APOLOGETICS

- Act 24:10; 25:8, 16; 26:1-2, 24; 2 Tim 4:16
 - Paul in court
- Act 22:1
 - Paul before the Jewish mob
- 1 Cor 9:3ff
 - Paul, defending his right to receive wages as a preacher and his decision not to do so from the Corinthians
- •Php 1:7, 16
 - Paul's defense and confirmation of the gospel
- 1 Pet 3:15
 - Always ready to make a defense



PAUL'S APOLOGETICS IN 1 CORINTHIANS 9

- •Defense #1: Paul's "right to eat and drink"
 - Argues from consistency V5-6
 - Argues from similarity V7
 - Argues from authoritative precedent V9-10, 13
 - Argues from lesser to greater (~a fortiori) V11
 - Argues from moral fairness V12
 - Argues with appeal to ultimate authority directly on the question at hand V14



PAUL'S APOLOGETICS IN 1 CORINTHIANS 9

- Defense #2: Just because Paul didn't exercise his "right to eat and drink" did not make him less of an apostle
 - External Motivation: To cause no hindrance V12
 - Purpose: Would not make his boast an empty one V15
 - Internal Motivation: Preaching voluntarily brought a reward V17
 - Personal trustworthiness: A pattern of life to not exercise freedom, for the benefit of others V19-22
 - Higher objective: For the sake of the gospel V23a
 - Charitable outlook: To share in the blessings with those he sacrificed for V23b
 - Consistent with his foundation for life: Lived with purpose V25-27



WHAT SPECIFICALLY ARE WE DEFENDING?

- Could be anything
 - The plan of salvation
 - Work, worship, and organization of churches
 - Biblical views of sexual morality

 - Does God exist?

- 1 Pet 3:15 Ready to make a defense but in what way?
 - V8-9, 15b Our attitude
 - V11 Seek peace
 - V12-14 Fearless
 - V16 Our conduct
- V18 Christ's physical suffering led to our sanctification
 - What might our willingness to suffer for Christ do for others?



FINAL THOUGHTS

- •Luke 12:11-12
 - Jesus told his disciples not to prepare beforehand what they would say, because the Holy Spirit would teach them in that very hour what they should say
 - That promise was not made to us, but we can learn from it
- Luke 21:12-15
 - Similar instructions, promise worded differently: He would give them wisdom and utterance no opponent could refute
 - Their persecution would lead to an <u>opportunity for testimony</u>
