

Passage of the Lend-Lease Bill has not ended our struggle to keep our country out of foreign wars. Indeed, in the new situation there may be one advantage. Instead of being confused with the "Aid-to-Britain" appeal, the issue is now single and clear; and the responsibility is now centered on one man. We shall know to what and to whom to direct our efforts.

It has been suggested that organizations like ours should now disband. On the contrary, we have an increased obligation: to arouse and give voice to the overwhelming (85% on March 10th) desire of the American people to stay out of war.

The President has pledged himself to the people repeatedly to keep out of war. For example, in the Boston speech: "American fathers and mothers, your boys are not going to be sent into any foreign wars."

Mr. President, we expect you to keep that promise!

As far as we are concerned, if England keeps her independence and her navy, that is all we can ask. It is their war, after all, and we can't dictate just how they are going to draw all the lines in Europe".

This statement is important because the Senator is not only an ardent supporter of the President's foreign policy but an important Administration "wheel horse".

I. The President's Speech We quote the following as "guest editorials":

"You heard the President's speech. The tone in which it was delivered gave it a more belligerent air than the text justifies. Now that you have read it and studied its implications in the calm light of the morning, you should realize that, except for the proclamation of a national emergency, it has not taken us closer to war than we were before. What does a "national emergency" do to us?

"You will observe that its main controls concern production and transportation and the activities of aliens. But before any of these powers may be taken over by the President, he must issue an individual proclamation covering each new control.

"We believe our Constitutional rights of free speech and assembly as individuals and organizations remain unimpaired. It will be our fault if we surrender any democratic rights. Our keynote should be the President's own sentence: 'The only thing we have to fear is fear itself'." Frederick J. Libby, N.C.P.W.

"The declaration of an unlimited emergency by our President must impress all of us with the size and the length of the task that lies ahead of peacemakers not only in the United States, but throughout the world. Just as war is the most overwhelming tragedy of our time, so the task of building a peacoful world is our most challenging task.

Perhaps the most significant fact that all of us ought to pender these days is that, although the world seems topsy-turvy, it is actually governed by law and order. It is its very law-abiding qualities that are confounding us now. The law of the harvest is in operation and we are appalled by the harvest we are reaping. Let us remember that just as we are now reaping "wild oats" from those we have sowed; so we are just as certain to reap "cats of good will and peace" if we sow that kind of seed."

week-end was of heightened significance because it came hard on the heels of the President's speech and proclamation. 600 delegates representing more than 150 communities in 31 states, including the Pacific Coast, registered. Your Peace Council was represented by three delegates including our newly elected Vice-Chairman, Herbert Ellinwood. The mass meeting on Friday evening drew an enthusiastic crowd of 2000. The receipts of the meeting totaled \$1500, a genuine evidence of determination. Round table sessions were over crowded and were described as more basic and penetrating than at any previous gathering. There was a note of confidence throughout the Congress. Oswald Garrison Villard traced the history of our efforts to date: John T. Flynn declared that the high noon of the drive to get us in has passed. "The little people of America" listened to a special re-broadcast of President Roosevelt's pledges "I hate war", "I shall say it again and again, your boys are not going to be sent into any foreign wars", and resolved to hold him to those words. The Congress closed with a memorial service conducted by Jeanette Rankin and addressed by Dr. Bernard C. Clausen, who said, "We can make democracy work here; we can bring about justice and security here; we can show them how. That's the way to win this war."

III. Our Annual Business Meeting, on May 26, with twice as many members present as last year, was the best ever. There were three high points: (1) Gene Bartlett's report of the Churchmen's Campaign for Peace Meeting in Chicago, with its assurance of support from peace minded ministers (there are more than forty ministers in this area who have promised cooperation): (2) the account of the splendid achievements of the Rochester Citizens No-War Committee, given by its able Executive Secretary, Mrs. Georgia Bevilacqua, was a direct challenge to our best efforts in Syracuse: (3) Announcement in the Chairman's annual report that the NEWS LETTER would be discontinued during July and August almost broke up the meeting as members began bringing dollar bills to the table. This wholly spontaneous offering together with offers of volunteer help have assured the LETTER for the summer months.

IV. The Mye Mass Meeting in the Mispah Auditorium on June 4 brought out a splendid audience of 1100 and a collection more than sufficient to pay the costs. The hard work of a large committee under the effective leadership of Tracey Jones deserves great credit for the success of this meeting. The senator was interviewed by Vedeboncouer on Station WSYR before the meeting, and the entire address was broadcast by Station WOLF.

Senator Nye made effective use of quotations from British and American statesmen to prove the insincerity of the elogans under which the present war is being "sold" to the public; he warned us against yielding to the "hysteria of hate and fear" whipped up by propaganda devices which has brought us peace time military conscription and threatens us with economic collapse and involvement in a foreign war; he pointed out that our foreign trade does not begin to equal the billions now being "lease-loaned" to Britain and would not be worth the loss of one American boy; he urged us to continue our letters and messages to the President, "No Convoys, No Doughboys, No War".

Mr. Roosevelt said that he was defending the United States when he ordered the occupation of Iceland by our naval forces, because by this move he was forestalling German occupation of the island. However, when questioned by newspapermen, he could cite no threat to Iceland on Germany's part and he seemed to overlook the fact that Iceland was already held by a very formidable force. Senator Taft charges that the President has exceeded his constitutional authority and that with Iceland as a fait accompli he can occupy Ireland, Scotland, or Norway.

IMPEACHMENT The National Council for Prevention of War is calling for the removal of the Secretary of the Navy Knox because "he has repeatedly intimated that SECRETARIES the American Navy should and would start shooting without reference to a declaration of war by Congress. In so doing he shows himself out of touch with American Public opinion, which every poll shows to be from 70 to 80 per cent opposed to our participation in this war. Worse still, he has advocated unconstitutional action and apparently gave the orders which led to the dropping of depth bombs without declaration of war." The depth bombs, he admitted at a closed session of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee on July 11, were dropped over what the commanders of an American destroyer believed to be a German sub-

Secretary of War Stimson was quoted in Washington dispatches of July 12 as having "informed Congressional leaders that, regardless of legislative hindrances, if the time comes when U.S. security requires that troops be dispatched outside the western hemisphere, they will be sent first and Congress informed of the action later." Because of this "public flouting of the laws of the country", his impeachment is being demanded.

The National Council feels that the "essential thing is that we take the offensive in order to stop the President's confronting us constantly with accomplished facts closer and closer to war".

"NO A.E.F.", General Marshall's appeal for lengthened service on the part of our conscripted army is as one with his request for 3,000,000 men who can be sent "anywhere in the world". Without the lengthened term of service there can be no A.E.F. There is no proposal that could be more hateful to the American people. Oswald Garrison Villard, Honorary Chairman of the Keep America Out of War Congress, says: "General Marshall should be asked to show what possible need there is for three millions of men when, as everybody knows, there are not transports enough in all the merchant fleets of the world to move a million men and their supplies. He should be asked just where these men are expected to fight -- whether in Russia for our new ally, Mr. Stanlin, or in India, under General Wavell, or elsewhere."

SPEAKING OF

RUSSIA . . . "The interesting dilemma raised by the German-Russian war," says Frederick Libby of the National Council for Prevention of War, "seems to have been solved by Prime Minister Churchill and our government on the superficial basis of 'he who fights Hitler, whatever else he may be, for this moment is my friend'. Those who a year ago cheered on the brave little Finns must now rationalize their position so they can stand with Russia against these same little Finns, This predicament, of course, also holds for the other Baltic states, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. We are witnessing, to an unprecedented degree, the total depravity and hypocrisy of the whole war system. France, who was an ally, is now an enemy. Russia, who was an enemy, is now an ally. C'est la guerre!"

"That we are opposed to war is known not only to every American but to every government in the world. We will not use our arms in a war of aggression; we will not send our men to take part in European wars."

President Roosevelt to Congress.

The passage of the draft extension bill by such a narrow squeak is in reality a serious defeat for the Administration forces. If there had not been so much pressure brought to bear upon the Congressmen, the bill would certainly have been lost by a very substantial majority. Obviously Congress is not convinced that our 'national interest is imperiled", nor is Congress taking heart from Churchill's military alliance with Stalin. In fact that coup d'etat has strengthened the opposition to our involvement in war on the side of Communist Russia, particularly among Catholics. The slim margin of passage of this bill further means that a great many of the draftees who are being kept in the army for another two and a half years are worried about their future, since jobs cannot be held for them now and if now the President presses for the third proposal - that of sending the boys anywhere in the world - it would be defected unless he has taken us into the war past retreat. And that would be dengerous with the nation so overwhelmingly opposed to involvement and in general unprepared for war.

RUB-A-DUB-DUB"Uncensored" has this to say about Mr. Churchill's and Mr. Roosevelt's meeting at sea: "The Joint Declaration by Roosevelt and Churchill is neither a Magna Carta nor a Declaration of Independence. It has not and apparently is not going to fire the imagination of men who would be free. As social documents go, the eight points fall into the category in which the platforms of the Democratic and Republican parties belong. Its joints are exposed. It was constructed to please the most and offend the fewest among the conglomeration of forces threatened by the Axis."

"FOOLS' GOLD" While the ordinary citizen worries about taxes and is asked to make all sorts of sacrifices for national defense, the government allows so-called "commission" men to reap juicy fees for their part in landing defense contracts for manufacturers who have no access to official Washington. So says the "New York Times" of August 10, 1941. The Times points out quite aptly that this procedure runs up the cost of national defense and correspondingly increases taxes; and then this journal draws a parallel between such an agent and Sir Basil Zcharoff, munitions maker of World War 1. Did someone say something about taking the profits out of war? Indeed he did, at Chautaugqua, August 14, 1936: "Nevertheless, if war should break out again in another continent let us not blink the fact that we would find in this country thousands of Americans who, seeking immediate riches - fools' gold - would attempt to break down or evade our neutrality. . . . To resist the clamor of that greed, if war should come, would require the unswerving support of all Americans who love peace. If we face the choice of profits or peace, the Nation will answer - nust answer - 'we choose peace!" -- President Roosevelt.

WE POINT WITH The first New York State Institute of International Relations pride sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee at Cornell University during the first ten days of August was an unqualified success. 140 delegates - not counting those who attended single sessions when the attendance rose as high as 600 - were registered. Every part of the state was represented; Syracuse sent 9 registered delegates and 14 others attended one or more sessions.

The weather was unparelled; the accommodations were superb; the delegates were superior! For ten days they faced squarely the problems of international relations from points of view ranging from military intervention to religious pacifism; from the history of diplomacy to the science of race relations. If education of the individual means anything, there ought to be some influence felt on the thinking of at least 60 different communities during the coming months.

To all those who directly or indirectly helped make this success possible: THANK YOU! To all those who wanted to come and couldn't, begin to plan now for the Mid-Winter Institute to be held on a week-end probably in February in Syracuse; and for the Second Summer Institute in 1942.

LABOR DAY The labor union movement, like political democracy, has its imperfections; yet it is the major expression of the democratic principle in industry. In many industries the men and women who work with their hands have become a great organic movement, involved directly in the worldwide struggle for the preservation and growth of democracy. In countries where liberty and equality prevail as ideals of human relations, there the labor movement is strong. Where democracy has been discarded, as in the totalitarian states, there the independent labor union movement has disappeared. Democracy, by the very law of its nature, must extend into industrial and economic as well as political relations. Industrial civilization must either extend more democratic control to those who produce and to those who consume economic goods and services, or it must center total power in a political state. There seems to be no other alternative.

SEPTEMBER MEANS STAMPS

The first need to the orfice as we swing into full time action again is postage stamps; literally thousands of them. An easy thing to do, but a great help: SEND STAMPS IN SEPTEMBER.

On August 8, Lega Henderson, head of the Office of Price Admin-GUNS OR BUTTER istration and Civilian Supply, told the House Banking and Currency Committee that unemployment would be increased by about 2,000,000, an increase which he described as 25%. He added that workers in non-strategic (that is, non-defense) jobs would take sharp loss in real wages. Last week, Leo M. Cherne of the Research Institute of America diclared that the Office of Production Management has prepared a secret list of forty industries that must eventually be closed down. Defense gets the preference; non-defense can go hungry. --Anti-War News Service.

Without promotion, publicity or prominent position of any kind, the voting machine at our exhibit at the State Fair polled approximately 1000 votes on the question, "Should the U. S. go into the War?" The vote was 82% NO; 18% YES. This is in direct line with larger sample and newspaper polls across the nation. By the way, Adelaide Webster, who was in charge of our Fair Booth, reports that it was one of the most successful in recent years. THREE (3) CHEERS for Mrs. Webster for "carrying on" so successfully during the summer months. months.

MARCH OF MONTHS In June it was rumored in Washington that diplomatic relations with Germany might be severed "within a few weeks"

In July the London "New Statesman and Nation" printed a report on the state of American public opinion from the distinguished H. N. Brailsford who wrote: "I am reporting what I cannot doubt... massive reluctance to face physical participation (in the war) is the main fact that confronts the President."

In August, "Peace News" also published in London said: "It is all very well for

President Roosevelt to attempt to persuade his fellow-countrymen that their vital interests, their national existence, is being imperilled by Germany's conquest of Europe; it is, in reality, an attempt to persuade them that the Atlantic does not exist. But it does exist, and it is a barrier."

In September "it is understood" in Washington that the President is disappointed

AT EXCELLENT EXAMPLE

By special permission we present the following letter.

"The President The White House Washington, D. C.

"Sopt. 12, 1941

"Dear Mr. President:

"Appreciating your reminder to your fellow citizens that we are free and fearless Americans living in a democracy. I want to express to you my prefound disapproval of the policy you announced in your speech last night. If I understood you correctly, you have instructed our navy to shoot on what I regard as the European side of the Atlantic Ocean, without having sought the authorization of Congress and without giving our people opportunity to vote on the great issue that is involved.

"I have maintained up to last night that you did not intend war. You have com-pelled me to change my stand, to my deep regret. If a "shooting" war starts now in the Atlantic, I cannot agree with you that the whole guilt will rest on Hitler. Your occupation of Iceland seemed to me to take us unnecessarily and aggressively into the zone of the fighting, which the Neutrality Act was designed to prevent. "The Eight Points of your Joint Declaration with Mr. Churchill I have hailed,

as the little bulletin that is enclosed will indicate, as a sound and constructive starting point for a negotiated peace. They would, I believe, be the seed of future wars if dictated to a conquered Germany. But with an opponent of fairly equal power on the other side of the table to balance the bargaining and make the disarmament, the freedom of the seas, and the abandonment of imperialism equal for

all nations, these Eight Points can be in truth the Magna Carta of a new world.
"It is to that end that my colleagues and I will work. I believe that the 'Divine guidance' to which you alluded is with us.

PEACEMAKER --- WHAT NOW?

Momentous events have taken place since our last issue; a major objective of our effort through the years has failed; our beloved country is at war; to many of us it seems that earth's last, best hope of democracy is gone. But remember this: no single fact on which our program was built has changed; no single conviction on which our policy was based has changed. And there are yet tremendous tasks which as loyal citizens we can and must perform. Indeed, it is quite possible that no one else can or will perform them. Our responsibility is not less, but more.

The original statement of purpose of the Syracuse Peace Council in January, 1936, read, in part: "To discover and unify the peace forces of this area for their mutual strengthening and support." That statement still stands.

Our first specific objective was "a continuing program of peace education" in the community. That objective is still valid.

For America must not again win a war to lose a peace. And the bases of a just and durable peace will be established only if there is an informed public opinion to demand and support such a settlement.

We are now not free from war, but the other three freedoms of our 1941-42 statement of policy must be maintained.

We can educate for a new world order: NOT ARMISTICE BUT PEACE. And so we announce our sponsorship and support of the Institute of International Relations on the theme, "Bases for Building a New World Order", to be held in Syracuse in February. Our January number will bring you a full announcement.

We can minister to the civilian suffering caused by war. We shall con-

We can minister to the civilian suffering caused by war. We shall continue to serve the American Committee for Christian Refugees and to collect clothing and gifts for the American Friends Service Committee. We shall strive to mitigate inter-racial hatreds and intolerance such as are bound to arise in times of national excitement.

We can guard jealously the constitutional civil and religious liberties for which America stands. They are, as always in war time, in grave danger. In large measure the extent of their limitation and their future existence will depend on the alertness and the courage with which we exercise our responsibilities as citizens.

To work out a world in which peace will be more than a breathing spell on the mad relay race to destruction, WE CARRY ON!

ANOTHER ANSWER

Most of the current discussion of the war and foreign policy assumes that our choices are limited to two: that V must stand either for Victor or Vanquished; that either we are to go "over there" and carve up Germany into a number of helpless provincial states or that Hitler will come over here and carve us up into chunks convenient to his purposes; that the world must be dominated by Germany-Italy-Japan or by America-Britain-Russia; in a word, that the capital of the world is to be Berlin or Washington.

We deny both the validity and the realism of this view. There is now, as always, Another Answer: a "cooperative commonwealth" of nations. As steps toward the realisation of this third alternative we urge your careful study of the "Call to America" enclosed.
