leave her apartment because of a nerve collaspe that resulted in drawing her leg. Three months ago, Mrs. Washington lost the screw from her leg brace, along with suffering from another ill-ness added to preventing her from being able to go to a doctor.
On Mrs. Washington's last visit

to Dr. Kouzack of Mercy Clinic, he assured her for the third time that because of her crippling con-dition, he had made arrangements to have telephone services for her home through the Public Aid De-partment of Cook County. Dr. Koudoctor for three years now. Since then Mrs. Washington has con-tacted the Public Ald Department several times and they have re-fused to have the telephone services installed. We questioned the relationship between Mrs. Washington and her caseworker (Mrs. Underwood.) We learned that it has been eight months since Mrs. Underwood has made any contact with Mrs. Washington. The only thing that Mrs. Underwood has made possible in the last eight months is to keep Mrs. Washington from being able to reach her or even return her telephone calls.

In Mrs. Washington's apartment we found falling plaster, falling walls, holes from wall to wall, or no running water from poor plumbing, leaking roof (in a top floor apartment) and she is paying \$88.00 a month rent to inowners (Raymond-Milnes) who has employed an 80 Realty) year old ill man to keep the build-

We found that Mrs. Washington and her family are in severe need of food, clothing, sheiter and medical care. Mrs. Washington and her family lives at 35th street and Prairie, in the third ranking slim city (Chicago), in the heart of ugly America.




HOLES IN FLOOR OF MRS. WASHINGTON'S APARTMENT.

We must first remove from on us. We must first remove from or communities the guards (Pig Polices). Who have been sent to watch and enforce our suffering the marrons (Daley) who is in office, not at the interest of our needs, but put there to approve all the activities of the guards (police), and anyone else who are seen the sufferior hardlack to the contract of the contrac police), and anyone eise who grees with the suffering that Black agrees with the surtering matriack people must live infrom day to day. And the wardon (Oligilive), who is in office to approve the activi-cles of the matron (Daley) and send them on to Washington where the final approval is put on the type of suffering we must and should live in. We used the words guard, matron and wardon because these are used to address the officials in the prisons throughout this country. We wanted to show how very much alike our homes, streets and communities are very much like the whole structure of the present day prisons. We are guarded like those sisters and

guarded like those sisters and brothers in prison, we are watched and spoken to from time to time by pig Daley in the same oppres-sive manner as a matron speaks to the prisoners and we are a piece of paper to the governor pig OLIGILIVE like the prisoners are to the wardon. Just like the prisoners more than anything else we too must free ourselves no mat-ter whatit takes. As the ten Point platorm and program of the Black Panther Party states; "We want freedom. We want power to de-termine the destiny of our Black community. We as a people must have freedom because we are now facing being totally destroyed. years old, who resides at 1459 E. 54th St. had his Constitutional and Human Rights violated as a result of his desire to live in a result of his desire to live in a decent home. He had borrowed \$8,000 from the government to buy a home for his family. A couple of months after they settled in their new home they received a notice from their realty company to vacate the premises. Mr. Hard-ing wanted to know why he was being evicted from his home so he went to the realty company to in-vestigate. He showed the realtor his bank receipts verifying that he had been making regular monthly payments, but he was still told that he would have to leave his home. Evidently, 83 year old Brother Mathew couldn't move quickly e-nough for the fascist piga so he was arrested in March for trespassing on private property. Every man is supposed to be guaranteed a fair trial but Mathew Harding didn't receive any trial at all. Even if he had been tried and falsely convicted by a racist jury, the penalty for a trespassing charge is much less than five months. He served time at Lancaster, a farm labor camp, where he was subjected to inhumane treatment by these racist pigs.

The pigs finally released Bro-ther Mathew last month, He returned to civilian life homeless and penniless. He and his wife Tina have been surviving from the good-will and cooperation of their family and friends because the gov-Mathew his oldage pension checks. He is presently trying to find a lawyer to help him get his pro-perty and money returned.

Brother Mathew, like all poor oppressed people, needs a new Constitution that will be geared towards fulfilling his basic needs and desires. This present, decrepit Constitution has been the document legitimizing our oppression and exploitation for all these years. we're now a new nation of people, and we're throwing off the modern day shackles of chattel slavery and servitude. We are drawing up a revolutionary Constitution for all oppressed people, and we will en-sure that the echoes of slavery, oppression, and exploitation are silenced forever

brother in the community came to 108-60 New York Blvd., and told us that a woman was being evicted from her home. When I arrived at her house at 109-47 Union Hall St., I saw two pigs standing in front of Mrs. Mary Rice's house and also a large moving truck. Inside her house was also a potbellied Marshall, smoking a cigar named Pomar. He was giv-ing orders to the two bootlicking niggers that were taking her furniture to the sanitation department.
When I was entering Mrs. Rice's house two pig cops, badge Nos. 24772 and 26559 called me back and tried to stop me. I just kept on walking because I do not take

orders from pigs.
Inside the house I spoke to Mrs. Mary Rice and she told me her problems. She has five children from the ages of 2 to 11 years old and welfare only gives her 200 dollars per month. She has to pay 135 dollars per month for rent She also has to pay for gas and electricity and also medical ex-penses for her children. So we can clearly see that in this case as in so many cases the welfare department is not giving the people e-nough money to survive. In recent reports I read in the pig mass media that you would have to make over 10,000 dollars a year raise five children. But welfare department gives our people nothing but crumbs to survive on without taking into consideration the rise in the cost of living. Mrs. Rice also explained to me that the landlord is avaricious and one else without thinking about her or her five young children. Her landlord is a Black woman who Tucker.

Mrs. Rice also went to court in May for her house and they

August 3rd. She said that she had been constantly looking for an apartment and that everyone she had seen cost too much. The wel-fare department told her to file an application for an apartment and that she would probably get one. Later they told her there was no more room in any spart-I also asked her how was the living conditions in the house when she was there. She replied that the tollet did not work and that she could not turn off her that she could not turn oft her water in the sink, Mrs. Rice re-ceived a letter Thursday, July 30, from her landlord that she will be evicted August 3, 1970. She called the welfare department and told them that she is being evicted and they told her she will get a place to stay by August 3rd, Now Mrs. Rice has been evicted and the welfare department did not find her a place to live. On August 3, I told her to go down to the welfare, department and tell them about her problems and she did. Those fools downthere told her

to find a one room apartment for her five children. This is blatant contradiction because it is not fit for six people to live in one room. see the living conditions of Mrs. people lived under 400 years ago when we lived on the big plantation in little sbacks called houses.

Mrs. Rice is just another example of a Black woman struggling to survive on the meager allotments given to her by the oppres-sive forces of the New York City welare department who work hand in hand with the greedy, deranged landlords

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE BLACK PANTHER PARTY FROM A BROTHER BEING HELD IN "THE TOMBS", N.Y.

As-Salaam-Alaikum Beloved Bro-thers and Sisters of the Black

thers and Sisters of the Black Panther Party: I am writing this letter to you to make you aware of the injust treatment that a fellow member in the struggle against this devilish pig spectry has received. On July 21st, I was picked up off the street while in the process of searching for jobs. I had many applications for jobs in my pockets, yet these police officers still picked me up bringing me back to a so-called "scene of the crime" where this woman testified against me. This was indirect violation of my rights.
Because if they thought I committed any crime, they by law, are sup-posed to place me before a lineup, so as to be identified with other men. The plaintiff stated \$58.00 was taken from her, yet when they picked me up sixblocks away from the stated crime, all I had on me was \$48.00. Now this crime took place at 11:00 and three minutes later they picked me up six (6) blocks away, "walking" down the street.

Today I am being held in the Tombs, 125 White Street, for this alleged crime. My ball was set at \$1,500.00, and I need \$75.00 and some collateral, I believe \$1,000.00 which I can't pay be-cause I just got out of prison cause I just got out of prison from doing five (5) years and I live out of state in Boston, Mass... and my parents are so (mentally) sinwashed, they won't even thin

I have been a Muslim Minister in the prison house upstate, and was sanctioned to do so by the Honorable Elijah Muhammed. I don't believe this devils (pigs) case is strong enough to stand up, but I could be sure of that in the street

Brothers I could use any help that you can bestow on me, I have no lawyer (except the devil Legal Aid), If you could help me with my bail I would really appreciate it, and be in your debt. Today I still believe in Islam. but

my tactics will be revolutionary.

I wish you could put my letter in your inspiring newspaper for your readers to give me some

aid. For my bail I need from \$75.00 to \$100,00 and some collateral to get my immediate freedom.

I hope the Black Panther Party and the people who read this will help me gain my immediate free-dom or give me aid, or clothes, money, legal assistance or what-ever you can do for your Black brother. When I am released I am going to speak all over New York and the country, trying to unite our people to prepare for the com-ing Blood Bath Of The People's blem is guerilla warfare, not the

RACIST 77th PIGS. ATTACK BROTHERS

Saturday, August 29, the racist plgs from the 77th precinct plg station once again displayed their true fascist colors. At approximately 5 p.m., a brother named Ernie and his girlfriend were sit-ting and talking in his car when and taking in this car when a carload of pigs pulled up along-side of them. Brother Ernie had some watches lying the back seat of his car, and when the pigs saw the watches they immediately or-dered Ernie and the sister to get out of the car. Ernie asked them "are you looking for a couple of niggers to shoot" and one pig, mbling in fear, put his hand on gun. The second racist pig his gun. grabbed Ernie around the ne and began choking him until was unconscious. After these ra-cist marauders had finished working over Brother Ernie they searched his car with neither his permission nor did they have a search warrant. When these blood-thirsty pigs could find no incriminating evidence to arrest either Ernie or the sister, they got back In their car and oinked away, Several months ago on 56th and

Broadway, members of the racist 77th precinct cold bloodedly shot n and murdered a brother in street. These incidents are indicative of the types of daily hrassments and brutalization the people are confronted with, par-ticularly those people who live within the confines of 77th pig sta-

No longer can the pigs of 77th or any other pig department invade communities attacking and lizing our people. When brutalizing our people. that the Panther Party offices in Philiadelphia were under attack by the fascist gestapo pigs under the direction of Frank Rizzo, Police Commissioner, When arriving in Philladelphia about 9:15 a.m. Wil-liam Coates, Willie Joyner and mysel Raymond Jones rode into North Philly to Columbia Avenue and saw how the fascist pigs had a two block stake-out around Columbia

We left North Philly and went to our destination in West Philly; from early that morning when the pigs vamped on the office up until 5:00 p.m., when we left they still had the streets blocked with paddy wagons and police cars. Only the ople who lived in that block on Wallace Street were allowed in, and some of them did not make it into the block. One brother had to climb his own backyard fence get into his house on Wallace

pig patrol. At Wallace Street, 37th and 38th Streets there were 4 pig cars blocking each entrance of the street, in the block itself. There were two paddy wagons and about 30 pigs in all to see that nobody went into the Panther office. The pigs had two trucks to empty the house of its contents which in-cluded refrigerator, radios, Pan-ther Papers, signboards, signs, literature, clothes, in other words everything was taken out but the kitchen sink.

Hearing the people talk among themselves and asking questions, the feeling that the masses of people had about the Panthers made you feel great to be a revolutionary, part of the solution not a problem. Three elderly women who were standing on the corner talked in the Panthers favor and praised the Black Panther Party ingeneral

They talked about the brothers and sisters before they became Pan-thers and Community Workers, and how they used to fight each other They talked about how the nice the neighborhood became after the Black Panther Party was es-tablished in West Philadelphia. brothers and sisters gave candy to the children, how they came by houses to see if everybody was doing alright, gave food to fami-lies who needed it. They talked about the Free Clothing and Break-fast and Lunch Programs; about the Bar-b-Que, the Panthers had and how they, themselves and other people had participated in the Bar-b-Que. One elderly woman who lives on 37th and Wallace Streets, stated that she did not believe what was happening. She would not be-lieve that a horrible thing like this could happen and how pasty the

One sister stated how the pigs were scared when getting infor-mation on one side of West Philadelphia the response of the op-pressed masses showed the Philly pigs what they (the people) thought of them. When two highway patrolmen were shot down at 59th and Cedar, and pigs came to help the wounded pigs, the oppressed wounded pigs, the oppressed masses numbering about 300

masses numbering about 300 tried to prevent them from helping the wounded pigs. One pig was tripped by someone in the crowd while trying to chase a suspect, and suffered a broken arm. Other spectators most of them young stood behind barricades shouting out calls and heckling the pigs until out calls and necking the page shall they did know what to do. 7:50 P.M. on Approximately August 25th, five pigs (3 White undercover pigs and one White and one Black T.P.F. pig) stopped brothers Charles Parker and Wil-"lie Oatem, who were sitting in a parked car on the corner of Hertz street and Sutter Avenue. The pigs forced them out at gun point, and began to search the brothers looking for drugs, which is a typical excuse for harassment in Brownsville. The people in the community began to gather around watching these mad dogs do their daily work (terrorize the people at the point of a gun). After the pigs searched the brothers and found nothing they began to ravage through the car, again they found nothing. They began to oink to one another, having failed in the attempted rip off. The pigs got back in the car (by this time the brothers were put in the unmarked pig car) and went into his pants pocket and brought out two bags of dope putting it in one of the brother's top pocket now the pigs had invented a reason for brandishing guns through the community and framing these two brothers. The community digging all this got uptight and began to tell the pigs just how they felt about them (the pigs) and what they had just witnessed. By this time three more pig cars from the 73rd precinct showed on the spot

As the pigs were taking bloods away some revolutionary bloods from the community began oods from the community began Nicky hall bricks and bottles at the Brooklyn Branch

RACIST PIGS SHOOT AN INNOCENT CHILD IN TOLEDO, OHIO

At approximately 4 pm, September 1, 1970, an incident occurred that again showed the people of Toledo, Ohlo, that pigs have no respect for the lives or rights of Black people....

The pigs were called to investigate a charge of breaking and entering at 1235 Palmwood Ave.
When the pigs arrived on the scene they were ready to kill.

A young brotherapproximately 12 years old ran from between the house of the alleged crime and the house next door, (1239 Palmwood) when the pigs saw the brother they "oinked," stop boy or I'll shoot." The brother kept on gettin up. (This brother knew he would get no justice once he was in the bands of Toledo's racist pigs. This small child, hungry, ragged, scared—a product of this decadent American society, realized that people are oppress-ed for no other reason than being Black. Even at his tender young age he bad seen or heard o crimes and injustices perpetrated against Black people in forms of beatings and senseless murders by Toledo's pigs and knew better than to give up and possibly face this certain doom. At the time that most young children are busy that most young children are busy participating in baseball games, going on hikes or picnics, this young brother was fighting a life and death struggle for survival. The pigs started shooting at the brother as soon she ran across the street. They didn't bother to fire "warning shots." They also didn't bother to notice that there. didn't bother to notice that there

whose lives they were en-dangering. These people were sitting on their porches, playing in the streets, when all of a suddenshot at! No consideration was given for these Black people's

The pigs didn't stop to think of the possibility that some passerby might be killed by their maniac actions. There was no indication that the young brother was trying to break and enter. The complainant did not see who her so-called burgular was. The possibility of error was astronomical, but the pigs moved as if they had concrete proof that the young bro-ther was guilty.

DEMARK VESEY'S SLAVE CONSPIRACY OF 1822:

A STUDY IN REBELLION AND REPRESSION by ROBERT S. STAROBIN

PART III

The hysterical reaction to the conspiracy by virtually all White Charlestonians indicated the pathological dimensions of the 'mine of the Old South'. Officials disagreed over the extent of the plot and the best means of repressing it, but no one at the time doubted that the Blacks actually intended to rebel. The whole White com-munity seemed gripped by fear for over two months, and the panic persisted through the fall legislative session and beyond, Even Governor Bennett and his brother in-law, United States Supreme Court Justice William Johnson, both of whom deplored the panic and criticized the procedures of the authorities, believed that a plot did in fact exist and became some-what hysterical themselves (24). Bennett secretly communicated with Secretary of War John C. Calhoun to request federal reinforcenoun to request tederal reinforce-ments for localgarrisons (military place or station); Calhoun com-plied by shifting troops from Savannah and St. Augustine to the Charleston area (25). Thus, the military preparations; the numbers of arrests, deportations, and executions; the harsh punishments; and the fears expressed privately by many Whites -- all indicate the magnit ide of the hysteria.

Most of all, slaveowners feared ir 'indiscriminate slaughter' their the rape and "prostitution" White women, Such fears of so-called sexual 'transgres-sions' were a prominent theme in both private and public utter-ances, just as they had been in earlier crises (26). A Charleston businessman, for example, dis-closed that "the females were to be reserved for worse than death while a Baltimore newsweekly re-ported that a slave of Governor Bennett "was to have had his daughter, a beautiful young lady, as part of his share of the spoils" (27). Even young Anna Johnson (whose father was urging public calm) believed that "we poor dev-iis were to have been reserved to fill their Harems -- horrible--I have a very beautiful cousin", she added, repeating the rumor a-bout Bennett's daughter, "who was set apart for the wile on more properly the "light of the Harem" of one of their Chiefs ... ' (28).
Thus one historian's view that "no conspiracy in fact existed" was not accepted by South Carolinians

in 1822 (29).

Though some had aiready achieved notoriety, politicians manipulated the hysteria (which they had also created and moted) for their own political pur-poses. By the fall of 1822, James poses. By the tail of 1822, James Hamilton, Jr., the zealous mayor-prosecutor, was elected to the United States House of Representatives. Robert Y, Hayne, commander of the troops and attorney general, was chosen United States Seneral. And John L. Wilson, owner of a slave informer, became Gov ernor. By comparison, Bennett left the Governor's office in disrepute, and had his report on the con-spiracy table! by a legislature hostile to criticism of the repression of Blacks, Justice Johnson was denounced throughout the state for his dissenting view that the hysteria was unwarranted; eventually he was hounded from the state because of his opposition to nullification in 1833 (30). In general, the policies of the fanatical racists triumphed over those of the liberal politicians in the ppression of the Vesey Affair. Given the savagery of White re-

taliation against Blacks, serious methodological (asystem of methods) problems arise in assessing (impose a tax, set a rate) the evi dence left from the plot. For all of the surviving sources derive either from terrorized Blacks or fearful Whites. The trial testimony came largely from witnesses who desired to escape death or to direct attention away from them-selves. Though two leaders confessed, they did so under extreme duress; the rest of the leadership denied complicitly or remainedsilent. The original court minutes survive, but the whole trial record was edited by the magistrates be-fore publication and withdrawn from circulation thereafter. The (was) in most cases preserved as it was originally taken, without even changing the phraseology, which was generally in the very words used by the witnesses...it was thought advisable to lay before the public the whole narrative, as it was given by the witnesses, and not to suppose and not to suppress any part of it." (31) In sum, the evidence is inherently biased against the conspirators and must therefore be used with skepticism and cauti

The printed and manuscript trial may be criticized on other grounds. Discrepancies appear between the manuscript confessions by Baccius Hammet and John Enand the printed version; addictions also appear within the printed record itself (32). However, the manuscript confessions were taken when the slaves were in jail, while the printed version derives from similar, but not necessarily identical, testimons given or read in court. Moreover, the wealth of detail about the rebels' plans, the coincidence of names, and the correspondence of places contained in the printed record--all point more to com-mon knowledge by Blacks than to testimony manufactured by Whites, Also, the rebel leaders had sufficient time to destroy their records and hide their arms, since Peter Poyas and Mingo Harth were temporarily released, while Vesey and Gullah Jack remained at large for several days.

The means used to extract testimony from the Blacks also casts serious doubt on the rellability of the trial evidence. The authorities did not of course hesitate to use various forms of torture and coercion to gain information from Blacks. William Paul, for example, was kept in solitary confinement for nine days until he incrim-inated (accused) other slaves. Other suspects were lodged in sep-arate cells to prevent communication among them. Peter Poyas was chained in his cell while another Black man was being inter-rogated nearby. Monday Gell, rogated nearby. Monnay Cear, Charles Drayton, and Harry Haig confessed only after being sent-enced to death and then promised clemency for cooperation. The court simply delayed their execu-tion so that they had more time to implicate other rebels and testify against them. As a rewar the court then commuted their sentences from death to deporta-tion. Little evidence bears on the ernor Bennett admitted publically that 'no means which experience or ingenuity could devise were left unessayed, to eviscerate the plot.' (33) plot.

The trials took place in a small room in the same building where the prisoners were confined. The

public was barred from the courtroom and Blacks were not allowed within two blocks of the building. Troops guarded me prison and court day and night and continuing the concy. The trial procedure was far from equitable: owners counsel were present, but defend-ants could not confront those witnesses who gave testimony under a pledge of secrecy. Thus, four out of five witnesses against Rolla Bernett were anonymous, and the fifth was a slaveowner. The court permitted hearsay evidence without objection, and attorneys of those witnesses who testified open ly. There was no jury; only a ma-jority of the magistrates was necessary for conviction (34). Bennett and Johnson objected that these procedures were so unfair as to endanger valuable slave property, and the court later admitted that it had departed "in many essential features, from the principles of common law, and some of the sertled rules of evidence." (35) However, since Blacks were in-volved, Artorney General Hayne ruled that the procedures were justified, so the trials continued



the purpose of the trials clearly was not only to ferry (search) out and punish slave and pacify the rest of the Black community. "The terror of example we thought would be sufficiently operative by the number of crim inals sentenced to death," ex mais semenced to death, ex-plained the magistrates. Governor Bennett conceded that the death semences were intended "to pro-duce a salutary terror." (36) Altogether thirty-five Blacks were executed, many in a mass hang-ing toward me end of July; more than forty others were deported from the state. Many awaiting de-portation were still incarcerated in the workhouse as late as the beginning of 1823; others received public whippings. Those sentenced to death were hung publically before crowds of spectators, andrebe delivered to the surgeons for dissection, if requested." To com-"terror of example". plete the the Black community was pre-vented from dressing in black or

order to promote "proper" behavior by Blacks in the future, the original informers received substantial rewards from the state legislature in the fall of 1322. The owners of Peter Devany and George Wilson were authorized to eman-cipate their slaves. The traitors received life-time annuitles and exemption from taxation. The assembly then granted William Pencil, the free Black who had counseled Peter to inform, \$1,000 out-right, Scott, a free Black wno had implicated a White man, received a \$500 award. The Charleston City Gazette simply pointed to what it called 'the Missouri poison.' Chancellor Henry W. Desaussure feared, along with others, that South Carolina's "vicinity to the West incourse with them, must introduce among our people many of those who have been engaged in scenes of blood in the West Indies, who will beguile our slaves into re-bellion with faise hopes and idle expectations." The Court reported that the rebels not only had time at their disposal, but had been "indulged in every comfort, and allowed every privilege compatible with their situation in the community (and) not one (was) of bad character." Even the New York Advocate concluded that southern Blacks were "a lazy pampered race, (who) meditate murder when thus indulged." Ham-ilton attributed Vesey's actions to "a malignant hatred of the Whites, and inordinate lust of power and booty." Significantly, no South-erner could admit that slavery, even in its most privileged form was an oppressive institution which ers of banished slaves also gained inevitably led to rebellion. Only

the New York Advertiser con-demned bondage on humanitarian grounds and approached an understanding of the actual reasons for insurrection, "It ought to excite no astonishment with those who boast of freedom themselves, if they should occasionally hear of plots and desertion sinong those who are held in perpetual bon-dage," remarked the editor. "Human beings, who once breathed the air of freedom in their own mountains and in their own valleys, but who have been kidnapped by White men and dragged into endless slavery, cannot be expected to be contented with their situation.'

After analyzing the causes of the conspiracy, Carolinians pro-posed several reforms intended to control Blacks more effectively. While Governor Bennett urged Whites to comply with the patrol laws, Chancellor Desaussure favored having the slave codes made more "humane" and strictly en-forced, Slaves should be confined forced, Staves should be comment to agricultural pursuits, Black ar-tisans should be prohibited from citles, and bondsmen should be kept in ignorance and denied separate places for worship. Desaus-sure's proposal to teach both mas-ters and slaves the "mili documes of the Gospel" was supported by the Reverend Richard Furman, a leading southern Baptist, who arg-ued that the Scriptures were not inherently subversive. "Instead of taking away the Bible from Blacks, taking away the Sible From Blacks, and abridging the truly religious privilege they have been used to enjoy, to avoid Danger," Furman wr.y-o Bannett, "the better Way would be to take Measures for brigging them to a more full and just acquaintance with the former: and secure to them the latter, under Regulations the least liable to abuse." One Savannahan's pro-posal to banish to the country-side "Huxters, day labourers, draymen, and all that useless class of servants who are only a tax to their owners and a nuisunce to the city" was seconded by the editor of the Charleston Times who branded Blacks "the Jacobins who branched Blacks "the Jacobins of the country, the anarchists and the domestic menny; the common enemy of civilized society, and the barbarlains who would, if they could, become the destroyers of our race." In addition to banishing free Blacks—"thegreatest and most deplorable evil"—Charles-postitioners; uread the lection petitioners; uread the lection ton petitioners urged the legis-lature to restrict the practice of hiring out, require supervision of slave mechanics by their mas-ters, regulate the mode of Black dress, forbid the teaching of reading and writing to slaves, and con-trol the holding of real property, living arrangements, and the importing of slaves from the middle Atlantic states, A regular mili-tary force for Charleston and stronger penalties for White involvement in slave plots were also demanded. (41)

In December of 1822, the legis-lature responded to these pro-posals by strengthening the Black code. It forbade Blacks leaving the state ever to return, placed a tax on free Blacks and required them to have guardians, prohibited self-hiring, made White partici-pation in insurrections a felony, and provided for the detention of Black seamen while in South Carolina ports. In effect, therefore, the reform of the Black code means heavier repression of the Black community, for as Intendant Hamilton reported; "There can be no harm in the salutary inculcation of one lesson among a certain portion of our population, that there is nothing they are bad enough to do, that we are not powerful enough to punish." (42)

INTERVIEW WITH JEAN GENET IN CANADA CONCERNING THE

BLACK PANTHER PARTY

Reprinted from La Masse, Quebec, Canada - June 15, 1970

La Masse: What kind of Political work are the Black Panthers doing? Jean Genet: As far as the general political line of the Panthers, I can say this; racism in the United States is such that certain Blacks have been obliged to start a moveto fight the Whites in the US. Little by little they have

seen as a means of politicizing the children; they are taught who are Bobby Seale, Cleaver and Newton, what the Whites are doing, what leads the Whites, what repression they wage against the Blacks and what are the motivations of the Whites vis-a-vis the Blacks. There is also another means of information which is the Black Panther Party newspaper and other papers

devised a means of struggle ex-tremely complex because their situation is complex. That is to say that they see themselves, and they have probably good reason to do so, as an oppressed nation in the middle of a White nation; therefore their aim is to try to establish a socialism that would take into ac-count their revindications to have the same rights as the Whites, without cutting themselves off from the White world but would oblige the Whites to cethink the Black question, to rethink it not only in the light of the usual domination or paternalism, but in the equality of relationshios.

La Masse: What are their means of political Interventions? Jean Genet: Their means of Inter

vention in the political life are of various kinds; First there is a direct information that is done among the militants; I have been present at meetings where young militants are taught how to maneuver in American political life. There is also what is call dibreakfasts for young children in the ghetto of the large \merican cities; these breakfasts have a charitable

usually published by Whites, the underground papers of which there are many and in which there is always a page or a half a page devoted to the Black Parther Party and its activities. Also there is a series of talks or conferences in the universities; there has been in the last few months something even better; an attempt to reach the workers inside the unions; but that experience is still too recent to derive conclusions, but that experiment is very interesting in that it tries to contact not only the young but also White American orkers within the unions.

La Maysa: What are the relationships between the Black Panthers and White American radicals, the students especially?

Jean Genet: For some time the Black Panthers have been involved with White radical micrities generally made up if sudden's or leaders of the left such as the Chicago Seven, with whom they have short term tactical agree-ments for precise actions; for example the demonstration in New Haven a few days ago; everything was organized by White radical

radicalising the Whites? Jean Genet: For the Blacks as well as for the Whites the priority must be given to the trial of Bobby Seale who is threatened by the judicial and political authorities to lose his life in the electric chair. Even if the authorities were to give ground in the Bobby Seale affair, however slightly, it would be a great victory for the American left; I think that if Nixon or Agnew felt a determination on the part of White radicals to make demon-strations in favor of Bobby Seale and in favor of the Panthers the re pressive authorities would be obliged to hold off and it would be a great victory for the Panthers and the left.

La Masse: Could you give us a brief history of the repression against the Panthers?

Jean Genet: Everything seems to have started with the murder of Bobby Hutton and then with the arrest of Newton and the murder of Fred Hampton followed by many more murders, about thirty in one year. The Panthers reacted in several ways; first with a gun defending themselves directly a-gainst the police; they react more and more through their news-papers making known to large audiences the acts of repression of

which they are the victims.

La Masse: Was the "public" image
of the Panthers useful or not?

Jean Jenet: In the United States nore than here, the radical groups must face this incontrollable and gigantic phenomenon known as pub-licity. That is to say that the image of the Panthers has been blown out of proportion to the detriment of their real action and their serious political work. The newspapers, television and the Ameri-can radio have used the image of the Black Panthers to make them appear diabolical and acceptable at the same time but without pre-La Masse: A committee of soli-darity of the Black Panthers has just been formed in Quebec, as in many other places in the world. What is the importance of this international support of the Black Panthers?

lean Genet: First it seems to yeary important from the psychol-ogical point of view that there should be support for the Black Panthers in White countries, which allows them to think that Whites Black struggle, Second from the political point of view the Black Penthers want to have a liaison with other revolutionary groups which have the same nature as theirs, it is in that way that the Quebec committee will work I hope. And eventually the Panthers will play the same role in the United Scates for the Quebec movement, that the Quebec movement will play here for the Panthers.

Note: A Committee of Solidarity The Black Panther Party is a most advanced group involved in the destruction of the American empire inside the mother country. It is also therefore the American group most victimized by the bru-tal and savage repression from the American fascist forces, This struggle waged against America cannot leave us indifferent, for the liberation of Quebec demands our liberation from American imper-ialism. This imperialism will not let go its hold on us as long as it can at home hold the Black people in slavery: in that sease there is a direct link between the struggle of the Black Paniners and the struggle of liberation of the Quebec people. That is why the Committee of Solidarity with the Black Panthers has been for ned in Montreal in order to Inform the public of the activities of the Black Panthers and to develop links between the Black American move agai and the Quebec movement

BOBBY'S APPEAL

A. CONTEMNORS MAY BE SUM-MARILY PUNISHED PURSUANT TO RULE 42 (a) OF THE FED-ERAL RULESOF CRIMINAL PRO-CEDURE ONLY WHERE INSTANT ADJUDICATION IS FOUND NECESSARY TO ENSURE THE ORDERLY CONTINUANCE OF TRIAL PROCEEDINGS.

Citation for direct contempt should not be delayed for months, it should spring fresh from the alleged obstruction of the performance of its judicial futy, although adjudication and punishment might well awalt the conrenience of the court's business. (Parmelee Transportation Co.v. Keeshin, 292, F.2d 806, 810 (7th Cir. 1961))

Since the court failed to cite. adjudicate or punish appellant for contempt during the course of his trial, but instead walted until it had decided to declare a mistrial, summary punishment for the 16 different acts of contempt cannot be justified by any need to ensur the orderly continuance of trial proceedings. Having delayed action to that point, the trial judge was obligated to proceed under F. R. Crim. P. 42 (b) (119) rather than Rule 42 (a)

(119) "Disposition Upon Notice and Hearing: A criminal contempt except as provided in subdivision (a) of this rule shall be prose-cuted on notice. The notice shall state the time and place of hearing, allow a reasonable time for preparation of the defense. shall state the essential facts constituting the criminal con-tempt charged and describe it as The notice shall be given orally by the judge in open court in the presence of the defend-ant or, on application of the United States attorney or of an atthat purpose, by an order to show cause or an order to arrest. The defendant is entitled to a trial by jury in any case in which an act of Congress so provides, He is entitled to admission to bail as provided in these rules. If the contempt charged involved disre spect to or criticism of a judge, that judge is disqualified from presiding at the trial or hearing ex-cept with defendant's consent, Upon a verdict or finding of guilt the court shall enter an order fixing the punishment."

Since summary punishment pur-suant to Rule 42 (a) dispenses with virtually all procedural safe-guards, it can be justified only by the nost overriding necessity (120). This power to punish direct in-court contempt summarily has from its very origin been jus-tified only by the need for some means of immediately dealing with misconduct (121). While the fact that the misconduct is witnessed by the judge has been used to rationalize denial of any sort of hearing where necessity demands stant adjudication, it is clear that in the absence of such necessity fairness requires a hearing (122). Summary punishment of con-tempt is concededly an exception to the requirements of Due Procoss. Necessity dictates the de parture, Nocessity must bound its limits. (Sucher v. United States, 343 U.S. 1, 36 (1952) (dissenting))

Denying courts power summa-rily to punish trial misconduct at a point where it is no longer necessary to ensure the orderly continuance of trial in no way undermines their power to deal with such misconduct. They can summarily punish such misconduct at the point in trial where it appears necessary, or they can wait for the close of trial to provide for a 42 (b) hearing. Nor does such a rule compel sum-mary punishment without allowing any opportunity for reflection, or cause any unnecessary delay and in trial proceedings, since trial courts unquestionably have the power to cite for con-tempt during trial and defer adjudication and punishment until later time (123).

in Sacher v. United States, supra, the first case construing F. Crim. P. 42, the Supreme Con Crim. P. 42, the Supreme Court upheld convictions where at the conclusion of an eleven-month trial the court summarily punished contemnors for conduct during the course of the trial (124). Strong dissents by Justices Black and Frankfurter pointed out that since the trial had ended there was no need for instant adjudication to ensure order and, therefore, no justification for dispensing with basic procedural safeguards (125).

Even at the time decided, Sacher was an anomaly (abnor-mality) in the law (126). Previous cases upholding deferred summary action on contemptuous conduct without exception involved only deferral for a brief period prior to completion of trial (127). Commentators have consistently condemned the Sacher ruling (128). Most importantly, subsequent decisions by the Supreme Court soon signalled a return to the traditional view, vindicating the dissenting Justices' position, and making it clear that, in this repsect at least, Sacher is no longer good law.

The Court pointed out that the fact that contemptuous conduct is witnessed by the trial judge cannot justify abonding procedural safeguards, since a hear-ing may nonetheless be essential to such issues as criminal intent and mitigation of penalty (131).

It is clear in the instant case fairness demanded a Rule 42 (b) hearing. In the summary proceedings below appellant was given no opportunity whatsoever to present evidence or argument relating to guilt--he was adjudged guilty before the charges were even read to him permitted only to speak before the judge pronounced sent-ence, and given no chance to prepare and present facts relevant to mitigation. Under Rule 42 (b) appellant would have been entitled to notice, adequate time to prepare a defense, opportunity to pre-sent evidence and argument relevant to guilt and penalty (133), and representation by counsel (134). A Rule 42 (b) hearing would have enabled appellant to present evidence that he was not, as the trial judge evidently believed, engaged in an attempt to sabotage the judicial system (135), but inwas attempting to present and preserve his objections to proout being allowed to represent himself. Evidence might have demor strated conclusively that he had never agreed to be represented at trial by anyone but Garry; that he did not know Garry wouldn't be at trial until its second day, after the jury had been selected that he was not advised by the other defendants' attorneys during the course of trial; and that he belleved it necessary to preserve his rights for him continually to object to the court's rulings and to attempt to present a defense; or that ne did not know that if he prevailed on appeal he would be entitled to a new trial. Such evidence would have been relevant to appellant's (Bobby) criminal intent and therefore guilt, as well as to penaity,

BROTHERS KIDNAPPED TO FOLSOM FOR ADDRESSING THEMSELVES TO DEMANDS FOR BETTER CONDITIONS AND LIBERATION

"Liberation does not come as a gift from anybody' it must be seized by the masses with their own hands. And by seizing it they themselves are transformed; confidence in their own strength soars, experience to the tasks of building. governing, and deciding their own lives for themselves." (A Dying Colonialism)

About noon on Monday, August About noon on Monday, August 24, 1970, a number of prisoners gathered on the lower yard of San Quentin prison. At the same time, members of the Black Panther Party and other revolutionaries began to organize a demonstration outside the San Quentin gates. The demonstration was a show of protest against trials being held with-in the gates of the prison, against repressive conditions under which prisoners are detained, and against the unjust incarceration of all political prisoners.

Having been mobilized by the

presence of the revolutionary masses outside, the brothers in San Quentin proceeded to organize a merch on the custody office to demand that the racist oppression which they experienced on a daily basis be brought to an immediate

The mass march on the custody began about 1:00 p.m. fore reaching the office, the bro-thers were closed off by the pigs between two gates; leaving the majority locked in the big yard. About ISO Chicano and Blacks made it as far as the Education Building on the prison grounds. At that time the pigs drew their gues on the brothers, Refusing to submit to this attempt by the pigs to sup-press their desire for immediate change and recognition, the bro-thers presented the demands verbally to the warden. The warden, tical prisoners. They demanded that "all men presently committed mands chose not to talk with the

prisoners and suggested perhaps prisoners and suggested perhaps he would be willing to discuss the matter the next day. Still seeling the unseen support of their com-rades outside, and mobilized by their presence, the brothers de strike to 8:00 a.m. the next day, Tuesday-Black, Brown and White included

this "small sacrificial " the brothers were ready to face any consequences they must surely suffer as a result of the pigs' inability to accept the fact that these are men-political prisoners—fighting with every bit of unity and solidarity at hand for just rreatment as human beings. e revolutionary brothers were testing their rights as men to seek liberation from "endless im-prisonment and certain death!"

On Tuesday, the brothers began to carry out the strike as planned the previous day. On the yard and in full strike they gathered, chanting "Power to the People!" All this time the pigs were continuously taking pictures of the brothers so that at a later time they could easily identify who they classified (in their racist news-papers) as "ringleaders." Again refusing to let these acts of de-liberate agitation break their solidarity, the brothers proceeded with their plans to address the prison officials. The demands were read, They clearly elaborated principles to break down the racist prac-tices of the pigs at San Quentin; they stressed the changes that must be made to assure just treatment of all prisoners; and they demanded the release of all poli

Execution, immediately be granted prisoner asylum or political asylum in those countries under the Flags of Africa, Asia, North Korea, and other socialist countries and other points of the world where the American Re-volutionaries have established the Free World Solidarity Pact for All Oppressed People." These demands were read in behalf of Black, Brown and White prisoners.

All the time these demands were being read, voices of the pigs agi-tated "racial riot" over the loud-speaker. To counteract the efforts of the pigs to make their demonstration appear to be a racial con frontation, more Black, Brown and of the demands. About 1,000 prisoners came together with "clenched fists raised in solidarity" shouting "Power to the People!" The pigs are People!" The pigs are confused. Our brothers were aware that the pigs might have taken this oppor-tunity to take the lives of more revolutionaries, but as revolution-aries for this too they were pre-

Francisco Pig Department tried to murder another Black brother. Thirty-four year old Jeff Davis was viciously attacked and shot by the San Francisco pigs on the etext of having committed

brother leff and a sister by the name of Josephine were hav-ing an argument. Jeff decided to leave so he walked off right in the heat of the argument. Josephine not knowing where Jeff was going assumed that he was going to get a gun or weapon to deal with her. Under this assumption, Josephine called the S.F. Pig Department. and filed a charge of assault with a deadly weapon on Jeff Davis.

Josephine gave the pigs the
description and license number of

The pigs located Jeff's car on the corner of Third St. and Paul Ave. What these pigs did was cruise up behind Jeff's car and fire a round into the back window of his car. The bullet hit dow of his car, the bullet in Jeff between the upper right shoul-der blade and the spine. We charge attempted murder of another Black man by the S.F. Fascist Folice

These pips not satisfied with the fact that they only wounded and not killed him, tried to make the bro-ther bleed to death. After the browas shot the pigs snatched the brother out of the car, brutalized him in their devilish na-ture of interrogation. Knowing the brother's condition, half conscious and badly bleeding these pigs tried

August 29, 1970, the San to force the brother into saying that he had a gun. Before the brother another Black brother. ther fell unconscious he denied knowing anything about a gun

When Jeff arrived at S.F. General Hospital where his mother came to see what had happened, the pigs refused Jeff his right to full medical treatment. The x-rays that were taken that were taken below the bui-let wound, and his mother re-quested that another x-ray be taken. The doctor greed to this. When jeff's mother went to Palo Alto to get jeff's wife and arrived back at San Francisco General Hospital, her son had not been re-x-rayed but rallroaded to the city prison on the trumped up charcity prison on the trumped upcatar-ges of wreckless driving and as-sault with a deadly weapon. The only damage done to Jeffs car was a shattered window from a .357 magnum handgun. The pigs found no weapon on Jeff or in

We charge brutality and attempted murder against Alioto, Reagan, Nixon and their lackey occupation troops who occupy the Black communities all across

The brutality and attempted murder of Jeff Davis illustrated the fact that the established order has no mercy for Black in Babylon. The established order will suffer for such injustice, if take it to the streets and snipe the hog.



THE BLACK PANTHER PARTY A Force Against U.S. Imperialism

Emeruing in the Eatl of 1966 rom the most depressed sections of the White police-ridded Black Black Panther Party for Self-Defense, has in a remarkable short time been raised by its leadership time been raised by its leadership to be an extremely significant force in the political battles against American reaction. Frenzied-like imperialist ton governmental agents have continuously sought the extermination of the Black Panther leadership and the destruction of its Party.

What social phenomena brought the Black Panther Party into being? First: police brutality, unr stricted. unrestrained and ofendorsed as constituting 'law and order'

Deep emotional and political frustrations brought on by the failure of White labor leader ship and liberals among the White masses to recognize not only the validity of the demands of Blacks for equality of rights and oppor-tunitles NOW but as well the inseparable relation of those de-mands to the progressive American political scene. More, exactly how support of those demands would revitalize national morality and check the process of dehumanization initiated by racism

Third: The consequent political conclusion that Blacks seeking freedom had to go it alone. Plus a determination on the part of Black youth to fight racism in its own way, regardless of the price they night have to pay. This conclusion came from a failure to understand to save Black, Brown, Red and Yellow Americans from the de structive ravages of genocide the from the menace of imperialism.

Objective conditions were ripe for the emergence of the Black opment, the desperateness of its ideological and political struggles are unique in the annals of the agnificent battles Black Liber ation fighters have waged in the U.S.A. before the Civil War against slavery and after. It did not come onto the stage of history as did the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) piloted by the Black middle

class and a White liberal bour geoisie that dictated policy. It came from the very bowels of the ghetto's deprived and harassed youth. These events testify to the fact that the Black communities, Black ghettoes, politically and other-wise warped and stunted in their growth by the foul plague racism has foisted upon them, are fighting fronts that contain unsurpassreserves for the struggle against imperialism, USA, A., the fight for peace, a demo-cracy of and for the people, and . The Black Panther P for Self-Defense was dedicated to the struggle to end murderous police violence. Police violence was rampant in Oakland's Black ghetto. The ruling class had launched a wave of terror against Black citizens. It was fearful of the high tension in the ghetto and sought to quell the democratic struggles for ational liberation that

When this youthful Black leadership moved into the arena of organized political struggle it be-lieved that police terror if sharply challenged, could readily be brought to an end. It was to find, ver, through struggle, that the police were not an independent social force. The police, as the communist Party had declared, was a terrorist agency of govern ment used to brutalize all who passivley accept violation of their inalienable and constitutional rights, which included the allies of the "colored" citizen-

Racism had been pushed to ger ocidal proportions in Oakland. Large numbers of Blacks had migrated there during World War II from Louisiana, Texas and other points South. The ship building industry gave work to thousands. The lessly thrust jobless into the streets. Peace time economy can make unlimited jobs. It made jobs but in the aircraft factories that opened up: Blackswere the last to be hired. They were discriminated against in the skilled lobs. Thousands of Blacks found themselv among the unemployed and aland Federal governments when re-

lief was considered.

During the war imperialist ideo logists had vocally proclaimed that American imperialism was out to destroy the murderous racial destroy the murderous racial practices of the ruling class of the German Reich and smash its leadership, Nazi war criminals who had borrowed heavily from the bestial projet present of Amer ica's ruling class were condemned. tried and punished. Justice Robert Jackson, the American prosecutor had made an outstanding condemation of bigotry and racism in his opening remarks at Nuremberg's trial. U.S. imperialists and racists had signed the Charter of the United Nations. The Governitself to end racism reaffirming ges its leaders never meant to

Millions of Black Americans were that the American brand of racism was also to be a victim of the war crimes trial. They did not war crimes trial. They did not realize that racism was inherent in capitalism. Nor did they ap-preciate how deeply racism had been dehumanized. They did not understand the nature or scope of the struggle against it nor didthey see it as a struggle for country and mankind as well as for them-

Blacks in Oakland, as elsewhere. demanded work or adequate re-lief, They got neither. The terror that had been slackened during the hot war was now renewed as the cold war was intensified. It was revived with greater conscious ness. The bourgeoisie felt the need to smash the natural trend toward unity that had begun to develop as Black and White worked side by Black and White worked side by side on the war jobs. America's White ideologists began by paint-ing anew the picture of Blacks as a shiftless cowardly people with incurable criminal ten-dencies. Blacks were terrorists!

The situation in Oakaind was orse than in many other places because the war and the depression before it brought an influx of politically backward White southerners literally steeped in the myths of White superiority. The picture of Blacks painted by ruling class ideologists was acceptable to those Whites now that a new fight for jobs had been sharpened. Labor had done little or nothing to help its rank and file study the com-plexities of the question of racial persecution.

The leadership of White labor had been brought off or duped by the "Establishment." It ignored the democratic demands of Blacks even though these demands clearly reflected the needs of all of American labor. The political demands advanced by Blacks should have been embraced by labor as it de-veloped as a class for itself. It was wise to sing "We ain't goin study war no more" but wiser to stop studying..the class nature and consequences of racism.

munists on the West Coast had called for unity in struggle of Black and White. They spoke casually of the menace of racism to labor but not to Whites generally. The call though clear was ineffective in the ghetto save around ques tions of Civil Rights, Reaction had launched a systematic and persis tent anti-Communist crusade in the ghetto. His conception that the Party was primarily a self defense group against police brutality is a most narrow interpretation of the concept of self defense by the ophave no understanding of the historical predecessors of the Party, especially Malcolm. He fails to understand the lessons learned by the Party through the failures of such civil rights organizations as SNCC, NAACP, etc. (i.e. power politics, mass force). Mr. F terson questions whether Bla should have their own organization to fight for national liberation. While he often says the struggle is for national liberation he really does not believe that Blacks in the U.S. are a colony. He says Blacks made a mistake when they decided that they had to control and lead the fight for their liberation and freedom. He talks about "the price they might have to pay." Does he propose that Blacks wait for White labor to lead the liberation struggle ar a time when White labor subjectively views itself as abeni-ficiary of capitalism? Labor unions are presently the stooges of the capitalist warmongers. in an attempt to label the Party as nationalist (that is, not interested in the struggles of people of other races) he completely fails to understand that our freedom and dignity is necessarily tied to the freedom and dignity of the op-pressed masses of the world.

Mr. Patterson never specifies what he means when he talks about the desperateness of the Party's ideological and political struggles. Were they "desperate?" or merely intense as we sought to confront the enemy and move the struggle to a higher level. What does Patterson mean when he refers to Blacks as "reserves" in the fight against imperialism? If Blacks are the "reserves" then who is the forefront of the struggle? It is apparent to any sane person that Blacks are the vanguard of the struggle against imperialism in the U.S.

Patterson tries to make the peo-ple think that the B.P.P. thought that police terror could be 'readily brought to an end' if it was "sharply challenged". This ties in with his earlier notion that the Party was organized by fools who were just reacting on a gut level to the police brutality they had seen all around them. He forgets or dismisses all of my early writings and all of Eldridge Cleaver's early writings about who the police are and to say that the Party did not understand that the pigs are an agent of the ruling class. "The police department and the armed forces are the two arms of the power structure, the muscles of control andenforcement...they use force to make you do what the deciders have decided you must do...Both police and armed forces follow orders. Orders flow from the top down." Patterson will not admit that the Panther Party

When Mr. Patterson discusses leadership understood this re-e social phenomena that brought lationship from the very beginning because he is a revisionist and opposed to armed struggle. He tries to hide my major point in the article on "Functional De-finition of Politics" because he does not want to meet those argu-ments head on. When we used "For Seif Defense", we realize that all oppressed people or legitimate revolutionary oppressed people never are the aggressors; all of their action is in self defense. The Vietnamese people are merely using self defense; it's the capi-talistic, imperialistic exploiters who initiate violence and ag-gression. So whatever the people do for their liberation, for their freedom is a self defense tactic. When we use self defense, we use it in the broadest sense. We've expressed time and time again, if one would take the time to look at our history as a Party (and it's recorded in our early papers and pamphlets) that when we used the words "Self Defense", we said that we're defending ourselves against poor medical care against unemployment, against against unemployment, against poor housing, all the other things that poor people of the world, and oppressed people of the world, suffer. What we have to do is find out what will mobilize the people. requesting a report on her present health. He did not reply. to 15 years. She is also responsible, along with electric chair and life imprisonment.

Loretta Luckes is an enemy of the people, a weak woman whose name can be added to the list of traitors and counter-revolutionaries over centuries who have always sold out to the racist power structure at the expense of seeing their people free.

SLAVE OF OPPRESSION AND EXPLOITATION WITHIN THE WALLS OF NIANTIC CONCENTRATION CAMP

I walked within the confines of Niantic prison seeing all the po-tential revolutionaries and I approached them speaking on this present day decadent society trying to politically educate the sisters

They related to what I was say-ing for a little while then they bee disinterested as if life has no functional meaning, no hope. I then related to them about genocide which is what they could definately relate to since this is basically their reason for being incar-

I explained to them that capitalism plus dope equals genocide and I aroke it down hoping, with extended P.E. classes to even-tually elevate their minds to a higher level. But even with me rapping as another sister from the streets of Babylon (Lumpen) the sisters still wanted to go into a metaphysical bag, about what irro-ther was throwing the hardest brick to get the bag or who was acting in a piggish manner or even homosexually which plays an important part in prison life.

P.E. seems to have left no re levant mark, which made me feel so worthless, yet I know that the position of the Black Panther Party and N.C.C.F. is that if you fail, try again and again. Because this fascist, racist system has the people's minds so distorted with their ration that the sisters and people in

CHAIRMAN MAO'S STATEMENT

I warmly support the fighting spirit of Samdech Norodom Sihanouk, head of State of Cambodia, against American imperialism and their lackeys; I warmly support the joint statement of the summit conference of Indochinese peoples; I warmly support the establishment of the Royal Government of National Union placed under the aegis of the National United Front of Kampuchea. In strengthening their unity, in assisting each other with mutual aid and help and in persevering in a people's war of long duration, the three Indochinese peoples will be able to overcome all difficulties and seize total victory.



American imperialism, while lending itself to massacres abroad, is killing White and Blacks in its own country. Nixon's fascist violence has made the ardent flames of the mass revolutionary movement in the United States surge forth. The Chinese people bring their firm support to the revolutionary struggle of the American people. Heroic in combat, the American people will conquer and fascist domination in the United States will suffer incluctable defeat—such is my conviction.

The Nixon administration is assailed by numerous difficulties, both internal and external: it is locked in struggle with a country in full chaos and is very isolated in the world. The mass protest movement against American aggression in Cambodia is unleashing itself throughout the world. Less than ten days after its formation, the Royal Government of National Union of Cambodia has been recognized by almost twenty countries. The war of resistance of the Vietnamese, Laotian and Cambodian peoples against American aggression and for national well being is experiencing an ever-better situation. The revolutionary armed struggle of the peoples of Southeast Asia, the armed struggle of the peoples of Korea, Japan and the other Asian countries against the resurrection of Japanese militarism perpetrated by the Americano - Japanese reactionaries, the struggle of the Palestinian people and the other Arab peoples against the Americano - Israeli aggressors, the struggle of the peoples of Asia, Africa and Latin America for national liberation as well as the revolutionary struggle of the peoples of North America, of Europe and Oceania are all developing with impetuosity. Leader, we dashed ahead to capture a height of the postwar Three-Year Plan for the National at a breath, Gross dustrial output value envisaged in the plan was fulfilled in two years and 8 months and overfulfilled by 122 percents in 1956. Total value of industrial output in 1956 increased 2.8 times as against 1953, 1.8 times the 1949 level and times the pre-liberation level of 1944. During the three years the production of the means of production grew four times and that of consumer goods 2,1 times.

Big successes were also scored the restoration and development of agriculture, Grain output in 1956 surpassed the prewar level by 108 percent. Agricultural cooperativization to transform individual peasant farming on socialist lines already reached a stage of decisive

People's livelihood was improved remarkably. At the end of 1956 the real wages of factory and office employees and the real in-come of the peasants outstripped

the prewar level.

We have also exerted great efforts on urban construction to stabilize the people's living and bring about the country's eternal prosperity. announced the thesis, "All efforts for the unification and independence of the country and for socialist construction in the northern half of the Republic. In the thesis he made an analysis of the different political situations in North and South Korea and elu-cidated the matters of principle -to powerfully promote socialist de-velopment in and further strengther the revolutionary base of the northern half of the Republic, the fountainhead of the Korean revolution and a decisive force for the country's unification and thereby hasten the nationwide victory of

It was a most pressing task for the continuous promotion of re-volution in the northern half of the Republic to reorganize the old production relations on socialist lines, it was imperative to realize laying of the material chnical foundations of socialism, and to give priority to the develop-ment of heavy industry for this

Drawing on the basic line of original economic construction on ensuring priority growth of heavy industry simultaneously with de-velopment of light industry and agriculture, Premier Kim Il Si gave an orientation to national economic development and set con-crete tasks to achieve the country's economic independence and the independent development of

Our people marched ahead triumphantly along the road indicated our great Leader Premier Kim Sung, registering brilliant results in the socialist revolution and socialist construction.

A new phase was opened in the development of the revolution. The postwar Three-Year Plan for the National Economy was brought to successful conclusion: industrial agricultural production of and agricultural production out-stripped their prewar levels by far. At the same time, great achievements were made in the socialist revolution of trans-forming the production relations in

town and country.

The successful implementation of the Three-Year Plan was only an initial step towards what was to be done. Premier Kim Il Sung mapped out the First Five-Year Plan whose tasks were to further expand and develop socialist re-lations in all branches of the national economy, dynamically ac-celerate the building of foundations of industrialization, increase light industry and agricultural pro-duction and continually improve the material and cultural standards of the people.

During the five years we had to refashion the relations of pro-duction on socialist lines and lay the foundations of socialist industrialization. Also in city and countryside, we had to push ahead powerfully with the socialist re-volution so as to complete agricultural cooperativization and the socialist reorganization of private

Tremendous indeed were the tasks of the Five-Year-Plan. It was envisaged in the plan to increase total value of industrial output more than 2.6 times and total value of agricultural production more than 2 times.

This means that more industrial goods than were turned out in the whole period of the postwar Three-Year Plan would be produced one year towards the end of the

The entire Korean people, closely rallied around their great Leader Premier Kim Il Sung and the Worker's Party of Korea, dashed forward for fresh victory with lightening speed. Tasks w heavy and the way to go was long and thorny, but the Party and the people were welded into a single battle formation and galloped on in the saddle of Chollima for the great cause and victory illumined

Chollima refers to a mythical winged horse that, according to legend, ran 1,000 ri a day jumping over steep mountains and fields and breaking through thick mist and clouds. The word Chollima reclouds. presents the speed of socialist con struction in our country and the revolutionary spirit of the people. The Choliima movement, a collective innovation movement of the working people, had just been initated by our great Leader in those days. This movement was expanded and developed on a full scale between the end of 1956 and early in 1957 when the socialist transformation of production relations was nearing completion nd the absolute majority of the people became socialist working people. This movement became a great revolutionary one to sweep all that is outmoded and make continuous innovations in all fields of socio-economic life . economy, culture, ideology and morality; it developed into a movement not only to change nature and society but also to educate and remould man. Thus the Chollima movement became the general line of the Party in socialist construction

The successful fulfillment of the Five-Year Plan needed great funds, manpower and materials. we were too short of them. Our Party put up the slogan, "Let us practice economy and increase production!" to encourage the peo-ple. We had to accelerate socialist

overcoming all difficulties. And we had to take 10 steps when others took a single step forward, and 100 steps when they ran 10 steps because we had led a poor life

in the past and we required much, The goals set under the Five-Year Plan which provided for an increase of 2.6 times in gross industrial output value were fulfilled in two and a half years. In the four years from 1957 to 1960 the total value of industrial output rose 3.5 times. During this period the average annual growth in production was 36.6 percent. As a result, our country came to have the firm foundation of sociallst industrialization and turned into a socialist industrial-agricultural ountry with the foundation of an independent economy

A great amount of work of which our fore-fathers could never have imagined, was performed amidst the grand march of Chollima, Remarkable changes took place in the minds of people so that they could lead all their life in a revolutionary way. The looks of the country funda-mentally changed, and so did even mountains and rivers. War wounds were healed. Modern villages and towns sprang up. Big factories and enterprises were built. Good harvests were gathered up every year. The average span of human life was extended by 20 years. So, people sing in praise of our era when the prime of youth comes back at the age of 60, and the longevity celebration is given at

Chollima march bro about great innovations and leaps forward in postwar reconstruction, pulling through one difficulty after another. Our enemies, who as-serted our Republic would not regain its feet, became dumbfounded before our great achievements. The course of building an inde-

pendent national economy in our country was a course in which we trained an army of national cadres capable of administering the state and running the economy by them-selves. Whether we could build an independent economy or not, whether we could put an end to economic backwardness and dependency or not, and whether we could preserve national sovereignty or not, depended largely upon whether we had our own naheroic Korean tional technical cadres. But we did national cadres on our own. Under the colonial rule of Japanese in perialism the Koreans were denied echnical labor and were not permitted to become, say, a lo-comotive engineer, not to speak of becoming any other kind of engineer or technician. Before liberation there was no institute higher learning in the northern half

of the Republic.
In April of 1948, the joint conference of representatives of the people of all walks of life in North and South Korea was convened at the personal initiative of Premier Kim II Sung, Ar that time a South Korean journalist asked Premier Kim II Sung "What is the bottle-neck in democratic construction in North Korea?" To this our respected and beloved Leader Premier Kim Il Sung answered: "...,A most difficult and important question confronting the people's wer after liberation is a question of cadres.

Our country was very short of cadres, technical cadres in par-ticular. This was one of the greatest difficulties in state adminis tration and economic and cultural construction, Under the wise leadership of Premier Kim Il Sung, trusting, above all, old intellect-uals, educating and remoulding them inducing them to take an active part in building a new society. At the same time, the greatest concern was paid to training many new intellectuals of worker origin. In October 1946, when the conditions of the country were very hard, Premier Kim II

founded develop national cadres sys-tematically. Since then he established numerous colleges and culture, public health, education, culture, etc. Even in the fierce flames of war, the training of national cadres was not interrupted in any generalized fashion. In 1956 a compulsory primary education system and in 1958 a compulsory secondary education, were intro-duced both for the first time in the East. Later in 1967 the compulsory nine-year technical education, the of its kind in Asia, was also introduced. In the meantime, our respected and beloved Premier arranged research institutes in safe places to protect our educators, scientists and technicians from enemy bombing during the severe war and provided them with all possible conditions and benefits to arry on scientific research for the eternal prosperity of the

Now our country has more than 100 institutes of higher learning. Some 425,700 engineers, assistant engineers and specialists are now working in the different branches of the national economy. There are many factories and enterprises where more than 1,000 technicians are working. These are to be found in many parts of the country. Thus we are in a position to solve successfully all the difficult and complicated problems arising in the revolution and construction, relying on the might and wisdom

our own national cadres.
With the successful implementation of the First Five-Year Plan in our country, the people's livelihood was stabilized andenhanced the solid material base of an independent national economy.

During the postwar Three-Year
Plan period the foundation of an independent national economy notice the people's living markedly improved and the poor disappeared. Furtherpeasants disappeared. Further-more, during the Five-Year Plan period the foundation of an inde-pendent national economy was pendent national economy was fortified more solidly, the question of food, clothing and housing was solved in the main and the peasants

solved in the main and the peasants' living was raised to the level of the middle peasants on the whole. Today, 2,690,000 students, one fourth of our population, are studying free of charge or receiving stipends at the schools of all levels from primary to college. Creches and kindergardtens, too are being run entirely at state

Provisions are supplied almost gratis to all people independently of their families. Pree medical services are introduced. Factory and office employees enjoy 14 to 24 days of paid holidays a year during which they can spend their vacations at state-run hollday resorts, according to their wishes. Women in our country have a 6-hour workday. Seventy-seven days paid maternity leave is established for the working women.

in 1958 a passenger plane flew the northern half from the South. One of its stewardesses expressed deep admiration for the fact that the people in the North were working freely and proudly and had no worries about food, clothing and housing. She envied very much the northern half where there were neither particularly well-clad people nor ill-clad people but all evenly and adequately bressed, where large quantities of cheap daily necessities instead of "luxurious" goods were stocked in the shops and where especially rice and clothing were plentiful and in-

What We Want What We Believe



Huey P. Newton Minister of Defense Black Panther Party

1. We want freedom. We want power to determine the destiny of our Black Community.

We believe that black people will not be free until we are able to determine our destiny

2. We want full employment for our people.

We believe that the federal government is responsible and obligated to give every man employment or a guaranteed income. We believe that if the white American bissnessmen will not give full employment, then the means of production should be taken from the businessmen and placed in the community so that the people of the community can organize and employ all of its people and give a high standard of living.

3. We want an end to the robbery by the CAPITALIST of our Black

We believe that this racist government has robbed us and now we are demanding the overdue debt of forty acres and two mules. Forty acres and two mules was promised 100 years ago as restitution for slave labor and mass murder of black people. We will accept the payment in currency which will be distributed to our many communities. The Germans are now aiding the Jews in Israel for the genocide of the Jewish people. The Germans murdered six million Jews. The American racist has taken part in the slaughter of over fifty million black people; therefore, we feel that this is a modest demand that we make.

4. We want decent housing, fit for shelter of human beings.

We believe that if the white landlords will not give decent housing to our black community, then the housing and the land should be made into cooperatives so that our community, with government aid, can build and make decent housing for its people.

5. We want education for our people that exposes the true nature of this decadent American society. We want education that teaches us our true history and our role in the present-day society.

We believe in an educational system that will give to our people a knowledge of self. If a man does not have knowledge of himself and his position in society and the world, then he has little chance to relate to anything else.

6. We want all black men to be exempt from military service.

We believe that Black people, should not be forced to fight in the military service to defend a racist government that does not protect us. We will not fight and kill other people of color in the world who, like black people, are being victimized by the white racist government of America. We will protect ourselves from the force and violence of the racist police and the racist military, by whatever means necessary.

We want an immediate end to POLICE BRUTALITY and MURDER of black people.

"We believe we can end police brutality in our black community by organizing black self-defense groups that are dedicated to defending our black community from racist police oppression and brutality. The Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States gives a right to bear arms. We therefore believe that all black people should arm themselves for self-defense.

8. We want freedom for all black men held in federal, state, county and city prisons and jails.

We believe that all black people should be released from the many jails and prisons because they have not received a fair and impartial trial.

9. We want all black people when brought to trial to be tried in court by a jury of their peer group or people from their black communities, as defined by the Constitution of the United States.

We believe that the courts should follow the United States Constitution so that black people will receive fair trials. The 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution gives a man a right to be tried by his peer group. A peer is a person from a similar economic, social, religious, geographical, environmental, historical and racial background. To do this the court will be forced to select a jury from the black community from which the black defendant came. We have been, and are being tried by all-white juries that have no understanding of the "average reasoning man" of the black community.

10. We want land, bread, housing, education, clothing, justice and peace. And as our major political objective, a United Nations-supervised plebiscite to be held throughout the black colony in which only black colonial subjects will be allowed to participate, for the purpose of determining the will of black people as to their national destiny.

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their unst powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But, when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security.


