keep looking back over their shoulders. Each time they look back the crowd is bigger and louder and moving on them like a black wave coming in out of the sunset.

Jimmy, my body-freak buddy is jogging along beside me. Suddenly it's as if he ran into an invisible wall — he stops dead and I see he's looking at something. Everyone in the street sees the same thing he sees all at once.

Finally, when it became clear that all Winkleman was concerned about was avoiding union troubles, Hilliard phoned the Amalgamated Photographers' Union to see if some of the Panther staff could join the union. He learned that under the Taft-Hartley-Act, his people could work one machine each for thirty days as "trainees", and then join the union.

This satisfied everyone. Two girls ran off to start working the justowriter and headliner, Hilliard and Winkleman shook hands, and the rest of the Panther staff got busy laying out their paper — which, barring acts of God or the government, should be out by the time you read this.

Panthers Resist New York Cops

Two members of the Black Panther Party (BPP) were arrested on September 30 by New York City Police for attempted murder and two other charges resulting from a twenty minute shoot out in Jamaica New York. The Panthers, Stanley Pettiford and Joseph Baskerville, both seventeen, were held on \$25,000 hail.

According to a press statement made at the BPP National Head-quarters on October I by Don 'DC'' Cox, New York Chief of Staff, the police tried to enter the Panther Pad without first presenting warrants. The Panthers resisted the invasion by firing on the police.

More than a hundred shots were exchanged before Pettiford and Baskerville were disarmed. Police claim that another man excaped from the apartment through a side window and fired several rounds with a shot gun at the copsoutside.

Cox said that before he left New York he ordered Panthers to "defend the door" against any attacks. He claimed that the police move which sparked the shoot out was totally illegal.

He accused the city government of trying to break up the Party and stop their community programs organization. The Panthers operate a breakfast program for children, free medical clinics in Brooklyn and Staten Island, a free store in Harlem, and a citywide Liberation School project.

Cox maintains that the tactic most employed against the BPP on the east coast is "jive conspiracy busts," and not armed confrontation. Unlike California, New York has Ilmited the availability of firearms through the Sullivan Act passed in the 1930's. Of the 21 people arrested last April for conspiracy to bomb downtown population centers, 16 still are unable to raise the \$100,000 bail, and they remain in jail.

Cox has phoned orders to New York BPP to resist any further police invasions with necessary force. Because of the increasing level of oppression against the Panthers, he feels that it might become necessary to "blow the motherfucking heads off" the police who attack them.

and of the entire Black Power struggle in the concept of self-determination for all peoples. He was happy that Black people no longer think themselves to blame for the contradictions posed by oppression.

He cited Stokely Carmichael's answer to white opposition to Black Power, "You better get some of that White Power," -- if whites want to control their own lives.

Jackson claimed that the Economic Opportunity Program instituted by Washington, in allowing so many Black students to enter Cal so quickly, caused the formation on campus of a new Black ghetto.

Jackson listed the purposes of the Third World Strike: 1) to create self-determination for non-white students through programs



Speaking for the Committee on Liberation or Death, an affiliate of the Third World Liberation Front, Buddy Jackson, remarked that there were obvious differences in the political positions represented on the panel, and that COLD, a Black organization, would differ even more.

The essential distinction which had to be made between Black and White radicals, he said, is that "Whites go to college and get politicized; Blacks get politicized to get to college."

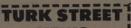

The following is a letter sub-mitted to the BARB by Jerry Rosenfield, a veteran of the Berk-eley Movement.

There are certain imperatives which transcend the demands of loyalty. In defense of my own integrity and of the promise of a better world, I feel called upon to let whomever will listen know where I stand in relation to those I have called my brothers and sisters over the years in Berkeley:

I believe that our Revolution depends on honesty, just as the hatred that now exists depends for its maintenance on lies. I therefore dissociate myself from the politics of deceit and manipulation and secrecy which, as it was the downfall of the Communist Party in America, will be the downfall of the New Left, the way things are going. I was sickened by the SDS Summer Program, which was a strategy of lying.

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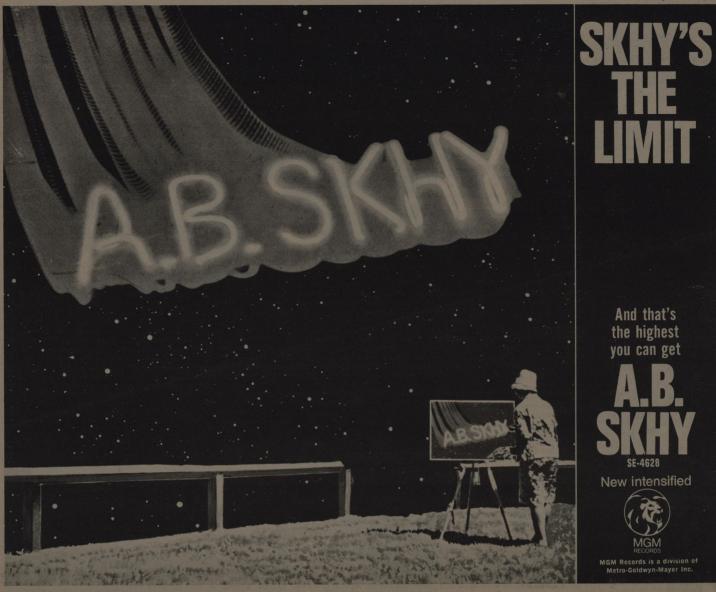

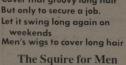




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DISANTIESTABLISHMENTARIANISM

Does the student who is dis-illusioned and disenchanted with the educational program offered by the University have another alternative to those that have al-ready been tried? So far, he has attempted to al-ter the system by going through the "properly-constituted-chan-nels-for-change" — electing stu-dent representatives, signing peti-tions, attending meetings, serving on student-faculty committees, etc.

And when these efforts produced chiefly the effects of retaliation and increased rigidity his attention has sometimes shifted to images of total destruction, and "closing it down".

But, is there still another alternative? Yes, there is — the path of the RADICAL MIDDLE—the creating of an ALTERNATE STRUCTURE.

The University is not going to change, basically. Change is always difficult and painful—and besides, the University is still successfully serving the needs of the majority. Whether the dissident student likes it or not, the "silent majority", and their parents, are still devoted to a set of standards and ideals that give top priority to such values as social status, money power "getting ahead in the world", and personal and national "SECURITY"! And if a student is willing to buckle down and go through the academic mill, acquiring the necessary technical skills and information, the establishment (DuPont, IBM, Rand Corp., the Armed Forces, the U.S. Government, and the University, itselfy will be there waiting, at the end of the line, ready to reward him with a cozy economic niche—and spiritual death everlasting. He may need to check his personal feelings and soul at the registration desk—but if he's not aware of these or believes they don't matter, then the price he pays will not seem great.

The militant leftist is often caught in a difficult inner bind. He doesn't want to admit to himself that his Mother University (Alma Mater) doesn't love him—and has only poisoned milk to give anyway. He refuses to accept the idea that she CAN'T change—but he thinks it's merely because she WON'T—that she has something precious to offer, and is just being stubborn about dispensing it. He assumes that if he kicks, screams, and throws rocks long enough she'll relent, become "responsive", and turn loving and giving. He secretly agrees with the conservative that all good things flow from institutions.

Naive as it sometimes appears to be, there's a real challenge in the question often asked by the right-winger: "If you don't

able, why not create an ALTER-NATE STRUCTURE for yourself? The world is full of books, periodicals, libraries museums, and public lectures of all sorts. A wealth of information and knowledge is all around you -- free for the asking. And, if it's understanding yourself, and your relations to your fellow human beings that's important to yourhere are people all overthe place. But if you like the idea of the intellectual and emotional stimulation of working and learning with like-minded companions, then why not get together with others who feel the way you do, and pursue your education cooperatively?





needs of those who find the set-up congenial.

And, if such a venture: were successful -- with an interesting group of teachers, courses, seminars, work-shops, and field-trips available -- the "drop - out" rate among students at the established University might rise to 3% (yielding a budget of \$450,000) -- or even 4% or 5%, someday.

If there's a social structure you don't like -- and you can't beat it -- but don't want to join it, then COMPETE WITH IT! If it's a good idea, and you establish a living MODEL, others may follow you.

The greatest opposition to such an educational experiment would not come from the outside, but from the INSIDE -- from the inner mental fears and conditioned images of those who may feel tempted to explore this new, alternative direction. It's true that, if you sincerely want an education these daysone that's for the WHOLE you (your feelings, your body, your soul, as well as your intellect) -- you'll have to FIGHT for it. But NOT by barricading college buildings, smashing windows, and throwing have to FIGHT for it. But NOI by barricading college buildings, smashing windows, and throwing rocks at the cops (and getting yourself, as well as yourhead, busted). The real battle will be with those elements within yourself that are holding you back. What are some of these elements? Here are the main ones that you might need to become more conscious of.

1. INERTIA To move in such a novel direction would undoubtedly require effort and work. It's a lot easier to just get angry (adrenalin flows so easily then), and rant and

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cussed. Even certain "administrative" decisions, about structure and organization, would have to be made by somebody, at some point. Certain crucial distinctions between FREEDOM and CHAOS would need to be discovered and applied.

Some of the participants might even realize, from first-hand experience, what those limited, fallible monsters on the administrative staff at the University are up against. But, let's hope they do a better job of LISTENING, and helping to resolve the inevitable conflicts in viewpoints and wishes that would arise.

3. GREED, Yes, you might need to battle your conditioned longings for prestige money, and power. If these are the things that are really important to you, then going through the University is probably the best and primitive sense of group togetherness that somes with demonstrating and protesting.

But, it's doubtful that inertia alone would be a crucial obstacle. The memory of watching a group of bare-backed, sweating youths, wielding heavy pick-axes one hot day last May, while they were breaking up the hard earth of a vacant lot on Dwight Way to create a pleasant, park-like retreat, suggests that the problem is rather one of DIRECTING the tremendous quantities of energy that are available.

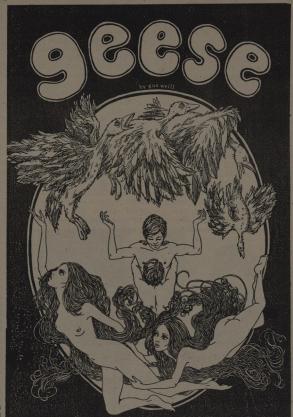

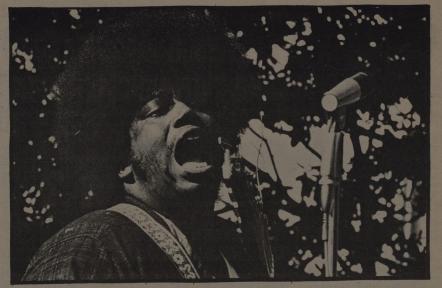

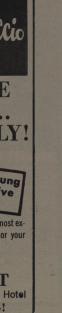

The story goes that people do not breathe because of the processes of socialization they undergo from the time of birth, Obstetric techniques, the plastic environment the infant is placed in from the time of birth, the plastic people the infant is exposed to, early weaning and forced toilet training, pressure to walk, to talk, and to constantly behave appropriately all entail constant repression of natural sexual and other bodily impulses, This turns an infant from a pliable joyous living organism, into a castrated, deadened socially manufactured robot.

Having been punished for expressing the life within him even before his self-consciousness has emerged, the child learns to control his body by tensing his muscles. Shallow breathing of society's members is beneficial to society, which runs more efficiently the less its members function individually; but is utterly devastating to the individual, whose health and happiness is sacrificed to the means and ends of the monstrous social organism.

Shallow breathing results in improper oxygenation of the body. The tissues literally putrefy, and even a seemingly growing adolescent is no more than a minimally functioning corpse, Improper oxygenation not only destroys the individual at a physiological level, but at the emotional, mental, and spiritual levels also. Emotions are feelings. Etymologically, emotion means to move. Emotions are the effect of consciousness, and are the flowing of energy, of feeling, through the organism, Shallow breathing, by cutting down on the energy within the organism, cuts down feeling. The anxiety most people constantly suffer from is a result of improper breathing, Anxiety is a specific physiological condition wherein a constriction or pressure is felt in the solar plexus, as the organism contracts toward its center due to fear of contacts with life within it and without it, It is impossible for an individual to feel anxious when he is breathing properly, for the respective physiological states of anxiety and proper breathing are mutually exclusive. Fear, too, and panic are states that disappear with proper respiration, Hate, greed, and all other feelings man suffers himself and inflicts on others are secondary emotions, created when man's expression of his primary emotion is suppressed. The primary emotion is the free-flowing life within him, which if it could be named would be called love—and it is blocked by the immobilization of the body.

In a sense, improper respiration saves man. For if he had more energy than he does now to express his secondary impulses, (yet not enough to express the primary emotion), man would destroy himself in a day.

CAUTION

This is a real danger. If an individual does start on a program to improve his breathing, and goes too fast, he may be emotionally unfit to properly discharge the new influx of energy, and will literally go crazy, in the end he will no longer practice breathing, but will be more armored then when he started.

Starting a breathing

Starting a breathing crash program will not get it. First of all there is the very real danger of becoming over-charged and freaking out. What is usually the case is that people, in a first burst of enthusiasm, practice hours a day desiring quick results. Then they give up in a week or two because they have not attained Nirvakaipa Samadhi, but have exhausted all their will.

Breathing exercises are no end in themselves, What is wanted is the establishment of full, free,









FLUID GENTLENESS

The entire action should not be accomplished in separate steps as I have described, The complete breath should be one fluid motion in the above order. This sounds easy, but it is harder than it sounds, The muscles necessary to accomplish this action may be somewhat attrophied after years of immobilization. Many people cannot feel their diaphragm, which is supposed to swing up and down freely on a longitudal axis to the spine. Armored people may feel pain when they try to fill the lungs.

There are other aspects to the complete breath besides the above muscular actions, The air should be taken in through both nostrils, However, the nostrils are not to be used as suction pumps, but by abdominal and chest muscular action, There should be very little or no noise during exhalation and inhalation, The air action should be very gentle. There should be very little feeling of the breath as a "wind," Concentrate on the muscular action.

When the lungs are filled, do not lock off the breath at the nose or throat. These should both remain perfectly passive during the breathing process.

line is the position most suited to let the breath action function freely. If your back or legs hurt, you can practice sitting erect for short periods only, gradually increasing the length of time.

At first you might try just practicing low-breathing, if you don't breathe that way already, Practice breathing by pushing out and pulling in your stomach without using the rest of the lungs, for a month or so. This loosens some chest armoring, and you can begin to get with the swing of the diaphragm. After you have mastered low-breathing, try practicing the complete breath.

At first, simply inhale and exhale in an even swinging shythm, After you have mastered an even rhythm (1:1) you can try other ratios. Try a ratio of 1:2, 1 unit inhalation to 2 of exhalation, Gradually increase the count, 1:2, 2:4, etc.

After you get up to a count of 4:8, you can try suspending your breath in between inhalation and exhalation. This is not accomplished by locking the air off at the nose or throat, but by keeping the lungs expanded with abdominal muscles. Do not suspend your breath bevond vour comfortable capacity. Start with a ratio of 1:2:2 (1 unit inhalation, 2 units suspension, and 2 units exhalation. Gradually increase the count to a 4:8:8, and then you can try a ratio of 1:4:2, which most Yogis feel is the ideal ratio. If this doesn't feel right to you, however, try a ratio of 2:1:2. Gradually increase the count.

During the time you are increasing the count and using more complex ratios, there are several things you can do to facilitate your progress and improve your over-all being. Ten times a day, push out and pull in your stomach in rapid succession ten times. This will greatly strengthen your abdominal muscles. Take deep, full breaths, exhaling completely whenever you remember to all day long, in every situation.

Before sitting down to practice, limber up your body somewhat. Bend over and touch your toes. Bend over backwards, bend over sideways, and twist your torso around. Swing your neck around one way, and then the other. Swing your arms parallel to the floor, crossing them over infront, clapping them together in back as parrallel to the floor as possible. Rotate your arms making circles in the air. Generally stretch every part of your body.

It is best to practice breathing on an empty stomach. Breathing is especially effective if it is the first thing you do in the morning, and the last thing at night.

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This sounds easy, but it's harder than it sounds. PRACTICE

To practice the complete breath, spend 10 or 15 minutes in the morning and at night practicing the motion, doing a prescribed number of rounds, a round being one full cycle. Simply approximate the complete breath at first, if you do not do it perfectly forget about it. The emphasis is on gentleness and naturalness.

Seated, with legs crossed and back, neck, and head in a straight

these the things you want to learn
about? Then go back to Alma
Mater, and she'll teach and take
care of you.

But if you're interested in another approach to education, you
may have to settle for smaller
fry -- guys who aren't "successful" enough to have become inhuman. Perhaps the physicist or
chemist you hire (if these fields
happen to interest you) won't know
the latest secrets of napalm manufacturing -- but they'll probably
know a lot of other fascinating
things about the physical world
around us -- things that can excite your imagination, and show you
how you could become a PARTNER with nature, instead of conquering and exploiting it.

Many people these days, es-

pecially among the older generation, suffer from an inability to trust their own perceptions and feelings about people, and about their competence. So they need to be reassured that everything's OK by finding out what credentials they have — and then feel safe if they can believe that they're getting the best and latest "expert opinion". It's as if they couldn't trust their palates to taste the food some chef had prepared—they'd have to know where he got his training before they could tell whether the meal was good or not. A guy in this bag might even hesitate to ball a chick until he found out whether she's a qualified graduate of the Masters and Johnson Institute. There's no reason for you to get hung-up on the need for this type of reassurance. Your own perceptions will tell you in a short time whether someone really has something you want to learn.

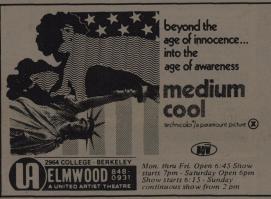
In fact, there may even be a slightly inverse relationship between academic or professional "success" and the ability to teach and inspire. Some professors that are "world authorities" are pretty dull. And some young men, whose viewpoints aren't yet as crystallized, can impart great enthusiasm and wonder for their subject.

The "expert" in any given field is all too often merely one who is dogmatically andrigidly asserting a set of interpretations that are dead wrong — or of limited value — but that represent the current fad in his particular professional circle.

6. THE NEED FOR RECOGNITION. When we are inwardly not very sure of our own personal values, feelings, and goals, it often seems important for us to convince somebody else of them. We demand that THEY recognize the validity of our outlook. And if they can't (because of their own situation or hang-ups), we get beligerant. We project the doubts coming from the INNER CRITIC in our own minds onto the outside world, and feel that if only "they" would agree and accept us, we could be content and happy with ourselves. But it doesn't work this way.

A student whose value system differs from that of the University administration may mistakenly feel that he's not really free to be himself unless and until his academic parents recognize and acknowledge his worth. But they'll probably never do this, And, if it's time for him to grow up, and find his own inner evaluative center, then he's better off if they don't. He'll be forced to the discovery that he doesn't really need their approval and acceptance after all.

If a student frees himself from the need for recognition, he can then pick and chose more widely from the great variety of educational opportunities available. He might even take certain courses at the established University—if they suit his own personal needs—without worrying about whether or not he's getting the proper "credits" towards a standardized degree. His interest will

Much of the Movement was simply rhetoric, he claimed, and gave the collapse through dis-use of the Park Annex as an example of how little anyone really cares. He attacked the duality of finding "somebody else as the evil guy," and defended individual acts of resistance, such as turning in draft cards, as bearing effective moral witness. Rubenstein told the people that they were the Revolution, and that it was incredibly dangerous to be content to follow other people's directives.

By the time Rubenstein finished speaking, the ballroom had nearly emptied, and several small groups from the meeting left to talk outside. It became clear that most of the people attending the Forum could relate to what the speakers proposed in terms of community. Participation is necessary for the Movement's continuation and growth. Disorientation Week was successful in involving many people in a discussion of student radicalism. This involvement must be further realized in action if the goal of community is to be achieved.

Like a fish in the water that can't perceive the water. When you are under a bad imprint, you can't see it because you are it. So most of the people who read this aren't going to believe a word I say, because they'll say, "'Aw, he's bull-shitting, he doesn't know whathe's talking about. I feel great.' And then they'll wander off and have another hamburger. Which is too bad, it really is. Because if this trip keeps going we're not going to have a scene anymore. We're going to have a bunch of alcoholics running around, PCP heads, out in the street, and it will just look like 34th Street. (pause)
