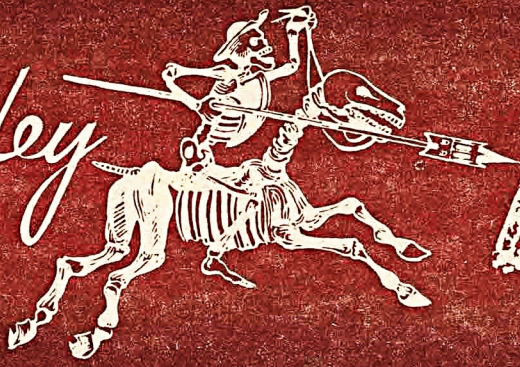

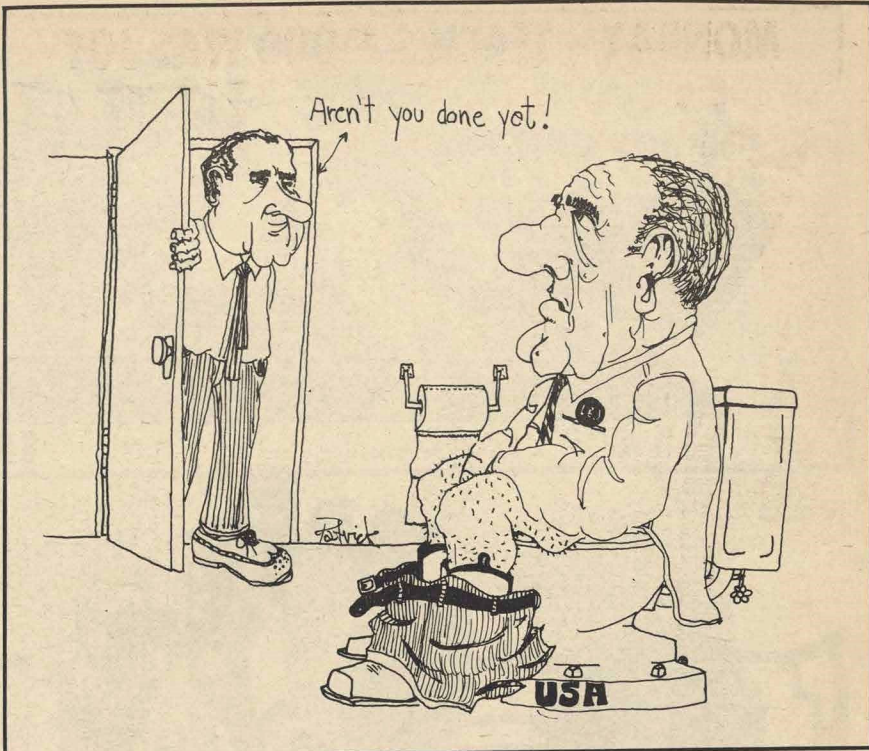
The entrance to be most heavily picketed is the one at 2550 Merced (left off Marina), that is marked for trucks carrying perishable items ... which means scab grapes.

PIGS MOVE AGAINST PROFS

At 3:55 Thursday afternoon the Attorney General's Office distributed individual citations and copies of restraining injunctions to professors manning AFT picket lines at San Francisco State.

About 250 profs were on the line in defiance of a court order.

This news came over the wire at BARB press time. A near program threatened SF State earlier Thursday afternoon as the strike continued.

At 3:00 the pig loudspeaker recited the restraining order issued Wednesday against the AFT strike. The reading of the court injunction is the first step the pigs must take in order to bust the picketing professors.

At 3:30 there was only one paddy wagon parked at the campus. No move had been made to bust the 250 professors. The AFT strikers intend to man their pickets until 7 P.M. in defiance of the order.

It's a fair hunch the mass bust will come before this evening. Hayakawa is determined to break the teacher's strike and is willing to put them in prison. The pigs may now be waiting for the students to disperse and the paddy-wagons to arrive for the defiant professors.

Earlier in the day the pigs challenged the crowds of students to stand pat and be slaughtered. Luckily the students declined, and thwarted a pogrom.

The first foreboding of the confrontation to come occurred when the Tac Squad took up positions at the main entrance to the campus, itching for action.

Shortly after 1:30 scattered incidents began to occur: the pigs maced dogs belonging to students, a bust or two occurred, a cherry bomb exploded in mid-air creating more tension; and students, professors, newsmedia cameramen, and pigs were rushing from one point of the front campus to another trying to find out what was happening amidst the confusion.

Suddenly, a large portion of the student pickets were forced out to the street by the pigs on campus. Simultaneously, squadrons appeared at all points around Holloway and 19th forcing all strikers into a box of pigs.

Having driven hundreds of students out to the street the loudspeaker cracked into action. A pig officer announced the crowd had to disperse from the street immediately or the assembly would be declared unlawful and all would be subject to arrest.

For a moment it looked like there wasn't anyplace to disperse

to as the pigs occupied all the earth around us. We were surrounded on all sides, but, somehow, the students managed to split from the box.

Afterwards the student picket line was rigidly contained within another box and the pigs held the entire front of the campus.

Only six persons were arrested but the scene was a horrifying demonstration of how several hundred pigs could materialize from nowhere to encircle the entire body of striking students and professors.

Like in three minutes everyone was trapped. It appears the sudden squadrons had been secretly deployed either inside the campus or at hidden points a block or two away from the campus -or both.

From 7:30 a.m. Thursday morning striking students, TA's and a handful of professors manned a picket line on the 19th Ave. side of the S.F. State campus.

All waited to see if the American Federation of Teachers would cop out and abandon their strike because a court had ruled on Wednesday that public employees in California do not have the right to strike.

Then, at 10:45 a.m., the AFT local materialized 250 strong on a picket line along the Holloway side of the campus.

The picketing students, now 1000 strong, responded with shouts of "On strike, shut it down."

The school was virtually shut down on Thursday. By noon no more than 500 scabbing students had gone on to the campus thru the main entrance at Holloway and 19th.

The tactical stance of the striking students was not to force confrontations with the occupying army of pigs.

The students were quite satisfied to have the campus virtually shut down without paying the price of soaring casualty lists.

Though the tac squad moved on to the campus' main entrance at around noon, by 1 p.m. there had been only one bust and no busted

umke dumke MANY BUSTEES HURT

Humke Dumke sat on a wall. Humke Dumke had a great fall. All the Mayor's horses. And all the Mayor's men. Couldn't put Humke Dumke together again.

SF State, that was more like The Mad Hatter's Tea, has become the Alice in Wonderland State. At a press conference Saturday, acting press S.I. Hayakawa read a lengthy statement -

press and TV reporters, cameramen, etc., asked questions -

AND - the words "Black Students Union" and "Third World Liberation Front" were not uttered ONCE!

What the hell? How is this possible? Answer...

"Most of their demands have been met," answered Hayakawa. This reporter, attending the press conference, finally couldn't take it anymore. With all the questions dealing with AFT action, regulations, city police, etc etc., nobody repeat nobody spoke for the blacks and minorities.

"Your entire statement, Doctor Hayakawa, does not mention the BSU and the TWLF. Do you feel these organizations have ceased to exist?" I asked.

"Oh, no," he replied. This seemed to satisfy him as an answer.

"Why didn't you mention them?" I asked.

"Because most of their demands have been met," he said. He looked away for another question.

"Have you discussed this with them?" I asked.

"Oh, no," he replied again. This was like the Mad Hatter's Tea!

Another reporter, after a few more questions, brought up the

BSU and TWLF again. "Since they started this whole thing..." "They did not!" replied Hayakawa, displaying for the first time, some irritation and heat.

"But they..." "They did not start this. Their

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demands have been met!" This put the stopper on this line of questioning from that point on.

Reporters were puzzled on how Hayakawa could keep anybody off "public property." He kept replying in an oblique manner when finally one reporter helped him out by announcing "the Mulford Act."

(Note: this is not correct; the Mulford Act applies only to UC campuses, not State College cam-

pus).

"Would you keep Bishop Hurley off campus?" was another question. "Oh, no," Hayakawa replied. "I am puzzled," a TV reporter said. "How are you going to handle such things as this (the Bishop) and the press - do we need passes?"

"If you have legitimate business on campus, you don't need a pass," was the reply.

"How about Dr. Carleton Goodlet who said he would lead a group of elders from the black community on campus?" was another question.

"If he complies with the regulations (i.e., stay off the main turf in the center), they can come," said Hayakawa.

Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke and Theodore Meriam, chairman of the Trustees, both sent messages of support to Hayakawa.

The small conference room was jam-packed with TV equipment and reporters. While waiting for the acting president to show, the media people joked about him. "Have you seen those silly signs?" they would ask as each new reporter showed up (in reference to the "warning" signs posted about the campus).

The media even indulged in a little racism. While they were testing the lights and sound (with a technician sitting at Hayakawa's table), somebody said, "Say 'suk-iaiki!'"

"Out of 150 persons arrested at San Francisco State before the holiday, one-third of them were injured and required medical attention," Bob English told BARB this week.

English, working with the San Francisco State Defense Committee, urges people to contact the Defense Committee when they are injured during an arrest.

The Defense Committee had about twenty doctors helping treat and examine people that were injured during arrest last December. "Most people are either financially unable to get proper medical attention," English said, "or just don't know that they should."

"You must have an examination as well as emergency treatment," English stressed.

Examination and injury records of people hurt during arrest are being compiled to present as evidence when these people go to court.

Fifty percent of those beaten during arrest were charged with

felonies -- the majority of the others hurt were charged with battery and three or four misdemeanors.

People are tired of having to defend themselves in court because they get their head cracked while the pig tries to get off by slapping felonies on them, English noted. The defense attorneys are going to use the medical records in their cases, he said, and these records provide a good base for civil suit.

People hurt while being arrested are urged to contact the Defense Committee.

In addition to doctors helping by initial treatment, the Defense Committee makes referrals to specialists and general practitioners. There are also hospitals like Mount Zion or St. Lukes that get welfare funds to help defray costs.

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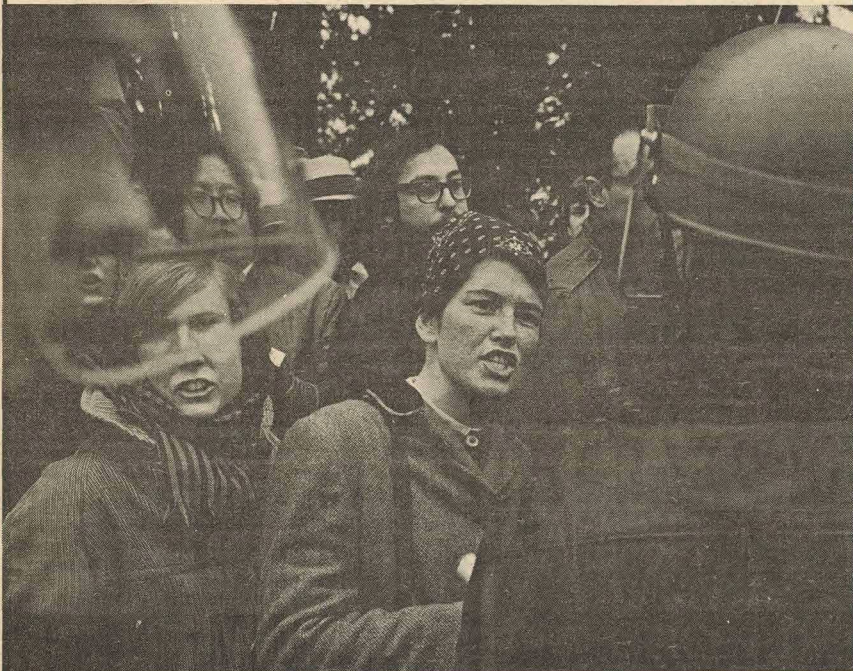

JUDGE HASSELS MURRAY AT PROBATION SCANDAL

"Power to the People!! Power to the People."

In comes Judge Albert A. Axelrod yelling, "Be quiet! Be quiet! Stop that smoking! If it isn't quiet in here, I'll hold everyone in contempt of court!"

The hearing to revoke the parole of George Murray, Minister of Education of the Black Panther Party, has started. If Murray, Jack Alexis, and the other Blacks involved in last year's "Gator" newspaper incident all lose court probation, they are required to report to the California Adult Authority Probation Department in San Francisco.

The men involved in the disruption of the San Francisco State College newspaper office have supposedly broken their promise to "act like good boys!", in the words of Judge Axelrod.

The not so good boys have been on probation to the court for a

year. Court probation is easier on the defendant than Adult Authority Probation. When on probation with that department, you have to report to a probation office and are liable to go through the same hassles and political intervention that Eldridge Cleaver had to go through.

Charles Garry, the Panther Attorney, told Axelrod that they did not recognize the court's right "to punish these men by revoking court probation". He said that a verbal promise to be a good boy was not the correct procedure for the court.

The court was supposed to have Murray and the others sign a document stating the terms of their probation. The probation requirements were never in writing for Murray and the others.

Axelrod was in such a hurry to get the whole mess off his hands and into those of the Adult

Authority that he constantly shouted, and argued with the defense attorneys.

The hearings ended with Axelrod yelling at Murray, "Do you hear me - I don't want you telling anyone to carry guns to San Francisco State. Did you hear me? Did you hear me?"

Murray, Alexis and the others will appear in court February 7 with a legal brief explaining why they need not show cause so as not to have their parole revoked.

San Francisco State is not on strike—it is in revolt. The teachers on strike are part of this revolt.

But Black Student Union leader Jerry Vanardo told it like it is, Tuesday. "The AFT don't control no strike," he told BARB.

"We will fight to the death on principles," he said. He looked like he meant it.

The fighting coalition of black, third world and white student communities is battling a society that is refusing to let them have an education that is relevant to their needs, instead of to Sacramento's ego power trips.

Monday saw the start of the teachers' strike with blacks and TWLF people feeling out what use the AFT strike would be in effecting their demands.

"The BSU will use the strike to all its advantage," said Vanardo, "but we are not subordinate in principle or tactics to the AFT."

BSU people kept up a steady rap at pigs eyeing the strikers. "Right here is a pig that has been on the force for 19-1/2 years, everybody. He don't want to mess with no strikers. He wants to collect his pension and sit home and drink beer before the TV."

Reagan's San Francisco portion of the "crumbling society" also watched the AFT to see how it would affect their power. The usual spotters on the buildings were there but there were no helicopters. Reagan reacted the next day by saying that any teacher missing five unexcused days of school would be fired.

About noon the San Francisco Labor Council granted strikes sanction to AFT local 1352. Hayakawa's problems grew even more complex when food service, library and other union workers walked off their jobs.

An AFT picket captain told BARB that he felt "amnesty for those arrested should be the first issue in any negotiations."

BSU leader Bridges Randall reminded BARB "the Labor Council has given strike sanction to the AFT for economic grievances." He emphasized, "The Fifteen Demands are still non-negotiable."

The rather cold day was a day of warm greetings. A Berkeley picket would meet an old friend now living in San Francisco. Students and teachers from Stanford, San Jose State, Marin and Berkeley would exchange greetings. Old lefties

were reunited. And many parents were there backing their kids. The holidays had proved useful for drumming up community support. SF STATE, Tuesday-- Nearly five hundred student pickets marched ON campus Tuesday and found themselves surrounded by the SF Tactless Squad. "For five tense minutes" (SF Chronicle) it looked as though the cops would bust all the strikers in front of the still open library.

But the police "parted ranks" to allow the strikers to join the off campus pickets (numbering over 2,000) at the 19th street entrance.

What came out of this, however, is the ominous shadow of events to come, namely, the striking professors left the ON campus pickets when they became "too noisy."

The question on everybody's mind is -- will they leave the BSU and the TWLF the same way?

The answer is pending. Meanwhile, the SF Chronicle had some dramatic pictures on how the black students feel about white students scabbing.

"Don't cross the picket line, join it," they shouted to students coming off the 19th street trolleys. Scabs were called scabs and students were soon marching around the administration building yelling "On Strike -- Shut It Down" and "Pigs Off Campus!"

Student Linda Poser, one month from graduating in drama, was challenged by a black girl. "I want you to know how angry we are with you middle-class white chicks," she shouted, blocking her path.

"We're going to get you. The system is falling and you're falling with it. Cry, damn it, cry, because you don't have enough sense to care about people."

The Chronicle's photos show Miss Poser being escorted on campus by Matt Cervelli, husky, square, wearing an athletic jacket with his name "Matt" sewn where a cop is supposed to wear his badge.

Hayakawa's new sound system drowned everyone out, informing them that they were committing "Loud and Boisterous Acts."

These speakers are the new early warning system.

The pigs moved into action about two minutes after the booming speakers are silent. About 150 pigs were let out of their pen and everybody got their ass to the sidewalks on the perimeter of the campus.

The rest of the day was spent picketing on the sidewalk, but by now the campus was quiet enough for Hayakawa to eat his bag lunch in peace. He must have been lonely, though, because the campus was totally empty.

Even the Oakland Tribune admitted that classes were sharply reduced.

I walked through the BSS building shortly after noon and found eight out of twelve classrooms locked. One teacher announced the class would be taught at his home.

Back on the picket line, the SF fuzz goofed (?) again. It took 16 cops to arrest Hari Dillon, a BSU leader. They "snapped handcuffs on him and led him off for failing to obey a warrant to appear in court."

Hours later Dillon was released. "Police at the Hall of Justice (sic) discovered that the warrant for his arrest had been quashed

TEACHER TACTIC



TEACH SHOWS HOW TO COOL THE PIG

"Point Dog to Point Charlie - Come in Point Charlie!"

"This is Point Charlie - Go ahead Point Dog."

So it went this week from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at SAN FRANCISCO STATE COLLEGE. BUT the man with the radio at point alpha, where I heard the above, did not have a blue uniform.

In fact, he had no uniform at all. He was Chuck Richardson, a member of AFT local 1352 of the AFL-CIO, and a professor in the education department at San Francisco State. The information relayed from points dog to charlie had to do with a hassle about blocking an entrance to a building.

In organizing the strike, the AFT has set up six checkpoints on and around campus. Points alpha through fox each have a radio and are in constant communication with the AFT Headquarters on Holla-way Street. There is also a roving command post stemming from the AFT truck that passes out picket

signs and issues press line passes.

Every member of the AFT local 1352 is assigned to a picket point. He is either on shift from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. or 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. A checker goes to each point to see if the member is at his post.

When police moved into the campus on Tuesday, the information was immediately relayed to each point. The various picket points found out that they were committing "loud and boisterous acts" and the pickets knew that the pigs were coming.

Only one picket was busted, Richard Curtis, a Teaching Assistant.

The picket captains led orderly retreats from all points and reformed in a perimeter on the sidewalks around San Francisco State.

Though the BSU and Third World cannot relate to striking teachers holding classes at home, they might well study some of the organizational tactics of both the AFT and occupying Army.

HOW DID THE MAN HELP BBC?

The Better Berkeley Council and Berkeley citizens got an eleventh hour reprieve from Berkeley's agile City Attorney today. It seems that the cut-off date for the Charter Amendment drive that had been set by City Hall wasn't legal after all.

Pressure from BBC attorney Mal Burnstein brought Attorney Anderson around to admitting that the provisions in the State Constitution hold for Berkeley, too.

This gives Berkeley voters another two weeks to sign petitions which will place on the April ballot a provision for a Citizen's Advocate with the power to investigate any city department, including the police or the City Attorney's office.

The original early deadline of January 10, which was also supposed to apply to the Peace and Freedom Party petition to divide the Berkeley Police Department along community lines, was explained in a telephone conversation with the City Attorney.

Anderson told BBC attorney Burnstein, "We set the deadline on the 10th for your convenience."

"We appreciate this consideration for our convenience," John Madden, BBC Election Committee Chairman told a BARB reporter, "but we'd rather decide for ourselves whether a later date is convenient or not. As it is, two weeks more will put us over the top."

"We had a good response to our door-to-door drive last weekend. People are looking for something which will put the brakes on the Police and other City Hall shucks."

Al Silbowitz, BBC Chairman, had more serious news for the BARB. "The petition drive isn't all that's on our minds. In a check with the County Clerk's office last Friday, we found that voter registration has dropped way down in Berkeley."

Silbowitz continued, "About 20,000 people found the Presidential Election and the Primary before it enough of a turn-off that they didn't vote and have lost their registration. They're mainly our kind of voters, left, radical, frustrated, looking for real change."

"They won't be able to vote for our Amendments or for new left coalition candidates in the April city election unless they send back the County Clerk's postcard or re-register before February 6."

The Community for New Politics and BBC are beginning a registration drive. Campus groups will be getting tables up soon.

The big problem, Silbowitz told BARB, "is to get people believing that there is going to be something to be FOR, for a change. We are bucking a lot of honest feelings about the meaninglessness of politics. But we know that the April election is going to be fought around real issues, like police problems. We've got to get our people registered by February 6th, or John DeBonis may be cackling when it's all over."

DOWN ON HOLDING HER HAND

Holding hands on Telly can get you in big trouble.

Brian Ross, 19 was walking on the Avenue Saturday night hand in hand with a chick. Wednesday he was just out of Santa Rita on bail, still facing lawyers fees and a trial date.

The cops stopped Ross Saturday after curfew, claiming the chick with him was a 17 year runaway. He was hit with 2 charges, statutory rape and contributing to delinquency of a minor. The first charge was later dropped, the second still stands.

After being at Santa Rita "with a bunch of dumb cops" for 2 days, Ross was bailed out with contributions collected by a friend, Alison Chitceck. Ross's lawyer is Richard L. Chestney. No trial date has yet been set.

All this for holding hands. --jj

SMART SMARTS

The Silent Majority Against Revolutionary Tactics (cleverly calling themselves SMART) is still smarting over the bust-up of their first meeting Sunday night by a group of radicals.

The meeting dissolved amidst scenes of chaos which would warm the heart of any Tammany Hall politician.

SMART never got around to taking committee signups and nearly threw out the straight-press photog during the tumult, but BARB, cleverly disguised as R. Crumb's "Whiteman," witnessed it all and got pictures.

Lincoln High School, in the lily-white heart of San Francisco, was the site for the SMART convocation. It had been heralded in the Hearst press as open to all. The purpose was to organize a community based opposition to campus radicalism, including but not limited to the SF State strike.

Most of the meeting was taken up by a perennial right-wing favorite, Pat Athowe, who has taken on the incredible task of demonstrating to the world that the UC Berkeley campus was subverting the Western Hemisphere with

your tax dollars." She rapped for an hour and a half until someone in the audience interrupted, and asked that she shut up.

That brought on the question period, and the room, packed with about 100 people, was ready for it. After a few innocuous questions, a beer-hall type in the back asked if "we would have to eat soul food" in the Black Studies Department.

A black student then stood up and shouted his protest at the racist crack. He continued in a rebuttal to the racist concepts expressed in the meeting as right-wingers in the audience began an uproar to get him to sit down.

The black had friends in the audience, though, and the uproar became a two-sided affair. In a few minutes people were spilling onto the floor and several fights started.

It was impossible to tell who started the fights, but there were plenty of willing participants on both sides. Much of the audience began to leave. A chair was broken and in a minute or two a beefy blond guy was waving a rung of it

and telling everybody to get out. It was almost as good as a Ukrainian soccer game.

BARB, disguised in an all-purpose undertaker's suit, stood behind a well-dressed grey-haired man who was one of the first up front when the fighting began. The students who had graced the platform came over to him as if he were their leader.

"I told them not to print it," fumed one of them. "I'm going to talk with the Examiner about that!" The old guy made soothing sounds. "Never again in the papers!" the student continued.

"We won't hold any more public meetings," said Old Grey, "we'll organize quietly."

BARB was in no position to ask for names, and having run out of film, took a powder. And just in time.

The cops had been called for a "possible riot" and were just arriving as BARB left. The first cop in the door was black. A short distance away outside stood a group of students who had engaged in the heckling but not the fighting. The fighters were long gone.

All in the good old American tradition. --L.F.

AMERICAN SOLDIER TORTURED BY GUARDHOUSE SERGEANT

A young soldier was brutally tortured and had his finger broken by a guard in the Presidio brig Wednesday.

Attorney Terence Hallinan visited the GI, Roy Pulley 20, and later recounted the GI's tale of horror to BARB.

"Pulley's two fingers were broken by a Sergeant Woodring as the guard sat on his chest," Hallinan said. "He bent Pulley's fingers back slowly till they broken. All the time Pulley was screaming. The Sergeant just kept laughing. Other guards in the next room heard everything, but continued drinking coffee and didn't interfere. My God! How much more brutal can one be," Hallinan wondered.

Eventually the tortured soldier was taken to the hospital and had his arm placed in a cast. "All the officials there at the Presidio are in a furor over this," Hallinan said. "They don't want any more bad publicity."

"This brings out in dramatic form the custodial personnel that run the Presidio brig," the attorney told BARB. "The man responsible for the act is in charge of all the guards at the stockade." In talking to the young GI Halli-

nan learned that he had a P-3 profile, meaning he was exempt from any work because of a bad back. Yet Wednesday the Sergeant ordered him to wash cars. Pulley agreed and was on his way to his task when Woodring grabbed him for no apparent reason, took him to a small room and proceeded to torture him. In an affidavit signed by Pulley he states there was alcohol on Sgt. Woodring's breath.

At the court-martial hearing for the Presidio 27 testimony was brought forth that Woodring often drank on duty. The Army denied this and didn't reprimand the guard.

Pulley is one of the 27 GI's involved in a supposed "mutiny" October 14 at the Presidio after the killing of a fellow inmate. Hallinan is attorney for 17 of the men and has been fighting their case in the courts for several months.

Earlier on Wednesday Hallinan appeared in Federal District Court before Judge Stanley Wiegel asking the civil court to intervene in the case of the Presidio 27 and correct the illegal and degrading conditions of the stockade.

Judge Wiegel had just asked Hallinan if there was any new evidence of brutality when news of the Pulley torture came to light. "The Army by its brutal action is defeating itself," Hallinan told BARB.

Last week the Military Court of Appeals had turned down the same petition by Hallinan.

Because of the precinct shattering nature of his petition Hallinan feels Judge Wiegel may be reluctant to intervene in the case. If he does it well mean giving civil courts jurisdiction over military prisons.

"From information I have the Presidio brig is one of the best in the country," Hallinan said. "Other brig must certainly be something," he remarked.

Although the 27 GI's had their preliminary meeting hearing completed almost two months ago, the army has not yet decided if it will bring capital sentence charges against the men.

One of the prisoners, Richard Gentle, who escaped several weeks ago, was captured recently in Florida and returned to the Presidio brig.

WILL SEEK REDRESS FOR INSULT TO CLEAVER

"In the south they used to lynch black women and cut the babies out of their stomachs. In Berkeley do they plan to commit genocide by freezing them out?"

Bobbie Thompson of Bay Area Blacks United asked this about Kathleen Cleaver's cold January 2nd ordeal on the Bay Bridge at the hands of the Berkeley Police.

We didn't have a ready answer. In the cold midnight hour of the day after New Year's, the car driven by the pregnant wife of world-famous author Eldridge Cleaver was brought to an abrupt halt by the sirens of the BPD and the California Highway Patrol.

"They put a gun in her face and told her if she moved a muscle she'd be dead," Bobbie told BARB. The cops then made the expectant mother and her companions stand out on the wind-swept bridge for upwards of half an hour, while they unsuccessfully searched her car for her husband.

Kathleen's requests to sit down because she was feeling ill were ignored, "and the police, who know everything about the Cleavers by now, knew that Kathleen Cleaver was pregnant," Bobbie said. "They know that the first three months are the crucial period, too," she added, "this is part and parcel of the policy of genocide directed against black people."

To protest this callous treatment of Kathleen -- or any black woman -- BABU is planning to pack the Berkeley City Council meeting this coming Tuesday night.

At the insistence of councilman Ron Dellums, the issue will be aired either at the City Hall or a "larger meeting place."

A community planning meeting before the city council meeting is to be held this Sunday. Kathleen and a number of black community leaders, including clergy, will speak, as will a previously undisclosed witness to the incident. The ACLU will participate and the public, black and white, is invited.

The time and place will be announced on the Ray Talliaferro show over KNEW. Phillip's Temple is probable, but not confirmed, at BARB press time.

"If it is a tactic of the FBI and the police departments to harass Kathleen Cleaver," Bobbie Thompson told BARB, "thinking this will bring Eldridge Cleaver out of hiding, they'll soon find that there are thousands of people, black and white, ready to protect Kathleen -- and Eldridge knows this."

HOW LOCAL PRESS DID ITS THING

"CHIEF BACKS MEN IN CLEAVER CAR ROW" was the way the Berkeley Police Gazette finally told its readers what the SF Chronicle had broken two days before.

The Gazette kept the Smith-family raid out of their paper, too, until it became a public scandal. One of Berkeley's finest had to "resign" after Chief William Beall had to admit one of his "men" had gone somewhat ape.

In a surprising statement, the Gazette made this comment: "A comparison of police reports and verbal accounts of the episode to the Gazette by Mrs. Cleaver shows little contradiction." If any readers still think the Berkeley Police have learned anything at all from the black revolution, let them ponder the following comment from the Gazette:

"Police noted Mrs. Cleaver, who complained of the cold, was perhaps the most warmly dressed in the group -- she was wearing a full-length fur coat, police said."

Compare also Chief Beall's refusal ever to let BARB see a police report and his explanation to BARB that NO newspapers are allowed to see his police reports. Never let 'em tell you pigs don't lie.

BLACKS IN SHOWDOWN AT DIABLO COLLEGE?

Black student anger is simmering at Diablo Valley College in the white suburban town of Pleasant Hill.

The administration is blaming six black students for a disturbance in the school's cafeteria prior to the Christmas vacation.

"If action is taken against six of our brothers there will be a dramatic response by the Black Student Union," Bobby Alexander, leader of the school's BSU, told BARB Wednesday.

On December 13 a fire broke out on the floor of the BSU office, Alexander said. It was put out with only minimal damage.

"No steps have been taken by the school or the DA's Office yet against whites who tried to burn down the BSU and intimidate black students on campus," Alexander charged.

According to the BSU leader, the disturbance in the cafeteria was triggered when a black student was given a poisoned soft drink. A fight flared up when authorities refused to give him prompt medical aid.

"The administration is trying to satisfy the need for a scapegoat," Alexander said. He charged the six cited students have been picked out indiscriminately. "Some of them weren't even in school that day."

According to Alexander on December 16 a white man drew a gun on some blacks on the campus. He was chased away by other students, but school authorities and police refused to act against him.

Alexander believes the racial friction on the campus has come about as a result of negotiations for a Black Studies Program. So far the BSU feels negotiations have been successful.

"Dr. Niland, the college president, has committed the administration to a long-range black studies program," Alexander said. "Already 11 classes for 60 units have been set up for this February," he observed.

Most of the 160 blacks on the 8,000 student campus come from the nearby town of Pittsburg, Pleasant Hill, where the junior college is located, is an all white shopping center type suburbia.

"Few people know what's going on at the school," Alexander said. "All the newspapers around here are very racist."

The BSU leader said he is satisfied with the proposed Black Studies Program. But if the administration acts against the six students people from the black community in Pittsburg might be called in for support.

HAIGHT CLINIC OPENS TO ALL

The Haight-Ashbury Medical Clinic is opening up to the people again, not only to those in the Haight, but to all people.

For those who can't afford the bread or the exposure of such facilities as Kaiser and San Francisco General, they can once again go back to the old second story flat on the corner of Haight and Clayton for their needs. That will be 559 Clayton.

For head-type needs, the 409 House at 409 Clayton St. will be the psychiatric clinic.

Dr. David Smith will be in charge of the clinic again when it opens this coming week, and some of the old staff will be there also.

The painted windows will be lit up from 6 p.m. until 10 p.m. Monday thru Friday, and the number for help will be 431-1714.

The opening of the Med Clinic was made possible by donations from Crocker Trust, the San Francisco Foundation, and several individual donors.



BLACKS SET TO CLOSE ALL VALLEJO SCHOOLS

Pickets walked in front of Solano College in Vallejo Tuesday in support of two black leaders expelled from the school the day before.

At first the student government called for a sympathy boycott, but later backed down. Several minor fires were reported on the campus during the day.

"It's a new time in Vallejo," Mark Jefferson one of the expelled students told BARB this week. "Blacks all the way from the NAACP to the Black Panthers are united. It's beautiful we're all together."

Jefferson is the head of the Solano College Black Student Union. The other expelled student is Jymbo Sudan, vice president of the campus BSU. School officials claim the two threatened a faculty member after a rally last month.

The strike by black students is in response to the politically motivated removal of black leaders, Jefferson indicated. He said the black community of the naval town has come together to combat the policies of the Solano College administration.

"Eventually there might be a strike at all Vallejo schools," Jefferson said. Most of the city's schools have a high percentage of black students.

At the moment Jefferson is working through the courts to get reinstated. "I'm confident we can win," the black leader said. "What they did to us was completely illegal."

Jefferson and Sudan appeared at a School Board meeting Monday night. He termed the gathering "a complete farce." Over 200 blacks came in support of the two BSU leaders only to be turned away by police at the door.

"That's a violation of the Brown

Act which states all board meetings have to be open to the public," he charged. "They also limited to three the number of witnesses we could have. I never heard of such a thing." The black leader said the meeting was packed with whites who had no business being there, while only a few blacks were admitted.

Trouble first erupted at the normally placid Solano College November 4 when 21 black students were arrested following a sit-in. Later the BSU issued a series of demands centered on fair and equal treatment for blacks at the college. The black students are presently appearing in court on the sit-in charges.

The incident for which Jefferson and Sudan were expelled is alleged to have taken place December 13. The two were kicked out for a series of charges such as threatening to do bodily harm and using obscene language.

"Professor Hamilton, a journalism instructor says we indirectly threatened his life," Jefferson told BARB. "This is not true. He is in charge of the school paper and we told him he was suppressing black news."

The two ousted blacks are having their attorney file a Writ of Prohibition in Solano County Superior Court in Fairfield. The writ would prevent Dr. Dallas Evans, the college president, from carrying out the Board's expulsion order.

The Vallejo straight paper has been giving the story big play. "But it's very racist in its presentation," Jefferson charged. "The things we're doing now this community has never seen," he said.

BLACKS NOT SURE ABOUT SAN MATEO SETTLEMENT

It appears striking College of San Mateo (CMS) students have won a victory over their administration this week. But it could prove to be only a paper victory.

Wednesday, Bob Hoover, the controversial head of the school's College Readiness Program for minority students was promoted to a new job. He will supervise minority education and recruiting programs not only at CSM but at nearby Canada College in Redwood City and Skyline College in San Mateo.

"When I start making decisions I'll know if we won," Hoover told BARB late Wednesday night. "They've lied so often in the past I don't believe anything till I see it."

Hoover said he is not really confident he'll have the power he needs to implement meaningful programs for minority education. "But it'll be a week before I can tell."

Right now he has more money and staff than ever before. He plans to hire Miss Jean Wirth as his assistant. She was fired by CSM on the same day (December 13) Hoover was let go because of supposedly "fostering militancy" among minority students. Hoover also plans to bring three "pretty active college people" on to his staff.

All of Hoover's appointments have to be passed by the administrations of the three individual

colleges. He is afraid they might object to some of his selections. "If I have no real power there is no reason for me to stay," he said.

Hoover also plans to keep the Readiness Program strictly for Third World students. Other college officials have indicated a wish to dilute its militancy by including poor whites.

Pressure that Hoover be rehired was brought to bear on CSM administration by spokesmen for the minority communities on the Peninsula. Several delegations visited the beleaguered campus during the holidays to demand his reinstatement. He was fired following an outbreak of violence December 13.

At BARB press time Thursday it is not clear if students have called off a strike scheduled for Friday noon. Five hundred minority students and about 200 white tutors have threatened to walk off the CSM campus if Hoover isn't given fair treatment.

"We want to see he isn't put in a pencil pushing job without power," Russ Beebe from the Student Strike Headquarters told BARB Wednesday.

During the month long turmoil on the Peninsula junior college the campus has been ringed by massive police force. Monday the home of a former dean Philip Garlington was firebombed and partly destroyed.

HAYWARD STATE CHICANOS PUSH ON FOR EIGHT DEMANDS

Mexican-American students at Cal State at Hayward and community leaders have issued a list of eight demands to the school's administration. Ellis E. McCune, the college's president has not yet been "satisfactory" in his response according to a Chicano spokesman.

"We're not going to back down on our demands," Manuel Gomez, leader of the Mexican-American Student Confederation (MASC) at Cal State told BARB Wednesday. "The community is behind us one hundred percent."

Gomez had just returned from a meeting where McCune had talked to 300 Chicanos concerning the eight demands. "He talks smooth just like Reagan," the MASC leader said. "He said he was aware of the problem, but didn't respond at all to our demands."

However, Gomez pointed out McCune had said he would admit all the Mexican-Americans he could get.

"We're going to hold him to that, and start recruiting in the high schools right away," Gomez stated.

According to the MASC spokesman about 40 percent of the high school population of Hayward and the nearby communities is Chicano, yet less than one percent of the students at Cal State are Mexican-Americans.

"This college, as well as others in California aren't meeting the needs of the Mexican-American

community," Gomez said. Gomez thinks the present situation in Hayward offers only two alternatives. One is for more talk with McCune, the other is building strength for a possible confrontation in the near future. "I'm tired of talk," he said. "There have been negotiations with no tangible results on this since October 30."

The eight Chicano demands were presented to the school's administration at a campus rally Tuesday. School restrictions on off-campus speakers and use of a PA system were thrown aside by MASC, Gomez said.

"We have a right to demand self-determination for ourselves," he said. "Historically our culture has been castrated and attempts made to destroy our language. We have been cut off from our own history. This has to be changed," Gomez emphasized.

The Chicanos are demanding that the school hire three Mexican-American administrators, admit 300 Mexican-Americans who don't qualify under present standards and give them financial aid, offer ethnic studies courses, create a Mexican-American cultural center, and recognize MASC as the official voice of Chicano students.

"This is literally a Life and Death issue for us," Gomez told BARB. "To survive we have to find ourselves as a people with a history and a culture."

VARNADO CLAIMS SF STATE WAR MAKING HISTORY

MONDAY, SF State-- "You have waged war for a period of time longer than any other in history on a college campus." With these words, Jerry Varnado of the BSU told it like it was, is, and will be.

The blacks, the browns, the yellows, and the whites brought it all together today on a mass picket line of nearly 4,000 people from the SFS campus community.

With only 20% of the college operating ('Newsroom'), a lot of re-thinking took place, especially downtown...

Mayor Alioto "permitted" on-campus picket lines, thus re-thinking S. I. Hayakawa's Saturday press-conference (see story elsewhere).

The SF Labor Council did a lot of heavy thinking (about five hours worth) and finally came up with support for the AFT strike.

Even the BSU did some re-thinking. Dr. Nathan Hare, the leading black professor on campus, felt that the strike and support from all over the bay area was so good, the planned "on campus rally" was cancelled a few minutes before it was to start.

The SF fuzz was cool. Staring grimly about at all times, they found they had little to do -- even the cops hiding out directly across the street in the Parkmerced carports (a new tactic, by the way).

The BIGGEST re-think coming up is this: will the SF Labor Council (and the AFT) still support the blacks and minorities if and when Hayakawa and the Trustees agree to the professor's demands?

The striking students won't let them forget, judging from the activity and signs present on the picket line today. "Japanese American Community Concerned - Supports Strike," read one being carried by a Sansei.

Another Japanese student had a photo of a man committing Hari Kari with the slogan: "Death Before Dishonor."

The grape-strikers were there with their red 'Huelga' flag. Parents showed up with "Community Strike Support Coalition" banner, "ILWU Local 10 Supports Strike."

Students from San Jose, Berkeley, Marin, and elsewhere, swelled the massed double-line of pickets that covered the main entrances to the campus.

Those students who crossed the picket line attended classes, apparently, by standing at all the windows, looking out. They probably will write a term paper on "What A Picket Line Looks Like From The Inside."

The 'Marin Strike Support Committee' put out a leaflet that told

HALLINAN CONFIDENT ON RETRIAL

"With an impartial judge they'll never convict me," Terence 'Kayo' Hallinan told BARB this week. He was commenting on his case for alleged assault on a Tac Squad cop scheduled for retrial in several months.

Kayo's father will again defend him. In the first trial, which ended last week in a hung jury, the elder Hallinan was sentenced to five days in jail for contempt of court by Judge Carl Allen. He is presently free and appealing the decision.

Kayo charged Judge Carl Allen, a former member of the DA's office, still thinks like a DA. "He definitely wanted a conviction" Kayo said.

In the instructions to the jury Judge Allen stated that merely touching a policeman can be considered battery.

"The fact that the cop was beating a girl at the time was not relevant according to him," Kayo told BARB.

"At first I was disappointed in not being acquitted," Kayo said, "but considering the instructions the judge gave the jury we won a moral victory."

voted to ask the Alameda County Labor Council for strike sanction if any striking members of AFT local 1352 at SF State are fired. If this is granted, a strike vote can be taken on 48 hours notice.

Similar action has been taken by AFT locals at ten other state college campuses, union members were told.

"The meeting where San Francisco State AFT voted to strike was easily the most impressive union meeting I've ever been at," Sylvia Forman, who has been coordinating Berkeley AFT support for the SF State strike reported.

She praised the careful organization of the AFT 1352's picket lines, and noted that striking faculty members there had hoped for strong support from Berkeley's TAs on the picket line.

State college students and faculty are working closely in support of each other, she said, even though the San Francisco County Labor Council did not sanction a union demand in support of striking students.

In an effort to promote Berkeley union participation on the State College picket lines, Tuesday's meet-

ing resolved:

"We have a duty to maintain pickets on the line of AFT local 1352 at all times for the duration of the strike, and to effect this, a schedule of pickets and any other necessary arrangements should be set up and members should be informed that they are expected to sign up for, and fulfill, picket duty."

In other action Tuesday, AFT 1570 negotiators resolved a serious problem with the University administration.

After a conference with Executive Vice Chancellor Earl Cheit, union leaders confirmed that TA Jack Bloom had been reinstated in his job pending the completion of hearings on his case.

Bloom was suspended from school last October for participating in a sit-in at Moses Hall. The administration initially had not fired Bloom from his teaching post, but did so just before Christmas vacation, according to AFT 1570's grievance committee chairman, Steve Engleman.

FBI RAID FAILS TO QUIET PUBLISHER

Early this week in San Francisco the authorities showed how they feel about underground poets and publishers by arresting Darrell "Dutch" Kerr on a variety of false charges in an attempt to silence him.

The F. B. I. invaded his office at Nevada/Tattoo Press in the city and arrested him on charges of stealing typewriters, a charge they have been known to use on various dissident elements. In addition they charged him with interstate flight to avoid prosecution because he took a vacation trip up north several months ago. They also told him they believed he had some connection with the bombings in Berkeley last year.

These charges are all probably false. What isn't false is the threat that this action holds for revolutionary elements who persist in telling people the truth about this society and the need for change.

Dutch's wife Janet is trying to organize some sort of defense for him. All their money was used in paying the retainer fee for a lawyer and they still need \$6,000 for bail to get him out of jail. At the free open poetry reading at Shakespeare and Company bookstore (telly and dwight) this Sunday at 8 p.m. books that Dutch printed will be given away free and donations will be collected and sent on for his defense.

"We never hurt anybody," Janet told me. "We just want to make this a good place for people to live." Anyone wishing to contribute to Dutch's defense so he can get out and continue his vital work while defending himself against slanderous efforts of the establishment to silence him, should send money or contributions to the Darrell Kerr Defense Fund, 255 Lakeshire Drive in Daly City. All checks should be made out to Janet Huffman.

Silence in these times of repression is criminal. As brother Eldridge Cleaver said, "If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem." --rk

"If we are to preserve our academic integrity, we must be willing to accept the fact that we do not have experimental education when a course such as Contemporary Soviet Civilization is turned down for essentially political reasons ..."

This course was to be taught by William Mandel, author of "Russia Re-Examined."

Mandel told BARB Wednesday, "Students at Berkeley reading Russian history (from their reading-lists) would think Khrushchev was still Premier of the USSR."

For a university like UC to be so out of date on Russia is stupid. But then, so are the Regents. Consider: Russia today is to be taught (if at all) under an "experimental" program of education!

MURRAY'S ANGRY VOW

"The only time I'll ever come back to Cal is when the fight's going on in terms of buildings blowing up, the president of the university or the chancellor killed, racist professors driven off campus and stabbed in the back, lying there bleeding and calling for the police."

A Forum on the Crisis at SF State took place on the Berkeley campus Monday night. But the scene had more to do with the separations between the strike leaders from State and their UC audience of about a hundred than anything else.

George Murray is the man who ended the Forum with a bitter, angry vow never to return to Cal until violent revolution had broken out here. Murray is a leader of the Black Students Union at State and is also Minister of Education in the Black Panther Party. Murray led in to his harsh rebuke to the audience by noting both he and Jack Alexis, another BSU leader, would probably have their paroles revoked Wednesday because of their roles in the struggle at State.

"They're going to send us on the same trip they sent Brother Eldridge on," Murray said.

"I have only two more days out of the jailhouse," he continued. "It takes a lot to come over here to talk to people who couldn't even make sure that brother Eldridge's course would be accredited or that he's paid."

And then Murray made his promise never to return to Cal, until, ironically, he was speaking in the same lecture hall in which Eldridge Cleaver had taught Social Analysis 139X.

This confrontation between SF State revolutionaries and Berkeley radicals came about when a chick in the audience asked how the speakers "want the Berkeley movement to help you, by coming over there, or by doing our own thing here?"

Roger Alvarado, a chicano leader of the Third World Liberation Front, replied by subtly putting down the said movement. He remarked as how, living in the Bay Area, he had heard a great deal about the Berkeley movement and how it was in the vanguard. "The people in this room can

make three SF States in terms of this institution here," Murray added to what Alvarado was saying.

Alvarado let on as how the difference between the radicals at Berkeley and the strikers at SF State is that "at SF State you don't have people standing up and saying there's racism, what you have is something much deeper than raising questions, the basis of our struggle is what is commonly described as a program."

But Alvarado felt the lack of a program in Berkeley to eliminate racism was the fault of the leaders rather than the people. "The people keep showing up, the people keep getting their heads busted by the pigs."

The demands of the Third World strikers at State, he went on, are not "something that was hap-

think

hazardly put together. They are something we have no other choice but to fight for."

The strike at SFS has 'been able to survive longer than the struggle of any other student movement because the demands have their basis in work, creativity, consideration, and our needs as human beings."

Alvarado also said that he thinks "there's no doubt in anyone's mind that what's happening at SF State is only the beginning of the struggle. People live in a condition of complete impotence under a system which will never provide for them an opportunity to exercise self-determination over their destinies."

Dr. Jerry Podell of the AFT professors union at State and Hal Draper of the TA's union also spoke at the forum. Podell was in a tight position because the sanction given to the AFT strike by the San Francisco Labor Council ruled the students' demands out of bounds for the professors.

The AFT representative avoided mentioning the fifteen demands of

the TWLF and did not say whether or not the AFT strikers considered the students' demands non-negotiable. Podell did promise, however, that "We won't go back to work till the Third World people tell us they've had satisfaction of their demands."

As an example of how the strikers are being repressed at State, Hal Draper rapped about how he had been informed that he would not be rehired as a TA next semester because of lack of funds (too much money was being diverted to the black studies program).

"The chairman of my department was supposed to be a flaming radical in the thirties," Draper said, "but now he doesn't have the balls to say, 'Draper, you're fired because of your political activities.'"

The evening's one shared amusement was provided by a cat who told Alvarado and Murray that he wanted to bring some high school kids from Pleasantville to the State campus the next morning. The snag, he felt, was that it wouldn't be a sufficiently educational experience for them to walk in a picket line all day. Would the strike leaders please arrange some kind of educational confrontation for the high schoolers with the pigs?

Alvarado dealt with the question by explaining that "anybody who gets a thrill out of combating pigs needs to be locked up. You can get that experience any time you want it; just walk up to a pig and spit in his face, he'll beat you righteously."

Murray sought to satisfy the questioner by suggesting that "you tell them to burn down their school in Pleasantville. If they do it, they're serious; if not, they're jiving."

As for their perspectives on the strike's future, Draper predicted that it would develop into a general strike in San Francisco. Alvarado said unboastfully that "People of the Third World are committed to the struggle until the point of getting what we need from this country, or we are prepared to defend our right to self-determination to whatever extent or implication that involves."

"The point is that some of us have nothing to lose."

CRUSADE IN MOVE TO FREE MESSIAH

Monday, January 13 an attempt will be made to get the Messiah out of San Francisco County Jail.

Attorney Richard Cohen will file a Writ of Habeas Corpus in San Francisco court for the release of Allen, the Cosmic Messiah imprisoned for an alleged pot rap since December 13. The Messiah's followers claim his bail was illegally raised to keep him behind bars.

"The Messiah is the inspiration for the Messiah's World Crusade," Dian one of his followers, told BARB this week. "He has a beautiful plan for the world and it works," she said.

"The Messiah's World Crusade works for a positive non-violent revolution, an artistic and creative revolution which will start in San Francisco," Dian said. "We show straight people how farcical are the things they take seriously."

Barry Koral, a photographer for the Messiah's World Crusade explained that the group only attracts creative people because they all have the same vibes. Everyone in the Crusade has a creative talent, be it in food, dance, music or clothmaking.

"I myself was attracted by the high energies directed at me by them," he said.

Everything in the groups is held in common. "We show that the world can work as a unified family without material possessions," Dian said. "All the crime and wars are due to the commercial way of life."

"Because of our positive vibrations we can make police put down their clubs," she said. This occurred, she remarked, on New Years Eve as the group was singing in front of the County Jail where the Messiah is incarcerated. Dian claims the cops there actually participated and enjoyed themselves in the demonstration.

The Messiah's World Crusade contends all natural foods are psychedelic. "If people would stop eating plastic food, their heads and bodies would be cleansed," Dian said. "Consequently the vibrations of this planet would rise."

Allen, the Cosmic Messiah, was arrested while watching the trial of another crusader, Bill Best.

TO MEET WITH THOSE WHO DID IT

A public meeting on the communications gap in regard to SF State, labor strikes, and news in general will be held in Berkeley next week.

Speakers include Roger Alvarado and Mason Wong of the TWLF, and Bridges Randall of the BSU at SF State; also, representatives of the white's Student Strike - Support Committee, and the American Federation of Teachers.

Spokesmen from organized labor include members of the International Atomic and Oil Workers Union, who are presently out on strike.

The East Bay Community Strike Support Committee, sponsoring the meeting, strongly urges everyone who has had any doubts in their heads about what is happening, REALLY happening, to attend the meeting.

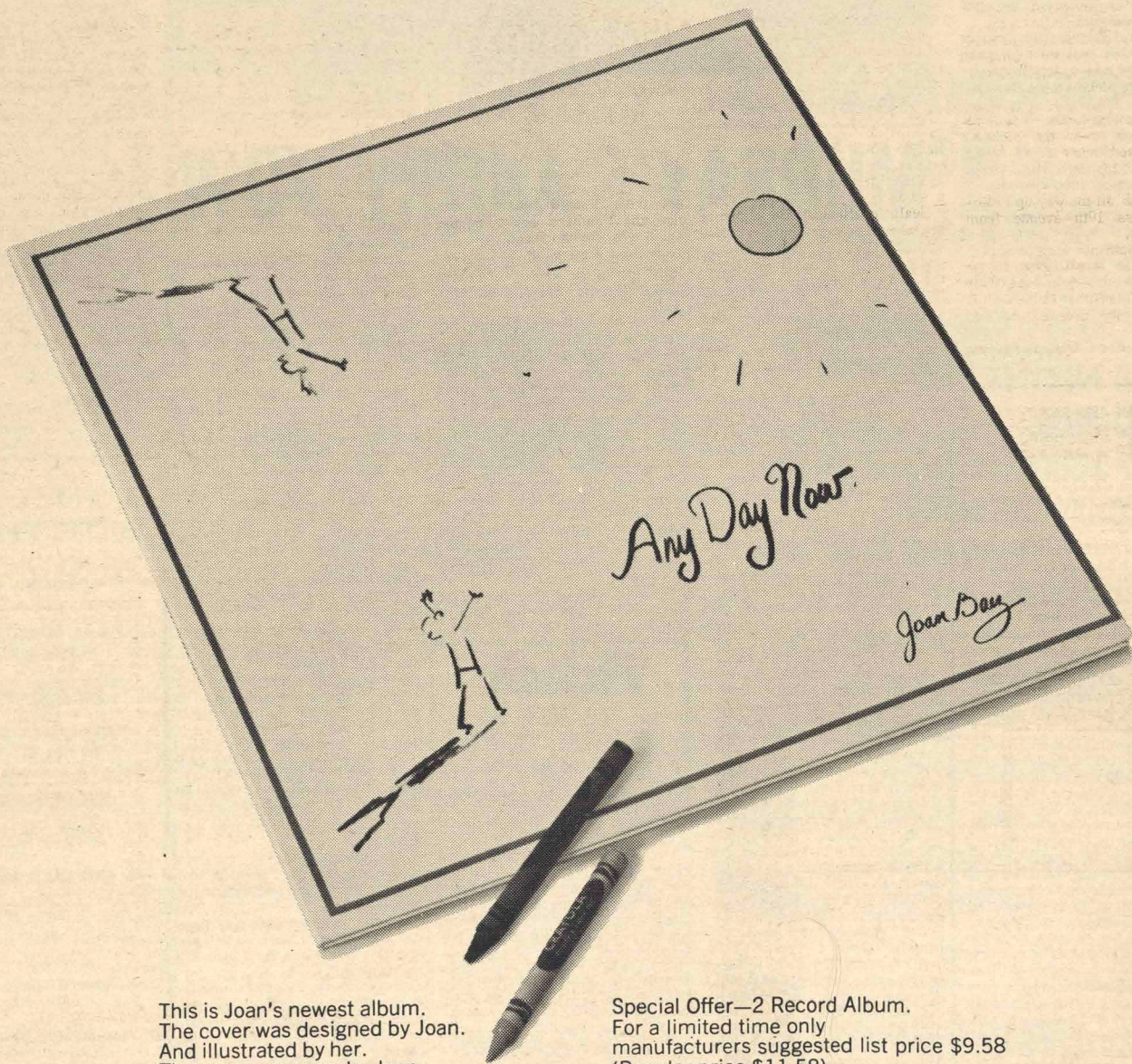
The EBCSSC feels that people should go directly to the SF State Campus; but if you couldn't make the meeting to hear the facts on the strike for sure.

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STRAIGHT PRESS FINDS OUT HOW BARB GETS NEWS

SEVEN, YUP MASSIVE INQUIRY SET

SF STATE, Wednesday-- A SF Chronicle reporter, John Leaning, was slugged in the jaw and kicked while down on the ground by a man in civilian clothes who turned out to be Inspector Jack Webb of the SF Police Department.

The Inspector, however, said he was chasing student "rock-throwers" when he collided with the reporter with such force he fell to the ground.

"I might have struck him," he was quoted as saying by Jim Benet of Chan 9's 'Newsroom' (who had TV film of the fight), "but I did not kick him on the ground."

The reporter was arrested as he had a SF Chronicle photographer take a picture "of the man who hit me."

It was then the Inspector revealed himself as a police officer by arresting the reporter.

Later, all charges were dropped. While being taken down to the Hall of So-Called Justice, Benet reported that the SF Chronicle reporter said the police made a man lie on the floor of the paddy-wagon while "they beat a tattoo on his backbone with billy-clubs. They also made another man stand up all the way while twisting his arms."

The police have denied this took place in the wagon. This action grew out of a double-whammy against the SF State striking students and the AFT professors. A court-ordered injunction against the strike was issued, and, police made pickets keep five feet apart.

This police-action brought direct-action from the pickets. They refused, some threw rocks or sticks. This, in turn, brought in the mounted fuzz who chased the students all the way up Holloway, across 19th avenue from the campus.

Eight students were arrested, including the strolling-troubador (his second arrest), and the black girl who told off that white Drama student as she crossed the line yesterday.

For the first time, it became

headline news that attendance was way off, as much as 80%, in spite of S. I. Hayakawa's contrary statements.

What effect the no-strike order will have on the picket line is not clear. While the AFT may not picket, the thousands of students will. Whether they will keep five feet apart, stay OFF the campus -- nobody knows (as BARB goes to press) -- but try and guess. --G.K.

PANTHERS PLEDGE ACTIVE SUPPORT TO HASSLED 7

The BlackPanthers are actively supporting the Oakland Seven.

Bobby Seale, Party chairman, announced Tuesday the Panthers have launched a nitty gritty campaign in the black communities of the Bay Area to mobilize support for the Oakland Seven.

Seale spoke at a noon rally in front of Sproul Hall on the UC campus. The rally was called to mobilize campus support for the Seven, whose trial begins next week in Oakland. They are up on conspiracy charges arising out of the Stop the Draft Week demonstrations at the Oakland Induction Center last year.

Seale denounced the Man's "jive tactics to make permanent political prisoners out of the Oakland Seven." He called for "all black people to come together against the action of the court system."

Seale challenged the audience to take the same revolutionary trip Eldridge Cleaver was on, coalition of black and white against the Man and his System. The revolutionary struggle will be waged, he prophesied, "by allied organizations regardless of ethnic group who will get down to nitty gritty dealing with the pig power structure."

"We ask those of you who don't want to act in a racist manner to come stand in the demonstration outside the courthouse on Monday," he said.

Quoting Cleaver, Seale stated what was needed to topple this "decadent, racist, imperialist system in America is 'Revolution in the white mother country, liberation in the black community.'"

The Panthers are supporting the Oakland Seven, Seale explained, "not because they're white, but because we recognize that we have a common enemy."

Monday, January 13, the power structure brings the Oakland Seven to trial at the Alameda County Courthouse. They are charged with "conspiracy" as a result of the October 1967 Stop The Draft Week demonstrations.

Thursday, January 16, supporters of the Oakland Seven will convene a Commission of Inquiry that will attempt to expose that power structure.

For four days, January 16 to 19, experts will scrutinize the

powers behind the Vietnam war and political repression in the United States. They will focus particularly on repression in the Bay Area.

These experts will take the stand in Pauley Ballroom (U.C. erk.) They include:

Boston University historian Howard Zinn; San Francisco State professor and former assemblyman William Stanton; new left activist Tom Hayden; former Maryknoll priest Arthur Melville, recently expelled from Guatemala for his political activity; Ramparts editors David Welsh and David Horowitz; Barry Silverman, Research Director of the ILWU; William Domhoff, author of "Who Rules America"; Jeff Sharlet, a Vietnam veteran and editor of "Vietnam GI"; and one of the Ft. Hood Three, recently released from Leavenworth after refusing to fight in Vietnam.

Also to be heard from will be victims of police brutality and political harassment from all over the Bay area.

Films will backup the witnesses. Included are the first showing of a film on Stop The Draft Week, a Cuban film on Hanoi, an NLF film on defoliation, three Black Panther films, "Off The Pig", "Prelude To A Revolution" and "Huey", a Newsreel film on riot weapons, and an Army training film produced by the Pentagon, "Why Vietnam". There will also be a special showing of "No Vietnamese Ever Called Me Nigger."

The members of the Commission are U.C. professors William Kornhauser and Franz Schurman, journalists Andrew Kopkind and Donald Duncan, Black Panther National Captain David Hilliard, and former SDS national president Todd Gitlin.

Attorney Terence Hallinan will act as "people's advocate", presenting and summarizing the testimony.

Organizers of the Commission have stressed that it is NOT another War Crimes Tribunal. They do not intend to reach a verdict. Their purpose is to show the community why the Oakland Seven were indicted, and who are the real powers behind that indictment and other acts of repression in the Bay Area.

Stanton will draw on his experiences in the California State Assembly to reveal how laws are really made, and who really makes them. Joseph Blum, editor of The Movement, and a former graduate student in Criminology will talk about crimes committed by corporations which go unpunished. This testimony will attempt to show how the law serves power.

ILWU research director Silverman will talk about the economic effects of the war, and Jeffrey Schevitz will discuss the militarization of the Bay Area economy. Arthur Melville who spent many years in Guatemala as a priest will describe how imperialism generates revolution. Domhoff will discuss the foreign policy establishment, and Tom Hayden will talk on the military situation in Vietnam. This section is designed to show how the war serves power.

Howard Zinn, author of "The Logic of Withdrawal" and a new book "Democracy and Civil Disobedience" will challenge the concepts advanced by Supreme Court

Justice Abe Fortas on civil disobedience. Zinn's new book is a critique of the Fortas attack on civil liberties.

The organizers of the Commission stress the fact that they do not expect it to be just a series of speeches. There will be questioning from both the people's advocate, from the members of the Commission, and possibly from the audience and the press.

While the opening of the Commission on the 16th will be the beginning of the movement's counter-attack, there will be some preliminaries. A large crowd is expected to accompany the Oakland Seven to court on January 13th.

The many people who signed the "Heartfelt Confession" printed in last week's Barb will turn them in to Alameda County DA Frank Coakley on the first day of the trial. (They are not legally binding). There were some however who felt that the Heartfelt Confession was a bit too frivolous. For those who want a more serious confession, the Stop The Draft Week Defense Committee has drawn one up.

A demonstration and rally will take place at the courthouse at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, January 13. Before then, the San Francisco Mime Troupe will give the second of two benefit performances for the Oakland Seven, on Saturday, January 11 at 8 p.m. in Wheeler Auditorium.

In order to raise money for the Oakland Seven Defense Fund, and to produce some good vibrations, a benefit rock dance has been scheduled for Thursday evening, January 16, beginning at 8 p.m., also in Pauley Ballroom. This will be just after the opening session of the Commission on Thursday afternoon.

Bands which have donated their services for the benefit are the Steve Miller Band, Mad River, Sons of Champlin, Mint Tattoo, Frumious Bandersnatch, All Men Joy, and the Better Half. There will be a light show by Optics Illusion. Admission is \$2 per person and \$3 a couple.

"The same grand jury that indicted Huey P. Newton indicted the Oakland Seven. The Oakland Seven came out for Huey to be set free," Seale recalled, and now the Panthers are doing the same thing for the Seven.

He said he was hip to the fact that white opponents of the Man are feeling the same repression by which the Panthers have been victimized. Running down his memories of the Induction Center demonstrations, he said "they literally beat the heads of the people, cracked their skulls."

The Panther spokesman bitterly denounced "Nigger Cecil Poole" for the federal attorney's role in the repression of the demonstration. Nigger is a word the Panthers use for "so-called black men" like Poole, Seale explained, and "Chief pig Gain and Nigger Cecil Poole were all part and parcel of jacking off on the people."

Returning to his theme of black-white coalition against the pig power structure, Seale declared the Panthers "recognize that it's necessary to sophisticate the revolutionary struggle."

"We've been hollering all power to the people," Seale went on, "and we know that many of the allies are going to be white people with black people. We know that with all the shit white people are caught in now, it's going to take black people to get them out of it, or blow it up."

Of Eldridge, Seale said that the Man's repression "has forced Eldridge Cleaver into a degree of exile." But Seale stressed the word "degree," strongly implying, as Kathleen Cleaver had done two weeks earlier, that even underground Eldridge is continuing his work with the Panthers.

Three members of the Seven also spoke at the rally which was attended by some three hundred persons. Frank Bardacke declared that "they should pin medals on us, not put us in jail."

"If I could think of an appropriate slogan for the court system," Bardacke added, "it would be Shut it Down!"

Terry Cannon, another member of the Seven, spoke about the various alternatives to the present draft system which are now being discussed within the halls of reason. "The question is not what kind of an army you have," Cannon claimed, "nor who's in it, but how it's used. We want no imperial army."

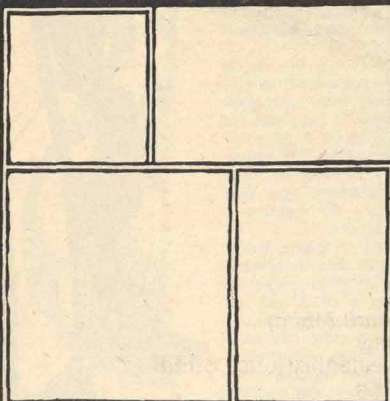

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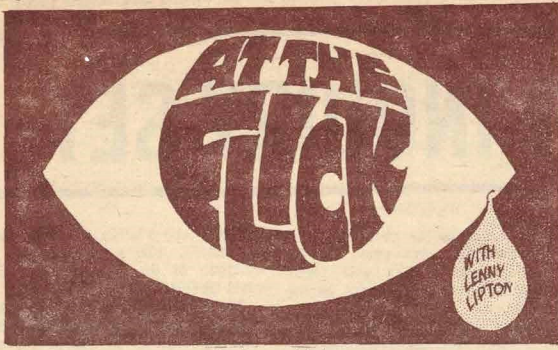

SHE WHAT WE NEED

I am writing in support of the article "Where Most Men Fail." I feel women now neither have the advantages of the traditional female role nor the advantages of liberation.

I also feel feminine women are at the greatest disadvantage. The vast majority of jobs available for women even with a BA are low paying, impersonal, uncreative and often force one to be hardened, cynical or artificial and phony. Softness, warmth, femininity and creativity only make one more vulnerable to the machine.

Also, most women I know, no matter what amount of education, consider their relationships with men to be more important than jobs and many women also want children. Many men nowadays don't believe in the "trap" of marriage or any commitment to one girl -- they go from girl to girl and use "freedom" as an excuse for lack of emotional involvement and commitment.

I think most women need some emotional involvement. If a girl makes a mistake with birth control and misses a pill, she is forced into a lifetime burden because of the prudish imprisoning abortion laws. Because of our great sexual freedom, men feel no responsibility for helping a girl he gets pregnant.

True, it is her mistake, but it isn't easy going thru the physical and psychological pains of giving birth to a child with no man's emotional support. And it's harder raising a child without a man around or being a child without a father. The woman must work and be father and mother and be emotionally drained and hardened -- or else live on a small amount of welfare.

Communes, which can be like large, extended families, seem one solution to the problem. But there are very few communes with old people in them. When you walk down skid row, do you ever wonder what it is like to die in loneliness, male or female?

You may not know it, but men have built up a series of prejudices against women that far exceed racial prejudice in degree, unless you look upon women as another race, and some people do.

The day of reckoning has arrived for San Francisco rock music. An unprecedented concentrated upsurge in musical freedom and creativity over the past three years has brought San Francisco world recognition as being the undisputed home of American new rock.

Some have even chosen to call it the "Liverpool of the West." The thin ranks of the few foundation bands of 1965 have now swelled to mammoth proportions, with the constant arrival of new talent spawning tens and maybe hundreds of new groups (there are 1500 in Northern California).

While eastern critics and other skeptics lament that the San Francisco scene has crested and is going downhill, local ensembles continue to sign substantial recording contracts with industry giants. (The latest are It's A Beautiful Day and Santana, both on Columbia, and the Sons of Champlin with Capitol).

One might reasonably speculate that as much as a million dollars in advances alone has been paid out to these groups. Record racks everywhere from New York to the Potrero Hill White Front are stuffed with lps recorded by locally based artists.

With success, however, frequently comes departure. The Jefferson Airplane is a prime example of this. Since making its splash in 1966 the Airplane's San Francisco gigs have gotten fewer and further between. Ditto for most of the other name groups.

This dumps the responsibility of perpetuating the scene directly into the laps of what are being called the "Generation" bands. Nobody knows how many "generations" of bands there have been in San Francisco. Most people talk in terms of four or five.

In any event it is these younger bands who must now provide the energy to keep the scene alive in a creative sense. They are now the stimulus for the audience response.

It is no secret that becoming a "draw," that is getting the people to pay their bread to come to see you play, is a difficult hurdle to make. It takes good musicianship, good audience-performer interaction and a consistency of being at

But the thing it takes most is gigs. If the bands have nowhere to play, they are lost. Jimi Hendrix would be Joe Shmuck if all he was able to do was play and jam in his basement.

With this in mind, be it publicly known that the Avalon Ballroom will reopen January 24, under new but groovy management. Also be it known that the displaced Family Dog will stage dances at Winterland on the weekends of the 17th and 24th.

I'm certain this comes as welcome news and a mild relief to many musicians and music fans everywhere. However, the difficult days are only beginning.

The Avalon has been obtained by Gary Scanlan and Bob Simmons, both former Family Dog employees. They have many good thoughts and plans for its use which, if successful, will be a solid shot in the arm for San Francisco music.

At the same time The Family Dog is probably the organization most responsible for San Francisco as it is today. A vote of confidence is certainly due these people.

Unfortunately, the type of vote with the most impact is the dollar. In its own sickly green way it is the only thing that will keep the bands alive and the dancehalls from closing.

"All music to the People!" to paraphrase a familiar cry. But it has to work both ways -- "All people to the Music!"

It was brought home to me in a startling manner several weeks ago when, through a mix-up, I was forced to pay three bills to get into the Fillmore even though I was supposed to be on the guest list. At first I was a bit irate about having to relinquish funds which I didn't really think I could spare.

Then I thought a minute and realized that it was probably the first time in a year and a half that I had paid to get into a major San Francisco ballroom, even though I went regularly.

Granted there are certain advantages and courtesies offered the Press. But it finally registered with me what a friend had asked me just days earlier ... "If you had the bread, would you pay to get in instead of being a guest?"

The Family Dog lost thousands of dollars every weekend because of their elaborate guest list. Most of the guests had either worked there at one time, were dealers who had supported the scene in its early days, or were members of local bands.

Many of these people could have afforded the price of admission, but none did and the Dog suffered heavily because of it.

Which brings us to the present situation. The myriad of freebies and friends who have slipped in over the past years probably won't find their names on the list at the Avalon or Winterland this month, or at any date in the foreseeable future. Don't bitch.

The time has come for Everyone to stand be counted, even if it is by way of dirty rotten money. THIS is the true crisis facing the San Francisco rock scene. Do you give a damn about your tribe?

Perhaps Berry Gordy had it covered when he wrote, "Your love give me such a thrill, But your love don't pay my bill, I need..."

I'll be at those dances and I expect to pay.

 told the press Tuesday that Bloom's firing resulted from a misunderstanding concerning the procedures for notice of dismissal," Hallinan said. "Both sides have agreed that Jack Bloom keeps his position as a TA until the hearing is completed."
 Bloom appeared pleased to have won back his job, but said, "I think this was a typical example of the constant attempts by the University to carry out political discrimination and repression as far as possible. They gave me back my job only when threatened with legal action."
 Steve Engleman noted that AFT 1570 still had the right to call for a strike vote if Bloom is dismissed after the hearing.
 After 1570 also took action to

support another member in trouble with the administration. Dave Kotz, union member dismissed last fall after the Moses Hall sit-in, will receive union aid in seeking reinstatement. The union will attempt to get some support in this case from the Alameda County Labor Council.

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

BLUESKIN SHIVA READY TO RIDE

Blueskinned Shiva will ride again on his living tiger's skin.

Devotees will resume their marijuana communions in SF's Golden Gate Park Jan. 12, as a sacrifice to the Hindu god. The services were held regularly last June and July until the Shiva Fellowship's Rev. Wilbur Minzey had to serve 120 days in jail for wearing a loincloth.

"We will gather at 1:00 PM every Sunday, on Hippy Hill, and offer the holy cannabis sacrament to Shiva. He will take what he wants, including any poisons, then we'll smoke the remainder," Minzey told BARB. "We won't get busted as long as everyone keeps their clothes on. The park fuzz don't mind our marijuana, just our skin."

He asked worshippers to "bring pot, wine and picnic food to share, tribal banners, musical instruments, animals, children and balloons."

Meanwhile his Neo-American colleague Rev. J. Fuck Poland reported that nothing fails like success. "As an evangelistic effort, we mailed free pot samples to religious seekers who had never

turned on before. We sent two lids of joints to 55 people. Counting our BARB ad, the proselytizing cost \$45, and we can't afford to repeat it."

Most observers had predicted a bust, so no plans were made for routine pot mailings. "If you are outrageous enough about breaking a law," Poland commented, "sometimes they don't dare touch you. Like Pat Maginnis' abortion referral service, or the Hippy Hill smoke-ins."

Poland hinted at a possible repeat mailing if keys and lids of grass, plus money, were donated to the N-A Church. Mail sent c/o Poland will reach him at P.O. Box 6196, SF 94101.

SOCIAL COMMENT:

An interviewer on a Los Angeles television program recently asked me to declare whether I was for or against abortion. To my way of thinking, this question was one of a categorical nature. The apparent implication, as far as I could see, seemed to be a choice between having all or no babies born. In other words, if I WERE in favor of abortion it would follow that all conceptions should be terminated. If I were against abortion, all conceptions would result in births. I don't see this issue as a for or against problem. There are those who wish to consider this alternative totally unacceptable. For all intents and purposes they are free to follow these views as they see fit. But is it reasonable for these people to force their beliefs upon others?

What the interviewer seemed to be missing was the possibility of choice. It is my contention that there must be an alternative to the humiliation which seems to be inevitable when a young woman becomes pregnant at an improper time. This humiliation is terrible if the girl must have a child against her will. It might even be worse in the event of her attempt to obtain a termination of her pregnancy. Despite the fact that she must bow before two psychiatrists, a gynecologist, and a hospital board, she must pay between four and six hundred dollars and totally relinquish her privacy by signing many implicating forms.

The average individual in the medical profession seems to have one overriding interest in this matter: money. To take advantage of someone in trouble is not a professional act. Understanding, compassion, and caring are the currency which seems to be lacking on the part of our society in relation to this problem. Many doctors are so fearful of this situation that they won't even have anything to do with the legal processes which are available. Many times its purely a matter of ignorance. But more often than not, they don't wish to buck the massive ignorance and indignation of their clientele. Again we find ourselves up against the dollar. After all, what good would it do for the man to compromise his earning ability and comfort by fighting for human rights? There seems to be some progress in the

works, but until then the utmost care is necessary in dealing with unwanted pregnancies. Maybe someday there will be understanding and compassion.

In the state of California abortion is already legalized. The only trouble is that the one who has the choice "for" or "against" terminating the pregnancy is not the one who is pregnant. The issue of abortion is past. What we are now trying to decide is who shall have the choice.

I have yet to see an unborn child suffer on this earth but ten thousand of us starve to death each day. Perhaps after we are able to grant the right of survival to all viable post-natal human beings we will be able to afford the luxury of granting metaphysical and legal considerations to the fetus and perhaps even sperms and ova. Perhaps man should create new life as an act of will and not one of chance.

PRACTICAL COMMENT:

If you are pregnant there are many considerations which should be made. Perhaps the following suggestions will be of assistance:

- 1.) If you are a teenage girl under the age of 18, you become, in the eyes of California Law, an adult the moment you become pregnant. You are then able to sign for, as an adult, any standard medical services you feel you need and this includes a therapeutic abortion. You may do this without any obligation to inform or involve your parents no matter how vigorously people insist that you should tell them.
- 2.) Most girls who believe that their parents won't understand or help, find themselves to be quite mistaken. Most of the time the resources of help and understanding are available, but the lines of trust along which these resources flow are in need of reestablishment.
- 3.) Any girl 14 and above not living with her parents and declaring herself an emancipated minor is entitled to consideration as an adult according to California Law and may obtain any medical help she needs.

- 4.) If you are told of any doctor in the bay area who promises a miscarriage by the use of pills or shots don't fall for it. These medications are effective for the induction of a late period only and not for miscarriage. If you are told that someone was successful with this method, see if you can find out whether she had previously had a competent, positive, medical test for pregnancy. The answer will probably be no, meaning she was most probably just late and not actually pregnant.
- 5.) Be very careful in the use of mimeographed lists of doctors who perform abortions. These lists are sometimes sold for as much as twenty dollars and might give very dangerous and antiquated information. There have been many girls who have called my office having just returned to the bay area after spending large sums on plane fares, wandering the streets of Mexico, and having close calls or trouble with the Mexican police. They did this in hopes of calling one of the numbers listed and obtaining help only to be turned away or arrested.

AGAIN, BE CAREFUL OF MIMEOGRAPHED LISTS, THEY OFTEN LEAD TO TROUBLE!

- 6.) Abortion is illegal in Mexico, therefore the utmost care should be exercised.
- 7.) Abortion is very illegal and dangerous in the United States. Records show that from two to three hundred women died in the U.S. last year as a result of botched abortions and thirty of these were in California.
- 8.) Fifty percent of the maternal deaths in this country result from poor abortions.
- 9.) A medically competent abortion is three times as safe as gestation and childbirth.
- 10.) If you obtain an abortion of any kind, see a local doctor immediately. Most doctors will respect your privacy and needs for post-abortion care.

An AFT spokesman, according to 'Newsroom's' Jim Benet, told S. I. Hayakawa that "such arrests on the picket line increases tension" and asked that they be

stopped. Hayakawa replied it was out of his hands.

WEDNESDAY

The scabs had a harder time getting to class Wednesday. Shouts of "Scab" were really hitting and I guess Hayakawa was having trouble eating his lunch again.

Down in Stonestown people could hear "This is Lieutenant blah, you are disturbing the people of California blah." Two minutes of silence and the pigs bust through the Campus at 19th and Holloway. The AFT couldn't react to pig force but the students did. They were forced into 19th street. "Stay in the street -- don't let traffic through."

The pig sergeants turned around a few times, smacked the hell out of a Chronicle reporter and then sent for about seventy-five more pigs as well as a dozen mounted on horses.

For the next fifteen minutes the essence of the whole SF State conflict plays itself out.

The pigs duck from the rocks

and bottles, point their sticks -- "You Fucking Pigs," the crowd shouts, and the pigs duck from a few more rocks. I see the horses down the street and split down Junipero Serra Street.

The horses aren't galloping, but I have to run my ass off. About a dozen people including me split into the woods and make it back down to the campus.

The pigs spend the rest of the afternoon looking for people that might have thrown rocks and two or three busts are made.

Those fifteen minutes are why SF State is not just a strike. Reagan's determination to keep State open "even at the point of a bayonet" is being met by people willing to face those bayonets. And by people who have the will to win.

Here is how Jerry Varnado spelled it out for BARB: "The BSU will use the Strike as an advantage until that is exhausted, and then it will go on to other tactics. They can bust everyone in the Central Committee of the Black Student Union but people will continue to take their place. We will fight to the death on principles."

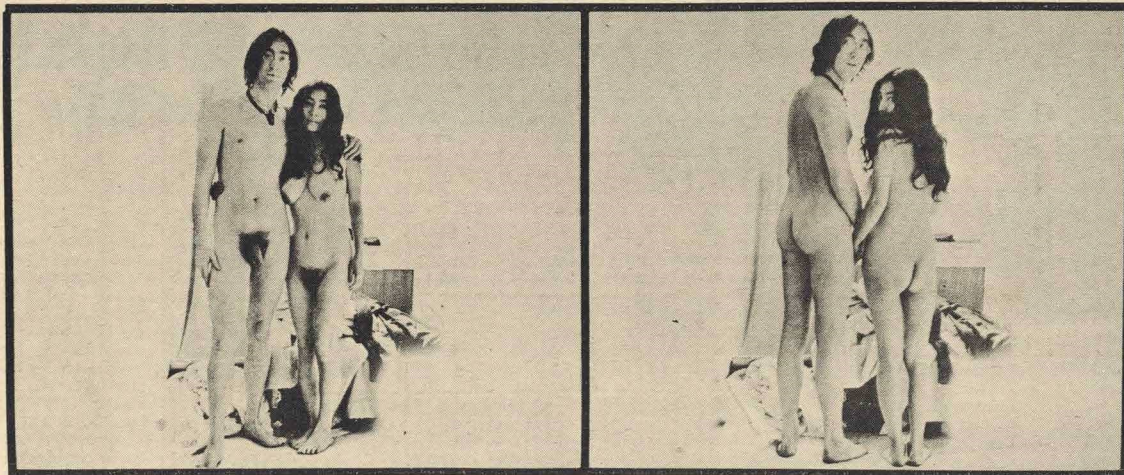

QUESTION: Can you tell me if a marijuana cigarette contains tar and nicotine and, if so, would smoking through a waterpipe decrease the amount inhaled?

ANSWER: There is no nicotine (that dangerous drug) contained in marijuana. When marijuana is smoked tars are produced but nothing is known about their potential harm. It is said that the effect of smoking through a waterpipe mainly cools the smoke produced. However, if water-soluble components are removed, the composition of inhaled smoke from a water pipe will be different from a joint. Some dope fiends believe there is a definite difference between the effect produced by smoking marijuana in a water pipe and a joint.

QUESTION: When we go to an M.D. we are supposed to take their word as gospel. Yet they differ greatly

on such things as pot, fluoridation of water, giving birth in a semi-sleeping state, hormones during menopause, etc. Cannot a patient after studying the two sides of a controversy demand the treatment he chooses if he signs a waiver?

ANSWER: One reason physicians differ greatly in their opinion of certain subjects is that often definitive answers are not yet known. The practice of medicine is neither an art nor a science, but a blend of the two. A patient cannot demand a treatment from a physician because he need not treat anyone. Few lay people have the necessary medical background and information to decide which kind of treatment is required. Only yesterday a girl asked me to write a prescription for a drug to relieve the discomfort caused by a bladder infection. When I asked if she had had a recent urinalysis and visit to her physician, she replied that she wanted to wait until the symptoms disappeared.

QUESTION: What is your opinion of macrobiotics? Can the body create all the necessary proteins and vitamins from whole grains?

ANSWER: So far as I know, no scientific study has been made of macrobiotics. Several reports have appeared in medical journals, however, which tell of malnourished individuals who have followed macrobiotic diets to the extreme. The body is capable of manufacturing certain vitamins but it cannot produce proteins and all vitamins from whole grains. For example, Vitamin C, or ascorbic acid, cannot be stored in the body and a diet deficient in this vitamin will result in scurvy.

QUESTION: I am enclosing an article from the EAST VILLAGE OTHER about a "memory drug" called magnesium pemoline (Cylert). Could you tell me more about the permanent effects of this drug and if it really works? P.S. If it's really ok, where can you get it?

ANSWER: Preliminary research indicates that magnesium pemoline does improve memory when taken over a period of weeks. This is still an experimental drug which is not yet available for prescription.

QUESTION: At what time during her monthly cycle can a girl get pregnant, and what times, if any, are safe?

ANSWER: Because of individual variations in ovulation, pregnancy may occur at any time during the menstrual cycle, including menstruation. Chances for pregnancy are reduced if intercourse occurs a week prior to the menstrual period and for five days following, assuming a 28-day cycle. But unless you are prepared for pregnancy, don't play Vatican roulette.

ILWU MOVES AGAINST TAC SQUAD

The longshoremen's union has partially busted out of Joe Alito's corral. The ILWU's Northern California District Council has demanded that the SF police Tactical Squad be dissolved.

This came after the Tac Squad worked over pickets at Kaiser medical center last month.

They weren't ILWU pickets, but they were union pickets, and the union feels more strongly about drawing their blood, perhaps, than about fuzzi cracking skulls of students, hippies and the general public. It's a start, anyhow.

The NCCDC is a delegated body representing all ILWU local unions in the northern part of the state. Their resolution calls the Tac Squad "strikebreakers," and asks "all locals to take a similar position."

Roger Alvarado, a leader of the Third World Liberation Front, told BARB he believed that the AFT had no other choice but to defy the courts and continue the strike.

"For them not to have taken this position would have really hurt the whole national movement in terms of public employees," he said.

Gary Hopkins, president of the AFT local at State, told BARB that the union regarded the injunction against the strike to be illegal.

About the AFT's degree of commitment to their strike, Hopkins said, "It won't be possible to return to work until the student grievances have been resolved."

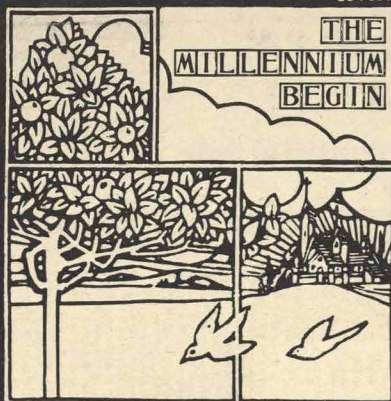
