We'll bring you to fascinating out-of-the-way places where bigger vessels can't go, including tranquil Nile farming villages with a timeless way of life. The breathtaking royal tombs of the New Kingdom pharaohs, awe-inspiring Abu Simbel, where the colossal statues of Ramses still radiate power, the romantic ambiance of our own private sailing vessel—together they create the perfect experience of the wonder of ancient Egypt.

Itinerary

DAY 1

CAIRO, EGYPT

Arrive at Cairo International Airport, where you are met and transferred to the 5-star Mena House, the legendary colonial-era hotel set next to the Pyramids... meals on your own

DAY 2

GRAND EGYPTIAN MUSEUM / EGYPTIAN MUSEUM OF ANTIQUITIES

This morning, we have a special visit to see sections of the Grand Egyptian Museum. Although the museum is not officially open to the public, our group has secured a short tour where we'll visit the Grand Hall, atrium entrance, and exterior gardens. The Grand Egyptian Museum, which began construction in 2005 and is scheduled to fully open in 2024, will be the largest archaeological museum in the world, housing more than 100,000 artifacts including King Tut's entire treasure collection. Next, we explore Islamic Cairo, visiting the graceful Mohammed Ali Mosque within the ancient Citadel, a spectacular medieval fortress perched on a hill above the city. Originally built by Salah El-Din in 1176 to fortify the city against the Crusaders, the Citadel was modified and enlarged over the centuries by subsequent rulers and today is a complex of three mosques and four museums.

After lunch at a local restaurant, we head to the Egyptian Museum of Antiquities in the heart of the city. The museum was designed by a French architect in a Neoclassical style, and walking through it is a passage through time, taking us from the Archaic Pre-Dynastic Period to the Old, Middle, and New Kingdoms. Housing an astounding collection of Egyptian antiquities from 2700 BC to the 6th century AD, there are thousands of statues, jewels, and artifacts from nearly every period of ancient Egypt. Perhaps most striking are the amazing treasures of the young king, Tutankhamun, including his famous mask of solid gold in a perfect state of preservation. Twelve rooms are filled with treasures from King Tut's tomb, which was discovered virtually intact in 1922. In the evening we gather for our Welcome Dinner. Overnight at the Mena House...BLD

DAY 3

SAQQARA / THE GREAT PYRAMIDS AND THE SPHINX

This morning, we will explore the necropolis of Saqqara, burial grounds for kings and nobility during the age of the Great Pyramids. Here, the very first pyramids were built, not with smooth sides, but with six steps on the outside representing the pharaoh's stepladder to heaven. We'll see the famous Step Pyramid of King Zoser, the first free-standing stone structure in the world, built during the 27th century BC for the burial of Pharaoh Zoser. We'll also see some of the tombs of the nobles, adorned with exquisite ancient Egyptian art.

Nothing quite prepares one for the first sight of the Great Pyramids, and this afternoon we will explore what the ancient Greeks considered one of the "Seven Wonders of the World." The sheer size and the magnitude of labor that went into their construction in 2600 BC is astounding. The three pyramids of Cheops, Chephren, and Mycerinus continue to radiate the magnificence that has awed visitors for centuries. Time permitting, we climb inside the Great

Nearby, we visit the inscrutable Sphinx, with the body of a lion and the face of a man. Carved from a natural rock, the Sphinx is 190 feet long and 66 feet tall at its highest point. Erected by Cheops' son Khafre, it sits in a quarry by the Pyramids. With its 16-foot-high face directed toward the rising sun in the east, it symbolizes the return of life each day. Dinner is on your own tonight. Overnight at Mena House...BL

DAY 4

LUXOR / KARNAK TEMPLE

A morning flight brings us to Luxor, site of the ancient Egyptian city of Thebes, in Upper (southern) Egypt. We head to the splendid Temple of Karnak, constructed over more than a thousand years by generations of pharaohs. Its ancient name was Ipet-Isut, or "the most perfect of places." The Karnak temple complex was built on a large scale for the giant gods, and so it sprawls across much of northern Luxor. It was begun during the 12th Dynasty, and each succeeding ruler added to the original plan and left his own mark. Amun, one of the gods of creation, was the most important god of Thebes and head of the local triad of deities. Although the original sanctuary of the Great Temple of Amun was built during the Middle Kingdom period, when the Theban Pharaohs first came to prominence, the rest of the temples, pylons, courts, columns, and reliefs were the work of New Kingdom rulers. The Great Hypostyle Hall is an incredible forest of giant pillars, covering an area larger than the whole of Paris' Notre Dame Cathedral.

We continue to our hotel, the Hilton Luxor. This evening, we enjoy a tour of the temple of Luxor, a strikingly graceful piece of architecture on the banks of the Nile. It was built by the New Kingdom Pharaoh Amenhotep III on the site of an older sanctuary. As Amun-Ra, the fusion of Amun and the sun-god Ra, this pharaoh was also a state deity worshiped in many parts of the country. Once a year from his great temple at Karnak, the images of Amun and the other two gods in the local triad—Amun's wife, the war-goddess Mut, and their son, the moon-god Khon—would journey down the Nile to Luxor Temple for the Opet Festival, a celebration held during the flood season. Overnight at the Hilton Luxor...BLD

DAY 5

VALLEY OF THE KINGS / ESNA / EMBARK / OUR DAHABIYA

We'll enjoy a visit to the West Bank of Luxor, where we explore the Valley of the Kings, a vast City of the Dead where magnificent tombs were carved into the desert rocks, richly decorated and filled with treasures for the afterlife by generations of pharaohs. Our explorations include the impressive Temple of Queen Hatshepsut who, along with Cleopatra, was one of ancient Egypt's two female pharaohs, and special visits to the tombs of Tutankhamun, Seti I, and Ramses VI (the latter is especially stunning, with much of its surface covered with hieroglyphs and paintings). We also visit the impressive Workmen's Village of Deir el-Medina, home to the ancient artisans and craftsmen who constructed the tombs. On the way back to the river Nile, we stop at the famed Colossi of Memnon, known in ancient Greek times for their haunting voices at dawn.

Itinerary

A drive of about an hour brings us to the town of Esna, where we explore the Greco-Roman Temple of Khnum, the main attraction of Esna. What actually remains of the temple is the well-preserved Great Hypostyle Hall built during the reign of the Roman emperor Claudius. Dedicated to Khnum, the ram-headed creator-god who fashioned humankind on his potter's wheel, the temple was begun by Ptolemy VI and built over the ruins of earlier temples. The hall was built later; it was excavated from the silt that had accumulated through centuries of annual Nile floods and is about 30 feet below the modern street level.

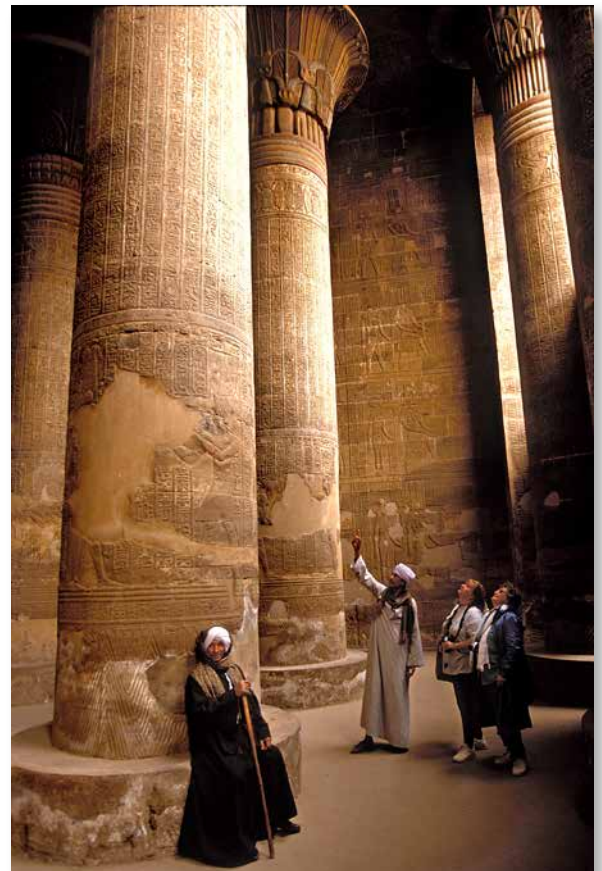


Heading to the harbor, we check into our private dahabiya, the L'Orient, our home base for the next five nights. We enjoy lunch and dinner on board and dock overnight aboard the L'Orient...BLD

DAY 6

EL-KAAB / EDFU / TEMPLE OF HORUS

Today we cruise to El-Kaab, a unique site very few visitors see. It features many beautiful tombs and temples, most of which were originally dedicated to the vulture-goddess Nekhet. In Pre-Dynastic and Early Dynastic times, El-Kaab was the capital of Upper Egypt, and it continued to be one of the region's most important cities up until the Ptolemaic era. With marvelous river views en route, we make our way to Edfu, where we explore the extraordinary Temple of Horus, the largest and most completely preserved Pharaonic, albeit Greek-built, temple in Egypt. Horus served as the protector and patron of the pharaoh. The temple's towering pylon was erected by Ptolemy IX, and on the exterior are a pair of beautiful Horus statues. Inside its Court of Offerings, we can study the beautiful reliefs on the wall depicting a feast. Lunch is on board as we sail to El Selsela. Dinner and overnight aboard the L'Orient...BLD



DAY 7

SELSELA / BARBECUE DINNER

The little-visited shrine of Horemheb, cut into the riverside rocks at Selsela, offers a fascinating opportunity to see carved reliefs from various periods of ancient Egyptian history, and is rarely visited on other cruise itineraries. We enjoy the atmosphere of this elegant shrine, then cruise to Farès. Dinner tonight is a barbecue prepared by our staff and served by candlelight on an island in the Nile. Overnight aboard the L'Orient...BLD

DAY 8

KOM OMBO / COBANIA ISLAND

We explore the Temple of Kom Ombo, dedicated to the crocodile-god Sobek. The temple stands at a bend in the Nile where in ancient times sacred crocodiles basked in the sun on the riverbank. Magnificent Kom Ombo was once a strategic trading town on the caravan route from Nubia. Although substantially ruined by the changing tides of the river and later by builders who used many of its stones for new buildings, it is still a stunning site of Ptolemaic and Greco-Roman temples. This architectural masterpiece features perfectly symmetrical twin elements—twin entrances, courts, colonnades, and sanctuaries—

probably indicating a twin priesthood. The left side of the temple is dedicated to Horus, the falcon-headed god, and the right to Sobek, the crocodile-headed god. This evening, we enjoy a visit with the villagers on Cobania Island. Dinner and overnight aboard the L'Orient...BLD

DAY 9

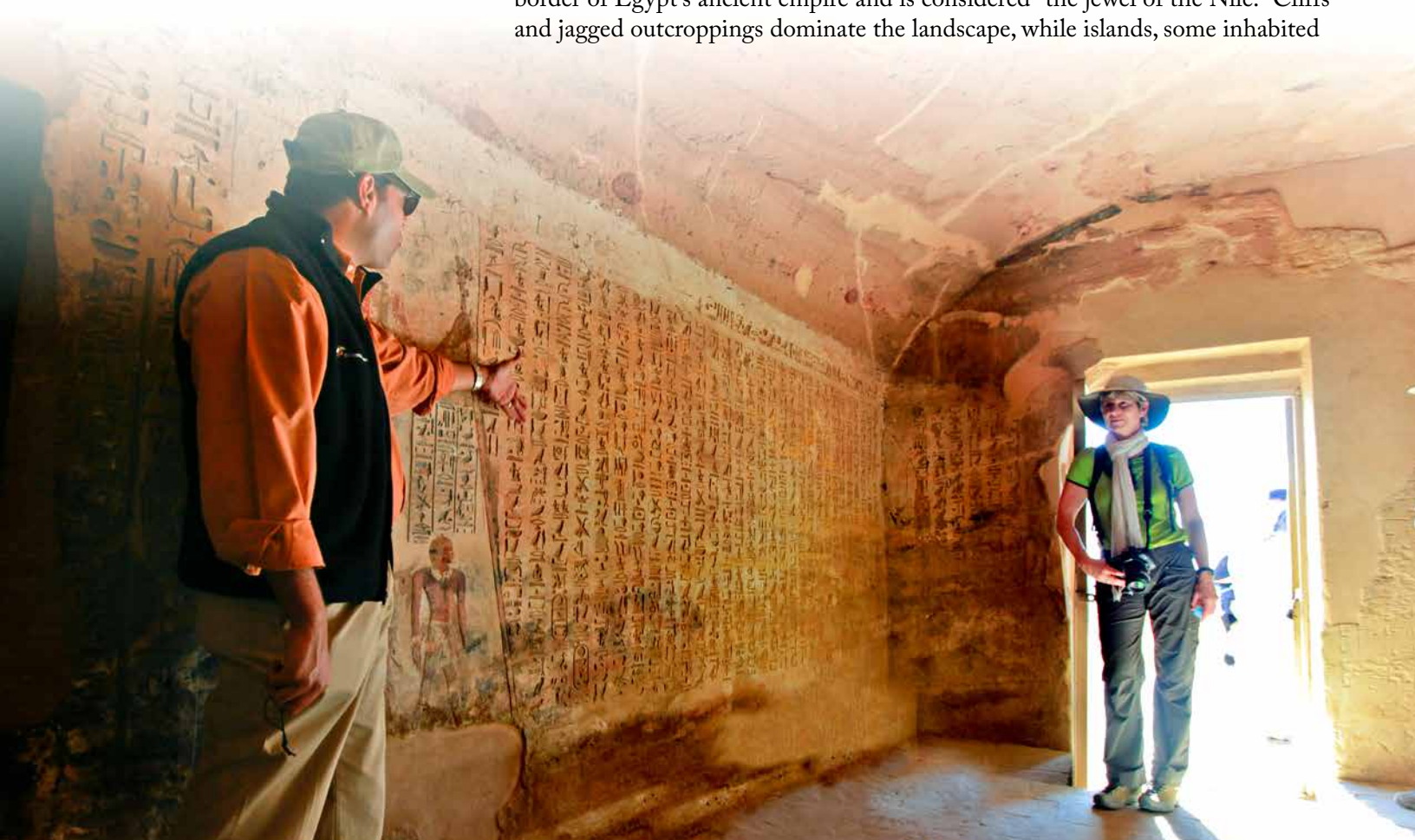
ASWAN HIGH DAM / PHILAE / ASWAN MARKET

After a visit to the Aswan High Dam, Egypt's contemporary example of building on a monumental scale, we enjoy a short motorboat ride to the romantic and majestic Philae Temple on the Island of Agilka. The Philae temple complex has lured pilgrims for thousands of years; during the 19th century these ruins were one of Egypt's most legendary tourist attractions. Next we visit the granite quarries that supplied the ancient Egyptians with most of the hard stone used in pyramids and temples. Here we see the famous and huge "unfinished obelisk." On this 100-foot-long block of stone, three sides were completed except for the inscriptions. Today it lies where the stonemasons abandoned it, still partly attached to the parent rock and with no indication of what it was intended for.

Lunch is on board, after which we enjoy our choice of two options: a walking tour of Aswan's colorful outdoor market or a visit to the Nubian Museum, with its thousands of objects celebrating the culture and civilization of the Nubian region from prehistoric times to the present. Aswan lies at the southernmost border of Egypt's ancient empire and is considered "the jewel of the Nile." Cliffs and jagged outcroppings dominate the landscape, while islands, some inhabited

since before the time of the pharaohs, dot the river. The riverbanks are laden with golden sand and the town is filled with sheltered gardens and tree-lined boulevards. Tonight we enjoy our last dinner aboard the L'Orient...BLD

DAY 10

DISEMBARK / ABU SIMBEL / CAIRO

Disembarking this morning and bidding farewell to the L'Orient staff, we fly to fantastic Abu Simbel, a magnificent example of both ancient grandeur and modern ingenuity and preservation. The rulers of the New Kingdom extended Egypt's borders to the Fourth Cataract on the Nile, and Ramses II, in a gesture of piety and self-aggrandizement, ordered two sun temples carved from the limestone mountains at Abu Simbel. Here, between 1290 and 1194 BC, stonemasons hewed giant figures of the king on the face of cliffs above the Nile. The figures radiated power, dominated the landscape, and with their ceaseless stares, subjugated all who dared to enter Egypt. In modern times, the temples of Abu Simbel were threatened by the waters that would rise with the completion of the High Dam at Aswan, and a campaign to save them was organized by UNESCO. The temples were cut into blocks, raised piece by piece, and reassembled in a new position above the water. The massive job took two years to complete (1966-1968). At the Great Temple of Ra-Harakhte, the four famous colossal statues of Ramses II sit majestically over 60 feet in height, gazing across the desert. Inside the entrance to the temple is an impressive hall. Flanked with statues of Ramses II, it leads to the vestibule, and finally to the innermost Sacred Sanctuary. The Temple of Hathor, dedicated to the cow-headed goddess of love and built in honor of Ramses' favorite wife, Queen Nefertari, is fronted by six massive standing statues, each 30 feet high. We fly to Cairo and check in at the InterContinental Citystars Cairo. In the evening we gather for a festive Farewell Dinner...BLD

DAY 1 (PRE-TRIP OPTION)

CAIRO

Arrive in Cairo and transfer to the Mena House for overnight...Meals on your own

DAY 2

ALEXANDRIA / ROMAN AMPHITHEATER / ALEXANDRIA LIBRARY AND MUSEUM

After breakfast, a journey of about three hours on the Cairo-Alexandria Desert Road brings us to the Mediterranean and Alexandria, crossroads of the ancient world, founded by Alexander the Great in 331 BC. Alexandria prospered as the Mediterranean's most glorious city under the Ptolemies, the dynastic Greek family that reigned as pharaohs over Egypt.

The history of the Alexandria region stretches back thousands of years, well before the time of Alexander. Greek literature from Homer's time recognized the island of Pharos as a busy harbor for ships laden with goods from Crete, Phoenicia, and the Aegean. A causeway known as the Heptastadion was constructed to link the mainland of Alexandria to the island of Pharos, thus creating two remarkable harbors. The famous Lighthouse at Pharos, one of the original Seven Wonders of the Ancient World, was built in the 3rd century BC under Ptolemy I and Ptolemy II. It rose to over 300 feet, casting a bright light that could be seen for many miles. The lighthouse was toppled by an earthquake in 1323 and now lies in pieces in the harbor, visible to divers underwater.

Upon our arrival in Alexandria, we explore the Roman Amphitheater, the only one in Egypt, discovered quite recently during excavations for a new apartment building. This well-preserved theater once stood with 13 semi-circular tiers of white marble imported from Europe, and contains galleries, sections of mosaic flooring, and marble seats for up to 800 spectators. At one point, it may have even been roofed over to serve as an Odeon for musical performances. Some inscriptions suggest that it was sometimes used for wrestling contests. We then enjoy a visit to the Qait Bey Fort, a 15th century Mamluk fort built on the foundations of the Pharos lighthouse that includes both a mosque and a castle inside its walls. After lunch at a traditional restaurant overlooking the beach, we visit the Bibliotheca Alexandrina, not only a library but also an integrated cultural complex (please note that the library complex is closed on Friday and Saturday). It stands on what is thought to be the site of the ancient Library of Alexandria, which was built by Ptolemy I. The largest library of antiquity, the Library of Alexandria was frequented by scholars from all over the Mediterranean from the 4th century BC to its eventual destruction by fire 700 years later. We overnight at the Steigenberger Cecil Hotel...BL

DAY 3

ALEXANDRIA NATIONAL MUSEUM / CAIRO

After breakfast we visit the newly opened Alexandria National Museum, with its thousands of artifacts spanning the ages from the Pharaonic Era through the Greco-Roman period in Egypt. Papyrus scrolls, perfume bottles, and painted mummy cases are well displayed, as well as classic Greek statues showing the physical beauty that represents the ideals of that culture. The museum also illustrates Alexandria's role in the history of modern Egypt. Later, we visit the Catacombs of Kom El Shugafa, the largest Roman burial site discovered in Egypt. The three tiers of tombs and chambers are cut into the bedrock to a depth of over 100 feet. Constructed in the 2nd century AD as a single-family crypt, these tombs were later expanded to hold more than 300 individual tombs. There is even a banquet hall where grieving relatives paid their last respects with a funereal feast. Though the motifs are pure ancient Egyptian, the architects and artists were schooled in the Greco-Roman style, resulting in an amazingly integrated artwork quite unlike anything else in the world. We return to Cairo in the afternoon, with lunch en route. This evening, we join the group on the regular trip (Day 1) at the Mena House...BL

Optional Half-Day Tour Old & Coptic Cairo

We recommend you arrive a day early if you wish to do this extension. This tour includes an English-speaking guide, transfers in private air-conditioned vehicle, and entrance tickets to the mentioned sites, but no meals. The tour will take place from 9:00 am-12:00 pm or 1:00pm-4:00 pm, depending on local scheduling.

We explore Coptic Cairo in the timeless Old Cairo district. Here we find the remains of the old Fortress of Babylon, built at the time of the Romans in Egypt to protect the country from invading enemies. The walls of the fortress enclose the church of St. Sergius, where the Holy Family is reported to have stayed, and the medieval Coptic Hanging Church, the seat of the Coptic patriarchs for centuries, has foundations that rest on the walls of the fortress. We also visit the Coptic Museum, with its wonderful collection of sculpture dating from Pre-Christian times up until the 5th century, as well as bone carvings, frescoes, icons, relics, and colorful textiles. We finish with a visit to the Church of St. Barbara, a charming monument commemorating a 4th century local saint, and see the oldest synagogue in Egypt, Ben Ezra. Inside this basilica-style temple, the so-called Geniza Documents were found, a treasure hailed as an unparalleled source of information about the life of the Jews in Egypt's past.

DAY 1

AMMAN, JORDAN

Arrive at Amman Airport, where you are met and transferred to your hotel. Overnight at the Fairmont Amman...meals on your own

Please Note: extension participants are responsible for getting from Cairo to Amman on their own. We recommend you book Royal Jordanian Airlines #504, which typically departs Cairo around 1:20 pm with arrival in Amman around 3:30 pm (flight time is subject to change). However, any afternoon arrival into Amman works well for this extension. If you book your Cairo/ Amman flight on Royal Jordanian Airlines, they may require that you present the credit card used for your ticket purchase at check-in. They may deny boarding without verification of this credit card.

DAY 2

AMMAN / JERASH

Morning tour of Amman, one of the most ancient cities in the world, with archaeological finds dating back 3,000 years. Inhabited since the Bronze Age, the city is mentioned in the Old Testament as Rabath Ammon, capital of the Ammonites, and it was here that David met Bathsheba. Visit the Citadel, archaeological museum, Roman theater, and enjoy a walk through the bazaar. Afterwards, visit the ancient Roman city of Jerash, an archaeological masterpiece framed by the hills of Gilead. It was founded by the soldiers of Alexander the Great during the 4th century BC and later joined the Roman Decapolis. Monuments of this prosperous Roman city—one of the best preserved in the Roman Empire—include a triumphal arch, a stadium, a monumental fountain, and temples. Return to Amman for overnight...BL

DAY 3

MT. NEBO / MADABA / SHOBAK / PETRA

On our way to Petra, we visit Mt. Nebo, the mountain where Moses was allowed to view the Holy Land, yet not allowed to enter it. Today it is the site of the Church of Moses, built by the first Christians. The views over Jordan, the Dead Sea, and Israel are tremendous. When the weather is clear, you may even see Jerusalem, about 30 miles away. Continue to Madaba, whose St. George's Church houses a world-famous mosaic floor that is a large map of Palestine, including a detailed mosaic of Jerusalem as it was during the 6th century AD. After lunch in Madaba, we continue to Shobak. Set on the edge of plateau with its imposing brick walls, the Shobak Castle was built by the Crusader king Baldwin I in 1115 AD. After its fall to the armies of Saladin in 1189 AD, it was occupied by the Mamluks, who expanded its complex. The castle itself has many secret passageways, and we'll pass under arches, walk through tunnels, and see the ruins of a lesser-visited crusade fortress. Continue to the Petra Movenpick Resort or Petra Marriott Hotel for overnight...BL



DAY 4

PETRA

We travel to Petra, the ancient capital of the Nabataens, a nomadic Arabian

tribe who ruled the Trans-Jordan area in pre-Roman times and derived their great wealth and power from the passing trade caravans. The city reached the peak of its fame after the Romans took over in the first and second century AD. With the rise of the coastal trading center at Palmyra and the opening of sea trade routes, Petra declined in importance and was forgotten by the outside world for a thousand years. In 1812, Swiss explorer John Lewis Burckhardt, a young convert to Islam traveling the Middle East's deserts in Bedouin disguise, heard local Bedouins tell of fantastic ruins hidden in the mountains of Wadi Musa and persuaded one to lead him there. His journal and sketches of Petra eventually made their way to London, where they inspired many to seek this lost city.

Sheer sandstone hills in beautiful shades of deep rust banded with gray and yellow form a deep canyon that protects Petra in all directions. Today's full-day visit begins with a short horseback ride (or walk) from the main gate of Petra to the entrance of the old city. From here, we walk through the narrow canyon called the Siq to visit the rose-red city of Petra. The archaeological site covers an area of about 50 square miles, with over 800 monuments excavated, including the famous Al-Khazneh ("Treasury"), featured in the film Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade. The modern town outside of Petra is called Wadi Musa (Valley of Moses). This is the spot where Moses is thought to have struck the rock with his staff, bringing water flowing forth as it does today. Overnight at the Petra Movenpick Resort or Petra Marriott Hotel...BL

DAY 5

WADI RUM

Head to the famed desert canyon of Wadi Rum, where British officer T. E. Lawrence was based during the Great Arab Revolt of 1917-1918. Enjoy an optional ride by camel to Lawrence's spring, and explore by 4WD vehicle to enjoy a magnificent desert world where massive rock peaks rise out of pink sands. Our camp offers a comfortable desert getaway in a superb wilderness setting. Before dinner this evening, head out to a scenic spot to enjoy sunset over Wadi Rum. Overnight at Wadi Rum...BLD

DAY 6

WADI RUM / DEAD SEA

After a short walk this morning to a small natural arch with inscriptions dating from the time of the Nabateans, the builders of Petra 2,000 years ago, continue to your hotel at the legendary Dead Sea, with the afternoon at leisure. Overnight at the Dead Sea Movenpick Resort...B

DEPART

After breakfast at hotel, transfer to airport for departure on homeward-bound flights via Amman...B

MENA HOUSE

Cairo, Egypt

Days 1 to 3 (3 nights)

Originally built as a royal hunting lodge for Khedive Ismail, ruler of Egypt from 1863 to 1879, the Mena House was converted into a hotel in the 1880s. It has hosted sultans, pashas, royals, and statesmen during more than a century as one of the world's grand hotels. People love this place for a compelling reason—it's literally right across from the pyramids. The Mena House has a historic wing with an opulent Arabesque interior, several modern wings, three restaurants, a lushly landscaped garden, and a huge swimming pool with views of the Great Pyramids. Note: The hotel is a popular venue for large weddings and other events. If weddings are in progress during our stay here, there may be noise from music and social gatherings. If you are sensitive to noise while trying to sleep, it might be wise to bring ear plugs or a white-noise machine.



HILTON LUXOR RESORT AND SPA

Luxor, Egypt

Day 4 (1 night)

The Hilton Luxor has an ideal location set right on the water's edge of the Nile. With floating feluccas in the distance and the sound of rustling palms in the breeze, guests can enjoy relaxing guest rooms with comfortable beds and access to garden terraces or in some cases private balconies overlooking the Nile. The Sunset Bar has fantastic views of the West Bank of the Nile, and it's a treat to unwind at the Nile-side Oasis Pool, with its swim-up bar.

Lodging



L'ORIENT

Nile River, Egypt

Days 5 to 9 (5 nights)

A traditional Nile sailboat of the style built at the end of the 19th century, the 120-foot L'Orient is the perfect vessel for observing life along the Nile. She features two decks, with six total cabins: two double and two twin cabins of the same size, each with a private bathroom, as well as heat and air-conditioning. There are also two Suite cabins, also with private bathrooms, as well as heat and air-conditioning, but with a small shared balcony (please note that the Suite cabins come at additional cost and each have one double bed—twin (two) beds are not possible). Meals are served outside on the large shaded deck, a fine place to relax on the comfy lounge chairs. Because the L'Orient is sail-powered only, we cruise with the breeze and come to dock under oar, though when needed, a motorized boat with a tow line is on hand. The L'Orient is a fantastic and intimate way to watch the riverside scenes and enjoy a lovely pace on the river in between our daily tours.



INTERCONTINENTAL CITYSTARS CAIRO

Cairo, Egypt

Day 10 (1 night)

This hotel has a great location—near the airport and the downtown business district, so it's close to everything, including good shopping. Guest rooms are clean and spacious, and there are 11 restaurants and bars, so you're sure to find one to suit your taste. Enjoy a cocktail on the poolside terrace or spend a little time at the spa. Depending on your routing, it is necessary to depart from the US one or possibly two days prior to Day 1 of the trip itinerary. The name on your airline ticket must match the name on your passport exactly, and your passport must be valid for at least six months after your date of return to the US.

Please do not purchase your tickets until you are confirmed on the trip and have reviewed your proposed air schedule with our office. Once your tickets have been purchased, please send us a copy of your airline schedule so we can reserve your airport transfers.

What to Expect

WHAT THE TRIP IS LIKE

This trip is rated Level 1+, Easiest, according to our trip grading system. It is a cultural and archaeological adventure with day walks exploring the fascinating ruins and wonderful towns in this ancient and modern land. Please note that we have several early morning starts, especially on days with air travel. Some days we tour only a half day, while on other days, we tour for a full day. There is plenty of free time planned so that you can explore, shop on your own, or simply relax.

Our home base for five nights is the 100-foot dahabiya L'Orient, a traditional Nile sailboat built at the end of the 19th century and completely refitted in 2003. She is air conditioned and has two decks and four double or twin cabins and one suite with private baths. The L'Orient is sail-powered only, but will use motor-boat assistance in cases of low wind. Public spaces on L'Orient include an interior lounge and a large shaded deck where meals are served. There are electrical outlets in the cabins for charging batteries. (You will need a voltage converter and plug adaptor). Meals are on board the L'Orient. Bottled water is available on board as well as tea and coffee. A selection of imported wine and beer is available for purchase. There is no corkage fee for trip members who bring their own.

WEATHER

Egypt's climate is hot and dry most of the year. During the winter months (Dec-Feb), average daily temperatures are in the upper 60s°F on the Mediterranean coast and in the 80s°F in Aswan. In spring and fall, daytime temperatures can get up to the 90s°F. It can be quite cool in the evening, especially when on the Nile River (and please note: there is no heat aboard the L'Orient). From January through March, the temperature is cooler, down to the 50s°F and 60s°F during the day, and dropping much lower at night, sometimes into the low 40s°F. Egypt has a very dry climate, which makes a temperature of 80°F feel much cooler than it would in a humid, tropical climate.

INTERNAL FLIGHTS

Please note that internal flights in Egypt are known for delays and changes. Some of our internal flights may depart very early in the morning or arrive late at night, so please be prepared for the possibility of early wake-up times and later check-in times. Even though we strive to book the best-available flights for all our departures, changes in weather, overbooking, and other factors beyond our control can also result in delays or flight changes, even with confirmed reservations. We appreciate your patience, flexibility, and willingness to embrace change with a sense of adventure.

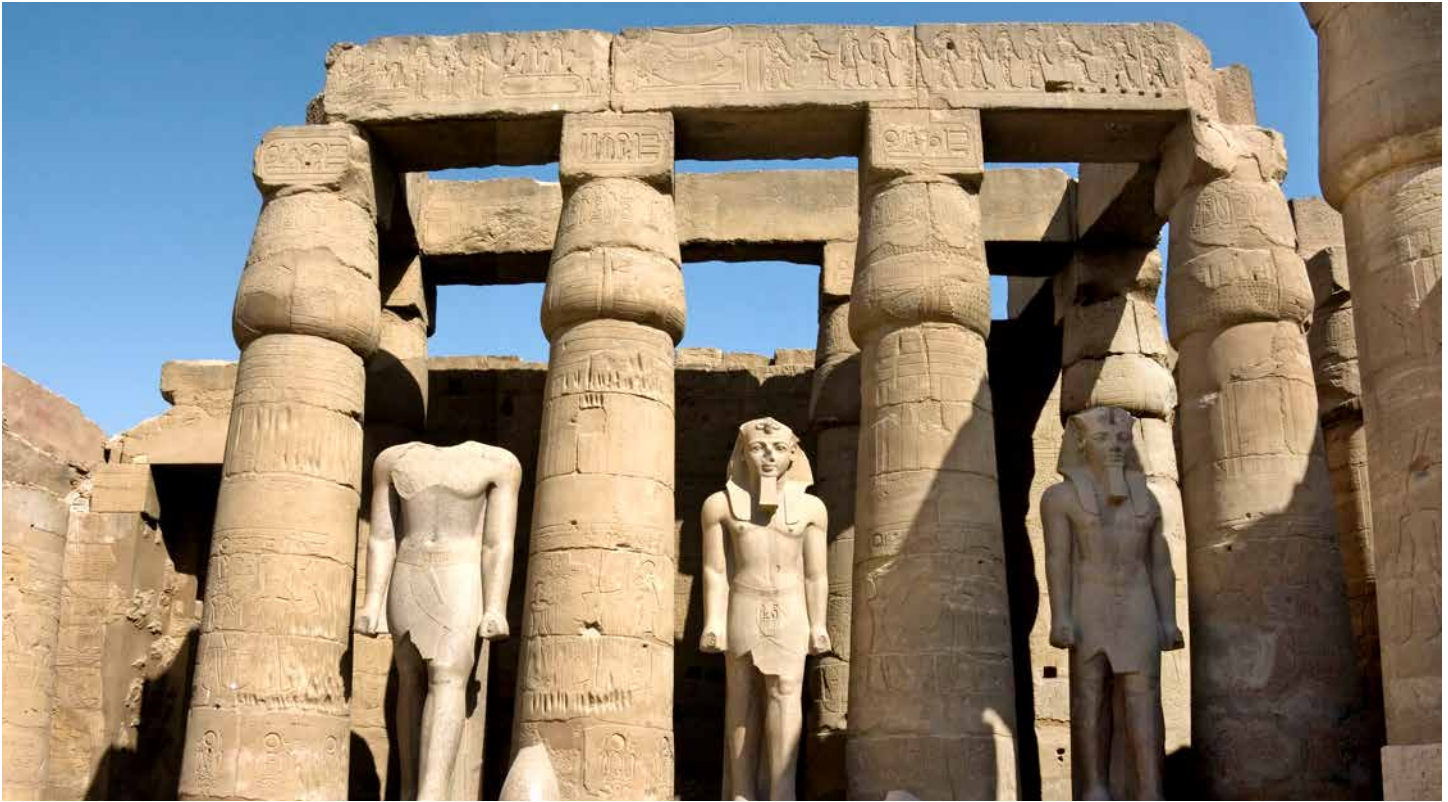
