We've designed an adventure that unlocks the country's secrets as we roam the mesmerizing bazaars of Fes—the 9th century walled city suspended in time like a medieval dream—cross the High Atlas to hike the craggy, red-rocked Todra and Dades canyons, meet Berbers in their mountain villages, and visit seaside Essaouira, an artists' haven. As a special treat, we'll enjoy our own private tented camp cradled in the sun-splashed dunes of the Moroccan Sahara. Along the way, our expert Trip Leaders bring the country's history and traditions to life as they introduce you to Morocco's welcoming people, sumptuous flavors, and often-astonishing natural beauty.

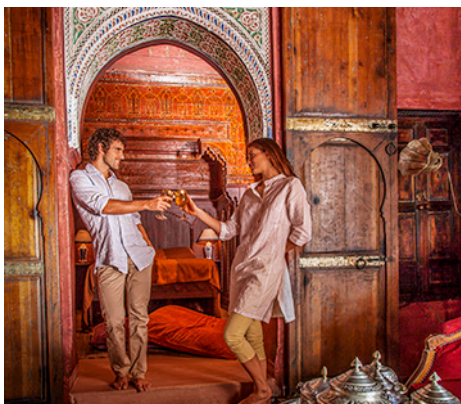

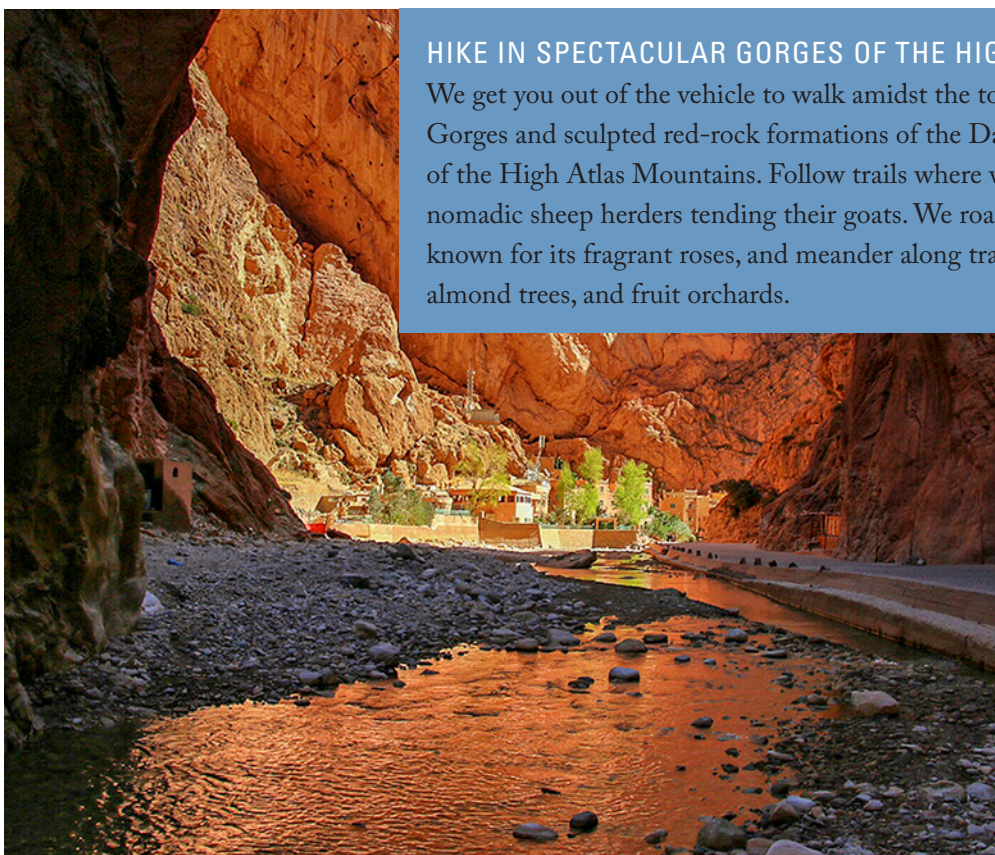


## EXPLORE ESSAOUIRA—AN ARTISTS' RETREAT

Ancient ramparts studded with old brass cannons give this 18th century walled town a decidedly medieval atmosphere, but these days Essaouira is known as a laid-back artists' haven of whitewashed houses with blue shutters. We take you to the bustling fish market and the harbor, as well as the port, where bright blue fishing boats lie at anchor. Our welcoming riad offers dramatic views of the Atlantic Ocean.

## EXPERIENCE A 5-STAR RIAD IN THE HEART OF AN ANCIENT SOUK

Staying in a riad—a restored traditional estate with many rooms centered around a courtyard—is one of the iconic experiences of a visit to Morocco. We've chosen some of the very best to immerse you in the country's history and heritage. At your relaxing retreat—just steps away from the excitement of the souks—you can pamper yourself at the riad's spa or wander up to the rooftop terrace with its spectacular views of the medina.



## HIKE IN SPECTACULAR GORGES OF THE HIGH ATLAS MOUNTAINS

We get you out of the vehicle to walk amidst the towering canyon walls of the Todra Gorges and sculpted red-rock formations of the Dades Gorges in the eastern reaches of the High Atlas Mountains. Follow trails where we may encounter farmers or semi-nomadic sheep herders tending their goats. We roam through a magnificent valley known for its fragrant roses, and meander along trails flanked by oleander hedges, almond trees, and fruit orchards.

## DAY 1 CASABLANCA

We begin in Casablanca, which is the the best gateway for Morocco, with many direct, inexpensive flights from the US. You'll be met at the Casablanca Airport for a transfer to our hotel. For those arriving from our Chefchaouen extension pre-trip, your driver will bring you to the hotel in the late afternoon. The name "Casablanca" evokes timeless romance, but unfortunately the the city is rather industrial; Hollywood's Casablanca lives only in the imagination, although the city did play a crucial part in the transit of European refugees during WWII. Meals today are on your own. Overnight at the Sofitel Casablanca Tour Blanche Hotel.

## DAY 2 HASSAN II MOSQUE / ROMAN RUINS OF SALA COLONIA

This morning we explore a most remarkable site, the Hassan II Mosque, dramatically set along the waterfront. A blend of ancient craftsmanship and modern technology, every inch of the mosque is exquisitely detailed—the tiles, marble, metal, and woodworking were all handcrafted by traditional Moroccan artisans. Boasting the world's tallest minaret, the mosque is unique in Morocco because it allows visitors of all faiths to come in and appreciate its wonders. Heading north along the coast we reach Rabat—in contrast, a delightfully low-key, walkable city that is the country's capital. After lunch on the waterfront, we visit the intriguing Chellah, a walled and towered necropolis built atop the ancient Roman town of Sala Colonia. Its elaborate brickwork and royal tombs make this one of the most beautiful ruins in all of Morocco. Our Welcome Dinner and overnight are at Villa Mandarine, an enchanting oasis set in an orange grove and run by a French family who have lived here for generations...BLD

Driving Details: Approximately 1.5 hours (Casablanca to Rabat)





## THE BERBERS / IMAZIGHEN / AMAZIGH

Two-thirds of Moroccans are Imazighen (the singular is Amazigh), a word that translates roughly to “free people.” Often referred to by outsiders as Berbers, the Imazighen have a mixed origin that includes European and Saharan peoples. Today they retain a distinctive tribal culture consisting of three major groups: the Sanhaja, the Masmouda, and the Zenets. The blue-robed Tuaregs of the Sahara are also a branch of the Imazighen family.



## DAY 3 A PILGRIMAGE SITE / ROMAN RUINS AND MOSAICS / FES

Our morning in Rabat includes a stroll through the picturesque Oudaya Kasbah, a 12th century fortress partly enclosed in ramparts, and a visit at the Mausoleum of Mohammed V, with its brilliant white marble surface and red-costumed royal guards. Departing the coast, we travel to Morocco’s inland valleys of gently rolling terrain dotted with wheat fields, vineyards, and olive groves. Our first stop is the hill town of Moulay Idriss, named for Morocco’s most famous saint, a direct descendant of the Prophet Mohammed. Until 2005, non-Muslims were not allowed to stay in the city, and even today it is largely untouched by Western influence. After exploring on foot, we head to Volubilis, a massive and magnificent Roman ruin surrounded by farmlands, olive groves, and cacti. A walking tour of this World Heritage Site, which was Rome’s largest city in North Africa and its provincial capital in Morocco, takes us by structures dating to the 2nd and 3rd centuries, as well as an impressive array of stunning, well preserved mosaics.

We stroll among the towering Corinthian columns and 30-foot porticoes, with views back to the whitewashed buildings of Moulay Idriss as they glow in the late afternoon sun. We continue to Fes and check in at the hotel. This evening we

savor a dinner of traditional Moroccan cuisine...BLD

## DAY 4 EXPLORING FES, AN ANCIENT IMPERIAL CAPITAL

The most evocative of Morocco’s imperial capitals, Fes is nestled in a high valley and resplendent with soaring minarets and dazzling domes. We’ll enjoy a full day tour, beginning at the seven stunning brass gates of the royal palace, Dar al-Makhzen. We visit the mellah—the old Jewish Quarter—and continue to the South Borj Overlook for a lovely panoramic view of the city.

We also visit a pottery workshop before entering Fes’ 12th century medina—one of the most perfectly preserved medieval cities in the world—with its mile-long network of souks, open-air cafes, courtyards, hammams, and



gardens. After lunch our guide takes us through a honeycomb of twisting alleys of Arabic-Moorish architecture with blue-tiled facades. We savor the scent of spices, orange blossoms, sizzling lamb kabobs, and sweet honey cakes, and see scenes unchanged for centuries, from donkeys laden with leathers to children carrying boards of bread dough to communal ovens. Some of the finest Berber carpets in Morocco are found in these lively souks. We visit Fes' famous tannery, where men process leather in an open-air courtyard lined with knee-deep vats of dye in every shade of red, blue, and gold; a madrasa

(Koranic school); and the Qaraouiyine Mosque, formerly home to one of the first universities in the world, predating both Oxford and Cambridge. Walking along the narrow lanes, we peer into the medieval foundouks—roadside inns built around open courtyards. Most are worn with age, but one 18th century foundouk has been beautifully restored and is now the Nejjarine Museum of

Wood and Carpentry, with displays of everything from tools and musical instruments to decorative woodworking. Dinner is at our hotel; this evening we're offered international cuisine as a change of pace from Moroccan dishes. Overnight at hotel... BLD

## DAY 5 THE ATLAS MOUNTAINS / A DESERT FRONTIER TOWN

This morning we drive through the cedar forests and deep valleys of the Middle Atlas Mountains, stopping to visit the old hill station of Ifrane, built as Morocco's "Little Switzerland" and now a university town. Along the way, we may see some of the rare "Barbary apes"—actually endangered macaque monkeys—that inhabit the area. (Legend has it that the macaques are descended from a disrespectful family who threw couscous at each other during a meal,

and, as punishment, were turned into monkeys and forced to live forever as wild animals.) Our lunch stop is in the remote town of Midelt, with its wonderful views of the High Atlas. Crossing the mountains, we descend a winding road through the stunning canyon of the Ziz Gorge, passing by dramatic stratified cliffs curving and pushing into the river's ancient channel.

We follow the gorge through an oasis of date palms to the desert frontier town of Erfoud, whose dates are renowned as the sweetest in all of Morocco. Dinner and overnight are at the stylish Kasbah Xaluca hotel...BLD

### RIADS AND HAMMAMS

No visit to Morocco is complete without a stay at one of its riads—traditionally the estates of the country's wealthiest citizens, merchants, and courtiers. Centered around an open-air courtyard, they contained numerous rooms and showcased exquisite Moorish tiles, architecture, and woodwork. These days, many have been converted to boutique hotels where visitors are warmly welcomed as family guests; we've chosen some of the finest in Morocco.

Hammams are traditional baths that originated in the Roman Empire. They've been enjoyed here ever since by people from all social classes, who go for a body scrub and massage—or just to relax in the steam.





## DAY 6 CAMEL TREK IN THE SAHARA

Switching to 4WD Land Cruisers, we head off road into the Sahara for a rendezvous with our Berber crew—a picturesque caravan of blue-robed Tuareg men and their herd of camels in the golden desert. Continuing by camel, on foot, or by 4WD (the choice is yours), we take in the Moroccan desert in its varied forms, from immense dunes and high mesas to dry washes fringed by tamarisk. We avoid the Erg Chebbi desert camp area, which has become crowded and noisy, and head to a more secluded region where our private Sahara camp features spacious, walk-in canvas tents with comfortable beds covered by cozy duvets. The tent floors are layered with a mosaic of colorful Berber carpets, and meals are served in a large, airy dining tent. This comfortable Sahara desert camp is exclusive to just our group, and tonight we'll feel as if we have the whole desert to ourselves as we savor the silence, watch the sunset, and gaze at stars blazing in the night sky. Overnight in camp...BLD

Driving Details: Approximately 2.5 hours 4WD (Erfoud to Sahara desert camp crew)

Camel Trekking Details: Approximately 1.5 hours to our

Sahara desert campsite in the morning and approximately 1.5 hours exploring the dunes in the afternoon.

## DAY 7 LUXURY SAHARA CAMP / EXPLORE THE DESERT / GNAOUA MUSICIANS

From our camp, we head out to experience the breathtaking beauty of the Moroccan Sahara, with its ochre dunes, cobalt sky, and jagged volcanic peaks. We'll appreciate why the Arabs called the Sahara "bahr bila maa," an "ocean without water." In the morning, we explore our surroundings by camel, with options to walk or ride by 4WD. On our return to camp in the afternoon we can learn to play ronda, Morocco's most popular card game; have a cooking demonstration of traditional Moroccan fare; or relax with a refreshing beverage and enjoy the vast desert expanses. Evening brings a glowing sunset and festive dinner, with Gnaoua musicians performing for us. It's incredible music, and we're more than welcome to join in, dancing and drumming along with the musicians! Overnight in camp...BLD

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## MEDINAS, SOUKS, CASBAHS, AND KSOUR:

A medina (the word means “town” in Arabic) was a pre-20th century city—often enclosed within defensive walls—with a mosque at its heart. Craftsmen work in the areas of the medina known as souks, which were laid out according to the commodities being made and sold, with the most valuable products (such as gold and manuscripts) in the center and lesser goods radiating outwards. Today, little has changed, with each souk still named after its products.

A casbah is a fortress-style building with crenellated defensive towers. In rural Morocco, representatives of the ruler lived in and governed from casbahs; a casbah can be inside a ksar (the plural is “ksour”), which is a fortified rural village surrounded by walls. Ait Ben Haddou, which we explore on Day 10, is a spectacular example of a ksar.



## DAY 8 DESERT SUNRISE / WALK IN TODRA GORGE OASIS

After enjoying a desert sunrise across the dunes of the Sahara and another chance to walk on this “sea of sand,” we bid farewell to our Tuareg cameleers. Meeting up with our 4WD vehicles, we set out for Tinghir, a palm-fringed oasis at the entrance to the Todra Gorge. Time permitting, we’ll stop along the way at the desert town of Erfoud to visit a local workshop where marble and limestone with trilobites, ammonites, and other fossil inclusions are made into plates and decorative objects. Todra Gorge is one of the most impressive canyons in the world; in some places its steep walls are more than 1,300 feet high. In a palmeraie, or palm grove oasis, we hike along serene trails that wind through fields, learning about water-distribution techniques that have been utilized for centuries. We arrive at our hotel in the late afternoon for our dinner and overnight at Hotel Xaluca Dades, with its expansive panoramas of the majestic Atlas Mountains...BLD

## DAY 9 DADES GORGE HIKE / GARDENS OF THE ATLAS / TEA WITH LOCALS

Departing in the early morning we enter the Dades Gorge, a magnificent landscape of limestone cliffs, lush citrus orchards, and sculpted red-rock formations, with mud-built casbahs sitting high above on both sides of the valley. Our walk in a traditional village takes us past fig trees, almond trees, and

the shining poplars that grow along streams of snow melt from the High Atlas Mountains. We may have the chance to visit with nomadic families. After lunch, we enjoy a scenic drive to the Gardens of the Atlas, where we walk in a magnificent valley known for its bright pink, honey-scented roses. We’ll meander along trails flanked by oleander hedges, almond trees, and fruit orchards, then stop for mint tea with a local family and learn about their lives

and local agricultural practices. We continue to our hotel, the Ksar Ighnda, for dinner and our overnight. Set in a serene, lushly landscaped oasis, it’s a perfect place for a dip in the pool or relaxing with a drink in the lounge as the sun slips behind the mountains...BLD

Driving Details: 3-4 hours

Hiking Details: 1-2 hours in the morning; 1.5 hours in the Gardens of the Atlas





## DAY 10 THE RED CITADEL OF AIT BEN HADDOU / SOUKS OF MARRAKESH

This morning we walk through the clay-brick hillside citadel of Ait Ben Haddou, the famously picturesque UNESCO World Heritage Site that's been used as a setting for "Lawrence of Arabia," "Gladiator," and many other films. Then we cross the High Atlas Mountains and head for legendary Marrakesh, founded in 1070 and once known as the "red city" for its rose-tinted buildings. With Berber rather than Arab origins, it has been the central marketplace for Berber tribes for centuries. After lunch in the city's 11th century medina we wander its fascinating souks, taking in the scents of lemon and mint, brightly colored cones of spices, and the sounds of donkeys and merchants calling out their offers. We end the day at the heart of Marrakesh in the Djemaa el Fna, the legendary central square, replete with musicians, snake charmers, fire-eaters, and fortune-tellers. Our dinner and overnight are at the Hotel Es Saadi, with its excellent location just a short walk from the bustling medina... BLD Driving Details: Approximately 3 hours (Ait Ben Haddou to Marrakesh)



## DAY 11 MARRAKESH: SECRET TOMBS / A PALACE

We discover more of the secrets of Marrakesh this morning. Our urban hike takes us to the Saadian Tombs, a hauntingly beautiful royal necropolis dating from the 16th to 18th

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century that was purposely sealed off and hidden for over two hundred years, and only rediscovered in 1917. We visit the Bahia Palace, a masterpiece of Moroccan architecture built in the late 19th century and intended to be the largest and most luxurious palace ever built. After lunch in the medina, we have several options: choose a Moroccan cooking class or go shopping in the medina with a local guide, who can help you find brass, leather goods, textiles, and other crafts. Or take a guided walk through Jewish history, with visits to a cemetery, a 15th century synagogue and

its small museum, and an opportunity to meet people who live and work in the Jewish Quarter. Dinner is on your own this evening. There is a wonderful variety of options—from Moroccan to international cuisine—close to our hotel, and your Trip Leader is happy to make recommendations to suit your interest. Overnight at the Hotel Es Saadi...BL



## DAY 12 MAGICAL ESSAOUIRA, AN ARTISTS' RETREAT

A scenic drive through farmland brings us to Essaouira (pronounced essa-weera), a charming city on the Atlantic Coast that's been occupied since prehistoric times. The Portuguese built a fort here in the 16th century, and much of the city we see today was laid out by a French architect in the mid-1700s, at the request of Sultan Sidi Mohammed ben Abdallah. Essaouira's whitewashed houses, with their blue shutters and ornate doors, give it an enchanting Mediterranean atmosphere. After a seafood lunch we head out on foot to explore the bustling fish market and the port, where bright blue boats bob in the harbor. We walk up to the old fort—with its ancient ramparts, cannons, and battlements—and discover quirky little artisan shops lining narrow lanes. Now known as an artist's colony, the city has cast its spell on many creative souls over the years; Orson Welles filmed scenes for "Othello" here, and musicians from Eric Clapton to Jimi Hendrix were inspired by their stays in the 1960s and 1970s. Dinner tonight is on your own. Overnight at the Riad Mimouna, an intimate, atmospheric, and well located riad overlooking the Atlantic Ocean...BL

## DAY 13 MARRAKESH / MAJORELLE GARDEN

After breakfast at the hotel we return to Marrakesh, with time for lunch on your own before we head out to visit the enchanting Majorelle Garden—a diverse botanical landscape punctuated by wildly vibrant architecture and ceramics, with pools, fountains, and burbling waters that welcome songbirds. Designed by a French painter in 1923 and built over a period of nearly 40 years, the garden was later restored by Yves Saint

Laurent, who added a fascinating museum dedicated to the rich culture of the indigenous Berber people. We enjoy a festive Farewell Dinner in the medina this evening. Overnight at the Hotel Es Saadi...BD

Driving details: 3 hours (Essaouira to Marrakesh)

## DAY 14 DEPART

Transfer to the Marrakesh airport for homeward flights, or continue to Casablanca to join our Chefchaouen extension...B

Due to the volatility of currency markets, we can only offer the most competitive pricing on our trips in Morocco by partially tying the trip cost directly to the value of the Moroccan Dirham. In the late spring of 2023, when we set the rates for our 2024 program, the US Dollar equaled 10.4 Moroccan Dirham. While in most years, no price changes are ever necessary, if there were to be a significant change in exchange rates, we may be forced to raise or able to lower our trip cost; if so, your final invoice, sent two weeks before your final payment is due, will reflect the difference. Please note that the calculation will not be a straight proration. While most of the trip cost is paid in Moroccan Dirham, the remainder of our expenses are paid in US Dollars. The overall effect is to moderate any change; thus, if the Moroccan Dirham were to rise in value, the trip cost would rise less than might be expected, and if the Moroccan Dirham were to fall, the drop in land price would also be less than might be expected.

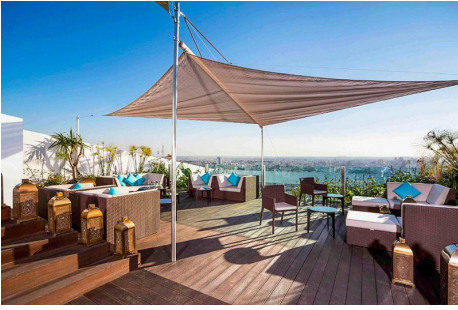

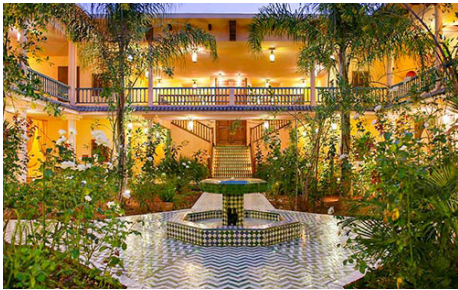


## SOFITEL CASABLANCA TOUR BLANCHE

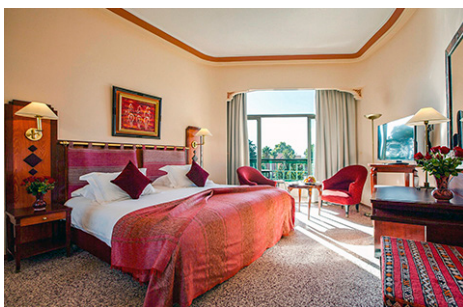


## KSAR IGHNDA

# Chefchaouen Extension

Inside the ancient gated medina of this dramatic “blue city,” nearly every building is whitewashed or painted some shade of azure, contrasting with the terracotta rooftops and red-walled casbah. Leather and textile workshops line the city’s twisting cobblestone streets, and the souks are filled with colorful wares. The Berbers who live in the surrounding villages are also known for their ironwork and textiles. This Chefchaouen extension can be added either before or after the main trip. Below is a description of this extension when done pre-trip. If you would like to do it post-trip, please contact us for details.

## DAY 1 CASABLANCA

Meet your private guide and driver this morning, either at the hotel or at the Casablanca Airport. A scenic five-hour drive brings you to the dramatic “blue” village of Chefchaouen (pronounced shef-SHA-wen). Arrive in the late afternoon and check into the Lina Ryad or Riad Cherifa. The city is filled with atmospheric restaurants offering both international cuisine and delicious Moroccan dishes. Many offer al fresco seating with views of the grand mosque, the medina, and the majestic Atlas Mountains. Dinner is on your own this evening...L

## DAY 2 CHEFCHAOUEN

After breakfast, enjoy a walk up to the Spanish mosque by way of the Ras el-Maa springs for a panoramic view across the mountains. Your guided tour of the medina includes the casbah, Outa el Hammam square, and several souks, with an optional visit at a local weaving workshop. Enjoy lunch with a local family, with the rest of the day at leisure so you can absorb the sights and sounds of Morocco’s “Blue Pearl” city. Overnight at Lina Ryad or Riad Cherifa...BLD

## DAY 3 CHEFCHAOUEN

This morning we take a side trip to the natural wonder of Akchour Falls in the wild, rugged Rif Mountains, with an optional challenging hike to God’s Bridge—a natural red rock formation high above a series of sapphire pools and sparkling waterfalls. We may return to Chefchaouen in early to mid-afternoon, giving you another opportunity to soak up the atmosphere of this artistic, laid-back retreat. Overnight at Lina Ryad or Riad Cherifa. Dinner is on your own...BL

## DAY 4 CASABLANCA

After breakfast, drive back to Casablanca through the Rif Mountains and the Berber town of Ouezzane (a spiritual

capital for Sufis and Moroccan Jews), then cross the fertile plains of the Loukkos valley to arrive back in Casablanca. Your guide is happy to share his knowledge and insights as you chat with him on the return drive of approximately five hours. You’ll join your group trip in the late afternoon...BL

# What the Trip is Like

## TRIP LEVEL

This trip is rated Level 2+, Moderate. It combines overland travel and cultural exploration with a two-day camel trek. Each participant should be in good physical condition, since most days include light/leisurely walking, especially when we're exploring the souks. In addition to "urban hiking" in the cities there is also light hiking, mostly on small paths that are a mix of dirt and rocky terrain; the trails are not steep or exposed. On Day 9 we hike for a total of about 3 hours.

## Camel Trek

On the camel trek, we enjoy two days of exploring the desert landscape around us. On the first day, we drive into the desert to meet our camels and Tuareg cameleers, then begin the walk, with a picnic lunch en route. You can walk or ride camels, or you can opt to ride to camp by 4WD vehicle. The next day, several options are available, with lunch at camp. You can explore a small mountain called M'ifis and the dunes of Erg Znagui by camel, enjoy a walk and visit a nomad family, or simply stay in camp and enjoy the surroundings. At camp, meals are served to us around a table in our dinner tent, and breakfast is often served out on the dunes. The desert walking is not difficult but covers a variety of terrain with no trails, from hard-packed desert to vast sand dunes. Our camels are roped together in groups of three or four and led by a cameleer. Most people alternately ride and walk, as camel riding for long periods can be uncomfortable. You can walk if you don't want to ride a camel at all, or relax in the camp instead. Please note: Camels can be unpredictable animals. It is possible for the camel to stumble on rough terrain or make a sudden erratic movement. Since camels cannot be saddled as securely as horses, the possibility of a fall is increased. It's important to follow the instruction and guidance of your Trip Leader, and to stay alert while riding. Anyone participating in this optional activity must acknowledge the inherent risks in

riding and perhaps falling from the saddle, and agree to accept responsibility.

## Accommodations

For lodging, we enjoy first-class hotels in the cities, a luxury desert camp on the camel trek, and mountain lodges in the mountains. Transportation is by minibus and 4WD Land Cruiser. Bottled water is carried on board our vehicles at all times for your use.

## GETTING IN SHAPE

Each participant should be in good health, since most days include light/leisurely walking on mostly flat paths that are a mix of dirt and rocky terrain; the trails are not steep or exposed.

Being in good physical condition is important for your enjoyment of the trip. The best way to get accustomed to walking and being on your feet throughout the day is by incorporating exercise into your schedule leading up to your departure. We recommend walking, hiking, and engaging in physical activities; stair-climbing machines are excellent preparation for walking uphill.

## WEATHER

Morocco has climatic variations but the weather is largely moderate, with a cooling influence from the Mediterranean and Atlantic.. In the summer months, daytime temperatures are in the 90s in the valleys, but cool down to the 70s as we gain elevation. Highs in the coastal cities are in the high 70s and low 80s. In the spring, average daytime temperatures in coastal cities range from the mid-60s to the low 80s. The Dades Valley is in vibrant bloom in early spring, from late February through March, and has cooler average highs in the 40s, dropping to lows in the 30s at night. In the north, light

rains may stretch to mid-March. During the fall months, Morocco's weather is mild and dry —highs range from the 60s to the high 80s. In the north, light rains begin in November.

## ACCOMMODATIONS

We enjoy first-class hotels and high-end riads in the cities and smaller, quainter lodges in the more remote areas. We spend two nights at a private Sahara desert camp while on the camel trek, where we provide all the comforts you would want in a luxury tented camp. Canvas interiors are hung with bright fabrics and carpeted with Moroccan rugs. Comfortable beds are covered by cozy duvets. You'll have a washstand, shower, and toilet within your tent, separated from the sleeping room by traditional white curtains. Meals are served in a large dining tent with a comfortable lounging area outside.

## CUISINE

Meals will be a mix of à la carte and family style at local restaurants, cafés and hotels. Tajine (a slow-cooked meat stew often made with chicken, seafood, vegetables, olives, prunes, or almonds) is an important staple of Moroccan cuisine, as is

couscous, kebab, and harira, a rich, spiced bean soup. We will also be eating dishes with a more French influence as well as seafood.

## TRANSPORTATION

The majority of your transportation is provided in a comfortable air-conditioned minibus. On some of the smaller, more remote roads where larger vehicles cannot easily access, we use Toyota 4WD Land Cruisers. Filtered water is carried on board our vehicles at all times for your use.
