

An unsigned letter came in. It consisted entirely of a clipping from the SF Examiner's story "Arabs Create 'Schools of Hate' for Young.

The clipping ends "Israeli intelligence sources are positive that many of the Arab texts are the work of former Nazis now living in Arab countries" and the unsigned letter-writer typed in the following comment, "and in Berkeley, Calif."

Okay - what this person ig-nores is history: the whites in the American south say the blacks "Create Schools of Hate Against Whites." Look - how much 'education' does a black need to know where it's at? And it sure as hell doesn't take much 'education' for an Arab to find out where it's at, either.

Ironic proof of this just came to light last week. On the picket line at UC a black was handing out an unsigned leaflet consisting ENTIRELY of a reproduction of a SF Chronicle news story of Israelis firing on (and killing) Arab women protestors.

No comment was made because non was needed. However, for the record: the Israeli government has apologized to the Arab people in this village (after this leaflet) and has promised "an investigation.'

This apology proves the black leaflet was right in the first place. A letter from Marvin Emery Collins, a student at Contra Costa College and a writer for its paper. He feels that Sgt Pepper's comments on police wearing no

badges was in error. "Do they not wear badges because they are afraid someone might be scratched while being arrested for their own good, or because it takes too much time to state a badge number while carting people off to jail?" he asks.


Oh, my God!

Timothy Leary said to think about beauty.

when we say "Oh God, it's beautiful" we are talking about something that is ephemeral -- a flower, a fleeting expression on a human face, passion, a profoundly unselfish act, snow falling under a city street light. All of these things are short lived of these things are short lived reminding us, subconciously per-haps, of our own mortality.

Beauty is sadness then exquisit compassion for all living things -- an atavistic flash across the mind reminding us of our early beginnings in the raging, warm sea and simultaneously reminding us of our own inevitable end. This juxtapositioning of our own beginnings and ending combined with the understanding that a particular flower, an immediate winter sky, a certain feeling of passion will never in the whole of our existence be exactly duplicated is where joy and sadness come together in beauty.

Coupled with the ephemeral nature of beauty is a vital tension created by the knowledge that the moment is going to end. That is why beautiful things, like sex, are partially destroyed by too much analysis. Would you rather hear a meteorologist analyze a sunset or hear a poet describe it to you? The meteorologist destroys the tension with his analysis. The poet uses the tension creatively by carving words out of it.

Beauty is an emotion. It's how you feel about what you see or hear. Beauty is not in the eye of the beholder; it's in his soul. We need innocence to appreciate

beauty. Society, formal education and institutions corrupt our inno-

The Southern Student Organizing Committee held a special demonstration before the Washington Pre-Inaugural March to make its voice heard throughout the nation.

STUDENT MASSES WIN

SIGNS OF THE TIMES SCABBING DONE

3:00 PM THURSDAY - (as phoned in by Phineas Israeli)

'The plaza is ours.'

'Sather Gate is closed. Sproul Hall is closed.'

'Where are the people? On Strike!'

Thousands of marching, charging students claimed UC Berkeley for the people Thursday afternoon.

An overwhelming show of student strength and solidarity turned back a pig invasion of the campus.

The Third World Liberation Front, joined by masses of white students, took a giant step today towards shutting Cal down.

Student Revolution rides again at Berkeley, not with a whimper but with a BANG.

Before 2 this afternoon a mass of over 2000 strikers blocked Sather Gate. Badgeless pigs, completely disoriented faced them and floundered. The mass wove around and finally took over Sproul Plaza as equal masses of students pondered joining them.

Minutes before noon the picket line made their stand, blocking off the main entrance to the campus, as well as Sather Gate.

Several hundred strong, for an hour they waited for the pigs to come. Heyns began to look like a colossal asshole. Yesterday he called the pigs to break up nondisruptive picket lines; today he's afraid to move.

At 5 minutes to one, the pigs came. Nearly a hundred of them

moved out from behind Sproul Hall to seize Sather Gate and the center of campus. Paranoia began to spread that they would make a sweep.

One black student, Jim Nabors, was busted at the gate.

The strikers called Heyns' bluff. A new march line was formed in lower Sproul Hall Plaza. Within minutes of the pigs' arrival the march came down Bancroft, across the front of the campus.

Yesterday's marchers were fifteen hundred strong. Today there were thousands. The endless beautiful throng began its vibrant snake dance through the campus.

Around the back of Sproul Hall, through Barrow, a feint into Sproul, then on through Sather Gate.

By 5 minutes after one the pigs had scurried to their bunkers, hopelessly outnumbered by the people.

On the march went, in unbelieveable numbers, throughout the campus the Third World strike roamed, shouting it's soulful messafe: 'On Strike, shut it down.'

'On strike, join the people.'
After ranging through the entire campus, the thousands circled Sproul Plaza and called it their own.

"It's just beautiful," one student exclaimed. Faces of many colors shined jubilant and proud: no one is alone any more.

Later the strikers went into Pauley Ballroom to rap about where they were at. "Free Jim Nabors" they chanted as they marched in.

Strike leaders stressed discipline and avoiding casualties and useless fighting with the cops.

While the strikers were meeting, the pigs again did their occupation bit around Sather Gate. Crowds of taunting students not involved in the strike meeting escorted the pigs away. Another bust was made.

They said the strike could never build. Today one chick smiled and said, "The strike has solided."

AFT 1570 SORT OF CHIDDADTC

Berkeley's TA union, AFT 1570, took every action except an official strike to support the TWLF student strike this week.

At strike meeting, Monday night, a motion to strike was defeated by a narrow margin. The vote was 98 in favor, 68 opposed. A strike motion requires a two/thirds majority. A switch of two votes would have made the difference.

Union president Conn Hallinan said afterward, "We accept the decision of the members." But it was no secret that many people at the meeting were bitterly disappointed by the failure to vote for

Also disappointed were members of the Third World Liberation Front, who listened through the door to the closed meeting in Pauley Ballroom.



THIRD WORLD PAMPHLET WILL MAKE IT CLEAR

month spite of the impression fostered by the straight media, the issues are being discussed by the striking Berkeley Third World Diberation Front,

A sixteen-page pamphlet entitled "The Strike Explained" is in its second printing and a four-page tabloid is being distributed by the TWLF on campus.

Both publications list the five strike demands and contain extensive explanations and answers to commonly-asked questions. BARB reprints the deamnds in full.

The pamphlet explains the concept of a Third World College in an article by Manuel Delgado. The specific implementation of the demands is also explained;

"TWLF specifically requests of the administration ... that they immediately establish the structure of the Third World College. The structure will consist of a declaration of the existence of the Third World College with guaranteed funding, open positions for co-deans, associate deans, etc.

"The further developments and implementation of th Third World College will be carried on by these administrators in conjunction with the Third World Liberation Front.

Delgado's article carefully explains that the criterion for admission of students into the Third World College would be their "potential to learn" rather than the standardized middle - class oriented tests and standards now used. The decision would be made by the College's admissions of-

pamphlet carefully discusses the many questions which arise in the white liberal mind about the strike and demands. Taking up the question of whether the demands are realistic, it suggests that money be taken from the Urban Crisis program, which was supposed to be the University's response to the whole urban mess.

It points out that the seemingly precipitous strike was called so that the administration could submit fund requests by the Feb. ditions of power."

channels" it recounts the path of the Black Studies proposal, now being rewritten in secret by white administrators.

"It should be remembered," states the pamphlet, "that the administration has only reacted to the demands of the TWLF, it has not initiated programs of substantial import without first being put 'up against the wall.' these channels have attempted to cut out the more substantial parts of the Third World proposals, i.e., field work study and community involvement."

"Their history would make it clear that the administration's intransigence has left the TWLF with no recourse but to call a strike.

The pamphlet also contains a section discussing the institutional racism on the Berkeley campus, reaching from the insufficiently representative number of Third World students and staff to the hand-in-glove cooperation between the University and the growers in the effort to break the grape strike.

Throughout the pamphlet and tabloid, the theme is stressed that self-determination is the fundamental issue. " ... One cannot take the position of the administration which expresses concern for Third World studies programs and then turns around and requires a structure of white control which denies the validity of those cul-

"Self-determination means that Third World people must have the power to set up such programs, that choices as to curriculum ... will take into consideration not just academic requirements but also the needs of the Third World communities ...

Finally, in addressing the question "Can the strike win?", the pamphlet concludes that "The struggle at SF State illustrates that a significant number of people engaged in concerted action can ultimately transform the con**UC ENCOUNTER GROUP?**

The total absence of the word "communist" is a political phenomena in itself. Instead, we keep reading about "students" or "anarchists" or "blacks."

How this came about is directly

Violence comes from stupidity at the highest level - in this case, the Chancellor.

In rejecting this request, in calling cops on campus, Chancellor Heyns has ESCALATED the violence of the strike, not diminished it. To stand on ceremony and wait for a "formal request" while his campus is burning is on a par with Nero's acts while Rome burned.

This all of course, holds true for fink-professor Searle and his "Scenario for Student Revolts"(is he on our side after all?). I wonder what he is thinking this

Another example of professorial cynicism comes from Rex A. Collings, Jr., "Professor of Law" (as he signs his letter in the Daily Cal). He details a "hypothetical interview of a Negro applicant for employment with a

major corporation." The point of this letter is that the "Negro" has had no "major" in "business ad, econ, accounting, insurance, statistics" but "majored in Black Studies" so he

wasn't hired.

What this professor (and most the other intellectuals) miss, of course, is that 1) there are damned few blacks in the above-mentioned courses already and, 2) a "major" in "black studies" could give two cents worth of hope for blacks and minorities to GO ON AND TAKE THOSE ESSENTIAL COURSES.

Even THIS, however, is denied by Heyns, Searle, Collings Jr., and all the other acedemics on campus. G.K.

Macias was standing elbow to elbow with other strikers at Sather GATE. Tuesday as he talked to BARB. The air was still heavy with the biting odor of a recently tossed tear-gas bomb.

"People in Berkeley are in an apathetic defeatist bag," the Chicano leader said. "But we will win no matter what."

STRIKE DEMANDS

The Third World Liberation Front demands the following:

That funds be allocated for the implementations of the Third Worle College Department of Asian Studies--that positions and staff be set up to develop the Asian Studies Department controlled by Asian people.

b. Department of Black Studies as proposed by the AASU.

c. Department of Chicano Studies.

Any other ethnic studies programs as they are developed and presented.

2. Third World People in Positions and Power

Recruitment of more Third World faculty in every department and discipline and proportionate employment of Third World people at all levels from Regents. Chancellors, Vice-Chancellors, faculty, administrative personnel, clerical, custodial, security, service personnel, and all other auxiliary positions and contractual vending services throughout the University system.

Specific demands for immediate implementation:

a. Hiring of Third World Financial Counselors (Special Services)

Third World Chancellors in the University System
Third World people put in the Placement Center as Counselors

Third World Deans in the L and S Departments

e. Third World people in the Admissions Office

3. Specific demands for immediate implementation:

a. Admission, financial aid, and academic assistance to any Third World student with potential to learn and contribute as assessed by Third World peo-

30 Work Study positions for the Chinatown and Manillatown projects, and 10 EOP counselors, including full-time Asian Coordinator.

Expansion of Work Study program jobs to the AASU East campus Berkeley

High School Project, to include at least 30 positions. That the Center for Chicano Studies be given permanent status with funds to

implement its programs. 4. Third World Control over Third World Programs

That every University program financed federally or otherwise that involves

the Third World communities (Chicano, Black, Asian) must have Third World people in control at the decision making level from funding to program implementation. 5. That no disciplinary action will be administered in any way to any student, workers, teachers, or administrators during and after the strike as a consequence of their participation in the strike.

These demands supercede any previous demands heretofore put forth by members of the Third World Liberation Front.

STATE STRIKER STRATEGY WINS

2:40 pm THURSDAY - (As phoned in by Art Gottlieb)

What looked like a standoff at S.F. State at 1:30 this afternoon turned into controlled pandemonium an hour later.

Over 500 strikers shouting, "On strike we'll be back!" prepared to leave the campus in what has been a traditional retreat in past

They marched up the central path, joined their brothers and sisters at 19th and Holloway and started to cross the street.

Before they had reached the other side squads of cops-about 75 - moved on them in orderly fashion.

Four squads of 4 horse cops each also charged the almost 500

The strikers retreated into Ecu- in the back with his club. menical House and neighboring yards and began to defend themselves with rocks and bottles.

Police surrounded groups of students only to be surrounded themselves by other students in what seemed to be a chaotic pattern. Gradually the cops began to dominate the situation.

I saw a sergeant personally pull back some cops attacking students on the Ecumenical House lawn. Supervising officers seemed to be urging restraint.

But I saw a pig strike a student

A typical action involved a UPI reporter named Rhytter. A cop pokes him in the back with his club. the reporter turns saying "Dig it" pointing to his press pass. He gets poked in the stomach. As he turns to retreat he is again poked in the back.

Now at 2:40 only about 200 strikers remain as the cops sweep them away from the campus. It looks mostly over as the first drops of rain start to fall.

MAY BE THE RAIN IS THE DOWNER

Lack of bread may kill off the teachers' strike at SF State.

Perhaps it was the rain, perhaps the cold, but no one on the AFT picket lines was very optimistic on

Tuesday.

The Trustees and their paymasters are cutting off the striking professors' salaries. The powers at State may soon just cut off the strikers' jobs.

One professor on the picket line told BARB, "If they fire everyone then people may just leave and look for jobs, that's a possibility."

Another bummer for the profs is the negotiations going on with the Trustees' legal henchmen.

"They won't even throw bones to us," another professor told us.
"These guys don't even want reform."

If the AFT strike trip is turning into a real down, a super cop-out is not about to happen. Prof. Thalheimer assured BARB that the striking teachers will not return to work even if the Trustees do meet the AFT's teacher demands.

"Nothing's gonna happen," he said flatly, "if they don't settle the student demands. There's no doubt about that.

"The other thing we have to have is a no-reprisal assurance," he went on, "for professors, students and staff too."

But if the Trustees have decided to let State die rather than turn

It is a good hunch, however, that the tactics will be more guerillastyle than they were last Bloody Thursday when the strikers rallied en masse in the center of campus.

Nor has the TWLF yet determined its policy for next semester's registration. But it seems clear that the striking students will have to do the registration thing in order to maintain their legal status as students.

Of course no one knows yet how many of the strikers Happy Haya will try to suspend or expel. It now appears, however, that the power structure sees SF State as its domestic Vietnam. Holloway and Nineteenth is the place where Reagan and Alioto have to make their stand against wars of student liberation.

SF State is no full-scale revolution yet, but stability and the status quo rest on the repressive mechanism's ability to destroy revolution in the bud.

The pigs' search and destroy operations at State have failed to break the strike. The Trustees may now be placing their maniacal faith in a policy of weeding out every fucking 'dissident' on the college's rolls.

The light at the end of the tunnel for Hayakawa is 100% scabs enrolled for next semester. But if he turns to that 'final solution' then Spring Registration may work out to be the Tac Squads Dien-

'WE'RE CONCERNED'

Students at Merritt College in North Oakland got a chance to speak out in a unique week of classes, before the strike started this week. They spoke strongly for saving their school from the wrecking crane and supporting strikers at San Francisco State. It was education at its best.

For two days classes met as usual but the standard subject matter was ignored. Instead students, and their instructors, discussed campus issues, student-faculty relationships, and the 15 Demands at

"We're Concerned Week" grew out of demands by the Black Students Union and a student advisory committee. Dr. Norvel Smith, unlike some other college presidents, took the students seriously and supported their convocation.

As a result, all segments of the college got down to it and discussed pressing, meaningful issues. For many students it was the first time they had the chance to discuss topics directly related to them in a classroom. People of all shades of opinion and every conceivable background joined in the often heated debates.

At the end of these talks every class in the school selected a delegate. Those selected were representatives to a meeting held before the entire student body and staff in the auditorium. There, each delegate reported the results

of his class discussion. Support for the San Francisco State strike was almost unanimous. They felt the struggle for the 15 demands related to them and all other college students.

The greatest source of irritation to Merritt students was the planned site for their school. The Trustees intend to tear down the old campus on the flatlands. They plan to build a plastic palace on hard-to-reach Skyline Boulevard in the Oakland

The present campus on Grove Street, by contrast, is easily reached from both Oakland and Berkeley. It is on or near a number of bus lines and only a few feet from the BART lines.

In addition, the proposed campus could handle less than half of Merritt's current enrollment. forcing many into other schools or out of college entirely. Those missing out would be, as usual, mainly Blacks, Third World people, and poor Whites from the lowlands. The assembly roared its approval

PROF NEVER WAS A PUNCH PULLER

my doctorate and go back to picking cotton."

The man walking beside me at SF State says this very easily, but the statement seems only to hint at the commitment to dignity and freedom which lies beneath it.

Earlier he'd told me, "If I get fired here, I can go back to box-ing again." When I responded with surprise, he explained, "A man can learn many things. I can hit a man as fast as I can type, a little faster in fact."

But I cannot envision this man withdrawing from the field of political combat in which he now lives.

His name is Dr. Nathan Hare. He authored the proposal for the Black Studies Department at SF State. When that department at last comes into existence he will be its director, chosen by the Black Students Union at State.

Before coming to State, Dr. Hare was fired from Howard University, which he calls "a colored school," because he tried to start a course in black history. Though he told the Administration at Howard he could always to back to picking cotton, he chose boxing instead.

"I'd become-disenchanted with college life," Dr. Hare says of that period in his life. "I didn't want to teach sociology to white students. And I didn't want to be caught dead teaching at a Negro college if they remained as they were.

He accepted the BSU's invitation to come to SF State because "I Sthought this might be my last chance to get back into academic life in a way that I could bear. didn't know Black Studies was going to spread around the coun-

Dr. Hare emphasizes the distinction between Black Studies and "polka-dot studies programs. The white professors at Yale can

dust off their old race relations. courses and call it Black Studies, but Yale doesn't know what black studies is."

"You must teach revolutionary pluralism," he says, "or else you're wasting time."

What is revolutionary plural-"An assimilationist wants the

black race to take on the culture, even the physical characteristics, of the whites. They call it integration, it's really disintegration. "The pluralist demands the right

to remain as a separate group, such as the French-Canadians are doing, such as the Jews did until they got a foothold.' The relevancy of Black Studies is that it would work "to solve

the problems of the black race,

the black community here. It would

"I told them I could always burn teach black students to help exterminate racism and oppression. We want to black out the white racism.'

Dr. Hare disagrees with the idea that the existence of a true black studies department in a college like State or Cal would have the effect of muting black militancy.

"Black Studies will give the students a sense of collective des-tiny," he explains. Participation in the black community is a cru-cial aspect of many of the courses listed in the proposal he wrote up at State.

Why set up black studies programs in the existing Universities, within the racist system?

"Ideally it could be done outside the universities," Dr. Hare feels. "But we don't have enough money to set up our own schools, the white man wouldn't recognize them anyway.'

Then there is the matter of a certain debt America owes to the black people. "We're not even talking yet about paying reparations, back pay for the work we were forced to do and fines for kidnapping us from Africa."

Dr. Hare sees the struggle for black studies as an essential part of the black liberation movement. "Social change is cumulative, it has a domino effect, just like Rea-gan says -- he's right about that."

Unlike the Establishment's academic leader at State, Havakawa, Dr. Hare regards college as "a microcosm for the society at large," and wishes to break down "the invidious distinction between campus and community."

About the relationship between studies and more obviously political aspects of the black liberation movement, Dr. Hare says dryly, "I don't think it's to be regarded as a training ground for Pantherism, because the Panthers haven't set up a prerequisite course for joining them."

"We teach the students to be relevant to the community," adds. "If the Panthers do that

I asked Dr. Hare about the future of the struggle at State. "Some of us will suffer," he said, his voice growing heavier.

"Some will lose their jobs, some will lose their boyfriends and girlfriends, some will go to jail, maybe some will get killed, unfortunately.

"In the long run, by struggling here we will lessen the degree of suffering and hurt that would otherwise accrue for centuries."

He paused for a moment, as if to grimace inwardly at the magnitude of the shit the people at State are being hit with.

"We're very much concerned about the fate of the people here,

from p.5 afternoon action the AFT picket line of 20 to 30 teachers continued in its monotonous round in front of the campus, apparently unaware of the action surrounding it.

Earlier at 1:40 Hari Dillon said he considered the students had won a tactical victory because they successfully ignored a court injunction ordering them to allow only five pickets five feet apart at each entrance. Nothing like this took place.

During the day I learned of five busts, in contrast to last week's mass arrest.

Third World leaders said this is the way it would be. And they said it like it is.

The Third World Liberation Front set the stage for action to come with their announcement that "We will march back on campus, Thursday. There is no room in the Strike for pacifism or nonviolence."

By Wednesday the people that were busted last week were swelling picket lines but there was an eerie calm as most students were finished with finals, and all that was left was strikers and the

Students arrested during the strike are receiving "Dear Recipient" letters from the administration. The letter states bluntly that federal grants and loans are being reviewed. Under an amendment to the Higher Education Bill, any student "disobeying the laws or regulations of the institutions," may lose his grant and/or loan.

Other students who are striking are facing bad grades and exclusion from credential programs, according to Student Government President Russell Bass.

Harrassment also includes the return of papers for spelling errors by administration secretaries. "Teachers on the picket lines will get such a hard time," one T.A. told Barb, "that they won't be able to stay on even when the strike is over."

The real test of Hayakawa's antics will come in the Spring registration, though. All strike leaders and striking students contacted say they are going to register for the Spring semester.

I removed my daughter (1st grade, Emerson Public School, Oakland) from school upon finding out that her teacher had, that day, washed a 6 year old girl's mouth out with "powdered soap" (which must have been a detergent) as a punishment. The teacher HAD NOT heard this girl say the word "motherfucker." The teacher was told by another 6 year old student that the girl had said this word. So the teacher picked this torturous punishment on hear-say evidence. All the students witnessed the punishment. I might add the child was black. Upon hearing of this incident I

wrote a letter to the teacher explaining to her that the language the children use is a result of their living with adults who use similar language and it is very unreasonable to persecute a child because of the sort of environment he was born into. Indeed, this word was deeply a part of a culture Oakland has successfully persecuted for some time. I was very angry, very reasonable and specific. I also explained to her that if any of the powdered soap had been inhaled the child could very easily have had an abscessed lung as a re-

The result was an apologetic letter from the teacher, explain-

ing that she was very over-worked because she was the head of some church committee for which she had been spending her evenings

BARB'S MISSION MISSION WAS NOT SO IMPOSSIBLE

The cops are confused, the press around, and didn't get busted. is confused, even most of the kids are confused at Mission High School.

Tuesday morning the phone rings. It's BARB's editor. "Get on over to Mission High School, he says. "Yeah, yeah, later."
A few more Z's and the phone

rings again. This time it's BARB's photographer. Was I planning to cover the Mission High School thing? We decide to meet at 11:15 a.m. across from the school.

Thirty minutes late, I rendezvous with the photographer who has been testing his patience waiting in the rain. We decide to have coffee since nothing is happening. The Good Karma Cafe is closed until 6 p.m. and the Dine-A-Mite Cafe on the opposite corner is serving only through the window because the kids busted up the joint the day before and stole some

The photographer says let's walk around the block, which we do, and the rain lets up a little. As we rap we discuss cops and agree that not all cops are pigs and not all pigs are cops. A few of them we like even.

Shortly, we are again walking directly in front of the old high school on the far side of the street. A cop gets out of the backseat of a patrol car and stops us.

He spots the camera and asks if we are newsmen or what. We tell him we are. "What paper?"

"The BARB," we tell him. Then ever so politely he quotes that section of the city code reminding us it is unlawful to be on or near school property etc. He suggests if we don't vanish fast we might get busted.

The cop is cool but stubborn. The photographer responds likewise.

The cop asks for credentials. I produce two legitimate out of state press passes. He turns them over and studies them. The fotog has nothing to show. (Chief Cahill refuses to recognize BARB). He says he is a free lancer. The cop is unhappy with this and again warns if we don't beat it we might land in jail.

Spectators create trouble because kids sensing an audience feel compelled to put on a show, the cop explains. Later we learn that black and Chicano leaders were also barred to the campus.

A long-haired white kid interrupts to tell the cop it's cool and nothing will happen that afternoon. He gives the implication that things happen only on cue.

"You can make a flat ass statement that nothing will happen?" demands the cop.

"Yeah," says the kid. "Nothing will happen this afternoon."

The rotund cop, wearing a black raincoat, says he wants to shake the kids' hand. He puts him down for predicting the action (which incidentally proved accurate).

"How do you know nothing will happen?" we ask.

"Because the Black Students, the rest of us all agree to cool it," he says.

Black and Chicano leaders had If this has happened once to the urged the students to stop fighting one another and unite against a common foe.

Members of the Peace and Freedom Movement urged students to fight against racism in their schools just as the students at San Francisco State have.

The cop is still anxiously waiting for us to leave.

How about that television crew down the street, we ask him. And how about those guys from the Chronicle and the Examiner who just went inside the building?

'They're all right,' says the cop. "We know those guys. The regular press is okay."

We wandered on, but hung

week in the Kern County Superior Court to have the injunction dropped. The farmworkers are questioning the right of the court to make the injunction. What the owners have to hide?

We talk to a carload of Chicano students listening to Spanish ra-dio. "What's happening?" we ask them. We had heard rumors of a walkout, a picket line, possibly more violence. "We don't know man," they answer. They knew nothing of the demands for a more practical English curriculum.

We talk to some black students smoking a joint in an alcove. They don't really know what is happening either. The trouble began with a fight between a Chicano and a black they thought. Two guys got jumped and their friends got into the action. The cops came and things happened.

Another student says the Black Students Union wants to get rid of teacher's aides who provide too much harassment in the corridors.

A cop car approaches; the kids The violence appears to be mis-

directed at this point. Black and Chicano leaders are trying to get together to explain

who the real enemies are. Mothers meanwhile protest that none of the students are getting the kind of education they deserve.

HIP COP JOB OPS **OPEN UP**

The BBC Police Patrol, which has been following the cops around on Telly for months, wants to give the Berkeley P.D. a new look.

"The police say they have a recruiting problem," explains Esther Zicklin, a veteran, groovy police watching chick, "and we want to help them. Since we haven't been able to dislodge the cops from Telegraph Avenue, why not have street people police their own area by becoming hip cops?"

Would any street people be willing to switch sides in the hip-

straight, people-police war?
"Obviously not," Esther flashed
back. "We won't change what's inside our heads. But some of us, black and white, whose minds have been opened by all that's come



down in the past few years, some of us must join the police department so that the police cannot stay as they are."

BARB saw one hang-up: How do hip people get past the straight entrance requirements?

Esther laid it out meet the legal qualifications set by police department recruiting materials. If they try to eliminate us because we're sane or because we don't believe that the use of force and authority are a policeman's only tools, we should fight that. You shouldn't have to look and act like Marshall Dillon to be a cop."

"And if some street people get through and become peace men, not cops, maybe the scene on the Avenue won't be so bad. How can we lose by trying?" Esther smiled.

The BBC Police Patrol will be leafleting the Avenue with its own version of police recruiting literature as they observe the cops on Friday and Saturday nights.

The Berkeley P.D. says there are more than 30 openings for officers right now. What would happen if 30 hip men, with flowing beards and hair walked in and asked to take the examination, right now? At least there'd be some solid test cases for court. if the doors stayed closed. Think about it.

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DAMPED BUT NOT DOWNED

EXCLUSIVE FOTOS FROM THE INSIDE

Hosed down, cold, without food, ly dark cell. and subjected to dehumanizing abuse by callous guards and matrons well over a hundred arrested women tried to make public their ordeal this week.

Monday representatives of the women arrested at S.F. State January 23, gave a press conference for the straight media.

"We were disappointed at the coverage," Carmen Carillo, a part-time instructor at State told BARB. "If there hadn't been daughters of the white middle-class there, the media would have ig-

nored the injustice we suffered completely," she charged. BARB talked to ten of the wom-en about their night behind bars. "It was a horrible experience,"

said one. "But I'm glad it happened. We learned first-hand what Third World people suffer every day.'

The hosing down was the most blatant outrage they suffered. The ruckus began when one student, Elizabeth Donnerberg was taken and placed in solitary. The cops contend she refused to give them

any information.
"That's a lie," she later charged. "As I was being led away I yelled at the top of my lungs, 'I didn't refuse to give my name and address. It's a lie!"

She was put in a small complete-

Other girls started to bang on the walls of their cell and chanted, "Let her out! Let her out!"

The noise was so loud it could be heard by demonstrators outside the building. Cops tried to bribe the women with food to keep them quiet, but to no avail.

"Suddenly something began to happen, "Betty Bishop, a Berkeley teacher told BARB, "I was in the back and shut my eyes expecting tear gas. Water hit me in the face. Then pandemonium broke loose. People were screaming and running. The water came from one side, then from the

"There was no place to escape," Bette Bentzman a history student at State said. "Some put up coats for protection but soon the whole cell was soaked."

A cop rushed out madly with his stick at the nearest woman. Other prisoners pushed him away,

Betty Bishop recalled.

After the high-pressure hosing Liz Donnerberg was taken out of solitary. But no blankets were There were not even enough mattresses to sleep on. A window was opened by guards letting in the cold night air. Despite pleas no food was provided to the pris-

Police Captain Peter Conroy of



the City Prison later claimed the cell was hosed because prisoners had urinated on the floor.

All the women to whom BARB talked were extremely incensed at the accusation.

"The charge is ridiculous," Cheryl Morrow a senior in anthropology said. "There is absolutely no truth in it."

"I was shocked to hear that fabrication," Betty Bishop said. "I feel so powerless. So many people will believe the word of one cop instead of a hundred strik-

Throughout the long day, from the time they were arrested at Hayakawa's police campus, till they were released the next mornthe women had to endure constant verbal sexual abuse and harassment from horny pigs and lesbian-type matrons. Snide comments and propositions were everpresent. "I wouldn't like that one"

Whore and Hot Tamale were especially reserved for Third World

women.

Carmen Carrillo charged black, brown, and yellow women were further humiliated by being forced to undress totally to be searched while white women were not forced to do this.

"One sister was refused medical aid for eleven hours," Miss Carrillo further stated.

None of the prisoners were advised of their legal constitutional rights nor informed of the charges against them. They were also refused the customary two phone calls. This was corroborated by all the women to whom BARB talk-

"After what went on there I believe almost anything said about cops," Helen Cook, an older Berkeley mother said.

"I didn't call them pigs before,"
Betty Bishop said, "But they certainly acted like pigs."

When we were arrested a pig or "I'll give you the best screw told me, 'We're going to take you you ever had' the cops would say. all to the ovens,' "Bette Bentz-Epithets such as Bitch, Animal, man said. She recalled him as a S.F. cop with badge number 1724. "The experience crystalized my feelings," Carmen Carrillo said. "Now I'm more committed than ever in the struggle against rac-

The Guatemala-born student reiterated how white women forced to go cold and hungry were made aware in a single night what Third World people suffer all their lives.

Most of the regular prisoners in

the jail were prostitutes from mi-nority groups. "They understood we all were in there under the same racist system," said Carmen. It was beautiful.

"We shared cigarettes and talked with them," Cheryl Morrow re-counted. "They were interested in what we had to say about the strike."

'I completely agree with the Panther program for freeing all imprisoned blacks," Cheryl continued. "It's so absolutely dehumanizing how people are treated in there."

None of the women were discouraged or dissuaded by their brutal experience. All vowed to be back on campus for this Thursday's

'I WAS A MALE CRACKER'

I am a male cracker, a chauvinist sitting inside his plantation dreams of superiority. In the movement my state of mind is typical. om all society's imprisoning securities, we men have nothing to hang on to but our own ego bloated testicles.

I first heard the term male chauvinism when I was in the Progressive Labor Party. I was always brought up by redfaced women and freaky-eyed men. The best guys in the party laughed at it in private and always joked at how the party's leader, Milt Rosen, treated his wife like private property.



And to push the Rockefellers one step closer to the wall--with all its gigantic fi-nancial empire that oppresses everyone from workers at the Standard plants to students at Columbia, to black people in the U.S. and Africa.

Margaret Leahy, who works with both Barrish and the strike told BARB, "We were up from Thursday morning to six o'clock Satur-day morning when the last students were released on bail."

"There were so many people

busted," Dorothy Torres, the pret-ty partner of Jerry Barrish told BARB, "that at first we couldn't get all their names because the court clerks didn't even have them

"We would get calls from pa-rents describing a blonde male in a red sweater and we would have to hunt him down."

The small office across from the Hall of Justice was crowded night Thursday and all day

A few people would get released and were met by a vigil of supporters before going over to Barrish for coffee or a warm blanket.

Dorothy would then go running back across the street with bail and papers for a few more.

"The cops didn't hassle me too much," she explained, "but when I saw all the windows shaking on the sixth floor I was afraid all the students would end up with felonies."

Barrish has been bailing State people out since last year as well as arrestees in the Auto-Row sitins, the Sheraton-Palace busts and the Free Speech Movement.

Everyone was able to get out on bail by Saturday morning because of their help.

State paper. Officers Palmer Jackson and Richard Honguisto, both detailed to the Community Relations Unit, and members of the Officers for Justice, put down the Tac Squad and other pigs during an interview with reporters.

The shit hit the fan later in the week, when the Police Officers Association heard the news. 90% of the SF cops belong to the union a group that believes ("after God, then George Wallace," says the OFJ).

The POA put the pressure on Cahill, the Police Commission, and Alioto, to nail their asses.

The Officers of Justice, the small union that Honguisto and Jackson helped found, defended the

In a statement made this week, the OFJ said "it was inevitable that the POA would make a move against Jackson and Honguisto."

"Most of the recent prosecution of white SF cops for maining and killing citizens has come out of the efforts of the Community Relations Unit that both Jackson and Honuuisto are in. Along with others, these two have spent off-duty hours helping to gather evidence against cops who have abused their badge and gun..."

A group of angry oil workers and their wives, came to the Richmond City Council to demand an end to the brutality of the Richmond cops, only to find that they were "not on the agenda." So they simply shouted down the meeting until this oversight was corrected, and Jake Jacobs, Secretary - Treasurer of the Oil Chemical and Atomic Workers local 1-561 was allowed to address the Council.

Jacobs had a personal as well as a collective grievance against the Standard Oil Goon Squad, which goes by the name of the Richmond PD.

On the preceding Thursday (Jan 23) two pickets at the Standard plant were arrested by Richmond cops for "felony rock-throwing" (I never heard of it either, but it carries an automatic one-year sentence.) When Jacobs went down to bail the two men out, he was stomped on and arrested by five of Richmond's finest.

"I know there may be individuals on the Richmond police force who are fair - minded and honest," Jacobs told the Council, "But those five who beat me up unnecessarily are just what I have heard other people calling the police these days: Pigs!"

He added that despite the City Council's promise of two weeks earlier to "study" the union's charges of police brutality, nothing had changed, and as far as the oil workers were concerned "The Richmond police are in the hip-pocket of Standard Oil." It was clear that this was also the oil workers' assessment of the Richmond City Council

When Mao-tse-tung wrote "The masses are the real heroes," he knew what he was talking about. Anyone who doubts this should come out here to Richmond, and walk the picket line with the oil workers.

These men, and their wives-many of whom put in at least equal time on the picket line -know they are up against one of the giants of American capital. Many of the old - timers were around in 1948 when "Bid Daddy," as they call Standard Oil, won a protracted battle with the same union. In that strike, police repeatedly used tear gas and clubs to break up picket lines, but the union held out for almost three months.

Standard's objective then was not to resist the immediate strike demands, but to break the union. Once this was accomplished Standard divided the men up by encouraging as many as 10 different unions to come in and organize different parts of the plant and by setting up a couple of its own "company unions."

BORN FREE

A few weeks ago, a child was born free in a San Francisco communal flat. The state has no record of its existence. The baby was delivered by the father and a nurse, acting as a

When a mother gives birth to an infant in a hospital, the baby's birth is routinely recorded and a birth certificate is issued. Usually,

as a precaution, the child's footprints are recorded. The state then has a permanent record of the existence of this new human being so that he might enjoy the many "benefits" society affords him.

"We want our son to be free, unprogrammed and completely unidentified with the state," says the child's young father.

"He will not go to public schools unless he wants to." He will not require a social security card because he will not seek employment unless he wants to. The boy will learn a handcraft

from his father. The parents say they plan to raise their son in the forest until he is old enough to know his own mind. "He can leave whenever he

wants," they say. The boy will not be forced to register for the draft because the state will not know he is alive.

If the child becomes sick, his parents plan to nurse him with herbs and rely on medical care outside officialdom's forms. "He will not get sick from the foul city air because he will be in the counsays the father.

The boy even has the option to keep his foreskin. And if he is ever busted? "He will tell them he's from another

planet," advises the father. Now will King Herod send his troops to search out this child born

without a number?

COUNCIL LIBERALS COP OUT, SO WHAT **ELSE IS NEW?**

As BARB predicted last week, Berkeley's "liberal" City Coun-cil bowed to reactionary pressure from its city bureaucracy and refused to place the Better Berkeley Council's three Charter Amendments on the April municipal election ballot.

It took until 1:30 A.M. for the Council to finish its hatchet job, with command performances by trembling - voiced City Manager Hanley and a red-faced City Attorney Anderson. Hanley, in a tearjerking performance that left not a dry leg in the house, obviously felt that his role as City Manager was being challenged.

"The Ombudsman concept was meant to protect against the power of the Swedish Kings," he sniped, so why does Berkeley need such a complaint officer to investigate citizen charges of abuses and misconduct by city employ-

The City Attorney, who by the way is employed by the City Manager not the City Council, produced a consistently right-wing interpretation of the law. Even Councilman Zack Brown, from the Co-op Credit Union, was annoyed at Attorney Anderson's up-tight reasoning. However, when Brown questioned Anderson's view he was slapped down like a naughty child who should be seen and not heard. "The Cityadministration," Anderson sneered, "is more complicated than running a credit union."

Strangely enough, only Black Councilman Sweeney, who is put down by people for his vacillating attitude towards police abuses, was willing to attack Anderson's bullshit and try to shovel it aside. Maybe the increasing pressure in black neighborhoods for a Civilian Review Board for police is starting to be felt even by Sweeney.

As usual, John DeBonehead kept up a steady stream of Birch Society - type noise and insult throughout the proceedings. Other Council members and even our Horatio Alger Johnson, found DeBonehead an embarrassment and wished he would get lost -- but he didn't. "Don't let these agitators fool you. They plan to destroy our fine police depart ment. This Citizen's Advocate is a Civilian Review Board in dis-

When the vote finally came down, Berkeley's castrated liberal City Council had been whipped back into line, and voted down a last chance for compromise with the left. They threw their future in with the rightwing, though the excuses were legalistic and financial.

"Too much money." "Need more time to study." "Conflict with the City Manager." "Oh

BBC's proposal for a Citizen's Advocate was the only one of the three amendments that the Council even bothered to consider seriously even so, Mayor Johnson threatened twice to adjourn the meeting because it was after midnight. (The Public Discussion on she said.






















FINAL JURY FOR 7

The jury that will decide the case of the Oakland Seven has finally been chosen.

The final juror was accepted shortly after Wednesday morning's recess when chief defense counsel Charles Garry rose to inform Judge George W. Phillips that the defense was "passing."

Just before the recess, assistant District Attorney Lowell Jensen had "passed," that is, indicated that he had no more peremptory challenges to make. Garry's move ended the two and a half week game of chess between Jensen and the three defense attorneys.

The jury that was finally chosen consisted of eight men and four women. One of the men is black and one is oriental. Garry had apparently been determined to get as many blacks on the jury as he could. Jensen had been just as resolute in keeping blacks off.

The one black man on the jury has a son in Vietnam who has written to him that antiwar demonstrations "don't do the morale any good."

Jensen also made a point of keeping people from Berkeley off the jury, causing defense co-counsel Richard Hodge to comment:

"There is no geographical representation on that jury at all. The DA has systematically excluded people from the northern half of the county. This county is split politically, the same way the state of California is. The southern half is much more conservative.'

The irony is, said Hodge, that the case is going to be decided by people predominantly from the southern half of Alameda County, although the incident occurred in the northern half.

Asked why the defense accepted such a jury, Hodge replied: ' was the best we could hope for under the circumstances. Those panels of prospective jurors were just loaded with people from San Leandro and places down south."

Garry appeared to be less con-cerned. "It is almost impossible to get a fair trial in a political case,' he said, "unless you have a jury of twelve morons with no political opinions at all. One or two bigots who lie always manage to sneak on a jury anyway.

Asked why he wanted as many blacks as possible on the jury, Garry replied: "Because black people know what police brutality is, and they know about wars against people of color. They also have experienced 'law enforce-

Garry also pointed out that the 1966 voter registration lists from which the jury panels were drawn completed eliminated the prospect of jurors in the 21-23 yearold age range, and severely cut down on jurors who would be under thirty. All of the Oakland Seven are under thirty.

The actual presentation of the case to the jury is not expected to begin until late Monday or sometime Tuesday, when Jensen and Garry will both make their opening statements. Before then, four alternate jurors will be chosen, and some key points of law will be argued.


The question of the admissability into evidence of the Nuremburg "Principles," and the mat-ter of "selective prosecutions" will probably be argued on Monday. The defense contends that under the principles laid down at Nuremburg, individuals are obliged to

oppose illegal acts by their own governments. They contend that since this is accepted international law, it is automatically U.S., and therefore California law. Thus far, no trial involving anti-

Vietnam war activists has allowed the Nuremburg principles to be used in criminal trials, although the Army court-martial that convicted Dr. Edward Levy did hear some evidence to that effect.

The Seven also contend that they were "selected" for prosecution by the DA out of the thousands who demonstrated during Stop The Draft Week, because they are all political activists.

brass against the Presidio stockade inmates charged with mutiny.

"The only chance they have is persistent community support," Brian Drolet of the National Committee to Defend Military Prisoners told a support crowd of 300 Tuesday in front of the Presidio. "They're facing a lifetime in prison while we only stand out here for a few hours," he reminded the crowd.

"It's been clear from the start the 27 have been selected as examples for all anti-war soldiers," Terrence Hallinan, attorney for 17 of the men told BARB this week. He has been in the forefront of the legal fight for the soldiers since the October 14 sit-in which sparked the case.

Captain Richard Millard, the hearing officer for the first six to go to trial recommended against mutiny charges. Any Army psychiatrist said several of the men are unadaptable to military life and should be discharged.

The only concession the command made is to ask for life sentences instead of the death pen-

alty as the maximum penalty. charges against the men be drop-ped," says a statement released

LASH!

Army - inspired restraining order's jury Thursday at noon, prohibited the Oakland 7 from setting foot on the Presidio Army Base, Friday, January 31. To support the GI's facing mutiny charges. The 7 had vowed to attend the trial. They will attend the rally.

Inspite of the notices, the Oakland 7 said they will toe the white line at the rally gate (Lyon and Lombard) and will publicly burn their restraining notices.

The 7 received the orders as they walked out of the Alameda County Courtroom in Oakland, where they are presently standing trial on conspiracy charges.

As BARB goes to press, rally in support of the Presidio 7 is still scheduled at 12 noon, Friday. It is sponsored by the Committee for Concerned Clergy and

Everyone is upset about the Tuesday morning by 35 religious hard-nosed attitude of the top Army leaders throughout the country. The group, which included 9 bishops, stressed the age of the soldiers (most are under 21) and condemned as inappropriate the serious charges placed against the men for demonstration against illegal conditions with the stockade.

"People in the East are equally outraged by this," theologian Harvey Cox, now at Harvard, said at Tuesday's rally. He spoke for more civil rights for GP's and for getting ROTC off college campus-

Another speaker, Phil Drath, former congressional candidate from Marin County, pointed out how people are forced to become more radical because the State is so repressive in keeping the status

There were no cops at the rally. Only a few MP's watched from the gate. Later about 100 protesters tried to get inside the courtroom, which seats only 40.

Inside the courtroom defense counsels sought a continuance on the grounds they hadn't enough time to prepare their cases. They had been caught unprepared,

expecting the Army to go along court granted a continuance to Thursday.

The six men facing trial are Larry Zaino, Larry Reidel, John Colip, Louis Ocezpenski, Edward Yost, and Richard Dodd.

The prosecutor is Captain John F. Novinger. Final decision as to the fate of the soldiers rests with 10 members of the general court-martial and the presiding military judge Lt. Col. George R. Robinson.

Meanwhile Hallinan is waiting for a ruling by U.S. District Court Judge Stanley Weigel on the Army's response about conditions in the stockade. Hallinan has asked the civil court to intervene because all other avenues of grievance have been exhausted. The Army in turn contends military officers were not approached about the grievances.

"It's only an absurd stalling tactic on their part," Hallinan said angrily. "They are well aware we've tried every recourse possible to correct the conditions inside the brig.'

UNATTENDED STRIKERS CHARGES MEDICS AND HOSPITALS WITH NEGLECT

BARB Thursday, the SF State Legal Defense Committee attacked the American Medical, and Hospital, Associations for their lack of concern with atrocities committed at San Francisco State.

"The existing medical community in San Francisco is more of a hindrance than a help in obtaining proper medical treatment, followup examinations, X-Rays and laboratory tests, says the letter with reference to medical needs of injured strikers.

"Your shocking professional, perhaps criminal negligence, should be exposed to all the people," continues the letter, signed

CLERIC **SWEATS OVER** MONEY

The money changers did a turnabout on an Oakland man of god several weeks ago. When it was all over he was bruised and battered by cops, his brand new car ripped off by the secret service, and facing a federal forgery rap.

Late Wednesday, January 15 Father Clinton Taliaferro of the Eastern Rite Catholic Church was returning from a visit in San Leandro. He stopped for gas, and paid with a ten dollar bill just returned from a loan. Shortly afterward a cop pulled him over.

"I thought it a routine traffic stop," Taliaferrolater told BARB. "While I was looking down for my driver's license I heard a clickclick noise. I looked up. There was a shotgun pointed at my nose. The cop said 'Blink and its all over'," the minister related.

Taliaferro and the two other occupants were lined up against the car and searched. A cop pulled a wad of \$10 bills from the minister's pocket and declared, "That's counterfiet."

"I was shocked," Taliaferro said. While handcuffed in back of the patrol car and sensing he could get in deeper trouble, he decided to eat the phoney bills.

"But they saw me," he told BARB. "one grabbed me by the throat, another by the windpipe. One by the nose. They beat my mouth with a leather strap till I opened it," he said, his face still swollen from the ordeal.

That was just the beginning of the minister's troubles. After a night in San Leandro jail he was taken to the Federal Building in San Francisco. Because his car, a 1968 Camero, was supposedly used in a federal crime it was impounded by the Secret Service.

Finally out on bail the minister returned home to his apartment to find another surprise. His door had been kicked open and his place ransacked. On the desk was a pre-trial hearing officer. The Service. The landlord asked Taliaferro, his wife and 16 month old son to vacate. So in three days the minister had almost lost every-

Taliaferro has contacted the ACLU for help. "The cops have ripped people like this all the time," the minister said. "Somebody should do something."

Getting down to specifics, English relates how "Dr. Ellis Sox, Director of Public Health had originally agreed to have all the injuries examined at City and County General Hospital and special arrangements were made for this purpose. However, he and the hospital Administrator, Mr. Swanson, refused to implement any such arrangements and Dr. Soxalso exercised his authority to permit the use of MACE on campus without providing any effective restrictions."

English further states, "Shortly after the campus massacres, the Office of Economic Opportunity ordered its Mission District Shotwell Clinic not to treat anyone involved at San Francisco State, About this time Dr. George Stuart, who agreed to treat people at his home, lost his job at the Clinic."

After several phone calls to the University of California Medical Center, which has the best laboratory facilities in Northern California, English says he was flatly refused help in any way "other than recommend that I go to the San Francisco Medical Society."

English also points out that the S.F. Medical Society Executive Committee voted to "publicly commend Dr. Hayakawa for his repressive actions."

The letter tells how other doctors and Clinics refused to help, saying "If the people wanted to demonstrate they should be prepared to suffer the physical and financial consequences.

St. Luke's and Mt. Zion and the Black Man's Free Clinic are commended by English for the service they have provided. He also states that about 35 internists, MDs and specialists have agreed to provide free care.

The letter is directed to The President of the AMA and AHA. It reminds them, "Any doctor in the world is bound by his profession to give treatment on a priority basis to those that need it most regardless of his political be-

English urges Dr. Mark Berke, the president of the Hospital Association; and Dr. Dwight Wilbur, president of the Medical Association to come to the campus any

day. "The responsibility for attending to the present and future numbers of casualties should not be left to the victims," English states, and continues:

"I will not be surprised on the day when strikers are gunned down by police who have already learned that no one with any power in this country will prevent them from using any form of violence."

"The community is totally unprepared in terms of medical facilities to handle the situations of mass casualties from people-police confrontations which probably will be happening in the Bay Area and the country for many years to come in increasing intensity," the letter charges. "Just what would your people do if 2000 people were shot and clubbed on the campus tomorrow?"

"I therefore request that in your positions of authority and influence you assist expanding the panels of doctors, lab facilities and hospitals needed to serve in the event of mass casualties, as a result of political confrontation in the Bay

When the commune wished to take action, it would be most likely to act in more relevant directions than are presently being taken on campus. Many communes would co-ordinate their activities and some would specialize (supply, communications, agitprop, leaflet production and distribution, etc.)

Thus the communes could form a decentralized revolutionary organization within which members could maintain the close contact which is so vital for sustained militancy. It would be a substantial and yet invisible organization, capable of explosive activity or dormancy as the situation demanded.

The closest example at hand might be the "centrals" of the Free Speech Movement at Ber-The FSM never had a keley. storefront office until the action was all over. During its creative period all activity was organized from the apartments of partici-

The original "FSM Central" at 2536 College (now torn down) became a beehive, with two phones and an average staff of six people including a maternal type who commandeered the kitchen to turn out meals for all who wished to eat at the time. Food money came from the campus donations.

They are formless (I should say more properly that to me they are formless — because the people who made them certainly thought they had a form) meanderings around the point, and no matter how much I agree with you. The question is often raised in this context, is this film, whatever film we have at hand, good propaganda? It's so in, so much like a homemovie, that I can't understaind, (the person asking the question says after having seen the film) how anybody outside the movement could be moved by these films. That question isn't as bad as it might seem at first glance. A better question is, how effective are these films within the movement? I can speak for myself; they fail to move me, and the pain of it is, they should be so much better than they are.

After I had seen some Newsreel films I talked to one of their number, and he told me how they make a film. A crew is assigned

"super-star" and proceeded to include in that category such personages as Bloomfield, Buddy Miles, Kooper, Bishop, and virtually everyone else who had in some way won admiration and critical acclaim in the pop music

Roughly about the same time the idea of jamming came to prominence, ie. a bunch of cats getting together and just playing whatever happens to come out. Through some bungle unequaled in the history of pop-blues music, a decision was made to record this type of thing for commerical sales.

The results were the first "Super Session" lp, a lot of rehashed material, none of which was really original, and generally the whole thing was a bore. Unfortunately for the direction of new music it was also a successful seller.

Now we are graced with the second lp in the series, The Live Adventures of Mike Bloomfield and Al Kooper. The musicians' terminology for this lp is "SOS" -- same old shit.

None of the cuts are outstandingly good; few are even as good as mediocre. None of the material is new. The vocals for the most part are poor, and the musicianship ranges from above average (thanks to some nice but infrequent licks by Michael) to virtual rock bottom.

It is interesting to note that the 'stars' themselves don't regard the lp too highly. Both Bloomfield and Kooper include speeches and liner notes on the record which, regardless of their intended functions, serve only as the cop-outs that they (the speeches) really



HE MASTER

Buster Keaton, the slight small figure whose mask-like face and puppet-like movement and carriage could express a range of emotion and action which has never been surpassed; the master of comic timing, the sight gag, the fade; the brilliant performer who not only executed all of his own stunt work but also directed, wrote, and edited most of his films; the nearly forgotten genius whose work has been locked in vaults for the past twenty five years, with the exception of a very few films circulated by the Museum of Modern Art -- for the first time in years a comprehensive selection of his works may be seen locally at the Telegraph Repertory Cinema Theater.

Keaton's work is characterized by integrated movements of objects (including props, bits of costume, animals, machines, vehicles, natural forces, and human beings) engaged in a series of actions furthering the development of plot. This treatment does not imply contempt for humanity but rather that man, animals, machines, and the natural world function as actors engaged in total commitment to the dictates of the action.

All response and relationship is conceived and expressed as movement, so that one can speak literally of Keaton's films as comic ballets of human and inhuman.

animate and inanimate objects.
In his feature lengths films the structure generally possesses the following format. Keaton leaves an accustomed place, travels to a radically different environment, arrives in an unpleasant manner to find himself an alien in an incomprehensive world. The action then centers upon his attempt to adjust or survive and the series of situations which enable him to

The journey may be used as the vehicle to transport Keaton from the accustomed environment of the predictable to the cultural disorientation he faces as an alien in a foreign environment. The distance and difficulty of the trip and



his painful arrival not only emphasize his total isolation but also indicate the degree of strange-

ness he will encounter. In GO WEST (1925) the boxcar of the train is both an uncomfortable cell and a symbol of his exile, the distance and duration of his journey is shown by a diminishing loaf of bread and sausage . when he reaches his destination he is spewed forth in a potato barrel by the action of the train.

The train functions as an active participant in the film "OUR HOS-PITALITY (1923). As it journeys from the North to the South, it passes from a straight-forward journey through a friendly environment to a point where it and its passengers are subjected to an increasingly hostile and primitive environment. Upon its arrival Keaton is violently ejected by the ac-

tion of the environment upon the train.

Visual motifs and symbols are enmeshed in the film's structure. An object will be treated realistically in earlier scenes, then used throughout the action, pick-ing up associations and interrelationships along the way, each time moving further from realism into the world of expressionism where more and more incongruous events proceed with artistic inevitability leading Keaton, as director and performer, and his viewer to the brink of the absurd.

This may take the form of a visual leit-motif. The TWLF policy of gradually building the strike with as much white support as possible began to pay off at high noon.

A few minutes earlier, the pigs invaded the campus. They drove a peaceful picket line at the main entrance to the campus and then took up positions there, at Bancroft and Telly. Soon they were stationed at Sather Gate and Wheeler Hall as well.

Thousands of students, stunned by the sudden swine occupation, milled around the unwanted officers, waiting to see what would happen.

At one o'clock it happened. Hundreds of students -- black, brown, yellow and white -- emerged from a Third World convocation in Room 11, Wheeler Hall.

Row after row, they marched through Sather Gate, their fists raised in unity, chanting On Strike! Shut It Down.

It was like magic. Hundreds of white students joined the line. Suddenly people knew who their brothers were and what they had to do.

The endless line circled Sproul Hall and came back through the center of campus. The pigs didn't dare get in the people's way.

The students then improved their path by promenading down Bancroft in front of the University. On and on the crowd paraded, adding Dwinelle Hall, a huge classroom building, to its route.

A squad of bewildered pigs emerged from the Sproul Hall basement to show the flag in Dwinelle. But the line had already moved on. Nearly two thousand strong, the students strode through Parrows Hall, another classroom container, to confront the scabs with the reality of the strike.

Mobile and disciplined, proud and determined, the march of the strikers shook the campus to the bones of student apathy and ignorance.

In an hour's time a mass movement had gotten itself together at Cal. The patterns of the struggle

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

undergoing treatment by an analyst for anxiety which is causing tachycardia in my heart. However, neither he nor my M.D. will explain

tachycardia to me.
I also wonder if getting stoned on grass would be detrimental to me? My analyst doesn't care if Ismoke weed. The tachycardia doesn't occur when I'm stoned, but some-times happens when I'm crashing or just relaxing but never when I am up tight, so I am confused as more. to its being caused by anxiety. Can

you explain?

ANSWER: Tachycardia means simply a rapid heart beat and is a symptom, not a disease. Apparently your physician has ruled out any organic cause for this condition. Paroxysmal tachycardia is a condition in which the heart beat becomes rapid (perhaps 140 beats per minute), often without a known cause. The increased rate in itself may cause anxiety but usually is not harmful unless it persists for 12 hours or more. People with this condition should be under the care of a physician. Until medical advice is received, the patient psychedelic trip. should lie down and rest. Sometimes, putting one's fingers down the back of the throat and gagging will stop an attack of paroxysmal tachycardia.

Marijuana may increase the heart rate slightly in some individuals but the drug usually acts to relieve anxiety. Don't forget your unconscious. You may be uptight when you're not aware of

QUESTION: Recently, friends and I turned onto a drug popular with poets and literati generations ago, nitrous oxide. We found the experience to be among the most religious we have encountered with the strongest of the psychedelics. I could easily see how it could be

QUESTION: Would you please called simply "laughing gas" but explain what tachycardia is? I am if one knows where to go, it can take you to the void, the threshold of death, "IT," "Ohm" or whatever it all means to you.

Anyway, we took in alternate tokes of N2O and air, passing the tank around the room or sometimes taking two or three hits consecutively until either we were too far beyond to handle the mechanical valve, or until it was felt that we might not be getting enough oxygen to the brain any-

Thus my question is, what are the potential dangers involved in the use of nitrous oxide this way? Would a person become anesthetized before damage would occur?

OM SHANTI ANSWER: Nitrous oxide was a popular turn-on for medical students at least as early as 1808. Later in the 19th century carnival side-shows offered "laughing gas" at 5¢ a whiff. Today it is one of the most widely used anesthetics and it is a curious fact that almost every person who has had a general anesthetic, i.e., "put to has gone on a far-out sleep."

The chief danger in the use of nitrous oxide for highs is death by asphyxiation. This could occur if a person strapped an anesthesia mask around his head, attached it to the tank, and turned the tank and himself on. Death is caused not from the effects of the gas but from lack of oxygen while the person is unconscious.

Another common danger, and one greatly feared by anesthetists, could be caused by eating IN KANSAS CITY.

just before using the gas. Nitrous oxide causes a significant number of people to be nauseated. Vomiting while under the effects of the gas could cause food to be aspirated into the lungs. Taking the gas directly from the tank might cause painful freezing of the lips or possibly the larynx.

Other dangers are theoretically possible but uncommon. Nothing is known about possible harm from chronic use of nitrous oxide. For most people it just seems to be a
