



TIME MARCHES ON

THURSDAY, May 29th. Chancellor Heyns held a press conference at noon at which he stated that the "only solution" was to lease the eastern portion of the Park lot to the city "for park purposes." The fence, however, couldn't come down lest it jeapordize "delicate discussions".

Earlier in the day a People's Park Corporation was formed as non-profit corporation. Straights

Earlier in the day a People's Park Corporation was formed as a non-profit corporation. Straights and streets a re equally represented on the board.

At 6:30 PM, just before a City Council meeting, Mayor Wallace Johnson held a press conference at which he came out against the proposed lease.

The City Council met at 7 PM and granted a permit for the Friday march, changing the route significantly from a "converging" march to a "walk-by".

After several hours the council passes the lease resolution by 5-4. Councilman Swingle had changed his vote.

FRIDAY, May 30. People had been coming in to Berkeley all night, and the "Insurrection City" at People's Park Annex was occupied all night. Around 11 AM thousands of marchers had assembled on the two square blocks.

The march began after several speecies, and an estimated 30,000 people flowed over the route to

certina barbed wire blocking off side streets, trees and flowers were planted around the periphery of the fence. Some people even dug holes in the paving with picks for a tree.

Most of the marchers never got beyond the park area, but dispersed after the festivities. A festive atmosphere prevailed.

Later that evening a wild cele-bration was held in the Annex, bration was held in the Annex, lasting all night. Noise complaints were long and loud from neighbors, and cops wouldn't go in to the crowd. Rapes were reported in Berkeley's sensation-mongering

SATURDAY was quiet, with a celebration at the Park Annex which was not as wild as Friday's. SUNDAY was quiet, with work progressing on the Annex as it had for the past several days. MONDAY, June 2 saw the statement by Governor Reagan that the state of emergency, in effect since February, was to be lifted as of 6 AM Tuesday and the Guard withdrawn. Reagan also commended the cops in his statement for "showing extreme restraint".

straint". Monday night the guard was withdrawn and the fenced-in People's Park was patrolled by several rent-a-cops. Bulldozers started to work at once on the Western

ted to work at once on the western half of the Field.

TUESDAY, June 3 was marked by a City Council meeting at which the cops were also commended for their actions (or lack of them) during the Friday march. Three councilmen abstained.

day night at Longellow School, at which a mass rally and torchlight parade were set for Friday. The fence around the Park was reinforced and floodlights were installed, giving the area a prison-compount feeling.

ARMIES OF THE NIGHT TO BRING FENCE DOWN

"The Armies of the Night" could be the name of the latest tactics in the struggle to bring down the fence.

Mass street actions along this line begin with a torchlight march tonight (Friday) to People's Park on Dwight.

A massive demonstration Saturday outside the Regents' committee meeting is also scheduled. The strategy was set at a mass meeting at Longfellow School, 1500 Derby St. in Berkeley Wednesday night.

Meanwhile, development will continue on People's Park Annex at Hearst and Grant.

Tonight's march will begin with a rally at 8 PM in Sproul Plaza, complete with rock bands and the Mime Troupe.

Other tactics include daily promenades around the park at twilight and continue development of People's Park Annex at Hearst and Grant in the spirit of People's Park.

On June 16, there will be a rally in front of the Veterans Memorial building on Center Street where Judge Mario Barsotti will hear motions to dismiss charges against 482 people rounded up in the mass bust two weeks ago.

"We can't let our people get demoralized by forgetting them," Paul Glusman, a street activist netted in the mass bust, told the Longfellow meeting.

All of these activities will lead up to a major Bay Area rally on the UC Berkeley campus June 20, when the Regents meet here at the State Building on University and Oxford to decide the fate of People's Park.

The major decision coming out of the Wednesday meeting at Long-fellow one to adopt the People's Park Corporation, with 31 directors chosen by drawing names out of a hat.

The Longfellow meeting was the smallest and most divided of the mass meetings held during the People's Park crisis. About 300 people packed the small gym floor as the meeting opened at 8. By 11, only 125 remained.

Most of the meeting was devoted to arguments for and against the non-profit corporation set-up to give the park people legal status and provide for liability insurance against injury or damage. The initial set of 31 directors would only hold office for one month, at which time a mass meeting would be held to elect new directors.

Two basic points were made against the corporation idea. First, many of the directors chosen out of the hat, like SF Chronicle Executive Editor Scott Newhall didn't help build the park or help defend it in the streets.

Second, there is no need for a

corporate structure at People's Park until we get the park and unless it's the kind of corporation that anyone can join by signing

up.
These points were argued by
Frank Bardecke, Jacquie Rosen-

baum, Al Kitt and others.

Speakers for the non-profit corporation idea included John Read,

Mike Delacour and Art Goldberg. When it came to a vote, there were 120 for the corporation and 110 against.

Similar splits over tactics added to the confused, discordant sense of the meeting. This is a sharp departure from earlier meetings. Several people said that it was just a fit of depression following the Memorial Day week-end suc-

In other Park developments, the Alameda County Peace and Free-dom Party has announced that they will seek a grand jury indictment of the pig who killed James Rector.

of the pig who killed James Rector, A 48-hour vigil, which began Thursday noon, will continue today on the south lawn of UC Chancelor Heyns house on campus, Meanwhile, the People's Park fence, has added features-electric bulbs to light up six Rent-a-Fuzz who went on duty after the National Guard pulled out Tuesday morning, and clipper resistant wires to hold the fence up.

I was really flying until we hit Oxford and caught sight of a line of pigs with flowers in their barb wire hair. Cheers went up as if the pigs were now pointing their guns at Roger Heyns and calling us Comrade, The sadists who murdered James Rector were now dered lames Rector were now

dered James Rector were now okay because they took our flowers and forced their lips into a smile, Some brothers tried shouting something angry at the pigs—but the liberals shut them up saying "We must not antagonize the police." lice.

We reached a point of turning left in the direction of the Park. Some of the march leaders wanted Some of the march leaders wanted to split the march, breaking from the pig-approved route and attempting to surround the park for a fence-shaking exorcism. Some of us headed down the side street but walked into a wall of pigs.

I learned later that the wall was originally built by liberals who called the pigs to replace them. These liberals are so scared of Sheriff Madigan they have him walking around in their brains barking orders.

When we got to the fence, it was very crowded and I found myself trampling on the newly-laid street sod. MARCHERS DEFY MAD DOG MADIGAN IN NOONDAY SUN

The day before headlines blared that Madigan would again use Double-0 loaded shotguns "if necessary." But the symbolism of Park vs. Police State was too strong to be threatened away.

They came in a peaceful, wistful, almost worshipful way and marched up to the park in what seemed a never - ending pilgrimage. Led by cycles, they came mostly on foot, But some piled on sod-bearing trucks, some young

mostly on foot. But some piled on sod-bearing trucks, some young ones were carried, and at least one man rode a wheelchair.

The march started at the People's Park Annex at Grant and Hearst. Before it arrived, Alameda County's heavily armed deputies cleared the street of onlookers near the original People's Park.

iookers near the original People's Park.

The people complied quickly as Sheriff Madigan's men held the street. When the marchers neared, though, they surrendered it. They had just wanted to remind us of their power over our lives. There were other reminders. Helicopters flying overhead all day. Even a Browning Automatic Rifle (B.A.R.) was photographed in the possession of the Guard. It's said it can fire 400 rounds per minute. Pigs on rooftops held the highground with guns, cameras, and radios.

Yet the feeling of liberation was strong. People knew they might be shot. Madigan had already proved he was capable of ordering a massacre. And they were there, anyway. When the rooftop cops smiled, some yelledup, "You better smile."

All manner of men and women made up that swollen stream of

All manner of men and women made up that swollen stream of people. Deacons and dandies. Freaks and Freddies. Grandmothers and would-be Gurus. Young girls with bouncing tits and hips that made your tired body come. that made your tired body come

alive.

Freedom, sunshine, love of the earth. All were much in evidence. Men and women took off their upper clothing to bathe their bodies in the air and rays.

The marchers brought things of value besides themselves. A large wooden cross, a guitar, a big picture of Gandhi, flags of Anarchy, the U.S.A., Revolution, and Psychedelia. Portable parks were set up on Dwight, watered, and enjoyed as rock music boomed out of friendly houses. Holes were dug in the pavement to plant trees. Many stayed but many others walked on up Piedmont, where fraternity folk sunned themselves on roof-tops. They ignored the benevolent chancellor's invitation to corral them in cavernous Memorial Stadium and straggled on down Hearst back to the starting point.

Those who stayed on Dwight started yet another People's Park, about a block from the original. We dug furiously, knowing they would soon drive us from the area but determined to make a start, as our brothers and sisters chanted Hare Krishna. They did, And we left.

Soon everyone was back at the Annex. A party destined to last several days was in progress. What kind of party? Typical comments were "Righteous" and "I've never seen anything like it."

"Our reason for being here was other reason for being here was not because of a dispute over a piece of vacant real estate," Major General Glenn C. Ames, commander of the National Guard troops states this week, "but because on last May 15th, law enforcement had broken down in the City of Berkelev." City of Berkeley."

Ames made the above state

ment, along with several others, during a press conference at the Berkeley police station, in which he announced the troop pull-out

of Berkeley.
"On that afternoon, (May 15th), "On that are moon, (May 1941), and early evening, law enforcement was being challenged..." he continued. "Single officers and even groups of officers were attacked, beaten, and in some cases disarmed."

It was in this "atmosphere," coording to Ames, that the Na-onal Guard moved in to occupy

Berkeley.

The objectives of the "enemy," The objectives of the "enemy," the Berkeley militants, General Ames described as "1. Reoccupation of so-called People's Park #1; 2. Closing down the University; and 3. Closing down the Berkeley Business District."

At an estimated cost of over a million dollars General Ames stated that "the National Guard and law enforcement agencies have prevented the attainment of any of these objectives."

When questioned about the helicopter gas attack on Sproul Plaza two weeks ago, Ames defended the decision to gas, stating that the

two weeks ago, Ames defended the decision to gas, stating that the field commander had felt that his troops were "in danger."

"Steel magazine racks were being thrown off buildings at the troops," he protested. "Part of the dissidents were actually moving on the guardsmen."

But when asked by newsmen the location of the supposed "attacks" on his troops, Ames dodged making a definite reply, "I am not familiar with the area," he said evasively. evasively.

However, Ames was forced to

admit that the "helicopters had been aloft, ready to perform their mission, for some time."
(Note: this reporter was aware of that; having been warned at least an hour beforehand by reliable sources that it would happen at the time it did. The army had planned on testing the gassing method at 2 pm that Tuesday, no matter what might have been going on.)

going on.)
During the General's conference

During the General's conference amouncing the troop pull-out, he also emphasized the "sacrifices" of "his boys."

"They knew why they were here," Ames said staunchly, "and because of this their morale was surprisingly high at all times."

Ames had no comment concerning the troops who split from the ranks, the guards prohibited from flashing peace signs, or the hash

ranks, the guards prohibited from flashing peace signs, or the hash cookies and LSD in the oranges incidents, as well as those threatened for reading the BARB.

Now that the guard is gone, who is going to keep the fence up around "the University's property?"

General Ames gave that honor to the least prige stepting that he

General Ames gave that honor to the local pigs, stating that he hoped that the "good intentions of city officials, University ad-

of city officials, University administrators, student and community would produce solutions to these problems."

The solution, as General Ames sees it, is "somehow these hard core militants, anarchists, and terrorists, must be separated from the campus and immobilized, so that a great University can get on with its business of being a great University."

When he took cookies from some chicks, an officer told him it was a court martial offense to take good from the enemy. "What enemy?" Bill asked in amazement.

BART doesn't deserve shit for so creatency letting up borrow the

BART doesn't deserve shit for so graciously letting us borrow the land down there. BART fucked up that area; BART, in the name of Progress, created the barren strip of land that stretches for blocks

of land that stretches for Diocks in west Berkeley.

BART should have supplied the sod that the people have laid down in Gobi Desert #2, in an attempt to lessen the swirling clouds of dust that move endlessly down

that move endlessly down the strip.

What would one say about an Army which led its troops into battle and then withdrew all the officers and NCOs? This, I think, is what the People's Park Move-

is what the People's Park Movement has done.

It has given great, even brilliant, leadership to the struggle for the park, in the streets, on the campus, in the city, and on the media. But in the course of this struggle over 900 people have been arrested, and are now being hassled through the courts. Repeated court appearances, hassles with ball-bondsmen and lawyers, long trials, the real danger of heavy jail sentences, all are casualties which this movement has suffered.

So far the leadership of the

this movement has suffered.
So far the leadership of the movement, and most of the activists who don't have a personal stake, (i.e., they were not busted) have paid no attention to this struggle. They have not done anything to help the defendants organize; they have not raised the demand for amnesty in a forceful way, in short, they have not related to the struggle which is starting in the courts as an extension of their fight. their fight.

their fight.

Many leaders have said to this,
"Yes, that's right, but there are
more urgent things to do now."
It is a little like an Army which
says that infantry and tanks are
so essential that they don't detail
men to bring up the field hospital,
the evacuation helicopter, or even
ammunition supplies.

A great deal can be done with
the kinds of criminal cases we are
now facing, but what the lawyer

now facing, but what the lawyer does inside the courtroom is only the surface of the iceberg. A great many decisions are about to be made. Some cases have been dropmade, some cases have been unoped by the prosecution, charges have been reduced in others. Juries will be coming in to decide the cases of many people.

All of these things can be affected by the climate of opinion.

There are thousands of potential witnesses who need to be interviewed. The city council, which is trying to calm things down, must be faced with the demand that it request all charges be

To compel people who were herded into Santa Rita like cattle and then treated like the inmates

of a Nazi concentration camp to sit through endless days of ar-raignments, where they have to wait up to four hours to stand up before a judge who then tells them to come back for more the

next week, is indenfensible treatment, yet this is what is going on with the mass arrest defendants, without a peep of protest from anyone.

When a movement has 900 people going through the courts in a demoralizing fashion, feeling that they have been abandoned by the

movement, when days and days and a great deal of money are being absorbed by their cases, and no support from the community is being organized, a large core of activists is bound to be diverted from the fight and many more will activists is bound to be diverted from the fight, and many more will be scared off. This movement has to recognize that its health and vitality, and in an important way, its integrity, are involved in the question of whether it is going to come to the support of the people who have been arrested during the demonstrations and the state of emergency. So far a small core of volunteers, law students and lawyers have been trying valand lawyers have been trying val-iently to struggle with this situa-tion. Huey Newton would be on death row today if the Black Pan-ther Party had left his fate in the hands of his lawyers alone,

John fought the charges for over a veer on the grounds that the

John fought the charges for over a year on the grounds that the state's dope laws are unconstitutional. But last week, when a panel of judges said otherwise, Sinclair was ordered to trial. As the trial began, John's lawyer, William Ravitz, took the offensive with a motion that all charges be dropped on the grounds of entrapment.

Entrapment is like when an undercover cop in tight levis, stands

While John has been fighting,

the pigs have been plotting. He was charged with assault on a rented cop in a Michigan teen club. During the action John and Fred Smith (guitarist for the MC5) were beaten and Sinclair was

maced,

At the trial's end, two weeks ago, Fred was acquitted but John was found guilty. As sentencing was about to be passed, the owner of the teen club came forward and admitted that it was all a frame---sentencing has been delayed.

That's surely enough for one man, but that ain't all. On May 23 a pre-trial hearing was held charging John with "failing to register as a narcotics offender" at the American - Canadian border. border.

Sinclair and the MC5 were on Sinclair and the MCS were on their way to play a gig in Canada but the customs men thought that John was trying to escape and arrested him. The warrant also states that Sinclair is a nomad. (That he doesn't have a

mad. (That he doesn't have a permanent place to live.)
John Sinclair lives with his wife and child at the Trans-Love commune; 1510 Hill St., Ann Arbor. The people want him there but the pigs want him in the slam.

to a grassy area, sat down, locked
arms, singing and chanting "We
shall Overcome" to protest the
killing of fellow prisoner Richard
Bunch and the conditions in the
stockade at that time.
Rev. in the stockade from August

Rey, in the stockade from August 14 to November 13, 1968, said he knew Johnny Cain and James Clark, two of the prosecution's witnesses who were also in the stockade then. Cain, now a civilian, and Clark, now stationed at Fort Ord, offered testimony to support the army's contention that all was spic and span behind bars.

Rey's testimony cast some doubt as to the credibility of the Cain-Clark testimony and offered some insight into the state of affairs inside of the stockade.

"One time I was in the down-stairs latrine with Cain," said Rey, "And he told me he was a personal friend of Major Chamberpersonal triend of Major Chamber-lain, (psychiatric consultant for the stockade) and that he was go-ing to help him get a discharge." Cain, who was a parolee, lived in the same quarters with the 163rd

MP company, and never served his full sentence. He said, "I got out early. Got Christmas clem-ency." (He was released January

'Dime-Dropper' is a stockade term for an informer, like a guy who drops a dime into a pay phone to "rat on a guy".

when key intilisied in testimory, assistant prosecutor Capt. Dean Flippo said, "I'm sure the MPs would like to see him outside".

"In most of these cases they use the time to harass you or deprive you of the funds to continue the fight, I hung on by some hook or crook," Mrs. Bowers could



Daniel Camejo has been sen-enced to five years in jail in

Daniel is the brother of Pete Daniel is the brother of Pete Camejo, West Coast Organizer of the Young Socialist Alliance, past candidate for Mayor of Berkeley and one of the "Berkeley Three" conspiracy defendants.

Camejo and thirteen others were sentenced May 14th for "conspiracy, inviting (not inciting) rebellion, and damaging public property."

The fourteen were arrested in July 1967 in an apparent effort to drum up a "red scare." The Cuban OLAS conference was about

to gin. All have been held in jail since then.
"Confessions" were extracted

from the victims by torture. They later repudiated the statements.

As part of the witch hunt, seven-

teen tons of books were seized from a Maoist bookstore. Mexico City dailies ran scare headlines for four days about the "trained

Tower management refused to sign a pledge that they wouldn't discriminate against homosexuals, and instead an ad-hoc union was formed and agreed to enforce such a pledge. and agreed to enforce such a pledge,
"It's a fink union, I don't trust finks," Leo Laurence chairman of CHF charged. He claims the union is powerless and called the agreement reached with Tower Records "a sellout."

Militant gays won important con-cessions this week in their fight

for homosexual rights.

His views weren't supported by most of the membership of CHF.

"This is a precedent in the gay movement," said Steve Mathews enthusiastically. He is a member of the group's negotiating team that hammered out the victory with Towers's management and labor representatives.

The battle against Tower Records began three weeks ago, when Frank Denaro, a clerk at the San Francisco store, Columbus and Bay, was fired on the grounds that he was a homosexual.

The CHF negotiators met with Denaro, Tower Records management and labor representatives Thursday, May 29, to discuss a list of five demands made by CHF. The first demand was that Frank Denaro's job be reopened, if he wanted it back, Management admitted that a mistake had been

wanted it back. Management admitted that a mistake had been made and offered Frank his job.

CHF demanded that Denaro be given all back pay, benefits and allowances. Tower management and CHF have agreed to submit this to binding arbitration by an outside party acceptable to both sides.

CHF demanded to the management of the demanded of the management of the control of the contro

outside party acceptable to both sides.

CHF demanded and won a guarantee that Tower will not take any recriminatory action against other employees who honored the picket line or participated in it.

"They have already honored this demand by not firing an employee who honored the picket line and have also agreed that no other action will be taken against any other employees," said Matthews.

CHF also demanded that Tower Records sign a pledge not to disciminate against persons because of sexual orientation, While management would not sign such a pledge, Mike Edwards, a president of the Brotherhood of Tower, a recently-formed employees union, did agree to enforce the terms of the pledge.

"Frank's firing was the catalyst for the formation of our union," said Edwards.

Leo Laurence termed this group a "company union." However, Matthews said, "the fact that the employees are willing to enforce

a "company union." However, Matthews said, "the fact that the employees are willing to enforce our non-discriminatory pledge against all minority groups, including homosexuals, puts us in a much stronger position than if management alone had signed." "The union will be there every day to make sure that the pledge is kept."

"It's not the role of the vanguard to sit around playing watchdog," he added.

"For the first time in the history of the gay movement, militant, non-violent tactics have been used to win a major victory," Whittington bold BARB.

"The gay establishment has been trying for years to do what we have done in two weeks," he said,

"We are also seeking an alliance with the International Longshore men and Warehousemen's Linion to boycott or strike States

Union to boycott or strike States Lines' ships throughout the world," said Whittington. Matthews added, "the situation at States Steamship Co. is much more serious than Tower Records was." was

"First, States Lines has no union, although we understand one is in the formative stages there.
"Second, States Lines hasn't even responded to our letter with

"They think that if they ignore us, we will go away, but we have only begun our campaign there," said Matthews.

In March, 1967, a young doctor named Eugene Schoenfeld began to write a column of medical advice for the *Berkeley Barb* under the now-famous name of Dr. Hip Pocrates. The column — which is now syndicated by eight underground newspapers in the U.S. and several abroad — deals candidly with sex, drugs, the pill, circumcision, venereal disease, allergies, pregnancies, psychiatry, homosexuality, and many other problem areas that are too "hot" for other columns to handle.

Other M.D.'s among his biggest fans

Surprisingly enough, Dr. Schoenfeld is as

Surprisingly enough, Dr. Schoenfeld is as popular with members of the medical profession as he is with the hippie he addresses in his columns. California's Health, a monthly publication of the State Department of Public Health, said, "The Hip doctor is a boon to hippie health . . . If you don't know about him, you should."

Not only is Dr. Schoenfeld's advice medically sound, but it is also hip, bright and frequently very humorous. To one letter, asking if there are venereal diseases besides gonorrhea and syphilis, Dr. Hip Poccrates answered: "The diseases usually classified as venereal are gonorrhea, syphilis, chancroid, granuloma inguinale, and ilis, chancroid, granuloma inguinale, and lymphogranuloma venereum. The last three are fortunately rare and usually found only in sailors and other visitors to exotic ports. VD is unpleasant and may be dangerous if untreated — but it's better to have had a positive Wassermann test than never to have loved at all.'

Dear Dr. Hip Pocrates is a collection of the best of Dr. Schoenfeld's columns. PIGS HIT. CHICANOS HIT BACK

Pigs attacked a chicano protest in San Jose last weekend and found themselves up against a hard-fighting crew of Black Berets and Brown Berets.
"Our guys handled themselves fairly well without being armed,"

fairly well without being armed,"
a Brown Beret spokesman told
BARB, "They got down to business with fists and feet-the way
they learn in the barrios,"
Members of the Berets went
into action after several "chongos" (monkeys--the chicano term
for pigs) had clubbed two women
who were carrying flags in a
peaceful protest,
Five hundred chicanos had assembled along the parade route

sembled along the parade route of the Fiesta de las Rosas, a plastic celebration which lauded

the coming of the Spanish and the "settling of California" by anglos. At one point the group attempted to march along with the parade. Two women carrying flags--one Mexican and the other reading "La Raza Unida"--walked out into the

street.
Immediately they were jumped

Immediately they were jumped by chongos--uniformed and plain-clothes. Both women were knocked down by clubs and one, a Mrs. Castillo, was beaten unconscious. "There never was a call for dispersing," said the Brown Beret spokesman. "The whole demonstration up to then was nonviolent."

The men of the Brown and the

The men of the Brown and the Black Berets were there to protect their people from just this sort of thing, and they went in swinging. Both groups are chicano self-defense organizations.

"When the chongos saw that the marchers were all around them they went crazy," the spokesman said. "They began clubbing everybody—little girls and nine-year-old children got hit."

Twenty-three chicanos were ar-rested. Two victims were still unconscious and on the critical

Two pigs from Mad Dog Madi-gan's Alameda County sty testi-fied this week that Jaime Soliz held their club against his neck and then lifted his feet off the

and then lined his feet off the ground screaming in mock pain when they tried to bust him. Soliz, a leader of UC Third World strike is presently in Ber-keley Municipal Court facing two misdemeanor charges from the pig attack on him February 25. Officers Dyer and Mingan, appar-ently vengeance-bent against Soliz,

omicers Dyer and mingal, apparently vengeance-bent against Soliz, stated under oath he inflicted injury on himself with their clubs. Soliz was picked out of a moving picket line that day and arrested on a warrant charging him with "blocking" the Student Union on February 10. An additional "resisting arrest charge" was laid on him after the assault. The case is expected to go to the jury by the end of this week. Besides Soliz, Barry S, Strong, another victim of the pig's violence during the UC strike is presently on trial. He is facing a felony assault rap for allegedly throwing a rock.

These two are just the beginning of over 170 more cases that'll go to court in the following months.

The biologists' letter says that DDT 'takes years to decompose to harmless products by weather-

to harmless products by weathering and biological processes. As
a result, it has been accumulating
in the environment.

"Not only is it carried from
land to sea by rivers and runoff,
but it also evaporates from lakes
and soil along with water and is
dispersed world-wide by winds.

"DDT and its toxic residues
are found in Antarctic penguins
and seals, and in fishes living

are found in Antarctic penguins and seals, and in fishes living thousands of miles out at sea."

The letter also is addressed to the people of California—and it urges them to "write their State Senators and Assemblymen, requesting support for Senate Bill 1430, which seeks to ban the use of DDT."

The faculty and students at Hop-kins Marine Station of Stanford University have released a sum-mary on DDT which states that "people in the U.S. carry in their fatty tissues levels of DDT aver-aging about 12 parts per million... "Recent clinical research shows a strong correlation between high DTT levels and encephalogulasis.

DDT levels and encephalomalacia, cerebral hemorrhage, portal cir-rhosis, and various carcinomas." Researchers in Florida several

weeks ago established a link be-tween pesticides—especially DDT used in back-yard gardens—and cancer of the liver.

A report released at U-C Davis last month stated that emphysema rates in agricultural, grape-growing San Joaquin County are four times higher than in smog-ridden Los Angeles County-and DDT or other pesticides are suspected. Ways of doing something about all this will be discussed at Ecology Action's Environmental Fair in Berkeley Saturday, June 7, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Provo Park.

Theme of the far is—dig—
EXTINCTION, Example: among the speakers will be Dr. Eugene Coan, a marine biologist who thinks we've so wrecked the seas with DDT that some Third World nations soon may lose their protein source.

"Here in the U.S. we're lucky."

"Here in the U.S. we're lucky,"
Coan told BARB, "We can fall back on beef for a while."
The fair starts at 10 am in Provo Park (Grove and Center Streets)—and will end about 6 pm. People from ecology and conservation groups throughout the Bay Area will take part in it.
At about 2;30 David Brower,

former executive director of the Sierra Club, will give a speech entitled "We're Down to Our Last Planet." Brower was eased out of the Sierra Club early this spring for trying to awaken the organization from its nostalgic, sweet-trees dreams. He hopes to put together a new organization to represent the growing ecological concern among many sectors of the public.

Action projects at the fair will include a booth at which nursing mothers can get their milk ana-lyzed for DDT content, (Studies elsewhere have shown DDT content in mother's milk to be four times higher than that allowed in cow's milk sold for human consumption.)

At noon Rev. Tony Nugent of the Free Church will conduct cere-monies for "the destruction of a smog-generating automobile and its transformation into a sculp-

ture symbolizing the ecological revolution." Everybody attending the fair will be urged to partici-pate in the transformation. Cliff Humphrey will talk brief-ly about summer activities of Eco-logy Action

logy Action.

Others will discuss halting retail sales of DDT in the Bay Area through boycotts, picketings, informational campaigns and any

other means necessary.
Additional discussions and exhibits will deal with pollution, overpopulation, People's Park, and resource and bay conservation.
There will be a do-it-yourself skiffle band at the fair—and hope-fully one or two rock groups will



WELLS JURY HUNG AGAIN

The second trial of Black Paner Warren Wells has ended in hung jury, just like the first. Wells is the first Panther to

go on trial for the so - called "shoot-out" in Oakland which re-

"shoot-out" in Oakland which resulted in the murder of Bobby Hutton and the imprisonment of Eldridge Cleaver.

On Tuesday, May 27 the jury in the latest trial returned with only a partial verdict (guilty of assault, undecided on attempted murder). The judge told them that either they made up their minds on all counts or they could forget it. No agreement was reached and no poll of the jurors was taken.

A motion for a new trial will A motion for a new trial mile be ruled upon June 9th, as will a motion for reduction of the \$20,000 bail. Wells has been in jail ever since the April 1968 attack.

The prosecution did not present several pig witnesses this time around, apparently for fear of cross-examination by Garry. He nearly hacked them to pieces the first time around, observers

reported.

Defendants who get hung juries are rarely tried a second time. are rarely tried a second time, In big cases a retrial is some-times held. But since Eldridge Cleaver's case depends on a con-viction for Wells, old J. Frank Coakley shows every sign of busting a gut to get Wells convicted.

Hopefully he'll succeed -- in busting his gut.

MADIGAN CRAPS OUT TELLS HOW ARMY TO SF MIME TROUPE

"We stood up to the Alameda Sheriff's repression, and they backed down," Steve Friedman,

backed down," Steve Friedman, a member of The San Francisco Mime Troupe told BARB this week. The Sheriff's Department at-tempted to stop the Troupe from using Earl Warren Park in Hayward for a performance last week end. They put pressure on the Hayward Area Recreation and Park Department (HARD) to deny the

park to the group.

But the Mime Troupe went on the offensive with a legal writ

But the Mime Troupe went on the offensive with a legal writ from ACLU telling HARD to show cause why the show shouldn't go on. The uptight park overseers couldn't, and the show went on. "Public parks are for public use, but the cops want to control the kind of people who use them," Peter Hennessy, a spokesman for the Mime Troupe said. He said police harassed the performers and people coming to the park over the weekend and succeeded in keeping the audience down to in keeping the audience down to about 100.

Hennessy was arrested after the cops closely inspected all the performers' cars and found he had several outstanding traffic viola-tions. He was freed on \$50 bail. The Troupe originally received permission for their visit to Hay-

ward several months ago. Two weeks ago a letter came from HARD telling them the show was off. The Sheriff's Department had complained that the group was lewd, obscene, and posed traffic problems the cops couldn't handle.

KIDNAPS CRIPPLES **FOR VIETNAM DUTY**

The Army calls it the Oakland Replacement Center. It's where they keep spare parts for Viet-nam. Any time the machine de-velops a need for a new compon-ent a requisition is sent and Oak-

ent a requisition is sent and Oakland supplies the part.

One such part is Private Marshall Bocher, 23 years old from Syosset, New York, Private Bocher is a bit defective though, According to the Army, he is "not allowed to crawl, jump, march for more than a mile or stand for more than 30 minutes." His feet are so flat that it affects his hamstring and calf muscles, yet Pvt. Bocher found himself in Oakland awaiting orders to Vietnam.

Bocher's lawyer, Robert Zweig, tried to get a medical hold executed. For two weeks he worked inside the Army. He went from the Oakland Army Base to the Sixth Army at the Presidio to the Judge Advocate General's Office in Washington to the Secretary of the Army. He got no results.

"It has been the policy of the Army, for the last three or fourmonths, to take men in Oakland who refuse to go to Vietnam, put them in chains, kidnap them by plane and deposit them in a combat zone in Vietnam," Robert

Dat Zone in Assaura.
Zweig says.
On May 13 Private Bocher submitted an application for discharge on the grounds that he was a Conscientious Objector.

According to Army regulations, each application must be considered. The Applicant must be held up while the processing goes on, If the application is denied and the man then refuses a direct order to Vietnam he may be court marghalled. marshalled.

marshalled.
On May 13 the Army refused to accept Private Bocher's application. They called him a "chicken shit coward" and put him under immediate guard. Bocher was denied all communication---with his lawyer, his family, with anywith

Two hours after he had submitted the application, Bocher was put in chains and carried aboard a plane bound for Vietnam.

Essentially a cripple; having enough physical disabilities to keep him out of a high school gym class, Bocher is now in combat in S. Vietnam.

Private Bocher is not the only victim of military kidnap. At least six such men now have lawyers in the bay area. Several affidavits have been filed in Federal Court and Mr. Zweig expects to have his

when asked if he thought the Army would deny his accusations, the lawyer replied: "If they deny it I challenge them to a public hearing. But I doubt if they'll deny it. If think that they believe that their actions are reasonable——I assume that they're doing it to everyone."

RIGHT WING OUT TO RAPE MERRITT

Merritt College's upcoming student body election pits the militant Soul Party against a slate headed by a member of Young Americans for Freedom (Y.A.F.). The last election saw the Soul ticket sweeping all offices by big margins. Now, David Grappo is leading an electoral counter-insurgency campaign against the Soul

reading an electoral counter-in-surgency campaign against the Soul men and soulful women. Grappo's platform is "to get things done." He is critical of a Soul attempt to hire a college docsoul attempt to hire a college doc-tor, Under law, he says, "he can't even give aspirin." He chides the incumbents for falling to provide enough money for the nationally rated Merritt track team and other student activities.

He charges his opponent, Alphonso Galloway, is ineligible to run for the office. The student Election Committee has approved Galloway's candidacy.

The Soul Party is running on its record of moving toward true student power. They lier these

student power. They list these programs already in effect: Black and Chicano Studies de-partments; equal student repre-sentation on major committees;

Saturday and evening summer classes; free meals and textbooks for poor students; student control of the cafeteria and bookstore; a special program that has enrolled 46 Merritt students parttime at U.C.; and a special credential for Afro-American Studies graduates. They pledge to continue "in the vanguard" of change. Grappo says his campaign is non-political, despite his active membership in Y.A.F. "I just want student government to serve the students," he says.

Grappo, like Reagan, believes in the silent majority. "Most students are conservative," says the non-political campaigner. "If we had a 90% turnout, we'd win by

non-political campaigner. "If we had a 90% turnout, we'd win by 5 to 1."

Most other observers feel his only chance is a very small turnout at the predominantly Third World, hip, and radical college. The election is open to all Merritt students and will be held June

Michael McClure I knew only as the person "Freewheelin" Frank" was told to.

"Freewheelin' Frank" is the "Freewheelin' Frank" is the fast talkin' autobiography of a hotroddin' Hell's Angel -- Frank Reynolds -- who was born in the Ozarks to die, no doubt, with his boots on sailing through the air at 120 miles per hour astride a flaming Harley Davidson engine, working the pistons up and down with his blistered hands if needs he his plaid scarf flaming in the be, his plaid scarf flapping in the wind, his hoarse mother voice screaming "ANGELS FOREVER, FOREVER LOADED!"

I also remembered reading somewhere McClure was busted for a play involving cumnilingus.

McClure's new play "Cherub" opened at Mandrake's in Berkeley last week. (With John Lion directing, it is performed by the Magic Theatre). "Cherub" is the first in a series of what the San Francisco neet calls. "Gargoyle car-

in a series of what the San Francisco poet calls "gargoyle cartoons" or protein fantasies.

I'm not a playgoer. I didn't understand it. It was something about Jesus being in bed with Camus. Whenever this was mentioned, everyone laughed. I guess I expected an enactment of Freewheelin' Frank.

"This better be dirty," I said to my buddy as the curtain rose

"This better be dirty," I said to my buddy as the curtain rose to reveal three naked torsos in a huge animated bed, "or I'm asking for my money back," Actually I had got in for free.

It wasn't dirty, except maybe on a level I didn't understand,

I'm not a critic, so you shouldn't go by my opinion. I'm just here to tell you about McClure.

Michael McClure met Free Michael McClure met Free wheelin' Frank Reynolds at a Dylan concert in 1965, "Dylan invited me," the thirty year old author of "Meat Science Essays" (on Revolt, Jane Mansfield, and Fuck) told BARB in his Haight flat. Scattered around the room were books of his own poetry, a copy of Jim Morrison's new book of poems, "The New Creatures" (limited edition), and copies of of poems, "The New Creatures" (limited edition), and copies of Freewheelin' Frank's new folder of poems. McClure was impervious to the cries of our three year old hippy companion, Jesse. We were

"Ginsberg, Baez, and some of the Angels were invited too, and we all had front row seats, Some people started turning on, and I started rapping with Frank, What an amazing cat! He has this incredible Elizabethan word stylet

After that we kept running into each other, and one night I casually suggested I could write his

iography. ut at the time I was having a lotta trouble with my play "Beard." We were busted every

"Beard." We were busted every night for fifteen nights — I'm still fighting the lawsuits — and the story of an outlaw was about the furthest things from my mind. "Then one night Frank called me up stoned in the middle of the night and said he wanted to get to work. I told him to be here at nine in the morning. Hah! I went back to hed figuring the matter was bed, figuring the matter was dispensed with.

dispensed with.

"But at nine a.m., Frank was at my doorstep, sobered up and dead serious about writing a book. We began work right then, and finished nine pages the first day." Frank dictated, while Mike hamered it out on his typewriter. "Jesus!" Freewheelin' would exclaim intermittently, "You're

fucking my train of thought with that goddam clacking!"

The first time I read the book, I thought that a lot of it was probably "as told to" hype: Frank Reynolds was too classic to be real. But McClure confirms that Freewheelin' Frank does indeed talk like that, And the story was Frank's; only a few pages were edited.

edited.
"What if somebody had written an autobiography," McClure went on, "of a member of the Eagle cult in 14th century Mexico. What an exciting document that would be! And that's what 'Freewheelin' Frank' is, only we don't have to wait six centuries --- it's fascinating now!"

I asked McClure whether he felt

it's fascinating now!"

I asked McClure whether he felt
he had influenced Frank during
his association with him, inclining him perhaps toward more
spiritual and literary things,
"There's only a little truth in
that," McClure responded, "Frank got turned onto Dylan and acid at Ken Kesey's. And to be sure, I was influenced by Frank as much as he was influenced by me. He opened up a new world."

opened up a new world."

McClure now proudly rides a vintage Harley chopper: it looks like a 56 or 57. In Norman Mailer's film, "Beyond the Law," McClure played an outlaw motorcyclist. "Mailer gave me some bread, and I went down and had some rockers made for the back of my jacket." In McClure's own Beast Language, the emblem reads a half-serious. half-satirical half-serious, half-satirical "GRAHHR!"

poet's next trip is going

to be tying a tape recorder to his bike. Somehow we couldn't get over the feeling that McClure sees bike. over the feeling that McClure sees his chopper as a giant blob of sensual protein, to be ridden be-tween his legs like a candy-colored DNA molecule!

ed DNA molecule!

McClure was raised in Kansas.

"Funny you should bring that up.
I just finished a book about my childhood there." He fumbled through stacks of poetry books, looking for the manuscript. I guess I lost it.

"The properties of shildhood."

"The memories of childhood are there, because they are your meat," McClure said. The thing meat," McCliffe Said. The shift is to posture a yoga stature that will draw on them. I think the rhyme gave me the impetus to recall memories that were lost to my unconsciousness mind. Our my unconsciousness mind. Our memory cells, you see, are arranged tangentially," (and here he started making all these diagramatic silns with his hands) "forming a helix, like a DNA molecule. They riffle out when we touch them."

McClure considers William Burroughs, Richard Brautigan, and Norman Mailer the most signifi-cant writers in America today. As to whether literature is becoming to whether literature is becoming an obsolescent art form, he comments that "It's going to become increasingly important in the future for people to be able to hold a book in their hands, to feel its content, like a piece of meat they are going to digest."

Most people's eyes are passive, you know. But McClure's burn, so that you find yourself glancing away to avoid his glaze. McClure is into his heavy biological trio.

is into his heavy biological trip, Meat. Very mystical. His fav orite overworked word is "meat.

orite overworked word is "meat."
"The new society will be biological" is his revolutionary outcry.
Much of his poetry is written in what he calls "Beast Language," which is pure animal sound after the style of Jean Arp. "This poem I wrote for Marilyn Monroe upon her death," he said, pointing to a phantasmagoria of flesh, reverence, and naive animal lust. "That poem I wrote for the lions. I read it to them at the zoo, and they roared right along."

As a prelude to the performance of "Cherub," the Berkeley Improvisational Ensemble fondle their reeds somewhat akin to the

Improvisational Ensemble fondle their reeds somewhat akin to the cool style of Miles Davis, A bared black incants -- basso profundo-this wierd voodoo Beast poetry while a pale yellow light suggest an outline of his hoary face, Cigarette smoke drifts through the wan light like an ethereal fog. I got

uneasy: Something is being sac-rificed here, and I'm not hip to it. McClure felt that it was very suggestive that "Cherub" opened while our brothers were in the streets outside. "To be able to

streets outside, "To be able to ecologically preserve the sense of pleasure while the revolution was commencing outside heightened the experience," he told BARB. In his work, McClure seems to be aspiring to touch -- and perhaps even unleash! -- dark hidden forces within us. Not surprisingly, he is now working on a film-script with Jim Morrison of the Doors: an adaptation of a novel he

script with Jim Morrison of the Doors; an adaptation of a novel he wrote last summer.

McClure's most famous play—the one that got him busted fifteen nights in a row—is "Beard," starring Billy the Kid and Jean Harlow. He ate her out on Blue Velvet. That sounds like a line from a song. But McClure calls it an "image," That's rich: Billythe Kid. the stoned adolescent rebel Kid, the stoned adolescent rebel eating out the jaded vamp with cream dripping all over the Blue Velvet. I like that.

McClure has this fascination

McClure has this fascination for people like Billy the Kid and

Jane Mansfield, It's almost as if Jane Mansheld. It's almost as the accepts their image on face value, and trips on it like a gentle fetish -- looking for meaning in the image itself: looking beyond meaning even to the experience itself

McClure has learned much from the playwright Antonin Artaud. Artaud believed the theatre should be used to convey an image, a feeling, a sensation. "To break through language in order to touch life," he defined as the purpose of the-

atre.
"Every night after Beard' got
these ideas for busted I would get these ideas for sex dramas," McClure told BARB. sex dramas," McClure told BARB.
"Like, you thought that was something, watch this!" Who knows.
Maybe while the people are giggling at the gargoyles in "Cherub," the three naked people are humping each other under the sheets of the animated bed.

They should be. Who knows what they're doing naked under those

they're doing naked under those sheets! Maybe McClure and the director don't even know what they're doing.

God knows they jump around

enough.



Remember when rock and roll was just a plain old communist plot? Well, times have changed and so have the political games. Since nobody is buying the commie scare anymore some new scam had to be fabricated.

Eh bien, violal Associated Press announced this week that Ralph "Kick-out-the-jams" Nader, notorious for investigations of auto safety, says "the amplified din of live rock music may be producing a new generation of hearing-impaired Americans and should be controlled."

In addition, Nader has petitioned two Senate subcommittees to conduct investigations to determine if local noise restriction ordinances are in order for rockclubs and "ear protection" for musicians and ballroom workers.

Nader bases his claims on the noise level readings taken in several DC nightclubs, Also, on results from hearing tests given freshmen at the University of Tennessee, Readings of between 100 and 116 decibels were recorded in these clubs, while come discotheques were measured as high as 138 dbs.

According to Nader the pain threshold for most people is 140

According to Nader the pain threshold for most people is 140 dbs. Also the American Medical Assn considers long exposure to levels of over 85 dbs hazardous to hearing.

Well, Corvair fans (anyone remember the Corvair?), to quote Dylan, some people don't have much food on their table, but they got a lot of knives and forks and they gotta cut something.

Nobody can ever deny that the volume levels in live rock ballrooms are frequently outrageous. I am most readily reminded of the Quicksilver Messenger Service, whose amps are always set at ten regardless. In fact, guitarist John Cipollina's set-up alone is quite formidable: two standels, a Fender twin, two Banshee horns, and four trumpet cones. (John has recently wired out the volume pot on his amp and controls it solely through his axe now.)

BUT. There is no requirement whatsoever that people be "subjected" to such "noises." Point A. Musicians are rarely affected by their own volume settings because the sound of their amps doesn't break till it gets about fifteen feet out. Point B. Constant decibel level exposure in terms of an audience will sit still long enough for such a barrage to endanger their hearing. One would have to spend many hours a day, not just a few a week, under such conditions to accrue any sort of permanent damage.

People pack ballrooms to hear groups like the Quicksilver because THEY DIG IT. There is only one language in the world that every human being with working ears can understand and that is MUSIC! Instantaneously. You may not like it but you can understand it and recognize it immediately.

The Wilhelm/Baynes edition of the I Ching has a Chapter 16 entitled "Enthusiasm." It deals almost exclusively with the fact that in ancient times music was considered to be the highest form of communication with the spirits of the ancestors, and that it was through the idiom of music that one was brought closer to God. They did not speak of a decibel range (whether or not they had amplifiers is of little consequence); they spoke of the ecstasy encountered by the human soul while becoming very high on music. Not dope, MUSIC.

If Nader sees evil in this, may I suggest he also consider investigating the aater-effects o





Even the hippies draw on the street, if they can find room. Once in a while a tourist's car drives in by mistake, and the look on their faces indicates they must be driving on the sidewalk (an easy thing to do in Europe, by the way).

(Note: for those who are interested, some data on costs: in 1967, for 30 days, we spent \$25 a day for EVERYTHING, hotels, food, trains, snacks. In 1969 we spent \$29 a day for EVERYTHING, including a two-week car-rental from Vienna back to Amsterdam. Key to this low cost is the book "Europe On \$5 a Day". Our planefares were not included in above costs. We are speaking of on-the-continent prices. We never spent over \$10 for a hotel room, and never spent near \$10 for a meal, something that is also quite easy to do unless you have that book and shop around).







Does marijuana impair driving Does marijuana impair driving ability? Not in experienced users, according to a study published in the May 16th SCIENCE, Members of the Division of Research of the Washington State Department of Motor Vehicles and Departments of Pharmacology and Psychiatry of the University of Washington School of Medicine gave tests simulating actual driving conditions to 36 marijuana fiends.

The group scored no more total errors on the simulated driving test when stoned than when they were straight. Alcohol, however, caused them to score significantly more driving errors.

The driver-training simulator consisted of a mockup of a car facing a 6 by 18 foot screen in a totally darkened room.

"The test film gave the subject a driver's eye view of the road as it led him through normal and emergency driving situations on freeways and urban and suburban streets."

Vehicles, had previously found in a five year study that a driving simulator test could predict fu-ture driving skills (an actual be-hind - the-wheel test could not). Factors tested during the 23 minute driving film were accelerator, brake, turn signals, steering and speedometer.

speedometer.

The average age of the 36 heads was 22.9 years; 7 were female and 29 male. Each subject had three "treatments." One treatment consisted of waiting in a comfortable lounge with no drug administered before taking the simulator test. The second consisted of drinking 2 Bloody Marys or 2 Screwdrivers of a concenor 2 Screwdrivers of a concentration sufficient to cause a 0.10% blood alcohol level (nearly half of drivers fatally injured in auto accidents have been found to have a blood alcohol level of 0.05% a blood alcohol level of 0,05% or more). The third seemed to be a treat as well as a treatment and consisted of smoking 2 joints of a batch of marijuana kindly provided by the National Institutes of Health.

More "speedometer errors" were made when stoned than when straight but in this test speedo-

meter errors mean not speeding but amount of time looking at the speedometer. The authors of the study believe that drivers when high on marijuana spend less time looking at the speedo-meter because their sense of time perception is altered by the drug. "They often report alteration

meter because their sense of time perception is altered by the drug.

"They often report alteration of time and space perceptions, leading to a different sense of speed which generally results in driving more slowly."

The conclusions of this paper coincide with observations often reported by chronic marijuana users. Some individuals greatly fear driving under the influence of marijuana; others enjoy driving while stoned and believe they perform at least as well as when straight. Driving under the influence of any drug is best avoided but it seems as if another marijuana myth may have been shattered.



The People's Park incident has been a very educating occasion for a lot of people.

I think it taught the straights

two very valuable lessons: calling in "all the force necessary"

ing in "all the force necessary" means relinquishing your own control of your own town: and there is far more responsibility among the young rebels than anyone thought.

The authorities learned that these are not just kids kicking against the traces. They mean business. They want a different culture than the one going. And there are getting to be more and more of them. more of them.

The revolutionaries themselves, I believe, learned that there is more to be gained by considered action than by just blindly strik-

ing back.

And I was most heartened by

And I was most heartened by the emergence of this new thing called Peace Power. It's something I've been calling for over the years, though I didn't till now know what to call it.

If I dig it right, Peace Power has nothing to do with the old smarrmy mystique of absolute non-violence. Worthy though it was as an ideal, it was self-defeating as a tactic. Instead of "What can we do effectively?" it posed the question as "How can we take action in the most conspicuously non-violent way possible?"

Peace Power is something that I've been insisting all along the

violent way possible?"

Peace Power is something that I've been insisting all along the New Left needed: an awareness of strategy. Essentially it has to do with that rock-bottom strategic axiom: Never let the enemy fight on grounds of his own choice. Take the initiative yourself.

The cops get rough, and it gets you mad. You'd like to rough them up in return. An understandable human reaction, and it would serve the buggers bloody well right. But don't try it. You have neither the temperament nor the equipment to match them at rough stuff, let alone beat them.

You try it a different way. Do nothing to provoke the cops to get rough. Act so that they have to let you by. It's not necessary to hand them flowers or say that you love them; in fact, that could just get them more uptight. Address them respectfully if you have to talk to them; that won't hurt.

As the little boy said in Sun-

have to talk to them; that won't hurt.

As the little boy said in Sunday school: "Love your enemies, it will drive them nuts."

And it has the side benefit of drawing sympathy from the kind of people who otherwise would be out to do you in. As see the front page of last Saturday's Gazette. In the course of writing this I talked to a friend who was less optimistic than myself. I pointed out to him that it did work this time. And of how many other recent approaches can you say that?


