Seventeen Americans grabbed by the Puerto Vallarta police in the dead of night and held incommun-icado for two days, were deported from Mexico this week.

One of the victims came into the BARB office Wednesday and told how it happened. The young man, with a neatly trimmed beard, chose to remain anonymous.

"They gave us no warning. They came at 2 am and rushed us to jail," he said. "One kid was pistol whipped and kicked by the chief of police. We were not allowed to see the American consul".

Straights were also included in the roundup. "Some of us offered the police money. They refused. The 'mordida' didn't work this time. They must have orders from higher up," the deported American said.

"I believe the dealer in Puerto Vallarta was in on it," he charged. "Everyone of us had talked to him. There is only one dealer in town, and everyone knows him. "If you go to Puerto Vallarta," he warned, "keep away from the

dealer. Bring your own stuff with you, or forget it." The 12 males and 5 females

The 12 males and 5 females spent two days in the local carcel and then taken to Mexico City, again in the dead of night, "The federales didn't want tourists to see us," the deportee commented.

In the capital they were ordered to fill out forms saying they had nothing against the Mexican government. Those who hadcars were escorted to the Texas border. Five were put on a flight without cars to San Antonio.

Where the pretty theory breaks down is clear to us all now. The political bosses and ward-heelers of the Twenties are gone. Comparatively few jobs are given to "triends" and supporters because of political favors--except at the Federal level.

East coast police departments no longer simply hire Irishmen, and garbage collection has slipped out of the hands of Italians. The corruption and control have become more subtle. Today you have to be "professional," you have to be part of the system in order to get into the system. Now, the facade of non-political professionalism is lowered like a strip joint fire curtain to hide the fucking around going on backstage. The police, we are told, are not political. Whenever the people fight for control of the police, they are put down for "politicizing" the cops. East coast police departments no

off duty cops attack Black Panther

test attempt to worm out of trouble with Blacks.
In Berkeley, Police Chief Beall gives a speech asking the public to elect "law and order" candidates for City Council and attacks


dates for City Council and attacks all who question the cops as "revolutionists" and anarchists seeking to destroy "civilization."



FAIR HEAD BRISTLES AS **WOMEN UNVEIL SI**

Bridal Protest by Isobel, Dodie, and Jenny

Women's Liberation demonstrated our contempt for the bridal bridle at the KYA Bridal Fair in S.F., last Saturday.
Using time-honored forms of protest like guerrilla theater, heckling, and picketing, a hundred angry women and a few men stormed the bastions. of the robber barons.

ed the bastions of the robber barons.

The hysterical sumptons displayed by the Bridal Fair officals were evidence that we had grabbed them by the short hairs. One baldheaded, ghoulish investor, imprisoned in a tuxedo, came ranting down the steps of the Masonic Auditorium howling, "Four grand, four grand I paid for this!"

He hoped to exercize the apparitions of free women by awesome invocation of the great god Mammon.

We arrived at the Masonic Au-

We arrived at the Masonic Auditorium at 2:00 PM and immediately began leafletting the arriving Brides-to-be and set up a picket line. The picket line told a story in slogans, a story which has been handed down from one generation to the next to create an enslaved self image in each American woman, slogans such as "Every wonam secretly wants to be raped," and "A smart woman plays helpless to bring out a man's protective instinct."

After a while some of our men added signs reading "I want a virgin" and "She'll do what Itell her."

The leaflets pointed out how we The leaflets pointed out now we ware bombarded by the mass media with images of the pretty, sexy, passive, child-like, yacuous woman. And Al we don't fit his image we are inditiobly a new

hair color or a new kitchen floor. When our weddings are over are we going to be anything more than well set-up domestic ser-vants?"

San Francisco pigs arrived and snorted around for a bit but aside from habitual minor harrassment,

Meanwhile back at the fair, Women's Liberation irregulars were mingling with the brides-to-be.

Our leaflets were usually accepted. our learners were usually accepted as just another of the various commercial handouts. To the KYA officials, realization came gradually that some wolves had gotten in among their sheep.

Suddenly a line of women weaved among the booths chanting, "Buy, buy, buy." Then, just as suddenly, the line broke into fragments and disappeared.

Women Liberationists, scattered through the auditorium inter-

ed through the auditorium inter-rupted, booed, heckled, and tried to get the floor long enough to say something interesting, but the panel was set to answer only previously written and edited ques-

The questions from the brides-tobe were usually on the order of "What should the mother of the of "What should the mother of the bride wear to a two o'clock wedding?", although ocasionally there were questions like, "My fiance thinks I'm a virgin and I'm not...What should Ido?" The former type of question was always answered in great detail, but the latter was curtly answered by "That's up to the individual." Tim Leary did it again! A beau-tiful lecture delivered in his very un-lecture type manner Tuesday night in Berkeley was all but guaranteed to turn on everyone who

"Psychedelic Communi-

"Psychedelic Communities" was the theme for the night, or, as Leary himself put it earlier in the evening, "How to live a life which allows you to grow in your individual psychedelic direction on this up-tight planet".

The constant flow of people between the city and the countryside is seen by Leary as the struggle of the turned-on people to free themselves from the social prisons that the rest are trapped in. He rapped that out to open the lecture, and built on it through the evening.

evening.

For most heads, the country scene is eventually a necessary environment to straighten themselves out and raise that hedonic index. The key issue, the audience was told, is LAND.

"To lead your dropped-out life, they never they they have they issue they are they in the proper they in the

"To lead your dropped-out life, free more territory. The more, the better. The farthest away from today's society, the better. The cheapest land economically is the most valuable hedonically."

The various modes of living a truly "dropped-out" life were divided roughly during his lecture into two groups: the auto-erotic religion, (described in part by Leary as "turning on by turning off" to all but the chosen trip), and bi-polar type living, which embraces all aspects of life and individuality, symbolized by the yinyang.

yang.
The all-embracing tribal way of The all-embracing tribal way of life was stressed by Leary as the most significant method of avoiding society's trap these days, "The men and women of Big Sur in their little cabins are definitely onto the way of living a psychedelic life." However, strictly governed communal living was not recommended to his listeners. Leary

pointed out that individuality was often smothered and frictions grew under the heavy conditions. "Rules restrict, and to be an individual you have to do your own trip. With too many regulations, the community gradually withdraws into nothing; there must be interaction for freedom and a truly hedonic life."

He put the no-dope rules of many communes down when he said "the only was a tribal thing can survive is either plenty of dope to smooth

communes down when he said "the only waa a tribal thing can survive is either plenty of dope to smooth the natural edges, or a far-out festival to blow minds regularly."

Leary mentioned that in the travels of himself and his wife Rosemary, "most ashrams I've visited in this country are nice, quiet, gentle mental rest homes".

As an alternative to such situations, Leary offered to his followers tribal communities, based upon the man - woman relationship and the family structure, which protects all those in it, and yet frees the individual to draw on his own genetic background "You can be anything you want to be this time around," he assured his audience, and provided the tribal community as the setting.

He emphasized the family structure of the tribal thing as the base to build on, with the children the most important aspect.

TERRORISM ANYONE?

Terrorism is a tool of political and military struggle which can cut both ways. The use of ex-emplary violence can just as eas-ily lose popular support or gain it

The primary consideration in the application of terror is that a clear-cut rationale must be evi-

dent.

No one is positively influenced by violence directed against his own person. That is a fascist concept whose bankruptcy has been proven time and again by the pigs' clubs. Most of the movement's support to date has been gained from reaction against the cops' clumsy attempts at personal terrorism.

rorism.

Therefore, terrorism must be an example. The violence can be divided into two types; that practiced against people and that practiced against property.

Regardless of the victim, one fact is paramount, The act of terrorism must appear to the populace as an act of justice.

A terrorist act need not be catastrophic. A hint canbe enough. Excessive zeal or passion can result in disaster.

In the campus struggles at the present time terrorism is cropping up. Unfortunately, very lite of it is thought out and therefore most of it is counterproductive.

The rationale must be so strik-



The success of the guerrilla ing as to come through even the biased freporting of the establishist that he can outgovern the opment. One example that did was pressor, not exceed its violence. the much-celebrated throwing of Guerrilla terrorism must be seen the typewriter out of the window

at SF State.

No one is going to send the National Guard to prevent brutality to typewriters. The event was unusual enough to get media space nationwide. The symbolism was undeniable — quit scabbing or we'll do similar violence to you. Many a typist could see even deeper levels of meaning.

The exact opposite was the scattering of library file cards at Berkeley. Its only purpose could have been to satisfy the persons who carried it out. In such cases, other terrorism could be justified to bring such people into line.

The analysis required to ensure effective terrorist activity inevitably must cut deep. You must have a clear vision of what results you are trying to bring about, what mechanisms are to be used, how people will probably react in such circumstances, and what alternative courses are open.

Emotionalism has no place in such analysis. Action for action's sake is self-defeating after a time. Above all there must be sufficient motivation. No one can organize a revolution with half a heart. "It's a concept of knowing who your people are, it recognizes that you're being fucked by the system in America."

Individual action is where Chicanismo is at. "You as a person have got to do something to see that your people are not continually fucked by the system."

Ysidro's education in American racism began in grammar school, where the teachers tried to condition the Chicanos to split from their culture. "I was subject to corporal punishment for speaking. Spanish in the playground."

Cars are burning in the street and some Avenue businesses have barricaded their doors, trapping people inside, preparing for the coming attack by countless pigs being bussed en masse into the city.

6:30 — Telly is liberated as far down as Haste by the street people.

A raging bonfire is burning at that intersection, and the Ave. is filling despite pleas made by TWLF leaders for everyone to go home.

The haze of tear-gas becomes blinding closer to the campus, where Berkeley regulars and reserve police called out this afternoon are re-

The pigs are on a rampage in the campus area, teargassing dormitories and student gathering areas in an attempt to secure some relatively-safe territory for a base.

At least two paddy-wagons have been overturned at this point by people who are getting it together; the pigs are frantically throwing the tear-gas grenades, over 60 so far, in an attempt to keep the people on the

Ave at bay...

Blue clouds of tear-gas strangle Sproul Plaza as this is being phoned in. Hundreds of choking students pour, half blind, off the campus. Pigs wearing gas masks rush to club those who fall. Terrified thousands are driven into the streets. The cannisters of tear gas keep coming down Telegraph Avenue.

Bancroft and Telly is like an open-air gas chamber.

By 4:10 the gas has reached Channing Way. We watch amazed as students keep throwing the awful cannisters back into the pigs' faces. "We're all niggers now," a black youth cries out.

It's Thursday at Cal, and the pigs have brought new weapons into their war on the students. For most of the day the pigs chickened out, not making a move as thousands of students picketed the center of campus.

The mass of the strikers safely returned to Sproul Plaza to renew the huge picket line. Still the pigs are too shook from yesterday to move against the students.

At three, a group of strikers block off Sather Gate completly. The pigs get the word to move. Highway patrolmen sweep through the Plaza, clubbing and arresting as usual.

The students fight back. Cherry bomb after cherry bomb goes off inside police lines. Rocks and sticks are thrown with arrogance. For the first time today, the blue meanie motherfuckers storm out of their Sproul Hall bunker. The final push is on.

After the slaughter begins, one beaten student is dragged off the Plaza by the Alameda County pigs. Bottles are thrown at them by others trying to get their comrade back.

Like a nightmare outside of reality, the gassing begins. The ghastly

tity, the gassing begins. The ghastly vapors quickly smother the Plaza. Panic-stricken crowds flee into the Student Union and out the back, the fumes having poisoned the the fumes h building also.

At the Terrace Cafeteria the battle rages on Windows battle rages on. Windows are smashed, more putrid cannisters go off. At last, given full rein, the pigs drive the students off campus.
Till four-thirty, the fighting goes

Till four-thirty, the fighting goes on. Some students and street people heroically hurl back the tear-gas grenades and repulse the pig charges down Telly. Victims no longer, the people prevented the pigs from getting past the Bank of America on Durant and Telly. When the pigs finally retreated to Sproul, they did so under a hail of rocks and bottles.

The students left Telegraph with tear-gas in their eyes and resistance in their guts.

The thing about the student strike at Cal this week is this: it's getting bigger. Whereas you could say a picket line of a "few hundred students" marched around the campus, today you must speak in terms of thousands.

Example: on Wednesday, Chen A.

campus, today you must speak in terms of thousands.

Example: on Wednesday, Chan 4 referred to the swirling battles as "500 students." As anybody who was there could tell you, it was closer to 3,000.

Not all at one place or at one time, because, man, that's not the scene, It's simply getting bigger and better because the student "spectators" are watching it less and enjoying it more.

And the reason the "silent majority" is moving is this, as explained by the Daily California, Wednesday (about the day before): "The blood-stained beast stalks the campus. The police have suspended the constitution and are making arrests at will, and without provocation."

making arrests at will, and without provocation.

"They then proceed to rarified forms of torture."

This reporter observed many unprovoked attacks on students who were just standing or sitting. Example: a student, in a blue Navy peajacket, was sitting on a bench in Sproul Plaza, when all of a sudden he was jumped by two cops who hit him with their billyclubs, pulled his coat over his

of a sudden he was jumped by two cops who hit him with their billy-clubs, pulled his coat over his head so he couldn't move, and beat him again. Then they took him to the infamous basement-headquarters where "rarified forms of torture" take place.

When the students asked, "Why, why?" the cops advanced on THEM with their billy-clubs.

It is the presence and the action of these CHP Reagan goons that makes the numbers of "spectators" less silent and more active. In point of fact, this apparently dawned on the fuzz, too. George Dushek, of Chan 9's 'Newsroom' reported that "later in the afternoon the California Highway Partol held a strategy meeting in the basement of Sproul Hall and decided to see what would happen if the police withdrew from Sproul Plaza."

Plaza."

This is what happened: everything became normal again, the students strolled back and forth across campus, and Holy Hubert started preaching—a sure sign that "peace" had come to the

Plaza.

It took some doing to arrive at this point. The error of the police (always the SAME error) was that they "surrounded" the 3,000 students on Sproul Plaza and proceeded to sweep and beat them off campus.

"The ante goes up," he repeated, "if they arrest one of us, they'll have to take ten more. Last week was the last time the pigs could attack apeaceful picket line."

"You're all niggers. The administration treats students like niggers," Nabors charged vehemently, "They won't take you seriously. And the motherfuckers better know this is serious."

As he spoke a cherry bomb exploded inside Sproul Hall. The crowd laughed and cheered.

Later strikers played a hide and seek game with the cops. Even in a drenching downpour the strike line numbered in the hundreds. Dispersing and regrouping at will before the yellow garbed stick carrying seum the students ran circles around their adversaries.

A tear gas bomb went off as the strike line marched through the

A tear gas bomb went off as the strike line marched through the cafeteria. About 200 students, strikers and non-strikers, rushed for fresh air leaving their food behind.

During a foray through the li-brary catalogue boxes were thrown to the ground. Stern faced wrink-led librarians rushed out to re-place their little paper cards. Some

strike leaders admonished others for the attack on defenseless paper. The only human casualty of the day was Stanley Kadani, arrested for "blocking a public walkway".

But the students aren't about to watch as the pigs trample on their very best brother. Fights with the goons break out as people try to get through to Nabors. Trapped by the fiercely hostile crowds of students, the pigs lash out, clubbing and clubbing.

The insides of LSB did not look the same five minutes later. The kids who'd gone in all got out, leaving much shattered glass in their wake.

West campus saw the strike march next, and another group of strikers gave Gilman Hall the same treatment LSB had received. Then it was on into the streets, a sweep down Durant and up Telly.

The Haight-Ashbury Free Medi-cal Clinic got ripped off last week; three losers' way of saying "thanks" to the people there who are putting their time, skills, and love into helping others. The bummers hit early Monday

The bummers hit early Monday morning when the night-watchman returned to the Clinic at 558 Clayton from lunch, to find three stran-gers in the hall trying to open the door to the pharmacy. They immediately tied his hands

with a radio cord and stuffed him into a nearby closet, then quickly looted the place and left with their arms full.

arms full.

As a result the Clinic, (where supplies are always in demand), is now doubly hard-up. The burglars took the two office type-writers and foraged through the medical supplies, "probably looking for "hard drugs" a spokesman for the Clinic said.

BARB talked with Don Reddlick, administrative director, who estimated the loss from the rip-off at \$350 to \$400 equipment-wise.

at \$350 to \$400 equipment-wise.

but added that the loss in medicine that the three took is hard to pin down as many of the supplies on hand had not yet been sorted through and itemized.

Monday's slap-in-the-face surprised and disappointed the staff, but it hasn't fazed their operations a bit.

Reddick reassured BARB that the Clinic will maintain its standard hours, 6 to 10 pm Monday through Friday. "We're looking forward to being open on Saturdays eventually," he added, thut to do that we'll have to have more professional volunteers, more doctors and nurses, to help us do the job. us do the job.

"Meanwhile, our more immediate needs are for equipment, pharmaceutical supplies, and money.

The city of Livermore, in south Alameda County, voted two-to-one against a Human Rights Council

The U.L.C. holds that "the man on the street is just as quali-fied to teach his proceedings." man on the street is just as qualified to teach his revelation as somebody who went to school and sits behind a big desk" in the Bishop's words. "I ain't knockin' education," adds the Bishop, 'but it's not everything and it won't make you holy."

So of course any man or woman may be ordained as a minister of the Church, Free, upon request.

Hensley was arrested Feb. 17 at the church headquarters in Modesto for issuing Doctor of Divinity degrees without "proper" accreditation. The issue is how the state gets to decide what is

in religious matters. "Nobody is really sure," points out the Bishop, "what a Divinity really is, and one opinion is as good as the next."

The "blessed time" will be a march to the courthouse from the church headquarters in Modesto, starting at ten AM on March 3.

"It is expected that many hundreds of new ministers will be ordained that morning before the march and scores of new churches

march and scores of new churches will unfold," says a church spokesman, "so bring picnic baskets, good vibrations, incense, children, revelations, holy books, banners, donations and desires for ordinations,"

The Universal Life Church has The Universal Life Church has been operating since 1962, and has been "recognized" by the State Atiorney General's office, who "welcomed it into the family of California's homebased religions", according to a church spokesman, Rev. A candlelight procession will enter San Francisco on the evening

of March 4.

It is not yet known if a change of venue will be made by the Army to head off the demonstration.

Bill purchased the popular hangout and groovy item shop last August. At that time he had a sub-lease from Yarmo, who held the master lease. At first the two got along well, but eventually fell out over police activity on the Avenue.

Their action has included co-ordinating picket lines and strike support, informing the public of the issues involved in the strike, and participating in the monthly caravans of supplies to the striking families in Delano.

Although the Chavez family would be the first to admit that they have done no more than countless other Chicano families in the strike, they have become the targets for harrassment which has increased in viciousness as the

creased in viciousness as the

creased in viciousness as the strike has grown.
Grapes and eggs smeared on their house, a flower pot thrown through their front window, and phone calls threatening them with death have only increased their determination to see the strike through.

The two year-old child, Aaron, is guarded even in his sleep by relatives and others concerned by threatening phone calls.

"They seem to know every move we make," Mrs. Chavez confessed.

To substantiate this, Mrs. Chavez pointed out how one of their fellow strike-workers returned from business only to find his motor-cycle smashed by a hit and run car. It was a total loss. Other incidents have occurred where strikers' cars have been burned, etc.

The first hint that strike-supporters had of just who "they" were came last November, when "Minutemen", militants from the so-called "Home Defense Association" in Oakland, counterdemonstrated against a picket line made up of grape strikers and those who backed them.

Only three weeks ago, and then as a result of heavy public pressure in San Leandro where the Chavez's live, did the police show any concern at all for their welfare.

The Mayor of San Leandrovisit-ed their house and stated that the tormenters must be "neo-nazis", and the police put their house on the patrol check list, which meant it would be checked two or three times a night. But not a clue as to who is making the Chavez family a target.

"They accused me of cutting the tire," Avakian told BARB. "I was handcuffed so tightly my hands are still numb. They beat on my knuckles, and smashed my head against the car."

week for overtime," he said, "If they wouldn't cross the line for a few days the strike could be won."

TELLS HOW DICK STALLED ARREST OF BAY BOMBERS

Cullenbine told of how Cullenbine told of how Joe Dobiss, a labor organizer, infil-trated the terrorist organization on his own. Dobiss went to a gun show on the lower Peninsula last fall and there met a man who of-fered to sell him automatic wea-

pons.
At that time the rash of bombings had just started. Prime targets were Kepler's book store and the Free University. The local press paid little attention to the

press paid intue attention to the incidents.

Dobiss was introduced by his new friend to the Bible study classes of the "Society of Man", which fronted for the bombers. He was asked to stay after the Bible meetings and found himself in a terrorist planning group.

Dobiss stuck with it and on January 6 sent a written, documented report to the Palo Alto and Mountain View police departments. The report listed names, serial numbers of guns, auto license numbers and more.

The report was given to Howard Carlisle, who was at that time in charge of the investigation, Carlisle was a member of the Committee for Excellence in Education, which Cullenbine described as an "out-front racist group" which had as its primary purpose to halt the "multi-cultural program" bethe "multi-cultural program" being instituted at Palo Alto High. The director of the program has recently resigned, citing the harassment of his children as his reason.

No evidence indicates that Car-lisle informed his superior, Chief Hydie, of the report. Cullenbine, who by then had seen the report,

While bombs were going off all over the Peninsula, a police detective in possession of inside information did nothing.

Howard Carlisle, a dick on the Palo Alto police force and a charter member of the racist Committee for Excellence in Education, sat for weeks on reports from an infiltrator in the neo-Nazibomb ring.

The only action taken by Carlisle, said Cullenbine, was to call Dobiss and tell him that the report had been checked, was not true, that Dobiss' life was in danger and that he could expect no help from the police.

On January 24 the report was given to the Menlo Park police, who went right to work on it. They put in their own undercover man and found the report to be 85% correct.

On January 26 Palo Alto finally moved, The house of City Councilman Kirk Comstock was bombed with an antipersonnel device. The straight press screamed and old Hydie took over the investigation from Carlisle.

But they were too late, Menlo

But they were too late, Menlo Park came up with nine arrests with more said to be on the way. During all this time the free people of the Peninsula were taking action, A group set up a continuous stake-out for several months and got eight "definite" license plates and fifteen "suspicious" from their observations. They watched the homes of suspected bombers and found them getting back late on bombing nights. getting back late on bombing nights.

pected bombers and found them getting back late on bombing nights. Fortunately, the Free University has also been alert. They knew they ran the risk of dissolution unless they took the offensive. 300 members dropped out, but the MFU has revamped its courses, office and store. Community service programs, such as their runaway placement service, have been strengthened.

But life for others is a little less cherry. Roy Kepler is in hiding, with a "contract" said to be out on him. The Menlo Park informer is off on a paid vacation at a secret site while Joe Dobiss is underground and fending for himself. The Palo Alto cops are still ignoring him.

In the Redwood City courtroom for the Monday arraignment Cullenbine reported a "freaky, uptight" atmosphere. Local nordic types filled the courtroom wearing swastikas, "white power" buttons and tight assholes.

Nine have been arrested, but reports have the ring much bigger. There may be more action and counter-action before the horizon

There may be more action and counter-action before the horizon clears. The Palo Alto fuzz, however, can be counted on. To do what, no one will say.

Asked for his license, Smith produced it. A native of Ohio, who returns home frequently, he gave proof of his driving status in Ohio. (Most out - of - state students retain their home - state

in Onto. (Most out - of - state licenses)

The pig started grunting, "Who are you? Where are you going? What are you doing?" He then reached in and grabbed some papers off the dashboard.

Smith informed him he had no right to search the car without permission. For that he was put under arrest.

Two other hogs had arrived and Smith was ordered out of the car. They gathered around him and started to go through his pockets. Smith told them they had the right to pat him down but not to go into his pockets. For that he was hurled against the car.

The women were ordered out and their identification was de-

The women were ordered out and their identification was demanded. The pork patrol then ransacked the trunk and the entire car. They took all Hooper's keys (not just car keys) and impounded

(not just car keys) and impounded the car.

Smith went to jail. The women had to walk home at 2:30 in the morning. In jail, Smith asked to be put in a cell with other Black prisoners. Predictably, he was put in the only all-White cell.

Of his jailers, Smith said, "It was hard to tell them from the drunks. You'd tell them your name and they'd laugh. They assume a nyone there is automatically guilty and call you Smitty or Boy.

The popular student body president is no stranger to police harassment. Last year he was beaten and maced in Berkeley's notorious "Smith Case". A Bermotorious "Smith Case".

It included the beating of a

fr included the beating of a 67-year-old woman in her own home. Charges against all three Smiths were dropped of course. This was only done though, after months of "legal" harassment. reports his phone has also

He reports his phone has also been bugged.

The Berkeley Smith case got a lot of people in the community uptight about the unbridled pig patrol. Perhaps the new Smith case will show people in Oakland it can happen to anyone. Meanwhile, check those taillights.

NOTE: The following are excerpts from a letter by Warren Wells from the Alameda County Jail February 17th to Miss Shirley

Since Sept. 9th. Wells has been awaiting re-trial on charges of attempted murder and assault with a deadly weapon which stem from the shoot-out last April 6th between other Black Panthers and Oakland

police.

BARB was permitted only a very brief interview with Wells, which was in the form of shouting through a steel wall vented by large holes; Wells then attempted to complete BARB's interview through his letter to Miss Lee...

I talked to the BARB reporter

I talked to the BARB reporter only a few minutes. You can tell him this: I'm 22, and I've spent nine and a half years in California prisons and Youth Authority reform schools.

I went to Soledad State Pen at 16 years old (it came out later in Wells's trial that he probably was the youngest juvenile ever placed in a men's prison of this type), and three and a half years later after two years and four months in solitary I filed a civil suit and got action. It was a big case, called the Jordan and Wells Decision.

I don't label myself as a certain

brand of revolutionary; I know what this whole thing is about, and I'm not a blind emotional follower. I'm very aware.

I used heroin: I was hooked. It was something personal. I'm much stronger inside now that I ever thought I could be. I know what real freedom is: It's in the mind,

real freedom, I didn't jump bail; it was proven in my trial. I have no reason to know I will win this case. Mr. Garry is a genius in court, and out of it. (Charles Garry, his attorney.) I'm being treated very

badly in here because of mybelief.

badly in here because of my belief, but it makes me stronger.

My Brothers in the Party (Wells was a Captain in the Black Panther Party) have a reason for more or less isolating me. I let them down real hard. I love these people of the Vanguard.

I used to be afraid of jail because I had so much of it, but not any more. I only fear that I won't be able to contribute enough

won't be able to contribute enough to our people. I also believe in people-ism.

Over two thousand political bro-thers, white and black, joined the Panthers in celebration on Sunday night of the imprisoned leader's

night of the imprisoned leader's birthday.
Speakers like Charles Garry and Bobby Seale came on strong with political raps, and soul musicians and dancers had the crowd moving, but Huey P.Newton was where it was at, all night long.
His wicker throne literally occuped the center of the stage, and his tape from prison, as well as his filmed interview, Prelude to Revolution, were what we all got into the most.

Using the tape recording as his podium, the Panther Minister of Defense promised that "this celebration today will only be a prelude or celebration to the offensive that we are going to wage in the not-too-far future, just as our brothers in Viet Nam had the Tet offensive last year."

Huey praised the Oakland Seven

Huey praised the Oakland Seven and the campus revolts. Of Eldridge, he said "this decadent, fascist society wasn't worthy of him and couldn't tolerate his presence, because he acted as a guide flag for the people."

After the film of Huey, which was made in another prison, Tom Hayden came on strong with a rap about the need for white radicals to get together a revolutionary program and organization. Hayden climaxed his rap about how Huey was right in telling the white movement to take up the gun, by slipping behind the curtains and emerging with a rifle in his hand, emphasizing "I mean it,"

it."

Seale came on to raise money for the Newton-Cleaver Defense Fund, but before he got down to the nitty gritty of bread, he gave a little rap of his own.

There was some really fine poetry recited. Baby Dee, a close friend of Alprentice "Bunchy" Carter, performed a couple of Bunchy's poems and they were gutsy explosions of where a Pan-

ther's head is at.

Le Ballet Afro - Haiti danced some fantastic things later on in the program, turning on just about everybody in the audience. And earlier, Johnny Talbot's band rocked the house when the singer, Faye Carol, did a rhythmic flashing song, "Your Love is Like a See-saw", and then started singing "Black Power"!

Charles Garry also said a few important things. He denounced the racism within the judicial system, "which is all I've been seeing for the last 15 months, from the lowest law enforcement officer to the highest judicial official".

from p. 5 attracted by what he's now learned to be Berkeley's "so-called liberal tradition," he transferred to UC last spring.

Then began Ysidro's evolution into a leading Chicano activist. There were only 55 Chicanos on campus, and no Chicano organization, when Macias got to Berkeley. By this fall the sit-in executed by the Mexican American Student Confederation was forcing the University to han scale grapes.

Student Confederation was forcing the University to ban scab grapes. He and ten other MASC leaders are still hung up in court on charges resulting from that demonstration.

But what had happened in Ysidro's head that enabled him to become a leader of the TWLF strike for a Third World College?

Ysidro answers that the crucial year for him was his last in the army. "I was 21, and I recognized what had happened to me as a youth. When I came out I a youth. When I came out I recognized a lot of the hypocrisy of the services, as well as the suffering of my people.

"It became meaningful to me to dedicate a great part of my time to see what way I could help our struggle."

Attending an Albuquerque conference held by Tijerina in 1967 had its effect on Macis' emerging political consciousness. But what really counted was that since childhood he'd been tuned in to being a Chicano, "at home there was no jive about being an American or not speaking Spanish," and his sense of being what he is overrid all the "attempts made in school to make you lose your self-respect and downgrade your culture."

Ysidro's political head is anti-

capitalist because "not only is it fucking us, not only the minority people, but it's fucking the mass of white people in this country, even if they don't know it."

Macias admires the Cuban revolution, particularly because of its success in getting rid of racism, but he would like to see in this country a socialism uniquely suited to dealing with American racism.

The TWLF leader is looking forward to victory for the strike demands. "Besides Heyns' personal obnoxiousness," Macias attributes the Administration's fall-

sonal obnoxiousness," Macias attributes the Administration's fallure to meet the demands to Reagan and the Academic Senate,
Reagan is dragging the strike out for his own political convenience, and "the fucking Academic Senate are not ready to recognize the legitimacy of the demands. They're not ready to rally round Heyns and give him the balls he needs to do it." balls he needs to do it.'

balls he needs to do it."

Macias finds it ironic that the
System is trying to break the
strike when the Third World College would also be in the interest
of white America. "Just think

of white America. "Just think what meaningful things could be contributed by those 30 million minds which are going to waste because of some funky - assed racist philosophy."

Ysidro also realizes that a strike victory would help the white students on campus. With the Third World College as a precedent, "they could go beyond the CPE trip and actually have a hand in trip trip and actually have a hand in deciding what kind of an education

Macias accepts a certain amount of criticism of the Front's tactics and leadership, pointing out that before the strike began the TW-

ence. But as the strike and the repression grows, the leaders mature. "We're learn-

Ysidro thinks that what's been icing up the strike's path so far is "the defeatist attitude among the mass of white students. believe the Administration cannot recognize a legitimate student strike and implement the demands. These people have got to get off the defeatist bag."

He pounds the desk we're sit-ting at as he lets out his frus-tration at the lack of mass white support on campus, "We've spent thousands of dollars on leaflets, we've had convocations, we've had the best speakers bureau ever at Cal to go to classes, sororities, wherever."

Macias responds to a comparison of the Cal strike to the one at State, which has succeeded in shutting it down, by pointing out that "we're dealing with a different mentality here than at State."

The news reaches Chicano headquarters that the TA's will strike in the morning. Macias turns to BARB and says, "the affirmative TA vote is a big step, we're learning."

"Things will be done, tactics will be introduced, until the Administration finally decides that they're going to meet our demands.
"We will win the strike. We cannot afford to lose.
"Tercer Mundo Vencera, - that means the Third World will be victorious."

Cal TAs have had it with police action on the Berkeley campus.

They voted Tuesday night to go on strike until police are removed from the Berkeley campus and Reagan's "state of emergency" is lifted.

"We have two demands," the union stated in its official civile.

reagains "state of emergency" is lifted.

"We have two demands," the union stated in its official strike resolution. They are "a just resolution of the campus controversy and of the AFT demands."

Besides demanding removal of on-campus swine, the AFT reaffirmed its support for the Third World Liberation Front's current campus strike, and called for "union organizing rights on campus."

The TA strike grew out of a major bust last Thursday. 17 TAs were busted off a peaceful picket

were busted off a peacerul plane at Sather Gate. The arrestees were charged with blocking were busted off a peaceful picket une at Sather Gate. The arrestees were charged with blocking access to buildings, although Vice-Chancellor Earl Cheit had demonstrated just a few minutes earlier that the line was permitting access to the campus by walk-ing through it.

ing through it.
As faculty union president Rich-

ard Steinhardt said later, "I feel that Sheriff Madigan deliberately provoked a TA strike." Union members felt strongly that the

that Sheriff Madigan deliberately provoked a TA strike." Union members felt strongly that the busts were ordered by the cops, not the administration.

The strike resolution had a strong majority at the Tuesday meeting following the arrests. The most controversial issue among the TAs was whether to permit members to continue teaching classes off the campus. They ultimately voted not to. mately voted not to.

TA Union president Conn Hallinan commented earlier that the ending of off-campus classes would hurt students more directly than administrators, but said, "When you strike, people get hurt, and there's nothing you can do about it."

"We're fighting the most power-ful corporation in California," he continued, "and we've got to use every weapon we can."

One weapon the union isn't try-ing to use yet is a request for formal strike sanction, which Hal-linan explaine; would keep all other

unionized employees off the uni-versity campus, "including the one versity campus, "including the one guy from the United Asbestos Workers."

After the successful strike vote yesterday, Halliann said, "We are trying to avoid bringing outside agents onto the campus-that's why we haven't requested sanction. That's what the administration is doing, when it brings in the police."

Nevertheless, AFT will picket campus entrances and yell "scab" at non-striking workers. Hallian

at non-striking workers, Hallinan

said.

One group of these nonstrikers is faculty local AFT 1474, which has not decided on policy relative to the strike. President Richard Steinhardt did announce that "we're not scabbing on our TAss."

Steinhardt added, "If they seek and obtain strike sanction, we will certainly honor it."

The campus clerical workers' union, AFSCME 1695, decided Tuesday night not to cross AFT picket lines. They have a strike vote scheduled this weekend.

PROSECUTION OUT WITH BAGS FULL, FEW HITS, NO RUNS

The prosecution brought its case t the Oakland Seven to a this week, and left many tors wondering if it had a against spectators case at all at all.

Prosecutor Lowell Jensen trot-Prosecutor Lowell Jensen trotted three more police officers, including Cal's own "Dean Fuzz" Sicheneider, on to the witness stand in an attempt to prove that the Seven were engaged in a bona fide conspiracy.

Besides revealing that police officers have remarkably poor and remarkably "convenient" memories the testimony only showed

officers have remarkably woonvenient" memories, the testimony only showed that the Oakland Seven had been among a large group of people active in planning the Stop The Draft Week demonstrations.

One of Jensen's star witnesses one of Jensen's star witnesses, undercover agent Robert Wheeler, even admitted that he never saw all seven of the defendants at any one of the many meetings he attended. Wheeler also admitted that he was shown pictures of Bob Mendel, Steve Hamilton and Terry Cannon, before he took his assignment, and told by police officials that these three were

Terry Cannon, before he took his assignment, and told by police officials that these three were "leaders".

Jensen has been trying to make a big point of Mike Smith's demonstrating the use of a baton as a club, but his two undercover informers haven't helped him any.

The first agent, James Coleman who testified earlier, said that Smith gave a "poor" demonstration on the use of the club, and said it was mostly of a defensive nature.

Wheeler confirmed this, saying that Smith was showing how the police would use their clubs against the demonstrators, and showed the monitors how to defend against the police thrusts. (In a misspent part of his youth, Smith was a guard at San Quentin).

Wheeler also made extensive use of his notes, which he said, he typed up minutes after attending Stop The Draft Week meetings. He said he didn't take any notes at the meetings, but would rush home right after them and type notes up, including exact quotations, from memory. He said his memory was quite good, and he could sit through lengthy two and three hour meetings and have almost total recall of what was said.

Shortly after making this state-

Shortly after making this state-

ment to defense attorney Richard Hodge, Wheeler was asked by the court reporter to repeat one of his statements. "I can't remem-ber what I just said," the memory expert replied.

expert replied.

After three hours on the witness stand, all Sicheneider could add to Jensen's case was that Reese Erlich, Steve Hamilton, Mike Smith, Bob Mandel and Frank Bardacke were among the monitors for the demonstration, and met in groups around Sproul Plaza the night of Oct. 16.

He also stated that Mandel illegally drove sound equipment on to the campus. This, he said, was a violation of a university rule, but not a penal violation.

rule, but not a penal violation. Chief defense counsel Charles

Chief defense counsel Charles Garry concluded his cross-examination of Sicheneider by asking the campus officer if he had observed any violations of the penal code at all, on the night of Oct. 16 and the morning of Oct. 17. Dean Fuzz admitted that he hadn't. Sicheneider also said that in listening in at the meetings of the various monitor groups, he had never heard anyone advocate violence against the police. Wheel-

had never heard anyone advocate violence against the police. Wheeler, in his testimony, also had stated that the general plan of the demonstration was to move people around so as to avoid a confrontation with the police.

Jensen brought Captain James McCarthy, of the Oakland Police Department, now retired, to the stand early in the week. McCarthy had commanded the wedge that had inflicted most of the brutality on the demonstrators on Oct. 17. on the demonstrators on Oct. 17. He seemed to blame it mostly on

"The Alameda County deputies are so used to taking people out to Santa Rita," observed defense counsel Malcolm Burnstein, "that Mr. Archibald is probably now serving thirty days."

McCarthy explained that he was told to move the demonstrators out at all costs. He said he could have stopped the wedge if he wanted to, but even when a girl fell down in front of it, he didn't stop it. He just had his men mace the girl.

Jensen concluded his case by playing some tapes of the speeches made on Sproul Hall steps on the night of Oct, 16. If this represents the substance of a "conspiracy" charge, it is probably one of the weakest cases ever presented.

is that the Oakland Seven participated in Stop The Draft Week, along with ten thousand other people. He hasn't even proved that the Seven were among the leaders. The defense has consistently shown that there were many other people who committed acts identical with the acts of the Seven, but who weren't indicted. These included persons who spoke at rallies and meetings, led monitory groups, and participated in the see p. 23 meeting the see p. 24 meeting the s

Plainclothes cops are around. Uniformed cops sit in offices reading or trying to look kind, but still give the impression that this is a police-occupied campus.

Boards have replaced bombedout windows at the rear of the often-damaged administration building. Ominous fences are being erected around the library, in what

erected around the library, in what is supposed to be aconstruction project. The work receives many wary glances—"we'll know what it is when they put the guardhouses at the corners," joked one student. Next to Hayakawa, a new bad guy is making his way into the publicity spotlight, Professor John Bunzel, a pseudo-liberal apologist for Hayakawa according to one BUS member, found his Monday lecture full of strikers determined to give him a hard time. Strikers involved in the January 23d rally busts are doing their court thing this week. According to one of those arrested, the strikers will coordinate to enter a plea of demur. They expect to win de-

Some of those arrested have held self-defense seminars to learn how to defend themselves in court. They hope to bring their issues directly to juries rather than being hung up by intermediaries.

TWLF leader Dr. Juan Martinex
refused to accept blame from Hayakawa for lack of progress on

establishment's fear granting them autonomy is the chief obstacle to the implementation of minority study departments. Third World leaders do not want a Hayakawa-appointed "lackey" as head of ethnic studies but the establish-

of ethnic studies but the establishment seems to feel that granting autonomy is tantamount to setting up schools of anarchy.

Martinez, along with Roger Alvarado, also condemned Hayakawa for refusing a Carnegie Foundation grant of \$180,000 that would benefit minority students. The trouble is again over who will run the program. The administration "is holding a carrot in front of our noses," said Alvarado.

Dr. Martinez denied a report by the SF Chronicle that he had been

the SF Chronicle that he had been involved with some chicano Mis-sion High students in threatening SFS Dean of Admissions Charles

"They want to destroy me," Dr. Martinex said, adding, "Stone will tell you there were no knives ... (at) that meeting."

Both Daley and the ACLU of Illinois published magazines on the Convention demonstrations. The ACLU report, "Law and Disorder", is a wordy analysis, written for intellectuals, lawyers and researchers. Daley's report is exciting, romantic, adventurous, written for the masses.

"Fuck you, you Jew son of a bitch! You louse motherfucker! Go home!"

These subtle ideological points aside, Daley will also

These subtle ideological points aside, Daley will also try to present "facts" for the federal indictments. The key witness for the prosecution will be Robert L. Pierson, a Chicago undercover cop, who says he "infiltrated" the yippies as my "bodyguard".

Pierson has given us an incredible insight into the mind of the Chicago police by publishing a long article about his work.

of the Chicago police by publishing a long article about his work.

The article, titled, "EXCLUSIVE! BEHIND THE YIP-PIES' PLAN TO WRECK THE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION" appears in the December, 1968 issue of "Official Detective Stories", appropriately following an article titled, "THE SLAIN BLONDE MODEL HAD 100 BOY FRIENDS".

Pierson's story says in the introduction:

"Bob Pierson, a daring undercover officer, infiltrated the Yippies' high command. His secret intelligence reports enabled police officials to anticipate every move the demonstrators planned in the Battle of Chicago."

But in fact, Pierson's article documents in detail the elaborate conspiracy of the Chicago police against the demonstrators.

He writes that nine months before the Convention, in November, 1967, "intelligence officers of the Chicago police received information that several so-called peace groups were making plans to disrupt the Democratic National Convention".

He explains:

"The officers learned that four men were combing forces in what was to be a massive demonstration. Intelligence agents."

He explains:
"The officers learned that four men were combing forces in what was to be a massive demonstration. Intelligence agents were assinged to learn all they could about these men, to get acquainted with them and, if possible, to attend their meetings,"

According to Pierson's article, the four men "combining forces" were Rennie Davis, Dave Dellinger, Tom Havden and me.

Hayden and me.

"For about six months we gathered all the information we could about the principal groups planning the demonstrations and their leaders."

strations and their leaders."

The riot-control division learned that the yippies planned to camp out and sleep in Lincoln Park with "love feasts and nude-ins . . . guerrilla theater, workshops in drug problems, mass love-making and obscene games making fun of Pope Paul IV."

and nude-ins . . . guerrilla theater, workshops in drug problems, mass love-making and obscene games making fun of Pope Paul IV."

According to Pierson, this information 'led the City Council to take action, to give the police some power to deal with the expecte throngs. They passed an ordinance closing all public parks at 11 o'clock at night and prohibiting anyone from sleeping or camping in them'. The riot-control division 'learned' of plans to murder Humphrey, McCarthy and Daley.

"Considering the intelligence reports we already had, we found it easy to believe these threats. So did Mayor Daley and Police Superintendent Conlisk."

"I had a feeling about the hordes that were about to invade my hometown, the city where I was born and where I live with my wife and five children," writes Pierson.

"I didn't want any unchecked violence to revive old legends".

It is unclear from his article who made the decision that Pierson try to infiltrate the yippies. "For a few weeks, I let my hair grow so that if became ong in the prevailing style of the hippies. I also let my beard grow.

"I decided that I would rent a motorcycle and pose as a hippie member of a motorcycle gang, My disguise consisted of denim pants, a black T-shirt, a black vest, boots and a helmet.

"The last couple of days I was at home before going underground, I carefully avoided bathing."

Pierson's tales take on a James Bond flavor.

He rents a small apartment near Lincoln Park as a refuge.

He provokes the "pigs" to prove that "I was a genuine himbe and conserved."

refuge.

He provokes the "pigs" to prove that "I was a genuine hippie and an enemy of the police."

He arranges with his police contacts to leave notes in the men's room in Lincoln Park, selected because "many of the yippies didn't bother to use tollets, but disposed of their human waste out in the open."

(Pierson relates that on one occasion, he swalled a note because, "I was afraid Rubin had seen me with it.")

Pierson describes the atmosphere he found in Lincoln Park:

Park:
"The girls wore dresses with nothing under thme and to give photographers and the boys a thrill, they raised their dresses above their heads. The boys unzipped their pants and exposed themselves to passersby."

Pierson says he was offered LSD, but "I managed to empty them before I chewed the capsules themselves. I pretended to 'go on a trip' and I acted a little dazed and slaphappy...
"I saw yippie leaders stuffing narcotics into cookies to be fed to demonstrators when they confronted the police.

police.

"I didn't know ehat the drug was, but I was told that it would give the young people the kind of jolt that would make them ferocious when they fought the 'pigs.'"

Pierson describes his own activities:

"I joined in with the chants and taunts against the police and provoked them into hitting me with their clubs. They didn't know who I was, but they did know that I had called them names and struck them with one or more weapons."

Pierson's description of how he became my "bodyguard" is so fantastic I think he may have eaten those cookies after all!

"I met a man I knew only as Fred. He introduced me to
Abbie Hoffman and arranged for me to be Hoffman's bodyguard. I was making progress, but from all that I had
heard, the top man in the park was Jerry Rubin. I set out
to win him over without ever appearing to.

"That afternoon a fight broke out between some ripples and I broke it up, sending the combatants scattering in different directions.

"I knew that Jerry Rubin was nearby and that was my main reason for intervening. I demonstrated to him that I was not afraid and that I was tough.

"Within an hour, there was another fight -- also within Rubin's sight -- and before I could stop this fracas, I had to administer beatings to three different men.

"All this was witnessed by Jerry Rubin...he was so impressed that he conferred with Hoffman, who agreed to let me go so that I could become Rubin's personal bodyguard."

To call this story total invention would be an understatement. There were no such fights. Abbie only remembers Pierson asking him once for some LSD.

Pierson made very little impression on me when I methim. He was introduced to me quietly as "my friend Bob" by Sunny, a female biker who never appears in Pierson's article.

Pierson's entire story is a fantasy. He reports as truth what he expected and wanted to find. He reports as truth what his bosses need to hear.

He has a personal stake in it too. Undercover cops see themselves as heroes who risk their lives playing a dangerous game. They are deluded by their own self-glorification. The psychology of an undercover cop is to convert the most commonplace event into action-packed adventure and significance, distorting reality into a Grade B movie.

Pierson says that the vippies planted to the results of the process of the process

Pierson says that the yippies planned to have a girl killed and blame it on the police.

H writes that he heard me suggest that "one or two pigs be isolated, beaten and killed."

He says that during the week we added Everett Dirksen and George McGovern to "the list of those marked for assassination."

He told HUAC hearings that I constantly referred to "the teachings of Comrade Lenin."

Pierson's fantasies roll on: "Ninety percent of the time we were on the run because Rubin and others were afraid that what we said might be overheard... Dellinger and Davis took long walks together along the lakefront, where nobody could hear what they said."

Pierson tried to hang around me and my friends. He constantly suggested that we confront the cops. We paid

little attention to him, and he was nobody's "bodyguard."
Pierson even saw a direct conspiracy between the yippies and CSB-NBC-ABC-TV against the Chicagopolice. He wrote that TV networks told demonstrators in advance where the cameras would be stationed and advised the yippies to "use the foulest four-letter words" while provoking the cops "because the networks would not allow scenes with such words to be shown on the air.

"Then when police move in with their clubs, the demonstrators quit their obscene shouting," wrote Pierson. A trick on our part to help the networks present on TV only pictures of police beating demonstrators!

A concerned father of five, Pierson writes that "critics have accused the police of attacking what they call rehildren."

"If these were children, where were their parents! Why weren't they at home instead of in a far-off city with the avowed purpose of stirring up trouble?

"Some, maybe, were idealists, but when I am faced with young people who don't bathe day after day and week after week, I can't take their idealism seriously."

Pierson writes that his undercover adventures ended suddently Wednesday afternoon, August 28, in Grant Park when a member of the Blackstone Rangers recognizedhim. "If got out of there as fast as I could"

Purely coincidentally, six hours later that night I was kidnapped by three plainclothes cops of a downtown street of Chicago. After roughing me up and threatening me with death, the cops took me to a small room in the Intelligence Department of the Police Station.

About 20 cops gathered, to watch my reaction to their surprised,

I put them all on my joking, "Well, at least he was a good bodyguard."

Pierson could not return to his superiors empty-handed. If the yippies were so violent, and me their leader, surely Pierson could find some crime after three days of watching me.

Daley and Chicago cops needed a yippie devil to justify their brutulity. Their appetite for revenge is voracious. He finally signed an arrest warrant charging me with a sex offense, "

the Chicago Tribune's Authority on demonstrators. He was chief informant before HUAC during its hearings on Convention Week, and he was a major witness before the Federal Grand Jury.

These federal anti-riot indictments against Davis, Dellinger, Hayden, Hoffman, Peck and me are the product of a relationship between whores.

'Tricky Dick and Daley Pig are sleeping together. Daley Pig could not come unless Tricky Dick agreed, because it is the Justice Department which must prosecute. We must hand responsibility for these indictments around Tricky Dick's neck.

America is using her courts and jails in the war against her youth -- black and white. A national plot is underway to destroy the Black Panther Party through insane charges and skyrocketing bails.

The courts and jails are teeming with political prisoners -- black people, anti-war activists, longhairs, student demonstrators, bot smokers.

The motive behind the anti-riot charges is obvious: "preventive arrest."

Their goal is to tie up up in court, and to frighten organizers of future national demonstrations. They insult the youth by trying to quell our rebellion through the arrest of so-called "leaders."

Daley puts in all up fron in his report. He says:

"We are concerned about injured protesters, injured reputations, but most of all we are concerned about the lack of public awareness of the significance of the departing words of the Yippies and 'Mob' leaders,' we Won1' and 'The revolution has begun!

"Where will the infiltrators strike next?" asks Daley. We will strike next everywhere: from high schools to factories -- wherever the youth are rising up against the merchants of greed, blood and piggery.

Within a week after we are arrested I would not be surprised if thousands of people, from McCarthy students to yippies, begin conspiring to organize a return to Chicago -- to protest the indictments and Nixon-Daley's war against American youth.

Does Daley want "The Conspiracy" back?






I want to make it clear that I think any filmmaker entering festivals accepting the present repulsive situation, is, in the words of Jonas Mekas, a fink.

The most abhorrent example of exploitation of filmmakers is the Ann Arbor Tour, which functions as a distributor in direct competition with filmmakers' sources of income. The unified Filmmaker's Festival Contract, drafted by Emort Menefee and myself, and approved by the Board of Directors of Canyon Cinema, should be used as the model contract for all festivals. Filmmakers who would like copies of this contract should write to Canyon Cinema, 756 Union Street, San Francisco.

At present filmmakers are at the mercy of the festival's unreasonable conditions. Now we plan to turn the tables. Among other things, the contract calls for rental fees to be paid for films screened, elimination of entry fees, tight deadlines for return of prints and publishing of festival information, and a call for entries that must include the names of the judges. The contract is not all that it ought to be, but it could go a long way toward correcting the present exploitation of film artists.

Now I want to congratulate the Telegraph Repetory Cinema for its outstanding series of films. Of particular interest is the Cinevolution series, which has uncompromisingly picked some of the finest work being done in head flicks.

I can't really agree with all of the selections, but Tom Luddy has been picking films that are bound to displease the mass taste, or most of the people likely to come to the theater. He has shown such

disturbing films as Wavelength and FUSES, and I want to encour-age him to keep on sticking out his neck.

The Buster Keaton revival, if that's what you want to call it, has shown that Keaton is a great filmmaker. I can't say that about Chaplin, lhave an aversion to Chaplin, who I think is a terrible filmmaker, blind to cinematic possibilities. I don't like his trip.

But Keaton is something else, and would be worthy of more detailed analysis. He understands his medium far better than Chaplin, and while Chaplin is a second rater from the word go, Keaton is what I can truthfully call a film poet.



draws its strength. Both films (MECHANIQUE and ELEMENTS) are strongly related by their overt symbolic content, and their strong black and white cinematography. I met Raymond Rohauer, the man responsible for rescuing Buster Keaton's films, last Saturday. A reception was held for him in the Student Union at the University of California; and, later in the evening, I heard the strange story of his association with Keaton.

The Career of Joseph Francis

his association with Keaton.

The career of Joseph Francis Keaton began in 1899, when he was three years old and a regular performer in his family's vaudeville act. He was nicknamed Buster by Harry Houdini. In 1917, he began performing in films with Fatty Arbuckle. By 1929, Keaton had demonstrated his creative genius as writer, director, performer, and editor in his brilliantly comic masterpieces.

After the advent of the "talkies" ended his career, he occasionally

After the advent of the "talkies" ended his career, he occasionally performed small roles, directed, worked as Red Skelton's gag man, and toured with European circuses. In Hollywood, Art is a commodity, genius a cash asset, a great or poor film a product, valued at its current ability to produce box office receipts.

The work of Buster Keaton, on highly inflammable nitrate film, susceptible to chemical decomposition or disintegration, was stored in vaults as a possession, but ignored as commercially worthless.

In Raymand Rohauer's words:
I was running the Society of
Cinema Arts in Los Angeles in
1954. Buster Keaton and his wife
came in and asked to see me.
I thought it was a joke, but there
he was.

"He said, 'I understand that you save a lot of silent films. I

have a lot of silent films in my

have a lot of silent films in my garage. If you want them you can have them, otherwise FII throw them out.'

I met him the next day at his Mother's house. He took me to the garage and showed me some cans of film containing THREE AGES, OUR HOSPITALITY, and SHERLOCK, JR.

I told him, 'FII take them, but not today.' Two days later I

not today.' Two days later I called and said, 'I will finance transfer from nitrate to safety stock.' We agreed on a 50-50 split. We drove to the laboratory split. We drove to the laboratory and began restoration of THREE

yand began restoration of THREE AGES first.

We then learned that Preston Sturges had accidentally discovered prints of Keaton's films in James Mason's house -- the house Keaton had owned in the twenties. I told Keaton, 'You must go over and get the film because its your property.'

Keaton drove over. A man answered the door. Keaton thought it was the butler. Later we found out it was Mason's business manager. Keaton told him he'd learned of the discovery of the films and would like to have them. He was turned away.

I told him 'You have to go back.'
A few days later he borrowed two

of them. We examined them and
found that they were original films
that he had made thirty years
earlier.

James Mason then donated them
to the Academy of Motion Picture
Arts and Sciences, and we were
finally able to get them back from

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

He said that beating prisoners was common at Dachau. "It was part of my on-the-job training ... the sergeant supervisors showed me how," he said.

Except that the sergeant was Wesley A. Williams of the US Army and the prisoner beatings in question took place last August.

The US Army, in its wisdom, has located a military stockade on the site of the Dachau concentration camp near Munich in Germany. It was in this stockade that Williams "followed orders."

Williams and two other guards were court-martialed for giving newly-arrived prisoners beatings as a "military deterrent" to ensure their good conduct. The defense was that the orders were "lawful."

The Rolling Stones seem simply to already have done it in the road. They are so together it is dazzling, BEGGAR'S BANQUET is tight, solid and constant, and perhaps the finest rock album ever. Thoroughly "professional" in the highest sense of the word.

And the Grateful Dead - god, what an incredible creation they be

And the Grateful Dead - god, what an incredible creation they've given us. ANTHEM TO THE SUN contains the mythical context for revival. It's a common theme, death and rebirth, but rarely is the theme wrought so carefully and profoundly that one can take it within oneself and make it serve in the real, everyday world.

I was reassured of the importance of ANTHEM after hearing

This was only the beginning. The film had to be restored, transferred to safety film, and the size changed to fit modern camera apertures; in one case, SEVEN CHANCES, this involved color.
Eleven years were spent in clearing copyrights and legal battles. This occasionally involved separate copyrights of film adaptation, play, and novel. Rohauer threatened to sue one film company for waste, if they did not allow the films to be released from the vaults.

In 1959, Keaton and Rohauer went to Europe in search of missing

in 1999, Keaton and Ronauer went to Europe in search of missing films, and gathered them from London, Paris, Czechoslovakia, and Moscow. Finally they had completed their search. Eleven features, eighteen shorts, ten of the ffiteen Arbuckle comedies were

teatures, eigneen snorts, ten of the fifteen Arbuckle comedies were recovered.

It was finally possible in 1962 to begin showing Keaton's work again. THE GENERAL was presented in Germany. Rohauer acquired a 100 year old train. Keaton, in costume, would drive the train into the town showing his film. In 1962, the French Cinematheque organized a retrospective season of his work.

In 1965, while Keaton was working in Rome, he was honored by the Venice Film Festival. As he entered the theater, he was greeted by a standing ovation from 3,000 members of the European press.

3,000 members of the European press.

As he left the festival, he was seized by an attack of coughing and began to turn blue. Rohauer urged Keaton's wife to take him to a doctor. The diagnosis was terminal cancer, three months to live. The news was kept from him. Rohauer arranged the London retrospective for the National Film Theater. On February 1, 1966 Joseph Francis Keaton died.

In December, 1968, THE GENERAL opened in Paris. By this time, there have been 68,000 paid admissions. It is still playing in two theaters in Paris. The BBC is currently preparing a series

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featuring the Keaton shorts.

In this country, the first retrospective showing of Keaton's work has been playing at the Telegraph Avenue Repertory Cinema. With the exception of my article of January 31, a few brief mentions in the San Francisco papers, and good coverage by Claire Clouzot on KPFA, there has been almost no press coverage of the only comprehensive screening of the genius of Buster Keaton in years.

Raymond Rohauer is currently at work on a compilation film

and a book on Buster Keaton, and is now patiently continuing his efforts to unlock the Hollywood vaults, and rescue and restore the work of Harry Langdon, D.W. Griffith, Douglas Fairbanks, and Max Sennett.

Sennett.

Keaton's genius and craftsmanship produced some of the finest work in the history of film. Although a shy man who did not recognize his own genius, Keaton finally received critical recognition before his death.

Because of Rohauer's efforts on Keaton's behalf, his films will not decay in forgotten vaults.

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
