#### Point #1

- a) Read Luke 1:46-50. How would Joseph and Mary have viewed their situation as hopeless? (i.e., virgin birth)
- b) In what way did Mary find hope in her challenges? (i.e., "generation to generation") How does this relate to Point #1?
- c) Why should Christmas be a time of hope for all Christians? How does Point #1 help you? Be specific.

#### Point #2

- a) Read Luke 1:51-55. What was Mary recalling when she talked about strong arms and bringing down the mighty?
- b) How was she applying this to her challenges? Why? What does this imply about Point #2 and finding hope today?
- c) In what way can Christians get distracted from this truth today? How does Point #2 help you find hope this week?

## **Daily Devotions**

These are provided for mid-week personal spiritual growth. Prayerfully writing out your answers will help you experience real life transformation as you dig deeper into the spiritual truths of God's word and today's message.

#### MONDAY / Read Luke 1:39-50, Matthew 1:18-25 / ADVENT: Jeremiah 14:22

- Explain how Mary and Joseph would have felt their situation was hopeless. (i.e., virgin birth) Be specific.
- In what way did Mary have a broader perspective on this challenging situation? (Hint: "generation to generation")
- How do you think this helped her find hope in spite of her challenges? How does this help you this Christmas?

## TUESDAY / Read Luke 1:46-50, Psalm 62:5-7, 71:4-6, 14, 130:5-8 / ADVENT: Psalm 42:5

- In what way did Mary apply an Old Testament perspective when it comes to hope? Be specific.
- Why will "hope" entail a looking forward perspective? How is biblical hope different than wishful thinking?
- In your own words, what does it mean to have hope? How can you apply this truth to a current challenge?

## WEDNESDAY / Read Luke 1:50, John 3:16-17, 1 Tim. 1:1, 4:10, Titus 2:13, 3:7, 1 Cor. 15:19 / ADVENT: 1 Tim. 6:17

- In what way has Christmas changed what it means to have a biblical focus for hope? Be specific.
- Why is this important to clearly understand? How does the cross and eternal life relate to New Testament hope?
- How does this encourage you given the local and global challenges we are facing today?

#### THURSDAY // Read Luke 1:51-55, Psalm 19:1, Ephesians 3:20 / ADVENT: Psalm 146:5-7

- What was Mary highlighting when she remembered how God had worked in Israel's past?
- How did this bring Mary hope in her challenging situation? What can happen without this perspective?
- In what way does this relate to God working during difficult times today? How does this encourage you?

#### FRIDAY // Read Luke 1:51-55, 1 Kings 18:16-39 / ADVENT: Psalm 119:116-117

- Describe what was at stake when King Ahab accused Elijah of being a troublemaker? What was the result?
- In what way did Elijah have a Christmas perspective when dealing with the Prophets of Baal? (i.e., hope)
- How can you be more confident in God's ability to work today? How can you step into this truth today?

## **SATURDAY** // Read Luke 1:46-55, Hebrews 11:1-13 / *ADVENT: Hebrews 10:23*

- What does Mary have in common with the Jewish patriarchs of faith? (i.e., trusting God in challenging times)
- Explain the interplay that takes place between hope and faith. Why is this important to recognize?
- How can this Christmas not only provide hope, but also challenge you to grow in your faith? Be specific.
