## TRIBES OF THE OMO VALLEY AND SPECTACULAR FESTIVALS

From its Orthodox Christian heritage in the mountain highlands to the animistic tribes in the Great Rift Valley, Ethiopia holds a fascinating mix of cultures. In the highlands, we explore Axum—Ethiopia’s holy city—and World Heritage-listed Lalibela, with its 12th century subterranean churches. A different side of Ethiopia thrives in the far south, where we visit the tribal cultures of the remote Omo Valley. Each trip is timed for a festival—January trips attend Timkat, the exuberant Epiphany celebration; in September, we’ll witness Meskel, with its flickering bonfires and carpets of yellow daisies.



# Itinerary

## TIMKAT FESTIVAL DEPARTURES (JANUARY)

The Timkat Festival, the biggest celebration of the year in Ethiopia, marks Epiphany on the Western Gregorian Calendar. We've scheduled our departures to spend two days in Addis to enjoy Timkat at its most colorful. Timkat is a three-day affair that begins with Timkat Eve, when dramatic processions take place through a night of fasting. The great Timkat Day, which commemorates Christ's baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist, is followed on the third day by the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel. For Timkat, tej (a honey drink) and tella (a barley drink) are brewed, special bread is baked, sheep are slaughtered, and gifts are given to children. Worshippers dress in the dazzling white of traditional Ethiopian dress, in dramatic contrast to the brilliant-hued velvets and satins of the priests' ceremonial robes and umbrellas. On Timkat Eve, the priests bring out the tabots, the engraved wooden or stone slabs that are the symbols of the Ark of the Covenant, then proceed to a pool or river to bless the water where the next day's celebration will take place. It is the tabot, rather than the church building, that is consecrated, and the tabot remains wrapped in velvet cloths, hidden from the gaze of the layman. The evening air is filled with the smell of incense and the sounds of ringing bells and blowing trumpets. At dawn, the priests bless the water and slip a golden cross into it, extinguishing a consecrated candle in the water. The water is then sprinkled on the assembled congregation in commemoration of Christ's baptism and the tabots are brought back by solemn procession to their churches. Huge crowds of worshippers come to observe the extraordinary Timkat ceremonies and it is a great privilege to be able to witness them.

### DAY 1

#### ARRIVE ADDIS (ITINERARY 1)

Upon arrival in Addis Ababa, trip members are met at the airport and transferred to the Sheraton Hotel, our comfortable base in Addis. In the afternoon, we gather for an orientation meeting, then enjoy a Welcome Dinner...D

### DAY 2

#### ADDIS

Our explorations of Addis include the Anthropological/Ethnographic museum with the richest collection of Ethiopian icons and paintings, ranging in age from the medieval period to the modern era. We'll then visit the nearby National Museum—the highlight here is the paleontology section that includes the remains of the feted Dinknesh, a specimen of *Australopithecus afarensis* discovered in 1974 by paleoanthropologist Donald Johanson. Known in popular parlance as "Lucy," its Ethiopian name means "you are marvelous." Overnight at hotel...BLD

### DAYS 3-5

#### JINKA / OMO RIVER VALLEY TRIBES

We fly to Jinka (1.5 hours), set at the edge of the dry savannas of 835-square-mile Mago National Park along the east bank of the Omo River, and begin exploring the tribes of the Omo River Valley. In the savanna of the Omo

# Itinerary



River Valley live a fascinating mix of nomadic and semi-nomadic tribes, from the Nyangatom and Kara to the Bena and Hamar, coexisting in a harsh land that is all but forgotten by the rest of the world. For the most part, they have separate languages. There are few interactions between tribes except at markets. In the wet season, October through November, and April, the tribespeople largely remain in their villages to take care of communal tasks such as honey gathering and cultivation. With the approach of the dry season, the men leave with their herds to find good pastures, moving to the grassy banks of seasonal watercourses.

Most of the tribespeople wear simple cotton wraps, much decorative jewelry, and elaborate hairstyles. Many men have decorative scarring that indicates their tribal rank, hunting achievements, and and bravery in inter-tribal conflicts. The men of the Mursi tribe are renowned warriors and Mursi women are famous for the lip plates they use for adornment. The Mursi speak a Nilotic language and are a homogeneous group governed by their own ancient rituals.

We make daily excursions to visit villages and meet a wide variety of tribal peoples. Our itinerary in the Omo region is flexible and subject to local conditions. The following is a sample itinerary: At Korcho, a small Karo village, we visit some homes and watch traditional body paintings and adorations performed by Karo men, women, and children. Photography is allowed during this ceremony and you are welcome to participate.

Driving Details: Jinka to Mursi round trip on a dusty bush road, approximately 3-4 hours; Jinka to Murulle 5-6 hours, mostly an asphalt road with the last 5 miles a dusty and bumpy bush road; Murulle to Kangatan to visit the Nyangatom is about 2-3 hours round trip, mostly on asphalt road round trip.

## DAY 6

### ARBA MINCH

A long but scenic drive brings us to Arba Minch. Along the way we visit the Konso ethnic group. Check into our basic hotel, which has a panoramic view of Nech Sar National Park and its two lakes, Chamo and Abaya. Time permitting, we enjoy a walk to a scenic local spring. Overnight at hotel in Arba Minch...

## DAY 7

### ARBA MINCH / DROZE VILLAGE / LAKE CHAMO

We visit a mountain village of the Dorze people, famous for their weavings, with a chance to explore the weekly market. After lunch back at our hotel, we take a boat excursion on Lake Chamo, where we may have the opportunity to see Nile crocodiles and aquatic birds. Overnight at hotel..BLD

## DAY 8

### BAHIR DAR

We fly to Bahir Dar, where we visit a church to meet the local deacon and also take a boat excursion out to an island monastery in Lake Tana. The town of Bahir Dar rose to prominence in the 16th century and is a center for commerce and government for the region. Around 20 of the 37 islands in the lake have monasteries, with some dating to the Middle Ages. Due in part to their difficult access, the lake's churches are well preserved and rich with the best of Ethiopian religious paintings, illuminated manuscripts, and other treasures. From a hilltop above the city, near the palace of the former Emperor Haile Selassie, there are panoramic views of the city and the lake. Overnight at a basic hotel at Lake Tana...BLD

Travel Details: Approximately 1-hour flight



## DAY 9

### SIMIEN MOUNTAINS

After breakfast, we drive to Gondar, Ethiopia's royal capital until 1868 and set at an altitude of 7,500 feet. From here we head up into the Simien Mountains, a spectacular landscape of deep gorges, sharp ridges, and steep jagged peaks, including Ras Dashen, Ethiopia's highest peak at 14,930 feet. Simien Mountains National Park is home to unique wildlife that include the endangered walia ibex, Ethiopian wolf, and the gelada baboon, as well as more than 180 species of birds. Overnight at Simien Lodge...BLD

## DAY 10

### GONDAR

We drive back to Gondar and spend the day exploring this medieval city, surrounded by mountains on all sides, with Lake Tana in view in the distance. Founded by Emperor Fasilides in the 17th century, Gondar has been called the "Camelot of Africa" because of its castles and fortress-like battlements. By European standards, the Gondar castles may not be elaborate, but their very presence in Africa makes them a rare and imposing sight. Ambassadors of the Ottoman Empire and of Louis XVI of France were once entertained here. Gondar's Debre Birhan Selassie Church is famous for its "winged angel" faces that decorate the entire ceiling. Gondar was also the home of the Falasha, the "black Jews" of Ethiopia, most of whom left for Israel in 1991. Overnight at a basic hotel in Gondar...BLD

## DAY 11

### AXUM

We fly to Axum this morning. The great mystery of Axum is its claim to be the resting place of the Ark of the Covenant. This claim is connected to the legend of King Solomon, whose son Menelik is said to have brought the Ark here some 3,000 years ago (Menelik founded the Solomonic dynasty, of which Haile Selassie was the last emperor).

After lunch, our explorations include the Church of St. Mary of Zion, where the Ark of the Covenant resides within a special chapel. There are actually two churches, the older constructed in the early 17th century and containing the crowns of many former Ethiopian rulers. The newer church was constructed by Emperor Haile Selassie, who opened it at a ceremony with Queen Elizabeth in 1965. The ruins of the original church, probably erected in the 4th century, still stand. Axum has a fascinating history. Archaeologists believe that the Queen of Sheba (1000 BC) visited Axum. Ruins thought to be the Palace of Sheba have been located a few miles outside of town. The first recorded kingdom in Ethiopia grew around Axum during the 3rd century BC, and it was in Axum in the 4th century that Christianity became the state religion, under orders of King Ezna. Axum became a vital trading crossroads between Asia and Africa, falling into decline only after the rise of Islam in the 7th century. Despite its decline, it remained Ethiopia's religious capital and the place where Ethiopian emperors came for their elaborate coronations. North of the town square are Axum's impressive monolithic stelae, or obelisks, the largest of which once weighed 500 tons. The largest still-standing stela is 75 feet tall. All were carved from single pieces of granite and are decorated with carved doors and windows and metal ornaments with pagan symbols. At the base of each of the stelae is a stone altar with bowl-shaped depressions thought to be used for sacrifices. Overnight at a basic hotel...BLD

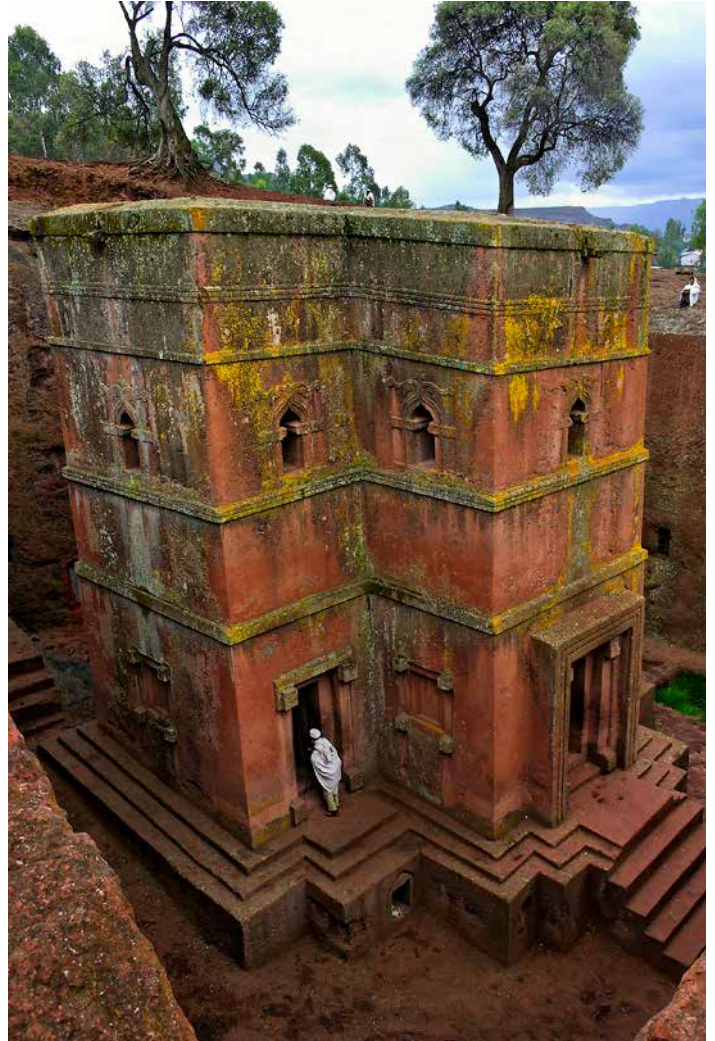

## DAYS 12-13

### LALIBELA

A morning flight takes us to Lalibela, where we spend a memorable day exploring some of Ethiopia's famous rock-hewn churches. This ancient town is known for its concentration of 12th century churches carved out of solid rock. There are no less than 1,000 such churches in the Lasta region of Lalibela, some hidden in enormous caves. Some of the churches are cut into volcanic rock, some are quarried enlargements of natural caves, and others are connected by a maze of underground tunnels. The architectural styles vary widely, from Grecian pillars and Arabesque windows to Egyptian-style motifs. With their unique architecture and artistry, Lalibela's remarkable churches truly must be seen to be believed. In his youth, King Lalibela was attracted to the monastic life and later made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. After he came to power, he ordered these amazing churches created, and they were built without using mortar or wood and completed in the 12th century. The largest, Bete Medani Alem, is 100 feet long, 70 feet wide, 35 feet high, and has rock walls that are up to six feet thick. Its basilica has five naves. This particular church is thought to be a copy of the great cathedral of Saint Mary of Zion, built in the Ethiopian city of Axum in the 4th century. Today is the main Timkat Day, and we watch the morning processions and celebrations around town, with day rooms at the Sheraton. Transfer in the evening to the airport to depart on homeward-bound flights...BLD

## MESKEL FESTIVAL DEPARTURE (SEPTEMBER)

Meskel, held each September, celebrates The Finding of the True Cross. The largest and most colorful Meskel celebrations are held in Addis, and our September departures are in Addis for the Meskel Eve ceremony. Meskel has been celebrated in Ethiopia for more than 1,600 years and commemorates the discovery of Jesus' cross by the Empress Helena, mother of Constantine the Great. The original discovery is said to have taken place on March 19, 326 AD, but the feast is celebrated in September, with the lighting of a bonfire on Meskel Eve. On Meskel Eve, branches are gathered and topped with yellow daisies then ignited. The branches symbolize the actions of Empress Helena, who when no one would show her the Holy Sepulchre, lit incense and prayed for help. Where the smoke drifted, she dug and found three crosses. Meskel coincides with the mass blooming in September of carpets of golden yellow "meskel daisies" (adey abeba in Amharic) in the highlands. The festival starts with the planting of a large tree in the main square on Meskel Eve. People bring poles topped with meskel daisies and place them around the tree to form the towering pyramid that will become the bonfire. In Addis, the celebration starts early in the afternoon, when a huge procession of flaming torches approaches the main square. The marchers include priests, students, brass bands, and people pulling floats bedecked with huge crosses. Thousands gather at the square to join in, and as evening darkens, the flames grow brighter. Dancing, feasting, and even gun salutes mark the occasion, and not until dawn does the burning pyramid finally consume itself. Any national holiday such as Meskel is an occasion for wearing traditional Ethiopian dress, and we enjoy mingling with the throngs of worshippers in Addis on Meskel Eve. Traditional instruments are usually played during important church occasions, and we may also see costumed horsemen, with their horses gaily caparisoned for the occasion.

We'll visit Konso Village in the afternoon and enjoy our overnight at a basic hotel...BLD

Photography is allowed during the dance performance. We may also have the chance to see the Karo's famous body-painting done. On one day, we head from our lodge to Kangatan and cross the Omo by boat to visit the Bume people, perhaps enjoying an optional hike beyond the main Bume village. On another day, we visit the main village of the Karo people, where we may have an opportunity to bargain for Karo handicrafts. Overnights at a basic lodge in the Omo Valley...BLD each day

Driving Details: Jinka to Mursi round trip on a dusty bush road, approximately 6 hours; Jinka to Turmi round trip on a gravel road, approximately 5 hours; Turmi to Omorate, approximately 1.5 hours on a gravel road.

## DAY 15

### ADDIS (MESKEL)

Private charter flight from Omo to Addis (avoiding a two-day drive!), where we watch the processions of Meskel Eve. Overnight at Sheraton Hotel...BLD  
Travel Details: Approximately 2.5-hour flight

## DAY 16

### ADDIS (MESKEL) / DEPART

We'll attend the Meskel day ceremonies this morning and have the rest of the afternoon at your leisure. The celebrations last until evening, and we'll cap off the day with a festive Farewell Dinner before transferring to the airport for departure on homeward-bound flights. To offer the lowest possible cost, our trips are priced according to the number of participants on the trip. All costs are per person, based on double occupancy. If you wish to have a single room, you must pay the single supplement fee. Please note that Wilderness Travel staff, or guests of Wilderness Travel such as travel writers, photographers, or leaders-in-training, are not included in the tier pricing count.

## CURRENCY EXCHANGE RATE

Because the prices published for our program are set so far in advance of the trip dates, we are occasionally faced with exceptional cost increases and/or currency fluctuations that affect the actual cost of running the trip. In most years, no price changes are necessary. However, we do reserve the right to raise or lower the trip price if there is a significant change in costs or exchange rates. If this is the case, your final invoice will reflect the difference in trip cost.

# Trip Details

## WHAT THE TRIP IS LIKE

The trip is Level 2+, moderate, according to our trip grading system. This is a rugged trip in a very remote region. Participants should be fit, healthy, and have no mobility restrictions. Medical facilities on the trip will be far away and often non-existent. Some mornings, we have departures as early as 5:30 am! Trip members must be prepared for some walking and some long days of rugged vehicle travel.

Accommodations at the Sheraton in Addis are excellent, as is the food at that international-standard hotel. Outside of Addis, we stay in “best available” hotels. Although there are private bathrooms in the rooms, you must expect only cold-water showers! Outside of Addis, our meals will be simple and lack variety because there are limited resources in the countryside. Ethiopia has some good beers, but the local wines are not distinguished. You may want to bring your favorite alcoholic beverage from a duty-free shop. Electricity in hotels in rural areas can be intermittent and sometimes generators are operated only during certain hours of the day.

Road travel in rural Ethiopia is very challenging. Our vehicles may break down or get flat tires on occasion, and that can delay the trip. We use vans for the trip, but they may not compare favorably with the vehicles you may be familiar with from safari countries such as Botswana and Kenya. While we are on our rural road journeys, there are no organized toilet facilities available. We will make “pit stops” from time to time so trip members can get out of the vehicle and find a private spot behind a bush.

In Ethiopia, air schedules can often be altered and new government regulations are implemented suddenly. We ask that you bring flexibility and a spirit of adventure to this unique journey, and take pleasure in the knowledge that you will be visiting a fascinating country.

Our trip is designed so that anyone in good physical condition can participate. We encourage you to make an effort to get in good physical condition with exercise beyond your normal routine.

## WEATHER

The highlands have a temperate climate and an elevation ranging from 5,000 to 7,000 feet. It can be cool at night. The southern part of Ethiopia is dry and hot. Ethiopia’s rainy season is March through September, with drier weather in January. However, rain can occur at any time of the year, making the roads muddy and sometimes impassable.
