We get you off the beaten track throughout our journey, with a diversity of activities that is unmatched, including climbing the epic dunes of Sossusvlei, flying over the legendary Skeleton Coast, and hiking the Tok Tokkie trail, where we'll sleep in "dune beds" beneath a blanket of stars in Africa's first Dark Sky Reserve. Join us to experience the absolute best of Namibia.



ACCOMMODATIONS AS ENCHANTING AS THE LANDSCAPE

Chosen to give you unrivaled comfort and access to Namibia's most remarkable locations, our accommodations are a highlight of the trip for many. We'll have exclusive use of //Huab Under Canvas, with fantastic access to Damaraland's black rhino population. (The two forwardslashes represent one of the four "click" sounds unique to Khoekhoe, the language spoken by Namibia's Damara people.) At Camp Kipwe, our gorgeous lodge is nestled right into the granite boulders of the Twyfelfontein Conservancy near an area where herds of desert-adapted elephants congregate. Our lodge in the Ongava Private Reserve offers incredible wildlife sightings from the lounge that is set near an active waterhole, and in Sossusvlei, we'll have you staying at a lodge right inside the park for early morning access to the dunes when the light is best.



CUSTOM-BUILT VEHICLES & GUARANTEED WINDOW SEATS

We travel in custom-designed Land Cruisers that are air-conditioned and guarantee that each passenger has their own window seat and ample room for camera gear. These are rugged extended-cab 4x4s with a roof hatch that allows for 360-degree views and great photos of your wildlife experience. We also include a private charter flight with dramatic views (weather cooperating!) along the dramatic Diamond Coast, where you also are guaranteed a window seat.

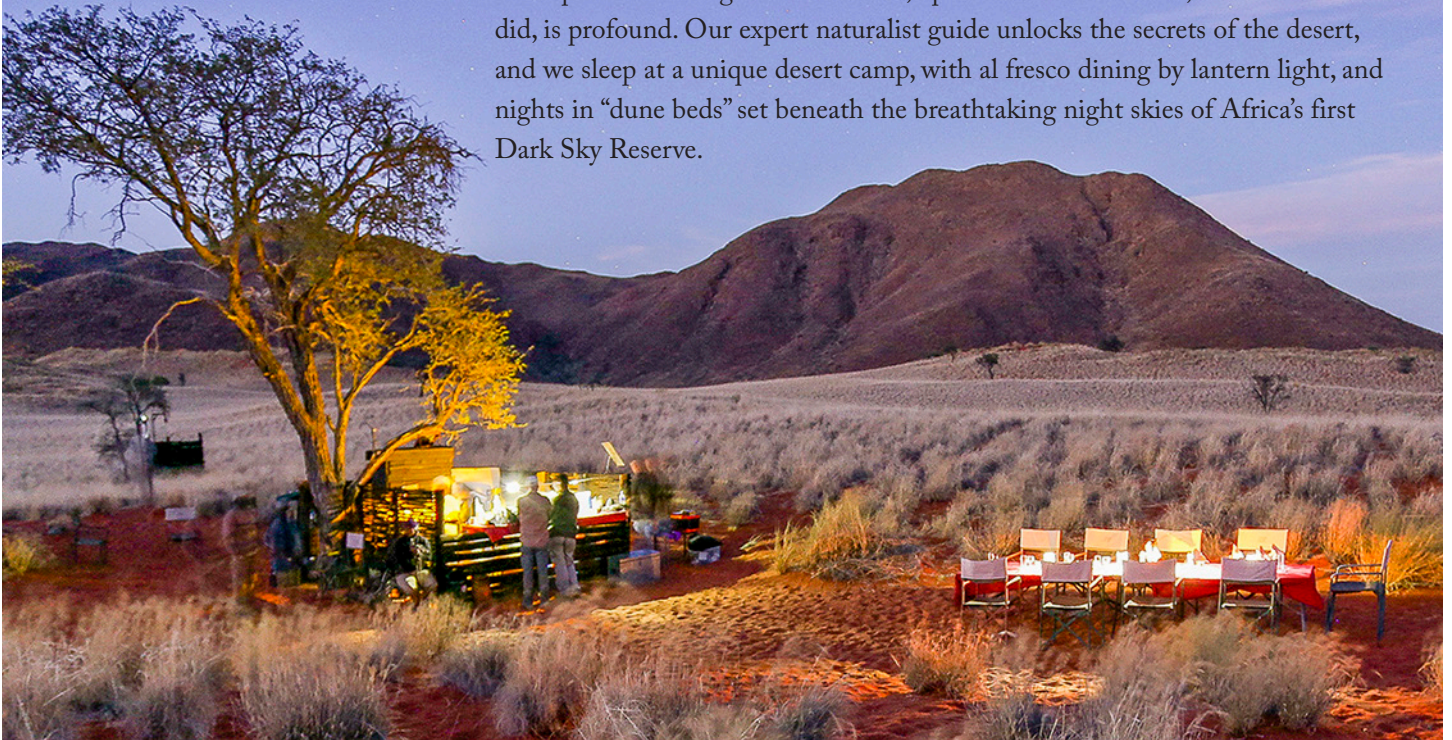
ACCESS AND EXCLUSIVITY: DAMARALAND AND AFRICAT

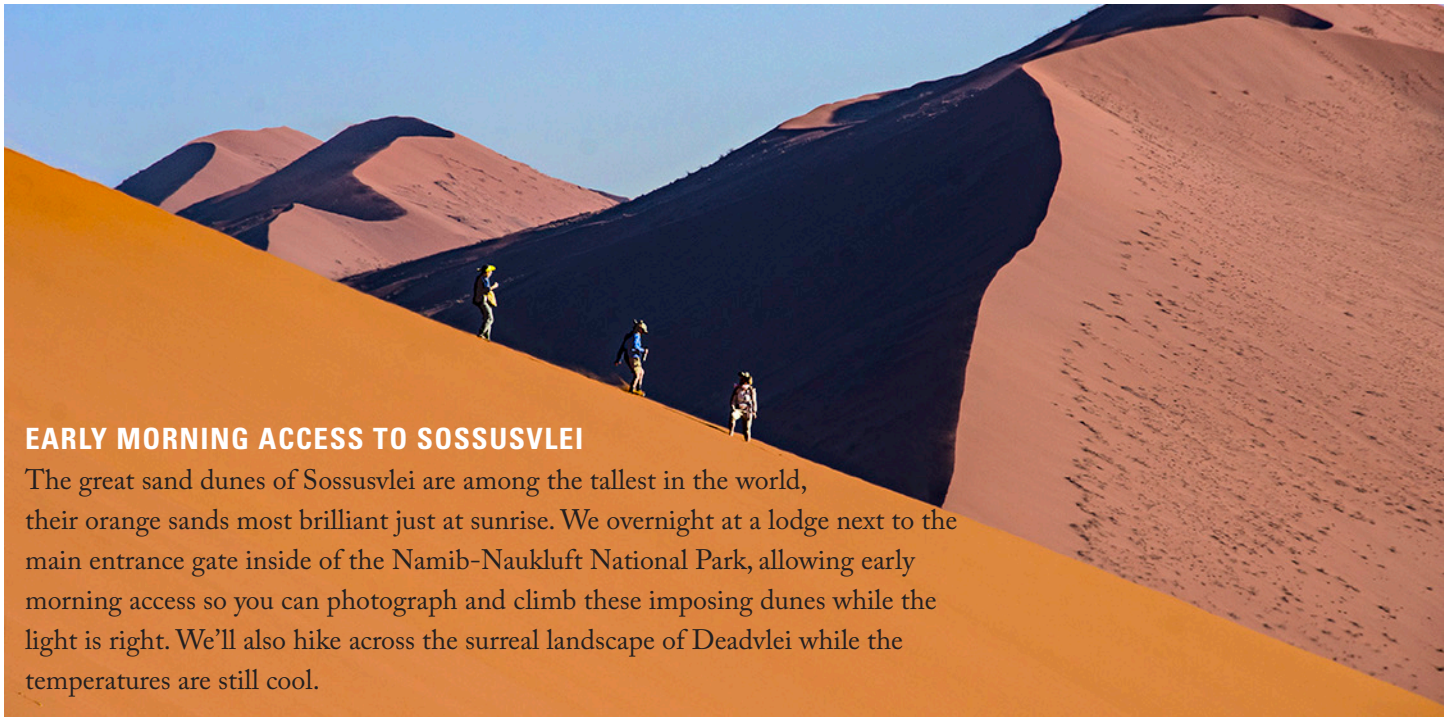
Damaraland is a realm of ephemeral rivers and ancient terraces formed by wind and water. From our exclusive camp, we'll have behind-the-scenes access with the trackers and rangers of Save the Rhino Trust, and have the thrill of tracking rhino on foot. At AfriCat Foundation, we'll have the opportunity to track leopard by vehicle and learn about the complexities of large carnivore conservation.



CAMP BELOW THE STARS IN NAMIBRAND NATURE RESERVE

Hiking the Tok Tokkie Trail in the exclusive NamibRand Nature Reserve is a WT special. Walking across this vast, open wilderness on foot, as our ancestors did, is profound. Our expert naturalist guide unlocks the secrets of the desert, and we sleep at a unique desert camp, with al fresco dining by lantern light, and nights in "dune beds" set beneath the breathtaking night skies of Africa's first Dark Sky Reserve.





EARLY MORNING ACCESS TO SOSSUSVLEI

The great sand dunes of Sossusvlei are among the tallest in the world, their orange sands most brilliant just at sunrise. We overnight at a lodge next to the main entrance gate inside of the Namib-Naukluft National Park, allowing early morning access so you can photograph and climb these imposing dunes while the light is right. We'll also hike across the surreal landscape of Deadvlei while the temperatures are still cool.

AFRICA'S GREATEST ANCIENT PETROGLYPHS

Hike below the extraordinary rock art in the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Twyfelfontein. Thousands of images have been carved into the massive rock outcropping here, recording ancient species and journeys, including images of shamanic experiences. We'll bring you right up into this extensive gallery, close to the mysteries of the past.



CHARTER FLIGHT OVER THE DIAMOND COAST

There is one place where we believe in taking to the skies. Our early afternoon charter flight (weather permitting) above the legendary "Skeleton Coast" is timed to give you the best conditions with an opportunity to see flocks of flamingos, huge colonies of fur seals, shipwrecked vessels, even the ghost camps of the diamond hunters of the early 20th century.

DON'T MISS OUT!

Other companies will try to convince you that a shorter flying safari is the way to go. It isn't! Flying safaris are expensive, and you miss out on so much. Our transfers, in specially designed vehicles, are also game drives, lessons in geology, and opportunities for spontaneous walks and wildlife sightings. All are illuminated by the insights and knowledge of our Trip Leader; an expert naturalist. This is a crucial part of giving you a full experience of this mystical land, its wildlife, and its inhabitants.

DAY 1 WINDHOEK, NAMIBIA

Arrive at the Windhoek International Airport, where you are met for the transfer to Galton House, a boutique hotel set in a quiet neighborhood. We gather for our trip orientation and Welcome Dinner this evening. Overnight at the hotel...D

DAY 2 TO THE BIG CATS: OKONJIMA BUSH CAMP / AFRICAT FOUNDATION

Journeying north from Windhoek, we arrive at lovely Okonjima Bush Camp in time for lunch. Okonjima is home to the renowned AfriCat Foundation, dedicated to the long-term conservation of Namibia's large carnivores through research, education, and community engagement. AfriCat researchers and veterinarians contribute greatly to our understanding of the ecology of large carnivores in enclosed and protected reserves. Since its founding in 1991, over a thousand injured or captured predators have been rescued at AfriCat. This afternoon we head out into the bush to track leopard, which we may find resting in the trees after a night of hunting. Overnight at Okonjima Bush Camp...BLD

DAYS 3-4 LEOPARD TRACKING AT AFRICAT / GREAT WILDLIFE ENCOUNTERS: ONGAVA PRIVATE RESERVE / ETOSHA NATIONAL PARK

Rhino are resident at Okonjima, and we'll rise early to see if we can find them (later we'll have the thrill of tracking them on foot in Damaraland!). After breakfast at the camp's open-air rondaval, we depart for Etosha National Park, game viewing along the way. Our lodge is set in Ongava Private Reserve, tucked in a hidden



valley within the 74,000-acre reserve, right on the southern boundary of renowned Etosha National Park. This gives us great access to the wildlife, yet is far from the crowded safari circuit. The lodge is built near an active waterhole so we should have great wildlife sightings right from our camp! This afternoon we head into Etosha, seeking out the salt pans and waterholes that attract an immense variety of wildlife, making for fantastic photos. Elephant, lion, giraffe, blue wildebeest, eland, kudu, oryx, zebra, rhino, cheetah, leopard, hyena, honey badger, and warthog, as well as the endemic black-faced impala all congregate by the water's edge. After exploring the game-filled pans of Etosha we'll head back to our camp, and since we are in a private reserve, a great range of activities are available to us, including guided walks (optional—at additional cost). On Day 4 we'll follow the call of the wildlife in Etosha, lunch at camp, then explore the reserve with the chance of seeing both black and white rhino—an extraordinary opportunity—since Ongava is one of the largest "custodianships" for rhino in all of Namibia, protecting the population for breeding and reintroduction throughout the country. Overnights at Ongava

DAY 5 SURREAL DAMARALAND

After an early breakfast, we head west into the stunning and diverse region of Damaraland, which provides some of the most dramatic scenery on our journey, with magnificent table-topped mountains, rock formations, and bizarre-looking vegetation. This is a long day of travel, but we'll game drive as we go, and we'll find scenic spots to pull over for cool drinks, coffee or tea, and snacks from the "magic box" en route to our camp, Camp Doros. This semi-permanent camp offers delightfully unexpected comfort in the absolute back of beyond, and is renowned for its cuisine. We arrive in time to wash

up and enjoy sundowners and dinner, then gather around a welcoming campfire, savoring the rare experience of being so completely immersed in the wild. Overnight at Camp Doros... BLD

Driving Details: Approximately 8 hours

DAY 6 TRACKING DESERT-ADAPTED RHINO ON FOOT / BEHIND THE SCENES WITH THE EXPERTS AT SAVE THE RHINO TRUST

Damaraland is a surprising refuge for species that have adapted to the harsh environment. Desert elephant, giraffe, oryx, springbok, and even lion have evolved with special adaptations to survive in this austere landscape of little water, and our camp is set in the heart of the habitat of the re-introduced desert rhino. The rhino cover great distances, walking and feeding in the cool of the night and resting during the day. Rhino populations throughout Africa were decimated in the 1980s and '90s, yet

Namibia's black rhino population has more than doubled since the formation of Save the Rhino Trust, an innovative NGO doing crucial work to protect the rare desert-adapted black rhino. Wilderness Travel is a proud supporter of SRT's work and the incredible dedication of the rhino guardians, who keep track of these solitary animals' movement and protect them from poachers. The guardians of a WT-funded mobile camp recently stopped a major international poaching ring.

We'll meet with rangers and trackers of Save the Rhino Trust to learn about their critical work, then head out to do our own rhino tracking. We hear about the fascinating adaptations of

these remarkable creatures as we search for them in the vast desert landscape. Sightings can be challenging—but we are in an exclusive area with the highest sighting success rate in northwestern Namibia. If we find them, tracking rhino alongside the rangers is absolutely thrilling. We head back to

our camp for lunch and an afternoon rest during the heat of the day, then enjoy a late afternoon nature drive or walk to explore this vast and astounding ecosystem before returning to our exclusive mobile camp. Overnight at Camp Doros..BLD

Walking Details: Approximately 2-4 hours, 1.5-3 miles.

DAY 7 DAMARALAND / TWYFELFONTEIN

A place of incomparable beauty, Damaraland is a photographer's nirvana—a dizzying array of geologic formations and magnificent palettes of color splashed over some of the earth's oldest landscapes. For eons, wind, water, and geological upheaval have conspired to create a masterwork of nature, a striking tableau of rolling hills, dunes, gravel plains, and ancient river terraces. Our destination is Twyfelfontein, which shelters one of the most remarkable galleries of rock art in all of Africa. Here, on the face of an immense outcropping of red sandstone, our ancestors carved thousands of images of wildlife, from elephant to ostriches, as well as shamanic



experiences. A spring at the base of the rock nourished both the human and animal populations over a period of 7,000 years. Our trail threads its way amid the 2,500 engravings, giving us an up-close experience of this UNESCO World Heritage Site. If our guides get word that elephants are in the area, we'll head out to see them (see Day 8), and explore Twyfelfontein on Day 8.

Our overnight is at an equally remarkable site. The lodge at Camp Kipwe was built into the surrounding boulders, overlooking the great expanse of desert. Each chalet seems to blend right into the rocks themselves, and we'll enjoy sundowners at one of the most spectacular locations imaginable, up on the broad back of a granite outcropping, with views out over the vast desert. Overnight at Camp Kipwe...BLD
Driving Details: 3-4 hours

DAY 8 DESERT-ADAPTED ELEPHANTS

A full morning of exploring by 4WD vehicle brings us into the dramatic landscape of the ephemeral Aba-Huab River valley as we search for game including, with luck, desert-adapted elephants, an amazing sight in this arid environment. Unique to Namibia, the desert elephant of Kunene Region

cover great distances to find the food and water they need to survive, traveling by night. Depending on their location, we'll either enjoy a picnic lunch out in the field or return to our lodge for lunch and a swim in the pool, set between massive boulders. In the afternoon we may visit Twyfelfontein if timing didn't allow it the previous day. Overnight at Camp Kipwe...BLD

DAY 9 FROM DAMARALAND TO SWAKOPMUND

Our route across the desert brings us past Namibia's highest mountain, the Brandberg. This imposing massif rises straight out of the surrounding desert plain, its sheer walls a challenge to rock climbers, especially Koningstein (8,442'), its precipitous peak. We'll see the endemic Brandberg acacia tree, and the surreal desert plant welwitschia, a favorite of rhinos. We arrive in historic Swakopmund in the late afternoon. This most unexpected gathering of colorful buildings is Namibia's "beach town," a wonderful place to relax after a long day of travel, savoring the unlikely setting. Beyond the last row of houses stretches the vast and uninhabited desert. We'll have dinner in a local restaurant renowned for its seafood. Overnight at a wonderfully quirky boutique hotel, The Delight Swakopmund...BLD





Driving Details: 5 hours

DAY 10 CHARTER FLIGHT ALONG THE DIAMOND COAST / SESRIEM CANYON

Weather permitting, a spectacular charter flight—at a great low altitude for photography—brings us along the "Diamond Coast," the southern end of the famed "Skeleton Coast," over shipwrecks marooned in the sand sea, huge colonies of seals, abandoned diamond camps, and finally to the massive dunes of Sossusvlei. In the event of coastal fog, we fly a spectacular inland route over desert and dunes, possibly spotting some desert-adapted wildlife along the way.

After arriving at our lodge, we head out to explore Sesriem Canyon, which has evolved through centuries of erosion by the Tsauchab River. A narrow gorge nearly a mile long and 100 feet deep has been incised into the surrounding conglomerates, exposing the varying layers of sedimentation deposited over millions of years. The shaded cool depths of the canyon allow pools of water to gather during the rainy season and remain for much of the year round. These pools were a vital source of water for early settlers who drew water for their livestock by knotting six (ses) lengths of rawhide thongs (riems) together, hence the canyon and surrounding area became known as Sesriem. Overnight at Dead Valley Lodge, set right inside Namib-Naukluft park, which gives us

DAY 11 CLIMB SOSSUSVLEI DUNES / NAMIBRAND PRIVATE NATURE RESERVE / TOK TOKKIE

Sunrise amid the dunes is magic—the colors are fantastic as the light becomes sharper and shadows accentuate their huge shapes and curves. The over 900-foot-high dunes are the highest in the world, dwarfing everything in comparison, and

mark the endpoint of the Tsauchab River, which penetrates deep into the Great Sand Sea. Some 60,000 years ago, the encroaching sand blocked its course, and the dunes now fill this otherworldly landscape. The cool morning hours are the best time to climb one of the dunes, following the spine of sand for fantastic views over the desert. We'll also hike through Deadvlei—on a stark white clay pan, gnarled and ghostly camel thorn trees still stand, slowly fossilizing in the dry desert air. The trees perished more

than 900 years ago when the sand sea finally blocked the river from flooding the pan.

After a picnic breakfast, we head to NamibRand Nature Reserve, the largest privately owned nature reserve in all of southern Africa. The diversity of landscapes is exceptional, with virtually every aspect of the Namib Desert represented:



expansive sandy plains and endless stretches of grassy savanna alternating with majestic mountain ranges and low dune belts of deep red sand. The variety of flora and fauna is as fascinating as the colors of the landscape, which change constantly as the day progresses. But the real star of the show is the night sky. This is Africa's first Dark Sky Reserve, and each night we'll thrill to some of the most fantastic stargazing on Earth.

We'll enjoy a late lunch at the historic farmstead on the reserve, then meet our specialist guide and set off on foot through a vast and eternal land, experiencing it at a pace that allows our minds to relax and absorb both the immensity and the details of the surprisingly vibrant desert. This afternoon's walk is about 3 hours, bringing us to our enchanting camp, complete with an al fresco bar and dining table and an ingenious camp set up. We'll each have our own individual "dune bed," with a comfy cot, thick duvet, lantern, and bedside table. Sundowners and a memorable meal await, and after the sun sets, the starscapes are astounding. We've timed our departures so we are here during the new moon, so we'll be able to see not only the Milky Way, but the Clouds of Magellan, satellite galaxies of the Milky Way. Overnight at our Tok Tokkie campsite...BLD

Driving Details: 2 hours

Walking Details: Approximately 2-3 hours, 3.1 miles.

DAY 12 HIKING THE TOK TOKKIE TRAIL

We'll enjoy a light breakfast and set off in the cool of the morning (when the light is the most magical!), as our naturalist guide "reads the newspaper" of the desert, deciphering the tracks left by wildlife the night before. The desert is not deserted at all, supporting fascinating flora that survives by tapping underground water from the riverbed, and insect life that drinks in the fog captured from ocean breezes. We may also see oryx, springbok, ostrich, and herds of mountain zebra galloping across the desert. Arriving in our new camp, we'll savor a delicious dinner amid the desert silence—punctuated by occasional gecko barks and hyena cries—and drift off to sleep beneath a blanket of brilliant stars that stretches from horizon to horizon across a velvet black sky. Overnight at our Tok Tokkie campsite...BLD
Walking Details: Approximately 7.5 hours, 6 miles.

DAY 13 NAMIBRAND NATURE RESERVE TO WINDHOEK

Our morning walk is a short one; we meet the vehicles and return to the homestead, then head back to Windhoek. Tonight we gather for a festive Farewell Dinner in celebration of our adventure. Overnight at Galton House in Windhoek...BLD
Driving Details: 5-6 hours / Walking Details: Approximately 1-3 hours, 1-3 miles, depending on the location of the vehicles.

DAY 14 DEPART

Transfer to the Windhoek International Airport for your international flight home...B

CURRENCY EXCHANGE RATE

Due to the volatility of currency markets, we can only offer the most competitive pricing on our trips in Namibia by partially tying the trip cost directly to the value of the Namibian Dollar, tied to the South African Rand. In the late spring of 2023, when we set the rates for our 2024 program, the US Dollar equaled 18.4 South African Rand. While in most years, no price changes are ever necessary, if there were to be a significant change in exchange rates, we may be forced to raise or able to lower our trip cost; if so, your final invoice, sent two weeks before your final payment is due, will reflect the difference. Please note that the calculation will not be a straight proration. While most of the trip cost is paid in South African Rand, the remainder of our expenses are paid in US Dollars. The overall effect is to moderate any change; thus, if the South African Rand were to rise in value, the trip cost would rise less than might be expected, and if the South African Rand were to fall, the drop in land price would also be less than might be expected.

A stay at Shumbalala Game Lodge, in the Thornybush Reserve bordering Kruger National Park, South Africa, is an ideal way to experience additional game viewing while enjoying the amenities of a deluxe wildlife lodge. Set on the banks of the Monwana River, Shumbalala is an oasis of luxurious comfort in the heart of the African bushveld. Activities include morning and late afternoon game drives in search of the Big Five, bush walks in the company of an expert ranger and tracker, or simply relaxing on decks overlooking a waterhole where animals frequently congregate. Accommodations



GALTON HOUSE

Windhoek, Namibia Day 1 (1 night), Day 13 (1 night)

This welcoming nine-room hotel, just a 10-minute shuttle drive from the center of town, offers a personal and informal atmosphere. Guest rooms are decorated in an inviting modern style, with wildlife photography adorning the walls. Communal areas include a large lounge, indoor and outdoor dining areas, and a small swimming pool. The hotel is named after the explorer and polymath Francis Galton, who produced the first maps of Namibia's interior.



OKONJIMA BUSH CAMP

Omboroko Mountains, Namibia Day 2 (1 night)

Home to the AfriCat Foundation, this luxury bush camp features eight thatched, African-style chalets decorated in earthy tones. The chalets are very spacious, have en suite bathrooms, and can be opened wide during the day for enjoying the views and watching birds in the garden right from your room. A secluded swimming pool awaits at the end of a busy day of game viewing. The food is of a very high standard and the staff and guides are terrific.



ONGAVA LODGE

Ongava Game Reserve, Namibia Days 3 to 4 (2 nights)

An intimate lodge with 12 spacious en suite cabins built of rock and thatch, Ongava offers comfort in the wilderness, a relaxed atmosphere, and a friendly staff. The cabins have air conditioning, ceiling fans, and private verandas great for gameviewing. At the main lodge, meals are served buffet style on an open deck overlooking a waterhole, floodlit at night so guests can see wildlife, including rhinos and sometimes lions, as they gather at the waterhole. The lodge is located on private land on the southern boundary of Etosha National Park.



CAMP DOROS

Damaraland, Namibia Days 5 to 6 (2 nights)

This intimate camp is ideally suited as a base camp for our adventures in tracking black rhino, as it lies in an area renowned for harboring these creatures. Set in a grove of mopane trees, the camp carries arguably the lowest environmental footprint of any camp in Namibia. Six guest tents are set on raised platforms and feature twin or double beds, solar power for lighting and charging points, hot showers and en suite flush toilets. Common areas include a bar, dining room, lounge with fireplaces and a campfire deck, plunge pool, and sun deck.

CAMP KIPWE

Twyfelfontein, Namibia Days 7 to 8 (2 nights)

Situated in the Twyfelfontein Conservancy, this unique camp is creatively tucked among the dramatic granite boulders of the area. The nine guest rooms are round-shaped rondavels with African-style decor, each one nestled between boulders amid superb wilderness scenery. The enchanting evening pre-dinner ritual is sundowners at the top of the boulders, as you watch an unforgettable sunset over the Namibian desert. The camp's central area and dining room are also great places to enjoy amazing views. Meals are fresh and delicious and the wine list is excellent.



THE DELIGHT SWAKOPMUND

Swakopmund, Namibia Day 9 (1 night)

The Delight Swakopmund is a boutique hotel with brightly colored artistic touches for an eye-catching and contemporary feel. Room amenities include crisp linens, large bathrooms, fridges, and Nespresso machines. The staff is friendly and the breakfast buffet is out of this world (including oysters and champagne!). Swakopmund's shops and restaurants are only a five-minute walk away.



DEAD VALLEY LODGE

Sesriem, Namibia Day 10 (1 night)

Views of red sand dunes and rugged mountain ranges extend out in every direction from this stunning lodge, located inside the Namib-Naukluft Park. Each of the 20 climate-controlled tented chalets has a private bathroom with shower and a panoramic view of the Namib Desert. Community areas include a bar, swimming pool, and open-air restaurant that serves fresh, Namibian-style cuisine.

TOK TOKKIE TRAIL

NamibRand Nature Reserve, Namibia Days 11 to 12 (2 nights)

Tok Tokkie is located in the southern part of the NamibRand Nature Reserve, the largest privately owned nature reserve in southern Africa. Here we sleep not in safari tents but in special open-air “dune beds.” These are fairly comfortable outdoor beds with foam mattresses, cotton duvets, and pillows—and you’ll sleep right below the star-filled sky. The bedding fits inside a waterproof canvas outer duvet that keeps the bed warm. Near your individual bed there’s a hand basin with water, a camp chair, and a table. Meals are also served in an open dining area around a table and chairs. The bucket shower and a toilet shelter are nearby, yet secluded.

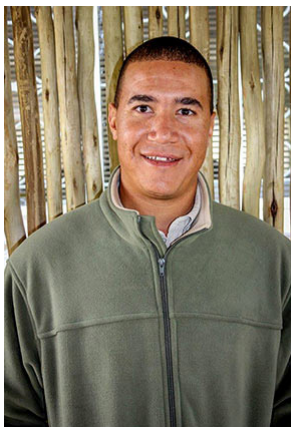
USKO HANGHUWO

What to Expect

WHAT THE TRIP IS LIKE

The trip is Level 3, Moderate, according to our trip grading system. This is a camping and lodge safari with game viewing by 4WD vehicle, nature walks, and long driving days. The hiking is mostly on easy terrain, but there are some sections of walking through sand dunes or on rough, hilly terrain with loose scree, which requires well-balanced and secure walking. We have two half-days and one full day of hiking; distances normally don't exceed 6 miles per day, and the pace is set to suit the group. Fitness and good conditioning are essential for enjoying this hike. Please bring well-broken-in lightweight hiking boots for these days, as well as for the hikes on the Sossusvlei Dunes.

Due to its vast distances, an integral part of any Namibia safari is driving, and this is part of the adventure. We will be in the company of the Trip Leader, who will make the road journeys very interesting and point out many highlights en route. While the driving times may appear long, there is a lot to see and the scenery is dramatic and beautiful. Our vehicles are very comfortable and have supplies for tea, picnic lunches, etc.

Although this is not a particularly rigorous trip, we still recommend you undertake a preparatory program of physical conditioning (especially if you want to climb the sand dunes in Sossusvlei, which can be quite challenging; it's also recommended for the Tok Tokkie Trail). Daily walking or regular hiking, jogging, and stair-climbing are excellent preparatory exercises.

Any African safari is an adventure, and the traveler should bring along flexibility, a sense of humor, curiosity about new peoples and places, and an openness to the unexpected. Please note: on the Tok Tokkie Trail, if we have a small group (fewer than seven trip members), we may share the experience with

other travelers. The maximum total number of travelers in the group would always be eight, to preserve the Tok Tokkie experience.

While on safari, most breakfasts and evening meals will be taken at the lodge you are staying at or in camps along the Tok Tokkie Trail. Lunches while traveling between destinations will be served picnic-style en route or at a café or restaurant if there is not a suitable picnic site. Bottled water, soft drinks, juice, house wine, and beer are included throughout the trip. All vehicles are equipped with a fridge or cool box stocked with bottled water. Tea and coffee are offered by most accommodations free of charge with meals and at afternoon tea time.

WEATHER

Namibia has a typical desert climate: hot in the day, and cool at night, mostly sunny and dry. Between November and April, daytime temperatures can be in the low 90°Fs, with night temperatures dropping to the 50°Fs. Between May and October, daytime temperatures generally reach the mid-70°Fs and can drop to as low as 40°F at night. The coastal region is cool and dry throughout the year.
