



Why did Coakley attempt to use the Conspiracy law against the Oakland 7 and now the Berkeley 3? The movement claims it is a method geared to suppress demonstrations, pick off leaders and give heavy sentences for minor

Coakley may try to deny it, but the brain behind Coakley's con-spiracy against the movement put it all down in black and white a

it all down in black and white a few years ago.

A certain Miss Yvonne Merga was moved by the 1964 civil rights demonstrations in San Francisco and the Berkeley Free Speech Movement. She felt inspired to find someway to "legally" crush the people involved. For Yvonne it was depressing to see all those trouble makers getting off with only 30, 60 or 90 days imprisonment. Even leaders like Savio only got 120 days. days.

The problem was how to get them a few years and huge fines for crimes like trespassing, disturbing the peace, illegal assembly and malicious mischief.

Then Yvonne hit on a brilliant idea. Don't try them for the offense they committed, that way they can't get over 6 months and sometimes you can't prove it and they get acuitted. Instead you try them for DLANNING. A DEMONSTRATION PLANNING A DEMONSTRATION

You don't have to prove they committed any crime, in fact you can arrest before the act, and it's a felony, not a misdemeanor, carrying years of imprisonment. Writing in the HASTINGS LAW JOURNAL in 1965 Yvonne Merga outlines how to use the Conspiracy Law against political activists. Properly implemented, the use of the conspiracy law has two functions: as a "law enforcement tool," and as a "deterrent" to political a "deterrent" to political

and as a "deterrent" to political activists.

Describing its effect Yvonne noted that the law "would allow the enforcement agency to prevent disorder and damage to property BEFORE they occur" (emphasis added). Thus the police would not have to waste time waiting for the

various crimes to be committed. Nor would they have to waste Nor would they have to wast time getting direct evidence. For time getting direct evidence, For-tunately, Yvonne explains, "cir-cumstantial evidence is sufficient. This overt act need not be com-mitted by each member, and the act of one may be attributed to all the other participants."

"Depending on the gravity of the planned action, law enforcement

"Depending on the gravity of the planned action, law enforcement agencies could take effective action at any time from the first preparatory meeting to the actual demonstration itself."

Miss Merga proudly pointed out that "another beneficial effect of applying the law of conspiracy to unlawful demonstrations lies in the deterrent effect of more severe penalties." Finally, she sees this uniue combination of effective-ness and deterrent as an "ex-cellent weapon" against disruptive protest.

Guess who gave Miss Yvonne Merga a job? Naturally Coakley wasn't satisfied with just hiring Yvonne; he tried her ideas our in the Oakland 7 case. He lost. The Oakland 7 were acquitted on all counts by the jury. This is among other things a political embarrassment for Coakley. Now more than ever he wants a conviction on the conspiracy law or the law itself may become useless not to mention his future political carreer.

carreer.

Coakley will try again May 26
when Peter Camejo, Jack Bloom
and Paul Glusman come up for
trial. Their case stems from the
Moses Hall sit-in of last October. Moses Hall sit-in of last October, All the other participants were found guilty of trespassing and given ten days. But Coakley picked the three as leaders, charging them with the conspiracy felony. The Berkeley 3 case will decide the fate of future conspiracy indictments.

dictments.

The concrete acts of the Berkeley 3, (two speeches at a Sproul keley 3, (two speeches at a Sproul step rally before the press and 2,000 people and the chairing of a public meeting), indicates the clear violation of constitutional rights involved in such conspiracy indictments. In fact if upheld all meetings planning a future demonstration could be used as a pretext for indictments. The importance of fighting the political use of the conspiracy law should be quite evident.

# DIGGERS DON'T DIG ALIOTO

Members of a militant Bay Area Labor union will confront their leadership this Saturday when the rank and file attempt to dedicate union meeting hall to the man of their choice

the new union meeting half to the man of their choice.

Local 261 of the Laborers, Hod-carriers, Miners and Muckers Union wants to dedicate the new hall to "Doc" Dougherty, an old IWW organizer who fought for safer conditions for miners.

The Union hierarchy for Local 261 want to name the new hall after Mayor Alloto, They plan to dedicate the hall in his name this Monday, May 5th.

However, Local 261 members plan to beat them to it, by dedicating it as "Dougherty Hall" this saturday, May 3rd.

"There was no vote taken of the rank and file membership when they chose to call it Alioto Hall," a Local 261 member told BARB.
"We want our hall named after Doc Dougherty, and we're going to do it."

Allen Walker, of #261, rapped the situation to BARB this week. He told of the open invitation issued to "The People" by #261, asking all to attendthe Saturday dedication at 18th and Shotwell in SF.

all to attend the Saturday dedication at 18th and Shotwell in SF. The invitation is to "the rank and file of all mions. Also, the Third World, the BSU, Panthers, Oakland 7, the Resistance, the Mission Coalition, and all other movers and shakers."

"We may have to break down the door to enter our own union hall," Walker admitted, "But we've been the most militant and radical union in the Bay Area all

"Most of the older laborers who have tried to buck the unions learned not to," Walker noted. "They learned that if they did, they got shot.
"But we are radical, and we're young."

The LHM&M Local #261 was the first union to hit the lines at SF State during the strike last December. "Most of us work under very dangerous conditions, often unsafe;" Walker explained, "Per-

unsafe," Walker explained, "Perhaps this is why we are so militant a union.

"We've been working with the Panthers a lot lately," he continued. "They are into fighting Alioto and his political machine, and we are into fighting Alioto and the union leadership. It's become obvious that Alioto, the political machine, the underworld, and union leadership are tied in together,"

Walker added that the LHM&M leadership is now under federal investigation for the possible mis-

use of funds.
"When we dedicate our meeting "When we dedicate our meeting hall to the man of our choice," Walker stated, "this will also be a move in our struggle for fair representation of members by the union hierarchy."


Bob Mandel and Steve Hamilton, th members of the Oakland even, were arrested Wednesday both

"We are going ahead. I am assuming there will be no confrontation. I expect no conflict," Cheit said.

Bu: Cheit backed off Wednesday Bu: Cheit backed off Wednesday in a meeting with park supporters. Cheit offered the people 'crea-tive control' over one-fourth of the park land,'' Wendy (who said her last name was unimportant) told BARB Wednesday.

told BARB Wednesday.

Others present at the meeting included book store owner Frank Cody, Carl Wirth, the city's art director, Charles Essenberg, of the city park and rec. department and three workers from the Peoples Park, Cheit and his assistant John Searle, represented UC.

"He (Cheit) said that the whole block behind Telegraph measures 450 feet by 270 feet and that we might aid in the design of the playing field and have the park in the area where the trees are now.

now.
"But he also said that the university was going to put one soc-cer field and one or two softball fields on that land, too," said

cer field and one or two softball fields on that land, too," said Wendy.

"He said that this was only a proposal and would have to be discussed with 'other people."

"If that doesn't work out, he said it might be possible to relocate us to some other place.

locate us to some other place such as the McKinley School site, "Cheit is going to call us all together; for another meeting next Monday or Tuesday," she added.

Monday or Tuesday," she added.
In a telephone interview Tuesday, Cheit denied a local TV news report that the university was reacting to pressure from the city to drive the street people off Telly and out of Peoples Park.
"I don't know which official was quoted, but we have had no contact with the city on this matter," Cheit said.

If the game was to make the people that that the University and the City of Berkeley are presenting a united front against the street people and "Peoples Park,"

street people and reoples and the jig is up. Cracks have already appeared in the uniform facade. Walter Neasbitt, forestry supervisor of the Berkeley Dept. of Parks and Recreation told BARB, "I personally think the park is a great idea."

great idea.

"It's a very constructive project and it's much more attractive than the mudhole that was there

previously.
"I think the people who have done

"I think the people who have done so much work on it will keep it up much better than the citycould. "After the city's plans for widening the streets next to the park are completed, we might be able to furnish some trees and shrubs for the city-owned peri-

meter of the park.

"I think it best that the university designate it as a park and let the people maintain it," Neasbitt said.

Neasbitt's approval of Peoples
Park was seconded by Albert Raeburn, a member of the Berkeley
Planning Commission.

"In fact, it would be a good idea if the city made deserted vacant lots available to the people for

"There may be a problem with maintenance, but if that can be solved, I'm all for it," he said.

"The university bought that land in June, 1967, on a plan submitted to the Regents calling for development of that site as a playing field, with long-range plans for residential development," Cheft told BARB. told BARB.

"The plans remain unchanged to build a playing field that will replace Union Field which was lost due to the construction of Zellerback Hall.

"It is badly needed as a field for softball, touch football, soccer, rubgy, lacrosse and, maybe even, cricket.

"I probably know less about it than you do," Jensen told BARB.
"When we're asked to do something, we do it.

"There have been a lot of plans floating around for the last two years concerning that land.
"First, there were dorms, then apartment houses, and I think that a playing field may even have been considered, but the playing field was not part of the official plan.
"I don't know who originated the idea for a playing field," Jensen confessed.
"I assume nothing will be done until we get some money to do it.

idea for a playing field," Jensen confessed.

"I assume nothing will be done until we get some money to do it. Our office has not been notified to draw up plans or let bids for a playing field," he said.

BARB checked with UC Intramural Sports Office, which is responsible for scheduling all events for on-campus and off-campus for on-campus and off-campus. The three big playing fields are Strawberry, Kleeberger, and Underhill, BARB was told by Charlene, a groovy blond chick who schedules games and things for all the fields.

"We don't have enough fields to hand the demand for space after 4 p.m. or on weekends," Charlene told BARB.

"I think the Peoples Park is great, but just working here I can see we don't have enough fields in early fall, late spring and summer.

"You can reserve a field just

mer.

"You can reserve a field just about anytime from early in the morning until 4 p.m., but most of the students are tied up with classes or labs, so they can't use the fields then," she said.

What about expanding the facili-

the fields then," she said.

What about expanding the facilities in Strawberry Canyon?

"Well, I don't know about that.
You'll have to talk to someone else," she added.

The point is that the Peoples Park, behind Telegraph from Dwight to Haste is where the people are and where they can use it all day long and during the night as well. The university has other areas at its disposal that are inconvenient as park locations.

And if Cheit and other UC administrators don't believe there will be

istrators don't believe there will be a confrontation, they should drop on by the park and take a look at the Bulldozer Alarm that was put up after Tuesday morning's

# **NEW KIND** OF REST, WORK IN PEOPLE'S PARK

Sunday in Peoples Park.

"Watch the pick."

A warm spring afternoon.
"Want some lemonade?"

The island of sod planted last Sunday grows towards Haste behind the rakes and shovels of a hundred people.

"Everybody gets a blister."

Over in the corner, a group is building a stage — a stage with stairs and levels and a totem pole and a flag pole.

A father leads his daughter to the swing set that has appeared since last weekend. A mother sits on a table nursing her child.

Over by a deserted foundation another group is building a minature Mexican garden with a grassy plaza and shaded walkways among the geraniums and sweetpeas, Just beyond the flower beds, beans and tomatoes are planted in thard, sunbaked clay made soft by pick, shovel, water and loving care.

On the sod island someone has care.

ore, on the sod island someone has carved heavy timbers into a bench that seems to have been growing there for years. On the western edge of the park a cat is welding some steel tube into something. You stand up to look around and — damn it — it is a park — at least, it's becoming a park — taking its form from the labors of nearly one thousand people. The mud hole north of the tree and sod island is filled in, leveled and raked. An ornery chimmey foundation yields to picks and sledge hammers and becomes a barbeque pit.

sledge hammers and becomes a barbeque pit.
Clank, clank, growl - the Roto-tiller comes in a circle clears, making room for the charging beast. "Ride 'um, cowboy!" And he does, Sometimes it takes two to handle, but it's getting done.
A small group sits on a foundation wall, eating fish and chips. "What are you looking at?" "The

future - we're wondering what we can do with that." And they point to the sea of cars parked on the west half of the park site.

On down along the wall, some guys are planting revolutionary corn. And there's never enough water. Everyone wants to use the hose. But it all gets worked out.

It's a living collage, Beer, wine, lemonade, soda pop, and cider always seemed to appear when you were thirsty. Bandaids and gloves were passed around for blisters. Bread and cheese were handed out, if you were hungry. Where did it all come from? Fuck it. Nobody knew, nobody asked. We were grooving on the sun and working with each other.

In the shade of a tree, a guy is playing a raga on his sitar. Bobby Seale and some Panthers are watching, smiling. "I sure wish I had the patience to learn the sitar," one of them remarks. Up by the sod island, a girl on banjo and some cats on guitar are holding a hoot, It brings in a small group. Someone is blowing kazoo, but I can't see him (her?).

# **DEAN FUZZ COPS OUT** ON KNOLL

The prosecution has completed its "case" in the Wayne Greene trial. Wayne is a black charged with attempted murder of a High-way Patrolman who was firebomb-ed during the August Telly freakout

officially Sgt. Sicheneder of the
UC Police, turned out to be the
star witness for the DA. Wednesday in Alameda Superior Court
he testified that, while standing
in Lower Sproul Plaza he had
seen Greene and an unidentified
white youth commit the horrid
deed.

deed.
From 60 or 70 feet away Dean Fuzz claimed that he had seen Greene's face illuminated by the glow of the molotov cocktail.
After Sicheneder had helped to put out the flames, he went after the assailant. Recognizing Greene's face, he went for his gun but was "too tired" to get it out of the helser.

Defense Attorney Clinton White pointed out to Sicheneder that large trees blocked the line of sight, but Dean Fuzz insisted that he had seen correctly. He said that he was moving around during that 20 or 30 seconds, dodging missiles from Telegraph Avenue.

Earlier, Robert Ludden, another Kampus Kop, said that he never saw the firebomb in Green's hands, and that he was standing four feet from Greene's mysterious white companion, but never tried to apprehend him.

A ballistics expert testified that Greene's fingerprints were not

Greene's fingerprints were not found on the glass fragments.

The prosecutor is Deputy DA Frank Bukota, who constantly referred to Greene as a "black boy" and "colored boy". He kept all blacks off the jury which conand "colored boy". The Office of Public Information of the Berkeley campus has issued a dismaying statement on the fate of People's Park. It is not only phony but it raises more questions than it purports to

answer.

The statement reveals that the playing field was originally intended to be built on the site of the Anna Head School (across Haste Street from the park). The park area was to be used for the street from the park).

Haste Street from the park). The park area was to be used for housing.

"Due to the financial situation, however, construction of housing on this site is at least a decade away," says the statement.

"At the June 1967 meeting of the Regents, the Berkeley campus proposed acquisition of this land to eliminate its blighted housing and to allow construction of the badly needed playing field."

The hundreds of thousands of dollars needed not only owipe out the existing housing but, more to the point, to scatter the avant garde tenants, was quickly procured.

"The campus was unable to proceed promptly with the playing field because of financial difficulties," says the statement, "..... but the funds are now available, and plans to build a playing field are moving ahead."

The crux of the matter is: When was the decision taken to make

are moving ahead."

The crux of the matter is: When was the decision taken to make these funds available? Who decided it?

There is nothing here to indicate that the funds were not scraped together after the park construction began.

The statement estimates that 12,000 students "participate in the entire (intramural) program and more would do so if more playing fields were available."

The intramural program includes basketball, bowling, chess and many other sports besides those which would need such a field. The figures given elsewhere in Heyns' statement as to the number of football, soccer and baseball teams would indicate a figure closer to 5500 students.

In contrast to this estimate for a year, last Sunday an esti-

figure closer to 5500 students.

In contrast to this estimate for a year, last Sunday an estimated 1900 persons turned out to work and help make the park a reality. Multiply this by fifty-two and the figure of concerned persons is ten times as great as the statement's. And this does not count weekdays.

We would suggest that given a chance to express their opinion, most of the students would prefer an open park to a fenced-in playing field.

most of the students would prefer an open playing field.

It is also likely that members of the community would agree to lend their efforts to finding and constructing a suitable playing field in some other area, perhaps on its originally planned site, the Anna Head School and perhaps without destroying its classic buildings.

The statement announces that Chancellor Heyns has asked his staff to "meet with" various concerned people interested in the park. However, it indicates that this is a smoke screen. "The University will proceed promptly to build the recreational field," it reads.

The Administration has held such "discussions" before, e results have usually been delay, obfuscation and discourse



If, however, he is merely covering for the University administration's eagerness to exert its hegemony over the land, then we must ask every person within reach to oppose these efforts.



# 160 PIGS PROVOKE RIOT AS PANTHERS KEEP COOL

machine guns and tear gas bombs to quiet a Black Panther loud-speaker in the Fillmore Monday.

Sixteen Panthers were arrested and a number of guns illegally seized when the pigs raided the Panther's Fillmore office. The po-Panther's Fillmore office. The po-tentially tragic police riot was based on an apparent police com-plaint that the Panthers didn't have the proper permit for a mobile loudspeaker in the Fillmore streets.

more streets.

Panther attorney Charles Garry charged at a press conference Tuesday that "this raidwas staged by the Mayor as a deliberate attempt to poison the atmosphere at the Huey Newton bail hearing Thursday, and to prevent the proper administration of justice."

A truck was broadcasting information about the rally Monday afternoon when a dozen armed cops approached the Panther headquarters at Fillmore and Eddy. It was about four o'clock, Black Panther Belinda Booker was inside.

Panther Don Cox told the cops they weren't allowed inside the building without a search war-rant. He closed the door, The pigs proceeded to act out their movie-

proceeded to act out their movie-kicking the door down, natch.

The pigs leered through the busted door with drawn guns. Cox yelled for the people in the office to take cover. The pigs moves to reel 2; they fired eight tear gas cannisters into the building and cannisters into the building, and let loose a blast of submachine gun bullets over the heads of by-

standers and neighbors.
At no time were any shots fired by Panthers.

The pigs told the straight press they heard the "clicking of wea-pons" inside. From a street crowded with hundreds of enraged and noisy citizens, the cops said they could hear a .22 calibre rifle cocking inside a building. Sure. Tear gas bombs exploded inside the office. The Panthers tried to leave by the back door.

to leave by the back door.

"Several sisters were choked
up by the gas," Belinda told
BARB, "and the brothers were
trying to help them, and the pigs
fired several shots at Don. He
was just trying to help a fainting
sister, but he had to drop her
on the floor."

Belinda and the others were taken to the pig pen. Most were released within an hour and a half. Assault charges were filed against

Don Cox.
"We came back to the street,"
Belinda said, "and there were
Panthers on the street telling people to go home. Kathleen Cleaver was there, and so was Bobby Seale, and we joined them? The SF Chronicle observed Monday that Seale and Kathleen Cleaver

"were seen moving about, trying
to calm the mob."
Mayor Alioto claimed in the
straight press that "The young
men who did react so quickly and

for Panthers." He went on to acfor Panthers." He went on to accuse the Panthers of "thrusting rifles into the stomach's of cops," and said he was putting an addi-

ing next week.

"Pig Alioto wasn't there. He's lying," said Belinda in response to the Mayor's allegation that the Panthers tried to incite the people to riot, rather than to disperse

And indeed, the Chronicle re-ported that "Black Panthers were seen trying to persuade the angry blacks to calm down and in one

blacks to calm down and in one or more incidents rescued whites who were being beaten."

Monday's bust of 16 Black Panthers and the riot which almost ensued is yet another example of police instigated violence.

The Panthers were broadcasting information about the Free Huey rally when a squad of cops proceeded to Panther headquarters. They did not make for the vehicle carrying the loudspeaker in question. They made directly for Panther headquarters.

The pig in charge - a Sergeant Schaumleffel - told the straight press that the kicker to the whole affair was the fact that he didn't like what the Panthers were broadcasting! They were insulting the pigs.

The police claimed that a search of their files indicated that the Panthers had no permit. "There was no permit issued to the Black Panther Party," the SFPD told BARB.

"-- at least, not in the name of the Black Panther Party, anyway,"

the SFPD hastily added.

the SFPD hastily added.

"They might have had a permit in another name, we don't know."
They might have. Perhaps an inquiry to the driver of the car might have revealed this. Perhaps a phone call to Panther headquarters, rather than a raid by twelve pigs backed by 150 reinforcements, would have yielded the necessary information.

Kathleen Cleaver told BARB that the Panthers did have a permit. It was for stationary sound equipment, as the SFPD does not issue permits for mobile sound, she told BARB.

"The record stores all up and down the Fillmore have sound trucks," she added. "There is amplifted sound in the streets everyday. It is clear they merely needed an excuse to provoke an incident."

Schaumleffel was told by the SFPD to' use his ownjudgment" in handling the matter. That was just before he gathered a battalion of cops, submachine guns, and tear gas bombs.

Some bloodthirsty neo-nazi was told to use his own judgment to quiet down a noisy car, and he almost brought a catastrophe like the Detroit insurrection upon the city!

Prisoner Richard Gentile appeared before the court-martial board Friday. The twenty-year-old Vietnam veteran who testified earlier that his participation in a San Francisco peace marchearned him time in the stockade, was standing in the defendant's area talking over the railing to his mother. Natalie Gentile, a handsome blonde woman, had only learned her son was one of the "mutineers" when their attorney Terence Hallinan wrote informing her three weeks before the trial date, set to begin April 7, at Fort Ord. Mrs. Gentile flew from Tokyo to be with her son.

Friday morning Gentile seemed very disturbed and his mother was trying to comfort him.
"No, mom, it just isn't worth it."

All eyes of the other prisoners centered on Gentile. He started throwing things hard to the floor cyring, "I can't go through with it." He jumped up. His mother put her arms up to him as he pushed his way around some of the other prisoners and started to walk down the aisle. "Take me to the stockade." ade.

Someone in the courtroom called "Terry." Hallinan turned and saw what was happening. "Now Richard, calm down. Everyone's nervous and tense. Hang on a little longer." Gentile started down the

onger." Gentile started down the aisle, his mother, Hallinan, two MPs closing in.
"I'm sorry Mr. Hallinan for all you've done and the expense and Captain Fay and Captain Yeary captain ray and Captain Yeary (army defense assisting Hallinan) but I can't do it any longer. I just want to go to the stockade."

The small bunch of people walked out of the back of the court room. The rest of the prisoners, all alert to Captile, were milling bout

alert to Gentile, were milling about their little corner. An MP arrived with a handful of pills and started passing them out to the prisoners like he was feeding the seals at Fleishhacker Zoo.

The court martial board had not The court martial board had not entered the court room yet, but the judge, the prosecution, a few people on the press side and the spectators were beat into silence. Only two men were talking. It was as out of place as talking in church or at a hanging. It turned out one of the men who had been laughing and joking was to be the first witness of the day.

the men who had been laughing and joking was to be the first witness of the day.

As soon as a calmed Richard Gentile re-entered the courtroom and slumped in his chair, the court martial board arrived, and the defense called Dr. Lawrence Levitin, a psychiatrist.

Dr. Levitin testified Pvt. Buddy Shaw "could not have formed an intent to act in concert with others to override lawful military authori-

to override lawful military authori-ty and hence to commit the crime of mutiny."

On Monday morning Prosecutor

On Monday morning Prosecutor Novinger reminded Pvt. Alan Rupert what Sgt. Thomas Woodring, provost sergeant at the Presidio stockade said when the alleged muttiny took place, "Walker made it. Bunch got zapped. There's the fence. You've got a 50-50 chance," then asked Rupert where he learned the word "zapped".

Rupert testified that he once saw another prisoner being thrown down the stairs by Sergeant Woodring.

another prisoner being informations the stairs by Sergeant Woodring.

Coincidentally a surprise appearance was made by Sergeant Woodring outside the courtroom following the testimony of Joe Stephens, a black prisoner in the stockade October 14, since discharged. charged.

Stephens was standing outside Stephens was standing outside the courtroom during a recess talk-ing to some friends when a tall, burly man with glasses ap-proached. He was wearing a fuzzy gray cardigan over a sports shirt

y Miller and light gray gabardine slacks. It was Sergeant Woodring. He approached former prisoner Stephens, leaned over and stuck out his hand. "Hi, how are ya".

Stephens shook hands with Woodring, and cooly said, "Fine. How are you?"

Woodring stepped back, chuckled, said "You know, win a few, lose a few," and stepped up into the court room closed to spectators at the time.

court room closed to spectators at the time.
When Woodring stepped out a few minutes later and someone asked him what he was doing down here, he answered "Nothing."
"What are you doing hanging around?"
"I'm not hanging around."
"Why aren't you at the stockade?"

"I'm on leave." "You might say it's an extended leave?"

"You might say", he answered and hurried away.

Joe Stephens literally swang into

Joe Stephens literally swang into the courtroom. There was a joy-ful stir among the prisoners when he came in. Stephens testified he arrived in the overcrowded, filthy stockade on September 18.

"Like it was always just no room to get around, Nothing to do. "Sergeant Woodring promised we were supposed to go out everyday for football and things. Didn't really get out to exercise. Nothing

Dear Editor of the Berkeley Barb;

I am a (...) white man. I have been in the Presidio Stokcade for been in the Presidio Stokcade for one year. I have seen a great deal of brutality, and unhuman treat-ment to the men at the Preside Stokcade, But on the 3rd of April, I was a witness to one of the most unjust acts I have ever seen in

unjust acts I have ever seen in my life.

Three sargents, one specialist (E-4), was caught by a Chaplin (Maj) beating a prisoner. I am going to call the Cahplin Major X, to protect him, the chaplin balled the four guards out and told them that he was going to press charges.

In the week that followed...it was

decided at a high staff meeting that Major X should be relieved of his duties as Stokcade Chaplin. The reason that was given to him for his removal, was that he min for his removal, was that he was getting to involved with the prisoners. In plane words he was doing his job, to well, for those who think that the prisoners in the Stokcade are less than human.

On the 17th of April, a young man was brought into the Stokcade, he was harged and to remembed for

he was harased and toremented for the first few hours he was here. He was then thrown into segregation, he somehow managed to get hold of a razor blade, he then cut the main artory just below his elbow, he was taken to the hospital, sown up and brought back. He now, ne was taken to the hospital, sown up, and brought back. He was then put back into segregation. Thats all I'm going to say at this time, except for we are two of the 27 mutiners.

Last Sunday afternoon (April 27)
I was forceably reminded that blind prejudice and the "average mar's" utter contempt for beauty have not only made unlivable cesspools out of our cities but have also spread their ugly slime across the countryside and into those once delightfully obscure hide-aways of trees and rocks and wind-whipped sand where we once found escape.

I got this most unpleasant reminder from a number of angry (and slightly confused) Marin (County Sheriff's deputies and from one outraged (and highly voyeuristic) Muir Beach landowner, all of whom seemed to regard the normal weekend visitation to this public beach by a few hundred hip young (and not so young) people along with kids, pets and attendant rock bands as some kind of barbarian invasion which could only be met with threats and force.

The effects of all this on my own until-then pleasant Sunday afternoon and that of my wife, two kids and a friend taking a long-needed break from a black San Francisco housing project

long-needed break from a black San Francisco housing project

San Francisco housing project were catastrophic.

We're not insensitive to bad wibes. The great wave of hosti-

vibes. The great wave of hostility and paranoia we walked into really jinxed the day for us, as I'm sure it did for many other people whose whole purpose in going to Muir Beach last Sunday was simply to get some fresh air.

The San Francisco Chronicle, with suitable tongue-in-cheek amusement over what even establishment newsmen can only regard as an utterly absurd situation, reported the incident Monday on page 3 under the headline "Reinforcements Rout the Nudes." In essence, reported the Chron-

In essence, reported the Chronicle, a ridiculously large squad of Marin County Sheriff's deputies (18 of them) invaded the completely peaceful beach scene late in the afternoon to "call the bluff" of "75 to 100" nude sunbathers on the keep.

They had come, the Chronicle reported, because a "male resident" of the area had spotted the nudes "with his binoculars" and complained that such a care-fully magnified sight impaired his

Two deputies arrived, alone at

first, told the "horde" of nudes to put their clothes back on but were politely told nothing doing. The upholders of public decency then called for reinforcements and then called for reinforcements and were, after considerable delay, assisted by eight more squad cars full of deputies which had to fight their way through a three-mile-long traffic jam leading up to the

By the time the wave of Marin By the time the wave of Marin fuzz arrived (about 5 p.m.), the nude sunbathers had decided to get dressed again anyway and everyone departed peacefully—sunbathers, three or four rock bands which had provided an aftername laws according to the sunbathers. noon-long concert from the steps of the Muir Beach Resort store building, the detachment of depu-ties, and all. No arrests. The Chronicle (which generally quotes whatever its police beat

quotes whatever its police beat man is told by the cops) erred in its estimate of "75 to 100" nude sunbathers on Muir Beach. I counted no more than a dozen at the height of the undressing

at the height of the undressing activity.

And what the deputies, property owners and the Chronicle also failed to take into account, because, to them. it plainly didn't matter a damn, was the kind of crimp all this hostility and police activity threw into the day for hundreds of people, hip and straight, who came to the beach with their families for a quiet, sunny Sunday.

with their families for a quiet, sunny Sunday.

People, like my family, who had parked quite legally on a public road on a bluff about 100 yards above the center of the beach festivities only to be met by a beefy and furious householder who first of all tried to order us out of our parking place while calling us "scum" and "bums" who "won't work for a living" all because we were going down to sun on the beach; and because one member of our party was black.

"I made up my mind right then to do what's right," Jim said, He told the dean and principal he would be back in school Wednesday because he hadn't been given a fair hearing.

"My son didn't do anything wrong," his mother said, "there was no reason to keep him out of

was no reason to keep him out of school." She fully supported his

was no reason to keep him out of school." She fully supported his decision to return to classes.

The next day Jim went to his first class, as always. But when he found messengers from the Dean's office had warned other teachers not to let him in, he went home.

Firm in her belief the school
was wrong Mrs. Lewis went to
school Friday, with her son, "to
ensure he would get into class".
Both mother and son went. Printo Mrs. Lewis they were both violating state law, but no action was taken while they were at school.

"We are using 'Desire Caught By the Tail' to convey indignation concerning wrongly established moral and religious concepts of existence, concerning the lack of daring to question ways of life and concerning a society which and concerning a society which

has grown cynical and apathetic. "We fear the possibility of being misunderstood, consequently we want to make clear that our mess-

want to make clear that our message is one of warning and not of condoning.

"We make this statement public in order to protect members of our cast against possible court action," he said.

Harrassing phone calls have al-ready caused one member of the "Desire" cast to quit.

The play has never been produced in its entirety, according to Elliot Tanzer, one of the actors and public relations man for CTA.

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
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# **MERRITT'S NEW SITE** 'NOWHERE'

It's a 15 minute drive on a winding dirt road to Merrit College's new campus high in the Oak-land hills. The site of this "com-munity college" couldn't be farther from the community it purports to

Most students in the district are from the flatlands of Oakland are from the flatlands of Oakland and Berkeley. The flatlands are populated mainly by working class and Third World people. The cur-rent site, in the flatlands, is con-venient for most students to reach.

Of course, the new campus will be convenient for some. The Oakbe convenient for some. The Cak-land power structure maintains its estates in the hills. For their offspring it's just a short zip in the Camaro to the new Merritt. Rallies were held by S.D.S Tues-day at both Merritt and Laney Col-

leges, the two existing schools in the Peralta Junior College District Afterwards, car caravans made the long, tedious journey up the hill to the new Merritt site.

The place has a spectacular view of the Bay Area. It's a beautiful site - for a park, not a college. An entire hill has been levelled and preliminary construction

is in progress.

Overlooking the hill campus is an enormous estate. It perches on a rocky crag and is surrounded by a high fence of cyclone and barbed wire. Floodlights are posted all around the grounds. A true mountain bastion of law and order gone paranoid.

Nearby we saw a model of what

Merritt might look like. Skyline High, the "elite" Oakland public school, is just a short rope climb Merritt might look like. Skyline High, the "elite" Oakland public school, is just a short rope climb up the mountain range. Skyline has got to be the best fenced school in the world. San Quentin's security isn't nearly as imposing as Skyline's

As one student said, "They couldn't put a most around Merritt so they decided to build it up here." In the uptight Oakland hills

here," In the uptight Cakland hills no moat is necessary. The area is possessed by a fortress mentality. After the inspection, the students went to the Peralta district office. They presented a demand that a public meeting be held to explain the reasons for this untenable site to the community. If not, they vowed to return and interfere with construction.

At the rally, the hill campus was assailed as a racist plan to divide white and Third World power. They said courses leading to higher pay-

said courses leading to higher pay-ing jobs will be offered on the hill. Laney, which will have to serve the entire flatlands population, will be severely overcrowded four years after construction. This will deprive thousands of flatlands people of an education, they said.

They might not have to worry about stopping the hill campus. Like

the Maginot Line, Fortress Merritt might be vulnerable. The new cam-pus is built on fill land perched on a hill. It is right on top of the Hayward Fault Line.

# **TO SAVE REDWOODS BOTH SIDES BEEFING UP** IN BOLINAS RIDGE BATTLE

A month ago an Oregon logging outfit, moved up on the forested ridge above the town of Bolinas, and began cutting redwood on some 1460 acres of the Righetti Ranch. For three weeks they worked uninterrupted, clearing out great stands of the ancient trees, the snarl of long-bladed chainsaws mingling with the snap of cracking timber and the roar of giant trees falling

to the earth.

For the moment the people of Bolinas and nearby Stinson Beach were silent, some decrying the fact while refusing to get involved, others, the younger ones, talked of sabotage.

An ordinance prohibited learner

An ordinance prohibited logging in Marin County for a 90-day morain Marin County for a so-day indica-torium period, during which time the county was to consider making a permanent ban, but the loggers on the Righetti Ranch managed to get their operation excepted from the moratorium.

Then last Monday about forty of us, met at the junction of the logging road with Highway One, about four to five miles north about four of Bolinas.

Several of us drove up the logging and to tree line, where the cutting and begun. We spend about an our wandering around through a wandering around through a vast area of once-forrested hill-side now covered with debris, waist deep in branches and truncated tree tops, interrupted here and there by bulldozed roads.

So little soil cover was left at erosion had in places already that erosion had in places already begun; we saw at once that when next winter's rains begin most of the topsoil on this part of the ridge is sure to wash off into the watershed of the Bolinas Lagoon. The increased siltation which will result from this means the end of the lagoon, and hence of the many waterfowls and shorebirds that live off it. off it.
So for about two hours we stood

So for about two hours we stood around, a few with signs, "Stop Raping Our Land", "Save Our Trees" one with an American flag imprinted simply with the letters, "Stop Logging."

The timber-truck drivers grinned as they went by, gearing down as they came out onto the highway, their rigs scattering scraps of redwoodbark on the road. Feeling stupid and ineffective, we decided to begin parking our cars directly in front of the logging directly in front of the logging road to block the trucks.

Soon after we had jammed up the road we heard a second full truck coming down from the ridge. It

slowed as it came round the last ods to hassle the loggers before bend above our blockade, then all our trees are gone. started to accelerate and we stepped We have begun to hassle the forward to block the road with our bodies. The driver brought his rig

to a stop about a foot in front of us.

After an hour and a half the cops had arrived in sufficient numbers to force us to remove our cars, and the trucks, by now backed part way up the hillside, roared the country of the country o through,

Tuesday morning we returned in Tuesday morning we returned in greater numbers, and when the rumble of the first truck sounded from the ridge we walked forward to occupy the road. The truck slowed to a crawl until it reached us, then began pushing us slowly on to the highway, its air horn blaring, its driver gunning the engine to scare us.

Seeing that we could not stop

him by standing up, we lay down di-

all our trees are gone.

We have begun to hassle the logging trucks on the roads from Bolinas to Richmond, using hit and run tactics and chosing our own locations rather than sitting where the cops can easily arrest us. Already we have the loggers on the defensive: Some have even admitted that the conventions is a sixty of the conventions in th that the operation is an irresponsible one; friction is developing between the company and individual truck drivers over loss in pay resulting from our holdups. Now fearing that they may soon be faced with a restraining order, the ecompany is trying to recruit more men and to get all the trees cut before the time originally planned. What we in Bolinas have felt best about since our protest began is the way that a small group in the beginning has beginn to involve

beginning has begun to involve



rectly in front of the truck. We the stayed there for about an hour and a half before the cops arrested seven of us and took us to San Rafael, and broke up the demonstration for the day.

Wednesday morning there were more than sixty of us waiting for the first truck to come down, and again arrests, this time eight people handcuffed, frisked, and sent off to San Rafael, Again the cops forced us to disperse. That day we had also sent out a letter, to all the people in Bolinas asking for support.

support.

We are now in the process of organizing a complaint by the landowners of Bolinas and Stinson Beach against the logging company. Court action on this could result in at least a temporary restraining or-der on the logging, and would give us time to work out further meth-

the whole community, including straights, in the problem of saving our redwood ridge.

# REALTOR SAYS RENT **STRIKE IS** 'FUTILE'

Than's the cry from 35 tenants of 2335 Dwight Way, a three-story pink and grey monstrosity that was built eight years ago. The tenants are withholding rent until a number of conditions are

corrected.

A notice, signed by 35 of the building's 60 tenants, was sent to the Cyril Stevenson Realty Co. (also known as Sather Gate Realty)

which manages the building,
Repair of existing fire hoses
and extinguishers, installation of
fire equipment where none exists,
repair of washers and dryers,
provision of vacuum cleaners and provision of vacuum cleaners and adequate hall and underground garage lighting are among the conditions listed in the notice, according to John Harling, one of the strike organizers.

"We'll stick it out all the way," Harling told BAPE.

the strike organizers.

"We'll stick it out all the way,"
Harling told BARB.

"The management has replaced a faulty pump in the swimming pool and done a few other things that don't cost much money, but they haven't made any real improvements," said Harling.

BARB visited the building Wednesday, A 20-foot pool of water had collected around the drain in the parking garage. The garage has only one 75 watt bulb to light it. The laundry room had an even smaller 40 watt bulb. One of the dryers was out-of-order. There was broken glass in the bottom of a pool in the back yard and the water was filthy.

The pool has been sprayed by the Alameda County Mosquito Abatement District, said Harling.
What will management do?

"Most of those complaints are inconsequential annway," Cyril Stevenson, Jr. told BARB.

"If a burner on the stove doesn't work, it's no big thing - unless you want to bake a cake or something," said Stevenson.

"From a legal point of view, they can be evicted in three days.

"We have plenty of prospects for those one-bedroom apartments - they're the easiest thing in the world to rent in Berkeley.

"Whether their gripes are germaine or not is not the point; rents would go up 30 per cent if those repairs were made," said Stevenson. (A one-bedroom furnished apartment rents for \$155 a month, BARB was told.)

"These are reasonable rents for Berkeley - extremely reasonable. "Listen, we have our problems, too. We only represent the owner.

too. We only represent the owner.
"She got this building out of a
divorce and doesn't have the money

to maintain it; besides she has too many mortgages on it.

"The owner just doesn't have the money to do the things that should be done - but she would like to," he said.

"What with excessive taxation, profit margins are down to only five or six per cent - and that's tight," added Stevenson.

So what about the lighting, the drainage, the broken glass, the

drainage, the broken glass, the laundry? And what's to be done in case of fire?

to donate his body for organ transplants, but the coroner ruled that since the death was a homocide, no organs could be transplanted. Official investigations into the shooting by Berkeley police and the District Attorney cleared Kline and his partner, Frank Reynolds, and indicated that no inquest was

The request was made by Berkeley attorney Mary Montgomery, who is representing Bartley's family. Last week, attorney Montgomery told BARB that murder charges would be filed against the two of-

would be filed against the two officers.

bring this incident before the public's attention," he added.

Leo Laurence, press officer for the Committee for Homosexual Freedom, told BARB that the demonstration did not go far enough, "We are not interested in these absurd official reports of an official murder," said Laurence, "CHF is demanding that the two officers involved be suspended immediately and remain off the force until murder charges against them are tried in court.

"We want these killers off the streets," he said.

CHF is also demanding that Chief Baker issue immediate orders to his men to cease harrassment of home. ment and entrapment of homo-sexuals or resign his post, Lau-

sexuals or resign his post, Laurence added.

# **GAY STRIKE HITS** SOUTHERN FRONT

The "Pink Panthers" are at-tacking the States Steamship Comtacking the States Steamship Com-pany on two fronts as the strike by the Committee for Homosexual Freedom spread this week from San Francisco to Los Angeles. Fifteen pickets led by the Rev.

San Francisco to Los Angeles.
Fifteen pickets led by the Rev.
Troy Perry of Huntington Park,
CHF Chairman in Los Angeles,
started picketing the States Lines'
L.A. offices Wednesday noon.
Meanwhile, over 30 CHF members, dubbed "Pink Panthers,"
were simultaneously hitting the
company's offices at 320 California St. in San Francisco's
crowded financial district.
Pickets in Los Angeles disturbed the steamship company enough
that their officials personally
visited the picket line. In San
Francisco, States Lines executives have steadfastly avoided confronting the homosexual protestors. testors.

"It was the biggest thing in downtown L.A.," says Rev. Perry.
"We had over 200 people that crowded around the picket line amazed at the courage of our people."

people."

The LA picket line at 6th & Flower streets was made up primarily of young homosexuals, plus a large number of seminary students from Claremont School of Theology, most of whom are straight.

"The attitude of the kids here," says Rev. Perry, "is that it's time we do something to show Los Angeles that we're not going to stand idly by anymore and watch our gay community get pushed around. We intend to keep this up every weekday noonhour until we win our freedom."

we win our freedom."

In San Francisco, "the picket line is a steady flow of about fifteen people a day," says Gale Whittington, 21, an attractive blond Accounting Clerk and CHF Chairman. The "Pink Panthers" charge he was fired only because he publicly showed he was gay.
"I know we are irritating people a great deal inside the company," Whittington says. "They are getting tired of it.
"The enthusiasm on the line is

Whittington says. "They are getting tired of it.

"The enthusiasm on the line is growing. We are singing more songs and yelling for Freedom more," Whittington explained.

"More people on the line are holding hands or embracing showing that we, too, can and should show affection in public."

"We are supporting any group fighting for freedom, especially the blacks and anti-war groups."

A CHF delegation was at the "Free Huey" rally on May Day, Whittington report to BARB at presstime Thursday.

"Our picket line is almost too polite considering two homosexual killings in two months by the pigs, undersirable discharges by the military, gay suicides and murders, increased taxation of homo-

sexual married couples, rejection by most churches, harassment in the Tenderloin, and blatant discrimination against gays in employment," says Leo Laurence. The CHF is already hurting for money. A small bank account is almost empty. CHF activities may come to an end unless contribu-

come to an end unless contribu-tions are sent soon to CHF, 15 Beaver St., SF 94114, a CHF spokesman said.

The resumption of the sit-in which two weeks ago had occupied the Applied Electronics Laboratory came after the Stanford Tustees failed to take any action regarding war-related research on campus.

As fifty members of campus Young Americans for Freedom, to (william F. Buckley's rightist young corps) tried to block engrance to the hall, militants of the April 3 Movement entered the April 3 Movement entered the through the rear and let in 200 gof the throng of 800 which had marched to the hall.

The decision to take the hall was made in a long mass meeting which saw a three-hour lapse between the decision to sit in and the decision of which hall to occupy. This gap probably resulted in the

the decision of which hall to occupy. This gap probably resulted in the transfer of the classified files out of Encinal Hall, which serves as administrative and communications center for the campus.

Shortly after the students moved into the four-story building, Dean of Students Joel Smith along with several faculty members and campus police entered to warn the students that they were suspended. Smith was warned back that the

students that they were suspended. Smith was warned back that the building was liberated and that he would have to leave. The students then proceeded not to pay attention to the Dean.

At this hour the building is reported quiet, with students bedding down in sleeping bags and funds being collected for provisions. Campus police are reported posted in the building, a procedure which has been followed in every Stanford sit-in so far.

By Thursday noon, students had left the building upon the arrival of busloads of Santa Clara County

The students marched to President Pitzer's office but he was not

The Bureau of Indian Affairs "has been set up to do away with our people," said La Nada Means at the UC Student Union Monday night.


For a crowd of about eighty, the president of United Native Americans was running down the kind of brainwash and de-Indianization that her people are going through.

cans was running down the kind of brainwash and de-Indianization that her people are going through. Starting in on education, La Nada said the Indian's only real choice is between reform school or one of those run by the BIA. Describing these, La Nada said they are run strictly "by the bell." There are matrons, separate dorms for the "bad girls" and rules everywhere you look. To sharpen your sense of identity, some teachers will cheerfully begin class with terms like, "Now, all you little Indian children..."

To crown this, La Nada described the Summer Home Program, under which the school children are indentured to white families until school resumes in the fall. This is nothing but assimilation, she said, and the money is sent back to the school.

"They don't want any Native Americans here at Cal," said La Nada, noting the present enrollment of 18 (twice the pre-strike See page 16





CONSTIPATED COSMOLOGY

THIS WEEK: CAN GOD COPE?

Since the release of his latest album, there has been a lot of speculation and consternation about where Bob Dylan's head is at these days.
While some of Dylan's fans are

While some of Dylan's fans are willing to unquestioningly follow the leader without quite knowing why, most of us are confused and a little disappointed about NASH-VILLE SKYLINE without quite wanting to admit it.

So far, the music critics have been (mostly) apologetic about the new album, but have been hesitant to condemn something they basically don't like. They know that Dylan has been right before when they thought he was wrong - that's

cally don't like. They know that Dylan has been right before when they thought he was wrong - that's why they're critics and he's the artist. So we're told that this new aspect of Bob Dylan may be hard to groove on at first, but we should really try because he must mean SOMETHING -- that Bob Dylan is a groovy guy and if this is his trip we should go along with it. People felt much the same way a few years ago when Dylan, after his third album, switched from folk to rock guitar. At that time however, the critics were not so timid about condemning him. Some were delighted at the prospects of him ending his scathing social attacks, while others, the folk-purists (whatever that may mean) accused him of selling out to the Electronic Age (whatever that may mean.)

During a 1965 concert in Chi-

mean.)
During a 1965 concert in Chicago, a segment of the audience walked out in protest when Dylan began the second half of his per-

formance with an electric guitar.

Dylan has since proved that he was way ahead of his critics then,

and he is probably at least far ahead of them now. While now. While the

and he is probably at least as far ahead of them now. While the critics, to avoid the possibility of sticking their feet in their respective mouths once again, make patronizing excuses for his latest LP, it is quite possible that Dylan has something entirely different in mind.

I personally don't care at all for the music of NASHVILLE SKYLINE; I think it's the worst album that Dylan has made, the only one I can say I dislike. Compared to (as the title implies) the outlaw style of country and western in JOHN WESLEY HARDING, which while being very different was still a Dylanesque progression, NASHVILLE SKYLINE is innocuous, lifeless, and without any real

NASHVILLE SKYLINE is innocuous, lifeless, and without any real focal point.

All of his other albums have been characterized by a very profound sensitivity, a social conscience, which this album lacks. In fact, it was this distinguishing factor which turned his melodies to music, his lyrics to neetry. music, his lyrics to poetry.

whey Dylan wrote "The Times They Are A-Changin" it was more a prophecy than a description of the social situation five years ago; yet the song was the precursor of the whole new culture that emerged in this country of which rock music and ROLLING STONE are only a part. "Only a Pawn in Their Game" was written long before most of us had any idea of the nature of southern politics, national politics, or even R. D. Laing's "politics of experience"; but it still stand as the most accurate description of American political methodology. American political methodology.

I don't believe that the author

of these songs, and all the succeeding has suddenly forceeding ones has suddenly for-gotten or neglected that very per-sonal style of ethics and clarity of observation which gave all of his music life.

But neither do I believe that

there is some special quality to the music of his new album which I'm just not catching on to right

now.

If we have to have an answer to these question I suggest we might find it if we listen, not so much to what Dylan is singing in NASH-VILLE SKYLINE, but who he's singing to — and listen, not to what he is SAYING, but rather look at what he is DOING. If we try that, we might just find that the Mesabi Iron Range of Hibbing, Minn, is really not that far from Minn. is really not that far from the recording studios of Nashville,

Tenn.
One of the most disturbing things about Dylan is that he comes on not like one of US anymore, but like a real country and western singer. This feeling is reinforced by the very explicit allicance be-tween Dylan and Johnny Cash. What is strange is not the dif-ference between Dylan and Cash, but the difference between their respective audiences.

Bob Dylan has become the most widely known manifestation of the new culture in this country, the culture of young people who have refused to play the game of living 20th century style where life has merely become a series of properly programmed responses stored on magnetic tape and played over and over again — the culture which has told the Closed Corporover and over again -- the culture which has told the Closed Corpor-ation of this country that it will

not be part of the violence, hatred, and greed which the Corporation uses to perpetuate itself. Through his music, Bob Dylan has become that culture's poet and its prophet. To many of its members, he has become their tribal chief.

To many of its members, he has become their tribal chief.

Johnny Cash on the other hand, finds his audience in the traditional country and western market — among the southern and non-urban whites, especially of the lower classes. Among all the "Tennessee Sutds" north and south of the Mason-Dixon line who hate niggers, hippies, commies, and jews. Among all of the blue-veined rednecks swelled with hate who are taking their frustrations out on you and me —— In short Johnny Cash's audience is composedbasically of Bob Dylan's "pawns in their game."

Cash joins Dylan on the first band of NASHVILLE SKYLINE, singing "Girl From the North Country" and writes a tribute to him on the back of the album. Is Johnny Cash talking to you and me —— do we need to be told what a groovy guy Bob Dylan is? I don't think so.

LOSING, Catch-22 is alreadyhere;
the air rights over the cuckoo's
nest extend even into the desert
of New Mexico; and the Dean
Moriarty's are being castrated or
retiring prematurely to Long Island.

Those of us who have tried to live in a way which allows us to maintain some amount of self respct have become an inefficient malfunctioning part in an other-wise well-oiled smoothly running machine.

Those of us who know that the Corporation, in its greed, is destroying everything of natural beauty, then replacing it with a plastic substitute it can sell back to us at a profit, have become subversive.

The new culture and its products have become a threat to the Corporation's existence, and like a machine with a built-in self-preservation instinct, that culture will be rehabilitated, bought out, or destroyed — its products will be turned into a marketable commodity and thus a socially desirable form of be-

marketable commodity and thus a socially desirable form of behavior.

This may sound like I'm on a very heavy political trip, but I am no more a politico (of any stripe) than I am a music critic. There are simply some situations which are best described in political terms, that can best be explained by political perversion. When I see so many of the people I dig being fucked over, the explanation is a political one, So also is the fact that the culture I identify with has become the victim of more violence, greed, and hatred than the amount whose existence made the creation of that culture necessary.

The intruments of that violence destroying our form of "antisocial behavior" are Johnny Cash's rednecks, Bob Dylan's pawns. We are their victims, and if we don't get them off our backs soon and get together with them, the machine's survival instinct will have won.

The only relevent political survival act today is to unite the

The only relevent political survival act today is to unite the pawns and their victims — anything else, as Jim Morrison showed us in Miami, is only jacking off against the wall.

Maybe that's where Bob Dylan's head is at.

ANSWER: Female sterilization re-

quires making incisions in the ab-dominal wall, cutting the fallopian tubes and suturing (sewing up)

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method involves making an incision in the back of the vagina and gain-ing access to the tubes without cutting the abdominal wall. When the tubes are tied off in this fashion, spermatozoa entering

the uterus cannot meet the ova, or eggs, released by the ovaries and traveling down the fallopian tubes. Once the tubes are severed, chances for pregnancy are extremely small. Even attempts at

tremely small. Even attempts at reuniting severed tubes (if the woman later changes her mind) are most often unsuccessful.

The chances of finding a gynecologist who would sterilize a childless 23 year old woman are also extremely small. Your potential child-bearing years could last another 20 years or more and no one can foresee where your head might be during that time.

your head might be during that time.

A study of birth control pill side effects completed recently in England showed an increased incidence of blood clots, some of which were fatal. These findings have been disputed by some American physicians. Assuming that the study was valid, it may be that the new lower dose pill forms have decreased these side effects. have decreased these side effects. A study of this question in American women is scheduled for completion this summer. At present there is no recommended limitation on the length of time the pills may safely be used.
