

<u> Point #1</u>

a) Read 1 Timothy 3:3. Why is "lover of money" a significant issue in order to become an Elder? (c.f., Matthew 6:24)

b) How was this on display in the life of Judas? How would Point #1 reveal if there were a problem? Give examples.

c) Why will this always be a challenge in today's culture? Why is Point #1 important to become a beautiful church?

Point #2

a) Read 1 Timothy 3:4-5. Why is the spiritual health of an Elder's family important when it comes to leading a church?

- b) Why will Point #2 be an ongoing challenge? What does this indicate when it comes to being a beautiful church?
- c) How does this adjust your current church leadership qualifications? How can you step into 1 Thess. 5:12 this week?

Daily Devotions

Prayerfully writing out your answers will help you experience real life transformation as you dig deeper into the spiritual truths of God's word and today's message. MONDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:3b, 6:6-10, 17-19

- Describe what it means to be a "lover of money". Give an example. How does contentment & generosity relate?
- Explain the difference between having money and money having you. Why is this important to recognize?
- How have you experienced this temptation? What are some ways you can better protect yourself? Be specific.

TUESDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:3, Matthew 6:19-24, 26:14-16, John 12:1-6

- As you read 1 Timothy 3:3, why is a "lover of money" so significant when it comes to church leadership?
- What can happen if this isn't recognized? In what way did this happen to Judas? Be specific. What was the result?
- What does this highlight about an Elder and becoming a beautiful church? (i.e., checks and balances)

WEDNESDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:3b, Luke 18:18-27

- Why did the wealthy ruler walk away from Jesus and the requirements for eternal life? Be specific.
- How would you have responded? What does this reveal about the power of money in your life?
- How do you see this happening in today's corrupt culture? (i.e., "follow the money") How is this a warning to you?

THURSDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:4-5, Titus 1:6

- Explain what it means for a husband/father to "manage" his family well. What would it look like? Be specific.
- Why is this required to become a church Elder? What is implied if a marriage is struggling, or kids are unruly?
- In what way does this challenge your current view of church leadership requirements? How would you do?

FRIDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:4-5, Ephesians 5:25-33, 6:4

- Given the "family requirement" for Elders to lead a church, what does this imply about godly management?
- How does Ephesians 5:25-33 and 6:4 help provide insight into how this happens? Be specific.
- Although no family is perfect, how would you rate your family's spiritual health? What can you do to improve it?

SATURDAY // Read 1 Timothy 3:1-5, 1 Thessalonians 5:12

- As you review the Elder qualifications, which particular area do you find to be the most challenging? Why?
- Why are these leadership qualifications necessary in order for PCC to become a beautiful church? Be specific.
- In what way does this elevate your respect for PCC's Elders? How can you be an encouragement this week?
