# **BACKGROUND** TO TREACHERY

Backed into his corner, UC's top rat lashed out Tuesday morning with a four-page statement that was the final official word on People's Park. It's coming

"I've never seen anything like it." said Pat Carey, a park sup-porter, referring to the state-

"I've never seen anything like it." said Pat Carey, a park supporter, referring to the statements.

"He must have blown his mind; it's absurd."

It began last Friday morning when UC Chancellor Roger W. Heyns met with Sim van der Ryn, professor of architecture and chairman of Heyns' advisory committee on housing and environment; ASUC Senator Jondavid Bachrach, and Wendy Schlesinger, a member of the People's Park negotiation committee (which was formed this Wednesday).

Heyns gave the committee two and a half days to come up with means "to facilitate the design of a process to get a plan," van der Ryn said.

During the Friday meeting, Heyns offered a compromise proposal which showed his total misunderstanding of People's Park and the community spirit that built it.

Despite misgivings about Heyns intentions, the committee held public hearings Saturday and prepared for its final meeting with Heyns Monday morning.
"Monday, the committee suggested that the park be declared an environmental design research field station," said van der Ryn.

"Heyns told us that we weren't giving him enough room to maneuver; he felt backed into a corner," he added.

Heyns' statement stresses over and over that it is the university and only the university that is of concern in the People's Park issue.

"I indicated that although the need for playing fields was important and had to be met, the plan might well be modified to accomodate the interest of other university recreational needs and purposes. I stated the following limits on a

recreational needs and purposes. I stated the following limits on a modified final design: I. the functions of the field must be related to university needs, particularly

space. 2. the area must remain under the control of the university, under the control of the university, with respect to planning and eventual use, 3. the field must not present police or other control problems, 4. it must not be used for the gathering of large crowds for meeting purposes."

And again:

"The northeast area can then be developed as an outdoor recreational area to include greenery and play equipment for the children of married students."

Campus activist Paul Glusman

Campus activist Paul Glusman commented that the children of unmarried students could have the word "illegitimate" stamped on

word "illegitimate" stamped on their foreheads so they could be kept out of the park.
And as a finale:
"The university is now prepared to proceed with site development.
"This property (Bowditch, Haste and Dwight) belongs to The Regents of the University of California and will not be available to unauthorized persons.
"Any equipment or other property on these premises not belonging to the University and no removed promptly may be deemed to be abandoned.
"Moreover, persons on these

"Moreover, persons on these premises without authority from the university shall be subject to the laws prohibiting trespass," at Heyns also accuses the park supporters of "conviently forgotten fact that the field is indeed the university's."

Heyns conveniently forgot that
the university used its power of
eminent domain to act in the public interest when it acquired the
land in June, 1967, and drove hundreds of students and street people out of fine old houses because

the Berkeley police were worried about a drug problem.

He also conveniently forgot that the "precious million dollars" used to pay for those houses is

# A STRANGE ALLIANCE

On that first Sunday when the park was started, I got there at about 5:00 o'clock. My children had been there most of the afternoon. The grass was laid under the clump of trees, a flower grotto had been started, it seemed almost a hudred people were digging with picks, shoveling, raking, hoe-

ing -- working with a joy and a hunger that hit me and laved me. If I had been asked the week before to help do this thing I would have thought it couldn't be done. I would have said no, sadly. At 5:00 o'clock on the first Sunday I wept, shamed by my over-thirty defeatism; filled with a singing at

this living, sweating, beautiful hu-manism, grateful that "they" had started it. My children have no father. At

started it.

My children have no father, At the park, any time any day, there are five or twenty young men being fatherly, brotherly, friendly. One is standing with my 6 yr. old son helping him use a pick, Two more are rough-housing with my 4 yr. old son and he is ecstatic. Another is comforting my 7 yr. old girl who has twisted her ankle.

On a Tuesday morning a swing breaks and before the child has stopped crying there are two or three young men at the swing-repairing, caring. The child begins to smile and asks to help. The young men work with the child and the swing is fixed. The mother—myself—stands with tears in her eyes.

the swing is fixed. The mother—myself—stands with tears in her eyes.

On the news one night a commentator spoke of the park as "creating a strange allicance of street people and housewives." It does not seem strange to me. Whatever otherlabels public—relations people give, we are and remain people. People working and caring together is not strange. It is health. "They": bearded, long—haired, alien, and slightly frightening; they have started all this for me and my children. Every day since 5:00 o'clock on the first Sunday my children and I have been at the park, working and being. It's not "they" anymore; it's "we."

I am so tired of negation: protests, demonstrations, violence and hate. The creating of this park is a surge of everything that is best in people—joy, caring, growing, sharing, creating, being.

People of the University and the City: Will you form a "strange alliance" with me? I will talk with you, I will negotiate (whatever that means) with you. Let's be people together. Join us.

### **MEDICS** READY TO HELP

For the past several weekends the 15-member, medically neutral Revolutionary Community Medical Corps has been at People's Park giving first aid for small cuts and bruises, but Mike Baxter, co-ordinator of the Corps, fears more serious injuries will occur if attempts are made to destroy People's Park, "Our job will be to give medical aid to the defenders of the park if the University moves on them," Baxter says.

Every Wednesday classes in first aid--for small wounds, mace, tear gas, and shock therapy--are given at the Free Church by the Medical Corps. Chuck Mc-Allister, a former Navy medic is in charge. The classes are at 7pm and are open to all interested people.

"The pigs are coming. 35 just left the Berkeley police station." And the Battle of People's Park was on.

The call came in to BARB at 3 a.m. Thursday.

3 a.m. Thursday. Ten minutes later, the 100 odd defenders of People's Park were warned and the

later, the 100 odd defenders of People's Park were warned and the battle of nerves began.

By 3:30, the whole south campus area was swarming with Berkeley and California Highway Patrol cars. Over 30 CHP cars filed along Collage Ave. headed for the UC parking garage below the tennis courts on Bancroft. This was the same staging area used during the TWLF strike.

Superjoel was screaming about the Fremont cops coming up the expressway. The defenders milled around in small groups, catching up on the latest rumors or trying to spot cop cars.

John Simon and I walked up to the staging area where three Rapid Transit buses line the curb and nearly 200 Berkeley and CHP pigs stood in small groups, checking helmets, gas masks and other gear.

Back at People's Park other de-

Back at People's Park, other de-fenders watched several CHP pigs sneak into the three-story white apartment building at Dwight and Hillegass to emerge moments later on the roof.

A warning about trespass and the arrest of violators was read twice over a bull horn. The officer in charge told the people that "personal property" on the park ground would be deemed abandoned. There were so many reporters and photowere so many reporters and photo-

were so many reporters and photo-graphers around that the people couldn't get very close to the pig on the bull horn.

The pig squad backed off and the defenders melted and split for the sidewalks, which were thought to be safe turf. Three guys re-mained seated around the dying fire. The pigs waited two minutes then moved in, explained their then moved in, explained their rights and busted them.

The three refused to give their names to the pigs. Two of them went limp and were dragged across Haste to the waiting paddy wagon.

Using the Sproul Hall routine, the pigs stood the first guy up against the wagon, held acardwith "Ib" on it up to his chest and took his picture, then pushed him in the wagon.

Numbers "2b" and "3b" mained limp through the routine. They were dragged and pushed into the wagon.

THURSDAY 5 PM.-The People's War started shortly after noon at Telegraph and Haste in Berkeley today.

One of the first to be felled was Gentle Waters, BARB circulation manager. He took a .38 calibre through the hip and forearm and was still bleeding as he phoned the facts to BARB at press time.

Ron Alexander, BARB cameraman and ex-Green Beret was also wounded with shotgun pellets in the hand.

"I was running across a parking lot at Channing Way," Gentle Waters told BARB, "and the pigs were chasing us with their guns drawn at hip level.

"Suddenly I heard distinct gunshots. I felt a pain in my arm and felt the blood flowing.

"I saw someone hit square in the chest and go down," he said, there to Chancellor Heyns' office. Gentle Waters found shelter along with four wounded brothers in a lers appeared at the substitute

"I saw someone hit square in the chest and go down," he said. GentleWaters found shelter along with four wounded brothers in a Gentle Waters found shelter along with four wounded brothers in a private residence hall near by. At least two of the others were victims of pig bullets, he said, the other two could have been from shrapnel from baseball grenades.

Later in Herrick Hospital, Gentle Waters found that he had been shot with a .38, and that a slightly different angle would have fatally pierced his colon.

National guard jeeps now patrol the streets seeking out groups of people. They threw tear gas at them and then fire into the scattering crowd with shotguns. At least 5 reports are in of shootings with .38 slugs.

The KPFA mobile truck witnessed this methodical massacre. Pigs have been firing indiscriminately at people on roof-tops, at fleeing victims, and at people mere feet away.

Berkeley pigs, Alameda County deputies, Highway Patrol, and SF Tactical squad goons are roaming the streets of the south campus area, some armed with Stoner Assault Rifles, the pig version of the M-16.

The war began when a group of 100 pigs stopped a march to People's Park from campus and attacked with tear gas, grenades

lers appeared at the substitute Sproul Plaza rally.

Sproul Plaza railly.

Dan Siegel, President - elect of the Associated Students, said, "we must show to Heyns and the other bums who run this campus that the Park belongs to the people, and I say to take the park!"

At that the cry went up of "take the park!" and the crowd began to move down Telgraph Avenue.

A line of pigs halted the marchers, estimated at 3000, at Haste and the mayhem began. People scattered and reformed in small groups, some heading for campus. It was like a scene from "The Battle of Algiers," said an eyewitness.

Telegraph Ave. merchants were at in the streets wetting down cople's handkerchiefs for tear

gas relief.

The pigs were reportedly gassing every intersection every ten minutes.

minutes.

The general tear gas attack rapidly spread down Telegraph Avenue and through the South Campus area.

Around Derby two men fell victims to Alameda County Sheriffs pigs who fired shotguns at point-blank range into the crowd without provocation.

People were seen moving up

Parker street waving a bloodied
sheet as a flag.

A barricade was erected at
Dwight and Dana by the people,
who held off the pigs with water
hoses.

who neld out the page whoses.

A man was shot in the back by a pig shotgun on the Avenue.

Crazed pigs then fired into the crowd immediately and felled at

least one more. Tom Luddy of the Telegraph Re-pertory Cinema approached some pigs on the street and told them they were shooting his employees.

"That's what you get for fucking around," sneered the hog.

### WHAT THEY SAW

"I am a student at SF State. My name is Mike. What I saw happened about twoblocks up Telegraph Avenue from Derby-near the Chevron Station.
"Alameda County Sherriffs marched down the Avenue with shotguns from Derby street. They stood around for five minutes and the people stayed in front of them.
"The guy nearest to the pigs

"The guy nearest to the pigs turned around and started to go away. The cop aimed his shot-gun and shot him, it looked like in the ass.

"The guy grabbed his stomach and wiggled around on the ground. He stopped when he reached the

curb. "They fired five more shots at the people; into the crowd. I didn't see anyone else fall; I was busy leaving.

### WHO COUNTS WITH CITY **FATHERS**

The Berkeley City Council heard over 100 citizens plead the pros and cons of mechanical traffic control devices in Claremont, seat of wealth and power in our town, for nearly three hours Tuesday night, then dispensed with People's Park in nine minutes.

Most of the people involved in the traffic dispute own a \$500,000 house in Claremont, curse the university and make their bread off the students. Therefore, the city council heard each and every concerned citizen speek his piece. city council heard each and every concerned citizen speak his piece about whether or not the traffic control device would be retained on Claremonf Ave, near the intersection of Ashby Ave.

Mayor Wallace Johnson, who presides at council meetings, went through the audience row-by-row, making sure that the voice of the people was heard on this vital issue.

Then, at two minutes after mid-

Then, at two minutes after mid-night, when the crowd had dwin-dled to about 30 concerned citizens, the Mayor decided that "the prob-lem of People's Park" could be

cliscussed.

Craig Murphy, a spokesman for the Berkeley Coalition, was scheduled to speak on the agenda. Six other citizens had turned in cards with the city clerk, requesting an appearance before the council. However, these citizens did not live in Claremont and were treated accordingly.

"Since the Chancellor has stated his policy on People's Park, we ought to review it and then decide if we are going to hear the public on this issue," said Johnson.

The now-famous statement from Chancellor Roger Heyns was UC Chancellor Roger Heyns was read. The mayor then commented that he thought "it is inherently a university issue."

Councilman John DeBonis replied, "It is a city issue."

"They are running a sewer line up there and building an outhouse without a plumbing permit," he added.

This convinced the rest of the council that at least Craig Murphy

should be given two minutes to speak. The other six were ruled irrelevant.

Murphy rapped about the need for a park in the south campus area and urged the city to buy the land for a park. He was not quite through when Johnson rudely in-terrupted him to end the two mi-

through when Johnson rudely interrupted him to end the two minute session.

DeBonis then asked Murphy some important questions.

"What do you have to say about the 11-year-old child who was running around there last week passing around a marijuana cigarette," he asked.

"I feel that the city has an obligation to enforce the building code and sanitation requirements," said DeBonis, who was off on a trip of his own.

'I warned the regents several weeks ago that this was going to be a confrontation issue," he said.

"Why don't they have to get a permit to build an outhouse, if I have to get one to add a bathroom to my house," added DeBonis, revealing his basic anal fixation.

Several people rapped about the need for publicity, door-to-door efforts to get support and contact with church and civic groups in Berkeley.

A list of 84 people was set up so that a 24-hour, round the clock command station could be set up in the park. The command station will always be manned by two people with a telephone for the next week or until the crisis passes. It is the Berkeley Gazette, and It is the Berkeley Gazette, and its proto-fascist editor Mike Culbert, who day after day have been saying that "the controversy over the 'People's Park'... is in fact a 'confrontation issue' "; that it is an "engineered, contrived, phony, dishonest, agit-prop event" designed in Havana or Peking:that "the good-hearted folks suckered into building the 'people's park'

"the good-hearted folks suckered into building the 'people's park' have no idea they are probably being used, once again, for Confrontation Issue No. 5314."

It is Heyns who is going to put up a fence and tear down the park, and who issued the "stern warning" that "persons on these premises without authority from the University shall be subject to the laws prohibiting trespass."

Heyns' statement implies that

### UC (BERK) VILLAGE STENCH

"It stinks so badly that my eyes arn when I come home," UC burn when I come home," UC studet Thomas Jordan told the Berkeley city council Tuesday

Jordan and his wife, along with 1,000 other families living in UC's Albany Village, were protesting the foul stench that has settled their housing project for the three months.
The disgusting odor is so

strong that you can even smell it when we are cooking," said Jor-

dan.

The council looked on in polite sympathy as Jordan wove his tale of woe before them.

The trouble, it seems, can be traced to one of two sources. First is the Berkeley dump, which is a means of filling in a part of the Bay with garbage and trash. To keep the Bay out of the dump, a retaining wall was built and excess water is pumped back into the Bay. The stagnate pond around the dump is one source of the stench.

stench.

Second, five or six industrial firms in East Berkeley are dumping their wastes into the Gilman Avenue storm sewer discharge into the Bay. The "industrial contaminates" are also a source of the big stink.

Councilman John DeBonis criti-

Councilman John DeBonis criticized City Manager William Hanley for allowing the contractor who is responsible for the land fill and dump operation for allowing this to happen,

Hanley, whose voice reminds you of well-oiled machinery, claimed that the contractor was not at fault and that the Gilman Avenue storm sewer was the only source of trouble.

Meanwhile, Mr. and Mrs. Jordan

Meanwhile, Mr. and Mrs. Jordan went on to debate the possible sources of the big stink and whether or not something was being done or could be done.

The matter was "resolved"

done or could be done.

The matter was "resolved" when City Manager Hanley promised to report back to the council with "some firm idea of when each of the five or six firms can be expected to begin to take corrective action to eliminate the source of these odors, which is a highly complex problem, since there are many possible sources within each firm that have to be traced."

During this time, the polluted water will continue to stagnate in the Berkeley dump, the six companies will continue to dump industrial wastes into the storm sewer and Tom Jordan's eyes will continue to burn, baby, burn.



There's no such thing as the right to bear arms, in a revolution it's your duty, regardless of your sex. The thing is that capitalism has fucked up women's minds (and men's, too, for that matter) to the extent that "nice" women are supposed to shriek at

women are supposed to shriek at the sight of a gun and be totally terrified of it. And for women to take karate to learn to defend themselves from the pigs...!

themselves from the pigs...!

It's definitely the case that
women have a whole ideological
history to struggle against inorder
to become skilled revolutionaries.
For example, all forms of fighting have capitalist-traditionally
been boy's play, and most women
have never even seen a fight up
close, much less participated in
one.

I don't think most women could I don't think most women could ever become as good fighters as men, purely for size and strength reasons, but it is important that we overcome our fear of fighting and learn to defend ourselves ad-equately and by any means neces-sary.

equately and by any means neces-sary.

Women's liberation isn't on a civil rights trip, and we don't need a man to project his confu-sion about that on us, Women's liberation isn't fighting for equal-ity, or equal rights under capital-ism, or any of that shit. We don't want to take over men's jobs in the corporation, we don't want to become bomber pilots and napalm the liberation forces of Vietnam, and we aren't out to emasculate

men by forcing them to sit at home in frilly aprons and masturbate. Women are fighting for their reality as human beings, for their psychic survival. We are fully psychic survival. We are fully aware of the fact that black people are fighting for their survival, and it's obviously true that the pigs aren't vamping on women the way they are on the blacks, Black people

aren't vamping on women the way they are on the blacks. Black people are waging a war against genocide. But let's set things straight. Capitalist ideology and practice puts women in an oppressed, slave situation, although we are not colonial subjects. Women are oppressed by capitalism in similar ways to black people -- most concretely job exploitation and educational discrimination--but more importantly, our minds have been fucked over for 2000 years to accept our position and like it. The American housewife's life is made tolerable by the ruling class throwing tidbits of saranwrapped plasticized timesavers her way. Ironically, I only really became conscious of the totality of the woman's liberation struggle in a conversation I had with Eldridge. He asked me once if I would kill for women's liberation, and I replied that I thought there were probably more important fronts in the struggle where killing would be necessary.

in the struggle where killing would be necessary.

His response to that was crucial for all struggles: "When you are fighting for your own liberation you fight to the death on all fronts."

The struggle for our liberation as women cannot be won in this oppressive system — as a result we are revolutionaries.

As women we are getting our shit together and overcoming the alienation that the system foists on us: as revolutionaries we are

on us; as revolutionaries we are learning and teaching those skills necessary for our survival. We don't hate men (we dig them),

We don't hate men (we dig them), but when men continue to oppress us after they have become conscious of what they are doing then they are part of the enemy. We will fight against our oppressors, regardless of their class, race or sex. We are part of the solution, and we will ally with everyone who wants to overthrow this rotten system.

If you (and a lot of other people) go to the meeting of the board and express your views, there's a better chance they'll decide in favor of the ban.

The meeting will be held in the Civic Center on the edge of San Rafael. Phone the county switchboard (479-1100), ask for the office of the board of supervisors, then ask theoffice what time of day the logging discussion will occur on the agenda. Flood that switch-board.

Bunch of people held a march last Sunday to protest the continuing redwood rip-off on the Righetti ranch. They started at the ranch and walked about five miles down into Bolinas. Lots of kids and dogs. Some music. No arrests and only light police harassment. The U.S. Forest and Range Experimental Station in Berkeley has studied erosion in the south fork area of the Eel River--erosion caused almost entirely by timber

area of the Eel River--erosion caused almost entirely by timber rip-offs. Their figure: 8950 tons per square mile per year. That's six pounds per square yard per year. All of it topsoil, all of it irreplaceable. The soil-situation on the Bolinas Ridge is very similar to the Eel River area.



Even though they had permis-sion from the sheriff's office and county planning department and even though they had an independent consulting forester with them, the loggers wouldn't let them view the operation.

One logger said, "We can't let you on the property because we've had too much vandalism."

"It was a bad trip all the way around," the long-haired yokng Reverend said. "When the cops came they checked all ID's and arrested two of our members as runaways."

Rev. Thompson said one of those

Rev. Thompson said one of those arrested was an AWOL who had just been rescued from the blaze and had second and thid degree burns over his body. "They didn't give him proper medication," the Reverend charged.

Besides losing all their belongings the church members also lost a dog who was trapped inside. The church had previously been hassled by uptights in the area for "harbouring hippie types."

The Church of Tomorrow has been in existence since 1964 when it was licensed by the state of California, Rev. Thompson explained.

in this letter.

Some students feel there is a "purge" of radical and liberal

"jurge" of radical and liberal faculty. Other faculty members are reportedly quitting in disgust. A recent poll shows most students want the school to become co-educational. Recently Wert put to on the line, He said he'd prefer a "respectable demise" (for the college, that is) to going co-ed.

"It's amazing how quickly he's lost the respect of the students," says one student. "I think he should be fired," says another. "But if we forced Wert out," says one, "we'd probably get someone just as bad."

There are only two political

There are only two political

organizations on the Mills campus. They are the B.S.U. and the Third World Liberation Front. Yet Blacks and Third World people constitute only a miniscule portion of the student body. The only white political group dissolved after the demands were met.

Many students agree that the college will achieve its "respectable demise" unless something is done. "It has to learn how to solve current problems," says one. Their solution is to adopt a "wait and see attitude."

They deplore the autocracy of Wert's administration as he consolidates his empire. You can't accuse Mills students of being power hungry. -- R.H.

### **HEYNS'** DIRTY WORK ON TA'S

The bare-fanged face of the Multiversity is again showing from beneath academic robes.

In this case the administration is purging several Teaching Assistants who had been leaders in the fight against official racism. Dale Gronemeier, Vice President of Local 1570 of the American Federation of Teachers, is being given the axe. given the axe.

Last year Gronemeier prepared a report known as the Union White Paper of Racial Discrimination in Employment, citing the U for a miserable minority hirring record. Although Earl Cheit and others Although Earl Cheit and others in the apparatus claimed that they couldn't possibly do better, Gronemeier as part of a six-union committee pushed through a plan which raised the rate of minority employment from 18% to 58%.

Now Gronemeier has been informed that he will not be rehired this June. This is the polite way the University has of saying "you're fired."

'You're fired.'
On May 2, Dale filed a grievance with his department chairman, Dr. Leonard Nathan of the
Dept. of Rhetoric. Nathan's response was straight out of 1984.

"I do not know what procedures are open to you," he wrote,
"Since, in my opinion, you have
no grievance, I have no further
suggestion to make."

On May 3rd or 4th the departon May 3rd or 4th the depart-ment's union grievance files were stolen off of Dale's desk. He filed a complaint with the police and re-quested of Dr. Nathan that he be allowed to copy the originals which were in the Chairman's files.

The secretary relayed the message back that Dr. Nathan "would have to think about it." Gronemeier wrote to Nathan formally requesting the copies and offering to pay for them.

to pay for them.

Back came a letter one sentence long, "...since you have chosen to put yourself in the position of an adversary, further correspondence between us concerning your so-called grievances appears unwarranted."

This can be translated to say, "Fuck you and your union contract too!"

Two others in the Rhetoric De-

tract too!"

Two others in the Rhetoric Department, all AFT members, have received this treatment, too. Gronemeier says that "several of my friends are afraid to be openly associated with me for fear they too will be subjected to attack. I gues this is how it was during the McCarthyism of the 1950's."

On Wednesday, May 14, a rally was held to discuss the case and march to Nathan's office to demand an answer. Nathan wasn't in and the march was not held. The leaflet asked the question, "Is Hayakawa running the rhetoric department?"

partment?"

Later in the afternoon Nathan was confronted by Gronemeier, who read him a list of eleven questions. To each one Nathan replied: "Everything I have to say is in the correspondence on the matter," which was stolen.

Elsewhere in the crackdown is the case of Prof. Yank, who was recommended by Chancellor Heyns to be fired specifically for his strike activities, Yank, who is active with SDS, was the subject of a letter to the Academic Senate from the Iron Chancellor.

ate from the Iron Chancellor.

The letter cited 1) Yank's alleged participation in a serpentine picket line in Barrows Hall, 2) his alleged non-conducting of classes during the strike, 3) his alleged conducting of classes at different times and places than scheduled, and 4) his alleged use of unauthorized sound equipment during an unauthorized rally.

Once again, liberal Chancellor Heyns is pulling the famous trick of foiling the forces of oppression by doing their job for them. He probably does not remember Churchill's adage about an appeaser being one who "feeds a crocodile in the hopes that it will eat him last."

Dr. Nathan Hare, de facto chairman of Black Studies at San Francisco State hasn't faded away during Hayakawa's sanctimonious policing of the campus -- he's gone international with speaking trips to Harvard and London. Hayakawa has told Hare that he has no job for him at SF State because Hare had held the line for a black-controlled Black Studies

black-controlled Black Studies

because Hare had held the line for a black-controlled Black Studies Program. And Hare was one of those who upstaged and angered the Doktor during his speech to the faculty this spring.

From all appearances, Black Studies at SF State is no closer to being implemented than it was before the strike and the "agreement" that ended the strike, Hayakawa has spent his time lately bringing Duke Ellington to his gym to bolster his image and seeing that new flowers are planted all over his campus.

Hare was a panel member at a meeting of the Parents for Self Determination at Howard Preshyterian Church in the Haight Friday night. The purpose of the meeting was to prevent the dissolution of predominantly black schools into the new SF master plan for centralized school complexes.

The other panel members were concerned with fighting the con-

The other panel members were oncerned with fighting the con-olidation plan, but Hare didn't imit himself to purely local prob-

Black students haven't been acting brilliantly on the whole, seizing "symbols of power (buildings, deans, etc.) rather than the instruments of power."
Don't expect much from the media-fed masses. Numbers mean little because the majority does not rule, "Most successful revolts are planned by one man and carried out by a dozen" he said. About SF State, Hare suggested that the National Guard was never called because Alioto wants a me-

called because Alioto wants a me

called because Alioto wants a mediator image to carry him to the governor's chair.

And Hare termed the strike convocation at State an invention by the previous president to delude Blacks into thinking they were getting somewhere. The press coverage of the convocation conversed Hacks on other campuses.

getting somewhere. The verage of the convocation convinced Blacks on other campuses that they too needed convocations. But it got them nothing.

Dr. Hare called the Ford Foundation "a front for the CIA", saying that the supposed philanthropy is really a super-subtle influence to soften black militanto.

The meeting about keeping so schools black was packed -- w schools black was packed -- with whites, mostly. Mothers, high school students, some middle-aged men. Looking at this absurdity, Hare said "Blacks have had it or they're invisible men."



### WELLS FREED TWICE

ompleting its first

completing its first week in Alameda County Superior Court before Judge Lewis Lercara.

Wells is the first Panther to be tried in the "shoot-out" in which Oakland pigs killed Bobby Hutton and wounded Eldridge Cleaver. The first trial resulted in a hung jury, 10 to 2 for acquittal.

A new witness, shown off by the prosecution on the first day, was a Mr. Brown, a Negro who said he saw the whole thing. He had not testified at the Grand Jury hearing and said he had been consaid he saw the whole thing. He had not testified at the Grand Jury hearing and said he had been contacted first by the FBI a month after the incident. Brown gave erratic and contradictory testimony, once claiming the incident lasted two hours, and later saying the shooting took only 4 minutes.

Pulling a well-worn psychological trick, the DA showed the jury 15 guns he said were found at the scene. This was to convince the jury that Wells was "violent"

A cop, Mike Hoefling, said that he had taken notes on that night. They read, "weather, clear... Black Panther ambush...off duty."

Defense Attorney Charles Garry got a cop to admit that at the time of the incident the department was listing the descriptions of twenty Panther cars,

Officer Carlo Cristiani of Emeryville said that he saw no firing and saw two "young unarmed men" not resisting arrest.

The UC administration is coming own hard on people who pushed rough the Ethnic Studies Depart-ent during the recent campus strike.

About 50 cases have already been About 50 cases have already been decided by the campus Committee of Student Conduct with most students getting suspensions for several quarters, or being placed on probation, Dan Seigel Boalt Hall law student and ASUC Student Advocate fold BAPE.

law student and ASUC Student Advocate told BARB.
For such minor offense as blocking, some students were suspended one or two quarters, he said. He told of one case where Chancellor Heyns personally overruled the Conduct Committee and suspended a student for 2 quarters instead of leaving him on 3 quarter probation as the committee had recommended. The student was accused of "disrupting" a class by informing it about the reasons for of "disrupting" a class by in-forming it about the reasons for

the strike.

One good point for the students has been the fact committee has at times acknowledged that cops

at times acknowledged that cops who testified could be lying or mistaken. "This would be unheard of in civil court," Siegel said. The Conduct Committee is made up of 5 faculty members, all appointed by Heyns, and 4 students chosen by non-representative judicial committees, Siegel told BARB.

dicial committees, Siegel told BARB.

"We should have a student court that is representative so students can be tried by their peers," he noted.But there is little chance of the Regents agreeing to such democracy on campus, he said.

Meanwhile, the civil cases of those busted during the strike haven't come up yet. The UC Legal Defense Committee is still seeking photographs and witnesses for those arrested. If you can help call 845-0180.

Noonan has been in jail since then, hoping to have his bail reduced. He finally gave up and paid a bondsman \$2500 of the Commune's funds for his freedom. His trial is set for July 14th.

ness.
During the afternoon a truck-load of Chicanos dropped by and had a little confrontation with Burns guards and SF cops in the store, but everyone stayed cool. In fact I saw a Chicano cop giving one of the leaders a revolutionary handshake, That's REAL cool.

The truckload, in a festive mood, dropped on to the part Sefavor.

Out on the picket line cars entering the parking lot weren't hassled but had to bear the stoney
glances of their neighbors telling

glances of their neighbors telling them that they were wrong.

It was a neighborhood kind of affair at this store, the largest Safeway in the Mission district. Neighborhood grade and high school kids were in the line along with vets of the SF State strike and all afternoon cars drove by with vets of the SF State strike and all afternoon cars drove by waving Huelga flags and giving the raised fist sign.

store still carries hurt." His store still carries grapes picked by people who hurt. Still, Safeway goes on insisting that it is only "in the middle" between the growers and strikers.

There was one troublemaker driving a yellow ex-taxi who made like he was going to run down the line at about 2:30. When he saw me take a picture of his car he stop-

ped and pointed to a realtor's shingle in his rear window which, he said, carried his name. Just what his game was I don't know; he wasn't there to shop.

On Monday a Burns guard was still in the store. When Safeway is convinced that protecting the grape growers is unprofitable they'll cooperate with the strike.

### **NEGOTIATIONS**

Farmworkers and Safeway bosses are attempting to negotiate on the grape boycott controversy as BARB goes to press Thursday.

Dolores Huerta and other leaders of the United Farm Workers Union are expected to meet in the National offices of Safeway in Oakland. At issue will be the removal

land. At issue will be the removal of scab grapes from the chain stores' shelves.

"That's ALL we'll negotiate," Kathy Murguria of the SF office of the farm workers said. She noted that Safeway is already on record as supporting Senator Murphy's proposed legislation against strikes during harvestseasons and against secondary boycotts. The farm workers are against these

union-busting laws.

"The turnout on the International Grape Boycott Day was great," she said. Thousands of people picketed over 50 Bay Area Safeway stores last Sunday. She feels the strong turnout was in partresponsible for the quick reaction by Safeway.

# TEACHERS TALK OF SICK SCENE **IN RICHMOND**

"Richmond is straight out of the which mond is straight out of the kerner Commission Reports. The whole town is demoralized by white racism," six teachers from that community told BARB this week. "People just cannot get along with each other."

The teachers, all of whom are young-two black and four white-were very upset about what has come down in their town the past several weeks.

several weeks.

They charged that none of the higher-ups in the school district are doing anything constructive to breach the racial gap.

"The administrators are just trying to survive. They just keep the lid on with police and pray for the next Friday to come. Bir-

the next Friday to come. Bir-cher types are in control of the school system." These are some of the foreboding statements they

And all are certain the situation will become even worse soon And all are certain the situation will become even worse soon. "I think the schools will have to be closed down," one of the black teachers said. "Black parents are talking of boycotting. They don't want police assaulting their children. It's impossible to teach with pigs on campus."

The racial tension in the town has recently come to a head with violent clashes on high school campuses, and police attacks, clubbings and macings of black teenagers.

teenagers.

Black parents met last Sunday at Richmond's Neighborhood House to work out a series of demands for the protection of their children. They expect to present them to city officials within a few days. In part they will be protesting School Superintendent D. E. Widel's proclamation in a letter to all parents last week. The letter states; "Now we are in a position to make an even better use of police, for we have police officers stationed right on our campuses." stationed right on our campuses.'

Richmond police chief Robert Murphy has also announced that plainclothes cops are stationed on two campuses, John F. Kennedy HS and Richmond High South Campus. The main demands of the black

The main demands of the black community are: no mace to be used on students, no police dogs on campuses, no beating of students by police, no suspension without sufficient evidence, protection for black students from attacks by whites and more conversing bewhites, and more cooperation be-tween school administrators and

parents.

The parents will ask that instead of police they themselves be allowed to patrol the campuses.

The causes of the black community's fears and concerns were explained by what the six teachers told BARB. While documenting the

eyewitness accounts of the turmoil that beset their schools one teacher

that besettheir schools one teacher suddenly stopped.
"Oh! This is just too depressing. Even I didn't realize how bad everything is," she said.
The teachers all charged the school administrators with just existing day to day without training.

The teachers all charged the school administrators with just existing day to day, without trying to solve the causes of the problems. Already the Richmond School District is in near financial collapse. On April 15 the white voters again rejected a school tax increase. For 17 years no tax increases have been approved for Richmond schools.

As a consequence the district has had to cut down not only its faculty, but also its maintenance and administration staff. The new school board just elected will contain all conservatives. "It'll be much worse than before," one black Richmond mother told BARB Ironically the spark that engulfed Richmond into violence came from

ronically the spark that enguired Richmond into violence came from outside the city, from Pinole, a white workers town just north of Richmond. The trouble started April 30 at Pinole Valley HS which has 90 blacks bussed in from Richmond and about 1800 whites.

Richmond and about 1800 whites.
Off that day a violent clash started between white students and the badly outnumbered blacks. According to a report in the underground paper on North campus, the Liberated News, the incident started when a white student hit a black girl on the head with an iron pipe.

a black girl on the head with an iron pipe.

"An ambulance took away black track star Eddie Ayers who was badly hurt. This is the gratitude he gets for representing Pinole Vally in athletic contests," the Liberated News recointed.

Other sources give much the same account of what happened at Pinole Valley. The teachers who talked to BARB said very few of the white students responsible for the violence were taken in by police. police.

police.
The following day, May 1, black students held a rally on South Campus in Richmond. During the rally a California and an American flag were burned. "It was so crowded it was impossible to know who was responsible," one of the teachers who was present said.
Yet, later, 520 17 year oldblack students were arrested and expelled from school. One of the black community demands is that they be reinstated because of the insufficient evidence against them.

black community demands is that they be reinstated because of the insufficient evidence against them. On that same day police dogs were used on North campus, attended only by 9th and 10th graders. Some students had requested permission to attend the Free Huey rally in SF. This of course was refused. A voice came over the intercom telling teachers to lock the students inside the classrooms. The most violent incident occurred May 7 on North Campus. This time it was not merely a student scuffle, but an attack by the Richmond police on black youths. When police arrived on the campus to quell several fist fights the scene became more violent. The white students disappared leaving the blacks alone to face the cops. to face the cops.

to face the cops.
Carolyn Wilkes, a black teacher
at North Campus told BARB of
seeing cops walk by the students,
taunting them with yells.
"I think the accusation of the
Richmond police being racist is
true" she said. at

Richmond police being racist is true," she said.

Jane Fitsgibbon, another teacher on North Campus said one of her black students suffered a broken wrist when he tried to protect himself from a cops' club. Other teachers spoke of two 14 year old black girls who were blinded by mace when the pigs charged the milling students.

As the blacks left, they had to walk through the white section of town across the railroad tracks to the black area. The police chased and beat them once they were off campus.

There were also reports of sev-eral shots being fired, and a white

The people of Butte county have gone hungry because the Board of Supervisers refuses to approve a food stamp program, but food grown on land returned to the people by the people may soon be available, Butte County is located north of Sacramento; it contains Chico State College and the Gridley Farm Labor Camp, Unemployment there averages 11% and hits seasonal highs of 23%. One fifth of the population suffers from malnutrition.

The students of Chico State who

The students of Chico State who have the highest per capita income of all the state colleges; are mostly from the Bay Area. Chico was listed as the #2 party school in the nation by Playboy, but black students (there are about 100 minority students out of 8500 total enrollment) can't get a haircut in Chico and hip students are routinely thrown out of the city's restaurants and pelted with vegetables. Chico State cooperates with the power structure to the extent that the college maintenance department has manufactured billy clubs for the local police department. The "Friends of Sammy Younge" are the prime movers behind the People's Gardens. Sammy Younge was the first black college student killed in the civil rights struggle. He was shot to death Jan. 4, 1966 in Tuskeegee, Alabama while trying to use a "white" men's room at a gas

station.

help the "Friends of Sammy"

help the "Friends of Sammy" build the first garden. "It was great," said Rev. Smith, an ordained minister of the Univer-

an ordained minister of the Univer-sal Life Church.

Rev. Smith and Rev. Calvin sat on the front steps of Rev. Smith's house in the Saturday dusk and

on the front steps of Nev. Simita house in the Saturday dusk and rapped about the gardens.

"We had neighborhood people out there, blacks, chicanos, yellows and whites - not just the radicals - but all kinds and views," said Rev. Smith.

"See those signs that say Black Victory Garden', "Chicano American Victory Garden' and White Victory Garden', well each day of the week the gardens are being dedicated to a group.

"It's for everybody," he added.
"At harvest time, we're going to take part of the crops down to the Berkeley Welfare office and distribute them," said Rev. Calvin.

and distribute them," said Rev. Calvin.
"If they give us any static, we'll just take over the welfare Among those helping with the garden Saturday was a group of students from Chico State.
"We've got 40 acres and some People's Gardens up at Chico already," said the Colonel, a sociology major at State.
"We just got tired of the political ideology bit and decided to do something," said the Colonel.
"I don't care if your a Wallace supporter, a McCarthy liberal or one of those PL freaks - - being hungry isn't political.

"This is a basic human response to a real problem and everyone can get involved," he

added.

"This is really great," he said, "but things are really uptightback in Virginia -- it would never work back there."

Scott St. John, editor of "The Stone Epitaph" in New Haven, Conn., said he was going to get People's Gardens going back east. Raymond 'Alraay Omega' Greer, Bay Area estivist sees these

Cops are present not only in
the high school, but also on the
junior high campuses. Joanne
Gearring, a black teacher at Roosevelt school told of police coming
on to that campus with dogs, with
long sticks in the cafeteria. They
seem to be trying to instigate

long sticks in the cafeteria. They seem to be trying to instigate trouble," she said.

On another campus, Downer Junior High the students have put up eleven demands to improve their education. The list includes an end to unfair suspension, more black cooks and janitors, counselors who do counseling instead of discipline, and charged some teachers treat black students unfairly. One point states, "We've been promised Black history and haven't got it yet. Now we Demand it!"

The six teachers feel little help

The six teachers feel little help The six teachers feel little help can be expected from the faculty in easing the racial troubles. Many of them are old, and don't know how to relate to black people, Jane Fitzgibbon said. The younger ones are leaving the city by the score, 79 have already resigned and won't be back next year, she noted.

"Integration just hasn't worked in Richmond, it hasn't been given a chance," Carolyn Wilkes said.
"It's always been a one way thing, just bussing for the blacks. Maybe community control of our own schools is the answer."

Richmond is like a part of the old South transformed to Northern California several of the teachers noted. The John Birch Society is strong in the town because so many of the whites originally came from the South. "They are the kind who support Rafferty's moral code, but not racial equality," one of the teachers pointed out. "It's a hideous racist town, and I can see little hope for it," another teacher said.



Following a nerve-racking week of maybe there will be a court session and maybe therewon't, the whole merry-go-round of the mutiny trial broke down when the father of one member of the court martial board died and the president of the court martial board died and the president of the court martial board one member of the court martial board one should be sufficient of the court martial board one should be sufficient of the court martial board entered the post hospital at Fort Ord with a gall bladder condition.

Major Billy Doremus returned to Philadelphia to attend the funeral of his father. Maj. Doremus is scheduled to return May 13.

More serious to the fate of the 14 Gis charged with mutiny when they walked out of formation at the Presidio stockade on Oct 14 is the absence of Lt. Col. Richard Potter.

At an out-of-court hearing on Thursday, law officer, lt. Col.

At an out-of-court hearing on Thursday, law officer Lt. Col. James Hagen said the trial would be postponed indefinitely dependent upon whether Col. Potter will need

Army regulations say there must be a minimum of five members to hear a court martial. If Col Potter must retire from the board, then a new member must be named, but the new member cannot sit until he has read the record of all that has taken place in the barracks court room

The trial was into its 24th day The initial was into its 24th day, The judge estimated it would take four weeks for a new member to catch up (Hallinan estimated one week). One spectator said the judge said the transcript must be re-read

said the transcript must be re-read in front of all present, meaning the court martial board, the law officer, both sets of attorneys, and the prisoners.

Some of the spectators at last Thursday's unscheduled hearing felt that the appointment of spyship skipper, Commander Lloyd Bucher to Monterey's Naval Postgraduate School made an embarrassing pre-School made an embarrassing presence in the Monterey Peninsula area for the army's "mutiny" trial in light of the fact that Bucher was let off despite a five-admiral naval court of inquiry's recommendation

court of inquiry's recommendation for court martial for Bucher. Thursday's hearing was also unusual because after the judge left, a very relaxed MP, one not seen near the court previously, did not clear the court room immediately which allowed time for the spectators to visit with the 14 young men on trial. "It was almost like a tea party," said one young lady who has attended court regularly.

At the last court session on

At the last court session on Wednesday, San Francisco psychiatrist, grandfatherly Dr. Maurice Spottswood said that "Pvt. Patrick Wright was very anxious and confused."

"His is a character disorder of the passive aggressive type. The situation in the stockade brought back the early situation in his life, the fear of his father... In talking with Pvt. Wright about what he expected from the sit-down he said he expected to get some kind of praise... It certainly borders on delusion if he expected this to come from a sit-down on the compound. "To say he had no choice would be an exaggeration, but his choice of action was diminished a great deal. The situation at the stockade was so stressful, more stressful His is a character disorder

was so stressful, more stressful than many situations he had run away from. He must have had a strong desire to run away, Since he wasn't able to run away because he was incar cerated, it took away one of the mechanisms he used. Unwas incareer aled, it took awayone of the mechanisms he used...Un-consciously the aim of the sit-down thing was somewhat the same, to get out of the thing, to get away."

### **PRESIDIO** STOCKADE LETTER

Dear Editor of the Berkeley Barb: Here we are again with some more news. Yesterday, early in the morning a man was brought into the stockade. He asked to go on emergency sick call, for some 3rd degree burns on his legs.

They told him to shut up and stand at attention with his pose stand at attention with his pose

They told him to shut up and stand at attention with his nose against the wall. He stood there for about 30 minutes, then asked to got on sick call again, when they refused him again, he told them his legs were hurting too bad, and asked to sit down, then they velled at him and said what are they yelled at him and said what are

they yelled at him and said what are you trying to be, a wise guy and threw him in the box, where he stayed all day.

Later, that night they were having an investigation, so the young man asked to go on emergency sick call again, and the guard he asked turned around and asked the sergeant, what should they do about the clown with the burnt legs.

The sergeant said you had better take the S.O.B. to the hospital before he blows the whole thing. He was taken to the hospital and treated for his burns and returned

treated for his burns and returned

treated for his burns and returned to the Stockade.

He was then put back in segreabout him.

In the Stockade the prisoners do all the cooking, this morning when one of the cooks was awakened by A FOOT IN THE FACE. When he started to complain the guard said shut up or you'll go see the man in segregation. Well we must close for now, and remember we'll always be free in our minds.

Hallinan said that at first the board didn't believe his testimony on conditions inside the stockade. But later, as witness after witness But later, as witness after witness gave consistent testimony, board members started to listen. They reacted the same with the first psychiatric evaluations, he noted. But now the Army jury is taking notes and asking questions for the first time.

"It takes a long time to get through to military people,"Hallinan noted. "But we're doing it."

The defense will finish its testimony by next Friday, Hallinan said. Then the prosecution will take about a week for rebuttal. The case is expected to go to the Jury by the first of June.

Meanwhile the 14 soldiers are being treated like "criminals, not sick kids," by being confined to the Ft. Ord stockade, Hallinan said.

He noted that on May 7 the Army had another possible embarassing

He noted that on May 7 the Army He noted that on May 7 the Army had another possible embarassing case on its hands, but avoided the mistake it made at the Presidio. Seventy men in the Ft. Ord brig staged a sit-down because the guards refused to let them talk to members of Secretary of the Army Restor's committee investigating prison conditions.

But improvements aren't really on the way for the Presidio brig. Woodring's replacement is a Sgt. Goodrich whom one of the guards described to BARB as "big, rough, and very nasty."

# REIGN OF TERROR IN SF'S MISSION SINCE COP'S DEATH

San Francisco's Mission District is occupied territory. There are no visible roadblocks, check-points, or gun towers but tension and repression pollute the air like

and repression pollute the air like smog. The occupying arm is the San Francisco Police Department.

On May I a cop, Joe Brodnik, was shot and killed with his partner's gun. Clad in a T-shirt, Brodnik met death as he lived—as an undercover agent, a spy. At press time six brown youths are in jail, charged with murder, and a seventh is being sought. Since the shooting, a reign of terror has been enforced.

Brodnik and his partner, Patrick McGoran, have been pictured as

McGoran, have been pictured as heroes by the straight media. Both were heavily decorated by the S.F. P.D. "Twenty-nine citations for bravery but it was for harassing our brothers," says a young Chicano

ano.
The straight press has leaped on the law and order bandwagon. The accused are regularly referred to as "hoodlums" and "thieves," rather than "students" for example. In the Mission one finds a different view of "Los 7 de La Raza."

"The media has stamped them guilty. We know they're not cold-blooded murderers but they ARE a threat to the system," says a friend,

friend.

The accused were active in Con federation of Brown Race for Action (C.O.B.R.A.). The organization stressed getting young people from the barrio into college, Now

tion (C.O.B.R.A.). The organization stressed getting young people from the barrio into college. Now its members are working to save their brothers. They charge the arrests are politically motivated. They point out that at least one of the suspects, Nelson Rodriguez, was not even in the area when the shooting occurred. Furthermore, they say the cops, the D.A., and everybody know it. He was fixing a truck miles away, says Ralph Ruiz. Still, Nelson remains in jail, charged with murder.

Police reaction to the shooting was swift, furious, and lasting. They started shooting. It is rumored that during the orgy of gunfire the officers were mistakenly shooting at each other. Their marksmanship was as bad as their target detection.

They did manage to wound a 14-year-old girl during the seige of a suspect's family home. Oscar Rios, brother of the accused prisoner Jose Rios, told BARB, "They shot up all the furniture, the TV, the whole house. They almost killed my little sister. And she had already told the offivers no one was home."

Apparently they didn't believe her. After an intensive fusillade (reportedly even including machine gun fire), they entered the house. As she had said, they found no one but her, lying on the floor with a hip wound.

Later in the week Oscar and three friends were stopped in a car. Within minutes 14 S.F. pigs were on the scene, though none were suspects. Oscar says a Lieutenant Ellis told him, "This isn't a threat but a promise. I'll put you in jail for 5 years for helping your brother."

It appears that anyone young and brown is now subject to arrest, beating, or harassment. One student told of a friend's case in an impassioned voice, "They came to his house and got him out of hed with a shotgun on him,"

came to his house and got him out of bed with a shotgun on him," he said. "Then they beat the hell out of him right in front of his mother."

Another time, BARB was told, a pack of pigs came to a house where four brown students were talking. They stayed for a half hour on the pretext that they'd received a "wife-beating" complaint.

received a whee-beating com-plaint.

"Friends of the family would come to a suspect's home," said one young man. "They would be put up against a wall, searched, and questioned intensively."

The young people of the Mission

spoke of numerous arrests for things like faulty taillights or im-

proper signalling for a turn. A thorough search and roust was inevitably included. Some, who had been jailed in this wholesale attack on La Raza were afraid to talk about it. "It might get out to the wrong people," one said,

Stopping people at gun point became a common occurrence. One said, "There's nothing uglier than looking at a pig through the barrel of a gun,"

of a gun,"

"Law?" said one student, "The cops don't believe in it, I begin to wonder why I should." "They don't even know how to spell it," added a friend.

# earth read-out

new book: EARTH HOUSE HOLD, by Gary Snyder, New Directions,

Gary Snyder's first volume of mostly prose arrives at a good time. We have been bombarded this spring with varieties of information indicating we've so damaged the planetary ecosystem quite possibly

indicating we've so damaged the planetary ecosystem quite possibly we've extincted ourselves.

Gary's book reminds us that for at least seventeen years he's been urging onto us -- again and again -- the kind of ecological consciousness/conscience that vastly increases chances of future human flourishings.

Way back in June of '52 Gary wrote a journal-poem which begins:

Blackie Burns:

"28 years ago you could find a good place to fish.

GREEDY & SELFISH NO RESPECT FOR THE

tin cans, beer bottles, dirty dishes a shit within a foot of the bed one sonuvabitch out of fifty fishguts in the creek the door left open for the bear.

fishguts in the creek the door left open for the Multiply a-shit - within-a-foot of - the - bed by fifty Rockefellers plus fifty industrially-revoliting capitalist/communist national regimes to the fiftieth power and you've maybe got the size of the thing facing us.

Gary's title comes from the pristine meaning of 'ecology': "'eco' (oikos) meaning house' (cf. 'ecumenical'): Housekeeping on Earth. Economics, which is merely the housekeeping of various social orders—taking out more than it puts back—must learn the rules of the greater realm. Ancient and primitive cultures had this knowledge more surely and with almost as much empirical precision...as the most concerned biologist today."

Early sections of the book deal with his months as mountain lookout ('52-'53), beginning Zen student in Japan ('56-'57) and fireman on an almost-round-the-world tanker ('57-'58):

"Caruso: 'It's along way to Suez' Duperont: 'It ain't a long way man, it's just you got a short mind.

I've spent quite some time leafing through the book looking for quotable snippets to stand as summary of this or that, Trouble is, the book is mostly quotable and mostly summary. You start to quote something—but then you see the quote really should continue right through several pages indefinitely. Probably because the book is the product not so much of long thought as long meditation.

Gary returned to the U.S. five months ago after having spent al-

thought as long meditation.

Gary returned to the U.S. five months ago after having spent almost a decade in Japan studying/meditating mostly Buddhism but also a lot of Hinduism and a lot of chen things including account

meditating mostly Buddhism but also a lot of Hinduism and a lot of other things including, especially, the "coming revolution."

His sense of what the revolution really must be makes most of the views rampant in the Movement seem less than radicaltatis, less than "root."

In a recent poetry-reading tour of a dozen American campuses he has urged students to deman not only black studies but also "green studies" in order to learn and implement "the non-negotiable demands of nature."

Gary sees the thing coming down on us so fast—through a combination of political repression/chaos and ecological disaster—that "we owe it to our children to teach them how to subsist in forest and mountain and back-country situations." He thinks it imperative that American blacks and whites alike become symbolically, Indians in order to survive the

that American blacks and whites alike become symbolically, Indians in order to survive the next decades on this soll.

Certainly these perspectives are helpful — even liberating— when viewed with the present brink-of-civil—war context: the black thing vigorous and courageous yet not really strong because packed into the central cities surrounded by armed suburban whites and also too easily controlled from the air—just a tiny step for the regime to

too easily controlled from the airjust a tiny step for the regime to graduate from the 1966 surveillance helic opters to helicopter gunships spurting death; the white-militant thing too often ego-ridden, faction-ridden, media-ridden.

What if the Pentagon had to deal with thousands of small tribes scattered across the American landscape? Tribes interiorly gentle but exteriorly capable of Indian-mobility. The suburban whites thus themselves surrounded—in fact opposed simultaneously front and rear, The strategic situ-

ation changes so much that possibly

ation changes so much that possibly few shots will have to be fired. Probably Gary's essay "Why Tribe" is the most important in the book—or at least for most of us at this particular time. The first half of it is an incredibly compact consciousness—bistory of first half of it is an incredibly compact consciousness—history of the West since World War I—and of Gary's own development since '48 when he played guitar in support of Henry Wallace: 'The suspicion grew that perhaps the whole Western tradition, of which Marxism is but a (Millennial Protestant) part, is off the track. This led many people to study other major civilizations—India and China—to see what they could learn.

learn,
"It's an easy step from the dialectic of Marx and Hegel to an interest in the dialectic of early Taoism, the I Ching, and the yinter theories. From Taoism it Taoism, the I Ching, and the yingang theories. From Taoism it is another easy step to the philosophies and mythologies of Indiavast, touching the deepest area of the mind... "Next comes a concern with deepening one's understanding in an experiential way: abstract philosophical understanding is simply not enough. At this noint many.

not enough. At this point many, myself included, found in the Budmyself included, found in the Budda-Dharma a practical method for clearing one's mind of the trivia, prejudices and false values that our conditioning had laid on usand more important, an approach to the basic problem of how to penetrate to the deepest non-self Self. Today we have many who are exploring the Ways of Zen, Vajrayana, Yoga, Shamanism, Psychedelics... "In the course of these studies it became evident that the 'truth' in Buddhism and Hinduism is not

it became evident that the 'truth' in Buddhism and Hinduism is not

or Chinese culture; and that 'India' and 'China' -- as societies-are as burdensome to human be-ings as any others; perhaps more so. It became clear that 'Hinduism' so, it became clear that 'Hindushi' and 'Buddhism' as social institutions had long been accomplices of the State in burdening and binding people, rather than serving to liberate them. Just like other Great Religions.
