SF STATE MASS ARRESTS

(as phoned in by Art Gottlieb)

Thursday 3:30 pm-I saw the pigs turn a peaceful rally into a massacre earlier this afternoon.

I saw them trap 500 or more people against the speakers stand.

I saw clubs rise, fall and rise to strike again.

A guy next to me is knocked down.

A girl gets smacked in the back with a

Inside the trap, I see pigs beating women in the pits of their stomachs.

The clubs are flailing and one whacks me in the ribs.

A three-deep wall of pigs surrounds the victims.

Shouts of "Medic! Medic!" come from the crowd.

A medical aide gets pushed back by

"Out, out, out, nobody gets through this line," yells a lieutenant.

I see the wooden speaker-stand falling as people try to escape.

A hole is made. But the pigs rush into it. They flail with their clubs, jabbing and felling the helpless crowd.

I can see a Chicano youth holding a rag to his bleeding forehead. A bearded man crumples. I hear the crack of a club smashing the side of his head.

"Get that asshole," yells a pig. "This club is just itching for your ass . . . Move out punk."

More pleas of Medic, Medic, come from the trap. But a five deep wall of pigs now bars the way.

The massacre began about 12:30. A half hour before about 400 people ga-

"More than 700 students were holding out in a dozen (Tokyo U) buildings when 8500 riot police moved into the campus" - AP. For two days, these students held off the combined efforts of helicopters dumping liquid teargas, police armed and dressed like medieval Knights of old replete with ladders to scale the castle walls.

The "final attack" brought 6000 cops into the "last stronghold" of the students, the main auditorium building. There, in full view of American TV, the students held out to the last, with umbrellas, rocks, and fire-bombs.

And, once again, the irony of events is played out on page 5 of the SF Chronicle's 'Sunday Punch' section, Jan 19. There, in full view of its readers, is a putdown cartoon illustrating that stupid article by UC's John R. Searle for his "Seenario for Student Revolts."

That cartoon is EXACTLY what just took place in Japan - scaling ladders, clouds of teargas, flags flying - and even the clock (which kept telling the time amidst all the flying debris and attacks in Tokyo). To former FSMer, Prof. Searle, however, student unrest is a joke.

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STRIKE ON! SURVIVAL THE ISSUE

"Our survival is non-negotiable," Ysidro Macias, a Third World Liberation Front spokesman, declared flatly on Wednesday.

The scene is Bancroft and Telly, not Holloway and Nineteenth; the campus is called Cal and not State, and the uniformed pigs are not yet visible.

State, and the uniformed pigs are not yet visible.

But the struggle is the same. The Third World students at UC Berkeley have united beneath the banner of a Liberation Front. On Wednesday they struck the UC campus. They are demanding self-determination over their educational destinies.

The first day of the strike was more successful than had been expected, according to Charles Jackson, a TWLF spokesman and representative of the Afro-American Students Union. The blacks are joined in the TWLF by Chicanos belonging to the Mexican-American Student Confederation and by Asian Americans belonging to the Asian American Political Alliance on campus.

At a late morning press conference Jackson denounced Chancellor Roger Heyns as "an out and out liar, and I defy him to disprove it."

The black student leader criticized the dealings the Administration had had with the AASU for the last nine months about the black student-proposed Black

tration had had with the AASO 107 the last nine months about the black student-proposed Black Studies Program.
"Heyns has treated us like a game for these nine months," Jackson said. But he continued, "We are totally committed to what we are doing."

"We are totally committed to what we are doing."
Pricking the balloon-like myth of great liberal progress in the ghetioes, Jackson said that programs had been begun in the Bay Area to have professional athletes set up basketball teams for the ghetto youth.
"We do not need basketballs," Jackson said, with anger and irony. "We need jobs, we need food."

irony. "We need jobs, we need food."

The TWLF's goal during the initial stage of the strike is to give political education to the white students on campus as to the Third World demands and situation. Picket lines are being manned from 8AM to 4PM by white students who are supporting the strike as well as by Third Worlders.

Jackson told the piglet press that there had already been two incidents where scabs had sought to bust through the picket lines and hurt the picketers. Jackson said the TWLF wanted no violence on the picket lines.

He charged, "There are certain students on this campus trying to disrupt our picket lines. If they are attacked they (the pickets) will defend themselves with all force necessary."

At a mass meeting on Tues- 8 day night, white students formed a 5 Strike Support Committee, similar to the White Student Strike Com-

At a mass meeting on Tuesday night, white students formed a Strike Support Committee, similar to the White Student Strike Committee at SF State.

Coupled with the picketing, many striking students, including whites, went to classes that were in session to ask the students to discard the day's agenda and discuss the issues involved in the strike. The majority of Berkeley's students slipped past the picket lines on Wednesday. Nobody knows how many of these scabs will actively respond to the education being offered them by the TWLF strike. It's difficult to say how many UC students came to Berkeley because Max Rafferty called it a cross between a shooting gallery, a hippie pad and a brothel. But one can easily affirm that among the eternal trinity of Dope, Sex and Treason, the average Berkeley student is thrilled to settle for just dope and sex.



How did the huge fire that completely gutted Wheeler Auditorium get started?

Rumors circulated swiftly on the UC campus late Wednesday night as the last wisps of smoke drifted out of the completely destroyed lecture hall, the largest on the campus. A young man told the BARB that "six firebombs started it." He said he was one of the first people to arrive at the scene. A young girl standing nearby corroborated his account.

Among those at the scene of the \$300,000 blaze, watching with vested interest were Chancellor Roger Heyns, and his deputy, Earl

REGENT REAGAN EGGED ON

from self-immolation), students in Berkeley splattered eggs on Gov Reagan's staff car.

In a curious demonstration last Friday by over 500 students outside University Hall, nothing happened except the omelette and two broken windows.

"Surrender, Reagan - we got you surrounded!" one student shouted at the face-dotted facade of the building in which the Regents of the University of California were meeting (inside an enlarged phone booth).

booth). But Reagan didn't give up, and But Reagan unit give ap, and the students let him get away from what could have been a nice trap; i.e., his long black Lincoln sedan was parked down in the parkingwell of the building.

black University cop. Ringing the well were hundreds of students. As this one cop left the ramp, some of the students moved in and placed the wooden barricade across the

ramp.

Reagan, indicated with HIS finger to someone out of sight (Regent Mrs. Hearst?) what he was getting from the students. He then bowed deeply and left for the enlarged phone booth again.

The barricade apparently gave pause to the Governor's departure because many hurried conferences were held at various doors and down in the parking-well.

Finally, three University cops came back, one with a drawn billy-club. This display drew mock shouts of fear then laughter. Ten minutes later, Reagan – appearing at the door again then disappearing then showing up again – pointed to then showing up again - pointed to much indecision at the Regent's

Even Mrs. Hearst put in a brief appearance (a striking woman with slate-gray hair dressed in a rose

Eventually, the warehouse doors of University Hall were opened and officials proceeded to back the Governor's car INSIDE the warehouseld.

This brought more laughter from the students.

However, apparently at Gov Reagan's insistence, the carwas moved outside again and hegot in while in full view of the students above.
He just made it before the first egg hit. In a rapid drive up the ramp, the car sped through the students who were pushed back by the three cops, one saying, "Okay, kids - you've had your fun."

"We demand an investigation if it is arson," the AFT statement said. "The motivation behind this is to discredit the strike."

On Monday evening, there was a small fire in Wheeler, apparently started by pouring an inflammable liquid over some seats and a portion of carpet and wall. Damage from the Monday fire was reported as "slight."

AFT Local 1570 called the fire

as "slight."

AFT Local 1570 called the fire tragic and counter to the aims of the strike, in a statement issued Thursday morning.

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Front has made a similar statement.

There was no minimizing the damage as a result of the Wednesday fire however. A BARB reporter who entered the building with the first wave of newsmen said the entire stage and all four walls were completely burned out, as were the back doors.

"There wasn't an unburned seat in the place," our man reported. "Plaster and wood kept falling from the ceiling, and the floor was a mess. The light fixtures had all fallen or shorted out. The only unscathed part seemed to be the very center of the ceiling."

Berkeley Fire Chief G, Rodney estimated the damage at around \$300,000. He said that there had been some damage on the upper floors of Wheeler also.

One campus source reported that there had been six false alarms in

been some damage on the upper floors of Wheeler also.

One campus source reported that there had been six false alarms in Berkeley earlier on Wednesday, and that the Fire Department had been slow in responding to the alarm for Wheeler. Chief Rodney said that when he arrived on the scene, Wheeler Auditorium was completely engulfed in flames.

The crowd watching the ilames lick out of the doors of Wheeler was in a carnival mood. They seemed happy that at last something big had occurred, "Wheeler's just gone up in flames, Isn't it great?" remarked a chick at the edge of the campus.

Chief Rodney admitted to reporters there was a possibility of arson as his men moved in to clean up the mess in the charred interior of Wheeler.

It was the third attempt to ignite a Berkeley campus building this week, in addition to the Monday night attempt on Wheeler, a firebomb was thrown into the Placement Center late Sunday night or early Monday morning. Why no extra precautions were taken to protect Wheeler remains a mystery.

As a BARB reporter approached As a BARB reporter approached the burning building around 10pm Wednesday night, he saw a janitor leaving, a ring of keys in his hand. BARB asked if he had reported the fire.

'No,'' the janitor said. 'I just helped open the auditorium doors. I was the nearest person with keys,'' he said, hurrying away.

"Minorities of the world, unite -you have nothing to lose but your chains."

Karl Marx may be turning over in his grave, but it's nothing compared to the tossing and turning of Chancellor Roger Heyns and Vice Cancellor Earl F. Cheit at UC Berkeley.

What is giving them bad dreams is this signature on a leaflet: "COMMITTEE OF CADRES, Asian American Political Alliance", for it heralds the historical first of ALL minorities united in closing down the UC campus until their thing is done.

"We want to write history," Manuel Delgado, of the ThirdWorld Liberation Front declared. "Heyns has already given us the ethnic group study. Now we want our own college, books, courses, faculty, and admission."

John Turner, Chairman of Computations of the Afront Agrants.

John Turner, Chairman of Communications for the Afro-American Student Union said, "We must shut down this university, bodily. We must move beyond mere rhetoric."

And move they also

rhetoric."
And move they did - nearly 800 pickets, on and off campus, took up the chant, "Asses out of Classes" and "We want the world, and we want it now!"
A little black lady stood at the campus entrance with a sign: "Black Mothers from the Black Community supporting. I am a

Community supporting. I am a black mother of 7 potential college

students."

A huge banner from SF State's AFT local #1928 read: "Strike Right On! We stand with you!" They also put out a leaflet signed by Wm. Rider Cooey, president of the AFT local, which stated that it "wholeheartedly endorses the strike of the TWLF... we strike with them to win the fight against racism, to implement the 15 demands, and to insure self-determination for all Third World peoples."

ples."
A leaflet put out by the Strike Support Committee pointed out that Heyn's "extensive" efforts to help minorities has only resulted in the hiring of 4 Blacks, 9 Mexican-Americans, and one Indian.

"But if black, brown, yellow, and red minorities were given employment and admitted to suddent status up to their percentage in the state, their numbers would increase by over 8,400," the leaflet states.

The Radical Student Union said,
"To make the university safe for
our minds, we need students in
every department challenging the relevance and importance of every

relevance and importance of every course, ever requirement, and initiating courses and countercourses of their own."

It hasn't got to THAT, yet, but on the first day of the strike, students did enter classes and either asked to speak in favor of the strike, or spoke anyway.

listened and continued. How long this will continue is the question hanging over the campus like a sword.

No campus cops were around, not even one (were they on strike?)

The fire occurred, coincidentally, as the Cal campus saw its first day of picketing in support of the fired San Jose State teachers, and against on-campus racism. When the fire broke out, the student senate was meeting in the ASUC building, trying to decide whether to support the strike or not.

With tension running high throughout the state as a result of Ronnie Reagan's policy of "education by billyclub," it seems inevitable "the fire" will make police "necessary" on the Berkeley

At a press conference Wednesday, both Charles Jackson, of the blacks, and Ysidro Macias repeatedly stressed that they were not "seeking violence."
Jackson pointed out that "on two occasions" students tried to force their west treatment.

Jackson pointed out that "on two occasions" students tried to force their way through the picket lines instead of going around like thousands of non-striking students did. BARB observed the same student (shown on Chan. 9's 'Newsroom') try to bully his way through 300 pickets at old Sather Gate just as he baited the line at Telegraph and Bancroft, earlier. (See also BARB photo this issue.)

At Telegraph, he held up a sign hurriedly written in his note book, "FUCK YOU". He changed his mind and wrote: "I WANT TO LEARN" and counter-picketed with that sign for a while.

This is the way the Asian-American Political Alliance put it in their leaflet: "We are not here to fight policemen, but the racist system which employ them. However, the police seem to chance upon the scene in a most provocative manner."

Chancellor Heyns has announced he will not "hesitate" to call police.

This Wednesday, then, was the

This Wednesday, then, was the end of the nine-month road the Afro-American Student Union plodded to get some action. From now on in, it's "STRIKE ON!".

afraid to commit treason against
the masters and 1984.
So the key to the strike's effec-

tiveness may well prove to be the TWLF's willingness to open up a bit more than ever before and take militant action against the cardboard academics and vinyl-coated

board academics and vinyl-coated businessman who run the UC plant. No tactics for nextweekhave yet been revealed by the TWLF. They have not threatened to escalate their disruptive activities beyond the level of picketing, should that be necessary in order to shut the school down. But they have indicated they mean business with this strike and intend to win the demands.

mands.

The crucial demand of the strike is for an autonomous black studies department. Heyns, the profes-sional manipulator, has little room

department. Heyns, the professional manipulator, has little room to squirm and squish on this issue.

The black students insist they be given the powers to determine the structure, the content and the faculty of the Black Studies Department to be, if it is to be.

If the blacks are able to exercise these controls over their education, then honest, relevant courses on the black man's position in America will be taught by honest, relevant black men.

But the Reagan Regents have made it clear to Heyns and the world that a voice as pure as Eldridge Cleaver's will not be allowed to teach at UC Berkeley.

As Ysidro Macias said Wednesday, "The central issue in the Cleaver controversy and in this strike is racism and self-determination."

"We recognize that the racist power structure does not give up power willingly," Jeff Leong of the AAPA told the Wednesday gathering.

"Rights are not given; they must

the AAPA told the Wednesday gathering.

"Rights are not given; they must be won. We of the Third World now stand together in the fight for educational freedom in this racist society."

The TWLF urges all students and faculty at Cal to join the strike in support of the demands.

Leong put it like this: "Our struggle is everyone's struggle against the hypocrisy and contradiction of American society."

Has the revolution really begun? Or is it another Reichstag fire? We have a right to know.

Steve went closer to see what was going on, "This plainclothes cop took my picture and I started banging on the door," Steve related, "I wasn't afraid of the cop but was worried what my parents would think, I flipped him the bird and he opened the door and grabbed me."

and he opened the door and grabbed me."

It took five UC pigs to drag Steve into a side room.

"I fell down and was grabbing at everything that I could. I yelled Let Go of me Pig and one of them kicked me in the back."

BARB first talked to him while he was in that side room. He related how UC police had put the handcuffs on him. "This cophere" pointing his head to an officer Fulks, "This cop here helped put the handcuffs on and pushed my arm way up behind my back."

Steve later told Barb that Fulks had tripped over him while they were dragging him into the room. Here you can see the bruises on my arm" and he drew up his sleeve to show the dull purple bruises.

Steve was forced to stand for
wo hours in a side room with
andcuffs on him. Outside two
indows were broken by pissed-

off demonstrators but the leaders soon told everyone to Cool It.

Before he was released he was questioned by Fulks and a UC police Sergeant. "They asked me my name and address and if Iever smoked pot," Steve said.

Steve was released to his parents and there were no charges pressed against him. Jewell Ross, head of UC Police and ex-head

of the Berkeley Red Squad spent most of those four hours telling reporters not to worry as "The kid is known to be mentally un-balanced."

Apparently Ross' ploy worked, BARB later heard Los Angeles Times reporters saying "Don't worry about that kid, The chief told us he was mentally unbalanced."

BERKELEY FUZZ CAUGHT WITH THEIR BADGES DOWN

The Berkeley Police goofed twice Friday during the student demonstration against the Board of Regents — two cops showed up without badges, and another cop "revoked" a sound-permit.

Both actions are illegal (which, no doubt, will be 'heard' by the

City Council, then 'referred' to some committee to be buried once again).
Police car #608 was occupied

by two or more Berkeley officers, two without badges. As the students pointed this out by shouting 'No badges, no badges! 'BARB saw one cop hurriedly put his star He was halfway out the driver's

He was nailway out the driver's side of the car when the shout went up. He hurriedly got back inside the car. Students brought this BARB reporter over to the car to see for himself, who caught

car to see for himself, who caught this scene.

This reporter then told Berkeley Police Sgt #18, who ignored the whole scene and shoved us all back with his billy-club. When this reporter later (as a private citizen) registered an official complaint with the Berkeley Police, the officer-on-the-phone, Lt Cook, asked, in amazement, "What were you chasing Gov Reagan for?"

I told him "that was my concern. I have no objections to the police doing their duty (clearing the street) but they got to wear their badges when doing so."

Lt Cook amazes easy. He was dumbfounded I would believe Kathy Cleaver and not Chief of Police Beall. I had pointed out that she, too, experienced Berkeley cops without badges.

The other BPD fuckup was over the sound permit issued to Bob Mandel of the 'Oakland Seven'. After cruising around the streets of Berkeley, asking students and people to come to University Hall

of Berkeley, asking students and people to come to University Hall and down to the County Court-house, a Berkeley cop stopped the

and down to the County Courthouse, a Berkeley cop stopped the car.

"May I see your permit?" asked the officer-of-the-law. When Bob handed it over to him, the cop said, "It's revoked."

As the students in the car began to protest, the officer then said, "You can come down to the Hall of Justice and pick it up."

All this was told to the BARB by Mandel and the others. One girl laughed and said, "Put in the BARB Bob is too chicken to go down and get it back."

Bob said, "That's right,"

Apparently, the Berkeley Police are becoming a law unto themselves. In "revoking" the soundpermit, they just "revoked" Judge Brunn's ruling on this matter, namely, you can't do what that cop just did.

ASIAN-AMERICAN RUMP GROUP BACKS UC STRIKE

"S. I. Hayakawa has dramatized what it means to be a yellow white American," Ray Okamura of the Japanese-American Citizens League told a recent conference on

the Japanese-American Citizens' League told a recent conference on the Asian Experience in America. Though it wasn't on the agenda of the symposium, held January 11th in UC's Pauley Ballroom, the issue of San Francisco State and the role of Asian-Americans in the conflict there seemed to be an overriding concern of many of the delegates.

The symposium sponsors, Cal's Chinese Students' Club, Nisei Students' Club and Chinese Students Association, announced the close of the conference before discussion turned to SF State. Some of their members apparently were disturbed that the issue came up, and one Asian-American columnist, writing in the DAILY CAL, called the procedure an "unexpected takeover by the radicals."

The SF State debate, carried on by the minority of conference members who remained after the

official adjournament, illustrated official adjournament, indistance the variety of viewpoints among Asian-American students. Warren Furutani from College of San Mateo, arrested during demon-

San Mateo, arrested during demonstrations there, gave one of the strongest endorsements of the radical point of view. He claimed, "the people that paid my bail were black people and white people," and called on Asian-Americans to become more involved in minority struggles. struggles.

Chinatown community leader Larry Jack Wong also voiced the call for unity with other ethnic minorites.

minorites.

"We're so damnedwiped out that we don't realize that we're the only group that can be used to divide by the power structure;" he said.

"Unless the yellow people become aware of the problems that beset us and find identity with the browns and blacks, we will be ignored."

Wong noted, though, that many Asian students are not citizens and avoid political commitment See p. 8

RIGHT LEAN PICKIN IN JURY PICKING FOR OAKLAND 7

Down at the Alameda County Courthouse this week one thing became absolutely clear. DA Lowell Jensen wants no blacks on the jury that will decide the case

became absolutely clear. DA
Lowell Jensen wants no blacks on
the jury that will decide the case
of the Oakland Seven.

Jensen has used six of the ten
preemptory challenges he has
made thus far, to get black people off the jury. Every single black
person who has been tentatively
seated on the jury panel has been
bumped off by Jensen.

Each time Jensen has challenged
a black person, chief defense counsel Charles Garry has risen to
his feet to state, "Let the record
show that Mr. (Mrs.)
is a black man (woman." If is getting
to be a daily ritual at the trial.

After Jensen challenged the sixth
black person, on Wednesday, Garry
made a motion for a mistrial on
the grounds that the prosecution
was seeking to systematically exclude blacks from the jury.

Jensen said Garry's charge was
ridiculous. "There are many reasons why you excuse people from
the jury," he explained. Without
blinking an eye, Judge George W.
Phillips denied Garry's motion.

At the time Garry moved for
the mistrial the DA hadchallenged
eight persons, six of them blacks.
Jensen's next two challenges were
of white persons.

Besides Jensen's obvious aversion to blacks, several other
features about the prospective
jurors stand out. Many of them
either work for the Defense Department at one of the many Bay
Area military installations, or
have close relatives who do. Several work in defense related in
dustries, or are connected with the
Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, a
leading atomic research center located in Berkeley.

The overwhelming preponder-

Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, a leading atomic research center located in Berkeley.

The overwhelming preponderance of prospective jurors, it seems, are avid readers of the Cakland Tribune or lister the seems, are avid readers of the Oakland Tribune or listen regu-larly to right-wing radio com-

mentator Pat Michaels.

The jury selection process is expected to take up most of the coming week. As BARB went to press, the defense had 36 premptory challenges remaining, and the prosecution, 35.

As the examination of jurors moves on, the major lines of the defense case are becoming clear. Defense attorneys Garry, Richard Hodge, and Malcolm Burnstein have repeatedly asked jurors if they would be prejudiced if it were shown that the Oakland Seven were totally opposed to the Vietnam War which they consider to be "illegal, immoral, and unjust". Garry and Hodge have also referred to the discriminatory nature of the selective service system,

The defense also filed a memorandum of law with Judge Phillips arguing: "(1) International Law is the Law of the U.S. (and, therefore, the law of California); (2) the war in Vietnam is illegal under International Law; (3) the defendants had the duty and the right under International Law to resist U.S. involvement in Vietnam ..."

The memorandum further argues that the U.S. involvement in Vietnam violated the United Nations charter, the Geneva Accords, and the Kellogg-Briand Pact.

He feels the Southern California charge too will be dismissed because of the illegality of the search. "The policeman said he smelled the odor of pot, but that's not probable cause for search," he said.



THE INQUIRY

IT DID AND IT DIDN'T

The Commission of Inquiry into the Vietnam war and political re-pression in the U.S., held in Pauley Ballroom on the U.C. Berkeley campus last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday proved to be an im-pressive, if somewhat tedious af-fair.

Saturday proved to be an impressive, if somewhat tedious affair.

The Commission certainly succeeded in its major aim, it clearly and logically presented the radical argument on political repression in the United States. Simply stated the argument goes: the law serves power; those who resist the war face legal harrassment and repression.

To illustrate this argument, and to concretely relate it to the case of the Oakland Seven, at whose behest the Commission was convened, some twenty witnesses were called, and five films were shown. The most impressive testimony came from U.C. Santa Cruz psychology professor G. William Domhoff, author of "Who Rules A merica", Ramparts Senior Editor David Horowitz, and Arthur Melville, a former Catholic priest expelled from Guatamala for working on behalf of the revolutionary movement there. ing on behalf of the revolutionary

ing on behalf of the revolutionary movement there.

The Commission also heardimpassioned statements from several very obvious victims of political repression in the United States, including Bobby Seale, Dennis Mora of the Ft. Hood Three, who just completed 28 months in Leavenworth for refusing to fight in Vietnam, and Gregory Harrison, chairman of the statewide high school BSU, charged with "insurrection" for his activities at Oakland Tech. land Tech.

Domhoff set out "to tell you who makes U.S. foreign policy, how they make it, and why they make it.' According to Domhoff, the major lines of U.S. foreign policy flow

out of three major think tanks--the Council on Foreign Relations, the Commission for Economic Development and the Brookings Instivelopment and the Brookings Instruttion. These in turn are financed by the Ford, Rockerfeller and Carnegie Foundations.

By reading the publications of the three institutions mentioned above, Domhoff said, one can pretty

the three institutions mentioned above, Domhoff said, one can pretty well predict what the major lines of foreign policy will be. In addition, he said, there are small groups of twenty to twenty-five persons who meet regularly to discuss foreign policy subjects. These groups are usually composed of top corporate executives, a man from the State Dept., a CIA spook, and "the best academics money can buy."

The key figures in the formulation of U.S. foreign policy, said Domhoff, are Averill Harriman, John J. McCloy, C. Douglas Dillon, and Devereaux Josephs. All are investment bankers.

To illustrate his point, Domhoff cited a 1960 study on China made by the Council on Foreign Relations. The study was financed by a \$900,000 grant from the Ford Foundation. The grant was easy to arrange. John J. McCloy was president of both the Council on Foreign Relations and the Ford Foundation at the time.

As a result of the study, Domhoff said, the U.S. is pursuing a

As a result of the study, Dom-As a result of the study, Dom-hoff said, the U.S. is pursuing a softer line towards China. "It's no accident that Hubert Humphrey re-cently proclaimed that U.S. policy on China did not have to remain rigid. He had gotten the word." Horowitz traced the history of U.S. imperialism.

U.S. imperialism.

U.S. imperialism.
"The United States must maintain its system of foreign investments in order to survive economically," Horowitz said, "Naturally, revolutionary nationalism

overseas is a serious obstacle to the U.S." Melville told the audience that

Meiville tool the audience that U.S. planes were bombing and na-palming in Guatamala. "You con-tribute to the system which op-presses them and benefit from it;" he said. "The main enemy of the Guatamalans is the United States."

Guatamaians is the Unitedistics.

The former priest described how

and carrying out other reforms
He soon realized that the governor

He soon realized that the governor of the province where he was working was under the thumb of the CIA. At that point he decided to join the revolutionary movement. There was much more testimony. In fact there was so much that the panel got very few chances to ask questions that might have enlivened the proceedings and created some drama.

There was an attempt to inter-There was an attempt to intersperse the testimony with films, but it proved impractical. Instead, all the films were shown Friday evening to a large audience. The benefit Rock dance was a huge success, with over 2,000 people jamming Pauley Ballroom last Thursday night.

jamming Pauley Ballroom last Thursday night.

The obvious message to the left then, is that a long series of speeches and statements, no matter how well organized, will not turn on huge numbers of people. Films and rock dances do. As Jerry Rubin said a long time ago. "You've got to use the media, baby."

Former SDS president Carl Ogelsby, now living in San Franogelsoy, now inving in San Fran-cisco seems to have understood this. One of the leading theor-eticians of the New Left, Ogelsby has recently formed a new rock band, The National Liberation

The trustees have but two

The trustees have but two choices left; either kill all the strikers or meet their demands.

Until the trustees make up their fucked-up minds, the striker goes on. Of course the men pulling Hayakawa's strings may still try a bit more repression here and there, you know how things work.

But with these tough, mean motherfuckers manning the picket lines at State, a bit more repression never works. So, as Alvarado told BARB, "They may eventually wind up kicking everyone's ass in."

WE ESCALATE
The TWLF will not yield a single of its fifteen demands, Alvarado stated flatly. We askedhim what would happen if the Trustees come to the strikers with an offer to meet most of the demands but not the ones giving the Third World students control over the ethnic studies departments.

"We escalate," Alvarado firmly replied.

replied.

"If they're hurting enough to come out front to tell us they'll give us some of the demands, then it's important to us to make them hurt a little more."

"Ever since the rain started," Alvarado said, "I guess they felt it's more important to stay warm than impress the people.

student battles at State, Alvarado says that the only way the police keep the people in fear of them is the gun each blueshirt carries on

his side.
"If all they had was the stick,"

"If all they had was the stick," Alvarado said, "we'd take half the people off this line and kill those motherfuckers.
"Law enforcement would be impossible in this country if the pigs didn't carry round that shit. That's the result of conditions which are so oppressive, that the only way they can protect the pigs assigned to enforce the law is to give them their pieces."

Alvarado compared the situation

here to recent student revolt in Mexico. There, he said, 'from the beginning the students were talking beginning the students were taking about overthrowing the govern-ment." So instead of messing with the police, the government sent in the army right away. Hundreds were slain by their guardians.

Mexico could easily be here

were slain by their guardians. Mexico could easily be here soon, Alvarado thinks. "If Ronald Reagan calls out the National Guard that's definitely going to start happening.
"They're not going to bring in some funky unit, they're gonna bring in fascists who really dig that thing, who just like to fuck people up."

REFORMS
After it was all over, Alvarado continued, the government would kick a couple of pigs out of the Guard and blame the killings on them, but the job would have been done

done.

"That's the only way this country can deal with the conflicts within it." Roger asserted, "Rather than deal with racism, they go out and buy tanks to use in urban ghettoes to further mutilate Third

ghettoes to further muthate filled World people."

We asked the TWLF spokesman whether he thought the struggle ar State might end in a bunch of reforms and nothing more.

ar State might end in a bunch of reforms and nothing more.

"I don't think so," he replied.
"Everyone here's been educated much more than any other group of people, educated to basic principles, educated to basic principles, educated to organizing. White students have had their eyes opened, not only to the fact that their formal education isn't worth shit, but also to what they can do to deal with this shit."

Alvarado also told BARB that the AFT's own conflict with the Trustees, over the right of public employees to strike, to have collective bargaining, etc., is not unrelated to the needs of Third World people in this state.

"The AFT strike is important to us because a lot of Third World people work for the municipal and state governments," he said.

The 350 arrested earlier in the day are not allowed to make phone calls. Barrish Bailbonds has received only 6 phone calls by 4 p.m. According to police reports no information on the prisoners is to be released before 8 p.m. A minimum bail of \$2500 is set for any felony charge.

Among those arrested are students, AFT members from State and other colleges, and community supporters of all ages and races.



Ending a black girl's education Ending a black girl's education in Oakland is like condemning her to death. That's the opinion of Alan Kalmanoff, an attorney handling the case of 15 year old Dorothy Allen. Dorothy, a student at Oakland Tech, was expelled from school for slapping a girl, a white girl who allegedly called her a "nigger."

"To end her education for that is

To end her education for that is "To end her education of that is a tremendous overreaction," Kalmanoff told BARB, "In most cases the student would only receive a severe reprimand." She has no prior record of discipline problems, he noted.

Kalmanoff has filed a suitagainst

kalmanoff has filed a suitagainst the Oakland School Board, the Oakland School Board, the Oakland Superintendent of Schools, and the Oakland Tech principal to get Dorothy readmitted. A hearing on the suit is scheduled January 23.

According to the attorney the girl was expelled for "unprovoked assault" although no fact finding had been done by school authorities on the case.

The incident took place September 26. Dorothy was at first suspended, and finally expelled on December 17. Yet she was not notified of this until January 14.

Meanwhile Dorothy has been without an education for more than a semester.

HEIGHTS SEIZED BY AFT

The AFT seized the high ground at State this week. Since New Year's the pigs had kept all picket lines off the main pathway leading into the SF State campus at Holloway and Nine-

pathway leading into the SF State campus at Holloway and Nineteenth.

But this week members of the striking AFT local at State moved up to the path and took it over for a picket line. The police, who previously had lined the path, gave out with a lot of menacing looks, but when the chips were down they didn't make a move.

The AFT strike is making headway in other directions also. Professor McGukken, a member of the union's negotiating committee, told BARB that support is growing for the strike all over the state among high school AFT locals and among other labor unions.

McGukken's scenario for the future of the AFT strike includes the walkout extending into the summer. The AFT leader believes that the issues exposed by the strike—the rights of public employees to strike, to unionize, to have collective bargaining—are of great importance nationwide.

The big labor unions will have to kick in with some support for the striking profs. In fact, McGukken believes that the AFT strike will long outlast the student strike will long outlast the student strike which got the AFT out in the first place.

State College strikers drewfirm support from all members of a panel discussion held near the end of the conference as well. Ray Okamura, who later told Haykawa supporters in the audience, "I think you are in a concentration camp of the mind," was one speaker.

Another was Prof. James Hirabayashi, from State College. He supported the striking students and said, "It is only because of the confrontation at State that we ever

confrontation at State that we ever-got off our bottoms to do things."

Other strike supporters were Loren Chi from Oakland High and Berwyn Lee, member of Intercol-legiate Chinese for Social Action,

legiate Chinese for Social Action, one of the striking groups at State. Out of the unofficial discussion came a quasi-resolution that read: "Be it resolved that 100 participants of the Yellow Identity Symposium 1) fully support the 15 demands of the Third World Liberation Front, 2) Condemn the manipulation of an Asian-American by the governor and the Board of Trustees, 3) demand that S. I. Hayakawa resign immediately as Hayakawa resign immediately as president of SF State."

president of SF State."
What are the issues which make Asian-Americans conscious of oppression in this society? The main ones stressed during the symposium and in interviews with students are quite similar to those felt by black and brown students, but they are generally expressed less violently.

George Woo, from Chinatown, gave the most militant speech

rhetoric very similar to that of black militants, he demanded ac-tion to improve social conditions in Chinatown, where 40% of the population lives below the poverty level set by the Federal govern-

Woo attacked students who feel Woo attacked students who feel superior to Chinatown residents, saying, "you are the brain from our community, but in the past, our brain has deserted us." And he also noted that the US government has reacted to his political involvement by attempting to deport him on the grounds that his father entered the country Illegally at the turn of the century.

Professor Isao Fujimotowarned Asian-Americans to avoid being

Asian-Americans to avoid being used against more oppressed minorities. "The entire Asian-American group is the Uncle Tom to the rest of minority society," he charged.

Asian-American organizations Asian-American organizations have grown rapidly in the past year. The Asian-American Political Alliance, less than a year old, has chapters at many California schools already, and is also active at the University of Howeit

also active at the University of Hawaii.


"We owe a great deal to the history of black liberation," Alan Fong of AAPA said.

BOBBY SEALE GETS JUSTICE FROM PEER

An Alameda County judge has exposed the untruthful and illegal ways in which the Berkeley pigs

ways in which the Berkeley pigs operate.

Last winter the pigs invaded Bobby Seale's Berkeley home and arrested the Panther leader on gun charges and for conspiracy to commit riot or murder.

Last Monday Judge Lionel Wilson ruled that the bust was illegal and the search of Seale's apartment and the seizure of his weapons was unlawful.

In his opinion Judge Wilson pretty much accused the principal pig involved of perjury.

ty much accused the principal pig involved of perjury.

"Officer Coyne's testimony,' the judge stated, "was at times inconsistent with other credible evidence, at times evasive and on occasion demonstrated a convenient memory which was usually sharp when helpful to his case and no so sharp otherwise."

no so sharp otherwise."

Judge Wilson implied that Coyne
busted Seale in order to get him-

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Good Time Washboard 3" self a promotion and a raise. Seale, at a press conference Seale, at a press conference after the miraculously honest decision was handed down, had fine words to say about the black judge. "Judge Lionel Wilson is a brother who knows the law and went by the law," the Panther chair-

man said.

"We want to be tried and judged by our peers," Seale added, "and we respect Judge Wilson." Wilson went into the pigs' lies in

detail:

Officer Coyne's "testimony that when he received the initial radio-transmission to go to 1927 Stuart. Street he was told that the citizen informant had stated that he had heard the three Negroes say, "There has to be a killing; there has to be a killing; and 'Let's go in and talk to him about it,' is not horns out by the evidence as conin and talk to him about it, is not borne out by the evidence as contained in the taped transcript of the informant's conversation with the dispatcher wherein the citizen stated that he could not make out what it was about and heard something about "Well, we're the only people (garbled)..."

What that means is that for all the pigs knew one of the Panthers could have been saying. Well, we're the only people on the block who like pistachio-flavored ice cream cones' and on that basis the pigs raided Seale's home and arrested the Panther couple!

In yet another putdom of the BPD's man on the scene, Judge Wilson said that "The inconsistencies in Officer Coyne's testimony and his apparent emotional involvement were such that it is difficult to segregate the 'truth' from the 'fiction and fancy.''

Another aspect of the ruling is that the finding of weapons in the possession of Black Panthers does not "form a basis for a probable conspiracy to riot or murder."

Judge Wilson pointed, ironically, one hopes, that "It was common knowledge that the Black Panthers were prone to carry guns."

The moral of the trip is this:

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PANTHERS PROMISE TO AVENGE DEATHS

"We will avenge Bunchy's and hn's deaths," David Hilliard,

"We will average Butterly's and John's deaths," David Hilliard, Black Panther Chief of Staff, vowed, Monday.
Alprentice "Bunchy" Carter and John Huggins, two officers of the Black Panther Party, were assassinated at UCLA last Friday, Jan.

17.
Saturday, the 18th, Hilliard flew to Los Angeles to investigate the murders. Monday he and Bobby Seale, Party chairman, released the results of the investigation to the press.
Hilliard and Seale charged that

Hilliard and Seale charged that the killings were brought about by US (United Stance), headed by Ron Karenga, and that the trig-germen were members of the "elite core within US known as

the Simba Wachukas.

ters in Berkeley, Seale charge the LA police with complicity

the crime.
The motive for the killing, Seale

Hilliard stated, were from US.

US is known in the doublethink media as a 'militant black organization.' Bobby Seale's statement described US as "Pork chop cultural nationalists who are co-opted and used by the racist, exploitative power structure."

US. Seale explained, is being used by the power structure in LA to suppress the Panther Party there.

there.

Despite the fact that US is cenered in Los Angeles, the Pan-Despite the fact that US is cen-tered in Los Angeles, the Pan-ther Party claims it has been growing there, even to be point of outnumbering US, Until the mur-ders, five national officers of the Party were living and working in

The plot is very simple, according to Panther spokesmen. The Panthers represent a real revo-

Karenga's organization receives poverty funds from OEO, Seale alleged, and its members carry guns freely about Los Angeles with the knowledge and approval of the LA

Hilliard described a previous incident with US about which the LA police looked the other way.
'They shot up one of the brothers' (Panthers') homes; the LA

thers' (Panthers') homes; the LA police knew about it and didn't take action, so we let it slide."

To further expose the relationship between US and the LA police, Hilliard revealed that "About thirty minutes after the incident at UCLA went down, some seventeen Panthers were arrested."

thirty minutes after the incident at UCLA went down, some seventeen Panthers were arrested."

Among the busted were Erica Huggins, the slain Panther's wife, and their ten day old baby. "The baby was released by the pigs in the custody of US." Seale stated. "The immediate repression against the Party members following the political assassination of Party officers," Seale continued, "as well as the efforts to make the shooting appear to be the result of an internal power struggle withing the Black Panther Party, which is a lie, indicates some collusion with the LA Pig Department on the part of the murderers."

Furthermore, Hilliard stated flatly that the LA police knew at 6 P.M. on Saturday evening who the assassins were, but did not release their names or photographs to the press until 10 P.M. on Sunday night, Hilliard saw no legitimate reason for this 28 hour delay.

The Panther Chief of Staff bitdenounced the killers as The Panther Chief of Stati bit-terly denounced the killers as "ballhead niggers and vipers." Hilliard promised that the Pan-thers would expose US to the black community and would educate the community to the new realities of "the LA Pig Dept. using nig-gers against black revolu-

of "the LA Fig Dept, using light gers against black revolu-tionaries."

A black female reporter asked Bobby Seale if it wasn't to the ad-vantage of the Establishment to have two militant black organiza-tions feuding with each other. Seale

replied:
 "Blackness is not a criterion for being in this revolutionary struggle."
 Then he added, "It's clear that only a pig would kill a Panther." -----

The motive for the killing, Seale continued, was "to weaken and destroy the Black Panther Party in Los Angeles."

According to the Panther spokesmen, the incident occurred in the following manner. "Bunchy and John entered the cafeteria at UCLA following a black student meeting. Five minutes later, they lay dead on the floor: Brother Bunchy shot in the chest and Brother John shot in the chest and Brother John shot in the back."

The meeting which preceded the assassinations dealt with control of the Afro-American studies program at UCLA and the choice of a director for the program.

One hundred and fifty people attended that meeting — two were Panthers, and almost all the rest, on to black revolution.
Part of the Panthers' national program is unity with the Black Students Unions. "UCLA," Hilliard said on Monday, "is Karenga's stronghold." The directorship of the Afro-American studies program at UCLA is worth \$20,000 a year, as well as a great deal of influence in the BSU on campus.

"They wanted that ballhead Karenga to have the \$20,000 position." Hilliard charged, "It's known that Karenga was trying to take over the BSU's in Southern California."

But the Panthers offered their own candidate for the job, though Hilliard did not reveal his name. So Bunchy Carter and John Huggins were apparently killed to keep the Panthers out of the Black Students Union at UCLA and, ultimately, out of Los Angeles.

Seale and Hilliard hit hard at their press conference on the theme of collusion between Karenga and the Man.

"Stop in the name of God!" the minister shouted. But to no avail. Federal agents arrested two of his parishioners during the service. And when he protested about sanctity of the church he was

sanctity of the church he was locked up too.

The scene was the cold rainy steps of San Francisco's Federal Building, Monday morning January 20. Reverend Dick York of the Berkeley Free Church conducted a service of liberation before the members of the church were

the Berkeley Free Church conducted a service of liberation before two members of the church were scheduled to go on trial inside the glass obelisk later that day. During the sermon water in the plaza fountain turned blood red, as in the passage from Exodus Rev. York read. The text asked the Pharoah to "Let my people go" from involuntary servitude. Bishop Michael Itkin performed an exorcism to drive the demons of violence and exploitation from the Federal slab.

Slowly, from all sides, five men in business suits slouched toward the 30 church members. They zeroed in on Sandi McCallister and Charlene Pope in the congregation. The two were set to go to trial for throwing paint on a US flag at the Presidio, October 23.

"Please wait till after the service," the Rev. York admonished the intruders. They paid no heed and tried to lead the two women away. When the minister objected and tried to block their way he was arrested.

The three were led away, but Rev. York continued his service

The three were led away, but Rev. York continued his service even inside the elevator, and later in the cells. Bishop Itkins was later arrested when he asked a bully who pushed him for identification. The man was a federal agent. All four prisoners were released on bail the same day.

"I was very upset with their total disregard for a church service," Rev. York later told BARB. "I'm not guilty of anything except trying to prevent my service from being interrupted."

"The state is infringing on free-The three were led away, but

"The state is infringing on freedom of worship," York continued, "We may eventually have to go underground as the church did in Germany under the Nazis,"

Janitors and maintenance men washed off the red steps of the Federal Building after the Monday service of liberation. "But the blood is still there," said the minister. "They put it there themselves, We only made it more visible for a few hours."

Despite the attack on their minister in San Francisco the Free Church is as alive as ever in Berkeley, They have soon plan to expand their switchboard service to 24 hours and are presently seeking volunteer aid.

mittee to Defend Military Prisoners told BARB, A rally is scheduled to take place at noonthe day of the trial in front of the Presidio, Drolet announced.

Major T.G. Chamberlain, an Army psychologist examined five of the six men during their first hearing and recommended the GT's be "separated from the Army" because of mutual incompatibility. His advice has not been taken. Captain Richard Millard, the officer in charge of the November preliminary hearing for the six, requested in his summary the soldiers be either charged with disobedience maximum 6 months or given discharges.

"A charge of mutiny doesn't apply in this case," Millard states in the transcript of the hearing. He further comments on the shoddy and inefficient grievance procedure, and the substandard conditions of the Presidio brig as mitigating circumstances for the soldiers' protest. But General Stanley Larsen commander of the Presidio has chosen to ignore the opinion of his subordinates.

Stanley Larsen commander of the Presidio has chosen to ignore the opinion of his subordinates.

Sunday, January 19 several of the prisoners allegedly attempted suicide and were reported to be in Lettermen Hospital in serious condition. However, the hospital would not confirm this.

Meanwhile, Terence Hallinan, attorney for 17 of the 27 men is still pursuing the case through the courts. On January 16 Federal District Court Judge Stanley Wiegal issued an order to the Army to show within ten days that it had remedied the illegal conditions in

remedied the illegal conditions in the Presidio brig. "That's a tremendous victory," Halliana told BARB, "By virtue of this the court has taken jurisdic-tion over the treatment of military prisoners.'

Sergeant Woodring, the guard who allegedly broke the fingers of a prisoner January 8 is still in charge of the stockade, Hallinan told BARB. "As far as I know he wasn't even reprimanded," he said.

Hallinan's charges of brutality were countered by a former in-mate of the brig who called BARB last week. The soldier, who chose

Richard Whitehall has asserted that the filmmaking movement in the Bay Area is, what he calls, Kinetic Cinema.

I'm not sure I understand precisely whathe means by Kinetic Cinema, but from a list of films he gave, citing them as examples of Kinetic Filmmaking, I get the idea that he is talking about films that exploit hard-edged graphics, gross colors, and flashy techniques.

That's only a little of what's going on in the Bay Area. Maybe that's how it looks from LA.

There are many filmmakers in the Bay Area working in very interesting directions. Here's a list of most of them:

John Schofill, Herb DeGrasse, "Don't follow leaders, watch your Michael Stewart, Myron Ort, Jordan Belson, James Broughton, Larry Jordan, Ben VanMeter, DeGrasse's latest film, VENUS, VENUS, a retelling of the myth of Connor, Jerry Abrams, Bruce Baillie, Gunvar Nelson, Lenny Lipton, Michael Arnold, Scott Bartlett, Lawrence Booth, Tom DeWitt, Steve Wiese, and Will Hindel.

Of these only two work in what might be called Kinetic Cinema. They are Scott Bartlett and Tom DeWitt's latest film THELEAD.

DeGrasse's myth of Venus takes place in modern America, Berken.

DeWitt's latest film THE LEAP, is the best the pair has produced. The film has extraordinarily subthe effects and color harmonies, which grow naturally in intensity. Sadly, the effect is spoilt by the horrendous sound track, banal and overstated stuffing of tape music.

overstated stuffing of tape music.

When I compare it to the tape composition used with Scgofill's XFILM, by Bill Moraldo, I realize how really crumby is the track of DeWitt's THE LEAP.

It's a pity, because the visual portion is the best thing of its kind that I have seen. The form, despite what festivals and some writers might have you believe, and despite what the public in turn believes. finds little favor with creative fillmmakers. Fillmmakers may say they like these harsh exercises, but it is difficult to find the taint of a monstrosity like 7362 in most artists' work. 7362 was made by a Los Angeles fillmmaker, whose name escapes me. Appropriately the title comes from the code number that Eastman Kodak gives its high contrast positive film.

I quote from the data sheet provided by the manufacturer: 'It is suitable for making negative or positive titles of excellent definition and sharpness when clear

positive titles of excellent definition and sharpness when clear whites and dead blacks are de-

A cursory examination of films in the Canyon Cinema Catalog would reveal that only the most facile classification could lump

would reveal that only the most facile classification could lump together many of these films as "Kinetic Cinema." DeWitt's film, THE LEAP, takes the thing about as far as I have seen it taken, and is visually really a rather refined and pleasing exercise.

I think we're just seeing the beginning of these films of kinetic design, and I hope the experimentation continues. Its developed form will probably bear slight resemblance to these early works. Turning to other works, recently completed is DAVID, by Michael Arnold, a remarkably compact and economical tale, if that's the proper word, of the undoing of one David, whose life is presented in the form of home movies, stills, tracks from radio and TV commercials.

The film is perhaps four or five minutes long, and what it accomplishes in this four or five minutes is more than you're likely to get from looking at four or five hours of other film. That's the experience I have with DAVID, surrounded as it was by so much surrounded as it was by so much crap, it glistened like a diamond in the shit.

Now that I've said I like the film, what the hell else is there to do about it? It's not so much that I'm at a loss for words, I just don't know what's the point of further communication on the sub-

realm intherto innabited by Anger and Marcopolis, that is, myth, DeGrasse's myth of Venus takes place in modern America, Berke-ley in fact, and has the same sort of flavor as Shakespeare in modern

dress.

The film has absorbing and ex-The film has absorbing and ex-citingly lyrical moments, and ex-quisite erotic sequences. Tech-nically, DeGrasse has advanced enormously, It is still possible to tell, and there is no doubt of this, that it's a Herb DeGrasse film. There is the nervous seeking camera, the oddly disconnected that it's a Herb DeGrasse film. There is the nervous seeking camera, the oddly disconnected continuity, or misblending of shots, and (for me) the silly technical errors. But the strengths of the film far outweigh its weaknesses, It is far and away the best thing DeGrasse has done, and that's say-

ing a lot.

If DeGrasse had simply told the tale of Venus the film would not be as rich as it is. Instead, it is an exploration of contemporary sexual hangups, from the double standard to male and female aggression.

Women are bound to find the film disturbing because Venus hors from bed to bed. But after all, she is Venus. If a male were to behave as Venus does, nobody would get excited.

The finest portion of the film is the sequence in which Vulvan drags his bride up to his lair, in what I suppose are the Berkeley hills. The sequences on the hill, or on the hills, are splendid, giving a feeling of dreadful anticipation. The following shots of Vulcan and Venus in bed are very interesting. Vulcan resists Venus' advances, and once they subside, only then is he content to approach her. VENUS and DAVID will be screened in the coming weeks at Canyon Cinematheque. Although it's okay to sell magazines this way, McCalllan Virtue wins out and the reader discovers that the author only pretended to be an unmarried woman. In reality, she, unlike the poor slobs at the nameless resort in the mountains of New York, is a happily married wife and mother.

It's not as honest that way but not as controversial either. The author concludes her article in a sentimental slush of monogamous tears: "I think of them (the singles) whenever the washing machine breaks or the septic field balks... I think of them, too, when God's in his heaven and all's right with my world."

The male editors of certain women's magazines are running scared of the Pill. In the January issue of Ladies Home Journal Robert Kistner, M.D. tells women that if they use the Pill and begin to feel sexually liberated they risk "enslaving" their husbands, "It's as if their sense of maleness and self-esteem has been threatened."

And later on he adds; "Wives have complained to me about their throoten husbands who developed this difficulty only after they started on the Pill."

What about the women's magazines that have been "enslaving" women with variations on the GUILT theme for the past one hundred years? Now they have something else to blame on women in addition to juvenile delinquency, homosexuality, heart attacks, alcoholism and ax murdes. And

homosexuality, heart attacks, al-coholism and ax murdes. And why? Because there is the danger that women are about to be as

now American Society has psychologically oppressed blacks by equating blackness with evil in folklore, language and liferature, it is interesting that this piting of guilt upon the female has its origins deep in the religious beliefs of Western civilization.

Eve is blamed for the Fall—the symbolic contamination of all mankind for clernity. It can also be argued that Eve was the first radical because she broke the rules and ate the apple and by doing so uprooted things forever. But Eve never heard a theologian explore this point although they frequently run on about Eve being made from one of Adam's ribs.

Not all women's magazines handle sex inpocritically, upholding the double standard by using the iron in the velvet glove. Cosmopolitan with a circulation of \$51,508 is edited by Helen (Sex and the Single Girl) Gurley Brown. Most of their articles treat sex with astonishing candor whene compared to articles in the other women's magazines. Occasionally, however, a writer gets carried away and writes stuff that sounds like a funny parody on Lolita. In an article defending extramarital affairs ingeniously titled Low Fidelity Wives (Jan. Cosmos), the author tells us about Jeannine, married for eight years and the mother of two children.

Jeannine tells it like it was: "The moment Tim rode up on his Honda, my heart began to skip beats. All I can say is that arrogant, muscle-bound juvenile delinquent just plain knocked me out. You should have heard me stuttering while I tried to explain what we wanted done with the closets, I didn't have to say a word about anything else. He picked up on the message right away. So what if he was so boring I couldn't falk to him? He was beautiful, And in bed.

hewas fantastic."
Such glib case histories are sus peet because it is extremely doubt ful that married women with children go leaping into bed with

sexy carpenters in the middle of the day. Where were Jeannine's kids? And what about the possibility of several neighborhood kids trailing through the house, Not to mention the Avon Ladyringing the doorbell.

the Avon Ladyringing the doorbell.
One interesting switch in the saga of Jeannine and Tim is the idea that women need not necessarily love a man or have intellectual communion with him in order to have a sexual relationship. D. H. Lawrence said this forty years ago in Lady Chatterly's Lover but the idea still scares a lot of people today — not to mention the editors of Good Housekeeping et al.

In another article in the issue of Cosmopolitan title In another article in the same issue of Cosmopolitan titled The Ostentations Orgasm writer Jill Schary sums up her philosophy. "The ability and right for women as well as men to enjoy sexual expression and satisfaction is as important and relevant a subject today as any other physical ability or civil rights."

Although Commonliton values the

Although Cosmopolitan rates the highest among the mags in terms of sexual honesty it has lots of junk in it like its sister publications. Articles (also in the Jan.

junk in it like its sister publications. Articles (also in the Jan. issue) on The Exciting Days and Nights of a Playboy Bunny and in Pursuit of a Pet, a picture story about one girl's search for a 200 dollar puppy dog are silly and a waste of paper.

Mademoiselle Magazine, also edited by a woman, frequently combines the best of both types of women's magazines. In the past they have included fine political and social articles and interviews with meaningful articles on sex. Their problem is a magazine so cluttered with glossy advertisements that the reader passes out from exhaustion before finding the articles, (Robert Benton and Dayid Newman who wrote the screenplay for Bonnie and Clyde have a regular column in Mademoiselle.)

The majority of women's mags twee Jeaned one thing from the underground press, and that is that sex sells copy. Unfortunately, they haven't learned to be as honest about it.

In spite of the most appalling public relations by UC Extension, over 400 people attended this three-day seminar held last weekend at the I House in Berkeley.

AN EMERGENCY LETTER TO MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN THE MOVEMENT

Dear friends,

From the Bay Area to New York, we are suffering the greatest depression in our history. People are taking bitterness in their coffee instead of sugar.

It's a common problem, not an individual one, and people don't tak to one another too much any more.

It is 1969 already, and 1965 seems almost like a childhood memory. Then we were the conquerors of the world. No one could stop us, We were going to end the war. We were going to wipe out racism. We were going to mobilize the poor. We were going to take over the universities.

to inbilize the poor. We were going to take over the versities. Go back and read some of the early anti-war literature. Check out the original hippie-digger poerry and manifesteest, suphoria, overflowing optimism, and expectation of immediate success. Wow, I can still get high on it.

A lot has gone down since then. The war roars on, the San Francisco scene is gone, pot and acid are being challenged by speed and smack. Nixon has replaced Johnson, and white racism is stronger than ever.

America proved deaf, and our dreams proved innocent. Scores of our brothers have become inactive and cynical.

cent. Scores of our brothers have become inactive and cynical.

Still, our victories since 1965 have been enormous. We kicked LBI's ass. We defeated the Democratic Party. Our history has been marked by a series of great battles: berkeley, the Pentagon, Columbia, Chicaro, We are stealing the youth of America right out of the kindergarten and elementary schools. We are the most exciting energy force in the nation.

It is just because we are striking so deep that, in every phase of the movement, arrests and trials and court appearances, and Jail have bottled up resources, zapped energy and demoralized the spirit.

This has happened slowly — not the way many paranoids expected, the knock on the door, and concentration camps for thousands of us. Chase that ship out of your head. That's not The American Way.

Some of the Boston Five tried to beat the rap, re-interpreting their actions into meaninglessness. Where was that moral confrontation with antihority that Paul Goodman spoke so oozingly abou?

When cops first come on campus, the liberals scream — but gradually the liberals get tired and go to sleep.

WAR RESISTERS ARE BEHIND BARS

The antifarth organizations are in shambles. Individuals are left alone to face 3-to-6 year sentences for refusing the draft. Thousands of men have been driven into exile in Canada and Sweden. The bravest men in the army are choosing to go to the stockade rather than eat military shit.

Stockades, federal prisons and courts are full of mer who have defied the military, and who now must face the music. Unfortunately, there is no orchestra playing behind them.

ADD IT UP:

Cops and courts have tried to put the national black leadership on ice, knocked the Berkeley white activist movement on its heels, over-run the campuses, wiped out many longhair communities, muted the intellectuals, and given, with impunity, fantastic punishment to draft and GI resisters.

resisters.

The pattern goes a long way to explaining the malaise so many of us feel. America got where she is by jailing and killing blacks and other colored peoples. If America's own children — the brats of her white middle class — insist on acting like blacks, well, shit, they will jail and kill us, too.

own children — the brats of her white middle class — insist on acting like blacks, well, shit, they will jail and kill us, too.

Who the hell wants to make it' in America today? The hippie-vippie SDS movement is a "white nigger" movement. The American economy no longer needs young whites and blacks. We are waste material. We fulfill our destiny in life by rejecting a system which rejects us.

Our search for adventure and heroism takes us outside America, to a life of self-creation and rebellion. In response, America is ready to destroy us.

America, like the Roman Empire, is falling apart. Repression reveals the speed of America's fall. When you challenge America, you soon find that underneath the pretty words about democracy, lies a mad, arrogant beast who will tolerate no disrespect or opposition.

I used to know all this in my head, Now I know it in my gut. In the past six months I've personally found out what it's like to live in a police state,

In 1964 and 1965 I was active in campus demonstrations at Berkeley, travel to Cuba, and anti-war actions like stopping troop trains. In those days America thought it could solve its problems with white demonstrators by quickly winning the war in Vietnam.

But we had other ideas, and so did the Vietnamese. The anti-war movement became part of a massive youth movement, student demonstrations spread across the country, and in the summer of 1967 America's ghettoes burned. The solution to rehellion at home became for LBJ a military one, and his administration turned the problem over to the FBI, ClA, Red Squads, the cops and the courts.

I guess I began really asking for trouble when, after working as project director for the siege of the Pentagon, I helped organize the youth festival and demonstration in Chicago in opposition to the Democratic Convention.

The yippies were the most public, anarchic and fearless conspiracy the world has ever seen.

It made LBJ very uptight to realize that an incredible youth-rock festival was going to be held in Chicago the same week he was scheduled to be renominated. LBJ knew that the one group in the country which had done the most to laugh at him and make him look silly were the hippies. But LBJ dropped out. Bobby Kennedy looked like he was going to get the nomination and through his charisma put the yippies on the shelf. On June 5, Sirhan assassinated Kennedy, and yippie popped back, as unreal as ever.

On June 13 three New York narcotics detectives, carrying a mysterious search warrant, stormed into my Lower East apartment, angrily tore a Castro poster off the wall, and arrested me for alleged possession of three ounces of marijuana.

East apartment, angrily tore a Castro poster off the wall, and arrested me for alleged possession of three ounces of marijuana.

They spent 90 minutes in my apartment questioning me about yippie plans for Chicago and going through my personal papers and telephone book.

The search warrant claimed that on June 10 an informer was in my apartment with me andhe saw dangerous drugs there. The only people in my apartment on that day were my closest friends. Narcotics police, who use corruption to get high, invented an informer to get a search warrant. Attorney Bill Kunstler is now attacking the warrant.

A Red Squad detective later told a New York Post reporter that this was the first blow against the yippies, whom we said were agents of the Communist Chinese importing dope into the country to destroy American youth. Virtually everyone under 30 in Manhattan smokes pot. The cops use marijuana as a handy club against blacks, longhairs and political activists, if you are a longhair and a political activist, you get in trouble, if you are a longhair, a political activist, and black, you got real trouble. (Hello, Eldridge, wherever you are.)

The marijuana charge against me is a felony punishable by 2–15 years in the state pen.

When I arrived in Chicago for the yippie festival, I found three shifts of plainclothes cops hounding me day and night, It was typical Chicago police harassment. Round the clock they tailed the half dozen people they thought were "leaders." They were there when we went to bed at night and they were there when we got up in the morning.

For me they cooked up a special treat. Daley sent an undercover cop, Robert Pierson, alias Bob Lavon, to infiltrate the yippies, act as an agent provocateur, spy on me, and frame me on a serious felony rap.

At 10:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 28, while looking for a restaurant, I was kidnapped off an empty downtown street in Chicago by four plainclothes pigs. I was threatened with beating and death, slugged, and told by the head of the Chicago Red Squad:

"You guys ruine

ruined our city. You, you Rubin are res-



ponsible. Do you like our city? We hope you do because we are going to put you in jail here for a long time."
By chance, Jack Mabley, a columnist for the conservative Chicago American, happened to be in the streets when I was picked up. This is how he described what happened: "No blood flowed in one of the most ominous happenings. Jerry Rubin ... was walking west on Washington ... A girl (Nancy) was with him ...
"An unmarked car with four policemen skidded to a stop beside Rubin. Three men jumped out. 'Come on, Jerry, we want you,' one called as they grabbed Rubin. The girl screamed, 'We haven't done anything! We were just walking.'
"I have heard Rubin speak, and he was obscene and revolting. In America a man may be arrested for obscenity

"This is the way it is done in Prague. This is what happens to candidates who finish second in Vietnam. This is not the beginning of the police state, it IS the police state."

Two months later, on October 29, the Cook County Grand Jury returned an Illinois State indictment against me on two counts of "solicitation to commit mob action," a felony punishable on each count of 1-3 years in the state pen, Pierson's bullshit provided the basis for each indictment. indictment.

indictment.

Pierson lied by saying that I shouted through a bullhorn, "Kill the pigs," thereby supposedly soliciting others to mob action the afternoon of Wednesday, Aug. 28 in Grant Park. The incident is supposed to have taken place after cops attacked the crowd when the American flag was lowered, during the rally preceding the Mobilization march.

Whenever I come to Chicago for court appearances the press treats me like a yippie Richard Speck. The Judge has officially restricted my travel to Illinois. (Illinois?) The court system, of course, is under Daley's thumb. It all adds up to a one-way ticket for me to five years in the Illinois state pen and revenge for Richard J. Daley.
Embarrassed by the national press and the Walker Report, Daley needs a scapegoat in the pen. I am not going to be anyone's scapegoat.
America used to use HUAC to shit people up, but HUAC can only silence a movement that is afraid of itself. Pierson appeared before HUAC in October and said I told him that the yippies were planning to "assassinate Daley and the other national politicians" and overthrow the government "within a year." He sounded like he was on an acid trip.

What is not bullshit is an official government document in which the Department of Justice admitted in December, 1968 to a Virginia appeals court that it maintains "electronic surveillance" of me. The document, #12660, is signed by C. Vernon Spratley Jr., U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, and it was sent to the U.S. Court of Appeals, Fourth Circuit.

It says: "The government is tendering herewith to this court a sealed exhibit containing transcripts of conversations in which appellant Rubin was a participant or at which he was present which were overheard by means of electronic surveillance."

The government admits that it maintains either a phone tape or a house bug, or both, of my life. In other words, there is nothing that I can do in the privacy of my own home that does not go into some secret Big Brother tape recorder.

No need any more for suspicion — it's admitted. And what can I do about it? Nothing.

The New York cops, using an illegal search warrant and phony drug possession charges; the Chicago cops, using an agent provocateur and spy; the Department of Justice, using bugging; and the Chicago courts, using frameup felony charges, \$25,000 bail, and travel restrictions, have joined together in a criminal conspiracy to deprive me of my civil rights. That's about all the shit they could throw at me in six months.

I've got to raise a lot of money to stay out of jail; for everything from lawyers' fees to organizing a propaganda fight againt Daley's Neanderthal Republic. I am not sure myself, and what I think often depends on how I feel when I wake up in the morning. And this is one of the differences between the black and the white movements. For blacks the liberation movement is a struggle against physical and mental oppression. For whites the movement is an existential choice.

One way to feel wehther or not we have something real is to see how people relate to one another in trouble. In the past the movement has left the casualties of the last battle to their own individual fates as it moved on to the

battle to their own individual rates as it moved on to the next dramatic action.

Many activists have even been forced to turn to their parents for help, rather than to the movement which is trying to overthrow their parents' institutions. How can we ask young kids to take risks in a movement which doesn't defend its own? Mybrother is 21 years old and his over often ask me that question.

The movement is more concerned with ideological debate, organizational games, and in-fighting than with creating a family. But our movement is only as strong as the friendships within it. Our only real strength is in our identification with one another.

MESS WITH HIM AND YOU'VE GOT ME TO DEAL WITH

If 1968 was "The Year of the Heroic Guerrilla," then 1969 will be "The Year of the Courts," We must attack the myths surrounding the courts as ferociously as we have

attacked the American myths of war, apple pie, your friendly neighborhood cop, and "free elections." Maybe Pigasus should become a judge.

Lenny Bruce put it right: "In the Halls of Justice, the only Justice is in the Halls." Courts come on as sacred as churches. Judges act like they just got off the last plane from heaven.

America's courts are the nation of the last plane from heaven.

America's courts are the nation's toilets. And in Ameri-Martin Luther King saw civil disobedience and arrests as moral thrusts aimed at stirring the population and government to action. His death dramatized the death of

innocence.

The police, district attorneys and judges use arrests freely: to get activists off the streets, to tie us up in endless judicial and legal procedures, and to serve as a warning to others. Arrests become a form of punishment and detention.

For the cops, an arrest is almost as good as a conviction. innocence.

For the cops, an arrest is almost as good as a conviction.

To challenge the courts is to attack American society at its roots. In campus rebellions, the most revolutionary demand, the demand that can never be granted by the administration, is the demand for amnesty, Attacking the society's mechanism for punishing her citizens is attacking the society's very basis for control and repression. Americans like to believe that this is a country of "fair play." We ought to organize tours for the American people of their courts and jails.

An offensive against the courts and jails — including direct action and direct legal and financial aid to the victims of the system — would be the most immediate link that a white movement could possibly make with blacks and poor whites: the country's shit—on, the "criminal element."



area had risen 1800% in the past 12 years. A few months ago, a group of U.C.L.A. physicians advised all who could do so to leave Los Angeles because they thought it unfit for human habitation.

But smog is certainly not found solely in Los Angeles. According to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, New York City has the country's worst air pollution problem. Manhattanites often can't tell whether flakes falling from the sky are snow or ling from the sky are snow or soot. Chicago, Philthydelphia and

os Angeles follow New York in the

Los Angeles follow New York in the dirty skies contest.

Clear days in the San Francisco area have become a rarity. From the Berkeley hills or flying over the bay one sees a dense cloud of brown muck. Even Miami, a city with no heavy industry, no hills, and prevailing breezes, has a haze, easily seen when flying there from the clear blue skies of the Bahamas.

Air pollution experts tell us the

Air pollution experts tell us the single most important source of smog results from the use of gasoline in internal combustion engines. Electrically operated automobiles would solve this problem but they either have not been perfected or powerful forces powerful. fected or powerful forces prevent their development and use. A dif-ferent power source for autos would certainly cause giant econ-omic upheavals in the oil and gaso-line industries.

There is an easy way to almost There is an easy way to amost immediately reduce the amount of pollutants placed in the air by automobiles. Most of the Detroit behemoths gulp a gallon of gas for each 10-15 miles traveled. Autos which consume less fuel contaminate less

consume less fuel contaminate less air.

Within a year or two all autos which get less than 20 miles to the gallon could be banned from the highways. Detroit engineers could easily develop engines to meet these requirements. Seems like a good project for Ralph Nader.

Meanwhile, I'd like to urge everyone to drive cas which consume as little gasoline as possible.
