DEBUNKING PARTY. January has been a busy month for the Syracuse Peace Council. Of course, the BIG EVENT was our annual Birthday Party at which Miss Jeannette Rankin, first Congresswoman in the United States, now Legislative Secretary of the National Council for Prevention of War, was our guest of honor and made a brilliant address on "Debunking War Propaganda". She not only did a thorough job of "debunking"; she made constructive recommendations, as well. She advised her hearers to "invest one dollar in peace" by buying 100 postal cards. "Don't write more than once a week," she said, "unless it is an emergency! And don't use them all yourself: get all your friends and neighbors to write. Ask questions until you get a reply. Then say "thank you; and ask another question!"

THE ONLY WAY. All this was to implement her contention: "The only thing that will keep us out of war is EXPRESSED public opinion." Challenged with the contrast between the limitless opportunities for war propaganda and the meagre resources of the peace movement, she countered stoutly: "We have one thing that they lack, DEVOTION. With it we can win."

QUESTIONS. Among the questions she suggested asking the President were:

1 - Which country do you expect will attack us first?

2 - Are you preparing for another foreign war?

3 - Will these new planes you want be for the Army or the Navy?

4 - Why fortify Guam?

Footnote: Remember, this is a democracy. Address your message simply: My dear Mr. President; Dear Senator Wagner; Dear Senator Mead; My dear Mr. Hancock.
