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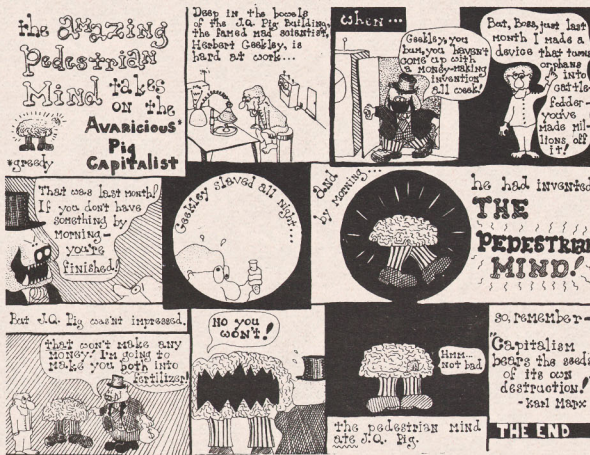

Comrade Sou-Tze clarifies Mao

Dear Bill P.,
 In reference to your letter in QT 25, Oct. 19-29, which attacked Gilbert Shelton for his "smearing Caricatures" of various revolutionary types, and QT for publishing the strip, I would like to make a few comments on what it looks like from my end.

Is Shelton "out of touch with reality"? That's a pretty sweeping statement, especially from one who I assume doesn't know him personally. If by "reality" you mean what actually goes on in the world, then don't come looking for it in a comic strip, particularly an underground one. Truth may sometimes be stranger than fiction, and art of any kind (humor certainly) must be based on experience, but the essence of art is the interpretation of facts into something imaginary which nevertheless tells us something special about ourselves. Its power is not sapped by distracting and unnecessary details. The foundation of humor is the incongruous, and the foundation of the comic strip is caricature. You say you are "criticizing humour, not putting it down." While your statement is not as self-contradictory as it might seem (i.e. the criticism is perhaps constructive), it looks to me like you are attacking the very roots of humour.

Is humour to be subservient to someone's solemn ideology, law, culture, lifestyle, or whatever? Art has been put into the service of "the revolution" before, and the results have hardly been encouraging. For a few years after 1917, Russian artists were given free rein, and great strides were made by the likes of Gabo, Moholy-Nagy, and whole schools of eager young men. Then Comrade ("Brother") Lenin and his cronies realized that art refuses to stand still, and that they might have a new revolution on their hands, against them, this time. Since then we have been treated to a body of "revolutionary" work, the dullness and ugliness of which has rarely been surpassed, excluding perhaps the handiwork of our own artists in their contribution to the New Deal. Hitler was also a great patron of the arts. He was also the sole arbiter of public taste, and the reason there are so few shows of Hitler - approved art is not merely his reprehensible conduct in other areas. When it isn't vulgar, egocentric, or maudlin, it's just plain lousy. There is certainly such a thing as doubtful taste in humour (and it seems that this is your gripe against Shelton), but you don't have to read the strip. Humour is the last defense against oppression of the mind, and to destroy it would be unwise, to say the least. Though you have implied that this is not your intention, things can progress little by little to the state I have described.

Is Cleaver a humourist? The gist of Farina's novel was that any revolution is ultimately confined to one's head, and that too often valiant crusades become blind, intolerant, destructive, petty, and not a little ridiculous. Trashing, anyone? Lenny made his living "giggling at society's hang-ups." Is Walt Kelly "outrageous"?

SHOULD QT "place priority on stressing the sober validity of the hijackings"? If I have learned anything from life it is that taking some things too seriously usually has a nasty way of turning into disaster, be it minor, like a painful life, or major, like an Inquisition, holy war, bombing, or nectie party. If you can't laugh at yourself or your cause once in a while, there may be something wrong with both.

Making it better

The dope dealer

Your friends turn you on to grass the first few times, and you dig it, so you want some more, and besides, you want to return the favor; so you look around for some really fine shit at dynamite prices, and you end up snapping up the first thing you run into, ten, twelve fifteen or twenty bucks worth.

Well, that can't go on forever unless you're very rich, so lured on by promises of free dope and a quick return on your money with a minimum of effort, you get hold of a pound and do ounces for your friends. If you've ever been poor out on the street, and you can't relate to pig society and a goddam job, then you know what an attraction dealing is as a means of support. Suppose you get convinced it's fine shit at good weight, so you pay \$160 a pound for it. That's \$10 an ounce for 16 ounces, so on the original \$160, you can make \$80, selling full weight ounces at \$15; or, you get to smoke five ounces free while you turn over eleven to the people who are now in the same position as you once were. Now whether you smoke those five ounces up, or spend that \$80, either way you are consuming the surplus, using up what you 'earned' for the hassle and risk, real or imagined, that you had to go through to get, divide, to distribute the shit. You see, the way people look at it is, every time the grass changes hands, someone has put some extra work into it, and taken some extra risk. And that increases its value - and people are really into being compensated for that work, by the next man or the next woman down the line.

Now some people are so into the compensation that they're willing to do a little extra work to get some more. Like taking a quarter pound of sugar for every pound of grass, dissolving it in water, pouring it on the grass, and letting it dry, leaving the sugar behind to make the dope heavier. There are 22 ounces now where there had been 16 and \$120 profit instead of \$80. Very together in one way of looking at it. Very untogther from another point of view - this is called 'adulteration of the product' - a very common capitalist trick. It's done to tobacco, chocolate, wine, all the time.

Alright. Assume now that by hook and crook you've established a prosperous dope business with steady connections, and some 'capital' - and you decide to make a big cop - a hundred pounds, say. Now you're selling to dealers who sell to dealers, etc. That's a good business - for one thing, it's easier, even in times of drought to find large quantities to buy than small ones and the connections for larger amounts tend to be steadier. Also there's less chance of being sold bad shit. Further there's a chance you can corner the whole market in your area, and set terms on prices, getting a healthy cut of all the local business. And there's a hundred reasons for getting into a heavy business trip - all the freedom, mobility and security you could never have on the street, and free dope to take and give away to everybody, all the things you never could have before. From this point on is when the heavy shit starts happening. You form a syndicate with friends, with smugglers, money men, phone people, bookkeepers, subordinate dealers, and traveling salesmen, your ambassadors to the sticks where prices are high, a sellers market. You go into psych edelics - you hire a chemist, buy a lab - a tabbing machine, an airplane - establish connections for trading - and as long as you can keep the pigs and the Mafia off your back, or out of your territory, you're sitting pretty. A big dealer. Getting it all together takes a fuck load of capital - past profits extracted from customers by fair means and unfair ones too, all too often.

So far, what's been said exposes where it's at economically in the dope trade to those who don't know - except in those few honest syndicates run solely for mutual benefit of buyer and seller, where profit covers costs and a modest living for the dealer, and where



some bread at least goes out to the community as a whole - to a people's center a free store, a breakfast program, a free wheel, a crash pad, etc. Also what's been rapped about here shows how capitalism works, by a small example - there's profit, and adulteration of the product, and more profit; there's capitalization, and syndication, monopoly, diversification, with, finally, in the worst cases, a whole scene being controlled by a dealer at the top, then his middlemen, lackeys and favorite connections.

This is the time to get out of the strict economic rap, and get down to what the trade does to people, how the relations of buy and sell, and profit, take people out on trips, really change and affect every aspect of their lives.

First of all, there's the hustling going on from the very beginning. Getting people onto grass, turning them on, besides being a pleasure, for the dealer, is a necessity. That's where the dealer survives, makes his living. So you make yourself as groovy as possible, as socially cool, and acceptable and useful as you can. You solve people's problems, make people happy, love them or make them think you love them. You offer them the image and the friendship of a person free from school, and straight jobs, and all the hassle we run into. A person free to travel (although an established business can tie you down) a person with enough bread to live any way you want to. This is especially important to the travelling dealer in small town upstate areas, this image of freedom, being the bearer of a new culture, new music, new ideas, new social relations, the Easy Rider trip, for better or worse. And the friendship, the problem solving, turning people on and helping them kick out the jams, relax, take it easy, this is very important in the city to establish buyer loyalty. In the city, the buyer has so many dealers to choose from, that it's good to have some tie with your market, besides just an economic one. And anyway, besides just needing bread, a lot of people get into dealing from being lonely - digging on something that gives people an excuse to get to know each other better. Because everybody knows how uptight we are in this society about real closeness with other people.

But there's a reason for that - buying and selling. On the dope scene, like anyplace else, except among true friends, you not only never get something for nothing, but you also have to give the middleman a little more. Not that dealers shouldn't make a living, not that there isn't a risk with the pigs, not that trusted middlemen aren't necessary to get the shit out on the street, to give you somebody trustworthy to cop from. These

are good things, not bad things, these are things that let us dope smoking outlaws stay clear of the slam, living the kind of life we dig in peace and a little freedom. But that's where the real problem is. Because plenty of dudes can only think as far as using people to get a little more money, and using money to get people to dig you a little more. Because the only freedom we can have in this society is the freedom to say fuck it on the one hand, and to buy some security on the other. You have to get bread to travel, and dig on fine things, etc. Like women - because you see, most dealers, like most rock stars, are men, and people are looking for somebody, some dude, who has it all figured out, and sewed up tight - somebody secure, financially and otherwise, somebody women dig - see, the fucked up dude attracts fucked up women with his money, and his free-wheeling life style. Because she's been oppressed and repressed all her life, just for being a woman, and the only way she sees to get out is to cop herself a free-wheeling well-to-do man. But then she becomes just an object of pleasure and a measure of his status, like his record player, his apartment, or his car. And the really tragic thing is people believe the myth that you can cop, in the bread-ruled system of buy and sell, some real freedom, and respect, and love - and some cats use our culture, our freedom with our bodies, our music, our genuine love for each other, just to sell more dope, be adored by more people, have more women, seem more of a man, strong and secure just on his own, by his own power - and that's a lie and a drag. A lie because nobody, especially a dealer, is doing it all up on their own, with no help or sacrifice from their friends - it all happens in a social context of mutual help and equality, so why should one person get more benefits than another? And the bad shit in the scene is a drag, because when you use all the free and people loving things we know and do, when you use these things for some ulterior motive, for Me First, then there's no freedom and no love, only slaves and masters, you know, users and used, macks and marks. And this relationship is clearest and worst in the hard dope trade - smack and speed, where the dealer is a pig, pure and simple, and the junkies and prostitutes he controls are his slaves, he has life and death power over them. The people have to put an end to this trip. It's a control trip, it's an ego trip, it's a lonely and insecure trip, it's the trip that made your father a pompous asshole fronting off for some pig that turned your mother into his public bankbook, into his slave and his teddy-bear, his 'love' slave.

So what we can do is keep getting high, and keep loving each other, not using 'love' to get bread, or bread to get 'love', but freely loving out of all the strength we have. Formine done co-operatives, sharing the wealth; and if it's got to be a profit thing, since we can't relate to pig jobs and since there is a risk in dealing, since you can become a political prisoner for smoking a joint, well, we ought to move some of the profit into bust funds, and we ought to have some kind of underground to disappear into when shit gets too heavy out in the cold. And we ought to have people's programs, free stores, free food, deocent crash pads, so nobody has to be so afraid of the down-and-outs, that they're going to be ready to use people, playing king of the mountain with thousands of other poor fools, each one believing he's going to be the one in the top spot. And finally, and I think this is the most important, if the sisters get together, and won't take any more shit, any more bullshit 'love', if they teach the brothers where love is at, how it's a two-sided thing, and if the brothers get together, and teach each other that slavery is not where it's at, I feel that if this happens, nobody's going to be so uptight about being a Man with capital M, that he'd be ready to cover up his loneliness and insecurity with people and things bought and sold with the profits that come from using people. That's a front, and a bullshit satisfaction, that's no satisfaction at all. Where we came from way saying 'I am who I am and I love you.' It's that culture, that way of relating, that sold dope in the first place.

Emergency still rockin'

but...

...G-town Citizens' Assn. can't dig it

Emergency, Inc., at 2813 M St. N.W., is the only nonalcoholic club in Washington where one can listen to live rock music. For two years it has served the youth community as a place for people to relax with music and refreshment, as a vehicle for local bands, and as a record shop. In these three areas, Emergency has tried to keep in mind good entertainment at cheap prices.

But, as it sometimes happens, such generosity is met with little thanks or support. At present, Emergency barely survives.

The concept of Emergency as a non-alcoholic rock club was formulated in October 1968 by a group of area high school students. With the aid of several university students, professional lawyers, accountants, and architects, these people set about, in the words of the current manager, to "provide Washington with a good place for bands to play, a good place for audiences to listen, and to sell records as cheaply as we could to help sideline the two other philanthropic missions."

The first six months were spent finding a location for the club and organizing the business. A building was rented and renovated, and five months later Emergency opened its doors to a public more than ready for the entertainment it offered. The initial admission price was two dollars, but soon enough that price had to be raised 25¢ to include the D.C. entertainment tax.

When Emergency first opened, its old manager, Michael Schriebman, booked quite a few out-of-town groups as well as local groups needing promotion. But, as hiring groups from New York, San Francisco, Detroit, and other cities became too expensive, and Emergency rapidly started to lose money, local bands felt the tightening of the purse strings. Many local bands complained. Still, the bands continued to be booked, and the audiences appeared content. What the public did not realize was that the people who were providing them with live bands and comparatively inexpensive records were going through difficult times for these reasons:

First of all, a club which serves only soft drinks fails to take in much profit. In order to attract a steady audience the club must hire popular entertainment. Emergency ran into problems in hiring nationally-known groups, and not being able to pay its local bands enough. Every business has an overhead to meet. Emergency has, and still has, creditors and a landlord to pay, and investors to attract. In order to survive, any club must make at least enough money to cover expenses.

Also affecting Emergency's op-

portunities for making money is the trend rock music is following these days. People do not want or need to pay bread to hear music. Woodstock dramatically changed the economics of rock music, and since then the prices charged for hearing live bands have declined. The break-up of the Beatles also played an important part in the trend; this supergroup that had given the public so much for so long was now calling it quits, disappointing its supporters, and also defocusing, unintentionally the spotlight that had shown so long and so brightly on acid-rock. In fact, the whole rock scene, at the small businessman level, now started suffering a depression; only the industrial giants continue to make any noticeable profit, and Emergency is not one of these.

Therefore, to increase its chances to survive, the club now plans to diversify its operation. It wants to begin offering films and a repertory theater, as well as to make the place available for private parties. To do this would mean obtaining a public hall license and a parking variance in order to provide customers with enough space.

Standing in the way of the appeals Emergency's lawyers have made to the D.C. Board of Zoning Adjustment is the Georgetown Citizens' Association. This group would like to see Georgetown return to the old-fofey peace 'n quiet and the amachronistic sedateness of its earlier days. Emergency's manager, Peter Delano, sees the Association as the major cause of its problems.

"The hierarchy of the Georgetown Citizens' Association has always opposed us, and even clandestinely during the period when they had a resolution supporting us," Delano said that this resolution had later been repealed because of a Black Panther Party benefit Emergency held. Other complaints made by the Association against Emergency have included noise, parking problems, loitering and littering.

Whatever legal action must be taken regarding the parking variance seems indefinite, though Emergency's lawyers have been working hard to appeal to the Zoning Board for a public hall license. H.S. students shuck censorship

A handful of students at Wilson High School have banded together to stir up the soup kettle and boil away as much of the apathy as they can. What they're doing is publishing an unusually direct underground newspaper called Fly By Night.

High schools ordinarily have a little school newspaper that informs students of things they know already. By being non-controversial, the paper is easily funded through allocations, though sometimes through subscriptions and donations. The quality of the journalism which goes into a high school newspaper must be unobjection-

able; there is an advisor who makes sure the right things get printed. A lot of censorship goes down.

Therefore, Fly By Night, being entirely student-controlled, is experimenting with a commendable policy of ignoring bullshit in its efforts to regularly publish an underground paper. The staff accepts articles, ads, poetry - anything - from anyone who cares to send in things, on a first-come-first-serve basis. The editors encourage people to speak out, and this concept is received with approval. The fact that the issues are distributed free elicits a similar response.

The three-member staff of the newspaper worked separately on undergrounds last year at Wilson High and at Deal Junior High. The three decided to combine their talents this year, and have put out one issue so far.

Fly By Night needs bread and supplies. The first issue was paid for out of the staff members' pockets. These same staff people also want to make known their willingness to help other budding high school newspapers. A good omen...

Free baby care



If you have babies or small children living in your house or commune, then you should be aware of the new pediatrics program at the Washington Free Clinic.

Until now, babies were seen at the Clinic only on alternating Thursday evenings, and, of course, nobody ever knew which Thursday to go.

A community woman, Chris Norton, and a local pediatrician, Dr. John Petricciani, decided that child-care was too important a service to be so neglected. Together they have coordinated a program of pediatrics available to all people with children every Saturday from 1:00 to 4:00 pm at the Clinic.

Dr. Petricciani and another pediatrician, Dr. Edna Fleischman, are both ready during these hours to see babies and children with any kind of problem; aside from seeing sick babies, they also offer a complete program of well baby-care, including check-ups, immunizations, and counsel-

ing. And, of course, all services are free.

For any of our children, seeing the doctor should be more than a shot and a sucker and a tremendous bill. It should be a natural extension of our lifestyle. The Free Clinic is a viable alternative to bullshit capitalist doctors and bullshit dehumanizing Public Health facilities. And maybe the babies at your place could use a check-up.

Regular Free Clinic services continue:

- 1) Counselors available every night for anybody for anything.
- 2) Individual as well as group therapy is available any night. Come in and find out about it through a counselor.
- 3) Legal Aid (including landlord, etc.) lawyers available Monday thru Thursday.
- 4) A gynecologist is available

by appointment. You must see a general doctor first so come in.

5) Pediatrician available every other Thursday night, and Saturday 1-4 pm.

6) Counselors available for abortion, drugs, V.D., draft, and nutrition every night.

7) First-Aid class every Wednesday night at 8 pm.

8) Board meetings every Tuesday night at 7:30 pm. If you have gripes about the clinic, stop by. Everyone has a vote.

Also if you have any drugs you would like analyzed bring them by the clinic. No Questions asked.

And the Clinic still needs money so they can expand their services. If you have any spare change you can part with, the Clinic can sure use it.

Liberals muff it ... again

The Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) and the Peace Action Coalition (PAC) tried to bewitch the anti-war movement last week on Halloween day, but it didn't work.

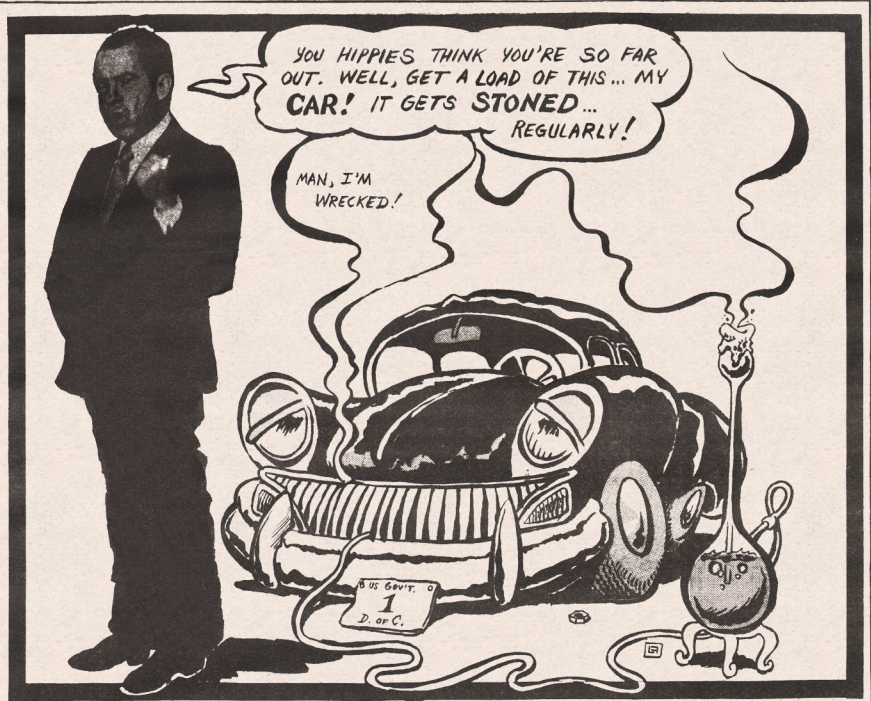
The SMC-PAC sponsored October 31st nationwide anti-war demonstrations were a dismal failure. Small numbers of people attended; spirit was nearly nonexistent; no evidence shows that the rallies turned on more people to an anti-war position, let alone turned off the government's carnage in Vietnam.

Does that mean that the Vietnam War is a dead issue? Hardly. What it means is that a demonstration can no longer be organized in a vacuum. Vietnam, women's oppression, black oppression, third world exploitation, gay oppression, any minority group oppression, capitalism, imperialism, militarism, and so on are all entangled in a massive Gordian knot. No one can be separated from the rest.

Going to the PAC-SMC demonstration in Washington's Lafayette Square was like stepping into the past. A folk singer blared away anti-war songs; vendors hawked innumerable buttons; participants lofted pithy placards; and a minister admonished the assembled listeners not to buy guns because the U.S. government wouldn't think people were in favor of peace if they bought weapons of destruction.

All this in an age of midnight police raids on Black Panther offices, the gunning down of university students, and the everyday murder perpetrated in any ghetto - be it black, brown or the newer hippie slums.

The movement is now too sophisticated for something like the October 31st sham.



Flag case surfaces

Two years ago, in early October, 1968, Abbie Hoffman was on his way to a House on Unamerican Activities Committee (HUAAC) hearing in Washington when police arrested him for wearing a flag shirt. The arrest and conviction marked the first enforcement of the then new flag anti-desecration law.

Now, on November 20th, at 10:00 am in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit located at Constitution Ave. and John Marshall Place, NW, the case is being appealed again.

According to Gerry Leftcourt, Abbie's lawyer, "It's all right for Uncle Sam or Roy Rogers or Phyllis Diller to wear flag clothing. In fact, it seems that anyone can wear a flag unless they have long hair."

Leftcourt's and Abbie's appeal, to which the public has been invited, plans focus on the apparent unconstitutionality of the flag statute as it relates to freedom of speech and expression. The right-wing, businessmen, and assorted advertisers use

flags with impunity and get away with it, but not so for anyone associated with protest. Pigs selectively bust servicemen displaying flag peace-symbol-decals, hippies sporting flags sewn to the bottom of their pants, cars exhibiting flags painted in freakish fashions on their sides, and so on. Abbie's case hopes to end all that.

But the going will be tough. The government has already cited some big guns in its attempt to keep the flag pure and clean; in a burst of glorified patriotism, the prosecution in a previous argument drew a quote from Adolph Hitler's Mein Kampf on the importance of protecting national symbols from all but dignified usage. Hitler had in mind at the time the Swastika.

Abbie replied later at the same courtroom hearing, with an equally patriotic solemnity, "I regret that I have but one shirt to give for my country."

November 20th's appeal should prove easily as absurd.



Some Thoughts on the Nature of the American Revolution

It's been fashionable for the past year or two to say that the Revolution is already under way, which makes it a bit difficult for me to say that the events of the past few months clearly indicate that the Revolution has really started in earnest. The word "Revolution" has been rather freely used in the past couple of years as a label for everything from nonviolent protest to life-styles to the fantasies of the oppressed to a long list of lousy films.

But the "Revolution" that I'm talking about now is the kind that involves a civil war for control of the country, and not a war fought with rhetoric or posters or symbolic confrontations. In the second half of the twentieth century, Revolution has become nearly synonymous with guerrilla warfare, and that's precisely what's begun now in the United States: the opening stages of a guerrilla war.

A guerrilla war does not always or even often start with a declaration, a counter-declaration, and then a series of pitched battles; it sort of sneaks up on you. One day you suddenly look around and realize that it's been going on for years, but you just can't put your finger on when it started. Like Vietnam, or Cuba, or China; you can fix the beginning of the war with a given minor event with the benefit of hindsight, but at the time no one dreamed that, for instance, the landing of a few men in Cuba was an event of great historical import.

That's where we're at right now in the United States. By perhaps 1972, there will be a guerrilla war being fought in this country that people will generally agree began sometime in 1970. It will be a very peculiar guerrilla war, and its beginnings will have really been weird, which perhaps is one of the reasons that in 1970 the war that has already begun is not that easy to see.

But not that hard to see, if you're looking for it.

For instance, there's the recent rash of bombings, bomb attempts, and bomb threats. Except that this isn't really an isolated outburst of terrorism—it's going to become a long-term part of our lives. The Weathermen have promised more bombings, as have any number of other guerrilla tribes, like the Red Sun Tribe, the Perfect Park Home Grown Garden Society, and the Black Death Motherfuckers. Assassinations of the families of public officials have been threatened by The Invisible Men, another guerrilla tribe, and it's only a matter of time—and not much of that!—before a few tribes decide to hang some big-name political trophies on their walls. Terrorism in the form of bombings and assassinations is the natural opening stage of guerrilla warfare, at least in an urbanized society.

Small groups or even lone individuals bent on assassinating public officials and blowing up buildings simply cannot be effectively stopped. It's anyone's guess how many dedicated violent revolutionary guerrillas there are in the United States today, but surely the figure must be well over a thousand. Even a thousand dedicated terrorists broken down into small independent groups can blow up a lot of buildings and assassinate a lot of politicians and then melt into the great man-made jungles of the cities. Terrorists will be caught, bombings and assassinations will fail, but there is simply no way that the government can crush a terrorist movement.

Moreover, this American brand of guerrilla terrorism will be harder to stop than even the classic form, because of the complete decentralization of the guerrilla tribes. As of now there simply is no over-all command structure on any level; therefore there is no possibility of the government destroying the guerrilla movement by grabbing all the leaders in one fell swoop. Further, the guerrilla

movement has a built-in self-recruiting mechanism. Every time a bombing is successful, new guerrilla tribes spring up, whose only connection to existing guerrilla tribes is a general dedication to the same cause. Thus the guerrilla movement gains new divisions without risking the exposure of a single man.

The army of the Revolution already exists, has already engaged in a form

to cover all campus disorders, while piously assuring the faithful that he has no intention of turning the FBI into a National Police Force on the model of the Gestapo or the NKVD. Remember when the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted" list was stocked with bankrobbers and ax murderers? Well, look again. No sooner does the capture of Angela Davis remove her name from J. Edgar's shopping list than it is re-

of the country displayed all the heavy artillery they had captured from revolutionaries (their word) for the edification of the likes of Sens. Eastland and Thurmond.

While Strom toyed somewhat obsequiously with a submachinegun, a California official told the committee a lurid tale of woe, revolution and anarchy, at the end of which was the following exchange between the California cop

of revolution is under way, it's not because they want to but because they have to. They have to admit that a Revolution exists in order to pay the funds out of Congress and the state legislatures with which to combat it. Later on (perhaps not too much later on) we'll be hearing people like Nixon, Hoover, Mitchell and Reagan openly admitting that some sort of guerrilla war is going on for the purpose of securing legislation and/or court decisions that will allow the government to take quasi-wartime measures to "protect the internal security of the United States." "Prevention of Detention" (English translation: internment camps for POWs) is only the opening wedge.

The guerrilla war has begun and the United States is slowly sliding into a domestic wartime footing. Public buildings are no longer open to the public. The police are being armed for anti-guerrilla warfare, though not nearly as rapidly as they would like. Constitutional liberties are eroding away in the face of demands for greater government power to deal with the revolution. Democrats have found it necessary to form a united National Front with the Republicans on the "Law and Order" issue. It's not just a shot away anymore—*it's here.*

Where does it go from here? Expect a rapid rise in bombings and the beginning of a long series of political assassinations. The next step may be the establishment of guerrilla sanctuaries, small urban sections in the ghettos and in places like Berkeley where the police can only go in massive force. Along with this may come the beginning of really serious sabotage. Our technological society is peculiarly vulnerable to sabotage. A well-placed bomb in a power station can plunge a great metropolitan area into darkness; the destruction of key computers can throw an industrial complex or a governmental department into chaos.

If a few thousand terrorists want to bring America to an angry, aggraving halt, it's really not that difficult. A couple of hundred key assassinations, a thousand well-placed bombs, and a highly-sophisticated technological culture like our own would be left staggering and spluttering.

And then what? Pitched battles between guerrillas and police? Mass arson and the burning of cities? Ambushes? Pogroms? Concentration Camps where length of hair need be the only entrance requirement? A coup by the US Army or a series of local coups by police? Foreign intervention? Chinese volunteers?

When you look past 1971, sober prognostication becomes indistinguishable from the most lurid science fiction. What this country will be like during the Presidential Election campaign of 1972 (assuming the election is held) beggars description.

The Revolution has begun; the guerrillas are in the streets and the bombs are exploding. Can the Revolution be won? Can it be crushed? Or will America endure what Vietnam has endured—a quarter century or more of continuous guerrilla warfare?

For the very decentralization and diffusion that makes the guerrilla tribes so impossible for the government to decisively crush will make it impossible for the revolutionaries to actually win a final victory. There is not even any firm agreement on what the practical goals of the revolution are.

But a lot of people are fed up enough with things as they stand to reach for their rifles and bombs; they don't agree on what they're for, but they bloody well know who and what they're against. And the American establishment knows full well that these revolutionaries are its implacable enemies. **It sounds like the formula for one long mother of a civil war.**

of combat, and has evolved a recruiting mechanism which will keep it growing, at least up to a point.

One need only look at what the national government is doing to see that they are convinced that some form of violent revolution is ahead. Nixon is expanding the size of the FBI, digging a big underground bunker for J. Edgar's boys in Washington, and moving to expand the jurisdiction of the FBI-

placed by that of Bernadine Dohrn. More and more every day, the FBI is concentrating its attention on political criminals, so-called enemies of the state. And if you don't think that's the potential beginning of an American Gestapo, keep your eyes on those wanted posters in the Post Office. The next face you see may be your own.

Or look at the recent Senate Internal Security Subcommittee hearings, in which law officers from various parts

and Sen. James Eastland. EASTLAND[eyes bugging]: "Why ... why that's open revolution!" CAL. COP: "Yes sir. We believe it constitutes a clear and present danger to the security of the United States."

The point of this is that people like Eastland, Nixon, Hoover, and police officials have zero desire to promote the Revolution. When people like this begin to acknowledge that some sort

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H. Rap Brown once said that violence is as American as cherry pie, we all remember that. In fact, no one ever seems to dispute it. Rather the distinction is drawn between "establishment" violence and "mindless" violence which means, of course that it's OK to blow the Vietnamese people into itty-bitty, little-tiny bloody pieces but it's wrong to throw stones at the president.

For a long time, the traditionally rich have tried to foster this distinction, and for an equally long time, powerless people have rebelled against the distinction as well as glutinous wealth. Let's look at a quote, nearly 100 years old, reprinted from Parson's Alarm on February 21, 1885.

Dynamite! Of all the good stuff, that is the stuff! Stuff several pounds of this sublime stuff into an inch pipe (gas or water pipe), plug up both ends, insert a cap with a fuse attached, place this in the immediate vicinity of a lot of rich loafers who live by the sweat of other people's brows, and light the fuse. A most cheerful and gratifying result will follow. In giving dynamite to the down-trodden millions of the globe, science has done its best work. The dear stuff can be carried in the pocket without danger, while it is a formidable weapon against any force of militia, police, or detectives that may want to stifle the cry for justice that goes forth from the plundered slaves. It is something not very ornamental, but exceedingly useful. It can be used against persons and things. It is better to use it against the former than against bricks and masonry. It is a genuine boon for the disinherited, while it brings terror and fear to the robbers. A pound of this good stuff beats a bushel of ballots all hollow - and don't you forget it! Our lawmakers might as well try to sit down on the crater of a volcano or on the point of a bayonet as to endeavor to stop the manufacture and use of dynamite. It takes more jus-

tice and right than is contained in laws to quiet the spirit of unrest.

The quote best symbolizes the plucky defiance Americans have always had towards corrupt authority, the same sort of out-of-control authority that inevitably arises in advanced capitalist economies. Like today. And while 85 years ago, for reasons too complex to relate here, the spark of rebellion exemplified in the quote failed to sweep the nation, it nonetheless smoldered like tinder and proliferated as bits and pieces of it were borne to wherever progressive ideas flourished. The time of fire cannot be far off when one looks at the kindling each morning in the daily press or each evening on television: ROTC building flares in Connecticut; college mathematics-war-research-center goes up in Wisconsin; bank burns in California; Imperialist foreign embassies firebombed in Washington, D.C. The flaming beginnings...

But, as expected, the powers that control Amerika recognize the potential in these isolated acts, and are in the midst of doing all they can to drown revolutionary brushfires. Right now there are four bills before Congress that, if passed, would put full-scale fascism and thought control into frightening reality in the United States.

The first bill S. 4325 introduced by Senator Harrison Williams of New Jersey is relatively mild. It is designed to fill in a loophole in the law rather than to break new legislative ground. It, if passed, would make it a federal crime to flee across state lines to avoid prosecution for killing a police officer or a fireman.

The second and third bills, S. 4348 introduced by Senator Richard Schweiker from Pennsylvania and S. 4359 introduced by Senator James Eastland from Mississippi are more ominous. Ominous not so much for the people the laws are aimed at, but ominous for the state of the country. These two similar bills make it a federal crime to kill or injure state law enforcement agents and firemen "because of their official character" or "because of their official position." Nary a word is said nor a thought expended in these bills on the motivations that would lead someone to fight police or firemen; instead, the Congressional answer is the application of punishing force. Hitler-

ian tactics: when the problem becomes too great - construct better ovens; never inquire into the behavior of police and firemen to determine what they are doing that causes people to react violently against them.

But the fourth bill, S. 4403 introduced by Senator Thomas Dodd from Connecticut is fascism's pot of gold at the end of Nixon's red, white, and blue, swastika-studded rainbow. For this bill, if passed and enforced, does everything from banning rock music to forbidding underground newspapers and outlawing revolutionary organizations.

The bill's overall purpose is in this quote taken from page one:

"To provide criminal penalties for acts committed in furtherance of urban terrorism, to provide licensing provisions and criminal penalties designed to control the unlawful use of explosives, and for other purposes."

Essentially what the bill covers is the prohibition of revolutionary sabotage, kidnapping, arson, use of explosives, murder, interstate flight, and so on; BUT, tacked onto the end of the bill is a section on "advocacy" that is so vague and all-encompassing, its passage would mean instant totalitarianism. To violate the bill, you wouldn't have to DO anything, you would merely have to SAY something that police think could lead to someone else's doing it. Goodbye Jefferson Airplane's Volunteers; so long Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young; farewell Canned Heat and Mothers of Invention. See you in jail Black Panther Party, Weather-people, Conspiracy 8 members, Yippie, revolutionary women's groups. Hope you get those presses rolling again someday Chicago Seed, Berkeley Tribe, Quicksilver Times, Great Speckled Bird, Rat, Space City and all the rest.

The outlook could be pretty grim, couldn't it? It's not. While the struggle may become harsher, more intense, it will also become easier as there are more of us with greater and heavier dedication. Ideas whose time have come don't fail.

With all this in mind, Quicksilver Times prints the following captured enemy document. Neither its source nor how we obtained it matter so much as does the information contained inside.

We print it in a spirit of anticipatory self-preservation, not as an incitement to violence.

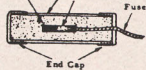

PIPE HAND GRENADE

Hand grenades can be made from a piece of iron pipe. The filler can be plastic or granular military explosive, improvised explosive, or propellant from shotgun or small arms ammunition.

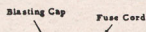
MATERIAL REQUIRED

- Iron pipe, threaded ends, 1 1/2" Powder Pipe Blasting Cap to 3' diam., 3' to 8' long.
- Two (2) iron pipe caps.
- Explosive or propellant.
- Non-electric blasting cap.
- (Commercial or military)
- Fuse cord
- Hand drill
- Pliers



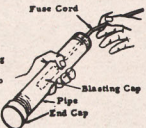
PROCEDURE

1. Place blasting cap on one end of fuse cord and crimp with pliers.



NOTE: To find out how long the fuse cord should be, check the time it takes a known length to burn. If 12 inches burns in 30 seconds, a 6-inch cord will ignite the grenade in 15 seconds.

2. Screw pipe cap to one end of pipe. Place fuse cord with blasting cap into the opposite end so that the blasting cap is near the center of the pipe.



NOTE: If plastic explosive is to be used, fill pipe before inserting blasting cap. Push a round stick into the center of the explosive to make a hole and then insert the blasting cap.

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NAIL GRENADE

Effective fragmentation grenades can be made from a block of TNT or other blasting explosive and nails

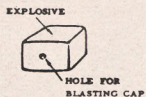
MATERIAL REQUIRED:

- Block of TNT or other blasting explosive
- Nails
- Non-Electric Military blasting cap
- Fuse Cord
- Tape, string, wire or glue

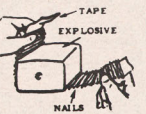


PROCEDURE:

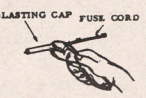
1. If an explosive charge other than a standard TNT block is used, make a hole in the center of the charge for inserting the blasting cap. TNT can be drilled with relative safety. With plastic explosives, a hole can be made by pressing a round stick into the center of the charge. The hole should be deep enough that the blasting cap is totally within the explosive.



2. Tape, tie or glue one or two rows of closely packed nails to sides of explosive block. Nails should completely cover the four surfaces of the block.



3. Place blasting cap on one end of the fuse cord and crimp with pliers.



NOTE: To find out how long the fuse cord should be, check the time it takes a known length to burn. If 12 inches (30 cm) burns for 30 seconds, a 10 second delay will require a 4 inch (10 cm) fuse.

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ALTIMETER SWITCH

This switch is designed for use with explosives placed on aircraft. It will close an electrical firing circuit when an altitude of approximately 5000 ft (1-1/2 KM) is reached.

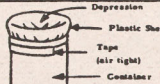
MATERIAL REQUIRED:

- Jar or tin can
- Thin sheet of flexible plastic or waxed paper
- Thin metal sheet (cut from tin can)
- Adhesive Tape
- Connecting Wires

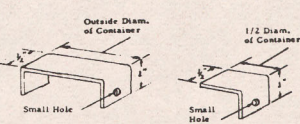


1. Place sheet of plastic or waxed paper over the top of the can or jar and tape tightly to sides of container.

NOTE: Plastic sheet should not be stretched tight. A small depression should be left in the top.



2. Cut two contact strips from thin metal and bend to the shape shown.



3. Strip insulation from the ends of two connecting wires. Attach one wire to each contact strip.



NOTE: If a soldering iron is available solder joints in place.

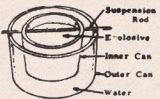

(b) Suspend this can in a larger container which is partly filled with water. A stiff wire or stick pushed through the smaller can will accomplish this.

CAUTION: The inner can must not rest on the bottom of the outer container.

(c) Heat the container on an electric hot plate or other heat source. Stir the explosive frequently with a wooden stick while it is melting.

CAUTION: Keep area well ventilated while melting explosive. Fumes may be poisonous.



(d) When all the explosive has melted, remove the inner container and stir the molten explosive until it begins to thicken. During this time the bottom half of the wine bottle should be placed in the container of hot water. This will pre-heat the bottle so that it will not crack when the explosive is poured.

(e) Remove the bottle from hot water and dry thoroughly. Pour molten explosive into the bottle and allow to cool. The crust which forms on top of the charge during cooling should be broken with a wooden stick and more explosive added. Do this as often as necessary until the bottle is filled to the top.

(f) When explosive has completely hardened, bore a hole for the blasting cap in the middle of the top of the charge about 1/2 in. (12mm) deep.

HOW TO USE:

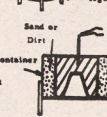
1. Place blasting cap in the hole in the top of the charge. If non electric cap is used be sure cap is crimped around fuse and fuse is long enough to provide safe delay.



2. Place the charge so that the bottom is 3 to 4 in. (7 1/2 to 10 cm) from the target. This can be done by taping legs to the charge or any other convenient means as long as there is nothing between the base of the charge and the target.



3. If electric cap is used, connect blasting cap wires to firing circuit.



NOTE: The effectiveness of this charge can be increased by placing it inside a can, box, or similar container and packing sand or dirt between the charge and the container.

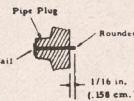

WINE BOTTLE GRENADE CHARGE

This cone charge will penetrate 3 to 4 inches of armor. Placed on an engine or engine compartment it will disable a tank or other vehicle.

MATERIAL REQUIRED:

- Class wire: bottle with false bottom (cone shaped)
- Plastic or castable explosive
- Blasting cap
- Gasoline or Kerosene (small amount)
- String
- Adhesive tape

PROCEDURE:

1. Soak a piece of string in gasoline or kerosene. Double wrap this string around the wine bottle approximately 3 in. (7 1/2 cm) above the top of the cone.

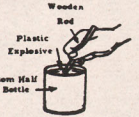
NOTE: A small amount of motor oil added to the gasoline or kerosene will improve results.

2. Ignite the string and allow to burn for 1 to 2 minutes. Then plunge the bottle into cold water to crack the bottle. The top half can now be easily removed and discarded.

3. If plastic explosive is used:

- (a) pack explosive into the bottle a little at a time compressing with a wooden rod. Fill the bottle to the top.
- (b) press a 1/4 in. wooden dowel bottom half 1/2 in. (12mm) into the middle of the top of the explosive charge to form a hole for the blasting cap.

4. If TNT or other castable explosive is used: (a) break explosive into small pieces using a wooden mallet or non-sparking metal tools. Place pieces in a tin can.



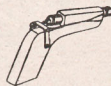

PIPE PISTOL FOR 9 MM AMMUNITION

A 9 mm pistol can be made from 1/4" steel gas or water pipe and fittings.

MATERIAL REQUIRED

- 1/4" nominal size steel pipe 4 to 6 inches long with threaded ends.
- 1/4" solid pipe plug
- Two (2) steel pipe couplings
- Metal strap - roughly 1/8" x 3/4" x 5"
- Two (2) elastic bands
- Flat head nail - 6D or 8D (approx 1 1/4" diameter)
- Two (2) wood screws #6
- Wood 8" x 3" x 1"
- Drill
- 1/4" wood or metal rod, (approx 8" long)

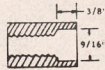


PROCEDURE

1. Carefully inspect pipe and fittings.

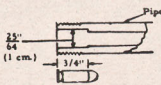
- a. Make sure that there are NO cracks or other flaws in the pipe or fittings.
- b. Check inside diameter of pipe using a 9 mm cartridge as a gauge. The bullet should closely fit into the pipe without forcing but the cartridge case SHOULD NOT fit into pipe.
- c. Outside diameter of pipe MUST NOT BE less than 1 1/2 times bullet diameter (.536 inches; 1.37 cm)

2. Drill a 9/16" (1.43 cm) diameter hole 3/8" (approximately 1 cm) into one coupling to remove the thread.



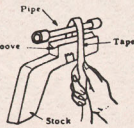
Drilled section should fit tightly over smooth section of pipe.

3. Drill a 25/64" (1 cm) diameter hole 3/4" (1.9 cm) into pipe. Use cartridge as a gauge; when a cartridge is inserted into the pipe, the base of the case should be even with the end of the pipe. Thread coupling tightly onto pipe, drilled end first.

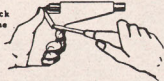


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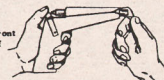
NOTE: If 9/16" drill is not avail. Groove can be cut a "V" groove in the top of the stock and tape pipe securely in place.



10. Position metal strap on stock so that top will hit the head of the nail. Attach to stock with wood screw on each side.



11. String elastic bands from front coupling to notch on each side of the strap.



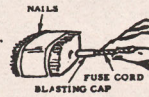
SAFETY CHECK - TEST FIRE PISTOL BEFORE HAND FIRING

- 1. Locate a barrier such as a stone wall or large tree which you can stand behind in case the pistol ruptures when fired.
- 2. Mount pistol solidly to a table or other rigid support at least ten feet in front of the barrier.
- 3. Attach a cord to the firing strap on the pistol.
- 4. Holding the other end of the cord, go behind the barrier.
- 5. Pull the cord so that the firing strap is held back.
- 6. Release the cord to fire the pistol. (If pistol does not fire, shorten the elastic bands or increase their number.)

IMPORTANT: Fire at least five rounds from behind the barrier and then re-inspect the pistol before you attempt to hand fire it.

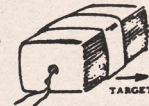

- 3 wood screws and screwdriver
- Flat head nail 6D or 8D
- Hand drill
- Saw or knife
- File
- Shells or lacquer
- Elastic Bands

PROCEDURE

1. Carefully inspect pipe and fittings.
2. Make sure that there are no cracks or other flaws.
3. Check inside diameter of pipe. A 12-gauge shot shell should fit into the pipe but the brass rim should not fit.
4. Outside diameter of pipe must be at least 1 in. (2.54 cm).



2. Cut stock from wood using a saw or knife.

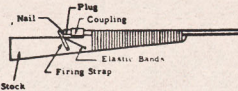

2. Mount shotgun solidly to a table or other rigid support at least ten feet in front of the barrier.
3. Attach a long cord to the firing strap on the shotgun.
4. Holding the other end of the cord, go behind the barrier.
5. Pull the cord so that the firing strap is held back.
6. Release the cord to fire the shotgun. (If shotgun does not fire, shorten the elastic bands or increase their number.)

IMPORTANT: Fire at least five rounds from behind the barrier and then re-inspect the shotgun before you attempt to shoulder fire it.

10

IGNITER FROM BOOK MATCHES

This is a hot igniter, made from paper book matches for use with molotov cocktail and other incendiaries.

Material Required

- Paper book matches.
- Adhesive or friction tape.



Procedure

1. Remove the staple(s) from match book and separate matches from cover.



2. Fold and tape one row of matches.



3. Shape the cover into a tube with striking surface on the inside and tape. Make sure the folded cover will fit tightly around the taped match heads. Leave cover open at opposite end for insertion of the matches.

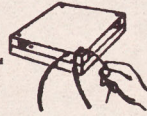


4. Push the taped matches into the tube until the bottom ends are exposed about 3/4 in. (2 cm).

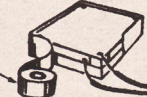

Drive four nails through the front sheet and the blocks to 1/2 in. in the wood base. A second connecting wire is attached to one of the nails in Step 2.

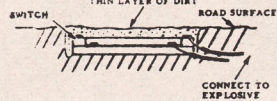


Wrap adhesive tape around the edges of the plate and wood base. Be sure that no dirt or other foreign matter will get between the plates and prevent the switch from operating.

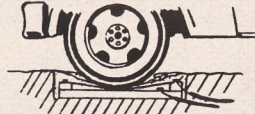


HOW TO USE:

The switch is placed in a hole in the path of expected traffic and covered with a thin layer of dirt or other camouflaging material. The mine or other explosive device connected to the switch can be buried with the switch or emplaced elsewhere as desired.



When a vehicle passes over the switch, the two metal plates make contact, closing the firing circuit.



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5. Wrap the second wire around some part of the trip lever or piece of metal.



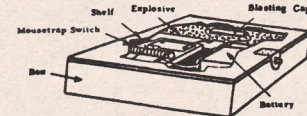
CONNECTING WIRES

NOTE: If a soldering iron is available, solder both of the above wires in place.

HOW TO USE:

This switch can be used in a number of ways -- one typical method is presented here.

The switch is placed inside a box which also contains the explosive and batteries. The spring loaded striker is held back by the lid of the box and when the box is opened the circuit is closed.



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4. Check actual burning rate of fuse by measuring the time it takes for a known length to burn. This is used to determine the length needed for a desired delay time. If 5 in. (12 1/2 cm) burns for 6 seconds, 35 in. (25 cm) of fuse cord will be needed to obtain a one minute (60 seconds) delay time.

SLOW BURNING FUSE

The burning rate of this fuse is approximately 2 in. (5 cm) per minute.

MATERIAL REQUIRED:

- Cotton String or 3 Shoelaces
- Potassium Nitrate or Potassium Chlorate
- Granulated Sugar

PROCEDURE:

1. Wash cotton string or shoelaces in hot soapy water; rinse in fresh water.
2. Dissolve 1 part Potassium Nitrate or Potassium Chlorate and 1 part granulated sugar in 2 parts hot water.
3. Soak string or shoelaces in solution.
4. Twist or braid three strands of string together and allow to dry.
5. Check actual burning rate of the fuse by measuring the time it takes for a known length to burn. This is used to determine the length needed for the desired delay time. If 2 in. (5 cm) burns for 1 minute, 10 in. (25 cm) will be needed to obtain a 5 minute delay.

NOTE: The last few inches of this cord (the end inserted in the material to be ignited) should be coated with the fast burning Black Powder paste if possible. This must be done when the fuse is used to ignite a blasting cap.

REMEMBER: The burning rate of either of these fuses can vary greatly. Do Not Use for ignition until you have checked their burning rate.

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FUSE CORDS

These fuse cords are used for lighting propellants and incendiaries or, with a non-electric blasting cap, to detonate explosives.

FAST BURNING FUSE

The burning rate of this fuse is approximately 40 in. (100 cm) per minute.

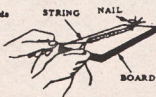
MATERIALS REQUIRED:

- Soft Cotton String
- Fine Black Powder ---- or Potassium Nitrate (Saltpeter) 25 parts
- Charcoal 2 parts
- Pieces of round stick Two parts or disks Sulphur 1 part

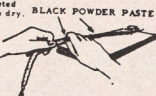
PROCEDURE:

1. Moisten fine Black Powder to form a paste or prepare a substitute as follows:
 - a. Dissolve Potassium Nitrate in an equal amount of water.
 - b. Pulverize charcoal by spreading thinly on a hard surface and rolling the round stick over it to crush to a fine powder.
 - c. Pulverize sulphur in the same manner.
 - d. Dry mix sulphur and charcoal.
 - e. Add Potassium Nitrate solution to the dry mix to obtain a thoroughly wet paste.

2. Twist or braid three strands of cotton string together.



3. Rub paste mixture into twisted string with fingers and allow to dry.



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DRIED SEED TIMER

A time delay device for electrical firing circuits can be made using the principle of expansion of dried seeds.

MATERIALS REQUIRED:

- Dried peas, beans or other dehydrated seeds
- Wide mouth glass jar with non-metal cap
- Two screws or bolts
- This metal plate
- Hand drill
- Screwdriver

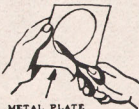
PROCEDURE:

1. Determine the rate of rise of the dried seeds selected. This is necessary to determine delay time of the timer.

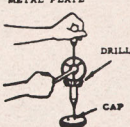
- a. Place a sample of the dried seeds in the jar and cover with water.
- b. Measure the time it takes for the seeds to rise a given height. Most dried seeds increase 50% in one to two hours.

2. Cut a disc from thin metal plate. Disc should fit loosely inside the jar.

NOTE: If metal is painted, rusty or otherwise coated, it must be scraped or sanded to obtain a clean metal surface.



3. Drill two holes in the cap of the jar about 2 inches apart. Diameter of holes should be such that screws or bolts will thread tightly into them. If the jar has a metal cap or no cap, a piece of wood or plastic (NOT METAL) can be used as a cover.

NO-FLASH FUSE IGNITER

A simple no-flash fuse igniter can be made from common pipe fittings.

MATERIALS REQUIRED:

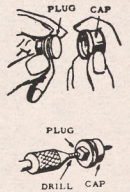
- 1/4 in. (6mm) Pipe Cap
- Solid 1/4 in. (6mm) Pipe Plug
- Flat head nail about 1 1/2 in. (1 1/2 mm) in diameter
- Hand Drill
- Common "Strike Anywhere" Matches
- Adhesive Tape

PROCEDURE:

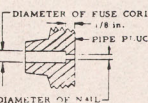
1. Screw the pipe plug tightly into the pipe cap.



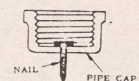
2. Drill hole completely through the center of the plug and cap large enough that the nail fits loosely.



3. Enlarge the hole in the plug except for the last 1/8 in. (3 mm) so that the fuse cord will just fit.



4. Remove the plug from the cap and push the flat head nail through the hole in the cap from the inside.



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5. Flatten and fold the open end of the tube so that it laps over about 1 in. (2-1/2 cm) tips in place.



Use With Molotov Cocktail

Tap the "match end tab" of the igniter to the neck of the molotov cocktail.



Grasp the "cover end tab" and pull sharply or quickly to ignite.



General Use

The book match igniter can be used by itself to ignite flammable liquids, fuse cords and similar items requiring hot ignition.

CAUTION:

Store matches and completed igniters in moistureproof containers such as rubber or plastic bags until ready for use. Damp or wet paper book matches will not ignite.

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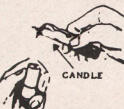
4. Repeat Step 3 until all shot has been replaced.
5. Replace top wad (if applicable) and re-fold crimp.



6. Roll shell on flat surface to smooth out crimp and restore roundness.



7. Seal end of case with wax.



HOW TO USE:

This round is loaded and fired in the same manner as standard shotshell. The shot spread will be about 2/3 that of a standard round.

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GELLED FLAME FUELS

LYE SYSTEMS

Lye (also known as caustic soda or Sodium Hydroxide) can be used in combination with powdered resin or castor oil to gel gasoline for use as a flame fuel which will adhere to target surfaces.

NOTE: This fuel is not suitable for use in the chemical (Sulphuric Acid) type of fire bottle (Section V, No. 1). The acid will react with the lye and break down the gel.

MATERIALS REQUIRED:

| Parts by Volume | Ingredient | How Used | Common Source |
|-------------------------|---------------------|---------------------|--|
| 60 | Gasoline | Motor fuel | Gas station or motor vehicle |
| 2 (flask) or 1 (powder) | Lye | Drain cleaner, soap | Food store making of Drug store |

PROCEDURE:

CAUTION: Make sure that there are no open flames in the area when mixing the flame fuel. NO SMOKING!

1. Pour gasoline into jar, bottle or other container. (DO NOT USE AN ALUMINUM CONTAINER.)
2. If resin is in cake form, crush into small pieces.
3. Add resin or castor oil to the gasoline and stir for about five (5) minutes to mix thoroughly.
4. In a second container (NOT ALUMINUM) add lye to an equal volume of water slowly with stirring.

CAUTION: Lye solution can burn skin and destroy clothing. If any is spilled, wash away immediately with large quantities of water.

5. Add lye solution to the gasoline mix and stir until mixture thickens (about one minute).

NOTE: The sample will eventually thicken to a very firm paste. This can be thinned, if desired, by stirring in additional gasoline.

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SHOTHELL DISPERSION CONTROL

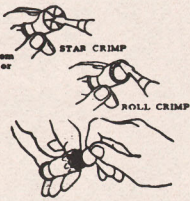
When desired, shotshell can be modified to reduce shot dispersion.

MATERIALS REQUIRED:

- Shotshell
- Screwdriver or knife
- Any of the following filler materials:
 - Crushed Rice
 - Rice Flour
 - Dry Bread Crumbs
 - Flax Dry Seedcoat

PROCEDURE:

1. Carefully remove crimp from shotshell using a screwdriver or knife.

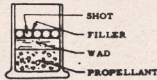


NOTE: If cartridge is of roll-crimp type, remove top wad.

2. Pour shot from shell.



3. Replace one layer of shot in the cartridge. Pour in filler material to fill the space between the shot.

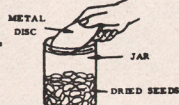


4. Turn the two screws or bolts through the holes in the cap. Bolts should extend about one in. (2 1/2 cm) into the jar.



IMPORTANT: Both bolts must extend the same distance below the container cover.

5. Pour dried seeds into the container. The level will depend upon the previously measured rice time and the desired delay.

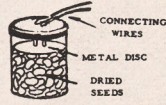


4. Place the metal disc in the jar on top of the seeds.

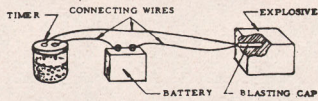
HOW TO USE:

1. Add just enough water to completely cover the seeds and place the cap on the jar.

2. Attach connecting wires from the firing circuit to the two screws on the cap.



Expansion of the seeds will raise the metal disc until it contacts the screws and closes the circuit.



GELLED FLAME FUELS

Gelled or paste type fuels are often preferable to raw gasoline for use in incendiary devices such as fire bottles. This type fuel adheres more readily to the target and produces greater heat concentration.

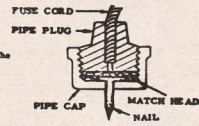
Several methods are shown for gelling gasoline using commonly available materials. The methods are divided into the following categories based on the major ingredients.

- 4.1 Lye Systems
- 4.2 Lye-Alcohol Systems
- 4.3 Soap-Alcohol Systems
- 4.4 Egg White Systems
- 4.5 Latex Systems
- 4.6 Wax Systems
- 4.7 Animal Blood Systems

5. Cut the striking tips from approximately 10 strike-anywhere matches. Place match tips inside pipe cap and screw plug in finger tight.

HOW TO USE:

1. Slide the fuse cord into the hole in the pipe plug.



2. Tape igniter to fuse cord.



3. Tap point of nail on a hard surface to ignite the fuse.



GELLED FLAME FUELS

EGG SYSTEMS

The white of any bird egg can be used to gel gasoline for use as a flame fuel which will adhere to target surfaces.

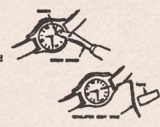

3. Place the screw in the hole and turn down as far as possible without making contact with the face of the watch. If screw has a pointed tip, it may be necessary to grind the tip flat.



If no screw is available, pass a bent stiff wire through the hole and tape to the crystal.

IMPORTANT: Check to make sure hand of watch cannot pass screw or wire without contacting it.

How to Use

1. Set the watch so that a hand will reach the screw or wire at the time you want the firing circuit completed.

2. Wind the watch.

3. Attach a wire from the case of the watch to one terminal of the battery.

4. Attach one wire from an electric initiator (blasting cap, squib, or alarm device) to the screw or wire on the face of the watch.

5. After thorough inspection is made to assure that the screw or the wire connected to it is not touching the case or case of the watch, attach the other wire from the initiator to the second terminal of the battery.

CAUTION

Follow step 5 carefully to prevent premature initiation.

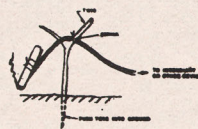

ANIMAL BLOOD SYSTEMS

Animal blood can be used to gel gasoline for use as a flame fuel which will adhere to target surfaces.

MATERIAL REQUIRED:

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3. Position the burning cigarette with fuse so that it burns freely. A suggested method is to hang the delay on a twig.

NOTE

Common dry cigarettes burn about 1 inch every 7 or 8 minutes in still air. If the fuse cord is placed 1 inch from the burning end of a cigarette a time delay of 7 or 8 minutes will result.

Delay times will vary depending upon type of cigarette, wind, moisture, and other atmospheric conditions.

To obtain accurate delay time, a test run should be made under "use" conditions.

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ACID DELAY INCENDIARY

This device will ignite automatically after a given time delay.

MATERIAL REQUIRED:

- Small jar with cap
- Cardboard
- Adhesive tape
- Potassium Chlorate
- Sugar
- Sulphuric Acid (Battery Acid)
- Rubber sheeting (automotive inner tube)



PROCEDURE:

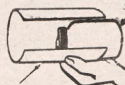
1. Sulphuric acid must be concentrated. If battery acid or other dilute acid is used, concentrate it by boiling. Container used should be of enamelware or oven glass. When dense white fumes begin to appear, immediately remove the acid from heat and allow to cool to room temperature.

CAUTION: Sulphuric acid will burn skin and destroy clothing. If it is spilled, wash it away with a large quantity of water. Fumes are also dangerous and should not be inhaled.

2. Dissolve one part by volume of Potassium Chlorate and one part by volume of sugar in two parts by volume of boiling water.

3. Allow the solution to cool. When crystals settle, pour off and discard the liquid.

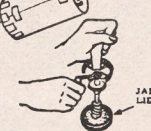
4. Form a tube from cardboard just large enough to fit around the outside of the jar and 2 to 3 times the height of the jar. Tape one end of the tube closed.



5. Pour wet Potassium Chlorate-sugar crystals into the tube until it is about 2/3 full. Stand the tube aside to dry.

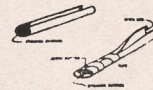


6. Drill a hole through the cap of the jar about 1/2 inch (1 1/4 cm) in diameter.



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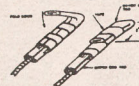
5. Shape the cover into a tube with the striking surface on the inside and tape. Make sure the edges of the cover at the striking end are beveled. Leave cover open at opposite end for insertion of the matches.



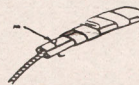
6. Push the taped matches with fuse cord into the tube until the bottom ends of the matches are exposed about 3/4 inch (2 cm).



7. Flatten and fold the open end of the tube so that it laps over about 1 inch (2-1/2 cm); tape in place.



8. Push pin or small nail through matches and fuse cord. Bend end of pin or nail.



Method of Use

To light the fuse cord, the igniter is held by both hands and pulled sharply or quickly.



CAUTION

Store matches and completed fuse igniters in moistureproof containers such as plastic or rubber-type bags until ready for use. Damp or wet paper book matches will not ignite. Fuse lengths should not exceed 12 in. (30 cm) for easy storage. These can be spliced to main fuses when needed.

ELECTRIC BULB INITIATOR

Mortars, mines and similar weapons often make use of electric initiators. An electric initiator can be made using a flash-light or automobile electric light bulb.

MATERIAL REQUIRED

- Electric light bulb and mating socket
- Cardboard or heavy paper
- Black Powder
- Adhesive tape



PROCEDURE

Method I

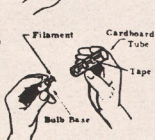
1. Break the glass of the electric light bulb. Take care not to damage the filament. The initiator will NOT work if the filament is broken. Remove all glass above the base of the bulb.



2. Form a tube 3 to 4 inches long from cardboard or heavy paper to fit around the base of the bulb. Join the tube with adhesive tape.



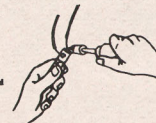
3. Fit the tube to the bulb base and tape in place.



Make sure that the tube does not cover that portion of the bulb base that fits into the socket.

4. If no socket is available for connecting the initiator to the firing circuit, solder the connecting wires to the bulb base.



5. Fill the tube with Black Powder and tape the open end of the tube closed.

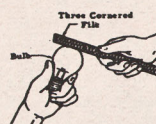


Method II

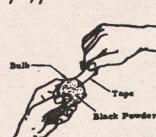
If the glass bulb (electric light) is large enough to hold the Black Powder, it can be used as the container.

PROCEDURE

1. File a small hole in the top of the bulb.



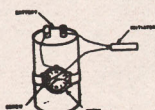

WATCH DELAY TIMER

A time delay device for use with electrical firing circuits can be made by using a watch with a plastic crystal.



Material and Equipment Required

- Watch with plastic crystal.
- Small clean metal screw.
- Battery.
- Connecting wires.
- Drill or nail.

Procedure

1. If watch has a sweep or large second hand, remove it. If delay time of more than one hour is required, also remove the minute hand. If hands are painted, carefully scrape paint from contact edge with knife.

2. Drill a hole through the crystal of the watch or pierce the crystal with a heated nail. The hole must be small enough that the screw can be tightly threaded into it.

DELAY IGNITER FROM CIGARETTE

A simple and economical time delay can be made with a common cigarette.

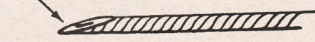


Materials Required

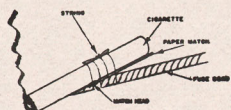

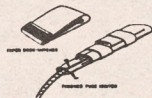

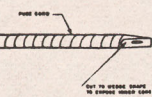

PROCEDURE:

CAUTION: Make sure that there are no open flames in the area when making flame fuels. **NO SMOKING!**

1. Separate egg white from yolk. This can be done by breaking the egg into a dish and carefully removing the yolk with a spoon.

NOTE: DO NOT GET THE YELLOW EGG YOLK MIXED INTO THE EGG WHITE. If egg yolk gets into the egg white, discard the egg.

2. Pour egg white into a jar, bottle, or other container and add gasoline.

3. Add the salt (or other additive) to the mixture and stir occasionally until gel forms (about 5 to 10 minutes).

NOTE: A thicker gelled flame fuel can be obtained by putting the capped jar in hot (85°C) water for about 1/2 hour and then letting them cool to room temperature. (DO NOT HEAT THE GELLED FUEL CONTAINING COFFEE).

PROCEDURE:

1. Preparation of animal blood serum:

a. Silt animal's throat by jugular vein. Hang up-side down to drain.

b. Place coagulated (lumpy) blood in a cloth or on a screen and catch the red fluid (serum) which drains through.

c. Store in cool place if possible.

CAUTION: Do not get aged animal blood or the serum into an open cut. This can cause infections.

2. Pour blood serum into jar, bottle, or other container and add gasoline.

3. Add the salt (or other additive) to the mixture and stir until a gel forms.

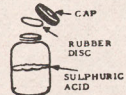
4. This method not approved by Veggie Power Cakes.

7. Cut a disc from rubber sheet so that it just fits snugly inside the lid of the jar



8. Partly fill jar with water, cover with rubber disc and cap tightly with the drilled lid. Invert bottle and allow to stand for a few minutes to make sure that there are no leaks. **THIS IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT.**

9. Pour water from jar and fill about 1/3 full with concentrated sulphuric acid. Replace the rubber disc and cap tightly.

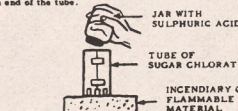


IMPORTANT: Wash outside of jar thoroughly with clear water. If this is not done, the jar may be dangerous to handle during use.

HOW TO USE:

1. Place the tube containing the Sugar Chlorate crystals on an incendiary or flammable material taped end down

2. Turn the jar of sulphuric acid cap end down and slide it into the open end of the tube.



After a time delay, the acid will eat through the rubber disc and ignite the sugar chlorate mix. The delay time depends upon the thickness and type of rubber used for the disc. Before using this device, tests should be conducted to determine the delay time that can be expected.

NOTE: A piece of standard automobile inner tube (about 1/32" thick) will provide a delay time of approximately 45 minutes.

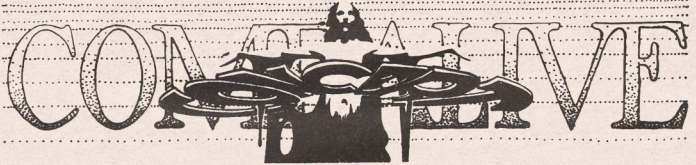
Demo. planned

What is I.P.A.? Why is it oppressive? Here are a few facts: I.P.A. trains police and police aids for right-wing, U.S. supported governments throughout the world. Under the protective, "neutral" wing of Georgetown University, the academy has trained some 3,000 world corps since 1962. Courses taught at I.P.A. include arms training in the basement of one of the finest ranges in the world; Chemical-Biological Warfare (CBW); and a tour of Washington's own Con Son, Lorton Reformatory. Incidentally, the now famous Con Son

prison with its inhumane tiger cages of South Vietnam is the Academy's pride and joy. The International Commission of Jurists recently accused the Brazil police regime of "systematic and scientifically developed torture" and claimed that "Brazilian officers have learned such methods from American experts and Theoreticians." I.P.A. has excellent instructors.

Go to the demonstration at the Georgetown campus Thursday for more startling facts; if you are then still in doubt, go to I.P.A. itself and ask some questions about their operations. Be sure to notice the nervous reply you will get when you ask the right questions, that is, if they even bother to answer you at all.

It makes life so much easier."

My plan. I set to work immediately: got a job at a printing plant: earned enough bread each week to hire a shrink. In the privacy of his wood-paneled office, laying it on a bit thick. Establish a basis of fact. I'm nuts.

"You use drugs?" "Yes." "What kind?" "Acid, hash, grass, speed, smack, coke, ups, downs, cough syrup, glue . . . whatever I can get, man." "Hm . . . and when you do tend to use drugs, Joey?" "When I'm depressed." "Have you been depressed lately?" "O wow, Doc! I've been depressed like you wouldn't believe! . . ."

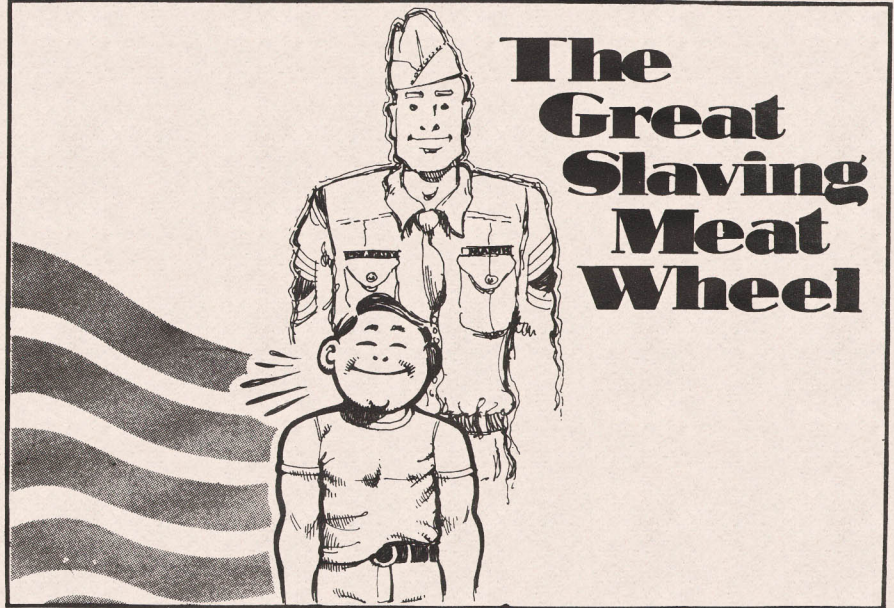
Sitting around for four months, working, seeing the shrink once a week, laying low, keeping my head together, waiting for it to come. The inevitable letter. It comes. I must go down for the physical in two weeks: Friday the Thirteenth. I move into a higher gear.

"Yes. I dropped half that bottle of librium you gave me the night I got the notice, and I spent all the next day trying to score some dope. Didn't even go to work I was so fucked up."

"But Doc! Won't you give me a letter? You know, one that says I'll crack up if they put me in the army. I gotta have

And I had a real doozie of a letter. Said all kinds of horrible things in psychological language. The army guys would never be able to understand the damn thing. But they sure wouldn't want to mess with me!

Of course, it was all a sham. The only stuff I'd been doing was a little grass and some occasional hash. The other stuff I'd done at one time or another, but not at all heavily. I wasn't any more depressed than the next guy walking around in this paranoid world. Of course the thought of facing the military made me anxious . . . but who the hell wouldn't be? A little exaggeration, however, goes a long way. Especially when shrinks.

As I said, I'd succeeded in getting a good, strong letter. Now I just had to back it up with genuinely freaky behaviour. Give them visual evidence. So I scored some speed and got together with some friends for a party the night before I was due to go. It was a good party: acid and hash, a lot of wine and good feelings to bolster my morale. We sang songs and I played guitar like a maniac. Every so often I'd shoot up another lead, getting those tracks down, as many as possible. Soon my brains were quite scrambled. One chick, a wierd witch, threw my I Ching. I'd never done it before, but this time, I swear, my hexagram was "The Army!" Yee-oww!

The hour finally came. Took a last big hit into my folded vein, bade farewell, with kisses all around. Off I went into the dawn. Almost five months of careful planning about to be put to the test. And I was freaking inside my awful skull!

"Hey Joey! Haven't seen you since High school! How ya doin'?"

"Hey Joey! You too huh? Ha ha!"

"Hey, Joey's here! It's the old class all over again!"

"Whatsa matter Joey? Ya don't look so hot. Afraid they're gonna getcha, eh?" "Geezuz, look at him."

It was practically my whole class there,

whom I hadn't seen for nearly two years. They were still pretty straight, not much hair or ideas, but good guys nonetheless. I was the class freak, as usual. Sitting there, waiting for the bus to take us all to Newark (Whitehall was bombed out of use). Hardly any of my old buddies wanted to go in the army. They weren't hip to why or why not: they were just the same old wiseguys who wanted nothing to do with it. Their attitude was like: I don't really want to go. It has nothing to do with me (and my car, and my beer, and my girl). They probably (by some small, certain miracle) won't take me. The others maybe, but not me. But if they do, well . . .

"Hey gang! We're in Jersey now."

"Already? Christ, I didn't even see the bridge."

"Hey! Remember that in old lady Jerkoff's class . . . Joey, you've burned your bridges behind you. I'm sending you to the principal's office! Ha ha ha! Remember that Joey?"

"Yup. I remember."

"Geezuz! And every day he got sent down."

"But you passed anyway, didn't ya Joey?"

"Yup. I passed."

"Hey! Here we are!"

"Here we are!"

Oh no. Here we are.

It was not Alice's Restaurant. At first, everybody's good humored, lots of laughs and gags, nervous like. When told to strip, down to underwear, one joker takes off his pants and stands there naked and grinning. He has no underwear. "Put yer pants on and keep em on!" he is told. Another tells loud jokes while going the rounds of getting weighed and measured, obviously trying to act crazy, much to the group's laughter, but he is told to shut up, and he does. Then things start getting desperate. It's beginning to occur to some of these guys that the army might actually take them! Holy shit! Now there's very few jokes. The military doctors are all the same: unsmiling, blankfaced, they'd-see-it-all, get moving,

keep moving. Very grim, and bodies in line sweating. I clutched my letter and the folders I had to carry around. My head was a crumbled oatmeal cookie, I could hardly talk coherently, and my hands shook from the amphetamine wipe-out. But inside, I was calm. I knew I was going to get out. I was determined. But the others? I looked at them, standing in line, subdued. They hadn't made up their minds clearly enough. They hadn't been able to! Suddenly I realized why . . .

I looked at them.

"Just have patience . . ."

I looked at my classmates there in the halls.

"Don't call us children . . ."

In the halls of the Slaving Meat Wheel.

"Single file!"

Grown up men . . .

"No talking!"

I'm not especially proud of my I-Y. But it does allow me to stay alive, and it does allow me to work towards my objective: tearing down the present deadly school system so that no one else will have to grow up with a school yearbook full of pictures of dead men.

"Something is wrong"

DENVER - In a speech called "Blue-Collar Blues" Jerome M. Rosow, Nixon's Assistant Secretary of Labor urged the American Compensation Association, a group of fringe-benefit experts, to tax their imaginations in seeking new ways to placate Amerika's unhappy workers. At the same time, he warned them, "Let it be clear we are not proposing any change in the Amerikan economic system."

"Unfortunately," Rosow said, "large numbers (of American workers) are getting increasingly frustrated by a system *they think* is not giving them a satisfactory return for their labors. Instead, millions of full-time workers - I mean get-there-on-time-type-workers - find themselves in an almost intolerable three-way bind:

"1) The legitimate, basic needs of their families have grown beyond the capability of their take-home pay, even though that check has increased.

"2) They are unhappy with their jobs but see no way of breaking out.

"3) Their total life patterns are less than satisfactory.

"Our studies show that, given current conditions, many are perman-



ently trapped."

Rosow urged his high-class puppets to find new and imaginative ways to exploit the workers' and employers' mutual desire to earn more money by giving workers incentives for increasing productivity.

One of Rosow's major points was that "Working wives can be an asset to both industry and the worker - if certain adjustments are made." The adjustments mean day-care facilities

"as a sound investment," the cost of which will be tax-deductible as business expenses.

Rosow cited a survey by the University of Michigan Survey Research Center which concluded that workers are human beings. "American workers generally expect that working entitles them to more than a paycheck." The survey also found that among all workers:

*28% did not receive medical, surgical, or hospital insurance coverage;

*38% are not covered by a life insurance policy;

*39% are not included in a retirement program;

*41% of women workers are not entitled to maternity leave with full re-employment rights;

*61% did not have employer-sponsored training available.

Rosow prophesized that "frustrated individuals, caught in a situation from which they see no escape, are likely to vent their feelings in actions...Something is wrong," he went on, "when conscientious, able, and hard-working people can't make it."

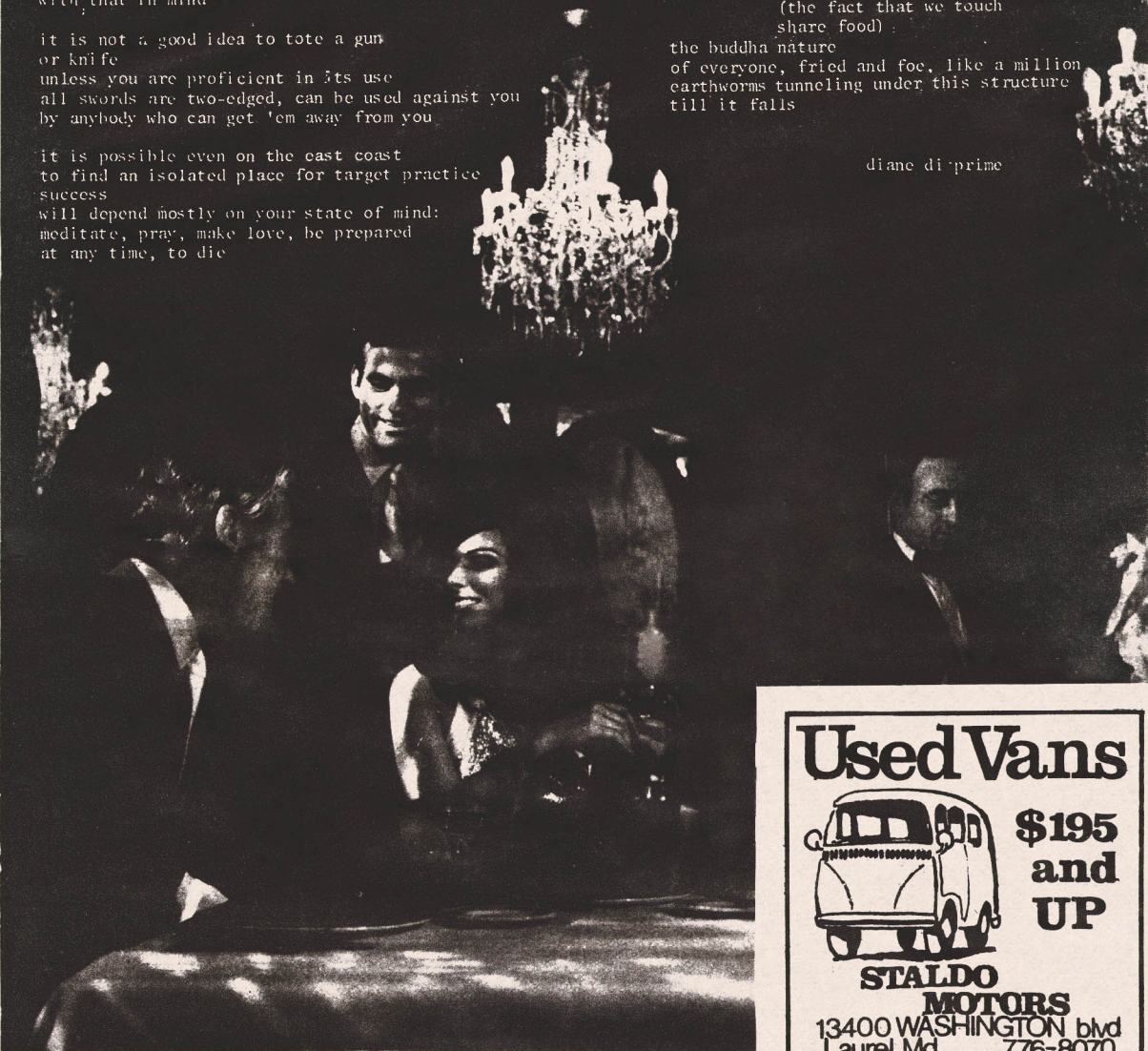


