civil disturbance control force. Troops engaged in civil disturbance operations must this is a stoke organated weaanticipate rioter-orginated wea-pons fire as a diversionary tactic. In an effort to breach barriers, individuals may throw grapples into wire barricades and drag them away 'or attach grapples, chains, wire, or rope togates or fences and pull them down. They may use long poles or spears to keep troops back while removing fences or barricades or to prevent troops anticipate rioter-orginated weaback while removing fences or barricades or to prevent troops from using bayonets. They may crash vehicles intogates, or fences to breach them. Thus ends the list of danger "our boys" must face in the

"our bøys" must face in the streets. In addition the manual

streets, in addition the managements warns: Women, children, and elderly people may be placed in the front ranks of a mob. This is done to play on the sympathy of the troops and to discourage any counter-measures. Where countermeas-ures are undertaken by the troops, agitators may have photographs taken to create further public ani-mosity and embarrassment to civil disturbance control forces. Although the Manual has detailed

references and photographs on "rioters", every single person portrayed in every photograph in the Manual is clearly white.

The Army apparently anticipates large scale riots in the near fu-ture among the white middle-class population of urban areas, --de



HAYAKAWA NAGGED

by G.K. SF STATE MONDAY -

SF STATE MONDAY --"My campus for a horse!" or such like, as Hayakawa called in fuzz on horseback to take care of yet another "illegal" rally at SF State. But it's going to take more than horses, more than the black brass to keep the action "respectable." Like king Hussein of Lorden

"respectable." Like King Hussein, of Jordan, who can't control his own El Fawho can't control his own El Fa-tah guerrillas, the State Board of Trustees, the AFL/CIO Labor Council, the black ministers and leaders, the Association of State College Professors found they couldn't keep the militants from breaking 22 more windows.

The really started at noon with nearly 2,000 students and suppor-ters of the strike circled the commons shouting "On Strike-Shut It Down!". The really apparent, how-ever, that this action means no-thing, for circling back to the smember of the BSU declare: "They're still holding classes at Business Education. Do we close it down?" A yell went up as students surged

up to the building and proceeded to break the windows as those students inside retreated from the sil-ent viewing of the strike. As the cops came in on the dou-ble, the students faded back into the

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center of the commons. It was then decided to march off campus, let-ting the Ad Building, and others still holding classes, know their feelings by breaking some of those windows, too.

The strikers marched off cam-

The strikers marched off cam-pus at the 19th st entrance. It was at this point that twenty SF Cossacks arrived, Clippety-cloppiting up Holloway, followedby hundreds of fuzz on foot, they sur-rounded the Ecumenical House. There, they arrested David R. Brooks, who had run into the House, Police claimed he "as-saulted" an officer. Hayakawa, however, has res-

official declaration of war," declared Leroy Goodwin, BSU off-campus coordinator.

Under this state of war, all ad hoc rules and regulations set up by the acting president Hayakawa to hamper freedom of speech or freedom of assembly will be disregarded, and the battleground, tactics and time sequence, will be determined by the central committee of our revolutionary people," Goodwin said.

Okay — there it is. Ignore it at your peril. Some already have.

On Wednesday, the administra-tion of SF City College started a two day "convocation" instead of closing down the school (as asked by the BSU) in support of SF

The blacks walked out, and the president of the college "vowed" to keep his school open "even if we have to use the police." This will be repeated from cam-pus to campus, city to city, no matter how much "mediation" is done by the Pillars of the Com-munity. munity.

But the issue will not be contained on campus, Already it is reaching the minds and bodies of underprivileged and-dig-even overprivileged industrial the workers

Dig this. This week the United Auto Workers. Dig this. This week the United Auto Workers Union sent an ob-server, Jim Cohen on the campus. And the next you know he was so shook up by what he saw he de-clared to students at a rally, "If you lose the right to strike here, they might try to take the right away from us too." That's a broadening throught. The police at SF State Wednes-day had their hands full. Not only were they kept on the run, break-ing up student meetings of the stri-kers and arresting a dozen stu-

ing up student meetings of the stri-kers and arresting a dozen stu-dents, they also had to keep an eye on an ON- CAMPUS picket line (around the Ad Bldg) of the AFT professors' local. Police used Mace on handcuffed students, or, students being held by another cop. The SF Chronicle published a photo captioned "a sergeant in the SF Police Depart-ment shot Mace in a striker's face."

NINETY PER CENT

Once again, TV viewers saw cops

beating students while they were on the ground. The vicious energy put forth by the cops indicates they must enjoy beating, prodding, and flailing away at prostrate students.

flailing away at prostrate students. In another case, Wednesday, the students supporting Hayakawa and wearing blue armbands attacked strikers with blackjacks. It was a short, furious fight, and "police officers assigned to nearby posi-tions did not interfere", reports the SF Chronicle.

Stung by militant student leader Stung by militant student leader Tony Miranda (who told the pro-fessors 'we're out there getting busted every day and beaten by the pigs while you're sitting around waiting for strike-action''), they have announced THEIR minor revolution:

olution: If the Trustees don't mediate by this Friday, then come Monday the AFT''will strike SF State. The SF Tactless Squad tried to stop the professor's line, but Prof Bill Stanton (also an attorney) told the fuzz, ''you can arrest every one of us, but we'll sue each and every one of you for false arrest.'' The fuzz moved off-campus. Later, when the fuzz came back on to chase down single students who had Hayakawa's ''greetings'' for them, Stanton and his col-leagues placed themselves between the cops and the students. ''Go tell Alioto to get his men off this campus!'', he shouted. Meanwhile, the plague is spread-ing. The professors at Cal State Hayward announced they will ask the Alameda County Central Labor Council for strike sanction in sym-pathy with their fellow-profe If the Trustees don't mediate

their fellow-profs pathy with across the bay. Fresno, Chico, and San Jose

also are supporting SFS.

REFUGEE-SPARKED CANADIAN CLUB MAY FIZZLE

American exiles in Canada are slowly and painfully drawing together.

So reports Jane Boyer, writing from Vancouver. She tells of the formation of a new organization of American draft exiles. The group publishes a newsletter entitled "Yankee Refugee" which has gone through two issues. Fifty showed up at the first meeting, reports Boyer. The dis-cussion centered around the pol-itical and the social aspects of life in exile.

life in exile.

life in exile. Since many of the refugees were politically apathetic in the States, there exists both a potential for creating new radicals and a tend-ency towards inactivity and timid-ity. During the Vancouver march in support of the International Days of Protest the group marched be-hind a banner identifying them-aelves as American exiles. There was some opposit ion to this identification from members of the group who preferred to

Inere was some opposit ion to this identification from members of the group who preferred to march as individuals. This typi-fies the problem of getting the exiles together. The other barrier is the social. Most exiles suffer from feelings of isolation. The group serves an important function as a social forum. But some who thought it would be exclusively social in na-ture have become disappointed and have dropped out. Most of the articles which form the basis of the "Yankee Refugee" are autobiographical in nature and concern the whole scene: social and economic as well as political. They serve as orientation for the survival and adaptation of new-comers.



CONGRESS IN MOOD **TO REOPEN** JFK PROBE

A sub - committee spokesman said a new administration might enable further investigation into the case without fear of contra-dicting the Warren Report. "This is not to say that the present administration has ham-pered any investigation. But an administration totally unconnected with the assassing no might not be so emotionally involved in re-opening old wounds," the sub-

be so emotionally involved in re-opening old wounds," the sub-committe spokesman added. The Supreme Court announce-ment of December 9 lends cre-dence to this view. The sub - committee investi-gation will probably focus on such questions as: Was there a con-spiracy to kill Kennedy? How many shots were fired and from which direction? Was Oswald the only assassin?

If Reverend Broshears were overly anxious about an imminent death hanging over his head it was not evident in the free and breezy exchange he had with this BARB reporter. Chuckling at intervals in the interview the Reverend said he did not believe he would be around much longer to enjoy either the spiritual or temporal world. But his face became quite agi-tated when he discussed the role of the police in spying on his activities in Long Beach. He held up a leaflet advertising a "Town Hall Meeting" in September that had as its subject, "The Reverend Broshears were If

Garrison Investigation." This meeting, he said, was infiltrated by police agents as were other meetings he held.

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Broshears said he relied on a group of young men known as the "Monitor Training School "to "give us protection from the police and from the radical right" at

this Garrison meeting. Broshears said that at one time two police officers came into his office and made a threat on his

Broshears said that at one this office officers came into his office and made a threat on his life. "They came in - they called me a dirty Commie - they called me a dirty Commie - they called me a dirty Queer and things of this nature. They said I was helping mess up the country and they wanted me out of Long Beach." One of the officers then told Broshears: "We're going to take you down for questioning." Said Broshears: "I says 'fine' -On what charge?" For being a homosexual was the reply by the cops. " I then quoted to them the California State Penal Code which states that the only crime con-cerning homosexuality is commit-ting the act - there's no law against being a homosexual and so this officer swang at meand called over my lamp and several ar-ticles on the desk? ... He then says: 'Why don't you run, mother-fucker, and he was just reaching around his coat pocket and then he palled out his gun." " Come on - run, mother fucker,' the cop egged him on. Broshears said that the man who made both threats on his life and Garrison's is connected with the Central Intelligence Agency. He claimed that this a'leged CIA agent warned that "none of the witnesses (in the Garrison investigation) will live to come to trial."

Garrison, Broshears maintain-ed, would be assassinated by two "Spanish gentlemen" who had been sent to New Orleans to perform the deed.

Another sensational charge that Another Sensational charge that Broshears let out of the bag in the interview was his claim that the famous Oswald photograph showing him holding the alleged the function of the second state of the second was really in the picture. Bro-shears revealed the name to this reporter. (Oswald is reported to have said

when he was shown the photo that the picture was a fake because someone had put his (Oswald's) head over someone else's body). All the information pertaining to this is in Garrison's possession.

An attorney for the Oakland Police Chief tried to lay that on a Federal Court in San Francisco last Tuesday, as the Oakland Seven hauled Gain, and Oakland DA Frank Coakley before the federal bar. The Seven, joined by four U.C. Berkeley professors and three clergymen, charged that Gain and Coakley have systematically tried to stifle First Amendment rights in Alameda County. They asked in Alameda County. They asked the court to restrain the duo from further constitutional tresspass, and to declare the California con-spiracy law, under which the Seven have been indicted, unconstitution-

al. Those who were clubbed, gassed, beaten and arrested during Stop The Draft Week probably have a different view of Chief Gain, but according to his attorney, who sounded like his mother, Gain is a flaming liberal. He even gives out parade permits for demonstra-tions. ... sometimes. (Tell that al.

out parade permits for demonstra-tions . . . sometimes. (Tell that to Huey, Eldridge or Bobby). The Seven had intended to drag both Coakley's and Gain's asses into court, but it being a civil action, neither of these worthies was required to appear. Coakley sent his assistant, Lowell Jensen, the prosecutor-persecutor of Huey Newton to represent him. Jensen didn't have much to say about Coakley's character (there evidently being little of a positive nature there) and stuck to the legalisms, "state court jurisdic-tion . . . evidentary hearing ... 

John Dillinger was the first White Panther. He scared shit out of the bankers, pigs and the FBI. His gang roamed the Mid West ripping off police stations and banks! He was the man J. Edgar Hoover hated most. Dillinger could have been a stations and banks! He was the man J. Edgar Hoover hated most. Dillinger could have been a fucked over Indiana farmer strug-gling to keep his land out of the bankers hands. It was during the Depression. Dillinger decided the life of the bank robber was a hell of a lot better. Most of his fellow townsmen agreed even if they didn't have the guts to take up the gun and join him. He could walk the streets of Moorsville, Indiana at the height of his career, and nobody would think of turning Johnny in. We can learn a lot from the Dillinger gang's tactics. They supplied themselves with bullet proof vests and machine guns by breaking into Police Stations and putting the pigs up against the Wall.

putting the pigs up against the Wall, There wasn't a pigpen that could hold either Dillinger or his gang brothers. They took turns spring-ing each other. Many farmers would have been willing to wear "Free Johnny" buttons. Dillinger's greatest moment was when he broke out of the Crown Point, Indiana Jali with a wooden gun. The National Guard sur-rounded the jail and planes flew overhead. The sheriff boasted that this was the end of the outlaw's career, but photographs taken of Dillinger in jail show that he knew the whole scene was a paper tiger.

Dillinger in jail show that he knew the whole scene was a paper tiger. His cellmate was Herbert Youngblood, a black man who liked to whittle. John borrowed his knife and carved out a wooden gun which he covered with shoe polish. Everybody fell for the riff, and Youngblood and Dillinger left town in the Sheriffs car. The Dillinger gang was a model of participatory democracy. John was the leader by virtue of his style and courage. There were

no bureaucratic structures and the relationships were voluntary. If anyone had to be kicked out of the gang it was a collective decision. Nobody was ever cheated out of his bread or offed for getting out of line. Contrary to ruling class bullshit, there was a high and beautiful honor among the Dillinger thieves. We should never confuse the crime syndicates built out of pro-hibition with the outlaws who fought the bankers during the Depression. no bureaucratic structures and the

The bankers during the Depression. The syndicate was big business rob-the-poor capitalism. It bought its way into the establishment and sent its daughters to high class finishing schools. It bought off politicians the way Standard Oil did and invested in banks rather than robbing them. The outlaws were anarchistic rebels fighting in self defense against everything big and ugly in the oppression that America's rulers called law and order. Men like Pretty Boy Floyd, Clyde Bar-row and John Dillinger had con-tempt for the bureaucratic gunman the bankers during the Depression.

of Chicago. They turned down offers to go to work for the mob. It is an interesting fact of class justice that the syndicate has never been scratched and dominates many industries in America. All of the anarchists were hunted down and murdered in cold blood. The FBI put out a shoot on sight order for John Dillinger while Mafia executioners sipped cocktails with judges and business-men in Miami Beach. men in Miami Beach.

John Dillinger was trapped on at least three occasions by the FBI. In each case he shot his way out. For a period of months the Feds were looking like fools. A special were tooking like tools. A special Dillinger squad was created and dozens of agents worked full time to trap him. John was declared public enemy Number One with a ten thousand dollar reward on his boad head.

The outlaw had a lot of the public The outlaw had a lot of the public sympathy that Eldridge on the run now has. Many average Americans wrote letters to the editor de-manding a pardon for Dillinger. He was portrayed on Broadway and in the movies in the "Petrified Forest,"as Duke Mantee. Humph-rey Bogart built his career by imitating Dillinger who possessed in real life the existential courage and cleverness that Bogev went and cleverness that Bogey went through the motions of on the

through the motions of on the screen. Dillinger's end was inevitable. The odds against him were too great. He was denounced by FDR and all the Wealthy Press. The American Legion, National Guard, posses and police sallied from their stys looking for him. There is so much you can get away with as a loner and then the shit comes down. down.

down. The outlaw was betrayed by a screwed - up chick. A Rumanian who faced deportation and went to the pigs and squealed. The FBI agreed to a deal to let her stay agree to a deal to let her stay in the country if she revealed John's whereabouts. The setup took place outside the Biograph Movie Theater in Chicago. The executioners were waiting outside. The Lady with Dillinger dressed in an easily spo easily spottable red. They cut him down cold, shot in the back without warning.

red. They cut him down cold, shot in the back without warning. To show their gratitude the "Lady in Red was deported. In his whole career John Dil-linger was charged with killing one man, a pig, shot down in a gunbattle. He never was known to act in the cowardly fashion of his murderers. J. Edgar Hoover has a death mask of Dillinger outside his office in Washington D.C. It's a kind of trophy to the virility of the FBI. It should be made out of chicken shit. We must all become at least a little like Dillinger. The pigs have been getting away with out-rageous sadism. I can imagine them at their parties laughing

Since 1841, the end of the Opium war, when Britain established do-minion over Hong Kong, Europeans have had free reign in draining the Far East of its resources and exploiting oriental labor. The U.S. continues this imperialistic policy by warring on the Vietnamese under the guise of halting the spread of Communist aggression. Although not a communist, Dr. Wu agrees with Mao's analysis. "Mao calls this country a paper tiger. Vietnam is not 1/20th the size of China and you have half a million troops over there. You have gotten nowhere. To fight China you will need twenty million troops. And that's impossible for you".

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


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

"The students in the inner circle became tense," she said, "And started to leave the middle, Sud-denly the cops charged to the out-side and chased some people toward the cafeteria.

It was amazing nobody did anything to stop it," she said. The beaten student was lead away to the CAE (blue ribbon) office, she reported. The freshman girl also told of

she reported. The freshman girl also told of seeing an older heavy set man hitting a student with a lead pipe. "I was too scaredto doanything," she explained. "Other students surrounded him, but again no-body was willing to interfere.

"Finally the police came, but they didn't arrest the man, they let him leave," she complained. She observes that the police on campus have lately been very tense. When a cop accidently bumped into one of his own, the other trooper wheeled around with his arm poised ready to strike.

whetered around with his arm poised ready to strike, "The situation won't change as long as Haykawa is in command," she concluded sadly, "But I don't want to transfer to another school, That would be a cop-out.'



The majority of protestors were tried en masse before the Student-Faculty Committee on Student Con-duct and the punishment recommended for them was two quarters

duct and the punishment recom-mended for them was two quarters disciplinary probation. Several of the group, like Waldman, were summoned to individual hearings because of past records. It now appears that Waldman is the only one to face the shift full blast. He was already on pro-bation this quarter for his partici-pation in last December's Sproul Hall mill-ins. In a BARB interview Waldman recalled that the mill-ins were pro-testing the suspension of two of the leaders of Stop the Draft Week, Now Waldman is being forced off campus as an Enemy of the State, magna cum laude (suspension ranks as cum laude and expulsion as

PRESIDIO VICTIMS **FATE STILL** UNDECIDED

The fate of the 27 Presidio stockade GI's being investigated for mutiny is still up in the air. Several weeks have elapsed since the Army finished its pre-liminary hearings on whether the men should be court-martialed. Everyone is waiting for the de-cision. For the men it is a ques-tion of life or death, since death might well be the punishment dealt out.

might well be the punishment dealt out. Meanwhile, on December 6, Ter-ence Hallinan, attorney for 17 of the men, sent a writ of Habeas Corpus to the Military Court of Appeals in Washington DC asking that the Army be prevented from quartering prisoners in the Pre-sidio stockade because of the ill-egal conditions inside the brig. Hallinan is sure the military will turn down the writ. He says he is merely following the advice of Judge Albert Wollenberg, who sug-gested that every possible avenue be exhausted before submitting the case to a civilian court. Hallinan submitted the same writ to Wollenberg on November 26.

case to a civilian court. Hallinan submitted the same writ to Wollenberg on November 26. The judge ruled it premature and asked Hallinan to try the military appeal court first. "If we get turned down, we'll have tried everything," Hallinan told BARB, "Letter to Washing-ton, appeals to Congressmen, del-egations to see the commanding general, petitions by the prisoners -- everything has failed," he said. Tuesday a group of ten prom-inent Bay Area citizens went to see Colonel Garnett, the base's Judge Advocate and asked that charges against the 27 soldiers be dropped. A spokesman for the War Resis-ters League said Garnett was non-commital in his reply. The incident in question oc-curred on October 14, when the 27 prisoners refused to work to protest the killing of a fellow in-mate by a guard three days earlier.

His secretary, who will accept bids for blade sharpening in one hand, has been instructed to accept conservation letters in the other, they say.

One campus person interviewed at the scene of next month's crime, expressed his fears that Berkeley would begin to look as asphalt-

would begin to look as asphalt-ugly as U.C.L.A. "Wasn't it Joyce Kilmer who said: I think that I shall never see a campus lovely as U.C.?" he asked. "First they take away the good grassy areas, then they start hauling away whole trees," he lamented. "A tree,;; he told BARB, may in summer wear a nest of robins in her hair." HITCH-HIKING IN LAOS

It's weird

Future historians, in analyzing the causes of the Laotian War (or World War III, as the case may be), will be stumped by a curious footnote which will cause them to take off (or put on) their spectacles, shake their heads slowly, and say, "It's weird." They will be amazed, of course, at the presence of "hippies" in Laos and the part they play politically in the games intrigue that are so characteristic of Laotian government.

First, it is necessary to note that Laos, aside from being "The Land of a Million Elephants and the White Parasol," aside from bordering on almost every major Southeast Asian country including China and the Vietnams, aside from being governed by a shaky and sometimes non-existent coalition government, is also one of the few places in the world where mari-juana and hashish are absolutely, totally, and completely legal. Consequently, the beleaguered Westerner finds life in Laos idyllic, as the setting of an en-chanted fairy tale. Complications are not created by the Laotians (who attach no importance to the fact that marijuana - called "ganja" locally -- is sold in the Vientiane marketplace at the tobacco stalls) but by Americans (who else?) who are conscientiously dedicated to the development and enlightenment of the Laotian people.

There is growing in Vientiane a curious arms race: on the one hand, the American presence makes itself felt with increased aid to the Royalist government (\$67 million a year), American "advisers," U.S.A.I.D. rice, Air America and Continental Airways (two airlines run by the C.I.A. in support of the Lao Royalist Troops), a U.S. road construction project that will, when completed, make it easier to deploy troops from Vientiane (the major city) to Luang and, on the other hand, hitchhikers from all over the world have convened in cafes on Rue Dong Palane to smoke opium (in illegal but well-protected dens). open discotheques, botiques, give light shows, and just generally blow their minds in a paranoia-free atmosphere. One enterprising young Frenchman named Max makes and sells some of the finest joints in SE Asia and, in the spirit of supply and demand capitalism, he does quite well.

U.S. officials in Laos are nervous, concerned, baffled, and frustrated by all this. The "hippies" (or "hitchhikers" as they call themselves) are a factor that never entered into the planned U.S. intervention (and take-over) of foreign countries and the whole situation leaves the C.I.A. embarrassingly short of tactics.

The Laotian people must regard with amusement the rival groups of "phalangs" (foreigners): rigid, bourgeois, crew-cut types who drink liquor, talk about increased crop production, worry about strengthening the royalist troops and defeating the Pathet Lao (Laotian version of the Viet Cone) while Pathet Lao (Laotian version of the Viet Cong) while colorful, marijuana-smoking hitchhikers float around Vientiane in native garb working in various and ingenious ways to sustain the mythic existence of ingenious ways to sustain the myrine existence of life in Laos (where rent is \$30 a month, food is one dollar a day, grass is practically free, the weather is sunny and the Mekong River flows nearby). Imagine some poor State Department official as he surveys his task. Vietnam was easier, he thinks. In

Vietnam, all that was necessary was barbed wire and a few soldiers. But the Laotian people are not civilized. They don't care about the war between the royalist troops and the Pathet Lao (which is fought, incidentally, by the Americans and the North Viet-namese). The Laotians don't care about ideology, about the Communist Threat, about The Yellow Peril, about the U.S. Information Service. Indeed, the Laotian people don't care about anything. They are uneducated. (They are stoned.) The Laotian people are not interested in Stopping Communist Aggression and, as if things weren't bad enough, these hippies come in here and reinforce this unconcern about Reality. Damn dirty unwashed filthy beatniks. Their growing prominence in Vientiane and their evangelistic missions to outlying villages endangers

the whole infrastructure of war and destruction that the United States has planned ("at the invitation of the Prime Minister") for the country of Laos. As must be the case, this situation abounds with

improbable personalities. There is a guiding light behind the circus of faces that hitchhike to Vientiane and stay ("It's incredible: I came to Vientiane for a look around and I've been here six months" is a common complaint) and that guiding light is one of the most improbable personalities: Dr. Sheldon Cholst, a wealthy psychiatrist from New York who is waging his own private war against Insanity by dropping out and supporting, in Laos, the influx of artists, writers, creators, inventors, hitchhikers, adventurers and maniacs who gather joyously at Dr. Cholst's cafe "The Third Eye" and discuss, amidst the smell of hashish, the coming consciousness revolution

Says Cholst, "I am a psychiatrist by profession and American society is very sick. As a physician, I would be remiss if I did not prescribe a remedy. It is useless reconstructing the mental health of individuals when the whole environment of life in America is so unhealthy. For this situation, I prescribe marijuana. Marijuana would serve to relax and stimulate the American people, thereby liberating their creative energies without further aggravating the prevailing situation of guilt, paranoia, and aggressiveness." Dr. Cholst has, in addition to lending financial support to The Third Eye, written a Constitution for The World where he advocates, among other things, an annual stipend for everyone by virtue of their Right Not to Work. The career of Dr. Cholst reads like the riot act and he is not the only "phalang" that causes officials in the U.S. embassy to wring their hands in despair.



The arms race in both the "hippie" and the camps has escalated with Vietnamese regularity. As the fighting between the Pathet Lao and the royalist troops (U.S. supplied and financed) ebbs and flows, the number of U.S. generals that can be seen chauf-fered through the streets of Vientiane in black, unmarked cars increases. It is not secret that the U.S. unmarked cars increases. It is not secret that the U.S. has been bombing Pathet Lao controlled areas of Laos (which, by the way, may be well over 50% of the country) where the North Vietnamese take refuge. While U.S. supplied planes streak through the air bringing rice to the "friendly" troops and bombs to the "enemy," U.S.A.I.D. officials show the People (in order to Win their Hearts and Minds) propaganda films at the local Buddhist temple which, I was amused to note one night, included old I was amused to note one night, included old travelogues and an army training film on combat techniques.

But no one seems to be taking the Americans and their Holy Mission seriously, except for the few Laotian generals who benefit financially from all the talk about "security" (which is fast becoming the most dangerous and deadly word in the American language). The supreme tolerance of the Laotian people is manifested by the fact that they put up with both the pushy, self-seeking Americans and the gentle, bizarre hitchhikers. The Laotians accept aid (guns and rice) from the former and sell opium to the latter, perfectly content to let considerations of communism, morality, or philosophy go undiscussed. The thinly disguised hostility between the rival groups of "phalangs" is considered to be an internal affain and the Laotians stay out of it, granting visas and visa extensions impartially.

American officials are afraid, most likely, of the establishment of a permanent Vientiane-based artist colony because the members of such a colony are openly hostile to the war next door in Vietnam and are not reluctant to work actively to prevent such an occurrence in Laos. If the fledgling community on Rue Dong Palane can become economically selfsufficient (as it is tending to become), the position of the U.S. influence in Laos will be weakened in a very subtle and important way.

The hitchhikers and the resident European community (primarily French businessmen left over from colonial days) can unite to give the Laotians more options in dealing with the Western world than just the traditional Asian ritual of accepting American "aid" and yielding to American pressure. The colony that is entrenching itself on Dong Palane contains many educated, talented people who can offer the Laotians instruction in many of the skills and methods of Western society. These people would actually make better teachers -- whether the subject be airplane mechanics or English -- than the U.S.A.I.D. people because their life-style is closer to the Laotian than that of the American U.S.A.I.D. official and this implies acceptance of (or at least great respect for) Lao religious and cultural values.

The American comes into Asian societies like a bull in a china shop, blind to the subtleties of Eastern thought and antagonistic to the rhythmic, cyclical slowness and (In) efficiency of life in Asia. The contact between East and West demands not that the East abandon its centuries-old heritage and copy Western habits, but that both viewpoints (the agrarian and the industrial) yield, change, and grow. A failure to communicate culturally in this confrontation can, and does, have disastrous results -- as the war in Vietnam clearly shows.

Two types of Westerner has emerged in reaction to the contact between East and West and these two types are in cold but serious war in Vientiane. The first type regards Western ways as being superior and seeks to impose them on the East. The second type realizes that Eastern civilization is a deep and rich source of wisdom from which even Westerners can learn much, and, consequently, he adopts a more receptive attitude toward the Oriental viewpoint. The tension that exists between these two personalities

is at once amusing and serious. The phenomenon of "hippies" (or pro-Oriental Westerners) in Laos is interesting, but its significance is more sociological than political. The people who leave their warm, secure homes in the West to travel through mystic India and finally settle in the smoky corners of Vientiane generally shun history and politics. These people are forced onto the historical stage because of circumstances - 1) the coincidence of a senseless, brutal war being fought next door in Vietnam and 2) they symbolize the collapse of indigenous values in the West.

It is an illusion of American officials that the ideological complexion of Asia is vital to the defense of the United States -- and the influx of "hippies" into Asia is suspicious in the sense that it deviates from the strong, straight, pro-American line that the U.S. has been trying to cultivate with money and "aid." To the eyes of U.S. generals, the "hippies" are undermining everything that the U.S. has accomplished in Asia (including death and destruction) and should martial law ever be declared in Laos (as it often is) these people will be the first to receive expulsion orders. It is the nature of the "cold war" between the hitchhikers and the army that is serious.

But another aspect of this subtle rivalry is amusing. Dr. Cholst, who lives on the Thatdam (Laotian embassy row) struck fear into the hearts of U.S. embassy officials by placing a sign on his gate that read "The Free U.S. Embassy." Dr. Cholst declared himself the Ambassador to Laos representing all Americans who are "internally free." The Laotians and the hitchhikers found this incident to be highly amusing; the U.S. embassy (which is five hundred yards away from "The Free U.S. Embassy") was not so easily pleased. According to Dr. Cholst, he removed the sign when the C.I.A. began making serious attempts on his life. Such is politics in Laos. It's weird. from the Fifth Estate (UPS)
