


Old Wives' Tale?

<u> Point #1</u>

a) Read John 20:19-25. How did Thomas initially react to the resurrection of Jesus? Why?

b) Given Thomas was a disciple, what does this highlight about Point #1? How does this encourage you?

<u>Point #2</u>

- a) Read John 20:26-28. How did Jesus respond to Thomas and also hold him accountable? Be specific.
- b) How does this relate to Point #2? Why is this important to remember? Be specific. How does this adjust you?

<u> Point #3</u>

- a) Read John 20:29. What was Jesus saying to Thomas about future generations? (i.e., you and me)
- b) How does this relate to Point #3? What will this prevent from taking place? How does this challenge you?

Daily Devotions

Prayerfully writing out your answers will help you experience real life transformation as you dig deeper into the spiritual truths of God's word and today's message. MONDAY // Read John 20:10-18, 11:25, 1 Corinthians 15:12-22

- Explain why Easter is the centerpiece of Christianity. What would happen if the resurrection wasn't true?
- How often do you think about Easter being a deal breaker in your faith? How have you undervalued it?
- Why do you think this will be a challenge in today's culture? How would this impact celebrating Easter?

TUESDAY // Read John 20:19-25, 14:1-5, Luke 11:9, Deuteronomy 4:29, Jeremiah 29:13

- How did Thomas respond to the reports from others about Jesus' resurrection? How was this typical for Thomas?
- Given that Thomas was a disciple of Jesus for 3 years, what does this highlight about Jesus and doubters?
- What does this imply about your questions and God? How does this encourage you? Be specific.

WEDNESDAY // Read John 20:26-28, Matthew 12:36-37, Romans 14:12, 1 Corinthians 5:5, Hebrews 6:4-8

- How did Jesus respond to Thomas' doubts? In what way did Jesus also hold Thomas accountable?
- How does this highlight the truth of Point #2? What does this also imply about questioning? Be specific.
- How can questioning God be used to perpetually avoid accountability? How does this help you?

THURSDAY // Read John 20:29, 10:22-42, Luke 13:10-17, 10:13-14

- What was Jesus saying to Thomas about future generations? (i.e., physical vs. spiritual)
- Why is this important? How can people today try to demand "evidence" as a way to avoid faith?
- How can personal agendas actually blind people to the evidence? How can you avoid this trap?

FRIDAY // Read John 20:29, Mark 10:13-16, Hebrews 11:1-6

- How does Scripture describe biblical faith? How is it a combination of evidence and trust?
- In what way did Jesus use children to define Easter? What does this prevent from happening?
- List two ways you can tend to doubt God. How can you apply an Easter type faith to move forward?

SATURDAY // Read Matthew 27:62-28:20, 1 Corinthians 15:3-8

- Describe the two responses to Jesus' resurrection in today's reading. How does this take place today?
- Why is the Easter message critical to following Jesus? How easy is it for you to believe in Easter?
- What is often overlooked when it comes to Easter? (i.e., eyewitnesses) How can this help with doubt?

MEDITATION VERSE: ²⁷Then he (Jesus) said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side. Do not disbelieve, but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" **John 20:29**
