Remember: You don't have to be guilty to get arrested. To the Municipal Police, guilt or innocence is often irrelevant, many prople are simply extorted on the

Municipal Police, guilt or innocence is often irrelevant, many propie are simply extorted on the spot and told to leave town.

The most important part of getting busted is; be diplomatic. I cannot stress this point enough. A recent survey taken here at the carcel shows that four out of five gringos here badmouthed the man while being arrested.

Assume your guilt automatically and stress the point that it is important to you to pay a fine on the spot, you have to leave town today or whatever.

But time is crucial. The amount of the fine and the difficulty in regaining your freedon both increase the longer you are under arrest. Pay the cop, Whatever he asks for will be the cheapest, If you can't solve your problem on the spot and get taken down-town, the fine jumps to its current level (about \$530.00)

spot and get taken down-town, the fine jumps to its current level (about \$300.00). Forget any ideas about legal assistance from the American consul. There is nothing he can do to help until a fine is arranged between you and the police. When it is necessary to have money wired to pay your fine, he will help you but the consul will not represent you, nor will he interfere with the Mexican legal process in any criminal case.

Upon regaining your freedom, leave town immediately. The only other survey taken recently shows that 8 out of 10 gringos here in the carcel are doing their second beef. 80% of the American population in residence failed to observe this point.

While the Canadian border is tightening upon deserters and draft dodgers, it is NOT closed to

says the Montreal Council So says the Montreal Council to Aid War Resisters in a letter dated Feb. 3. The straight press has been running reports that deserters are routinely barred from immigration to Canada.

"The situation is bad," says Ed Miller, Executive Secretary of the

"The situation is bad," says Ed Miller, Executive Secretary of the Council, "but we are still able to get guys through."

The Montreal Council is helping to prepare a brief pointing up the contradiction between stated imcontradiction between stated immigration policy and practice, Canadian immigration law clearly states what qualities of an applicant are to be considered by officials. Military status, present or future, is not one, and this has been reaffirmed by high officials. But directives have gone out to lower officials to bar deserters. The Montreal Council refers to an "internal directive" dated July 1968 to that effect which was ack-

1968 to that effect which was ack-

nowledged by a "spokesman for the Immigration Department." The latest word from draft re-sistance groups in Canada is for prospective immigrants to avoid applying for immigration status at the borders and enter as visi-tors.

Once inside, application may be made, although the wait may be a problem. "Such applicants may be effectively starved out because they are not permitted to work

HOW YOU CAN TELL THE COPS **FROM PIGS**

Police officers or pigs?
Last Friday California Highway
Patrol Officer Vital was amiably
chatting with UC students about
his Mexican-American upbringing.
Someone asked if he was going to
be our leader in the revolution.
Everyone laughed, Students even
made up a yell "Vital supports
the strike."
The next Monday Vital was back

The next Monday Vital was back at UC, ordering his men to charge defenseless onlookers in Sproul Plaza. I inquired about his former friendly attitude. He said he didn't remember what happened Friday. When it comes right down to it, none of the friendly conversation will mean shit. The cops become dehumanized robots following orders, or brutal pigs sadistically clubbing anyone in their path. Even after a day on the strike line you learn who the real pigs are and stay out of their way.

Number 302 of the CHP pushed a girl repeatedly with his stick because she was going the wrong way through Sather Gate. Only the shouts of other students drove him off.

Number 323, another CHP tried to trip me as I sought to retreat. Later he was in on an arrest in Sproul Plaza, using his stick gleefully around a striker's throat. "What kind of people are you," a girl demanded of #288 of the Alameda pigs. The bulline cked bluedecked bastard had just pushed Dave Comstock, A University employee for walking past the police line.

"How can you live with

"How can you live with yourself?" students asked him. "Do you know what the strike is all about." But 288 remained silent. Sweat

But 288 remained silent. Sweat formed on his face as he stared straight ahead, cornered by dozens of students. You could tell he was itching to get his club on all the goddamn dirty commies around him. Other cops took him aside before he could blow up.

"Go home and beat your wife," people shouted after him. "Tell her what a hard day you had."

"If have no sympathy for anyone," CHP Vance #3398 told inquiring strikers. They had asked how he felt about police turning dogs on blacks in Birmingham. Occasionally a few cops smilled to the chant, "Work, study, get ahead,

the chant, "Work, study, get ahead,
kill!" or to queries if they had
seen "Yellow Submarine," But
everything became tense when the
chant became "Off the pigs."
"It's my first day here," Number 2677 a meek looking cop talking to some medics said, "But I
don't know what's going on." He
appeared scared, surrounded by
hundreds of students.
"He doesn't seem the type to hit
anyone," the medic said as he
walked away, "But he'd do it just
by reflex, He's so nervous."

At 3:55 students chanted "Eim,
Swel, Drei!" as their uniformed
adversaries marched off the campus in what has become a common
event in America.
But atop the Student Union there
still remained agents with spyglasses, Strikers gave them the
finger, Another secret policeman
in a red sweater was above the
cigar store on Bancroft and Telly.
That's an even more frightening
view of the America to come.

Pigs on campus make for bad

Pigs on campus make for bad working conditions, according to American Federation of Teachers local 1570 at Berkeley.

AFT 1570 is the teaching assistants' union.

Union members passed a resolution Monday ordering their representatives to stress the importance of the removal of police from the campus and the termination of Reagan's state of emergency in current negotiations with the University administration.

The Monday meeting also resulted in a definite decision to hold a peace picket on campus Thursday to test the state of emergency.

No specific ban on peaceful picketing has been announced since Reagan's decision, but there was a report that police broke up a moving picket line set upby TWLF

on Monday.
Union members gave their exec-Union members gave their exec-utive committee authority to call a strike meeting when necessary, but rejected a proposal to seta definite date for it. AFT held a strike vote two weeks ago which was unsuc-cessful. Members did not want to risk another unsuccessful attempt to call a strike. to call a strike.

to call a strike.

The two factors in the background of the union's actions were
the current TWLF student strike
at Cal and negotiations now under
way between the union and the administration over a variety of
issues.

AFT 1570 has demanded that the administration implement the TWLF demands, and is also seeking the right to organize on camsee p. 14

UC Berkeley was a battleground on Thursday.

Two hundred or more pigs waged war on several thousand students and compatriots.

The entire AFT picket line was busted.

About twenty other busts were made throughout the afternoon, as

BARB went to press. Most of the victims being beaten first.

The striker's lines swelled with new supporters, as the helmeted pigs

Shoved and smacked their way through campus.

Before the struggle for control of Sproul Plaza began, three Third World Liberation Front leaders, Jeff Leong, Howard Ramsey and Elijah Turner, were arrested as the Highway Patrol broke up peaceful picket lines.

Then came a noon rally at which Jim Nabors vowed that "We will

Then came a noon rany at which Jini Yaanob vowed that we was seize power, we will rip it off as they ripped it off from us."

Third World Community supporters of the strike failed to show up on campus in sizeable numbers. Ysidro Macias, a TWLF spokesman, attributed this to the economic facts of Third World life. "Our people just don't have the kind of jobs where they can get away to attend a morning rally at UC."

Macias told BARB that "the strike cannot continue as it has. It's going to take a very different character." see p. 26


The afternoon got more uptight as defiant students were singled out for Alameda County's world-renowned B&B, being beaten and busted.

TWLF LEADER TELLS WHY HE'S WHERE IT'S AT

"As a child I was interned for four years in concentration camps in San Mateo and Utah."
Richard Aoki takes another drag on his cigarette and continues to carefully and unemotionally describe his life under the gun of American racism.
Richard Aoki is a spokesman for the Third World Liberation Fron: at UC Berkeley.
After WW II, the Japanese-Americans were liberated from the 'relocation centers' and Richard began his education in black gheto schools in the Bay Area.
"Of my junior high graduating class, more than 50% have been in jail or are in jail now. I see this as a reflection of their being unable to achieve a standard of living through traditional means."
Richard attributes his school-

means."
Richard attributes his schoolmates' alienation from trad tional
means to the West Oakland ghettols "high rate of unemployment,
sub-standard housing, inadequate
educational institutions, inferior
medical services, and constant
police harassment."
One high school teacher advised
Richard that "I'd end up in San
Quentin five years after I got
out of school.
"I took it on a very personal
level when they vamped on me,
but in retrospect," he says now,
"I see they couldn't have acted
in any other way because of the
racist nature of the institution."
When he was I7 Richard signed
up, for the Army hoping to attain
a measure of "vertical mobility."
He was offered a commission "but
I stold them I wanted to do some
other things."
After the Army Richard spent
two years at a junior college in
a pre-med program. But, "I gave
that up upon being convinced of
the racist nature of the medical
profession. There is no institution in this country that doesn't
have it.
"I started asking around about
the medical schools and found that
there was a quota system for
Asian-Americans."
"Having failed to find a racismfree zone in either the service
or school, Richard, went, on the
road. He spent six years "wandering about the country, just seeing, what it's all about."
Along the way he worked as a
truck driver, hospital orderly,
clerk and factory hand. He learned
two, things; that there aren't any
areas in this country really free
of, racism, and that his thing was
to work for the Asian-American

ommunity.
"I became convinced that this is my country, and if it's going to become a more positive society then I have to stay here and help."

then I have to stay here and help."

"Leaving the road, he returned to school, graduated with honors in sociology, and is now a grad student at UC. The Third World Strike is his way of creating a racism-free zone for this country's Third Worlders.

"I think the strike's going on quite well. Morale's quite high, we still think we're going to win."

Richard believes the Third World College will help the minority communities by creating "a circular thing where the youth leaves the community, comes on campis, and then goes back to the community."

The Thir Fiber But a great deal.

leaves the community, comes on campus, and then goes back to the community."

The TWLF has put a great deal of energy into building strike support in the Third World community. "If we convince them that we're fighting in their best interests, then there will be another dimension to the struggle."

The Front expects this support to materialize Thursday (BARB press time) on campus, and the future direction of the strike depends on Thirsday's turn-out.

"The Third World College will be instituted at UC," Richard says flatly. "it's just a matter of time. The strike is a manifestation of the question of who's going to control it."

Though the TWLF has received a favorable response from some of faculty and administrators, "the a

main sources of power at the university have indicated an intransigent attitude of non-cooperation with the Third World Liberation Front."

The Front is aware that many white strikers are dissatisfied with the strike's tactical pace, but "they haven't seen anything yet, we've just started.

"Multi-faceted systems of pressure will be exerted on the University.

VICTIM TALKS

VOWS HE'LL SUE COPS NOT JUST FOR SELF

Jack Millard, ahistorygradstudent from UCLA says he's going to sue the police for false arrest and brutality for the treatment hen received Tuesday, February 4. Three weeks ago he came up here to enroll at UC. Last week he found himself enrolled instead in the Santa Rita jail.

Here's his story in his own words as told to BARB:

Tuesday at 12:30 I was watching the action at Sather Gate. Although I'm sympathetic to the strike I've never been in the picket line. Suddenly I saw two men try to drag someone out of the strike I've never been in the picket line. The next thing I knew I was hit on the head from behind. I got no warning before I was hit. I was absolutely surprised. I think I went out for a second. I fell to the ground moaning. When I touched my head it was full of blood, My glasses were broken.

I remember people picking me up. They weren't, in uniform so it didn't dawn on me the were police. I didn't see any badges. Nobody told me I was under arrest. One man talked to me very reassuringly. He was a black medic. Halfway into Sproul the plain-tolches cops yelled at the medic to get out. They manhandled him. Inside I told them I was innocent and not a striker. They photographed and fingerprinted me, one cop tied some bandages over my head wound.

In the interrogating room I saw 4 or 5 plainclothes men drag John Burke into a chair. 4 or 5 plainclothesmen drag John Burke into a chair. He was asked his name and address and he replied. He was asked his age and replied it was on his license. One of the cops gave him a backhand across the face.

Later the plainclothesmen ran out. I think they returned to Sather Gate. As they passed one of them hit me on the jaw and knocked me to the floor. I may have mumbled something to him, I don't remember. Even cop #62 saw him hit me.

Me. At 4:30 we were placed in a police wagon and taken to Santa Rita. I kept asking for medical attention but wasn't given any till 7:30. I requested an X-ray for my head but wasn't given one. I was not even allowed to make a phone call. I'm epileptic and asked for Dilantin for which I have a prescription. It was hours before I got any.

scription. It was hours before I got any.

The charges against me are resisting arrest and obstructing traffic. Both are absolute lies. I intend to sue. Not only the brutality on myself, but on others.

"This is a typical outrageous case of a guy who was beaten for doing nothing, "Terence Hallinan, Millard's attorney told BARB. "Rather than getting satisfaction for the brutality he has to defend himself against serious criminal charges."

Bear felt KSAN "decided I was too far out. This is probably a warning to the troops. Maybe this is a new trend," he wondered. "We gave them a station that is vital, now they'll try to clean up their image for the advertisers."

The same day Bear was sacked a memo was passed out asking announcers not to knock and joke about their sponsors, "Otherwise there will be a quick remedy," the memo stated.
"It's weird," he told BARB. "Since I was fired there has been no mention of it on KSAN. I'm treated like a non-person. I'm sure the other announcers were told not to say anything."

Bear was formerly the highest paid announcer on KMPX the FM station which did a great deal to change the concept of radio on the

San Francisco scene.

After the KMPX strike last March most of the staff was hired by Metro-Media which runs KSAN.

"But now that we've fulfilled our function, we're tossed away."

The jobless DJ is not interested in returning to KSAN. "No sense going where youaren't wanted," he said. "It all came down so quickly I don't know what I'll do now. Maybe write a book or just sit and think for a bit." Maybe write a boo and think for a bit."

Station manager Vernon Paulsen was in Los Angeles and unavail-able for comment at BARB press time Thursday afternoon.

SUICIDE SCENE

ON PRESIDIO'S

"The present situation inside the Presidio is dynamite. Its ready to blow up any minute."

A young G.I. is describing the tension mounting steadily inside the base in an exclusive phone interview with BARB shortly before it went to press Thursday.

"The soldier who attempted suicide yesterday by burning himself alive was no isolated incident; he's not the only person who has recently been pushed over the edge."

The GI, known to BARB from other days, prefers to identify himself only as "Kurt the Russian. He speaks angrily. He is under Presidio detention, too.

"No one on the outside would believe the shit that has been coming down on all of us who are here for going AWOL. They are pushing us towards mutiny, and at this rate it won't take long".

"Kurt" proceeded to tell in detail what actually occurred at the presidio Wechesday morning.

"Kurt" proceeded to tell in de Presidio Wednesday morning.
"It had to happen; he was just driven too far. His name is John Brown, and like most of us he was here for going AWOL. The psychiatrist here recommended that he be discharged, but instead the Army decided to send him to Korea. He couldn't take it; he's been there before and its hell."
"We were in formation yesterday in front of our barracks for harrassment (doing push-ups in the mud and stuff). That's when he suddenly poured a can of lighter fluid over himself and set himself afire.

self afire.

"We jumped on him and smoth-ered the flames, While the ambu-lance was coming, one of the guards, Sgt. Colbert, told him 'If

guards, Sgt. Colbert, told him 'If you want to burn yourself, next time go do it where we can't see you'.

"What broke him is the same thing that's broken others here lately," Kurt continued bitterly. "It's the harrassment, brutality, and torture that's been going on." "January the 10th was the day it started getting really heavy the day a new team of Airborne Rangers came to the base. Since then it's been constant harrassment, harrassment of all the AWOL cases, and it's been even worse cases, and it's been even worse for the ones they've worked on

in the psychiatric ward."
Kurt described some in the psychiatric ward."
Kurt described some of the nightmare that he and his buddies have been existing in. He cited cases of people in the psychiatric ward who have been systematically and purposely driven to insanity by the guards. Soldiers whose arms have been broken by guards, and other victims of their sadism whose medical needs were neglected.

sadism whose medical needs were neglected.
Almost casually he told about the Rangers' favorite treatment for the guys in his barracks.
"Well, its a detention cell off by itself in the basement. It's painted black, so we call it either the 'black room' or the 'torture chamber'.

The Rangers like to take us

The Rangers like to take us down there one at a time, and beat us up for fun until they get tired."

BARB asked Kurt why the of-ficers in charge of the Rangers don't do something about the situa-tion, and Kurt quickly assured BARB that they did. "The officers like to have their fun too." He named two. Kurt told of about one time when the MPS filled the SPD bar-racks that he and other AWOL.

when the MPs filled the SPD bar-racks that he and other AWOL cases were in with CS gas (a particularly vicious gas that pro-duces nausea and temporary chok-ing and blindness).

Kurt said they did it just for something to do, and added that when the GIs attempted to flee

*charges to keep them in.

Kurt told of how scattered incidents around the base are building up to such a climax as they occur with increasing frequency. This included the Administration Building that was set on fire about three weeks ago (it was discovered too soon to do any drastic damage).

This last week I have gone to many movies, I'm making some movies, I'm writing a book about movies, I'm talking about movies a good part of the time, and even at this moment, I'm supposed to be writing a column weirdly titled AT THE FLICK.

Starting the week, or was it last week, with a preview screening of ISADORA, the story of Isadora Duncan. I can't remember what day that was, but it doesn't matter. The most interesting thing about the evening was that we sat in front of a columnist for a San Francisco paper, and a banker. For about fifteen minutes I overheard their conversation.

You bet I eavesdropped. It isn't every day that I get to spy like this. I understood why a lot of people are talking about having a revolution in this country. The people who have power, like this banker, aren't about to give any house up the block. Actually, it

We were walking around San Francisco one day, looking at a neighborhood going to pieces. We were looking at the facades of the houses crumbling, talking about how the city would assess the owners for more bread if they fixed up their places. This is, without a doubt, a negative incentive to improve your dwelling. Why do the poor get shat upon, we wondered? Off in the distance we could see out toward the bay, and there was the new Bank of America building going up, appropriately juxtaposed with a little playground set in some Irving Renewal project.

The playground was a model of ingenuity, with metal frame camels and other animals the kids were supposed to be playing on, but they weren't. There must have been a dozen kids scattered around the few huildings that constituted what I assume was a city project for lower income families (the culturally disadvantaged - this is a glaring example of institutional racism terminology).

Not one kid was playing in the playground. The only kid near it, was playing stick ball despite it, having to weave his way through those terribly creative metal monstrosities. I asked him if he liked the playground, and sure, he said, I like it. But that was clearly shit, since it was getting in his way.

But it isn't only the poor, it's the sappy white and blue collar workers who suffer too, in fact, anybody who isn't well off, with few exceptions, gets the shaft. Take incometax, I'm thinking about it, since I visited a friend the other day who was doing his tax, over the phone, with his accountant. He is what I think is called, in some circles, an independent ant. He is what I think is called, in some circles, an independent operator. He works for himself, gets his income from a number of sources, lives by his wits more or less. The way he fills out a tax form is the way a Rockefeller must. He gets lots of exemptions, and winds up paying almost no tax. In fact, last year it worked out that he made less than \$1000 after deductions, which is nice on paper, but you can't support a family on that, and somehow he did. Moreover, he did not cheat with his tax form, it was filled out accurately.

Beneath an enormous banner inscribed with the words: Support the Oil Workers, Support the TWLF Strike, United We Will Win, the Community Solidarity Rally for the Third World Strike at Cal and for the Oil Workers Strike in Richmond and thoughout the nation got under way in Pauley.

Chairman Froben Lozada introduced Jake Jacobs, Sec. 

HOOVER OPTS OUT. WILL TRY NAIROBI

From San Mateo to Nairobi. That's the route black educator bb Hoover intends to take soon. Hoover is presently in charge of

Hoover is presently in charge of minority education and recruitment at three junior colleges in the Peninsula. Formerly he headed the controversial College Readiness Program at the College of San Mateo (CSM).

"But paper shuffling isn't my bag," he admitted to BARB this week. "Once I get things organized Pm moving on to something else." He wants to help set up a Third World College in East Palo Alto. The residents of the primarily black city call it Nairobi, so Hoover thinks the school should be named Nairobi College.

At first he thinks Nairobi Col-

Nairobi College.

At first he thinks Nairobi College can be a two year school from where minority students can go to established institutions.

"This way the students will have their degrees, but OUR mental attitude," Hoover said.

Eventually he believes Nairobi could be expanded to a four year minority college.

Hoover doesn't think Professor Nathan Hare (of San Francisco State) or anyone else can do much to change the established Universities. "I'd rather spend my energy and time developing something new

and time developing something new than working from within," Hoover told BARB.

Hoover believes the staff he has trained in his present minority recruitment position can take over when he leaves sometime before June. Although he sees the College Readiness Program he set up as a useful vehicle for developing black and Third World leaders "it isn't the best possible solution."

"The White Establishment and their Universities cannot be changed," Hoover believes. "But we can still change Black and Third World people. We want to start with young people and give them the right cultural and mental attitudes."

"If Hare proves successful of they will follow him, if we are successful they'll follow us," he said.

Meanwhile there are still repercussions from the December 13 strike at College of San Mateo. Five Third World students have filed a federal suit against the school asking that they be allowed to return to class.

The students also have asked the court to delay their college disciplinary hearings until their criminal trials come up in March and April. They claim they will face "double jeopardy" otherwise.

SAN JOSE **TEACHERS** CALLIT LOCKOUT

"The Administration has locked us out," a spokesman for striking San Jose State AFT teachers charged this week.

charged this week.

"No striking teachers are being scheduled for the coming semester." David Van Becker, associate information officer for the AFT told BARB, Tuesday.

"At least 500 less classes will be offered according to Van

be offered, according to Van Becker. He believes this will ag-gravated the strike more and gain

gravated the strike more and gain the teachers more student support. The AFT spokesman blames the lockout on political interference by conservative Southern Cal-ifornia legislators. The school's president Robert Clark intended to have strumps for classes schedto have signups for classes sched-uled to be taught by striking teach-ers, Van Becker said. "But he was afraid he might lose his job

if he did, so he bowed to pressure," the AFT information office charged.

office charged.

Of the approximately 100 striking teachers 28 have so far been informed they are fired. Seventy six have received no paychecks.

No hearings, no trial; just the swift revenge of the State for being an uppity nigger.

Students had the usual hassle with registration, but this time it was complicated by administrative confusion. New students arrived, complaining they didn't get their registration instructions in the mail. They were shuttled from room to room, building to building, trying to find their registration packets.

Emerging from this labyrinth, they doubtless felt that they are due a more relaxed pace during normal spring classes.

Normal, hardly. They will find that besides the absent AFT teachers, some non-striking instructors have "despaired" and left. In signing up for many departments courses, registrants were told which classes are and aren't being given. One department which was previously difficult to get into has been admitting new students in expectation that some of its students will not return.

Conclusion: the whole SFS operation is resting on a thin thread of confidence.

We can all sleep easier now. As of last Saturday the Air Force and Navy had meted out punish-ment to those dread twin menaces to public safety and military o public safety and military norale, Sue Schnall and Mike

The courts-martial vindicated the view most Gr's I've met have of the court system to which they're

of the court system to which they're subject. They call it the Non-uniform Code of Millitary Injustice. The "crimes" had been essentially the same -- organizing and leading (in uniform yet) the October 12 GI march against the war, in San Francisco. The only significant difference was that Lt. (jg) Schnall, a poised, beautiful and articulate Navy nurse, had shown a little more chutzpah by leafletting the Alameda Naval Air Station from a light plane with her husband Peter two days before the march.

Both were found guilty as charged, she of disobeying an order and conduct unbefitting an officer and gentlewoman, and he of disobeying an order.

beying an order.
Yet Sue's sentence was much the lighter. She was given a Bad Conduct Discharge and six months "at hard labor", which is being suspended according to Navy statute because any woman officer with less than a year sentence does not serve the time. Thus she is right now back at work at Oak Knoll Hospital for six more months; as for the discharge it is less than Honorable but better than Dishonorable (which would have meant loss of voting rights and the equivalent of felon status for the rest of her life.)

equivalent of felon status for the rest of her life.)
Airman Locks, on the other hand, was sentenced to a Bad Conduct Discharge, had his rank lowered from Airman 1/C to Airman, and was given a year term which will be served at Leavenworth unless be served at Leavenworth unless the commanding officer of the Fourth Air Force exercises his option to lower the term when the case comes before him for customary review next week.

option to lower the term when the case comes before him for customary review next week.

Meantime Mike is being held in what are, certainly by military standards, very plush quarters for a convict. The only similar military facility I've seen or heard of was Captain Howard Levy's at Ft. Jackson, South Carolina, before he was sent to Leavenworth. (I visited Mike on Sunday and asked three different officials what the Air Force calls their jails. Each frowned, thought about it for a minute, and then said, "Do you mean the Confinement Facility?" Like meeting a garbage man at a party and having him tell you he's a sanitary engineer...)

In any case Mike shares with the few other prisoners being held at Hamilton AFB a good size common room with a couch, television set, and any books he wants and can get sent in. For the time being, anyway, his morale seemed high. After all, he was finally getting around to reading ULYSSES, Besides, his sentence might be reduced on review, which would mean serving perhaps six months in roughly this manner at Hamilton or Travis AFB-- far from the worst fate he could have expected.

And somewhere along the line he might be able to get out pending appeal. The unobtrusive San Francisco office is at 2201 Filbert St. near the dear and intimate little shops of Union St. in the Marina district. The Heliotrope atmosphere is of gentleness and comfort. Berkeley's case ended with "all charges dropped" against the family, Police Chief Beall stating his men acted not in good judgment, especially in Macing the small children being baby-sat at the time, and one of the Berkeley cops suddenly resigning from the force.

(The Berkeley Chamber of Com-(The Berkeley Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a "testimonial dinner" for Chief Beall, who leaves his Berkeley post to become Chief of UC police. The "entire community" is invited, Does this include the Smith family?)

The occult has been the inspiration for countless stories and films -- among them Rosemary's Baby -- and witches knew about mind-bending drugs long before regular people got on to them. Dennis Bolling (witch Adonis Auriel) is the learned instructor.

Heliotrope springs up on the force of enthusiasm alone, without all the hangups of public education. 

"The older grads in the Alumni Association think a quiet and peaceful campus is the ideal. They are all for giving Hayakawa a vote of confidence," Irwin said. "But the younger ones feel differently. Many of us believe the grievances of the BSU and TWOF are justifiable."

Those supporting the strike have formed an organization called Concerned Alumni Against Reagan's Encroachment (CARE),
"We're mailing out questionaires to the alumni and informing them of the issues," Irwin said. "I'm sure once they learn what the strike is about any reasonable person will see through the propaganda of Hayakawa and the news media."

The young alumnus charged the press has given a lot of misinformation about the strike, It has given very little coverage to the activities of CARE, he said, "Maybe they don't want people to know the striker's side,"

"The Alumni Association refused to give us their mailing list," Irwin said, "But we got it anyway," he laughed.

A meeting is scheduled by CARE on Feb. 24 at the Golden West YMCA at 20th and Euclalytus, Assemblyman John Burton will speak on local control of education.

"Everything the Administration has done shows a complete disregard for the students and the community. It's politically manipulated by Reagan and the Trustees." Irwin said.

"I audited a course from Hayakawa when I was a student and was impressed by him," Irwin recalled. "But now he is laughable. Everything he says has such faulty logic it's pathetic."

"But," he's done a good job of influencing the non-thinking masses, Irwin coheeded.

"If the problems aren't settled a lot of people will drop out of the system." Irwin said. "The difference between violent and peaceful revolution will diminish."

The Academic Senate is also getting more and more upset at Reagan and the Trustees for notalking.

"The situation is desperate" the Senate said in a resolution this week. "Although still 'open' in some legal or political sense the college is rapidly closing intellectually and spiritually."

"Unless some immediate resolution is found" the Senate continued, "the point of a bayonnet will have to be used to maintain a posture of business as usual. "The escalation and further polarization will make it impossible to start the spring semester and will lead ultimately to the destruction of the school."

The second week of testimony in the conspiracy trial of the Oakland Seven ended with the score: Defendants 3 - Pigs 0.

Prosecutor Lowell Jensen has put three Oakland Police officers on the witness stand since he began presenting his case to the jury in an attempt to establish the guilt of the Seven.

Thus far, each police witness appears to have done the defense more good than the prosecution. Several other witnesses have been called, but they have been minor. The action promises to be hot and heavy next week. Jan Blais, assistant to the Dean of Students at Cal is on the witness stand and is undergoing a piercing cross-

at Cal is on the witness stand and is undergoing a piercing cross-examination by chief defense counsel, Charles R. Garry, Garry and Judge George W. Phillips have also had some heated exchanges. Garry, and defense co-counsel Richard Hodge disposed of the testimony of Oakland Deputy Police Chief Raymond Brown quite effectively last week. Late in the week, James Bruce Coleman, a plastic looking, 22-year-old undercover agent, took the stand to describe the different defendants doing a variety of things during and preceding Stop The Draft Week. during and Draft Week.

NATIONAL GUARD ON MADISON CAMPUS

The Madison campus of the University of Wisconsin has taken the lead in repressive measures

versity of Wisconsin has taken the lead in repressive measures against striking students.

Nine hundred National Guardsmen were called out and stationed on campus late Wednesday by Governor Warren Knowles.

Both the University administration and the local mayor are claiming credit for the call. No state of emergency was declared, however.

of emergency was declared, however.

Members and supporters of the Black People's Alliance have been conducting a strike on the campus since Monday, At issue are several demands for increased black control of black programs.

Several buildings have been occupied and barricaded. Police cleared one building which held the President's office. No arrests were reported in that action.

Only four arrests were reported in the entire action to date, but mobile strike tactics have kept the cops hopping. Madison Mayor Festge claims that he called the Guard because "the city police were bone weary".

Fifteen hundred students marched to Bascom Hall Wednesday morning to blockade several buildings and stop traffic. No major



violent incidents were violent incidents were reported provoked, although anti-strike students pushed some strikers into police lines.

One hundred opponents of the strike showed up wearing blue armbands bearing the letter H for Hawakawa. They forced that way

armonas bearing the letter H for Hayakawa. They forced their way into buildings driving strikers against police who laid on with clubs and mace. At BARB press time the Guards-men had not been deployed and the strikers were reported meeting to discuss strategy.

discuss strategy.

On Monday morning, Coleman was ordered to bring the original notes he took bring the original notes he took while attending the various Stop The Draft Week meetings to court, so they could be compared to the synthesized, xeroxed notes he depended upon so heavily for his testimony.

testimony.

A quick comparison by the defense attorneys turned up several discrepancies.

The high point came when Garry asked Coleman to read a statement from his xeroxed notes. Coleman had attributed the statement according to the statement of the statement o man had attributed the statement on several occasions to Bob Mandel. Reading from his origi-nal notes, Coleman was forced to admit, "It says here that the statement was made by Morgan

to admit, "It says nere that the statement was made by Morgan Spector."

Coleman also said that he saw several other members of the Stop The Draft Week steering committee at meetings he attended far more often than the seven men now on trial. He said that there were five other men who seemed to be key leaders of the Committee, more important perhaps than the Oakland Seven.

Lt. Ernest Smith was the next cop on the stand. He didn't fare much better than Coleman. He testified that he took more than 700 pictures during Stop The Draft Week, but he could only come up with two of Mike Smith, and one of Bob Mandel, Smith admitted that he had been assigned to photograph Mandel, Smith, and four others in particular. He couldn't remember the other four, he said. Although he could recall he was wearing tennis shoes, green socks and a sport shirt, he couldn't recall whether he was wearing a press badge or not. "Is your memory poor, or don't you want to admit that you were masquerading as a press photographer?" Garry asked.

Smith also denied seeing any acts of police violence, although

Smith also denied seeing any acts of police violence, although he was shown his own pictures of people on the ground, trying to cover themselves to prevent in-

jury.
Garry came into conflict with
Judge Phillips and Jensen late
Thursday when he attempted to
cross-examine Blais about the role

cross examine Blais about the role Alameda County DA Frank Coakley might have played in pressuring university officials. Jensen objected strenuously to Garry's questions, and Phillips generally sustained the objections.

It is believed that Garry is trying to show that the Oakland Seven were selected for prosecution, not for what they did during Stop The Draft Week, but because Coakley wanted to "get" some of the leading political activists on the Left.

PANTHER HELD UP IN JAIL

A Black Panther is still being held political prisoner in the Ala-meda County Jail. Warren Wells, 22, has been holed up in the pen since his trial ended in a hung jury several months

ago.

He was the first Panther to be tried for the April 6 shootout in Oakland in which Bobby Hutton was killed.

was killed.

The jury voted 10-2 to acquit
Wells on an attempted murder
charge, and split evenly on an
assault with a deadly weapon

assaurt with a deadily weapon charge.

Normally such a weak showing by the prosecution means the case is dropped. But not if the de-fendant is a Black Panther.

Wells has to stay cooped upuntil
his new trial, which will start
once his attorney Charles Garry
finishes with the Oakland 7 case.

ness, influence by the individual's genetic heritage, and the final stage of absolute being: vibrations of pure energy.

In explaining how different people register on the hedonistic index, Leary cited the school teacher's relationship to her primary school public. mary school pupils.



"Here are the little kids playing out their lives of princesses, Indians, soldiers and explorers (etc) that are coded in their genetic backgrounds, The school teacher, who is living in the punishment - reward world, breaks up their trips, and conditions them to her hedonistic level, which operates on good/bad, Heaven/Hell, etc.

and can withstand the bring-down vibrations of those people who are on lower levels IF they are aware of the hedonistic gap."

The turned-on people can even bring those functioning on lesser levels up to the level that they live on if they can realize and relieve the fears that trap those people into their plastic pre-planned lives.

Leary carried it even further, explaining that the hedonistic gap, if recognized and acted upon, could



Leary closed with a farewell that would "last until we meet again as one". The scapegoats that took him off the mule train in Death Valley provide the food for his third political campaign.

An exhausted Reagan Innisneu a distant third. Nixon, Thurmond, and Company had bought the bone he was seeking long before he arrived. Even the Rockefeller millions couldn't shake down Dicky's Southern strength. Reagan returned with his tail between his leas.

Thoroughly recovered, Reagan runs to the dog pit for another term. His potential opponents are Jesse Unruh and Joe Alioto. Unruh has seen the writing on the doghouse wall and is howling for law and order on campus. Still, he can only talk about law and order He only talk about law and order. He

only talk about law and order. He has no army.

Joe Alloto, on the other hand, has a small but well-trained army. It's called the San Francisco Police Department. Alioto can practice what Unruh can only preach. The S.F.P.D. is compiling a fine record of police brutality and murder. At San Francisco State, and in the Third World communities, Alloto's troops make law and order a harsh reality. Given America's march toward repression, this should make Joe a favorite of the citizenry.

In the face of this threat to his image as top dog and protector of the American way, Reagan had to act. His first move was flipping the bird at Cal students during a recent meeting of the Regents. His image makers decided, though, that just saying "Fuck you" wasn't enough. He had to actually do it. So we see a state of extreme emergency, a gauntlet of pigs in Sproul Plaza, and proposed statewide blacklists for political activity.

ness and the right wing Superintendent they hired three years ago, Peter Bancroft, the school district has had to cut back such "extras" as hiring substitutes and kids taking showers after gym class.

Teachers in the elementary grades are sending lists home with the children begging for supplies like rugs for the floors, picture books, paints and paper. Even though the taxpayers in Livermore pay \$4.80 per \$100 assessed valuation for their local schools. What has the board done? They met in a phony secret session late

What has the board done? They met in a phony secret session late last spring avoiding the Brown Act by some parliamentary gimmick that is always available to the establishment and renewed Bancroft's contract for three years increasing his salary to \$27,000 per year. (Max Rafferty makes \$25,000 per year.)

This was done in the face of loud public complaints from a growing vocal minority. It now appears that even though Bancroft has resigned due to the shit hitting the fan (effective June 1969) the people of Livermore will be legally bound to continue paying this enormous salary for the next

this enormous salary for the next

this enormous salary for the next three years.
What else has the board done?
Early last spring Bancroft decided to send a couple of administrators to England to recruit teachers for the district. That's right. All the way to England to hire new teachers. Even people who have been digging into this financial slop differ on how much this eventually cost the school district.
One source told me it cost \$3,000. But another source even closer to the finances estimates \$25,000. The net result of this

closer to the finances estimates \$25,000. The net result of this merry sojourn at the taxpayers expense? Two new teachers. The trip was authorized by the board of trustees in spite of loud protests from the public.

On Jan. 30 of this year the Livermore Education Association issued a statement calling for Paperofits.

a statement calling for Bancroft's resignation. Bancroft resigned a few days after the statement was

The LEA statement, representing 430 teachers or 90% of the teachers in the district, said in part; "He (Bancroft) has attempted to undermine this professional organization by creating strife and doubt among teachers and by failing to support the goals and programs of this organization."

And what did the board do about that? Under the leadership of Mrs. Adams they issued a statement signed UNANIMOUSLY putting the LEA down claiming the statement

signed UNANIMOUSLY putting the LEA down claiming the statement "undermined" the district. Two years ago several high school kids were expelled by the board for smoking pot, Only God knows how this exercise in suburban compassion chewed up their lives. Eventually some were reinstated in Livermore high schools. Some finished at Contra Costa schools. One boy that I know of was urged into the Army by his family in order to avoid the "disgrace." And who was the loudest in her moralistic denunciation of these kids? Barbara Adams. Incidentally, James Nordahl who

Incidentally, James Nordahlwho was recently appointed foreman of the 1969 Alameda County Grand Jury served on the Livermore Unified School Board until late last spring when he resigned. He was part of the board when they sneaked through Bancroft's contract renewal. He responded to public criticism by verbally attacking the critics because they wore beards. The man bears watching.

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his Berkeley home. The magic has just begun. Like Siddhartha before the Buddha, we have come to hear the acid prophet speak.

Upstairs we move and beside the fireplace we settle down, atop pillows on the floor. The house becomes a garden and we get high with a little help from Leary. Then he lights the fire and brings the wine, his wife greets us and it all is

stunning. As the tape unreels throughout the evening, amidst a

touch of amazement, we come to understand the rarity that is Leary-that his life style and his thought are like Brahis Leary—that his life style and his thought are like Brahman in their oneness.

So many things to be asked of Leary. We begin by asking him about the world we are stuck in, the arena of political struggle. What does the Movement look like from his psychedelic lens into reality?

"The Leftist-activist movement," he answers, "is the perfect yang to the ying of the defense industry, plastic, capitalist system, so that the capitalist system creates the activist Left.

"But both of these are irrelevant to the future which is going to be psychedelic."

Amongst us sounds a chord of disappointment; we wish he'd said the political activists were the perfect yang to the ying of what he calls the psychedelic revolutionaries, "The activist movement," he goes on, "is very necessary and I'm delighted by it. It's just as inevitable as



the winter follows the summer. You have to have the activist movement to show up in clear perspective for everyone to see the insanity of the capitalist, defense industry, middle class system."

So Leary can in a way dig the radical scene, But in his vision, "left-activism is ridiculous too, the political power struggle is ridiculous, I think most turned-on people don't want to have that power, as far as running the University of California or running SF State goes, because no education takes place there anyway, or very little does."

The future is what counts and the political people, it

little does."

The future is what counts and the political people, it seems, are not relating to it at all.

"The real activists are the dope dealers and the rock and roll musicians. They're relevant because they're blowing minds and they're making people feel good and they're bringing about neurological changes which create a new generation."

Activist youth is tragic youth, alienated from the hedonic future. "It's just bad kharma, just bad luck if your cosmic kharma leads you into political activism. But somebody has to play that role, It's just too bad.

Leary does see a revolutionary force at work in America which will rock us into the future, "The powerful force in this country is the enormous, almost fairly silent, majority which is probably 90% of the people under the age of 25, North and South, East and West, black and white, who are psychedelic.

"They just want to feel good. And they don't want to get involved in any system or any activity which will make them or any other people feel bad. They don't want to be brought down.

"Therefore, they're not going to be working for defense.

them or any other people feel bad. They don't want to be brought down.

"Therefore, they're not going to be working for defense industries and they're not going to be leftist-activists. They're going to float along and create a new society." Pleasantly seduced by the stoned power of his being, we sense that he is right and that the streetfighting gigs of the present could not be our thing in the future. But like a case of the crabs, the doubt nags on that we cannot float into the new society, that instead we must struggle in order to get it together. So we muse that Leary is a man belonging too much to the future to handle the nitty gritty choices of the present.

Leary is much more into the black liberation movement because "the Afro-American is closer to his body, closer to his senses, closer to the humorous wisdom of where life is at. I think blacks are closer to this sacred mystery of life than whites.

"The black culture and the American Indian culture is very psychedelic to begin with. The average black man and woman in this country has had the advantage of a very psychedelic upbringing. Grass is the gift of the black culture to the white middle class. It was the blacks and the Mexicans who were turning on to grass long, long decades before the white man discovered it. Psychedelic drugs blacken the white man the intelligent blacks are trying to liberate the educational system, not because they want to be like the white student or the white professor, but because the strategic place to bring about

the revolution is on the campus, that's where the young people are.
"The intelligent black is just using the universities as the stage for the broader revolution, which is to free all of us."

Leary feels that Black Power is America's ticket to ride

Leary feels that Black Power is America's ticketto fine into the new society. "I think that the black culture is the salvation of the human race.

"If blacks get more power, they'll loosen it up and make it more free and they'll make it funnier and they'll make it more physical and they'll make it sexier and more hedonic."

hedonic."

Though he believes that "a lot of blacks have white minds and have become middle class," Leary expects that, on the whole, "the blacks will just zoom through middle class affluence in maybe just a year or two. The concept of soul is such a powerful and wonderful concept, and I don't see blacks giving up their soul. According to Eldridge Cleaver, when the blacks talk about soul they really mean body."

Of course, Leary has a special interest in Black Power.

ridge Cleaver, when the blacks talk about soul they really mean body."

Of course, Leary has a special interest in Black Power. "I want the police chiefs in every American city to be black, because I know that not only will he end the ghetto problem and he'll end all the insecurity that we all feel about the police, but he won't bust me for smoking pot. "I just know that no black man in power is going to lay that heavy anti-ecstasy trip on me."

He also understands the Third World strikes to be generational conflicts. "The Third World Liberation Front, their average age is 25, and the Administration, their average age is 65. Well, you know who's going to win, you know what side to be on, you know where it's going. "The black movement is a young movement and middleaged Negroes like Whitney Young and Roy Wilkins are its worst enemies.

"Any time I see young people opposed to old people I've got to be on the side of young people, Young people are closer to their bodies and they're closer to the life principle and they're just about to have babies—they've got to be closer to the celestial pipeline than an older person."

He does not believe that the black movement on the

He does not believe that the black movement on the campuses will be co-opted by the system as a means of bringing the blacks into the middle class-student mold. 'I don't believe that young black men and women want to become horn rimmed-glassed graduate students, square, uptight, inhibited, booklearning, white graduate students." UNDER THE GUN OF THE EMPIRE

Leary begins to rap about his many busts on drug charges.

"I think that being raided and harassed by the police is one of the existential, authentic experiences of our time. Anyone who's living in the United States today and doesn't feel the threat of imprisonment hanging over him just isn't involved in what's going on.

"It's like living in Hitler Germany--if you didn't have that sense that ruthless, armed agents of your government were around, probably after you, then you were just out of what was going on.

"We've all lived with this knowledge for many months and years now. It's been over three years since we were arrested in Laredo, Texas, so it's just part of the reality of where the world is now. If you were living in Greece and didn't feel the pressure of the police, where would you be at? Or if you were in Czechoslavakia? Or in Russia?

"There's a tendency to think that these are especially bad times. Actually, it's always been this way. Anyone who's been interested in individual pleasure, has always been under the gun of the empire."

Despite the repetitious repression which history has recorded, Tim Leary expects the future to be different, "Iff man is going to survive, the population explosion and the technological explosion are such that man has got to start becoming a lover, because he just can't go on being a hater, and he can't have an anti-hedonic society any more.

"An anti-hedonic society is an uptight society, in a munishment society and it's a warlike society, and we

being a hater, and he can't have an anti-hedonic society any more.

"An anti-hedonic society is an uptight society, is a punishment society and it's a warlike society, and we just can't afford that any more if we're going to survive as a species. That's what the kids in Barcelona are catching on to and the kids in Prague, and Cuba and I'm sure in China too."

The hedonic gap is causing the empire to collapse. "The only issue today, as in the past, is the hedonic gap. Every issue, whether it's a psychological conflict, persoanlity conflict, or social-political conflict always comes down to an hedonic gap.

"Some people try to bring others down or make them feel worse; the innate struggle of every individual is that

feel worse; the innate struggle of every individual is that he wants to feel better and that's really behind the black-

feel worse; the innate struggle of every individual is that he wants to feel better and that's really behind the black-white thing.

"The white had it figured out that he did good and the black felt good. The black man is saying he can do well in addition to feeling good, and that's horrible. The average middle class white man has given up everything for the one little thing he's got, which is that he's a middle class white man, that's all he's got, and now he has to give that up, which is intolerable. No wonder they're arming the police.

"You either have to declare a state of police emergency or you have to turn on."

If SOMEONE HAS TO COME ALONG IN 1965 AND TRY TO TURN ON THE UNITED STATES

The Supreme Court will soon decide whether or not Leary will have to spend 30 years in prison because he had a little bit of dope on him one day in Laredo, Texas, Leary has said he will journey to India if the decision is in his favor.

We ask him why he had not tried to do so already, without the punishment society's permission.

As is his manner throughout the interview, he stares off into space, almost disappearing from our presence, while contemplating the question. Suddenly he returns, his voice mystically charming and relaxed.

"Exile and banishment are classic techniques in the spiritual martyr game. I think that exile and banishment were quite civilized techniques, I'm glad they got rid of burning at the stake. But I am very much opposed to

spiritual martyr game, because it makes everyone bad. It creates guilt, and the example of Christ eding on a cross has led to nothing but bloodshed and

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bleeding on a cross has led to nothing but blood suffering.

"No, I have not given any serious thought to what would happen if I lose the case. Because I think that your own nervous system determines, tends to determine, what happens, and the reality I'm trying to create now is that we will win this case, which will liberate several thousand federal marijuana prisoners, myself included. So that's the movie script I'm writing."

Can one really write the script, we ask, and have it work out?

work out?

"When I say that I'm God and you are too, I'm not kidding. My wildest fantasies of more than five years ago have more than come true. I wasn't gradiose enough.

"If you take your own divinity seriously you have to set up rules for yourself. You have to grant divinity to other people too, which means you have to adjust your divinity to where others are. Otherwise you're going around saying 'I'm God, take your clothes off and follow me,' and that's not conductive to making others feel good. You have to play out your divinity saying 'I'm God but the DNA code put me together in this particular form and threw me into this particular drama which is of Timothy Leary in the

not conducive to making others leet good. For have to play out your divinity saying 'I'm God but the DNA code put me together in this particular form and threw me into this particular drama which is of Timothy Leary in the United States in 1969.'

"The God Game is solitaire. When you play solitaire you could cheat, you could make it so that you could win every time. But the way the God Game is played, you let it happen minute to minute, card by card.

"My divinity deals with the unique set of energies that I find myself creating around me. The greater energies you get involved in or the grandiosity of your style of the God Game--you're playing for very high stakes and you get involved in very powerful ying-yang energies.

"The stirred up an incredible amount of hatred. The economics of the game is that if you do something that brings about a great increase in pleasure for one group, you're going to create a great deal of envy, discontent, and hatred on the part of another group.

"I've not seen any way out of that. In the future it will be different, but if someone has to come along in American society in 1965 and try to turn on the United States, that involves a tremendous release of both positive and negative energies, or of love and hate energies,"

Fascinated, we listen to Leary sift through his life as an acid prophet.

"I have been affected by the negative energies that I've stirred up. But it hasn't bothered me very much; it's

as an acid prophet.

"I have been affected by the negative energies that I've stirred up. But it hasn't bothered me very much; it's stirred up. But it hasn't bothered me very much; it's a heavy weight that I see all the time. I sense this pressure because it's real and it's there, of the millions of people who think that I'm the devil or that I am this crazed, vicious, degenerate, drugged person trying to corrupt youth. That hatred is real.

"The choice that I made, I thought that it was really



a good thing to do, to make the older people more upset because younger people are getting more free. The reason I chose to do this is because I do think our civilization is ended—it just can't go on.

"The only thing that is really important is the hope that the younger generation will produce a society of love and pleasure. If I do something that makes younger people feel good, then they will have children and be more hedonic parents. So that the seed thing of lovemaking and ecstasy and humor is released, although that does put the older generation very uptight.

"Many thoughtful people say I'm too hard on old people, and I think that is true, I've tried very hard to explain to the older generation what is happening. I've tried to be a bridge to bring to them what is happening, but the role of a bridge is often to get stepped on."

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Satisfied with his choice, hurt by the hatred it aroused, and now threatened with three decades of imprisonment, Leary still digs his own style of the God Came.

"I am not a martyr; I have no intention of being a martyr; I have no intention of feeling bad. I have no intention of suffering. Whatever happens to me I hope that if any image develops from it, if any energy goes out from it, it will make people feel more hopeful and more cheerful. Because I've never complained about police harassment or years in prison and all that in the sense of an atrocity.

"The way I play the God Game I never rule out suffering. I say I'm going to try not to suffer, but the closer you get to the line, the higher the energies you deal with, or the more willing you are to blow your mind-cause if you're going to take LSD you just blow the whole thing.

"Every time you take LSD you put all your chips

"Every time you take LSD you put all your chips right on the table: your personality, and your ego, and your identity, and your sanity, you put all your big chips on the table. You never know what's going to happen. When you get into really powerful energy there's no sure thing. It comes up for agamble, every flick of the coin, every tick of the clock,

"There is a 50% possibility that I'll feel terrible tomorrow. I may win the case and become a great hero-liberator and then the plane will crash at London airport on the way to India and my body will be burned.

"It's a bad metaphor, gambling, but it's a gamble in a way. The more energy valves you open, when you're actually living second to second, you can feel terrible.

"A prison is a terrible place. It's just like they took all the bad vibrations of the whole country and located them in prison. The prisoners feel bad, the guards have got to feel bad, all the rehabilitation people feel terrible because they're not doing any good at all. So that a prison is a monument to futility.

"On the other hand, I don't think I can remember the name of any man in history whom I respect a great deal who didn't spend a great deal of time in jail or had to run out on it or was caught and tortured or killed. Again, the greater the energies in the game you're dealing with, the greater the chance you'll run into getting assassinated or imprisoned."

Eldridge Cleaver is, for Leary, a man who plays the game well.

"Eldridge hooked himself up, as I have, to just a lot of energy-Black Power. In order to do that he had to expose himself to the law, But still, if he hadn't done that-he said in one of his own interviews-he would still be in jail today, if he hadn't been a Black Power person. So far he has gambled with the energy and he has released a lot of energy for himself and, God knows, for millions of black and white people, and he's still free, so I would say he's not



Just merge along, just flow, if your father and mother want you to cut your hair short and wear a tie, then you do it, you just float along, just meditate and find the ocean of bliss. "That does lead to a conservative thing, that does lead to worship of the Establishment, it goes along with minimizing, if not eliminating completely, union with the opposite sex.

"The Maharishi himself sits there and he doesn't have

"The Maharishi himself sits there and he doesn't have his chick with him on that platform.

"After all, the Maharishi's great message is not what he says, but the way he runs his life, And his model is not the dominant God who's engaged.

"If you're going to go through everything that's possible for you, maybe you have to do all these things, and then come out with something that's absolutely new and unique, because you're the mutant, that's the youngest of the great God players. "The more energy you have going through you, the more is likely to come. "There are periods of repression and periods of opening up, I am a spokesman for opening up, which is a position of such incredible prophetic power now because it's such a closed down system.

"There is a great deal of fun to being a leader of a trend which has the whole of evolution behind it."

Though he is a most radical spokesman for opening up, he believes that "life and every form of energy, including the structured atom, is a tension between control and free energy. The proton and the electron, the

It will probably take the form of such things as sensory deprivation, sensory isolation, sleep treatments, suspending life functions for long periods. When the swing comes back, the new Puritan will be fired from Harvard in thirty years because he's teaching his students how to suspend biological functions for periods of fifty years.

"90% of the sophomore class at Harvard will go into a deep sleep for a hundred years,"

In addition to an Eastern-like interest in sensory deprivation, "There will be a great movement toward esthetic suicide within twenty or thirty years."

But the pendulum's ride back will be on a higher level than our old repressive ways. "Low level turn off things like Meher Babaism, Billy Grahamism or Maharishism are just bad esthetics, not in tune."

Leary still believes that grass is cool, but acid is what's really fine.

"LSD demands more than marijuana. You can keep your plastic job and them come home at night and turn on and make love better and enjoy your firends better. That's good, that moves the whole middle class up a notch.

"But LSD is still the only challenge of the really

notch.

"But LSD is still the only challenge of the really intelligent person, because LSD requires a change of mind. Marijuana is the perfect drug to make you feel better, which is obviously necessary now, but there is no great spiritual challenge."

Several years ago Leary was really high on acid's psychiatric applications. Today we ask about that and he asks in turn, "Are there still psychiatrists?" Then, "I'm in favor of legal psychotherapy and legal prostitution."

Leary has often laughed throughout the

Leary has often laughed throughout the cap, digging the humor of his life and the world, and his thoughts about them. At times he's asked us to erase the tape because "it's only marijuana rap, and you know where that leads," Now he playfully remarks, "I think that if this material is handled intelligently, you can get the Pulitzer prize in journalism."

We wonder aloud if, considering the tension between form and energy, perhaps he's overdone it. A bit stunned, he replies quickly, "The Vietnam war is going on, there's a Nixon administration, and you ask me if I've overdone it?"

And then Leary takes a last look back.
"There's no feeling that I've overdone it--I've been too cautious all the way through.
"My only regret is that I don't turn on a thousand times more than I did, and that I didn't start earlier and that I didn't take more dope and that I couldn't persuade more people to take dope. My only regrets are bad esthetics and bad communication."

grit electric blues sounds of Chuck Berry, Muddy Waters, Sonny Boy Williamson, and many more pro-duced on Chess/Checker records? According to a recent statement by Chess executives the policies that brought the world all this fine music have been changed. Time warp: back several weeks ago to a Rolling Stone report from Chicago that rapped down how Chess had cornered Howlin Wolf in the studio with a "modern

Chess had cornered Howlin Wolf in the studio with a "modern sound" back-up band (ie, ala Cream, Hendrix) and virtually demanded he record some of his old standards (Spoonful, Smokestack Lightnin) with a Foxey Lady beat, Wolf reportedly didn't go for it, and it wasn't till Phil Chess himself came down to the studio and laid on a thick rap that the 260-pound back door man reluctantly condescended to the contrived copout.

After the sessions were completed, Wolf is reported to have told one Chess official, "Man, that stuff's dogshit,"

A similar stunt was pulled by Chess last fall when it released a long play piece of shit called "Electric Mud" which feathered Muddy Waters doing almost totally unrecognizable versions of his oldies. It's sales were a reflection of the album's content; nobody will pay for shit when there's so much of it around for free.

It kind of makes me wonder who Wolf was singing about years ago, and if it isn't applicable now, in the words, I shoulda quit you a long time ago, and I wouldn't be here now people, down on the killin floor."



In their concern and fright over potential dangers to students, school and law enforcement officials, some physicians, civic leaders and the Miami HERALD-Miami NEWS have joined together in a campaign against drug use which borders on hysteria.

I watched a TV program in amazement as a physician, who "sees a narcotics pusher behind every palm tree", according to one Miami HERALD reporter, described what he believed to be the dangers of marijuana use. First he said that marijuana damages chromosomes, a statement which would be debatable even if it referred to LSD, No source even semi-reliable claims marijuana use damages chromosomes. Then he described how THC can cause a trip similar to LSD. He neglected to explain that massive quantities of marijuana leaf would be required to achieve a similar result.

The physician continued with descriptions of how LSD and heroin are added to marijuana joints in order to "hook" the user.

Now these arguments are frightening indeed to the concerned parent but laughed at by their children. That's the problem. Lie to a kid about marijuana and he won't believe what you say about speed or heroin. Why should he?

School officials in Broward County, just north of Miami, recently began unannounced, unauthorized searches of school lockers and desks. Dade County (Miami) school officials have asked permission to deputize the school system's security personnel to give them police powers off the school grounds so they can prowl school parking

lots and nearby businesses.

At a meeting sponsored by the Dade County School Board, Florida State Attorney, Richard Gerstein, said narcotics was the single greatest crime problem. Understand now that South Florida hs stand now that South Florida hs for many years been a stronghold of organized crime and that civic corruption and blatant racism are accepted modes of lifethere. Drug abuse is a public health
problem with potentially serious
consequences to individuals. We
don't know all the right answers,
but we do know some wrong ones:
One is the punitive approach to
health problems. A second is lying about the effects of drugs. A
third is fostering distrust between
parent and child, "authorities" and
lay people.

The best approach to any social problem must be education. And if the chief danger from a drug is its illegality, we must tell that, also, to potential users.

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
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
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
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David Hull never believed the cops could be "so rough."

"I was very frightened by what happened to me," he confessed, as he spoke to BARB after his arrest at UC on Bloody Tuesday. The 18 year old student had come to Berkeley from Milwaukee just two days before. He was on the campus to visit his mother, who works there.

About 3:30, David was standing in front of Sproul Hall when he saw someone busted. "A group of cops ran up the steps, others come from another direction," he related. "I was caught in the middle."

"I froze," he said. "One cop pushed me with a club. I turned to brace myself and he charged, pushing me down with his club.

"When I was on the ground I took off my glasses. I didn't want them to be broken. Without them I can't see much. While I was down they clubbed me all over the head."

David still had lumps on his head as he spoke, a week later. "It still hurts," he said.

"I heard someone say, "Let's arrest the mother-fucker." That's all I remember.

"When I got up 4 or 5 grabbed

all I remember.

"When I got up 4 or 5 grabbed me and I was handcuffed. The

me and I was handcuffed. The handcuffs were very tight.

"I was pushed down the stairs going into Sproul. I fell. Before I had a chance to get up they pulled me in by my hair and the handcuffs. Then they threw me in a cell."

Inside David's cell was a black named Abercrombie, arrested the same day. "He had a huge cut over his eye and his nose was

over his eye and his hose was bleeding.

"I was booked. Then I called my relatives who bailed me out," Hull told BARB, Charges were dis-turbing the peace and obstruc-tion.

Immediately after the rally a mass picket line formed at Sather Gate, alongside the soon-to-be-busted score of striking teacher's assistants.

CHP charged up to push the pickets off the bridge behind the

The police began to look like utter fools, as we continued to form our marches inside their lines.

Councilmen Ron Dellums and Wilmont Sweeney disagreed, and moved that the City Council hold a public hearing to "let the people have their say."
Dellums offered, "Choosing a new department headfrom within the department without advertising for outside applicants means settling for a built in racial bias. Suppose there's no eligible Black person within the department because of the historical problems of minority group members? We need

person within the department because of the historical problems of minority group members? We need to discuss this and other problems in public."

The argument continued for another half hour between Councilmen, between Councilmen, between the City Attorney and Councilmen, between John DeBonehead and himself. No other scheduled or unscheduled speakers from the public were allowed to interfere.

DeBonehead called Silbowitz a "freak" and the audience "idiots." The City Attorney gave a tight-assed interpretation of the law that excluded City Council discussion of any hiring policies by the City Manager. Councilwoman May thanked heaven for Berkeley's sacred City Charter which enshrines a holy form of government in which an appointed City Manager has all an appointed City Manager has all

the power while elected representatives sit on their hands.
Silbowitz never did get to finish, since the Council spent all its time debating his right to say what he didn't get a chance to say, as the Mayor kept intoning "I know what you're going to say" before he could say it. Tennis anyone?

before he could say it. Tennis anyone?
When the Tuesday night farce ended for this week BARB cornered Silbowitz and scooped the Council by asking, "What were you going to say?"
Silbowitz smiled freakishly and said: "Berkeley must reach outside its own Police Department for a new Chief. This city is deeply divided, more than many cities, on the question of police. If a real gesture, a real acknowledgement of the need for change in the old ways doesn't happen soon, the beautiful culture that has been growing all these years in Berkeley ways doesn't happen soon, the beautiful culture that has been growing all these years in Berkeley is going to die. But it probably won't be a peaceful, quiet death. The choice of a new Police Chief gives us a chance to make that gesture, just as the recent choice of a new School Superintendent was used creatively by the School Board. But they don't hide behind a City Manager."

In a letter to the City Council, Loni Hancock and three Black Council candidates, Pecot, Wilson, and Widener, urged the Council to set up a public hearing, create a citizens' committee to determine the type of new Police Chief that Berkeley needs, and begin a nation-wide search to find him or her. In a separate letter to the Council, Grodin also asked that a Citizens' Advisory Committee be set up to advise on selection of a new Chief.

According to Silbowitz, BBC plans to involve Berkeley people in the selection process if it can, probably by a strategy of direct action. Lots of luck.



Quon has been suspended and needs any witness who was there. He can be reached at 841-6813 or through 843-2572.

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

At present, Sood is the only GI from the 27 to receive a conviction. Two other men, Lawrence Reidel and Louis Osczepinsk, were arraigned in a military court, but instead of handing down a decision presiding Judge Lt. Col. George Robinson ordered new psychiatric hearings for the two.



for the Rockefellers or the Kennedy's, but for us,"
Alvarado warmed up; "The mother-fuckers who run our country won't tell you that most of the poor are white," he said.
"Most of the farm workers, all those people in Appalachia, and the hillbillies in chicago are white. And YOU must go back to these people, back to your roots in your community and face up to the John Birchers next door, or thirdworld people will have to fight him and his wife and his children because their attitudes are our oppression.
"We have to fight what has become known as the war of the flea," Alvarado explained, "We don't go along with that stuff at Columbia and in Moses Hall. Our lives are too valuable to spend two or five or ten years in the mother-fucker's jails. We figure that the dog can scratch at a flea and try to bite him, but after a while his quantitative irritation will become qualitative and dog will have to move because he has no choice."
Richard Aoki and Jim Solis of TWLF in Berkeley, Scott Smith of SF State and many others reaffirmed their determination to keep striking "thomorrow, the next day, the next, and the next, until our demands are won."
