

Artists at Ohio University in Athens turn on with the latest high: gentle electrical stimulation of the brain. Professors J. E. L. Eldridge of John O'Connor have been stoning their art students, who report effects "like LSD."

who report effects "like LSD."

Basically the procedure is to run
a very mild direct current, about
1-1/2 milliamperes, between 2
electrodes attached to the skin of
the head. The negative pole should
be at the forehead, and the positive
pole at the back of the head.
The necessary current, 1 or 2
milliamps, can be produced by one
or two small dry cells (like flashlight batteries) attached to the
head with copper wires or with

head with copper wires or with contacts made of dimes. Several hours of stimulation are necessary to produce a distinct change of awareness.

Since Russian scientists found in Since Russian scientists found in 1953 that sleep could be induced by gentle electrical stimulation of the brain, there has been considerable interest by non - establishment American scientists and physicians. Now the U.S. military has announced it is doing research in brainstimulation to reduce the need for sleep.

in brainstimulation to reduce the need for sleep.

Soviet practitioners, in some 300 clinics, use "electrosone" treatment to cure such psychosomatic and emotional ills as high blood pressure, ulcers, anxiety, stuttering and bedwetting.

The entire body, but especially the brain, maintains a steady direct current charge, with the front of the body negative in relation to the back, and the feet negative compared to the head. In plants, this kind of charge corresponds to development of form andto growth.

development of form and to growth.

In the animal or human body, the In the animal or humanbody, the charge increases during mental activity or dreams, and decreases with sleep or inactivity. In conditioning experiments with animals, learning was maximized by adding a weak stimulating current to the normal brain charge. At Blake College in 1966 experiments showed similar effects occur in humans. In 1967 Dr. Saul Aronow, engineer at Mas-

Saul Aronow, engineer at Mas-sachusetts General Hospital, re-ported a large scale experiment in which depressed patients be-came happy and aware with nega-tive electrodes on their foreheads. When the polarity was reversed,

When the polarity was reversed, manic patients were calmed.

When a slice of brain tissue is stimulated electrically, there is a great increase in the serotonin content of the nerves. This is probably one of the processes involved in stimulation of the head with weak electric currents. LSD is known to cause a similar increase in serotonin in the nerves. There is also probably changes There is also probably changes in the amount of dissolved electrolytes in the brain fluid.

Elevated levels of brain amines

are associated with higher awareare associated with higher aware-ness and intelligence, but more efficient sleep seems to be another effect. Some people find that elec-trical stimulation reduces the amount of sleep they need, just as do some of the chemicals which energize the mind.

A related subject currently being studied by Raymond Peat at Blake is whether such stimulation might have beneficial evolutionary effects, since the electrical fields of plants are closely their genetic constitution related to

Abbie kept telling the pigs he had to get upstairs for a trial—but they busted him on five counts, including felonious assault on an officer. Bail was "\$2500 no cash alternative," meaning you can't put 10% down. Friends had to put up \$800 with a bondsman.

Meanwhile, the judge in Abbie's trial issued a bench warrant for him because he hadn't gotten back to his courtroom in time. Abbie was being arraigned with 22 others on charges growing out of the Columbia University rebellion last spring. Charges against the others were dropped — but not against Abbie.

Paul Krassner told BARB Wednesday that an NYC police captain told Abbie it must have been the FBI that planted the guns in Abbie's office prior to his bust on that charge three weeks ago. Abbie asked the captain if he's say that in court. Guess what the captain said.

Paul also reported that the FBI offered a chick money to spy on Abbie. The chick's husband had earlier been busted in New Jersey on possession of explosives-







The Sultan was born in 1922 in
the bayous of Louisiana, the son
of a carpenter's wife, Karella
Shabazz. In the damp moors outside New Orleans, Dohomean and
Ashanti voodoo societies had thrived in the black underground for
over a continy, making the ground. over a century, making the ground fertile for the growth of the, uh, "outer directed" secret societies which arose during Reconstruc-tion:

Ouende, ouende, macaya!
Mo mange le pork, macaya!
Ouende, ouende, macaya!

These cabildos, African in origin, kept alive the spark of freedom, gave Afro-Americans some control over their ownturf through occult rites and contraband guns (The Man feared both), and were the forefathers of contemporary Nationalist movements.

The Sultan's grandparents were followers of Marcus Garvey. By the time he was eighteen, Shabazz was organizing street gangs in the up-town ghettos of New-Orleans.

Orleans.

"After sundown, no white man would dare show himself in the black side of New Orleans. Much less a cop. And that's what we're pushing for today in black communities across the country—self defense committees, black policemen, black jails, and black executioners."

During the second world war, Shabazz fought in Europe and Africa:

will had my eyes blown open when I got to Africa. In America they indoctrinate you to believe that everybody in that socalled wild continent is a savage. Well, brother, I discovered that Africans are more intelligent than a lot of people in this country. I was recognized as a long-lost brother by the African. This they knew, but I didn't realize it."

The Sultan put two and two together, and it added up to exploi-

The Sultan put two and two together, and it added up to exploitation in every language. "Looking at the oppression they suffered under, and reflecting on our conditions here in the U.S. verified that our condition was the same in Algeria as in Louisiana, and the cause of that condition was the very system I was defending. The mock justice, the lynchings, the economic tyranny expressed the idea that I and all black people need liberation, for no one person can rise above the condition of his nation."

In 1962 the African Descendants General Assembly convened in Philadelphia and signed, on parchment, a Declaration of Independence. The Provisional Government was established, Al Sultan Nassar Ahmed Shabazz was elected Prime Minister by the Politburo, the United States was sued for five hundred trillion dollars reparation, and the political arm of the government began its

lars reparation, and the political arm of the government began its

"The Revolution will be organized in the Northern cities" predicts Shabazz, "but it will be fought with bullets and blood in the countryside of the South." Shabazz today works out of his Fillmore headquarters, the Black Presidio, his office cluttered with posters from the Red Guard, read-

posters from the Red Guard, readand-reread paperbacks by Ho and Che, black helmets and a wallsize strategic map of enemy-oc-

size strategic map of enemy-occupied territory: the U.S. of A.
The Sultan speaks slowly and
precisely, with the quiet fire of a
man who, when the time comes to
pull the death trigger, will pull it
together: "Since there must be a
revolution there must be a revo together: "Since there must be a revolution, there must be a revolutionary party. Without a party built on Revolutionary Black Nationalism, it will be impossible to lead the black masses of people to self-determination and independence. "From the time I was fifteen, I believed there would be a confrontation between black and white in this country. The next step is guerilla warfare in the states, and this will take place because colonial powers refuse to release the colonized black peoples."

JUSTICE QUICKLY BURIE

The file on another government execution was formally closed last week.

Closed last week.

A coroner's jury decided in 70 minutes that the slaying of unarmed, unmoving 19-year-old Joe Linthcome March 30 by Gerald Roberts -- from point blank range before Joe's pleading sister -- was "justifiable homicide."

"I consider this to be a complete and absolute cover-up," John Brennan, the Linthcome family's attorney, told BARB.

"The entire handling of the case was a sham, a total sham" he added. "Now they have an excuse to close the matter completely. I am trying to emphasize that we cannot let the matter resthere." Brennan, who is a good friend of the Linthcomes, said he was ready to stake his whole career on the matter.

career on the matter.

The coroner's "jury" echoed the sentiment of Captain Edward Cummings, who headed the police investigation of the state-sanctioned killing. Cummings con-

even complete that Roberts was just "doing his duty." Gerald Rob-erts, you see, is a pig -- or in the parlance of polite society, a

the parlance of polite society, a policeman.

A "coroner's inquest" was held to determine the cause of death, how the death occurred, and whether formal charges should be made.

made.
The only actual investigation into the death of Joe Linthcome was conducted by the police department itself. (The day after the murder,

take the bullet out of the wall.)
The District Attorney, acting
only on information provided by the
police department, decided not to
bring Roberts to an open trial (or
even to refer the matter to the
Grand Jury), but to refer the subject instead to the coroner for
a quick burial. At the "inquest,"
the coroner asked questions based
on information obtained from the
police department.
In an inquest reminiscent of Kaf-

In an inquest reminiscent of Kafin an inquest remniscent of kar-kar's surrealist novel, "The Trial," attorney Brennan was not even allowed to question or cross-examine any of the witnesses! Nor was he allowed to challenge the

was he allowed to challenge the qualifications or prejudices of any of the jurors, as is usually customary in civic trials.

San Francisco Coroner Henry Turkel (a doctor by the way, not a lawyer) selected a jury of eleven from 300 candidates. The list of 300 contained the name — as well as the address and occupation — of each person.

Turkel said he just chose the name at random, but Brennan

names at random, but Brennan believes otherwise. "Keep in mind," he reminded the BARB, "that you can pretty well determine a person's ethnic background from this information. There was only one black person on the jury - and that was only because I had mde an issue of this point with Turkel ahead of time."

Up to quite recently, such "juries" were chosen even more casually. The coroner simply called a major business, such as P.G.&E, and asked them to provide jurors from the office staff. (A bill that

from the office staff. (A bill that would reform the coroner's inquest system is currently being backed by Assemblyman Sieroty (D) Beverly Hills.)

"These hearing are supposed to be impartial," said Brennan, "but Turkel blatantly directed the verdict. It was a fraud. I had to voice my protest against this sham trial, even though not formally allowed to do so."

After the majority verdict was reached, Brennan asked for a poll of the jury — and was refused by Turkel.

of the jury -- and was refused by Turkel, As the Chronicle noted, Turkel "interpreted" for the jury state-ments made by witnesses in a man-ner favorable to Roberts, Robert's only defense was that he thought the youth had a gun, Witnesses— including Joe's sister—had told BARB that there was about a half minute pause before Roberts shot unarmed Linthcome through


the heart.

As the D.A. refuses to press charges, there is little further Brennan, as the family's attorney can do. "We can only hope that the Civil Rights Bureau of the

the Civil Rights Bureau of the Department of Justice presses the matter further," he said.

He then observed, with some apparent hesitation, that the FBI had been looking into the matter. (He did praise the intensive efforts of the agent following the case, a g-man by the name of Fin.)

The 36-year-old Brennan knows the family well. Joe's mother and aunt had worked for Brennan for several years, caring for his wife and home while his wife was laid in a body cast. Joe, Brenn see p. 6

HOUSE NIGGERS GETTIN' UPPITY

At Stanford last Tuesday night the revolution held candles, passed cake, and jumped to its ecstatic feet when Bobby Seale called for socialism.

About 500 students sat outside

About 500 students sat outside the electronic CIA building that is the center of protest for the purpose of having a new culture wedding and watching a Newsreel flick cut out of the Columbia Uni-

wedding and watching a Newsreel flick cut out of the Columbia University uprising. Around nine o'clock Bobby Seale, David Hilliard, John Seale, Rosemary, Tom Hayden and the BARB showed up with tidings of struggle and joy. Tom spoke first, rapping about the son of the editor of the Reader's Digest who stabbed his old man because the Babbitt was going to give a speech attacking the world's youth. Hayden's face savored the attempt at patricide as he spoke and the sit-inners seemed to approve of the goal if not the method.

When Tom introduced Bobby the sit-in came to its feet applauding and with fists raised, Before he spoke somebody told Bobby that a lot of the people are pacifists and he replied, "So?"

The Seale rap was generational rebellion raised to the level of socialism, "Kick your old man's ass if he relates to genocide,"

Seale exclaimed. Bobby attacked the pseudo-cultural nationalism of the black cop out. He proclaimed the Panthers would fight racism with solidarity and black capitalism with socialism.

At the call for socialism one young white sister of the rich began quivering, and then for the first time in her life and probably as some mysterious reflex of humanity shouted, "right on" and now will never be the same. Bobby finished with the same (only louder and more tightly clenched) standing ovation and raised salute.

The Newsreel flick on Columbia was a totally living experience. The Stanford rebellion checked out Columbia and made comparisons. Things are milder at Stanford but the analogies are clear. The screen's image of past pig violence waved the flag of Stanford's future.

Driving back with Panthers, we

Driving back with Panthers, we all wondered aloud about the ironic death of capitalism. Here was Stanford, the privileged child of the rich, in open rebellion against all the prisons its father built. "What a fucked system Capitalism is" we opined. It can't even keep its house niggers happy."

As Marsha Turner told BARB, "Mao says to serve the people heart and soul and that's exactly what the Black Panther Party is all about."

fense.
She told BARB and other reporters how the New York police beat, and tortured Mrs. Curtis Powell, wife of one of the "New

York Panther 21" who were arrested in early April.

Mrs. Powell was eight months pregnant at the time, and after an ordeal with the NYPD, which included their hanging her out a window by her heeels to pry Party info out of her, she miscarried.

Kathleen, who is expecting in July, exposed other incidents where the pigs practiced their program of genocide of revolutionaries.

Joan Bird, who was also busted

Joan Bird, who was also busted in the New York conspiracy ar-

rests, was another example of what the Panthers termed as "only part of the long history of atroclous and genocidal activities by the pig power structure against the most revolutionary segments of the oppressed peoples."

Bobby Seale, as Minister of Defense for the Party, called on the communities of all the oppressed peoples to "help put an end-to, the insane killings of our bables and to the beating and brutality inflicted upon the future mothers of our revolutionaries." Maining of

NO CAUSE FOR JOY'

Six weary students and their friends sat on the cold marble floor of the fourth story of San Francisco City Hall Monday night waiting for a jury.

The jury had begun deliberating at 9:30 that morning but the six had been waiting for five months. They had been arrested on Bloody Thursday along with 480 others at a rally at SF State and charged with disturbing the peace, falling to disperse illegal assembly, all misdemeanors.

While they had waited the court

perse illegal assembly, all misdemeanors.

While they had waited the court went to great pains to punish them before they went to trial. The Judge, Carl Allen, ran his court like Joe Stalin's purge courts -- after we convict you, we'll give you a fair trial. Only he bettered ole Joe -- he punished them before he convicted them before the trial.

It wasn't enough for him that the pigs had beaten, fire-hosed, and starved the defendants while they starved the defendants while they were thinking up charges for them. It wasn't enough for Judge Allen that the defendants had been illegally arrested, held without phone calls, had their rights laughed at while the pigs tormented them in jail.

them in jail.

The six defendants waiting in the hall Monday night showed the scars of how effective Judge Allen's pre-trial punishment had been. Some didn't even care what they said. Because the judge had ruled that all defendants must be present in the court every day of the four and a half week trial their lives had come to a screaming halt. They had lost their jobs, they couldn't go to class so they flunked out of school. One girl had lost her family. Their lives shattered already, they just wanted the nightmare to end.

If this had been a non-political misdeamenor case or the felony case of a white cop charged with murdering an unarmed black boy in a record store, the charges would have been dropped. dropped.

The defendants didn't know if they should scream or cry. Some cried and cursed the rotten system of political oppression called American Justice with cold bitter fury. One girl saidthrough clenched teeth she would have preferred a conviction, Now the whole nightmare would start again. The Man had punished them for putting up a defense. up a defense.

The comedy routine will begin again in June. For two months the defendants James Queen, Rosemary Romero, Linda Schuman, Charles Seeman, Megumi Shimizu and Heidi Smith will be in limbo, not able to move or rebuild the lives that Judge Allen and District Attorney Guralnick helped ruin. Once again they have to try to stay alive while they sit in a courtroom and watch how American Justice makes fools of them.

Spokesmen for the Legal Defense Committee which is trying to keep some sort of defense in court for them and all the others being tried or awaiting trial said that they have never seen a trial so obviously loaded against the defendants. Diane Feely, also ar-

rested on Bloody Thursday, told BARB that the judge and D.A. seemed to work in unision. "Many times police were caught lying and contradicting themselves

on the stand, but the chance of a perjury charge are nil." she continued, "its common knowledge that the D.A. has been given an almost unlimited slush fund to investigate the case, while the public defender has not received one extra cent to defend over 400 people."

Diane said that the D.A. had used the slush fund to investigate, not only every defense witness, but also every member of the jury!

The public defender was virtually the only full-time attorney for the SF defendants. Judge Allen ruled that all attorneys for all defendants had to be present every day. This is not only never done, but makes it impossible for the defendants to pay for adquate defense. fense.



OUT TO THRASH BRASS

"Our defense will open up the

"Our defense will open up the largest scandal in military history," Terence (Kayo) Hallinan declared Wednesday, as he started his main offensive against the Sixth Army at Fort Ord.

He adjudged the prosecution's just concluded seven day case against his 14 Presidio Gl's "very weak and shakey."

"They didn't want their men cross-examined," he said of the military's short presentation. "They want to get through as fast as possible." He promised his defense presentation would take about a month. about a month.

about a month.

Hallinan told BARB defense testimony will document the shocking overcrowded, illegal, and brutal conditions that existed in the Presidio brig at the time of the October 14 sit-in. Inmates, former prisoners, ex-guards, and present guards will come forth to tell what went on inside the Presidio stockade. "We'll show coverup by commissioned officers on the highcommissioned officers on the high levels of the Sixth Army,"

commissioned officers on the highest levels of the Sixth Army,"
Hallinan said.
Pvt. William Hayes, who received two years for his part in the
sti-in, testified Wednesday about a
conversation he had with Richard
Bunch the day before the young
Gl was shot.
Bunch asked him how best to
commit suicide, Hayes told the
court. He replied that running from
a shotgun work detail was a sure
bet. That's exactly what Bunch did
the next day, and was shot dead.
After Hayes several eyewitnesses to the actual shooting will
take the stand. They'll be followed
by Mrs. Ginger Bunch, mother of
the slain soldier. She will testify
about her son's unbalanced mental
condition the last time she saw him
when he came home AWOL to
Davion. Ohio. when he came home AWOL to Dayton, Ohio.

Dayton, Ohio.

Several former guards have volunteered to testify, Hallinan said.

Specialist 4th Class Lee Castongray wrote Kayo from Thailand where he is now stationed, He'll be flown to the Fort Ord trial to tell what he saw at the Presidio stockade.

All the defendants, plus about a dozen psychiatrists will also be called to the stand.

"Ouring the prosecution testimony we could only get in hints about the suicidal conditions inside the brig in October," Kayo told BARB. "But now we'll expose exactly what a hell-hole the brig was."

Hallinan feels two of the main prosecution witnesses, Sgt Thomas Woodring, and Captain Robert La-

GUARD BLOWS LARSEN'S COVER

"What the straight press saw last week has no resemblance to normal conditions," a Presidio guard told BARB. The MP gave this paper an inside view of what's been going on in the Army's "suicide pen." He, of course, wanted to remain anonymous.

Last week the Army opened up the Presidio brig and gave a guided press tour of what one of its colonel's called "a sort of Hilton West."

Even the Army admitted that for the past five weeks inmates have

the past five weeks inmates have been sprucing up the brig -- waxing floors, cleaning toilets, in preparing for a visit from the media. "I hope nobody is placated with what they saw or read in the news," the Presidio guard said. Then he went on to describe how the brass had hookwinked the straight press. The small torturous segregation

The small torturous segregation cells, where suicides have been

attempted, weren't shown on the TV news, he said. Only the big seg cell, which is never used was filmed for the home audi-

Grouped together, MPs watched the evening news, the guard said. "We laughed when they said mat-

"We laughed when they said matresses are bought into the segcells at night," he told BARB.
"Nothing like that happens."

Tee Vee reported there had never been a food shortage in the stockade. This brought forth derisive laughter from the guards around the set.
"I cannot really think of anything they said that was true," the guard said.

According to the straight press, Senator Cranston will come to the

Senator Cranston will come to the

Senator Cranston will come to the stockade sometime at the end of April. BARB's undercover informant hopes he will drop in unexpectedly to check out the scene. General Stanley Larsen, the top man in the Presidio, is expected to inspect the brig before letting Cranston in. This will be a first for Larsen. According to our man, Larsen has never been inside the infamous stockade. infamous stockade.

Before last Friday's press matinee the brass warned prisoners not to talk to anyone, but one "straw-haired" inmate reportedly flashed a peace sign at the press. "This made Sgt. Woodring furious," according to our under-

"This made Sgt. Woodring furious," according to our undercover man. He described how the head MP at the stockade sought out every blond prisoner to find out who was responsible. Every prisoner questioned confessed to being guilty.

"The sarge was fuming and red all over, but he didn't hit anyone," the guard recalled. MP's were warned recently not to beat inmates for fear the news would reach the straight media.

Normally Woodring, who is an ex-cop from LA, is rated the most sadistic and brutal by the prisoners, but since the "mutiny" trials started he's been told "to

FORT ORD (IWB) -- The East Garrison Gate to Fort Ord on Reservation Road is cold and windy even in the bright sunlight, During the trials for 14 of the Presidio of San Francisco soldiers accused of mutiny a section of the gate area is barricaded for "public safety" and is surrounded by two

safety" and is surrounded by two or three highway patrol cars and by two or three MP motorcycles with their helmetted drivers.

Usually a black van is parked nearby which seems to serve as a transport for the rotating guards who maintain watch on the general area surrounding the approach to area surrounding the approach to

area surrounding the approach to the court room.

After calling ahead to see if seating is available in the court room, a white-gloved MP, coldly courteous, waves you on. When one member of the press complained because he was held up at the East Garrison gate, which on that day was designated for spectators only, one MP growled, "Boy, some of them come just asking for trouble."

Spectators feel they are entering

Spectators feel they are entering the enemy's armed camp, even though passing soldiers frequently wave a V sign to the very unmilitary visitors. Spectators walk up to the courtroom part of the white-ribboned saw-horse barricade.

The courtroom is white white white. Two rows of light globes march down the ceiling. Half of the spectator area is reserved for the press. The other half seats 30 to 40 persons. Relatives and fiancees are seated first. There have been no more than 10 or 15

The court-martial board has five members. Lt. Col. Richard Potter, president, arrived Monday morning with a very bright red face which made spectators concerned that he may have a painful subjurg from a weekend cutting

cerned that he may have a painful sunburn from a wekend outing under his uniform.

The other four members of the board contain two black members, one a Major with a background in psychological warfare, the other a Sergeant. The two other members are white, one a Sergeant-Major, the other a Sergeant, Major John Novinger is the prosecutor and Terence Hallinan is handling the defense for the 14 Presidio Gls on trial down here.

Monday's witness for the pro-secution, Captain Robert Lamont, a slight young man with a girlish voice, seemed an unlikely choice for his job as of 14 October 1968, for his job as of 14 October 1968, that of correctional officer at the Presidio of San Francisco stockade, Since that time he has been demoted to deputy commander of the stockade, though he says the reason is that because of the mutiny trials he is not able to be in attendance full time at the stockade and that it is necessary to train a new commander because his established time of separation from the Army is 31 July 1969. Hallinan recalled that in earlier testimony in another of the mutiny trials Capt. Lamont said he is interested in going to work for the FBI after his separation from the Army.

the FBI after his separation from the Army.

Lamont testified that when the 14 Presidio GIs on trial here left the 7:30 AM formation on October 14, they sat over on the grass singing "We Shall Over-come" and chanting "We want Hallinan" and "We want Glass,"

and that he then called for additional help, a photographer, and a fire truck.

Mutiny seemed to be on every-

a fire truck.

Mutiny seemed to be on everyone's mind. An earlier witness, Sgt. Thomas Woodring, provost sergeant at the stockade, testified that he had warned the young men as they were walking away that they were "committing mutiny."

According to Hallinan's opening argument Woodring had at one time been fired from the Los Angeles police department for brutality. Woodring also testified that he saw no fire truck, and that the young men were singing "This Land is Your Land or This Land is My Land."

When Lamont went to see if the provost marshall had arrived he said he happened to pick up a copy of the Uniform Code Manual for Courts Martial. Lamont revealed that he had discussed using the mutiny article with Col. Ford, his direct superior and commanding officer, two or three times previously including one occasion on October 11, the very day Pvt. Richard Bunch was killed by a guard while on a shotgun work detail.

Lamont and Woodring both tes-

Lamont and Woodring both tes-tified they had been warned something was going to happen, but both cited frequent rumors circulated within the stockade and most times

nothing takes place.
Hallinan asked Lamont what made him think that what had made him think that what had happened was mutiny, "I don't know," saidLamont, but he allowed that his recent discussion with Col. Ford on October 11 about the prac-tice of reading mutiny charges to

tice of reading mutiny charges to the prisoners to make them aware of the seriousness of their behavior acts as a deterrent to trouble. He said his discussion with Col. Ford was fresh in his mind but was—not a fixed idea. "My intentions were to use the mutiny articles as a shock effect" said Lamont. He said 40 or 50 MPs in fatigue uniforms with night sticks assembled in a line formation with two or three ranks facing into the stockade. The photographer arrived and began taking pictures all around the circle of young men to identify the prisoners.

Lamont entered the circle to begin reading the articles when one of the prisoners, Pvt. Pawlowski, stood up and said, "Capt. Lamont, here are a list of grievances to read to you." Lamont heard him read the first three items: the elimination of shotgun detail, psychological evaluation to be given to stockade guards, and improved sanitation facilities.

Lamont said the group was quiet while Pawlowski read, but "when I started reading again, they Lamont entered the circle to

while Pawlowski read, but "when I started reading again, they started re-chanting." Pawlowski kept on reading. Lamont stopped at first because, "Well, I was surprised when one of the prisoners stood up and started reading to me."

When Lamont tried to read, the group chanted louder. Lamont walked up to an MP sedan nearby to use the PA system. H read the mutiny article, then gave a direct order to get up from where they were seated and get back into Building 1213. The prisoners chanted "We want our attorneys," Lamont testified.

Two - man "apprehension teams" then proceeded to pick

Two - man "apprehension teams" then proceeded to pick up each prisoner and take him into the building to a cellblock. Lamont testified that while the MPs were carrying them in, the prisoners whispered to each other, "Don't resist."



DISCOURTESY COULD COST KILLER COP HIS CAREER

It looks like the San Francisco power structure is getting ready to throw one of its periodic crumbs to the blacks.

Despite the fact that O'Brien and Willis Garriott, aided by the bravura racism of Jake Erlich, tried their best to lie their way out of it, the Commissioners are confronted with testimony from seven other people who contradicted them. dicted them.

Even Erlich seemed to concede at the end of the hearing that he would lose to the Commission. "I'm sure I'll win," Jake told the Tee-Vee. "If not here, mission. "Im sure II will, Jake told the Tee-Vee, "If not here, in the courts." Of course, Jake has a better chance in the courts. He probably helped to put half the judges into their jobs, and he's tight with all the people who control the judges.

"Sympathizers can also help by phoning 982-6221 and protest to States Lines executives," he added. Mid-morning is the best time to reach most company brass."

Whittington is a 21-year-old fellow with soft curly blond hair who with Laurence is Co-Chairman of the group of activist homosexuals forming the C-H-F. He's so determined to bring pride and dignity to homosexuality that he even wears his Gay-Is-Good button on job interviews as he searches for work.

Homosexuals are not a hostile bunch, yet, I feel our sexual revolution is helping everyone by removing guilt, concealment, e moving guilt, concealment, outlierlives, and hypocrisy from our lives.

'Even the cops will benefit,' is Laurence. "Sacred homoadds Laurence. "Sacred homo-sexuals are often victims of blacksexuals are often victims of Diack-mail, beatings, and other crimes, especially when looking for a trick in the bushes somewhere, or in a public john. If homosexuals could be free to do their thing like heterosexuals, crime connected heterosexuals, crime connected with homosexuality would drop sharply."

both were male.

Ronald Hummer, 23, the groom, was stripped to the waist and wore only white levies for the Hawajian ceremony. His bride was Chuck Mardin, 33, who wore a drag outfit of white satin and carried carnation wedding pleces.

Although the ceremony took place in a flower bedecked, but very crowded bar, everybody became serious for the wedding ceremony. You could hear a pin drop when the vows were exchanged.

"It's the life they choose, and I think it's wonderful," said the stepmother of the groom to BARB's reporter. "Of course, it would be better if the churches let these gay kids get married in the church, but I don't think that's far off," she said.

BARB has learned that several ministers do perform such solemn gay weddings, at certain Methodist, Episcopalian, and Lutheran churches.

SEEKS TO STOP TIMBER RIP-OFF

Eighteen hundred acres of splendid wilderness on the Bolinas Ridge in Marin County are being ripped off by an absentee landlord in combo with an out-of-state logger.

The rip-off will create slide hazards, kill fish through stream hazards, kill fish through stream pollution, increase siltation of To-males Bay and Bolinas Lagoon 500-1000% and interrupt a trail system and wilderness area stretching ten to fifteen miles from Mt. Tamalpais northward to Olema.

stretching ten to littleen littles from Mt. Tamalpais northward to Olema.

Ethel Righetti of Castro Valley last autumn sold logging rights on her Bolinas Ridge ranch to Walker Lumber Co. of Goose Bay, Oregon. Walker paid \$450,000 for the rights and will gross \$1,500,000. That's a profit of about 200% — depending on his labor and destruction costs.

The timber is fourth-rate by U.S. standards and at least half is being sold to a firm in Japan which quite possibly will convert it to fiberboard and sell it to the U.S. regime for construction of barracks in Vietnam.

Despite all this, Marin County conservationists were capable of only mild, polite opposition to the project at a county board of supervisors meeting Tuesday. Many of them incredibly felt victorious when the board voted fo a 90-day ban against OTHER logging operations in the area. Almost all of them obediently accepted the notion that nothing could be done about the looting of the Righetti woods since it had already begun.

The conservationists accepted

hetti woods since it had already begun.

The conservationists accepted the Yankee capitalist property-rights fetish almost as blindly as the politicians. Nobody pointed out that spaceship-earth now is ocrowded that those rights are impossible -- and that nominal ownership of large tracts of land really has to mean stewardship.

really has to mean stewardship or custodianship. Nobody pointed out that despite the technical legality of the con-tract between Righetti and Walker, tract between Righetti and Walker, the parties in fact are conspiring against large number of sentient beings struggling for life on an increasingly fragile planet.
Harold Gregg, head of the Marin Conservation League, is trying to raise \$35,000 to pay Walker to

spare a thin ribbon of trees on the top of the ridge. This plays

the top of the ridge. This plays directly into the hands of the plunderers. The trees would merely hide evidence of the rape from any future motorists using an 8-mile parkway proposed by the state. It would be much better to strip the ridge completely in hopes those motorists would be radicalized by what they saw.

Walker already has ripped off 400,000 of a 12-million board feet total. He began about two weeks ago.

"I never knew what I had Until I threw it all away." -- Dylan

"Just give me that rock and roll music Any old way you choose it." -- Berry

Man, the last time we saw Johnny Cash was at the county fair outside London, Ontario. He was headlining at the time with Brenda

Lee.

Bob Dylan? Folk music was always a little bit removed from us, you know? I mean it was always somehow associated with crew cut college kids playing guitars in bermuda shorts and all that. We never really got over that stigma, we gotta confess. So we always approached Dylan on the -- well, the intellectual level, like people sitting around rapping about WHO the sad eyed lady REALLY was, yea, yea, yea,

yea, dig.

But when Nashville Skyline came out, at our place we had a two-day party and all we did was listen to Dylan -- alternated with early Sun records -- and nobody once said "you know what that really means?" Because we all knew what it meant. The music itself is the

message.

Nashville Skyline is a celebration of our culture, and the most significant album since Beggar's Banquet. We don't want to play any exegical games -- Dylan himself seems to be trying to escape that by fleeing from the thick of "meaningful" words into the music itself, where those who knew will simply dig on it.

Nashville Skyline, it becomes clear after repeated listenings, is a compendium of dozens of early styles. In fact, the thought has occurred to us that everything on the album can be traced directly to an early rock artist.

rock artist.

The first thing that will probably hit you is that 'I Threw It All Away'' is a lift from Elvis' "I Was The One." The following track, "Peggy Day," starts out with a Sonny James' guitar riff, cuts into a melody highly reminiscent of a late fifties rock tune called "Primrose Lane," and winds up with a satirical (and hilarious) finale, modeled note for note after the close to "Let's Have a Party," from the soundtrack of Elvis' "Loving You."

Is this another Dylan hype on the public? Johnny Cash thinks not. As he writes on the liner notes:

"There are those who do not imitate Who cannot imitate
But there are those who emulate
At times, to expand further the light Of an original glow."

This is the first happy album Dylan has produced, and a romantic one at that. Technically, the album is excellent. It doesn't capture all the original fire of rock and roll -- it is, after all, an afterglow. But it is closer to the meat than the Beatle's latest extravaganza. In plain words, its fun, man. Trip out on the Carl Perkins guitar riffs, the Jerry Lee Lewis piano fugues. John Wesley Harding was just so heavy -- what a reprieve!

Somewhere near the nucleus there vibrates a petite ville called Mill Valley, home base of such notables as Clover, Quicksilver Messenger Service, West, Circus, Ace of Cups, Freedom Hiway, and many more. As opposed to the "San Francisco Sound" label, so well trod upon by most bay area bands, several of these groups have been instrumental in the origination of a new music somewhat jokingly

a new music somewhat jokingly termed "Mill Valley Soul."

Mill Valley Soul seems to im-ply something that's white and funky, but not necessarily either. Influences range from country, vestern to gospel, and all points

in between.
Out of all this conglomeration
comes a band that rings soul by
spreading its roots deep into the

somes a band that rings soun by spreading its roots deep into the ground and its branches all over the world. They could have come from Atlanta, Motown, or Chicago. But they're from Mill Valley and they are the Sons of Champlin.

The Sons, under leader Bill Champlin, have been together in their present form for about two and a half years. In that space of time they have paid more dues than almost any band I've ever heard of. They've gone through at least as many head changes.

According to manager Fred Roth, who's been along from way back, the Sons are "beginning to get things in order."

"Yeah, we're starting to stretch out," Freddie said recently.

"We're into a very heavy organic thing, being one with everything, getting back to the earth. Getting

thing, being one with everything, getting back to the earth. Getting high on organic reality.

"Sometimes when we have to come back to the inorganic world

it's so unreal. Things get pretty intense.

intense,"
For the Sons the inorganic world consists of having to struggle for paying gigs to stay alive when they would much rather play for free, it consists of spending hours in a recording studio making an album when they would rather be out in the woods getting high on nature's life style. style.

"Turning your mind over in a motel room doesn't make it," Fred assures. "We use humor to survive in that mess. It takes a lot of openness."

of openness,"
The Sons, in Fred's words,
"travel like a force" rather than
like a band, Effects of the force
are readily visible when the Sons
play. They are one of the few
bands left who can motivate people
to cast off their hang-ups and
dance.

But it goes much deeper than mere physical movement. The Sons are putting out a consistently extremely strong mental vibration that at various times either cares-ses or bonks you on the head. Re-gardless of its intensity the vibration always says the same thing --LOVE FREEDOM.

Ballroom and Speedway Mea-ows crowds are not the only ones

overwhelmed by the Sons vibes. Capitol Records recently got its mind blown by the Sons recording

"We told them we didn't under-

contract.

He was even a major issue in Marian Allred's campaign for the Board of Trustees, Mrs. Allred was against hiring Lozada because of his politics. (Shades of Ronald Reagan calling for more hiring of "conservative" profes-

sors.)

Dr. Peter Jurs, president of the faculty senate, denies the walk-

out was in protest of Lozada's hiring. "We only considered one thing; the procedure," he says. Predictably the Gazette and Tribne didn'r see it that way. They Predictably the Gazette and Tribune didn't see it that way. They could scarcely contain their glee, picturing it as faculty disapproval of Lozada. Happlest of all was ultra-conservative candidate Marian Allred, whose campaign got a huge boost on the eve of the election. election.

election.
Tuesday Chicano students held a rally and Jurs appeared to explain the faculty's action. "The faculty senate doesn't function in a political vacuum," said a Chicano instructor. He charged others had made "political hay" out of the action and stressed the faculty's reponsibility to the entire community. community.

community.

Chicano students were particularly incensed that they weren't consulted before the walkout. They charged that senate members had met with Mrs. Allred. "If you had our interests at heart, you would have asked us," said CSU leader, Victor Acosta.

Though he came to "explain" the walkout, Jurs was unable to do so. He said the news articles were misleading. But when questioned why the walkout had been staged, he said, "We can't yet put it into words." After this sad performance, Froben Lozada was introduced to hearty applause.

He quoted Allan Krebs of New York.

He quoted Allan Krebs of New York's Free University, saving He quoted Allan Krebs of New York's Free University, saying, "Universities are brothels where people sell their minds instead of their bodies." Lozada made it clear he wanted to change that situation, "We've paid taxes and never had a say about education relevant to Third World People," he said.

Earlier Lozada talked about the Earlier Lozada tarket about ne furor. "They wouldn't have said anything if I was a right-winger. They talk about the university asa battleground of ideas but they don't mean it and don't want it," he said.

"This is why so many students are disenchanted with their education." Of Mrs. Allred he said, "She's 15 years behind Joe Mc-Carthy who was hundreds of years behind the times."

A caucus of white students met after the rally to muster support for Lozada. The group agreed that the attacks on Lozada were also attacks on the Chicano Studies Department and the principle of self-determination.

"No librarian in his right mind will take a job in Richmond," a library worker told BARB this week. She said the whole city is now suffering because of the actions of a few right-wing people. Laurel Burley, Chairman of the Library Association's Intellectual Freedom Committee was speaking of the repercussions to Richmond from banning the BARB and Avant-Garde from it's library's shelves last September. Since then headlibrarian John Forsman has quit in disgust, and sanctions were placed against the city's library by AFT Librarian local 1795.

Forsman left to become a library science prof in Washington, DC at the new Federal City College opening there. No one has applied for his vecated job in

lege opening there. No one has applied for his vacated job in Richmond.

"There might be some fire-works at the next library com-mission meeting," Laurel Bur-ley said, "but certainly no new librarian." The next commission

librarian." The next commission meeting is Monday, April 21.

Those responsible for the crisis at the library are still plaguing Richmond. At the last city council meeting one of them, Dorothy Strindberg, had BARB confetti sprinkled over her head. Sponsoring PSR students called the festival a 'political confron-tation with the authorities of the Pacific School of Religion.'


We decided to bring the people



A column for those under 30: One possible definition of growing up is the successive dis-covery of needs in your life that you didn't know existed until the

When first it came to you what older boys and girls (or perhaps just older boys, or girls) saw in each other. Then you knew that you needed it, but you didn't know that until you knew that it existed. that it existed.

Or perhaps you can remember farther back, to your time in the primary grades. The day when learning to read suddenly was not

learning to read suddenly was not just toiling through the primer by rule, but getting a sudden look into the great world of reading. Such experiences do happen most frequently during one's early years, and tend to thin out later. And it's true that age thirty is for many people a sort of watershed, after which they simply cease to grow and become set in middleto grow and become set in middleaged fixity. The Over-30 stereo-type, like any other stereotype, never would have come to be ac-cepted if there weren't some truth behind i.

But age thirty is not a builtin bioligical limitation after which

ninety than they were at twenty.
Look at Bertrand Russell. Or

Right here, locally, take Max
Scherr, who was 49 when he founded
the BARB. Or Beatrice Whitnah,

Or Joe Gilbert, who wuld be a
hero to the young if he were better
known. During World War I he
stood trial for sedition at the age
of 53. and when I knew him in

shown. During worf a war I he age of 53, and when I knew him in Minneapolis he was an antiwar activist at the age of 86.

Personally, I regard my life as having begun after I turned thirty. I hate now to think about how square I once was, but after age thirty I dropped out of the square world for good, and have never been back. And I found out how life can be something more than filling in time while waiting to die.

And it seems that with increasing frequency I'm finding those needs that I spoke of earlier, that only are revealed by discovering

needs that I spoke of earlier, that only are revealed by discovering the remedy. The first time I read Thomas Pynchon's novels, or Bess Brigham's poetry, or listened to the singing of Buffy Ste. Marie or Johnny Cash, or picked up on the social thought of Paul Goodman or the religious thought of Denis Saurat, my immediate reaction was, "How did I ever make it through so many years without it through so many years without

that?"

So, my message to those under thirty: Sooner than you think you will be over thirty. Don't lose it all just because of a birthday. Keep what you have and bring it on into the over-thirty world. It will bloody well be needed. R.R.

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
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JOIN THE ARMY

Growing numbers of young people are Joining the Army -- rather than trying to cop out of the draft -- for the express purpose of subverting the structure

the draft — for the express purpose of subverting the structure of the war machine.

More than two dozen underground papers are now being published by conscripted Americans at army bases across the nation, and organized groups of anti-war Gis have been springing up in the past six months. According to vet Ken shillman, editor of the nationwide GI paper, Task Force, "just about every major training base nowhas its own paper, and many have GI liberation fronts."

"There is a general radicalization that has taken place among American kins," Shillman added. "A lot of GIs in the anti-war movement now were in the civil rights movement before the war."

Shillman believes that the movement among GIs is linked to the student movement and the civil

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rights movement. "I think it's fair to say that people in the student movement brought it into the army. But now, for the first time, and in the army, working class kids and students are coming together and exchanging ideas."

This past week, the army dishonorable discharged the editor of Fort Gordon Georgia's The Last Harrass. pvt. Dennis Davis would have been discharged "honorably" in sixteen days.

"There is a lot of innate opposition to the brass-to military authority--among GIs," Shillman adds, "American kids today just won't stand for the degree of authoritarianism that other generations have put up with."

In Fort Jackson South Carolina, eight soldiers affiliated with GIs United are suing the Secretary of the Army on the grounds that they are being deprived on their constitutional rights. The GIs had presented the petition containing

hundreds of signatures to the brass, asking for the use of fa-cilities to hold meetings to dis-cuss the war and other issues.

cilities to hold meetings to discuss the war and other issues. The petition was not accepted on the grounds that it represented "collective bargaining."

On March 20 the eight were arrested at a mass meeting of over 100 Gis, and are being courtmartialed for "inciting to riot" and "disrespect to an officer."

Originally there were nine, but charges against Pvt. John Hoffman were dropped when it was revealed he was an army informer.

"The Gis view themselves," said editor Shillman, "as citizen soldiers, who happen to be in the army for two years. They are demanding that the Secretary of the Army put it on the line: do soldiers have their constitutional rights or not? America still has to maintain that democratic coverand we have to pry that cover all the way open."

PFC Don Pyle of Oakland was one of the initiators of the Fort Benning Liberation Front in Georgia last summer. Before he was drafted, Pyle was a cardcarrying member of the ILWU, (He asked for,

ed, Pyle was a card carrying mem-ber of the ILWU. (He asked for, and obtained, the endorsement of his local for the Easter Peace March.) Pyle was organizing an April 6 demonstration at Fort Benning, when he was transferred with no notice to Fort Ord Calif-

with no notice to Fort Ord California.

At Fort Ord, he was confined for over a week, and denied access to a phone. After he managed to make contact with local anti-war GIs, he was again transferred with 24 hour notice to Camp Roberts, a desert outpost where he has been restricted ever since.

According to Shillman, the GI anti-war movement has really started mushrooming since the

anti-war movement has really started mushrooming since the negotations, While the war has been the catalyst, the radicalization of GIs has not been confined to the war issue alone. At Fort Jackson, for instance, GIs United holds discussions about imperialism, and listens to tapes of Malcolm X.

discussions about imperialism, and listens to tapes of Malcolm X.

"Like any other struggle for human rights," Shill man told BARB, "You have to fight for your rights. You don't have freedom of expression until you start to speak."

Nationally distributed papers include Vietnam GI, Veterans Stars and Stripes for Peace, and The Bond, which is published by the American Serviceman's Union, which is trying to organize solders along the lines of a labor union. Other papers bear such names as The Ultimate Weapon, which carries this banner: "This paper is written and published by a group of Fort Dix GIs who in so doing have freed their minds from the involuntary servitude of the military machine. This is our ultimate weapon."



NEWS staffhave philosophies basically different from the parent organization. The Letters to the Editor section, recently enlarged to a full page, often features letters from physicians who oppose official and semi-official A,M,A, positions. One was about malnutrition among poverty groups in Texas. A second concerned a report from John Hopkins University which recognized the under-representation of black students in Maryland medical, dental and nursing schools, recommended that the situation be corrected and suggested possible

Another item reported the Ca-nadian Medical Association has urged its federal government to ban cigarette advertising and require cigarette packages carry notices specifying health hazards to smokers. An end to federal financial aid to the tobacco industry (e.g. crop subsidies) and tighter

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control on cigarette sales to minors were also advised.

The C.M.A. filed a brief with the Canadian House of Commons which said in part: "There is no longer any doubt that cigarette smoking is a direct threat to the user's health."

The Medical Committee for Human Rights also received some attention from the A.M.A. NEWS. Meeting for its annual convention, MCHR voted to establish a program through which medical students would study the Food and Drug Administration and the Air Pollution Control activities of the government. 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

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


